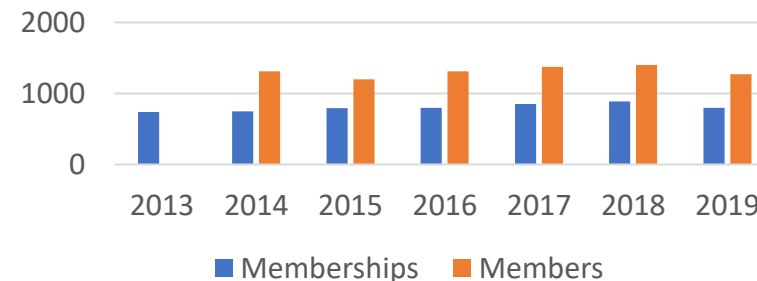

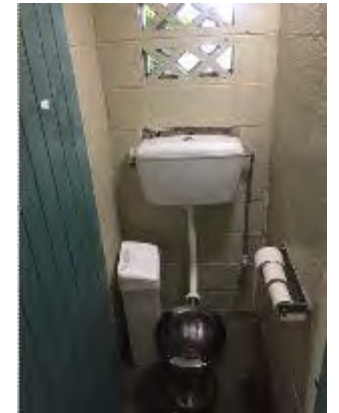

- In 1969 the current club rooms, hard stand and ramp were built
- In the mid-eighties a marina, New clubhouse, parking & boat ramp was built by the club in Half Moon Bay and the Grangers Point clubhouse became the junior sailing centre and race control tower.
- The Grangers Point facility and clubhouse is currently used as:
 - ☐ Junior sailing centre
 - ☐ Launching ramp for small boats
 - ☐ Race Control Tower for keeler racing

Nurturing youngsters into sailing and boating in general



- Granger Point provides immediate access to Little Bucklands beach, arguably the best and safest beach in Auckland to teach young sailors.
- Training at Granger Point
 - ❑ **Have a Go**, introductory programme - on average 860 students per year.
 - ❑ Participating primary schools include; Bucklands Beach, Pigeon Mountain, Macleans Primary
 - ❑ **Junior Learn to Sail** – NZQA and Yachting NZ approved
 - **Level 1** beginners 'Start Sailing' 140 children aged 8 - 15 years
 - **Level 2** 'Sailing Faster' number 34
 - **Level 3** 'Learn to Race' number 16
 - ❑ **Level 3 Extension** - club racing through the summer participating in Optimist, Open Bic, Starling and RS Feva fleets. Around 30 sailors

Current Facilities

- The current Granger Point facilities – are the focal point for junior sailing and the BBYC Sailing Academy
- To improve Sailing Accessibility the BBYC purchased and hire out, a 'fleet' of training yachts for budding sailors.
- The training yacht fleet **requires more boats to meet current demand but we have no more storage available.**
- **There is insufficient space to store required rescue / support boats.**
- Families in the area no longer have storage at their dwellings for boats and trailers, to develop youth sailing it is imperative the club can provide storage at Grangers Point
- The club uses community grants and partnerships such as Lions to assist with the purchase of vessels including rescue boats.



Launching ramp for small boats

- Small boats are launched from Granger Point
- The ramp sea state is often not suitable to launch small boats.
- There is no small boat docking or tie up facility.
- BBYC members use ramp for large boat haul out between May and November
- A sea wall is required to provide a safe launching and boat retrieving environment

Race Control & Communications Tower

- Used to officially start Friday Racing and other sailing events
- Communication centre for race management and emergencies that might arise during operational times on Marine VHF frequency

Hard Stand & Haul Out

- Designed & upgraded to current standards, the ramp at Granger Point allows haul out and Hard Stand space for BBYC members to work on their boats.
- The yard is run by volunteers and is only available to fully paid up BBYC members.
- In line with the basic facility, Fees are significantly less than Half Moon Bay Marina.
- This Hard stand provides a facility for those on low budgets.
- Operating from 01 May to 30 November, hauling on Saturdays unless sea state prevents safe operations, then the team may try to haul the next safe day.
- There are very stringent rules on noise and cleanliness.
- To reduce localized crime, the yard is chained closed at 7 pm and the security cameras linked back to the the main clubhouse.
- On average 36 boats are hauled each year with an average of 8.5 days per vessel on the hard stand. Normally boats are hauled out every 1 to 3 years.
- For practical & historical reasons the haul out and maintenance operations should not be altered.

