Northcote Neighbourhood Progress

- Te Ara Awataha and Cadness Loop Reserve physical works finished and working through snags, final inspections and documentation.
- Northcote's 15 hectares of land development with LEAD Alliance is in the final stages and due to finish over the coming months.
- 425 completed homes completed, with 106 state out of a total of approximately 1700 new homes.
- Construction of **680** homes in progress, with **370** state.
- Northcote's largest public housing apartment build (6 levels) on Lake Rd finishes in August 2023, with 85 units and Kāinga Ora support services located onsite. A community drop-in is being planned for <u>Saturday, 9</u> <u>September</u>.
- Scaffold was removed from Fraser Ave public housing apartments (30 units) due to be completed **early 2024**.

Te Ara Awataha - update

- Following confirmation of reserve names signage undergoing final design, to be installed ASAP
- New mana whenua artworks are being installed along Te Ara Awataha

Te Ara Awataha - signage and wayfinding

- Ongoing collaboration with mana whenua, Auckland Transport and Auckland Council
- Detailed design of standard AT/council signage and bespoke signage draft has been provided to Local Board Chair + Deputy Chair for review
- Standard signage pending additional map input from AT
- Installation of standard (park and wayfinding) signage has been pending reserve naming, received mid August and currently in final design stage.





Jessie Tonar Scout Reserve

- Construction underway completion by June 2024
- Winter work approval granted so contractor will start the work within stream
- Local residents notified and being kept updated
- Access maintained to Aikido club during construction
- Lizard management plan and fish relocation plan underway as part of consent conditions

Town centre

- Go to market this remains scheduled second half 2023. The marketing material and information is currently being drafted
- Will take approximately a year to get to a preferred development partner(s)

Tenant update:

- 2 new tenants have moved in since the last update
- 1 under contract and few leasing enquiries
- 2 tenants have signed the new lease


Construction/de-construction programme

- Eke Panuku de-construction planned to support delivery of public realm in town centre
- Staged delivery, buildings to be removed as needed
- First building likely to be on corner of Kilham Ave and College Road
- Salvage survey undertaken many opportunities for material reuse
- Approach for wider area to be determined (development partner or Eke Panuku led deconstruction)

Zero Waste Northcote update

- Collaborative project (Local Board, Eke Panuku, Waste Solutions, Mana Whenua)
- Continuing to support Zero Waste Northcote Action Plan and programme
- Evaluation overview document finalized capturing delivery and impact of initiatives to date – to be shared as part of future update
- Zero Waste Hub transition towards working more within the community, to grow the commitment to zero waste across the whole of the Northcote neighbourhood.
- Regular reporting through Waste Solutions Local Board reporting Looking to come to a workshop next month for more in-depth update

Regular activations continue, expanding across newly opened greenway spaces and working closely with the schools and locals, led by Kaipātiki Project

• Time Capture

Celebrating Northcote past, present and future working with the Business Association on the Time Capture piece. In July, 20 businesses were photographed and interviewed across the town centre. This will be rolled out as an exhibition across Northcote later in 2023.

Design brief key points

- Building size/spatial arrangements to meet council, local board and stakeholders needs
- Final design brief for building and open space to meet current project budget of \$19.1M
- Design integration of the new hub with the surrounding open space - plaza and Cadness Reserve

Community hub and Cadness Reserve update

Engagements since last update

- 14 June: LB workshop; high level concept options provided to the board and feedback was sought
- 16 June: TAG workshop: Technical Advisory Group reviewed the high-level concept plans and provided feedback
- 10 July: MW hui held and high-level concept options presented
- 26 July: LB workshop; discussion re-spatial diagram and latest updates on concept design
- 15 and 16 August: Meetings with NorthArt, CAB and Plunket
- 18 and 21 August: Workshop with MW subcommittee to discuss about Take Māori Take Hono tool and how it should be applied to the project
- 22 August: Meetings with Hearts and Minds and Library





Community hub and Cadness Reserve update

Next steps

- September 2023: Local board approval of the services in building
- October 2023 to March 2024: preliminary design completed. Workshops with service providers, mana whenua and local board during this time
- April 2024: Present the final preliminary design to local board for approval

2023 / 2024

What it is

- \$2 million for the region
- From Proceeds of Crime Fund via Ministry of Social Development
- Initially one year look at future options
- Can focus on CPTED and / or youth crime prevention interventions confirm approach by end of Q1
- A community-led and town centre focus -Council as partner due to community connection
- Can be community organisation, BIDs & business associations led eg funding agreement for external delivery





Approved budget FY2023/2024 - \$50k



KCFT offset budget investment into current FY Manaakitanga work programme

KCFT had some funding left over from FY22-23 that would be invested in this year's activities.

- Waitangi Day event
- Kapa haka festival
- Maintain the Kaipātiki Tangi trailer



Objective

How we propose to deliver on the objective

- An active and engaged community, leading local initiatives
- · Celebrate a thriving Māori identity as Auckland's point of difference in the world

Local led activities include:

- Kaipātiki Matariki lantern making workshops \$10k
- BBCP Māori programmes \$20k
- Te reo Māori classes (8 weeks per term, 32 weeks annually)
- o Korero Māori Mai
- o Hikio Tahi
- o **Kai Tahi**
- o Matariki kapa haka festival
- Aru Waihīrere kapa haka roopu \$2k
- Tikanga workshops across centres **\$7k**
- Support Māori led initiatives meetings and capacity building workshops \$7k
- Local board engagement with Mana whenua and mataawaka organisations \$4k o e.g. marae visits, tikanga arrangements, hui etc.
