Purpose

1. To provide information on the implementation of the decision to reduce investment in library operating hours for 2023/2024.

Summary

- 2. The Puketāpapa Local Board began investing in additional library hours for the Mt Roskill Library in 2016/2017 to sustain the preferred level of service at a time of Asset Base Service (ABS) funding reductions.
- 3. The investment has secured an additional two operating hours per week, making the service available to customers between 10am and 12pm each Sunday.
- 4. With additional fiscal pressure surrounding the finalisation of 2023/2024 local board work programme, the local board has chosen not to continue this Locally Driven Initiative (LDI) investment this year.
- 5. Staff are working to operationalise this decision and expect it to be in place by December 2023, with the full value of the financial benefit being effective immediately following the change to operational hours.
- 6. Having reviewed the current pattern of visitation through week, staff recommend a slight change to operating hours to optimise availability.

Context

- 7. In recent years, Puketāpapa Local Board has chosen to "top up" the operating hours of the Mt Roskill Library using its Locally Driven Initiatives (LDI) funding.
- 8. In July 2023, the local board decided to stop the additional funding for Mt Roskill Library, meaning that two hours of service each week (10am-noon Sunday) will cease. The \$19,400 LDI has been removed from the operational budget of the library service, effective from 1 July 2023.

Discussion

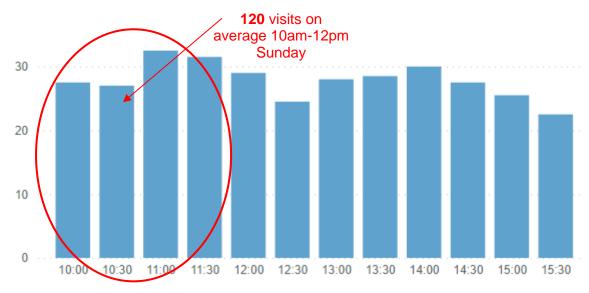
- 9. Figure 1 below indicates the impact to Mt Roskill Library of reducing service by two hours on Sunday. It shows the rolling 12-month average visitation for the LDI funded top-up hours from 10am-12pm.
- 10. In total, 120 visits per week would be affected by this change. Staff anticipate that while some affected customers would adjust their visitation time and continue to make use of the library, other visitors would not be able to visit the library outside of this time.



11. The reduction in service to operationalise this change could be accomplished by December 2023. Partial costs, approximately one third, would be realised immediately. Staff would work to realise the rest of the savings as quickly as possible.

Optimising operating hours

- 12. Analysis of visitation across the Monday to Friday operating week (Figure 2) shows that between 10am and 12pm on Sunday is busier than the last half hour of operations on any day from Monday to Friday.
- 13. Analysis of visitation on Thursday (Figure 3) shows that between 6pm and 7pm on Thursday, there are fewer visits than at any other day between Monday and Friday.

Mt Roskill - Days (All) - Average incoming visits per half-h...

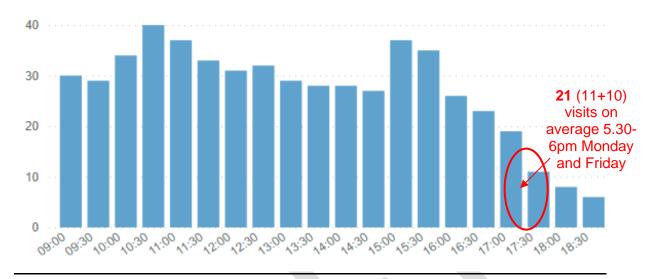
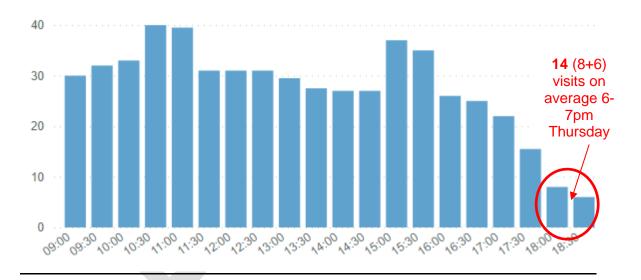

- 14. Staff recommend adjusting the weekly operating hours so that the Sunday hours are retained, and the reduction is applied to the last half hour on Monday and Friday, and the last hour on Thursday. The library will therefore close at 5.30pm on Monday and Friday and 6pm on Thursday.
- 15. In total, 35 visits per week will be affected by this change Monday (11 visits), Thursday (14 visits) and Friday (10 visits). Staff expect that customers will adjust their visitation time and continue to make use of the service.
- 16. Closing earlier on Monday and Friday will not disadvantage the Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB) as that is a daytime service offer. After library hours on Thursdays, CAB are able use their external door to run Legal Clinics.



- 17. These changes will help to support weekend activity.
- 18. Partial costs, approximately one third, would be realised immediately with savings fully realised by December 2023.

Next steps

- 19. Reset operations to be effective and sustainable at new funding level.
- 20. Communicate the change to customers and community via normal channels, including onsite signage, website and social media.
- 21. Continue to provide quarterly updates to the local board about the activity and performance of the Mt Roskill Library, including the library function.

Local Board Feedback for tailored measures investigation

Purpose of this feedback form.

- d) Where the local board is the primary funder of this specified service.

Reminder that not everything in your work programme needs to have an external performance measure.

Please do not include advocacy items, or things which are outside the service delivery of local boards.

Guidance for providing feedback

The LDI spending profile (in the workshop presentation) is based on your 2023/2024 operating work programme and categorised by delivery department, for you to consider as a starting point from a financial significance perspective.

Give feedback on local board plan initiatives which delivers services for the community and are intended to be consistent over the next 3 years.

There may be new services the local board is interested in, as part of the direction setting workshop, to investigate. These can be included for staff investigations as well.

Recommend avoid feedback on measuring advocacy or one-off projects.

Mt Roskill Library operating hours

Background

The Puketāpapa Local Board began investing in additional library hours for the Mt Roskill Library in 2016/2017

The investment has originally secured an additional two operating hours per week, 10am and 12pm each Sunday

In the FY2023-2024 workporgamme (adopted July 2023) the local board decided to stop the additional funding

The \$19,400 LDI has been removed from the operational budget of the library service, effective from 1 July 2023



Analysis of reduction in hours

Sunday – removal of original intent

- 120 visits per week would be affected by this change.
- The customers who visit Sundays tend to be unique and would not adjust their visiting times, as they are often using the Fickling Centre for other activities

Weekdays - reduction to week day operations:

- 10am 12pm on Sunday is busier than the last half hour of operations on any day from Monday to Friday
- Thursday late night has fewer visits than at any other week day



Recommended approach

Staff recommend:

- Sunday hours are retained
- reduction to the last half hour on Monday and Friday, and the last hour on Thursday
- library will close 5.30pm Monday and Friday and 6pm on Thursday

Impact:

- 35 visits per week will be affected by this change
- Monday (11 visits)
- Thursday (14 visits)
- Friday (10 visits).
