









1. The Esplanade

- Propose to use recycled plastic material (JakMat) for surface.





Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

The museum's collection of instruments, which was the life work of Lloyd and Joan Whittaker, will be maintained and thus its survival is ensured. The Waiheke community and visitors to the island can enjoy live music, learn about historical instruments and participate actively in making music. The museum is a valued island attraction and draws visitors to the island.

The concerts add value and pleasure to islanders' lives. Especially the elderly, sick, or disadvantaged, who often can not attend Auckland concerts due to financial or physical restrictions benefit from the varied and high quality events at the museum.

Also the local primary schools have expressed interest to be able to use the museum as an educational resource.

Alignment with local board priorities:

• culture and arts – creating a sense of identity and cohesion that reflects the island's identity. The museum offers free monthly concerts to Waiheke social services groups, such as MOW, Wish Trust, and Dementia Support. We are also offering the venue at no cost to WAL's orchestra and other one-off events, such as a fundraiser for a high school student who has been invited to attend a special workshop at NASA. In addition, the Waiheke community can attend monthly concerts, which are priced to ensure that they are affordable.

Our instruments, which are used for all these activities need regular tuning and ongoing maintenance.

We are asking for a grant to keep the instruments going so that the Waiheke community can continue to use the venue and the museum's resources.

Yes - There are limited things on offer for people with disabilities on Waiheke. We recently installed new flexible seating (thanks to a Local Board Grant) which allows us to easily change the layout of the space for concert, school, or community events. We are making a special effort to offer musical events for people with disabilities. We can only do this if the instruments are tuned and maintained. Life music enriches everyone's live.

We have zero-waste events; the venue is smoke-free; we don't sell food or alcohol; by attending events on the island (rather than using transport to and in Auckland), we all can reduce the carbon footprint.

The museum welcomes all visitors and offers a range of activities to meet diverse needs in the community, as much as our limited resources allow us.

Financial information

Amount requested: \$5340.00

Requesting grant for: Payments for 12 x monthly tuning/maintenance of instruments. Each month

we have two key instruments tuned and regulated (\$160 + \$160) plus a travel time allowance for our piano tuner (\$25/hour x 5 hours travel = \$125).

Total annual cost is $12 \times (160 + 160 + 125) = 12 \times 445 = \$5,340$

If part funded, how would you make up the difference:

Visitors to the museum would not be able to use the instruments. We would only tune the piano used for the monthly ticketed concerts. Overall the collection would deteriorate as regular maintenance is the key to the preservation of old instruments.

	Omiha Welfare and Recreation Society's tennis court. The OWRS has recently re-

	fenced the court and replaced the net, cleared the premisies of debris and weeds and removed tree branches overhanging the court. At present the court can not be safely used because of tripping hazards due to the deterioration of the playing surface. The undulating and fractured nature of the surface makes it impossible to reliably be used as a competitive facility. All the other necessary steps have been completed to make it a viable court. We have also established on the same court the only outdoor pickleball court on the motu. which similarly needs a safe surface.	
Expertise:	For the last 90 years the the organisation has continued to successfully maintain this sports facility, through fundraising and volunteer work. The organisation has continued to deliver a successful pest eradication project over the last 10 years. The organisation has succeeded in purchasing a historically significant public reserve (Crosby Reserve) The organisation owns and maintains a hall which has been used for recreational activites such as bowls and yoga and fitness classes and is hired out for social events, concerts, plays, film evenings and a regular weekend cafe

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

This project will benefit the community by transforming an already existing facility into a viable and safe place for people to enjoy safe and active exercise, particularly tennis, pickleball and other similar sports.

This facility has been part of the Rocky Bay / Omiha recreational and social ambience for 90 years. The OWRS built this court on land gifted to the OWRS specifically for the purpose of a tennis court . The OWRS has continued to maintain the tennis court over the last 90 years . However with the inevitable effects wear and age, the playing surface has now deteriorated so much that the court can no longer fulfil its purpose.

The project is specifically aimed at improving the health of the community and enabling people to leave active and healthy lives by providing a facility where a variety of games such as tennis, pickle ball, basketball and petanque can be played. Although this facility already exists and

is maintained by the society, remedial work is urgently needed on the playing surface to make it safe and fit for purpose.

