



- No active pest control lines







MBIE Community Renewable Energy Fund

Workstream A:

\$6.5m for solar PV and battery systems on community buildings in regions affected by Cyclone Gabrielle and other severe weather events

Up to 40 community buildings used to support the emergency response during this year's North Island severe weather events will be fitted with solar PV and battery systems. Areas identified for targeted funding are Northland, Auckland, Waikato including Coromandel, Tairāwhiti, Eastern Bay of Plenty, Hawke's Bay and Wairarapa,

Community buildings are often used in civil defence events to protect people during and immediately after emergency events. The Fund's investment in solar PV and battery systems for these buildings will provide communities with renewable energy for emergency events and for day-to-day use.

MBIE is not running a contestable open funding round for this workstream. Suitable community buildings – like marae, places of worship halls, schools and community halls – are being identified and prioritised in collaboration with government agencies, local authorities, Civil Defence Emergency Management and Cyclone Recovery staff, and community and Māori organisations involved in recovery efforts.

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Introduction

Why a focus on health and wellbeing in Puketāpapa?

Being healthy and well is more than being free from disease. It is often thought that factors such as genetics and access to and use of health care services determine a person's health. While these are important factors, the greatest impact on a person's health and wellbeing encompasses all aspects of a person's life and the environmental or living conditions in which a person is born, grows, lives, works, plays and ages.¹

For individuals and whānau health and wellbeing can be described as¹

- Toiora / Healthy Lifestyles. A balance of physical health, spiritual health, family health and mental health.
- Te Oranga / Participation in society. The inclusion of people to participate in society, access to good health services or job opportunities or recreation. To build the connections that helps us to belong.
- Waiora / Physical environment. The positive and negative impacts on people's health and wellbeing as shaped by where we live, learn, work and play.
- Mauriora/ Cultural Identity. The security and knowledge that our identities are valued is a critical foundation for good health and wellbeing.

To enable this holistic view of health and wellbeing Ngā Manukura (community leadership) and Te Mana Whakahaere (autonomy) must be in place so that communities, whanau and individuals can take control of their health and wellbeing.

Action at the local level increases interactions between people in the community enhancing our wellbeing, with local authorities, communities and local organisations able to create a built and lived environment that supports and encourages healthy behaviours.

We know that people's living conditions are not always equal and can lead to poorer health and wellbeing outcomes for some. These inequities are often socially produced, to improve the health and wellbeing of the community, we need to address the drivers of social disadvantage, so everyone has a fair opportunity to reach their full potential.

Healthy Puketāpapa

Healthy Puketāpapa will focus on environmental and system changes that support an improvement in health and wellbeing. It will deliver a mix of whole of board initiatives and focussed initiatives that target those most impacted by harm or poor health outcomes through a coalition of community, provider, agencies and topic expertise and in alignment of other council, community and agency programmes. Healthy Puketāpapa provides the opportunity for organisations who can influence the environments where Puketāpapa residents live learn work and play to align decision making and plans that contribute to the Healthy Puketāpapa vision.

1.1. How to read the Healthy Puketāpapa Documents

Healthy Puketāpapa has been developed to enable Puketāpapa communities and organisations to create a community with a sense of wellbeing, that feels happy, healthy, connected and safe. Healthy Puketāpapa: A Strategic Health and Wellbeing Framework outlines the delivery of five health and wellbeing priorities. Developed as a collaboration, the ownership and delivery of Healthy Puketāpapa will be through a coalition of community and providers. Healthy Puketāpapa is intended to be a tool that challenges our community, organisations, services and businesses to improve health and wellbeing at the local level.

There are two foundations documents for Healthy Puketāpapa

Document 1: Healthy Puketāpapa: A Health and Wellbeing Strategic Framework - The 5-10 year strategy for the development and delivery of Healthy Puketāpapa

Document 2: Healthy Puketāpapa: A Health and Wellbeing Action Plan 2019-2021 – The 2-year implementation plan for the delivery of Healthy Puketāpapa

Document 1: Healthy Puketāpapa: A Health and Wellbeing Strategic Framework

Designed to guide the work of Healthy Puketāpapa over the next 5-10 years the Strategic Framework provides a strategic vision and roadmap for implementation of Healthy Puketāpapa. More details of the framework and the context of health and wellbeing in Puketāpapa can be found in this document (LINK)

The Framework outlines the following

- A vision for Healthy Puketāpapa Puketāpapa communities have a sense of wellbeing and feel happy, healthy, connected and safe.
- Signpost Three signposts have been developed to guide how and where to put our efforts and to help us make decisions during planning and review. These Signpost have been developed based on themes from the consultation and build on community strengths and priorities.
- The five priorities for Healthy Puketāpapa are
 - o Wai (water) is the first and easiest choice of drink
 - o Access to healthy kai (food) for all
 - o Encourage movement
 - o Access to healthy housing
 - o Less use of harmful substances

Each of the Framework's priority area has 2-3 objectives that will drive action at the neighbourhood, environment and system level, and create links across other programmes currently being delivered in Puketāpapa. An additional enabler objective has been developed. This objective captures the work required across the five priorities to achieve the Healthy Puketāpapa vision. It builds structure and processes into the Framework and Action Plan, committing to a process of review, evaluation and sharing successes and lessons learnt.

What you said

- More accessible, clean and clearly identified water fountains around Puketāpapa in parks, town centres, schools and on bike routes.
- Promote tap water and the harms of sugary drinks, work with retailers to improve desire for water over sugary drinks
- Make water easy to access at events
- No more advertising sugary drinks to our tamariki
- The environmental is important this was a strong message from Puketāpapa tamariki –reduce and reuse plastic.
- Connect drinking water to our environment and our cultural stories of wai, awa and moana to build belonging in Puketāpapa.