Meeting Room Facility

- Three art groups use the club rooms weekly on Tuesday, Wednesdays and Thursdays
- Sea Scout groups use the rooms on call
- Toilets are separate from the building and used by both members and the public
- This room is available to rent and a modest charge through the BBYC.
- Due to **substandard toilet**, and kitchen facilities it is not reaching its potential.

Based on an inspection of the historic and current photographs it is evident that the majority of the sand has moved to the southern end of the beach. This can be attributed to the seawall, stormwater outlet and reclamations at Granger Point stopping the southerly movement of sand from Bucklands Beach. The Half Moon Bay Marina reduces the south westerly wind generated waves moving sand from the southern end of the beach to the centre (refer Figure 2-1 for an indication of the shadow zone). The loss of sand in the central part of the beach may have had an effect on the wall stability at this location, with the loss of sand effectively removing toe support for the wall.

At Little Bucklands Beach the key coastal processes affecting this area are the historic encroachment of the upper beach due to reclamations impounding beach sediment and increasing wave reflection, the reduced supply of sediment from the north resulting from reclamations and stormwater outfall construction around Granger Point. There has also been a southerly movement of sand within the embayment. This is attributed to an increase in sheltering from south- westerly waves by Half Moon Bay Marina. The lower sand levels in the centre of the bay may have reduced toe support for the existing stepped wall and exposing the silty/peaty substrate causing the wall to rotate, requiring ongoing repairs and maintenance.

Based on an imported sand rate and unit costs from the Point England Beach project where sand was sourced from the existing consented source in the outer Hauraki Gulf, costs for the beach and controls are in the order of \$2M to \$3M. This includes a provision of \$500,000 for work on the existing wall, but as noted above, costs will be dependent on the findings of the geotechnical investigations.

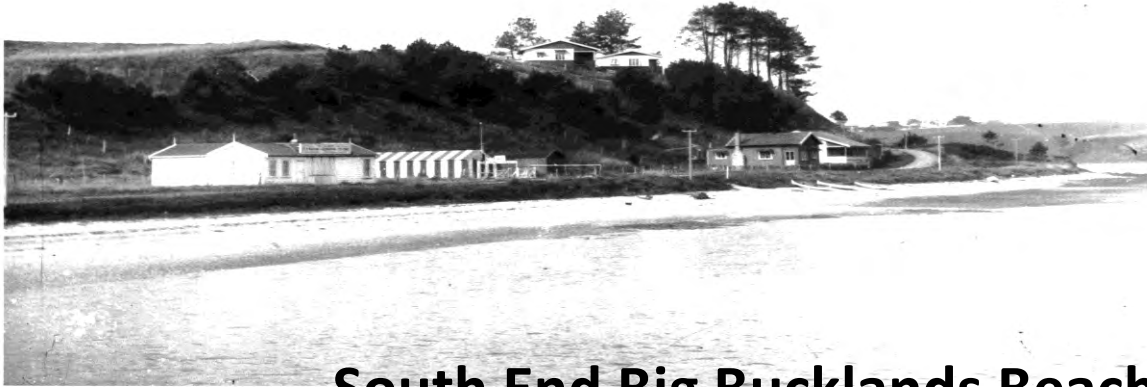

While sand sources could come from the outer Hauraki Gulf, it may be possible to source sand from an adjacent source in the Tamaki River. A visual inspection was made as part of this study of the sand suitability at the end of the spit and along the adjacent intertidal flats to the south of the spit (see Figure 2-17). The sand at the end of the spit comprised largely clean shell and coarse sand with no visible organic content. This sand is likely to be suitable for beach nourishment. However, on the intertidal flat the sand was significantly siltier and had a high organic content, including small shell fish, snails and worms and is not recommended for beach nourishment.

