November-December 2021:

- Collation of community feedback in preparation for climate priority action development

May – August 2022

- Development of draft climate action plan with input from subject matter experts
- Feedback sought from local board and community stakeholders.

September 2022


- Plan adoption deferred at 21 September 2022 Business Meeting.

December 2022

- Workshop to gather further board member feedback on the plan

January - February 2023

- Amendments made to plan in response to local board feedback, community groups engaged

Table formatting

- Clarity around funded vs unfunded activity
- Timeframes be adjusted from specific years, to short/medium/long term

Plan actions linked to existing community activity

- Include in the plan which community groups can collaborate on specific actions

Various minor changes needed to specific points in the plan e.g.

- Food at board meetings
- Rosedale Road cycleway and Smales Farm not in Kaipātiki area
- Chatswood shouldn't be categorised as “local centre”.

Local Climate Activator role

- Whether or not this role is fit for purpose and the best use of funds, given financial pressures

A series of additions have been made to the plan following the flood event and cyclone.

These are highlighted in the plan in green.



Local Climate Activator

The Board signalled that this role may not be suitable in the Kaipātiki context and that due to financial pressures there is unlikely to be funding available to continue this role in future years.

Implications of not pursuing the Local Climate Activator

- No resource for championing plan and community efforts to reduce emissions
- Activator could have progressed some of the aspirational actions with community
- Activator was going to monitor and report on some actions in the plan.



Proposed alternative to the Local Climate Activator

Proposed community activation programme to use the \$20k allocated for Local Climate Action in this year's (2022/2023) work programme. This proposal is outlined in full as a supplementary document.

- The costings below total to \$20k however there is scope to scale some projects up if the board chooses not to fund all of them.
- \$9k - **Pest Free Kaipātiki** – Planting and restoration for slips following flooding
- \$2k - **Kaipātiki Project** – The Community Kitchen sustainable food workshops
- \$8k - **Bike Kaipātiki** – Pop-up bike maintenance days
- \$1k - **Highbury House** – Repair Cafes



Te Ara Awataha - completed

- Greenslade Reserve, school's edge and Cadness Loop Reserve - blessing ceremony was held on Friday 9 December
- A community celebration day is planned for 1 April to promote the new greenway
- New temporary signage is being installed to help people enjoy and use the greenway
- Several new mana whenua artworks are being installed along Te Ara Awataha
- Full completion of schools' edge in Q2 2023
- Basketball section of Cadness Loop Reserve open in March 2023



Jessie Tonar Scout Reserve

- Construction due to commence in coming months – procurement is underway for contractor
- Local residents will be advised prior to works starting
- Work underway with mana whenua artists to integrate cultural design elements




A space to relax, gather and connect

The gathering space form and design is inspired by the puriri moth, as described on page 5. The bench seating is arranged in such a way to provide for passive recreation for a group to gather together, including for educational purposes. The ground space is a play surface- soft rubber matting- reflecting the characteristic of the spongy feel of a puriri moth nest whilst encouraging play amongst the users. The lower area provides a safe way to engage with the stream below.



Te Ara Awataha – signage and wayfinding

- Ongoing collaboration with mana whenua, Auckland Transport and Auckland Council
- Detailed design of standard AT/council signage and bespoke signage is nearing completion
- Signage content and locations have been further refined following feedback, and te reo translations completed
- Currently seeking quotes from manufacturers and installers
- Installation of standard (park and wayfinding) signage is pending reserve naming




Te Ara Awataha - standard park and wayfinding signage locations

S. 101
AT Gateway Totem

- Identifies entrance to greenway
- Gives directional information for destinations within and accessible via the greenway
- Mapping provides overall site orientation and promotes connections across Northcote via the greenway
- Flexibility of product design panels enables quick and easy updating of sign content



S. 102
AC Medium Entrance Plinth

- Identifies entrance to park (Cadness Reserve)
- Gives information for facilities and equipment within Cadness Reserve
- Pictograms on top of sign provide information about facilities and destinations

Note: This sign will be used in Cadness Reserve only. Sign content and allocation is TBC as design for Cadness Reserve is currently under development. Sign to be included in future scope.