What is happening

Number of water fountains in Puketāpapa 2019



- The east and south of the local board is not served well with water fountains.
- There are long term plans to double the number of water fountains across Puketāpapa.
- Partnership with Wai Auckland and Refill NZ to make it easier to reuse and refill water bottles for free anywhere

What you said

- Work with schools, businesses and faith-based organisations on policies to create a healthy kai environment and reduce plastic waste
- Increase the range of healthy food outlets and work with current retailers and takeaways to promote healthy food and discourage unhealthy food
- Discover and develop opportunities for local healthy food businesses and social enterprise
- Puketāpapa has one of the most diverse range of food outlets in the country and this makes people proud. The Wesley market is really valued but access can be an issue (days and transport).

What you said

- Puketāpapa residents love to walk especially with others
- We want to know where to access cheap friendly activity sessions that meet different cultural and ability needs
- Our green spaces are great, and you want to see them keep improving
- There are concerns about safety, fear of crime, poor lighting and use of alcohol in our public places which are deterrents to their use.
- Our road design could improve to feel safer for bikes and walking, so everyone can be mobile whatever ability or age.
- Create green and fun destinations that work across the generations and support mental health
- A desire to connect and care for Puketāpapa's maunga, parks and coastline

- Since 2015 there has been significant investment in urban cycle ways in Puketāpapa

Appendix 5 Te Pae Mahutonga



Ngā Manukura (community leadership)

Leadership for the promotion of health and wellbeing in our communities needs to occur at a range of levels from leadership for the community through community role models and among peer groups. Communication, collaboration and alliances between all social leaders and groups are important.



Te Mana Whakahaere (autonomy)

Communities – whether they be based on hapū, marae, iwi, whānau or places of worship, interest or residence – must ultimately be able to demonstrate a level of autonomy and self-determination in promoting their own health and wellbeing.



Toiora (Healthy lifestyles)

Healthy lifestyles are more than just physical health. It includes a balance of physical health, spiritual health, family health and mental health. A healthy lifestyle is holistic and can provide protection against health and wellbeing risks.

How we live our lives impacts on how our body grows and ages. We know that lives that experience many risks have poorer health. However, it would be an oversimplification to suggest everyone has the same degree of choice to avoid these risks.



• Te Oranga (Participation in society)

Wellbeing depends on how people are included so they can participate in society. It is about the confidence with which they can access good health services or job opportunities or sport and recreation. Wellbeing is also about our connections, the relationships that build a supported and rich community. Participation helps us to belong.



Waiora (Physical environment)

Health and wellbeing is shaped by where we live, learn, work and play. The nature and quality of this interaction between people and their surrounding environment and how this plays out has positive or negative impacts on people's wellbeing. This impact can be two-way, with people impacting positively or negatively on the environment which predicts how healthy or sustainable is it for future generations.



Mauriora (Cultural Identity)

Good health and wellbeing depends on many factors, and cultural identity is a critical foundation. The promotion of security of identity through opportunities for cultural expression held privately, publicly and within our institutions supports wellbeing. Identity is more than a sense of belonging, it celebrates sharing a group's cultural, social and economic resources - valuing yourself and being valued for who you are.

STARS Mt Albert is a therapeutic creative dance / movement programme designed to support the development of young people on the Autism Spectrum, and with related disorders including Global

Developmental Delays, ADHD, Anxiety, and Dyspraxia. Our

therapy team works hard to create a non-judgmental space free of able-ism and prejudice to allow attendees to thrive. The key objectives are to celebrate and empower tamariki with disabilities, developing their social and communication skills, emotional intelligence and wellbeing, coordination and motor function, as well as increasing their participation at school and the community. Sessions are led by a team of facilitators and run weekly for eight weeks with six children each term. The main priority of Dance 4 Us Mt Roskill would be to ensure that those with special needs and physical disabilities in our community feel embraced and valued. The sessions are geared to enhance the quality of life of our attendees, forming a community where attendees are valued and celebrated as they are, while they foster social relationships with one another. Our workshops invite active participation through dance and movement where participants get to explore their own unique talents, culture and creativity in a safe and accepting environment.

The STARS Mt Albert group creates a supportive community for youth on the autism spectrum and children with disabilities, offering them a sense of belonging and genuine friendships. These groups provide protection against the marginalisation often experienced by these children in mainstream schools. Participating in a group with like-minded individuals offers them protection against exclusionary experiences. The aim of STARS is to meet the identified community need for these tamariki who need support with social skills, emotional literacy, communication, coordination, and sensory integration. The benefits of this therapy are widespread - those attending experience a creative and fun medium for self-expression and self-esteem development, and the capacity to participate in school and family life increase immensely.

Likewise, our Dance 4 Us Mt Roskill programme enables adults with disabilities to build relationships and share experiences through dance movement, benefiting both participants and their caregivers. In typical caregiving relationships, caregivers often take charge, assisting with tasks such as cleaning faces or directing movements. However, our groups focus on the clients' self-expression, fostering agency & autonomy; encouraging caregivers to listen & observe, allowing clients to determine how they wish to move instead of having their bodies moved for them. The Youth Development Strategy Aotearoa says 'Youth Development is triggered when young people fully participate and that young people need to be given opportunities to have greater control over what happens to them, through seeking their advice, participation and engagement'. Spoken Word Poetry is an art form that's increasingly recognised as an effective vehicle for young people to understand, who they are in the context of where they are, what healthy relationships look like and how they can be enhanced through using tools such as active listening, communication, authentic expression, empathy and understanding.

Arts continue to emerge as a medium for young people to engage and connect with their peers, feelings and emotions.

In recent survey by CNZ it was found that kiwis believe arts have wide-ranging benefits. The majority feel participating in art activities makes them more confident (67%), helps them to feel good about life in general (62%), and helps them to make friends (58%).

The workshops often act as a catalyst for young people to start their journey within a thriving youth poetry environment where diversity is embraced, critical thinking is encouraged and young people are actively involved in their own development.

need safe, supportive and positive spaces where they are celebrated, uplifted and; can build, reflect on, and grow their own aspirations.

