

COMMENTARY


September 2023 saw an overall decrease for requests for service, and a decrease from the same time last year.

COMMENTARY

There were a total of 129 audits were conducted in the Waitākere Ranges Local Board region for the month of September which resulted in a 94% score.

Response work orders are being attended to in a timely fashion, and the quality of work is pleasing to see.

Gardens and plants are a lowlight feature for September 2023, and we are working closely with our contractors to remediate this, however the unpredictable weather could be a determining factor.

Works are anticipated to commence in the next financial year and this investment has been made to ensure the playspace is able to remain open and safe for use until renewal.





Summer Ranger Update

Once onboarded, they will be based then with our Regional Parks whānau, focusing as per usual on peak summer visitation, hot spots over a seven-day, 30 hour working week. Once appointments have been confirmed a further update will be provided.





ECOLOGICAL UPDATE

Titirangi Chickens

Scheduled control has been undertaken and a flock consisting of 4 hens, 5 chicks and 2 roosters were removed for rehoming at an approved site in Taupaki.

This situation will continue to be monitored and the contractors will be supplying Council staff with track log photos and GPS marks in a follow up report.


A Closed-Circuit Television (CCTV) system and lockdown buttons have been installed.





ECOFEST 2023 - WAITĀKERE RANGES OUTCOMES

Events offered

- 132 events registered with EcoMatters took place (149 registered)
- **31 of those were in the Waitākere Ranges area** (41 registered - cancellations due to weather events affecting access or venues)
- Four out of every five registered events (81%) were free to attend
- Almost two thirds (64%) of registered events were whānau friendly
- 99% of events were offered in person (only 2 online events this year)

Attendees

- More than 6,600 attendees across the events
- 62% of those were attending an EcoFest event for the first time

Event Hosts

- 56 different organisations/groups/businesses/ individuals hosted events
- 15 new hosts offering events this year



EcoFest: climate action and community resilience

In the wake of recent devastating weather events, the need for climate action and community resilience in Aotearoa has never been more pressing.

From Saturday 18 March to Sunday 16 April, EcoFest will offer opportunities for people of all ages and stages of their sustainability journey to engage with the unique environment of Tāmaki Makaurau and learn how they can reduce their climate impact.

Started in 2012 as EcoFest West by EcoMatters Environment Trust, the annual festival has since expanded across all corners of Auckland, with Kaipātiki Project, Beautification Trust and Waheke Resources Trust joining as co-organisers in their role.

"Amidst the recent weather-related tragedies, we are reminded of the urgent need to take action on climate change and to build resilient communities," said Carla Gee, CEO of EcoMatters Environment Trust. "EcoFest 2023 aims to inspire and empower individuals and communities to take meaningful action towards a more sustainable future."



We hope that this year's festival will help create a stronger, more connected, and more resilient Tāmaki Makaurau."

Some of the more than 200 events featured in this year's programme include composting workshops, silent disco clean-ups, and sustainability-themed film screenings. EcoFest also welcomes individuals, community groups, and businesses to host events as part of the festival. Events in the West Auckland area include:

- Get hands-on experience creating drought-tolerant garden beds
- Make your own no-sew bunting or garland using recycled fabric scraps
- Make a terrarium
- DIY Bokashi Workshop
- And with the school holidays coming up you can search for whānau friendly events to keep the kids entertained.

ECOFEST 2023 - WAITĀKERE RANGES OUTCOMES

Thanks to your ongoing support, in 2023, we expanded across Tāmaki Makaurau, in partnership with Beautification Trust, Kaipatiki Project and Waiheke Resources Trust. There were more than 500 events in the regionwide programme. We still supported a strong, well-attended west festival which attracted positive feedback from local hosts and attendees, including:

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COMMUNITY NURSERY

Achievements during the 2022-2023 year:

- 132 nursery sessions
- 360 volunteers contributed 900 hours
- 16,100 plants repotted
- 2,000+ plants available in the Waitākere Ranges area

This year saw a big increase in requests for help and advice around restoration planting with natives, following the weather events in early 2023.

Outreach highlights included a practical workshop in Glen Eden, about collecting, sowing and caring for native seedlings.



