AUCKLAND'S HERITAGE COUNTS 2023

Running since 2018, this programme aims to highlight the extent and benefits of heritage in Auckland through the collection of statistics and research. Here are some interesting insights for 2023.

1,935 people have signed up to the guarterly Auckland Council Te Kāhu Heritage Newsletter. This is an increase of 20% since 2017.



There were **22,376** visits to the Auckland Heritage website in 2022-23, this has more than doubled since 2016/17.

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There were **252,761** views of the Kura Heritage Collections website in 2022-23.



The Auckland Council Libraries lunchtime Heritage Talks podcast had 3,450 plays in 2022-23.




6,606 people follow the Auckland Heritage Facebook page. This is an increase of **84%** since 2018.

1,797 people follow Auckland Heritage Instagram. This is an increase of **200%** since 2018.

There are at least 60 heritage trails in Auckland. showcasing our local heritage.





Auckland has **1.48** protected heritage places per 1000 people. This is less than New York City (7.42), London (2.23) and Brisbane (1.85) but similar to Vancouver (1.5).



20% of **domestic tourists** who visited Auckland in 2022-23 associated the city with history and heritage.

35% of Australian tourists who visited Auckland in 2022-23 associated the city with history and heritage.² ² Visitor Insights Programme - Market Perceptions (Angus and Associates, 2023).



Between 2013 and 2023 there were over 3.6 million visits to Auckland Councilowned heritage venues.

Auckland's heritage attractions have had their visitor numbers bounce back nicely since the COVID-19 lockdowns. Glenbrook Vintage Railway has increased by 231% since last year, Alberton by 146%, MOTAT by 131%, Auckland Museum by 82%, Howick Historical Village by 81%, Pah Homestead by 75% and Couldrey House by 52%.

4 out of 5 Aucklanders

live within a **12-minute** walk of a protected heritage place.

105 sites and places of significance to mana whenua protected in the Auckland Unitary Plan.

4 Māori heritage sites are protected in the Hauraki Gulf Islands District Plan.


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99.6% of all resource consents

related to historic heritage were granted between 2016 and 2022. Applicants are encouraged to seek free advice from the Auckland Council Heritage Unit early in the process, and often proposals are modified after lodgement to ensure that positive heritage outcomes are achieved through the resource consent process.





Over **3,300** Aucklanders are a member of Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga.

had **164** events in 2022, attracting **23,331** people. 82% of visitors were satisfied or very satisfied with the events, and 92% would recommended the festival to others.
