## Introduction

#26210 Open space drinking fountains and shade sails - action provision priorities - Puketāpapa

### Background:

- Drinking fountains have been installed at:
  - Margaret Griffin Park
  - Waikōwhai Park
  - Monte Cecilia Reserve
  - Three Kings Reserve
  - Wairaki Stream Park.
- A new drinking fountain in Hillsborough Park is currently being priced.





## Introduction

Project staff are now proceeding to the next phase of the project, scoping and installation of **new shade sails**.

From the Puketāpapa shade/shelter provision assessment May 2019.

- 2.3 Tākaro investing in play
  - highlighted that **shade** over children's play equipment can be provided artificially with permanent or seasonal structures, or naturally with trees, but that artificial shade cannot be provided at every playground.

There are two potential solutions to provide shade:

- Shade sails
- Tree planting





## **Shade Sails**

- Modern, customisable aesthetic
- Estimated Cost: \$25,000 \$75,000 depending on the size of the sail
- Benefits: Immediate shade, customisable, designed to withstand weather conditions
- Limitations: Requires periodic maintenance and replacement (five-seven years)
- Sails can be removed during winter, avoiding deterioration and extending the lifespan
- Building consent is required for shades with over 50m². Alternatively, multiple shades smaller than 50m² can be installed, therefore not requiring a consent, however this means more poles.









# **Tree planting**

- Natural, green solution
- Estimated Cost: \$700-1000 per tree
- Benefits: Long-term shade, carbon sequestration, enhances air quality, supports local ecosystems
- Limitations: Takes time to grow, prone to diseases and storms.

### **Prioritisation**

# From the **Puketāpapa shade/shelter provision assessment May 2019**:

- there are several play spaces within the local board area currently without sufficient shade provision.
- staff advice is to focus on providing formal shade provision in suburb scale play spaces and parks where people are encouraged, and the infrastructure is available, to stay a long time.
- many could benefit from tree planting as a cheaper alternative to hard structures.
- desktop research and site visits indicate that the following play spaces (listed on the next page) are significantly lacking in natural shade for play equipment and/or for caregiver seating and picnic tables.







# Potential play spaces to benefit from shades



### (1) Harold Long/Fearon Park

**Shade issues:** Large grade trees have been planted at the new play space but will not provide adequate shade for the junior sand/water play area for many years. Some caregiver seating or picnic tables have no existing or newly planted trees nearby.

**Opportunities:** Temporary or permanent built shade over the junior play area. Additional large grade tree planting to provide summer shade to caregiver seating.

Rough Cost Estimation					
Shade Sail over junior play area	\$64k				
Tree planting	\$1k

### (2) Keith Hay Park (central playspace)

**Shade issues:** No shade at south-western play space. One pohutukawa tree at central play space but no shade for caregiver seating.

**Opportunities:** Provide informal or formal shade as part of playground renewal. Additional large grade tree planting to provide shade for caregiver seating.

# Potential play spaces to benefit from shades



### (3) Waikōwhai Park

**Opportunities:** while there is some natural shade from nearby trees, additional tree planting is recommended for shade at picnic/seating area as part of any play space renewal.

Rough Cost Estimation					
Shade Sail over Picnic area, BBQ and partially play space	\$23k				
Tree planting	\$2k				



### (4) Margaret Griffin Park

**Opportunities:** while there is some natural shade from nearby trees, additional tree planting for shade within the play space is recommended.

Rough Cost Estimation					
Shade Sail covering most of play area	\$25k				
Tree planting	\$1k				





## **Freeland Reserve**



For consideration **in the future**, this reserve can experience high temperatures during summer and has a well frequented BBQ area. While a shade structure would be advantageous, the cost will be high (estimated to be \$80,000).