Food is a place we can all connect, and the environment is the mother that we all rely on. This large round swing is 1000mm across with a max load of 150kg's so can fit up to 4 preschool children at a time. The foam padded frame ensures children are kept safe.

This project will specifically promote active lifestyles by encouraging children and caregivers to move their bodies to slide, swing, climb, jump, dig, and challenge themselves physically.

Hillsborough Playcentre also promotes a healthy environment in our day-today operations:

- Hillsborough Playcentre is a smoke-free centre. All members and visitors are advised of this.
- We have 3 waste bowls on our kai table for rubbish, recycling, and compost. Children help to put these bowls on the table and we talk about what goes where, and being conscious of our waste. We have a compost bin and worm farm at our playcentre.
- Water is available for children at anytime and accessible for them. We only have water and milk as drinks for children. Families are encouraged to pack a healthy lunch, and we share kai to celebrate. We cook on session and talk about healthy food as the children help us to prepare the food.
- We have fruit trees and food gardens on site. Many of our members walk to Playcentre. We work with Eco-Neighbourhoods to run a second-hand children's clothing market to minimise clothing waste.

Does your project support any genders, ages or ethnicities specifically?

The project specifically supports children aged 1 - 6 years. Children love moving and movement, and being physically active is an important part of everyday life. The equipment we wish to purchase helps children to use large and small muscles and allows them to gain increasing control over their bodies. Physical activity promotes children's mental and emotional health as well as their physical wellbeing.

The outdoor play equipment and sand supports learning across all strands of the early learning curriculum, Te Whāriki. In particular, it supports the Exploration strand, where children gain confidence in and control of their bodies. They develop increasing knowledge about how to keep physically healthy.

Expertise:	Youthline has been supporting young people in need for over 53 years and we have considerable expertise in providing this support. We have built up significant knowledge and experience over this period such that we are recognised as the premier support service for young people in need. Our 120 Helpline volunteer counsellors receive intensive training and close supervision. Kantar Public research (2023) shows that over 67% of young people in New Zealand are aware of Youthline. Last year we managed over 145,000 contacts to our Helpline and worked with 14,000 individual young people. Research shows Youthline's strengths include having trained volunteers who can help and with young people supporting other young people.

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

For many of the young people we work with the first contact point is through the Helpline and our volunteer counsellors. Many of the young people are vulnerable – disadvantaged, disillusioned, disengaged - and their situation is exacerbated by the lingering COVID shadow and the extreme weather events of early 2023.

Our Helpline is staffed by 120 volunteers who processed 145,927 contacts from young people in need last year. They are only able to do this vital work because they receive comprehensive training and support.

Mental health remains a key issue for young people with 3 in 4 young people agreeing mental health is a problem in the most recent research (Kantar Public 2023). Last year 1,839 young people from Puketapapa needed our help, with COVID producing greater stress and distress for our rangatahi.

We have to be able to provide the best possible support for young people in need and we do this best when we have a well trained team of volunteers and support staff.

The community benefits when we are able to support young people through their period of distress and emerge with a positive plan for the future and can help build a resilient community.

Albert Eden

People are resilient and can adapt to change

Youthline has been supporting rangatahi and their families for over 53 years. Our kaupapa/purpose is to strengthen wellbeing through youth voice and youth choice such that young people are empowered within their communities.

We are well known as "the number one place for young people to reach out to for support". 67% of young people are aware of Youthline and 13% of young people have contacted us for help (Kantar Public 2023). We are a "with youth, for youth" organisation and the first point of contact for many young people accessing youth development and support services across Aotearoa New Zealand. We are a respected and trusted frontline service that has changed the lives of many people who have reached out in their time of need.

The Youthline Helpline is at the heart of our mahi. Young people in need who contact us through our Helpline often feel lonely, alone, disengaged and desperate. They often have a reduced sense of belonging to family, school or community.

We aim to ensure that the young people we work with have clear pathways from school to work. And we aim to engender a sense of belonging to their family, school and the community in which they live. In supporting these young people Youthline is very much committed to promoting healthy, safe, sustainable and active lifestyles.

COVID-19 has had a profound affect on the youth of Aotearoa and its impact is ongoing. There has never been a more important time to create a sense of belonging, connection and community. The pandemic increased the demand for our services to a significant degree and placed additional pressure on our already stretched resources and we are still stretched.

Now, over 3 and a half years after the first lockdown, the stress and anxiety that young people felt as a result of COVID remains for many as an underlying condition and will require great care as we work with our rangatahi going forward. And while the restrictions have now been been lifted COVID is still in the community and our rangatahi remain vulnerable to the distress its presence causes. In essence, for our young people there has been little relief from the stresses and strains of COVID since it arrived. Our rangatahi will continue to need support under the COVID shadow. We simply have to be there for them as they build their lives and transition from adolescence to adulthood, from school to tertiary education, training and employment.

In research undertaken in 2023, 75% of young people said mental health issues, including suicide,

are the biggest problem facing youth (Kantar Public 2023). And 1 in 4 young people surveyed said they had been affected by recent extreme weather events. Of those affected 2 in 4 report stress or mental health issues being made worse as a result. 1 in 4 report economic uncertainty being made worse as a result.

Youthline supports these young people, acknowledges their issues and is inclusive with a strengths-based, person-centred approach. We very much aim to build engagement and resiliency for young people and and support them in transitioning to adulthood.

Youthline services equip youth with skills and insights on how to build self-esteem and improve mental-health, how to actively problem-solve, recover from setbacks and build resilience. Counsellors link them with local support services to assist their ongoing development. Through their improved emotional and self-management skills young people are less likely to fall into helplessness, depression, addictive behaviours, dangerous relationships and unemployment. Our experienced youth worker teams provide individual support, mentoring, development and leadership opportunities to vulnerable youth throughout the Auckland region.

For many, connecting with Youthline provides a pathway to a range of personal development and life skills programmes offered by our team including personal development, job skills (e.g. barista training, CV writing and job applications) and learner licence training. All designed to better equip young people to be healthy and active and productive members of their communities.