S. 103
AC Medium Entrance Blade

- Allocated at thresholds and secondary entrances to greenway
- Identifies parks within greenway
- Gives high-level information on facilities within park



S. 104
AC Entrance Pole

- Identifies secondary entrances to greenway
- Gives high-level information on facilities within park
- Used when there is limited space and long sight-lines



S. 105
AT Shared Path Fingerpost

- Directs to destinations within and accessible via the greenway
- Allocated at decision points throughout user journeys


Overview



A healthy stream creates habitats for little creatures in and around the water. Do you recognise any of them? You might need to look in some shady corners—they like to hide!

Ā tōna wā, hei te hokinga mai o te hauropi māori (ngā tipu me ngā kīrehe), ka kite tātou i te pikinga ake o te ora ki te awa o Awataha. E mahi tahi ana mātou me ētahi tauira o te rohe pātata ki te ine i te kōunga o te wai, ki te arowhai hoki i te kauneketanga nei.

Over time as native ecology (plants and animals) return, we will see the Awataha Stream health improve. We are working with local students to measure water quality and track this progress.

Northcote Kāinga Ora progress 2023

- Started in 2016
- Around 310 existing homes
- Approximately 1,700 homes at completion. Completed 356 homes so far (105 Market, 144 Kiwibuild, and 107 social). 742 under construction.
- Terrace Housing and Apartment Building (THAB) zoning for majority of site (5+ storeys)
- 14% standalone / terrace homes. 86% apartments (3+ storeys)
- 5 stages, with forecast completion 2026

Amenity projects: Richardson park, Te Ara Awataha Greenway and Cadness Loop Reserve upgrade opened in 2022, full completion 2023


- NZ Living – Potter Ave / Greenslade Ave completed early 2023
- TLC and Universal Homes underway on 5 superlots building terraces/walk-up and 6 level apartments.

Community Engagement and Partnership – Kāinga Ora



Connecting Northcote information evening held on 8th November 2022 at Northcote Citizen Centre Hall, showcased work in the community, key milestones, information about Kāinga Ora and our home ownership products. Also connected with key Northcote stakeholders to update on the development, key projects and promote the good things that are happening in Northcote.



Community Engagement and Partnership – Kāinga Ora

Northcote pop up BBQ organised in collaboration with KCFT and the Community Development Team on Tonar Street in January 2023.



Number of initiatives being worked on with **Zero Waste Hub**, including **Tonar Street Revitalisation**, food scraps, **Adopt a Spot** litter and their monthly litter clean ups.

Placemaking and Community Engagement and Partnership – Kāinga Ora

In 2022 the Placemaking and Community Engagement and partnerships team collaborated on a one-year contract with local community group Kaipatiki Community Facilities Trust. Throughout the year they delivered several outcomes on our behalf. Some examples of this include:

- A full programme of Summer Fun /Winter Programme, around streets and park play. Activations/street play and events were planned and positioned in the targeted communities to meet the needs of these residents.
- Community Activations programme providing residents with a variety of options such as assisting in the development of raised gardens and a kai shed build.
- KCFT BBQ Van set up in local streets and parks with active play equipment and Hangi days.



Town centre development

- All 39 buildings have been acquired
- Business case and continuity strategy is being developed
- Go to market - second half 2023
- Enabling and supporting works commence in stages:
 - Community hub and Cadness Reserve
 - Ernie Mays St extension
- Woolworths development



Town Centre – tenant update

- 5 new tenants have moved in over the last six months
- 1 relocation, 1 exit and 2 leasing enquiries
- All leases have a 6-9-month termination clause in preparation for demolition
- Recent rain/storm events have resulted in numerous roof repairs being needed. No flooding from the ground was experienced



Northcote placemaking

- Supporting ongoing connections across community groups, connecting people to place
- Northcote community image installation (pictured) capturing 'Northcote Then and Now'
- Restoration work continues expanding across newly opened greenway spaces and working closely with the schools, led by Kaipātiki Project
- Te Ara Awataha celebration Sat 1 April – working collaboratively across Eke Panuku, Kāinga Ora, KCFT, Kaipatiki Project, schools, kindy and other community groups and organisations
- Good Evenings live music and games event – 28 Jan was cancelled due to bad weather



Zero Waste Northcote update

- Continuing to support Zero Waste Northcote programme as part of collaborative project (*Local Board, Eke Panuku, Auckland Council Waste Solutions, Mana Whenua*)
- Regular reporting on programme through Waste Solutions Local Board reporting
- Eke Panuku construction/de-construction programme approach
