Local Board Transport Capital Fund

- Auckland Council's 22/23 Annual Budget approved on 29 June 2022.
- LBTCF reduced to \$10.29 for the 22/23 financial year.
- Kaipātiki's 22/23 financial year allocation reduced from \$1,047,683 to \$539,032.
- AT Board are considering providing an additional \$778,305 which would bring budget up to \$1,317,337.74 but the funding would be subject to there being underspend in other AT work programmes.
- Kaipātiki currently have \$622,736 in current commitments leaving \$694,601 available.

Northcote Kāinga Ora development overview

- Started in 2016
- Around 310 existing homes
- Approximately 1,700 homes at completion
- Terrace Housing and Apartment Building (THAB) zoning for majority of site (5+ storeys)
- 14% standalone / terrace homes
- 86% apartments (3+ storeys)
- 5 stages, with forecast completion 2025
- NZ Living Potter Ave / Greenslade Ave completed early 2023
- Amenity projects: Te Ara Awataha Greenway, Richardson park, Cadness Loop Reserve upgrade

Zero Waste Northcote update

- Eke Panuku continuing to support the zero-waste action plan
- Eke Panuku team has produced a video series with Kaipātiki Project and volunteers of the Zero Waste Hub to promote the zero-waste mahi in Northcote.
- The numbers so far...
 - **Over 600 hours** of volunteer time
 - **12 volunteers** currently support the hub
 - **6.25** m3 of polystyrene to be recycled by Expol rather than being sent to landfill
 - **1.1** m3 of curtains for Habitat for Humanity to repurpose
 - 77 kgs of batteries to be recycled via Abilities Group
 - The hub also collects colgate oral care products, cell phones, tablets, and ink cartridges

Tidy Tonar Street Event

The event was designed to provide our customers with an opportunity to dispose off inorganic rubbish. Joining Kāinga Ora staff was Robyn from the Zero Waste Hub. We also had two volunteers from Auckland Council's waste team to help out and chat to those wanting to know more about zero waste opportunities as we move forward with working together with our residents.

A small amount of waste was diverted and taken by a group in Glenfield (Abilities) that recycles items like washing machines and e-waste.

Standard AT / AC Signage

- Directions for pedestrians (wayfinding).
- Park names and general site information.

Bespoke signage

- Educational and interesting for schools and younger visitors.
- Interprets the environment and key stories as identified by Mana Whenua.
- Could include video/audio content via QR codes.

Signage and wayfinding – standard AT / AC signage design



Signage and wayfinding – approach to bespoke signage

Through engagement with mana whenua iwi artists, the greenway's kõrero / narratives have been refined to focus on 5 key points, which focus on the health and quality of the greenway environment as a principal expression of mātauranga Māori.

This includes location-specific points along te ara Awataha (such as the Puna of the stream), and general principles applied across the work (such as ngahere / hauora / mātauranga). It may also include a graphic identity, or tohu which could be used across other council standard signage.

Signage expression of these points would be subtle and integrated, to 'let the works speak for themselves'. This could be done through integrated elements, and small freestanding markers which educate, interest and express the narratives as visitors move though the spaces.

Integrated Artwork to Cadness Loop Reserve and Richardson Park have been shown for context, which sit within an independent Körero.

> Puna / Source Source of the stream. Opportunity to acknowledge the journey of the PUNA of the stream.

Kūkūwai / Wetland. Opportunity to acknowledge the journey of the water and the unique stream ecosystems as the KŪKŪWAI.

Te Ara Awataha 'Puna 1' 'Puna 1' - daylighting of the stream source. Opportunity to acknowledge the journey of the AWA.

Future integrated artwork

- Shelter (outdoor classroom) Opportunity to acknowledge the role of this space for community and school HAUORA (wellbeing) and MĀTAURANGA (education). Also potential to incorporate information about the living vegetation & terrestrial life of NGAHERE.

Signage and wayfinding – bespoke signage design

- Designed to complement not compete with artworks and standard signage.
- To be integrated into the landscape design and tie graphic and spatial language to the place.
- Focus on cultural and environmental story telling.
- Playful and intended to inform and delight.
- Based around two characters a tuna and a kākā (yet to be approved by mana whenua)
- Integrated with the wider infrastructure on red steel to match artworks.





Signage and wayfinding – initial input from artists

- We are seeking input from artists to deepen the ties to artworks and the overall story of the project.
- Accentuating the focus on cultural and environmental story telling.
- Possible tie to idea of characters (yet to be approved by mana whenua).

1007 days closed due to varying Covid-19 restrictions and inability to operate.



events lost

due to the quality of relationships and flexibility, only 3 events were lost to the North Shore.

Keeping a balanced approach to ensuring our event clientele could continue to move dates as rules changed.

We introduced some highly innovative systems (such as in seat ordering) we found our clients were incredibly supportive.



We now see growing team registrations and growth in the sport which is in line with a national trend.

The Eventfinda / Harbour Basketball relationship has, I don't think ever been stronger and we look forward to celebrating (and supporting) their 50th Jubilee with them in a few weeks.



Harbour Basketball has bounced back well after a slow start to Term 1 post Covid-19 lockdowns.



Harbour Gymnastics has not feared so well. We understand they are currently experiencing significant financial stress and a slow recovery from Covid-19. This is understandable as a solo, and fairly expensive sport.

We have supported NHG (and HBA) with numerous amounts of rent relief and are currently awaiting information related to a further request for rent relief. The Trust Board has sought to balance the line between supporting Gymnastics and ensuring the Trust is solvent and maintaining the facility for the wider community also.