Research shows that when young people are engaged in community activities, linked with whanau, and given the opportunity to participate feel that they are part of something and encouraged to reach their potential, that risk taking behaviour is reduced. Youthline works inclusively with youth, from those young people who are most vulnerable to youth leaders who are championing change. Our clinical support workers counsel/mentor young people identified as needing one-on-one support to encourage and inspire them. They aim to understand the strengths and weaknesses of each young person, then identify goals and milestones and develop a plan for successful implementation and progression. By walking beside a young person and providing positive role models Youthline aims to see every young person become a positive contributor to society with a strong sense of belonging.

In terms of our services going forward we know that:

- 1. There will continue to be a high demand for support coloured by the shadow of COVID
- 2. We will need to maintain volunteer numbers for our Helpline service at as higher a level as possible to cope with the demand and increased complexity
- 3. The need for comprehensive training and triage support for our volunteers will be paramount.
- 4. Our youth worker teams will continue to have a large number of vulnerable young people to work with requiring significant levels of programme resources.
- 5. Our volunteer and face-to-face counsellors will have a high need for supervision that in particular acknowledges the unique stresses and strains engendered by the pandemic and more recently the extreme weather events and worries about economic uncertainty.

We have a strong commitment to diversity recognising that our minority communities, including Maori, Pasifika and Rainbow youth, disproportionately experience mental health issues and are less likely to seek help.

A strategic priority is to hold an equity focus on Maori, Pasifika, Rainbow, Asian, Migrant and Refugee youth and young people with disabilities.

We are advocates for youth focus, youth voice and youth choice and providing leadership to ensure young people are prioritised and invested in. Recognising and addressing inequities and upholding safety is very important to us.

\$4,404 of the annual budgeted costs of \$121,000 for training and providing clinical supervision for our volunteer counsellors who staff the Youthline Helpline in support of the young people of the area and their whanau.

If part funded, how would you make up the difference:

We would not amend our plan as such. Rather we would continue being extremely proactive in applying for funding from a wide range of funders. The total cost of the Youthline Helpline will be \$1.576m this year. We receive funding of \$226,000 from Oranga Tamariki and MSD contracts meaning we have to fundraise over \$1.350m each and every year.

Since the arrival of COVID many of our funders have a reduced capacity to provide funding. At a time when young people need our service more than ever we are hugely dependent on those organisations who can provide funding.

Wesley Primary is a smoke free environment. Encourage parents who are smokers to quit by discussing the the benefits of not smoking at our parent meetings. Teaching parents and children the importance of recycling and reducing waste. Serving healthy food options at the morning teas. Any left over food is not put into the general rubbish but is placed in the compost bin. Only water or milk is served to the tamariki. The HIPPY programme includes physical fun activities for the parent and child to engage in and we actively encourage other children in the family to join the games. Encourage parents to use the council food scraps project and educate parents on how to grow vegetables and plant fruit trees, how to make compost and what can be put into the recycling bins. Encourage parents to walk to the parent meetings instead of using their cars or to car pool.

Does your project support any genders, ages or ethnicities specifically?

HIPPY supports all genders, particularly young children and women from all ethnicities. Currently HIPPY Wesley has 30 children enrolled from 13 different ethnicities and 18 different languages are spoken in the homes. Ethnicities include Maori, Samoan, Tongan, Pakistani, Sri Lankan, Fijian Indian, Indian, Chinese, Egyptian, Afghanistani, Somali, Bangladeshi and Iraqi.

Our Founder and Chairperson Gael Ogilvie has more than four decades of environmental management experience within the public, private and philanthropic sectors. Tread Lightly admin/operational support staff have a minimum of two years' experience supporting our educational delivery team.

Environmental benefits: As a result of this project, tamariki and their whanau from disadvantaged communities will be inspired to make simple changes in their everyday lives that will have environmental benefits including lower carbon emissions, less energy/water consumption and less waste to landfill. In our experience it is also common for the tamariki and their whanau to become involved in community-led initiatives to restore local native ecosystems. Over the long term a visit to the Tread Lightly Caravan could trigger visiting tamariki to take a lifelong interest in science and pursue careers in STEM.

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

The Tread Lightly Caravan educational programme benefits the community by inspiring student, whanau and community action to restore our natural environment. All students visiting the Tread Lightly Caravan have their photograph taken to take home, holding a pledge which describes an action they promise to take to "tread lightly" on our natural environment.. During our post-visit meetings with tamariki, we reinforce the take-home pledges, and we receive excellent feedback on the changes that have been made in the whanau and in some cases on how this has filtered out into communities.

We also host whanau workshops with some schools where parents visit the Tread Lightly Caravan after school hours and learn about different ways in which they can protect the natural environment. Our topics include recycling right and gardening.

Based on feedback received from some of the 800 schools we have visited over our 14 years of operation, visits from the Tread Lightly Caravan can trigger and amplify support for community-led environmental protection and restoration iniatives such as litter blitzes, urban pest-free projects and riparian tree planting that results in more native ecosystem coverage and improved water quality across the Local Board area.

Alignment with local board priorities:

Our people live more environmentally friendly lifestyles

One of the Puketēpapa Local Board's environmental objectives is to help people live more environmentally friendly lifestyles. This objective is completely aligned with Tread Lightly's mission which is to inspire New Zealanders to live more sustainably. The Board is also committed to supporting residents care for waterways, parks and public spaces. The Tread Lightly programme will help Puketēpapa achieve both of these two key environmental objectives and also contribute positively to growing inclusive, connected and inclusive communities.

With support from the Puketēpapa Local Board, TLCT will be able to offer subsidized Tread Lightly Caravan visits for approximately 600 primary-school aged children, attending the selected three schools. Based on the feedback we have received over the past 14 years, the school children who experience our interactive high-impact activities, take action themselves, and influence their whanau to take action, to live more sustainably. The result is less waste to landfill, reduced water pollution and lower carbon emissions. In many cases whanau become more involved in local community-driven sustainability and ecosystem restoration initiatives.