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ECOHUB AND GARDEN

Our showcase event for the year was our Matariki Day, held in August 2022. This open day welcomed the community to our New Lynn EcoHub, for workshops and drop in activities. A key focus was on te ao Māori education, with a raranga (weaving) workshop and Te Iwa o Matariki (nine stars of Matariki) workshop.

Achievements during the 2022-2023 year:

- Open to public for 30 hours a week
- 16 workshops delivered with 109 attendees
- 42 māra kai sessions with volunteers contributing 304 hours

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LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOURHOOD GRANTS

- 23 projects supported in Waitākere Ranges Local Board area for 2022-2023
- Promoted through EcoMatters channels and targeted communications to schools, community groups and local networks.

Oratia District School Garden to Table

Garden to Table news

In September our Orātia Garden to Table team applied for an **EcoMatters' love your neighbourhood funding** which is environmental assistance supported by the Waitākere Ranges Local Board. We used this money to purchase some reclaimed railway sleepers to create garden edges and add to our Orchard garden as part of Garden to Table. Our caretaker Steven and gardener Moira helped us to create the beginnings of an expanded no-dig style vegetable and flower garden. We are hoping to continue to create a wonderful space in the orchard area over the next few years and we are very grateful to have received this financial grant to kick start our project.



WAR ON WEEDS

- Postponed until April 2023, due to weather events
- Bins at 15 sites (across Waitākere Ranges and Henderson-Massey local board areas)
- 44 bin exchanges
- 89 tonnes of weeds removed
- Good compliance this year, with high amounts of the right type of weeds and few instances of illegal dumping
- Pest Plant roadshows and staff at bins helps improve correct use of bins



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ACKNOWLEDGING YOUR SUPPORT

- Support is acknowledged through signage, digital media, publicity outreach, and in person, wherever possible. Excellent working relationship with council local comms to maximise opportunities.

Environmental benefits: Grey faced petrels are seabirds that nest on cliff faces. They dig a tunnel into the ground. They lay an egg in there and then head back out to sea. When the egg hatches, the chick is quite vulnerable. It's the eggs and the chicks we are trying to protect.

Seabirds play quite an important role in the environment. I'm not sure what would happen if they were ever to disappear. Studies have shown that even them dropping guano can have quite a significant effect on the land (fertiliser) and even the ocean (helps build coral and other marine structures).

Of course with mustelid control added in we begin to see and hear more birds including miromiro and matata and even kokako spreading from Ark in the Park. Whilst kaka visit from Hauturu for winter feeding, not to mention the tuis, keruru, riroriro, piwakawaka, kotare etc. We are intent on making our habitat at the foot of the Waitakere ranges a part of the North-West Wild link. A healthy place for our native trees, birds, bats, frogs, fresh water species and invertebrates

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

For many of the young people we work with the first contact point is through the Helpline and our volunteer counsellors. Many of the young people are vulnerable – disadvantaged, disillusioned, disengaged - and their situation is exacerbated by the lingering COVID shadow and the extreme weather events of early 2023.

Our Helpline is staffed by 120 volunteers who processed 145,927 contacts from young people in need last year. They are only able to do this vital work because they receive comprehensive training and support.

Mental health remains a key issue for young people with 3 in 4 young people agreeing mental health is a problem in the most recent research (Kantar Public 2023). Last year 1,576 young people from Waitakere Ranges needed our help, with COVID producing greater stress and distress for our rangatahi.

We have to be able to provide the best possible support for young people in need and we do this best when we have a well trained team of volunteers and support staff.

The community benefits when we are able to support young people through their period of distress and emerge with a positive plan for the future and can help build a resilient community.

Youthline provides support services to young people in need across the ethnic spectrum. Last year 16% of calls and texts to our Helpline presented as Māori, slightly ahead of the 14% of young people aged 15-24 residing in the Auckland area who identify as Māori. 25% of our mentoring and face-to-face counselling clients are Māori and 11% of our staff identify as Māori.

All of our staff and volunteers are trained on the Treaty of Waitangi. Māori models of health such as Te Whare Tapa Wha inform our work with targets groups of rangatahi Māori. Youthline has a Māori working group (Nga Whetu Poutama) to guide Youthline to increase the organisation's cultural capacity and inform the work that we do.