# From the **Puketāpapa shade/shelter provision assessment May 2019**

4.3 Significant shelters


Consider providing permanent significant shelter that:

- Accommodates multiple uses (eg. perimeter or moveable seating, picnics, small events, recreational activities for up to 30 people).
- Is located in a suburb park with existing adequate car parking provision.
- Is co-located with other buildings and facilities (eg. community centre, hall or swimming pool).
- Is near an existing public toilet.
- Has an adjacent area suitable for audience seating if used for events.
- Includes provision of water and power.
- Avoids nuisance effects for park neighbours and other park users.





# **Molly Green Reserve**



Noting that shade and shelter is proposed to be installed here as part of the development of the reserve by Kāinga Ora.

Opportunities: BBQ and eating area with shade shelter

### Introduction

This presentation is to provide background and history to the LDI Capex projects in your Parks and Community Facilities work programme.

- The current LDI Capex three-year work programme contains several old/historic projects that due to various factors (Covid-19, emergency budget etc) have been deferred and pushed into the outer years.
- Due to the current challenges faced in the capex delivery space (increases in building materials and labour supply) it is recommended not to fully allocate the yearly budgets. This will accommodate any requests (if any) for additional funds on projects that are underway.
- This presentation is to ascertain whether these projects are still a priority or should be removed from the work programme.

#### **Purpose**

1. To provide a summary of the Activation of parks, places and open spaces programme delivered in 2022/2023 (SharePoint ID#1009).

2. To seek feedback on the draft Activation of parks, places and open spaces programme in 2023/2024.

#### **Summary**

- 3. In 2022/2023, the Puketāpapa Local Board allocated \$20,000 LDI OPEX to enable and coordinate a range of 'free to attend' activities and events that support the local community to be physically active, either through the Out and About programme or other locally focused community or partner organisations and initiatives.
- 4. Twenty-one activations were delivered across seven locations with a total of 734 attendees.
- 5. Despite numerous postponements and cancellations due to adverse weather events, the programme was fully delivered.
- 6. Participant feedback was collected via a survey which was conducted across a range of activations and locations.
- 7. Ninety-two per cent of participants surveyed were either satisfied or very satisfied and 50 per cent were first time attendees.
- 8. The Puketāpapa Local Board was one of 15 local boards that provided an Activation programme across Tāmaki Makaurau during 2022/2023.
- 9. Overall, 936 activations were attended by 28,977 participants in 174 locations across Tāmaki Makaurau.
- 10. The local board is allocating \$15,000 for the 2023/2024 Activation programme.
- 11. A draft programme has been prepared for 2023/2024 for local board feedback in **Attachment A.**

#### Context

12. The 2022/2023 work programme included \$20,000 LDI OPEX for delivery of the activation of parks, places and open spaces (SharePoint ID #1009).

- 14. As a result of severe weather events experienced during the year some activations were rescheduled or occasionally cancelled. Affected activations were able to be delivered later in the year.
- 15. The allocated budget was spent, and the activation programme was fully delivered with 21 activations across seven locations with a total of 734 attendees.
- 16. Activations were delivered by a range of delivery partners.
- 17. The activation of parks, places and open spaces programme delivers on the following local board plan outcomes.
  - Outcome one: Inclusive communities that are healthy, connected and thriving.
  - Outcome four: Well-planned neighbourhoods and vibrant public spaces.
- 18. The programme also delivers on activity benefits from the local board's work programme to support the following outcomes.
  - More Aucklanders living healthy, active lives through play, active recreation and sport.
  - More Aucklanders connecting to nature.
  - More Aucklanders connecting to our unique Māori identity.

#### **Discussion**

#### Activations in the 2023/2024 Puketāpapa Local Board work programme

- 19. Puketapapa Local Board have allocated \$15,000 LDI Opex for 2023/2024.
- 20. With a reduced budget of \$15,000 for 2023/2024, staff are seeking direction from the local board on what their expected outcomes are from Activations programme so we can refine the programme accordingly.
- 21. A draft suite of activation themes are outlined in **Attachment A**. This attachment outlines all the activations of parks, places and open spaces in the current programme. Once staff have received feedback on the options below, a draft programme will be developed and presented at a later workshop for discussion.