From a longer-term perspective, our visiting students have experience with exciting hands- on

science activities which may lead to growing confidence and interest in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) based careers. This is particular important for disadvantaged communities including Māori and Pacifika as these cultures are significantly underrepresented in STEM careers in New Zealand.

As part of our pre-visit to schools we obtain information on any children with special needs and/or disabilities and tailor our programme delivery to meet their needs.

Our mission is to inspire sustainable living, which means that a healthy environmental approach is embedded into our programme delivery. Our

focus is on waste minimisation, energy efficiency, improved water quality, reduction in carbon emissions and creating healthy native freshwater, marine and terrestrial ecosystem. Where possible we bring in broader environmental health benefits such as exercise (e.g. tree planting, swimming, walking through native forest), personal nutrition (e.g. consuming environmentally responsible food) and healthy homes (e.g. insulation). We believe that living in ways that 'tread lightly' on earth supports positive wellbeing and is aligned with te ao Māori worldviews that humans are part of, not separate to, nature.

Does your project support any genders, ages or ethnicities specifically?

Our targeted approach to schools within disadvantaged communities is specifically designed to maximise participation from Māori and also Pasifika whanau. Over the past few years approximately 30% of students visiting our mobile classrooms have been Māori and we are seeking to increase this level of participation.

Our educational korero and activities are based on a mix of matauranga Māori and Western science knowledge of the natural environment. We use reo and, where possible, explore māori history in the location we are visiting. Based on our experience Māori tamariki contribute confidently to our korero around the natural environment, because it resonates with their thinking and culture and reinforces their own innate wisdom.

Our project supports all genders, ages and ethnicities but does preferentially provide for school-aged children, Māori and Pacifika and females.

All of our activities and exhibits are designed for school aged children. As a result they benefit the most from our project but there are also benefits for teachers, parent helpers and whanau from other age groups.

As above we are specifically targeting schools in disadvantaged areas with significant Māori and Pasifika students. Our programme is well suited for these students given the key messages around respect for our natural environment and the specific korero and practices which are based, where possible on Māori tikanga, matauranga and reo. Based on recent STEM Alliance Aotearoa findings, only 2% of New Zealanders in STEM roles are Māori.

There is evidence to demonstrate that by age 14 young people have already made up their minds about whether or not they will pursue careers in Science. We believe that this early crossroads is a contributing factor to the very low proportions of woman in Science.

A Tread Lightly Caravan experience while at Primary School is a very small part of childhood but it could trigger a long time interest in Science in Māori and in young woman which would have significant benefits for Aotearoa New Zealand's future prosperity.

Requesting grant for:

We are requesting funding for one half of all the costs associated with taking the Tread Lightly programme to the three selected schools. These costs include all contracted teaching and admin/operational staff time to meet with the schools prior to the Tread Lightly visit, setup, teaching and pack down for a 2-3 day visit to the school, a follow-up post-visit meeting, towing and all associated administrative and communications tasks including liaison with the Local Board, Auckland Council and the media.

If part funded, how would you make up the difference:

We would amend our project plan by reducing the number of schools we visit to two. This would require a minimum amount of funding of \$4,500 as some of the admin/communications related costs associated with the current original sized project would still be incurred.

We are well known as "the number one place for young people to reach out to for support". 67% of young people are aware of Youthline and 13% of young people have contacted us for help (Kantar Public 2023).

We are a "with youth, for youth" organisation and the first point of contact for many young people accessing youth development and support services across Aotearoa New Zealand. We are a respected and trusted frontline service that has changed the lives of many people who have reached out in their time of need.

The Youthline Helpline is at the heart of our mahi. Young people in need who contact us through our Helpline often feel lonely, alone, disengaged and desperate. They often have a reduced sense of belonging to family, school or community.

We aim to ensure that the young people we work with have clear pathways from school to work. And we aim to engender a sense of belonging to their family, school and the community in which they live. In supporting these young people Youthline is very much committed to promoting healthy, safe, sustainable and active lifestyles.

COVID-19 has had a profound affect on the youth of Aotearoa and its impact is ongoing. There has never been a more important time to create a sense of belonging, connection and community.

The pandemic increased the demand for our services to a significant degree and placed additional pressure on our already stretched resources and we are still stretched.

Significantly the stress and anxiety that young people felt as a result of COVID remains for many as an underlying condition and will require great care as we work with our rangatahi going forward. And while the restrictions have now been been lifted COVID is still in the community and our rangatahi remain vulnerable to the distress its presence causes.

In essence, for our young people there has been little relief from the stresses and strains of COVID since it arrived. Our rangatahi will continue to need support under the COVID shadow. We simply have to be there for them as they build their lives and transition from adolescence to adulthood, from school to tertiary education, training and employment.

In research undertaken in 2023, 75% of young people said mental health issues, including suicide, are the biggest problem facing youth (Kantar Public 2023). And 1 in 4 young people surveyed said they had been affected by recent extreme weather events. Of those affected 2 in 4 report stress or mental health issues being made worse as a result. 1 in 4 report economic uncertainty being made worse as a result.

Youthline supports these young people, acknowledges their issues and is inclusive with a strengths-based, person-centred approach. We very much aim to build engagement and resiliency for young people and and support them in transitioning to adulthood.

Youthline services equip youth with skills and insights on how to build self-esteem and improve mental-health, how to actively problem-solve, recover from setbacks and build resilience. Counsellors link them with local support services to assist their ongoing development. Through their improved emotional and self-management skills young people are less likely to fall into helplessness, depression, addictive behaviours, dangerous relationships and unemployment. Our experienced youth worker teams provide individual support, mentoring, development and leadership opportunities to vulnerable youth throughout the Auckland region.