We had successfully obtained a grant of \$4,000 but returned this once we realised that we could not meet the balance of the costs involved In 2024 we obtained a new quote from a different organisation which is well within our capacity to meet if our application for the Local Grant succeeds

In 2022 the OWRS began to improve the tennis court which was getting little use because of its dilapidated condition. .We first of all removed the collapsed fence around the court and erected another effective fence.We next removed trees overhanging the court.The surface of the court was the major problem .We received quotes from several businesses . . We had previously patched the cracks in the court but this proved to be only a temporary solution .The cheapest quote received was \$56,000. This was far too expensive We have now received an achievable quote of \$15,812

Summary:	WISH Trust requires funding towards its 'Garden Shed Project'. This is an integral step in its ongoing commitment to its 'Garden to Table' healthy lifestyle initiative. WISH is growing its own vegetables, herbs and fruits, for its own use and to sell excess produce at the gate, or at the Waiheke Market. This is creating opportunities for Tāngata whaiora who reside at WISH, and the community, to enjoy a community connectedness. A Garden Shed would house all manner of gardening tools, store seeds, potting mixes, bagged compost, planting pots, gardener's rain gear, gumboots etc. A shed would keep everything dry in the winter and create a seamless link to benefit the other successful garden to Table initiatives already in place.

WISH has amassed an invaluable amount of expertise in the growing of vegetables. Since our establishment in 1993 WISH has been developing the biodiversity of the land and gardens through similar projects. Currently WISH employs Rosie Bramley, who is a hugely knowledgeable and experienced gardener and has been able to continually develop the growing capacity successfully. WISH has previously initially fund raised for a water bore, a hen house, a Tunnel house, and for the now developed raised vegetable beds. Initiat the Food map was planned. Tāngata whaiora are now experienced and confide at gardening, however this expertise is hindered by the lack of a Garden Shed to store their seeds, tools, and equipment. Kaimahi are also now experienced gardeners.

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

The Waiheke community stands to benefit from the WISH Garden to Table Initiative, which seeks support for funding a Garden Shed. The community will enjoy more of the healthy, organic, unsprayed produce sold at WISH's gate for an affordable price which is much less than people are having to pay shops. This landowner conservation effort to continue to increase productivity of the land by growing vegetables and planting more fruiting trees, will also benefit the community by reducing carbon emissions and increasing carbon storage in soil and plants. This in turn protects the natural environment of green, productive, open, land which the community enjoys. WISH actively collaborates with other community groups which collectively benefit the whole community. E.g. the ongoing WISH Kaimahi (staff) training by the Zero Waste Manager at Waiheke Resources Trust. This project is based on Waiheke Island and WISH uses local suppliers, local procurement contributes to sustaining Waiheke businesses to weather their fluctuations throughout the year. This ensures that Waiheke remains a sustainable tourism destination which in turn benefits its

community. WISH community group works to produce a beneficial spinoff to the rest of the Waiheke community as all people can flourish and enjoy a healthy lifestyle

WISH is restoring its two sites into a successful, productive, garden environment. There is an urgent need for a Garden Shed which will effectively protect the huge amount off work and funding that has already gone into creating this productive environment by ensuring its continued and growing success. WISH Trust Tangata whaiora are flourishing from their work in their gardens and consuming their healthy, organic garden produce as no sprays have been used. The gardening activities are enabling diverse participation and inclusion. The Tangata whaiora represent a diversity in ages and ethnicities. However they share the diagnosis of Paranoid Schizophrenia in this Level Four facility. These people are successfully integrating into the Waiheke Community not least by interacting at their gate with the sale of fresh, organic vegetables. Tangata whaiora are proud to have been able to reduce their dependence on medication through interacting with their environment in their 'smoke free' gardens. Last year Waiheke Island experienced Cyclone Gabriel which made Waihekeans aware of their vulnerability in the event of a major disaster, where Waiheke could findd itself temporarily cut off from the Auckland supplies. Previously the Covid Pandemic made people aware of the need to protect ourselves against a disruption in the supply of vegetables by growing our own. WISH Trust is developing community capability and capacity with its own garden produce. This goes a long way to fil a gap and build local resilience. Waiheke needs to invest in its own food production where possible before an emergency arises, so that we can sustain our own fresh food supply in the event of another emergency.

