Purpose

1. To update you on the development of the council's play investment plan.

Key messages

- Auckland Council does not have a regional strategy for investment in play.
- Each local board is responsible for planning for play provision in its local area, and investment of the funds allocated to it by the governing body.
- Major sources of funding include growth funding (development contributions) and renewals funding.
- Staff are currently developing a regional plan to inform future investment in play over the next 20 years.
- Subject to approval by the governing body, public consultation on the draft plan will take place early in the new council term.

Context

- 2. Auckland Council does not currently have regional strategy for how it supports future investment in play. Each local board is responsible for play provision within its own local area.
- 3. Funding is allocated to local boards through the Long-term Plan and Annual Plan:
 - a. Renewal of older play spaces is funded through depreciation, with money set aside overtime. This must be spent within the same local board area as the depreciated asset.
 - b. Provision of new play spaces is funded from development contributions. Such funding is available to areas experiencing growth.
- 4. Some local boards choose to fund additional or out-of-cycle improvements to local play provision from their discretionary budgets.

Creating a regional investment strategy

- 5. Council is currently developing a regional play investment plan, *Tākaro Investing in play*.
- 6. The plan will cover:
 - a. all types of public outdoor play, including in city parks, at the beach or in the bush, on the streets and in civic spaces.
 - b. all capital expenditure on play assets, and all operational expenditure on play services, including play programmes and other relevant open space activation.

- 7. The purpose of plan is to:
 - a. define a council-wide vision for play
 - b. describe the public value of play and play space
 - c. describe the high-level outcomes sought from investment over the next 20 years
 - d. describe the role of council in the delivery of play
 - e. establish principles to inform planning and high-level resource allocation
 - f. outline the range of play experiences council may provide
 - g. provide guidance on how, where and what the council will invest in
- 8. The intended audience for the plan includes decision-makers, developers, technical consultants, philanthropic donors and the wider community.

Process to date

- 9. Staff first sought public input on creation of a regional plan in June 2017. The purpose of this consultation was to seek support for the creation of regional approach to play, highlight issues and opportunities and determine what a potential plan might include.
- 10. In February 2018, staff reported to the governing body on the results of the public consultation.
- 11. Overall, public feedback supported the creation of a regional investment plan. Key feedback included:
 - a. that future investment should cater to people of all ages and abilities
 - b. that the council should invest in a broader range of play experiences, including more challenging, unstructured forms of play, such as nature play
 - c. that investment should support equity of outcomes
 - d. that the council should use community partnerships to extend the play network
 - e. that the council should use data to inform future investment
- 12. The governing body endorsed the feedback report as a basis to commence development of a regional plan.
- 13. Work on the draft plan is progressing. No formal decisions have been taken.

Next steps

- 14. Staff will conclude work on the draft plan over the coming months.
- 15. Staff will report to the Environment and Community Committee (or equivalent) early in the new council term to seek approval to publicly consult on the draft plan.