For many, connecting with Youthline provides a pathway to a range of personal development and

life skills programmes offered by our team including personal development, job skills (e.g. barista training, CV writing and job applications) and learner licence training. All designed to better equip young people to be healthy and active and productive members of their communities. Research shows that when young people are engaged in community activities, linked with whanau, and given the opportunity to participate feel that they are part of something and encouraged to reach their potential, that risk taking behaviour is reduced. Youthline works inclusively with youth, from those young people who are most vulnerable to youth leaders who are championing change. Our clinical support workers counsel/mentor young people identified as needing one-on-one support to encourage and inspire them. They aim to understand the strengths and weaknesses of each young person, then identify goals and milestones and develop a plan for successful implementation and progression. By walking beside a young person and providing positive role models Youthline aims to see every young person become a positive contributor to society with a strong sense of belonging.

In terms of our services going forward we know that:

- 1. There will continue to be a high demand for support coloured by the shadow of COVID
- 2. We will need to maintain volunteer numbers for our Helpline service at as higher a level as possible to cope with the demand and increased complexity
- 3. The need for comprehensive training and triage support for our volunteers will be paramount.
- 4. Our youth worker teams will continue to have a large number of vulnerable young people to work with requiring significant levels of programme resources.
- 5. Our volunteer and face-to-face counsellors will have a high need for supervision that in particular acknowledges the unique stresses and strains engendered by the pandemic and more recently the extreme weather events and worries about economic uncertainty.

Demographics

Youthline provides support services to young people in need across the ethnic spectrum. Last year 16% of calls and texts to our Helpline presented as Māori, slightly ahead of the 14% of young people aged 15-24 residing in the Auckland area who identify as Māori. 25% of our mentoring and face-to-face counselling clients are Māori and 11% of our staff identify as Māori.

All of our staff and volunteers are trained on the Treaty of Waitangi. Māori models of health such as Te Whare Tapa Wha inform our work with targets groups of rangatahi Māori. Youthline has a Māori working group (Nga Whetu Poutama) to guide Youthline to increase the organisation's cultural capacity and inform the work that we do.

Accessible to people with disabilities

Healthy environment approach:

Youthline Auckland supports the Auckland Council's Smokefree Policy and its commitment to working proactively with others towards making Auckland smokefree by 2025. We have a smoke free policy in place and can offer support, advice and referrals to young people who wish to give up smoking.

We ensure that the young people we work with are aware of our support for making Auckland smokefree and how we can help them if necessary.

Does your project support any genders, ages or ethnicities specifically?

As a "with youth, for youth, by youth" organisation Youthline is committed to supporting all rangatahi with a focus on ages 12-24 years. We have a strong commitment to diversity recognising that our minority communities, including Maori, Pasifika and Rainbow youth, disproportionately experience mental health issues and are less likely to seek help.

A strategic priority is to hold an equity focus on Maori, Pasifika, Rainbow, Asian, Migrant and Refugee youth and young people with disabilities.

We are advocates for youth focus, youth voice and youth choice and providing leadership to ensure young people are prioritised and invested in. Recognising and addressing inequities and upholding safety is very important to us.

Requesting grant for: We are requesting \$3,000 as a contribution to the Puketapapa share of

\$3,152 of the annual budgeted costs of \$86,595 to provide triage clinical support for our volunteer counsellors who staff the Youthline Helpline in support of the young people of the area and their whanau and for clinical

supervision of the triage staff.

Clinical triage staff support our Helpline volunteer counsellors, and have responsibility for ensuring the safety of young people who contact us.

If part funded, how would you make up the difference:

We would not amend our plan as such. Rather we would continue being extremely proactive in applying for funding from a wide range of funders. The total cost of the Youthline Helpline will be \$1.576m this year. We receive funding of \$226,000 from Oranga Tamariki and MSD contracts meaning we have to fundraise over \$1.350m each and every year.

Since the arrival of COVID many of our funders have a reduced capacity to provide funding. At a time when young people need our service more than ever we are hugely dependent on those organisations who can provide funding.

Poorly managed asthma reduces a person's ability to concentrate and learn and participate in sports, leading many to drop out. We know that 60% of children will stop physical activity due to poorly managed asthma.

Asthma NZ's promotion of a healthy environment approach involves raising awareness, providing education, and collaborating with community members, local schools, healthcare providers, businesses and organisations focused on health and wellness. This creates an environment that supports smokefree living, healthy eating choices, and active lifestyles. Asthma NZ can contribute to improved respiratory health and overall well-being in the community.

Specifically in our 3+schools program, our nurse educators raise awareness about the dangers of smoking/vaping and the benefits of a smoke-free environment. We offer a digital respiratory learning platform to primary schools which includes this message as well as promoting healthier food and drink choices. Certain allergies, foods and triggers can exacerbate asthma among individuals. Encouraging water consumption as the primary beverage choice aligns with promoting hydration and overall well-being. Asthma NZ encourages active lifestyles to the community which include low-impact exercises and activities that support respiratory health. Physical activity can have significant benefits for those managing asthma and COPD. Regular exercise helps improve lung function by enhancing the efficiency of the respiratory muscles and increasing lung capacity. This can lead to better overall lung health and improved breathing for individuals with asthma.

Does your project support any genders, ages or ethnicities specifically?

Asthma NZ has a strong focus on children and those in lower socio-economic communities. Because our mobile nurses travel to where the patients need us our services have a much higher uptake with Maori, Pacifica and those of lower financial means. We also reach into our disabled community that lack the ability to be mobile. Children, Maori and Pacifica are 3 times more likely to be hospitalised for asthma. Hence the partnership with schools and other kaimahi/community support services.

Unfortunately respiratory illness cannot be cured. The recent weather events, damp, cold, mouldy homes and increased anxiety have seen a rise in those presenting with poorly managed asthma and COPD.

Asthma NZ have 700,000 patients - our work is never done. Asthma NZ receive no government funding so keeping a nurse in the community for even a week makes a difference to a number of lives. It costs Asthma NZ approximately \$80,000 a year to keep a nurse educator in the community.

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

The positive impacts of early intervention youth mentoring, in particular for tamariki and rangatahi facing adversity, are immense.