Accessible to people with disabilities

Yes - Some of the Tāngata whaiora now residing at WISH have lived at Kingseat Hospital before it was devolved, and a modern inclusive approach using Community facilities such as WISH Trust were formed. Some of the Tāngata whaiora are physically disabled people as well as experiencing the

mental anguish of Schizophrenia. Some are older and many have comorbidities including intellectual challenges. There is a mix of male and
female, younger and older people currently benefiting from the forward
thinking of a General Manager with lived experience, through to highly
qualified kaimahi and outside clinical professional overview by Psychiatrists
and Medical expertise. WISH provides a raft of Rehabilitation Programs,
including external education and engagement with the community through
programs run by Waiheke Adult Literacy and Literacy Aotearoa. Community
activities, cafes, library, provide inclusion and acceptance. A Person
Centred approach using the Strengths Model is used, all staff are continually
updated and educated.

These short films have a rare insight into how Waiheke used to be, from the people who shared their own accounts of their experiences living on the island.

They are a precious taonga, because the footage features many kinds of people, some who have gone on to become prominent figures in Aotearoa New Zealand or others who are no longer with us. Over the past decade the tourism industry and commutable position of Waiheke has shifted the residential aspects of Island life, giving way to a new era of the island existing as a vacation destination. Looking back at this footage is for many, the only way to relive the Waiheke they used to know. It is important for the community to be strengthened by the knowledge that is shared.

• culture and arts – creating a sense of identity and cohesion that reflects the island's identity The Waiheke TV Archive has a collection of short documentaries that make up a visual history of the island. The earliest video in the collection is from 1933. It is important to document the everchanging landscape of Waiheke Island as it has moved from a residential society to a holiday destination over the past four decades. Waiheke is a special place and has an ancient history dating back to the pre-colonial era which has yet to be explored within this visual documentation format. Having an accessible and flexible platform for younger generations to learn from will keep the past and present of Waiheke alive for many years to come. As our generations get older, it is important to remember those who have shaped the island as it is such a unique community.

Identified community outcomes:

Ostend Medical Centre is the health provider for approximately 3000 of the island's residents, all of whom can take advantage of our free Health Improvement services. Our clinicians report high patient engagement with these services because often they can hand patients directly over to the Health Improvement practitioners. And even if the practitioners are not available for an immediate appointment, patients are more likely to engage with these wellness services because they have been recommended by their trusted GP.

Caring about the comfort and aesthetic of the environment in which we see people indicates to them that they matter to us and are important. It also helps them to feel more at ease, less anxious and better able to engage. In this way, the new space, would lead to even better outcomes for the patients utilising these services.

Engaging patients in their health improvement journey, whether it be through exercise and weight loss plans, mental health symptom management, medication advice or healthy lifestyle support, prevents disease and disability and saves lives on Waiheke. It also eases the financial and manpower strain on our health system and helps community members remain healthy and productive.

Our project focuses on the resilience and well-being of island residents who are vulnerable to mental health challenges, physical health deterioration, and social isolation, by connecting them with supportive health professionals and other community members.

Access to Ostend Medical Centre's Health Coach and Health Improvement Practitioner is a free service provided in collaboration with Fresh Minds by ProCare, our Primary Health Organisation. These practitioners support patients to improve their health and wellbeing, especially when the patients or their doctor feel like there are obstacles getting in the way of this or the patients are feeling stuck. If patients are dealing with challenges such as managing difficult thoughts or feelings, sleep difficulties, persistent pain, chronic illness or long-term conditions or would like support around lifestyle changes, children's/teenager's behavioural issues or relationship difficulties, they are referred to the service by a doctor or nurse. These services are not counselling or psychotherapy, but rather about developing a plan that patients can start using straight away to improve wellbeing.

Currently, the Health Coach and Health Improvement Practitioner see their patients in a small room at the medical centre that is not fit for purpose or welcoming. It has been used as a patient monitoring space and a storeroom over the years and is run down, clinical and uncomfortable. This request would enable us to turn this unloved and unwelcoming room into a warm and comfortable space for patients and whānau to focus on their health with a supportive ally.

Yes - A key service that our Health Improvement professionals provide is assisting people with long-term disability or chronic conditions to live as fully and healthily as possible. They support individuals with disabilities both physically, through health coaching and medication support, and emotionally through counselling and wellbeing strategies.

The Waiheke Health Trust was founded to promote the health of our community. Our Health Improvement Practitioner and Health Coach, who would directly use the space funded by this grant, provide free wellness support to patients, working on managing disease and medications, accessing healthy food options and exercise, and understanding the underlying mental health challenges that contribute to physical disease.