Accessible to people with disabilities

Promote smoke-free messages

Youthline Auckland supports the Auckland Council's Smokefree Policy and its commitment to working proactively with others towards making Auckland smokefree by 2025. We ensure that the young people we work with are aware of our support for making Auckland smokefree and how we can help them if necessary.

Does your project support any genders, ages or ethnicities specifically?

As a "with youth, for youth, by youth" organisation Youthline is committed to supporting all rangatahi with a focus on ages 12-24 years. We have a strong commitment to diversity recognising that our minority communities, including Maori, Pasifika and Rainbow youth, disproportionately experience mental health issues and are less likely to seek help.

A strategic priority is to hold an equity focus on Maori, Pasifika, Rainbow, Asian, Migrant and Refugee youth and young people with disabilities.

We are advocates for youth focus, youth voice and youth choice and providing leadership to ensure young people are prioritised and invested in. Recognising and addressing inequities and upholding safety is very important to us.

Since the arrival of COVID many of our funders have a reduced capacity to provide funding. At a time when young people need our service more than ever we are hugely dependent on those organisations who can provide funding.

We are already bringing four world class Scottish musicians - Ewen Henderson and Brian McAlpine from Scotland and Catherine Fraser and Judy Turner from Australia - to Oratia for our week long ScotstringNZ event.

This project will take share the joy of Scottish music with the Oratia community, by hosting a community concert at the Oratia Settlers Hall on Saturday 20 April and a community ceilidh (an opportunity to dance simple traditional dances to live music) at the Oratia Bowling Club on Friday 26 April 2024.

This project reaffirms the importance of Scottish immigration as an important and neglected part of the history and heritage of the Waitakere Ranges area, and gives the local community a taste of the joy of Scottish music and dancing today.

This application is only for the direct costs of hall hire for these two community events; other costs including the musicians, sound system, advertising and supper costs for the community ceilidh will be covered from the wider resources of ScotStringNZ, assuming we are successful with our Creative Communities application.

All of the funding received will be used to pay for hire of the Oratia Bowling Club, which is itself a community grassroots organisation.

Regional Pest Management Plan 2020-2030 (RPMP)

- RPMP sets requirements for RPMP Buffers project
- RPMP Buffers work funded by Natural Environment Targeted Rate (NETR)
- Focus of pest plant control in RPMP is on parkland with high ecological value
- Supported by 500m buffer zones around high value parks
 - Park land must be being managed for pest plants before buffer can be activated
 - Council has some control obligations on land in buffers
 - Land owners have some control obligations on land in buffers



Status quo

- Three projects: NETR funded RPMP Buffers project; Waitākere Local Board funded Our Backyard and Bufferzones
- They have all been working together since RPMP Buffer work began in 2019-2020 FY
- Education and engagement with land owners and community
- Pest plant control of all the RPMP buffer species on private land in the buffer zones



Key differences in current approaches

NETR RPMP Buffers:

- Different council and landowner control obligations for specific species as per RPMP
- Is intended to move properties through initial control to monitoring and compliance
- This allows more properties to be included in the project over time
- Intended outcome is environmental protection for buffered parks

Local board projects:

- All species treated the same, meaning some land owners are getting their RPMP obligations covered by the LB projects and others are not
- Focused on ongoing support in particular areas
- Engagement and continual control, no monitoring and compliance process

Local board projects provide ongoing support to community for pest plant management. Potential approaches:

- Can include pest plant species not in the RPMP
- Tools, resources and events to help people identify and control their own pest plants and raise awareness.
- Funding a pest plant coordinator with a community organisation (perhaps Waitākere Ranges Pest Free Alliance) to provide one-on-one advice to landowners. This has been done in some other local board areas to complement the RPMP Buffer programme and it is working well. Some approaches have included coordinators surveying properties for pest plants and providing specific advice to the owners.

NETR RPMP Buffers project:

- Does initial control as per RPMP species and requirements.
- Does monitoring and compliance. Moves to enforcement if required.
- Works in an area for a few years then moves to another area of the ranges.