Through ongoing mentoring support, relationship building, community engagement and connection to services, negative behaviours and poor decision making are significantly reduced. Additionally, health, well-being, academic achievement and relationships for tamariki and rangatahi are improved significantly. Our programme helps tamariki and rangatahi navigate the challenges they face, build resilience and increase life-skills so they are able to reach their full potential. Volunteer mentors experience a sense of fulfilment and are also offered opportunities for personal development and foster a sense of belonging within our programme and their wider community.

The impact of evidence-based mentoring intervention extends beyond tamariki and rangatahi in the programme. We call this the ripple effect which includes the tamariki, whānau, mentors and communities including schools, NZ Police, other social services and health professionals. Empowering local community members to make a difference for tamariki and rangatahi in their own

community is the cornerstone of the service Big Brothers Big Sisters Auckland provides. Our community reports being more supported, celebrated, strengthened and less isolated. We believe these are indisputable benefits to any community.

Alignment with local board priorities:

Puketāpapa

Communities with a sense of belonging and identity, and pride in our diversity

Our service is 100% community participation because, without the volunteer mentors from the community, there is no service. Volunteers are ordinary community members of all ages who want to make a difference and through their mentoring relationship. They make a connection not only with their mentee but also with their whānau. We strive to empower members of communities to support tamariki and rangatahi within that same community, acknowledging that the people who are experts in what works for a community, are those within that community.

We ask our volunteers to commit to mentoring for one hour a week for an initial period of one year. The mentor's role is to provide the Little Brother or Little Sister with a caring, trusted adult who is interested in their needs. We run an induction and training programme for new mentors, and require all volunteers to attend professionally supported clinical supervision monthly. We also provide ongoing learning and development opportunities for mentors, as well as 24/7 on-call support. The mentor is at the core of what we do. A Big Brother or Big Sister is matched to one child at a time. Mentors build trust, open doors to new experiences, act as a positive role model and, most importantly, they are there every week, when they say they are going to be.

The tuakana/teina relationship, an integral part of the Te Ao Māori worldview, provides a model for BBBS mentoring. Within this model, an older, more experienced tuakana (traditionally a sibling or cousin), nurtures and guides a younger, less expert teina. Embracing the principle of ako, or a reciprocal learning arrangement, this relationship acknowledges the fluidity of this relationship – at times, it is the teina who is guiding the tuakana. This concept recognises the knowledge each person brings to the relationship, and seeks to empower the teina to share their expertise. We pride ourselves on being able to respond to the specific needs of each tamariki and rangatahi, and empower them to forge their own path, with a positive role model and professionals walking alongside them. It is incredibly important to us that we are able to provide culturally responsive services to support our taiohi, caregivers and whānau. Our programme is culturally diverse with 29% of our young people identifying as Maori, 10% Samoan,10% Asian and 6% Indian.

Volunteerism serves as the foundation of the Big Brothers Big Sisters programme, acting as the cornerstone for the incredible transformations occurring in the lives of Puketāpapa tamariki and rangatahi. Recognizing this, we prioritise the creation of a meaningful and fulfilling experience for our BBBS volunteers. This project involves offering training and workshops to further upskill our amazing mentors. By offering consistent training initiatives, we provide our volunteers with opportunities to gain knowledge in diverse areas and impart fundamental principles that hold significance not only within their mentoring relationship but also in their individual lives.

This project provides comprehensive support to caregivers, whānau, tamariki and rangatahi by ensuring that their needs are being met with a specific emphasis on well-being. By prioritising support for caregivers and whānau, there is an enhanced capacity to nurture their families effectively. Consequently, this fosters a heightened sense of belonging, value and acknowledgement within the Puketāpapa community.

We build strong relationships with iwi, hapū and whānau by working together to support their needs and provide mentors to tamariki who need it. Our vision is Kia eke noa a Taiohi - all young people/taiohi realise their full potential. We focus on connection and collaboration, and we are strength-based in all we do, helping communities to build meaningful connections and inspiring and igniting potential in our future generation. 29% of tamariki and rangathai on our programme identify as Māori, The core goal is to build resilience and confidence in tamariki so that they are able to take the skills they've learnt back to their whānau/communities. We provide culturally competent services, led by the principles of Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

Accessible to people with disabilities

Yes - Within our programme we work with children who have hearing impairment, learning difficulties, and parents who are dealing with mobility challenges. This project will support these children and provide ongoing support and training to their mentors.

Healthy environment approach:

Healthy options for food and drink, including water as the first choice, Encouraging active lifestyles including movement or fitness programmes, Encourage the reduction of carbon emissions or increase community resilience to the impacts of climate change*

Our project encompasses promoting a well-rounded and wholesome environment. Our mentors achieve this by engaging in conversations about choices and viewpoints that might challenge positive narratives. The aim is to consistently foster an awareness of cultivating healthy behaviours and attitudes regarding the environment, nutrition, lifestyle, and personal character. The primary method of conveying these messages is through role modelling. Our mentors exemplify to tamariki and rangatahi what it means to be a contributing member of a community and how to participate in constructive endeavours. Our mentors promote well-balanced lifestyles, which is reflected in the activities they opt for when engaging with their mentees. These activities can range from physical pursuits to those centred around charitable initiatives, fostering a sense of giving back. We pair mentors with tamariki and rangatahi within their local community, eliminating the need for extensive travel during their weekly meetups. The activities and events they engage in are frequently situated within their community, promoting reduced commuting within Auckland.

Does your project support any genders, ages or ethnicities specifically?

Mentoring is accessible to all young people aged 6-12, however, once matched a child can stay with their mentor till they graduate at 18 years old. We work with the family to best assess the safety of the situation for our volunteer mentors, as a result, this project does not have restrictions on involvement due to age or ethnicity. We work with communities and all those who live within them to find mentors that will best suit the child. Where possible we match children with mentors of the same culture to be able to support their spiritual well-being and support the development of a sense of being to their whenua.