Smoking cessation programmes are a key component to our Medical Centre's service, one of the primary benchmarks that we report on monthly and an area of focus for our Health Coach. We provide water coolers in the reception areas of both of our buildings and contract with a dietician to travel to the island monthly to work with residents on healthy options for food and drink. In addition, we facilitate Meals on Wheels Waiheke, a support service that prepares and delivers a hot midday meal to eligible people living at home to maintain their nutritional status.

Our 120 Helpline volunteer counsellors receive intensive training and close

	supervision. Kantar Public research (2023) shows that over 67% of young people in New Zealand are aware of Youthline. Last year we managed over 175,000 in-coming contacts to our Helpline and worked with 14,000 individual young people. Research shows Youthline's strengths include having trained volunteers who can help and with young people supporting other young people.

Promotion:	The Youthline Helpline is promoted and marketed across a wide range of media including the Youthline website, Facebook page and various promotional activities. We have an extensive communications contact plan in place. In partnership with the Attitude Charitable Trust, the Youthline Helpline and support services and programmes are promoted at schools across Auckland. We will publicly acknowledge the local board's contribution in the Youthline Annual Report, on our website, in social media and on our promotional material.		

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

For many of the young people we work with the first contact point is through the Helpline and our volunteer counsellors. Many of the young people are vulnerable – disadvantaged, disillusioned, disengaged; many have a reduced sense of belonging to family and school - and their situation is exacerbated by the lingering COVID shadow, the extreme weather events of early 2023 and the cost-of-living crisis..

Our Helpline is staffed by 100 volunteers who processed 175,950 texts and calls from young people in need last year. They are only able to do this vital work because they receive comprehensive training and support.

Mental health remains a key issue for young people with 3 in 4 young people agreeing mental health is a problem in the most recent research (Kantar Public 2023).

We have to be able to provide the best possible support for young people in need and we do this best when we have a well trained and supervised team of volunteers and support staff.

The community benefits when we are able to support young people through their period of distress and emerge with a positive plan for the future and can help build a resilient community.

Youthline has been supporting rangatahi and their families for over 53 years. Our kaupapa/purpose is to strengthen wellbeing through youth voice and youth choice such that young people are empowered within their communities.

We are well known as "the number one place for young people to reach out to for support". 67% of young people are aware of Youthline and 13% of young people have contacted us for help (Kantar Public 2023).

We are a "with youth, for youth" organisation and the first point of contact for many young people accessing youth development and support services across Aotearoa New Zealand. We are a respected and trusted frontline service that has changed the lives of many people who have reached out in their time of need.

The Youthline Helpline is at the heart of our mahi. Young people in need who contact us through our Helpline often feel lonely, alone, disengaged and desperate. They often have a reduced sense of belonging to family, school or community.

We aim to ensure that the young people we work with have clear pathways from school to work. And we aim to engender a sense of belonging to their family, school and the community in which they live. In supporting these young people Youthline is very much committed to promoting healthy, safe, sustainable and active lifestyles.

The mental health crisis faced by our rangatahi and exacerbated by COVID and more recently the extreme weather events and the cost of living crisis has increased the demand for our services and changed the nature and complexity of the issues presented and placed additional pressure on our already stretched resources.

Significantly the stress and anxiety that young people felt as a result of COVID and the more recent environmental events remain for many as an underlying condition and will require great care as we work with our rangatahi going forward.

In research undertaken in 2023, 75% of young people said mental health issues, including suicide, are the biggest problem facing youth (Kantar Public 2023). And 1 in 4 young people surveyed said they had been affected by recent extreme weather events. Of those affected 2 in 4 report stress or mental health issues being made worse as a result. 1 in 4 report economic uncertainty being made worse as a result.

Youthline supports these young people, acknowledges their issues and is inclusive with a strengths-based, person-centred approach. We very much aim to build engagement and resiliency for young people and and support them in transitioning to adulthood.

Youthline services equip youth with skills and insights on how to build self-esteem and improve mental-health, how to actively problem-solve, recover from setbacks and build resilience. Counsellors link them with local support services to assist their ongoing development. Through their improved emotional and self-management skills young people are less likely to fall into helplessness, depression, addictive behaviours, dangerous relationships and unemployment. Our experienced youth worker teams provide individual support, mentoring, development and leadership opportunities to vulnerable youth throughout the Auckland region.