Option A	Higher attendance numbers - more generic activations and less specialised.
Option B –	More specialised activations/targeted communities with less generic activations– attendance may not be as high
Option C (Status quo)	Combination of both Options A and B – Attendance numbers will be approximately the same as previous years or slightly lower due to the decrease in funding.

#### 22. Option A: More generic activations and less specialised-higher attendance numbers

The Activation team has worked with various delivery partners over several years to bring the community a variety of activations. Therefore, we know that generic activations such as Pop-Up Obstacle Course, Hungerball and Pop Up Play Stations and Kiwi Bubble Soccer have higher attendance numbers.

23. Option B: More specialised activations/targeted communities with less generic activations – attendance may not be as high.

Specialised activations that require registration or numbers to be capped for a better experience are lower in attendance but provide experiences for the community to participate



in activities they wouldn't otherwise do. These include activations such as nature play, girls skate classes.

- 24. Option C (Status quo): Combination of both Options A and B Attendance numbers will be approximately the same as previous years or slightly lower due to the decrease in funding.
- 25. Staff recommend the board support Option C.
- 26. It should be noted that regardless of what option the board supports, a reduced budget will mean fewer activations and lower attendance numbers than previous years.
- 27. Staff recommend that the specialised activations mentioned below are retained for the reasons outlined. These activations can be delivered in all options. The number of these activations can be reviewed if supported by the local board and can be complemented by some generic activations.

#### **Activations that celebrate Māori cultural identity**

- 28. The delivery of Māori outcomes is a priority for Auckland Council. Local board funded work programmes which include the Activations programme present an opportunity to bring this priority to life.
- 29. Staff have actively sought to engage delivery partners who can support Māori outcomes. For the last financial year this included the delivery of Ako Hoe Waka, and Ako Kēmu Māori as well as other activations that incorporate specific elements of mātauranga (knowledge) Māori in their delivery.
- 30. These activations provide tangible and accessible opportunities for whānau and community to engage with te reo, tikanga, and mātauranga Māori in our local parks, spaces and places.
- 31. Staff are proposing to continue to engage delivery partners who can support the ongoing delivery of Māori outcomes and welcome any feedback from the local board at the workshop when the draft programmes is presented.

#### Activations that remove barriers for women and girls

- 32. Research shows that women and girls are typically less active than their male counterparts but want to participate more. The Activation team has sought to address this by finding new delivery partners who can deliver female friendly activations.
- 33. For the last financial year this included the delivery of skateboarding, gymnastics and BMX activations led by female instructors in a female-only environment to encourage participation.
- 34. It is recommended that some activations specific for women and young girls are once again supported.

#### **Targeted activations to increase Asian community participation**

- 35. Research shows that Asian youth and adults spend less time being physically active when compared to the general population. The Activation team has been working with ActivAsian to better understand the cultural values and other factors that may contribute to these lower activity levels.
- 36. The Activation team has been allocated some Sport New Zealand Tū Manawa funding to enable the purchase of play and recreation equipment that can be used to support the Asian Community.
- 37. The ActivAsian team at Sport Auckland is eager to support the local board funded Activation programme and design targeted activations for the Asian community or connect us with local providers who can deliver these.