Amount requested: \$4,250.00

Requesting grant for: We are requesting funding for the entire project. This encompasses a mentor

development program spanning over a 6 month time frame, alongside enhancing the well-being and confidence of tamariki and rangatahi. This is achieved by addressing needs and offering products and resources that

improve welfare and contribute to building confidence.

We intend to revise our project by excluding first-aid training for mentors and the provision of resources and products aimed at enhancing the well-being and confidence of tamariki and rangatahi. We would potentially consider the possibility of seeking assistance through donations to cover the costs of first-aid training and the acquisition of resources and products, enabling us to fully realize the entirety of this project.

Purpose

1. To seek feedback from the local board on the proposed activation programme for 2023/2024 financial year (project ID 1009).

Summary

- 2. The Puketāpapa Local Board approved the activation of parks, places and open spaces project as part of their 2023/2024 Customer and Community Services Work Programme, (project ID 1009).
- 3. The local board allocated \$15,000 from their Locally Driven Initiative (LDI) operational budget for the project to deliver and coordinate a range of 'free to attend' activities and events. This project supports the local community to be physically active, either through the Out and About programme or other locally focused community or partner organisations and initiatives.
- 4. Direction from the local board was sought at their 10 August 2023 workshop to guide the development of the activation programme to be delivered for the project.
- 5. Three activation theme options were presented to the local board at the workshop for the delivery of the project.
 - Option A: More generic and less specialised activations
 - Option B: More specialised activations / targeted communities with less generic activations
 - Option C: Combination of both options A and B
- 6. The local board indicated support for delivery of a combination of both generic and specialised activations for the project (option C).
- 7. Staff have prepared a schedule of the activation programme as per the direction received from the local board (attachment A).
- 8. It is requested that the local board provide feedback on the attached activation programme which proposes delivery of a combination of both generic and specialised activations events.
- 9. After receiving feedback from the local board, staff will update the activation programme for 2023/2024 financial year (if required) before the delivery commences in December 2023.



Context

- As a part of the Puketāpapa Local Board's 2023/2024 Customer and Community Services Work Programme, the local board approved a project to activate parks, places and open spaces (project ID 1009).
- 11. The local board allocated \$15,000 from their Locally Driven Initiative (LDI) operational budget for the project to enable and coordinate a range of 'free to attend' activities and events that support the local community to be physically active through locally focused community or partner organisations and initiatives.
- 12. Three activation theme options for delivery of the project were presented and discussed with the local board at their 10 August 2023 workshop.
 - Option A: More generic and less specialised activations
 - Option B: More specialised activations / targeted communities with less generic activations
 - Option C: Combination of both options A and B
- 13. The local board indicated support for delivery of the project through option C (a combination of both generic and specialised activations events).
- 14. The proposed activation programme will deliver on the following outcomes of the 2020 Puketāpapa Local Board Plan:
 - Outcome one: Inclusive communities that are healthy, connected and thriving.
 - Outcome four: Well-planned neighbourhoods and vibrant public spaces.
- 15. The activation programme will also deliver on activity benefits outlined in the local board's work programme for the project as below:
 - more Aucklanders living healthy, active lives through play, active recreation and sport.
 - more Aucklanders connecting to nature.
 - more Aucklanders connecting to our unique Māori identity.

- 16. Staff have prepared a schedule of the activation programme for 2023/2024 financial year as per the direction received from the local board at their 10 August 2023 workshop.
- 17. An outline of the proposed activation events to be delivered as part of the project in 2023/2024 financial year are noted in attachment A of the memo.
- 18. The activation programme has 12 activations confirmed for delivery and 58 per cent of the project budget is allocated.
- 19. The unallocated budget will be allocated in early 2024 to any new delivery partners that may become eligible, or existing activations that have seen high attendance numbers or achieved high participant satisfaction levels.
- 20. The full amount of \$15,000 will be allocated by 30 June 2024.

Marketing and promotion for the proposed activations

21. Participant survey data indicates that online advertising such as Facebook and Eventbrite continue to be the main source of information for attendees. Recent changes to Facebook and Instagram's algorithm, prioritise dynamic videos and reels over static images.



- 22. In the 2023/2024 financial year, delivery partners will be required to take short action videos of each activation. These will be used as a marketing and promotional tool to help increase and maintain programme engagement and attendance numbers at activation events.
- 23. The Out and About programme is scheduled to deliver a significant number of free to attend community activations across Tāmaki Makaurau this summer season and staff have developed a social media marketing and promotion plan.
- 24. The plan requires a steady release of event posts, and general posts over a two-week period, this will allow for greater reach, easy to find information and will increase the overall user experience. The user experience will also improve by reducing the number of scrolls and clicks required when seeking information.
- 25. Printed material such as flyers and posters are not ideal as they become outdated if there are changes to the programme. With two seasons of COVID-19 related interruptions and severe weather events earlier this year, staff do not recommend printing flyers in 2023/2024 financial year.
- 26. Schools will be approached to support the promotion of local activations through partnerships with Sport Auckland and their Healthy Active Learning Advisors.
- 27. As part of promotion of the local board's activation programme staff will post individual local board schedules on the Auckland Leisure Network website (https://aucklandleisure.co.nz/out-about-auckland/).
- 28. As Active Communities operate the Auckland Leisure website, any changes and updates can be made more efficiently than using other platforms, such as Our Auckland.
- 29. The community can download the whole activation programme for their own local board from the Auckland Leisure Network website which are updated regularly to account for any cancelled or rescheduled activations.

Next steps

- 30. The local board provides feedback on the activation programme and schedule of proposed events
- 31. Staff will use this feedback to update and refine the final activation programme for the 2023/2024 financial year before commencing marketing and promotion.
- 32. Progress updates on the delivery of the activation programme will be provided to the local board as part of the quarterly reports. An annual summary of the entire activation programme for the 2023/2024 financial year will be provided to the local board as part of the quarter one update in July/August 2024.