For many, connecting with Youthline provides a pathway to a range of personal development and life skills programmes offered by our team including personal development, job skills (e.g. barista training, CV writing and job applications) and learner licence training. All designed to better equip young people to be healthy and active and productive members of their communities.

Research shows that when young people are engaged in community activities, linked with whanau, and given the opportunity to participate feel that they are part of something and encouraged to reach their potential, that risk taking behaviour is reduced. Youthline works inclusively with youth, from those young people who are most vulnerable to youth leaders who are championing change. Our clinical support workers counsel/mentor young people identified as needing one-on-one support to encourage and inspire them. They aim to understand the strengths and weaknesses of each young person, then identify goals and milestones and develop a plan for successful implementation and progression. By walking beside a young person and providing positive role models Youthline aims to see every young person become a positive contributor to society with a strong sense of belonging.

In terms of our services going forward we know that:

- 1. There will continue to be a high demand for support through COVID and events that impact their daily lives like extreme weather and adverse economic conditions
- 2. We will need to maintain volunteer numbers for our Helpline service at as higher a level as possible to cope with the demand and increased complexity
- 3. The need for comprehensive training and triage support for our volunteers will be paramount.
- 4. Our youth worker teams will continue to have a large number of vulnerable young people to work with requiring significant levels of programme resources.
- 5. Our volunteer and face-to-face counsellors will have a high need for supervision that in particular acknowledges the unique stresses and strains engendered by the pandemic and more recently the extreme weather events and worries about economic uncertainty.

Demographics

Youthline provides support services to young people in need across the ethnic spectrum. Last year 16% of calls and texts to our Helpline presented as Māori, slightly ahead of the 14% of young people aged 15-24 residing in the Auckland area who identify as Māori. 25% of our mentoring and face-to-face counselling clients are Māori and 11% of our staff identify as Māori.

All of our staff and volunteers are trained on the Treaty of Waitangi. Māori models of health such as Te Whare Tapa Wha inform our work with targets groups of rangatahi Māori. Youthline has a Māori working group (Nga Whetu Poutama) to guide Youthline to increase the organisation's cultural capacity and inform the work that we do.

Accessible to people with disabilities

Yes - All our services and facilities are accessible to people with disabilities.

Healthy environment approach:

Promote smoke-free messages

Youthline Auckland supports the Auckland Council's Smokefree Policy and its commitment to working proactively with others towards making Auckland smokefree by 2025. We have a smoke free policy in place and can offer support, advice and referrals to young people who wish to give up smoking. We ensure that the young people we work with are aware of our support for making Auckland smokefree and how we can help them if necessary.

Does your project support any genders, ages or ethnicities specifically?

As a "with youth, for youth, by youth" organisation Youthline is committed to supporting all rangatahi with a focus on ages 12-24 years. We have a strong commitment to diversity recognising that our minority communities, including Maori, Pasifika and Rainbow youth, disproportionately experience mental health issues and are less likely to seek help.

A strategic priority is to hold an equity focus on Maori, Pasifika, Rainbow, Asian, Migrant and Refugee youth and young people with disabilities.

We are advocates for youth focus, youth voice and youth choice and providing leadership to ensure young people are prioritised and invested in. Recognising and addressing inequities and upholding safety is very important to us.

Since the arrival of COVID many of our funders have a reduced capacity to provide funding. At a time when young people need our service more than ever we are hugely dependent on those organisations who can provide funding.

We did an 8 week snap-shot of our service in 2024, identifying the Wards where police and community referrals come from. Based on this, 56% are from Counties Manukau, 24.53% from Auckland Central and 18.87% from the North Shore, with New Zealand Police being our largest referrer at nearly 50%.

Environmental benefits: We are promoting sustainable practices and restoring the native environment.

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

There are 780 preschools and schools included in this application for funding. We are actively working with learning communities helping them setup and maintain simple and effective recycling systems. This is diverting tonnes and tonnes of paper and cardboard from the landfill. As a reward for their recycling efforts (and logging their data) we give these preschools and schools free native plants to plant in their learning communities to not only beautify the space but also restore the native environment to what it used to be. The hope is that these sustainable practices will become ingrained in the next generation of New Zealanders and it will be extended from the classroom to their homes as well.

the environment – restoring and protecting our natural environment

We have 7 preschools and schools registered in our paper4trees programme in the Waiheke area. We understand the importance of restoring and protecting our environment. We support learning communities in making sustainable choices by providing classroom recycling bins to each classroom. In doing this, they are separating the paper and cardboard waste that would otherwise go into the general rubbish. Around 70% of school waste is paper and cardboard. As a reward for their environmental efforts, we reward these preschools and schools with free native plants to plant within their learning community which not only beautifies but also encourages the regeneration of the natural environment and the native wildlife that will return and thrive.