#### **Marketing and Promotion**

- 38. Participant survey data indicates that online advertising such as Facebook and Eventbrite continue to be the main source of where attendees see activations advertised. Recent changes to Facebook and Instagram's algorithm prioritises dynamic videos and reels over static images. In 2023/2034, delivery partners will be required to take short action videos of each activation. These will be used as a marketing and promotional tool to help increase and maintain programme engagement and attendance numbers.
- 39. Schools can be approached asking for support in marketing and promoting local board activations. Some schools did support the programmes in 2021/2022, however at the time they were prioritising communication with parents about COVID. The Activations team holds strong relationships with Sport Auckland's Healthy Active Learning Advisors who work in schools across the local board area and can assist in getting our messages to schools this year.
- 40. Printed material such as flyers and posters are not ideal as they become outdated as soon as there are changes to the programme. With two seasons of COVID related interruptions and severe weather events this summer, staff do not recommend printing flyers in 2023/2024.
- 41. This year, staff posted individual local board schedules on the Auckland Leisure Network website. (<a href="https://aucklandleisure.co.nz/out-about-auckland/">https://aucklandleisure.co.nz/out-about-auckland/</a>) including the full schedule for the April school holidays. The community can download these for their own local board, and they are updated regularly to account for any cancelled activations that are then rescheduled. As Active Communities operate the Auckland Leisure website, any changes and updates can be made more efficiently than using other platforms, such as Our Auckland.

#### **Activation programme analysis - Participant Survey Data 2022/2023**

Figure 1: Reasons for people attending activations




Figure 2: Percentage of people who were first time attendees vs have attended before




Figure 5: Ethnicity of attendees




Figure 6: Attendee satisfaction with the activation



- 43. Overall, the successful delivery of the local board's activation programme was well received by the community.
- 44. Ninety-two per cent of surveyed participants being either satisfied or very satisfied with the programme exceeded the Activation team's goal of 85 per cent.

#### **Next steps**

- 45. The local board to provide direction on which option they support, which will indicate to staff which activations to include in the draft programme.
- 46. Staff would like to know the local board's intended option at this workshop or via email from local board advisors by 24 August 2023 so planning can commence for 2023/2024.
- 47. Staff will prepare the draft programme to present at a workshop in September/October 2023. Any feedback received will help to finalise the programme.
- 48. A finalised activation schedule will be provided to the local board in via a memo before delivery commences.
- 49. Delivery will commence in late 2023 and activations will take place until March/April 2024.



50. Regular updates will be provided to the board throughout the year, with an annual summary provided in Q1 2024.







# How does regional filter down to the work you are doing locally?

- The regional plan will identify what whānau and communities across Tāmaki Makaurau need for effective recovery, and it will support community – led efforts
- It will be a guide to organisations (both government and non-government) and community groups in their planning, coordinating, funding and delivery of recovery activities across Tāmaki Makaurau
- It will foster co-ordination and collaboration between communities, and the many organisations supporting recovery in Tāmaki Makaurau







#### Outcomes

- A Tāmaki Makaurau Regional Community and Social Recovery Plan, that clearly articulates
  - How impacted people can access information, services and support, if they need it
  - Support available to provide safe, suitable and sustainable accommodation for those impacted
  - Support available for those financially impacted
  - Opportunities to support and enable people to lead their own recovery
  - Opportunities for building resilience and thriving communities, so that people have positive feelings about the future and a sense of connection and belonging
- Clarity about Roles and Responsibilities, and how we work together in a co-ordinated way
- Clarity about outcomes sought, millestones and timelines
- Opportunities for the future we want to see







### The process for developing the Plan

- Consider early and initial priorities identified by the Community and Social Recovery whenu, based on needs identified through the response and early recovery
- Engage widely and seek feedback on initial priorities and seek input on needs, issues and opportunities to be involved in the development of the plan
  - Have 7 place-based face to face hui across Tāmaki Makaurau South, Central, West Coast, West, North, Upper North, Pūhoi/Rural
  - Hui with representatives from priority populations, through the 7 Auckland Council Advisory Groups
  - Hui with Government partners and stakeholders 7 Sep, 1pm-1.30pm
  - Hui with internal Council units where there is alignment
  - Hui with other Recovery Team whenu
- Timeline:
  - Hui take place August 2023
  - Draft Plan finalised September 2023
  - Final plan published by 1 October 2023