Devonport-Takapuna

 Our natural environment, heritage features and cultural taonga are celebrated, protected, and enhanced

We have 52 preschools and schools registered in our paper4trees programme in the Devonport-Takapuna area. By helping these learning communities establish simple but effective recycling systems and then rewarding their efforts with free native plants, we are encouraging the importance of sustainability and the restoration of our natural environment. These learning communities receive 1 plant per 2 cubic metres of paper and cardboard they recycle, with each preschool and school receiving a minimum of 5 plants. These are then planted within their school grounds or their community not only restoring how it used to be but also encouraging the native wildlife back into these places which is always a treat to see!

Since our last meeting in August, we've achieved key steps in our plan to 'activate long-term rentals on Waiheke':

- Brought on a General Manager Damian Sycamore to lead up strategy, operations and 'doing'.
 - Was engaged through late-2023 on 10-15 hour weeks.
 - o Since 2024, is now working 25-hour weeks.
- Door-knocked 250 Waiheke properties recording 'usage' of each:
 - Long-term rentals on the island account for between 12-18% of properties.
 Considering 35-40% of NZers rent, this means Waiheke has a huge deficit of long-term rentals having only 30-50% of what would be proportionally required.
 - The statistical significance of this survey is only +/- 10% at this stage.
- Identified, Healthy Homes'd and property managed 3 **new** long-term rentals, placing young local families into each.
 - Damian has spent approximately 150 hours on this, with a gross return to date of \$390.
 - Standing up a new and compliant Property Management service had considerably front-ended cost. We expect the ratio (of cost to return) to get better, but this is not intended to be a profitable service.
- Conducted 4 additional Healthy Homes checks for property owners that were considering renting their properties out for long-term.
 - o This service was (and will remain) un-charged.
- Almost completed the pre-construction and consent phase of 2 x 1-bedroom units on Ostend Rd, both of which will be managed by WCHT for long-term rental.

Additionally, we have:

- Connected parties and facilitated the relocation of a character villa to a new site on-island (that would have been otherwise demolished).
- Met with and introduced ourselves to the majority of Housing Stakeholders on-island.
- Conducted assessment on behalf of Habitat for Humanity to renovate unhealthy property using co-ordinated community labour, volunteers and Habitat for Humanity's grants for low-incomes

Strategies for FY2024

- Complete door-knocking / data collection to upgrade statistical significance to +/- 5%
- Use door-knocking exercise to activate more long-term rentals on the island by providing an effective and encompassing service: pre-tenancy (Healthy Homes assessment, project management, consultation) through to full and compliant property management
- Finish the project management of the 2 unit development on Ostend Rd (resulting in 2 more affordable rentals in to Waiheke's stock)



- Organise and coordinate monthly meetings with Waiheke Housing Stakeholders, with a focus on:
 - Ensuring everyone is aware of efforts and delivery of all other stakeholders
 - Galvanising stakeholders to assist each other in achieving outcomes
 - o Producing an accordant and community-led strategy for Housing on Waiheke
 - Preparing realistic advocacy objectives for the Unitary/HGIDP review
- Establish a fortnightly presence at the Ostend Community Market to propose and discuss community-led solutions to Waiheke's housing crisis (such as a Community Land Trust)
- Use all of the above to find high-need people and facilitate Habitat for Humanity home improvement projects

As of today, WCHT's funds are fully-committed:

- OpEx to paying Damian Sycamore our GM on a fixed term contract until September
- CapEx finishing the 2 unit development on Ostend Rd
- Please see attached WCHT Budget showing Capital, Income, Forecasted Income and Costs for the 2024 Financial Year.

KPIs for FY2024

- Door-knocking survey to a statistically significant 1000 homes
- 5 more long-term rentals activated
- 3 low-income renovations completed on behalf of Habitat for Humanity
- Accordant Waiheke Housing Strategy published and actioned

We seek funding from the Local Board to continue this work, using the independent skills and experience of our WCHT GM, trustees and advisors to help push strategies into actions.