 Liquid rubber systems must be applied and cured on site in a number of layers. This requires very good drying conditions between coats. If rain or low temperature prevents full curing then subsequent coats are compromised and delamination may eventually occur. We have pulled out courts with this condition.
2. 4mm thickness of mat.
 The mat thickness provides better shock absorption over nominal 2-3mm liquid rubber systems. This is one of the major reasons to install a cushioned court! We also know that the court will have 4mm thickness everywhere the mat is applied. With a liquid rubber system the skill of application and the undulations in the base mean that there will be places where the rubber may be under 2mm thickness and over 5mm thickness in low spots. It is very difficult to get consistency in product thickness.
3. For courts requiring remedial work to the base, the 4mm mat is less inclined to reflect cracks and damage in the base through to the top surface. Very significant movement will still reflect through on any system but the remedial work is less significant on this type of system.
4. It lasts longer. Over time, liquid rubber bases harden to the point where there is little or no cushioning benefit anymore. With a prefabricated rubber mat system this effect is greatly reduced allowing courts to perform for much longer extended periods.
5. If there is future damage to the surface or the asphalt base degradation reflects through to the top surface then we have developed extremely effective repair procedures to fix these areas.
6. Experience – we have installed over 200 courts around NZ with this product.

1. Base Works

For details of base works suitable for Rebound Ace Sports installation see separate technical bulletin titled 'Base Construction Specification' for construction of concrete or asphalt bases.

- 1.1 **Concrete** - New concrete shall be allowed to cure for a minimum of 28 days. The concrete base is to be waterproof. This means that water should not be allowed to enter the concrete base from below or from the side. Special care is needed on slabs installed on 'cut and fill' sites and in areas of high water table.
- 1.2 **Asphalt** - New asphalt shall be allowed to oxidise for a period of 14-21 days depending on climatic conditions.

2. Surface Preparation

- 2.1 **Surface Accuracy**
Base surface shall be laid to an accuracy of a maximum deviation of 3mm beneath a 3 metre straight edge when measured in any direction.
- 2.2 **Concrete**
Ensure concrete surface is free from all dust, dirt, grease, etc. Concrete is to be etched with a mixture of 4 parts Water to 1 part Hydrochloric Acid and washed off thoroughly with fresh water under pressure to ensure removal of all laitance and cement slurry. Concrete is to be thoroughly dry before application of Rebound Ace HSA Club Outdoor.
- 2.3 **Asphalt**
Asphalt shall be free from all dust, dirt, grease, etc. If necessary, asphalt shall be cleaned by high pressure water blasting and is to be thoroughly dry before application of Rebound HSA Club Outdoor.

3. Surfacing System

Rebound Ace HSA Club Outdoor is a water impermeable polyurethane/rubber/acrylic composite surface laid in mats at a nominal total thickness of 5mm.

Surface composition consists of:

- 3.1 **Rebound Adhesive 2000** applied by a notched trowel.
- 3.2 A 4mm thick prefabricated polyurethane rubber mat manufactured to Rebound Ace Sports' specifications for Rebound HSA Club Outdoor.

Surfacing System (cont'd)

- 3.3 Two (2) coats of **Mat Sealer WB STD** by trowel to fully seal all pores of the rubber mat and all joints to provide a seamless surface.
- 3.4 Two (2) coats of **Rebound Flexible Filler Coat** applied by a squeegee.
- 3.5 Minimum two coats of **Rebound Topcoat** applied by a double squeegee or a double broom or a combination of both.

4. Linemarking

Rebound Linemarking AS applied by brush or spray, free from splatter and overspray. International Tennis Standards Linemarking Specification is for White 50mm width lines. Other colours for various other sports are available.

5. Coverage Rates

- 5.1 **Mat Adhesive 2000** applied at a rate of 0.7- 0.9 kg/m² dependant on the porosity of the surface
- 5.2 **Mat Sealer WB STD** applied at a rate of 0.3 – 0.5 Lt/m² (0.3 – 0.5 kg/m²) in two coats.
- 5.3 **Rebound Flexible Filler Coat** applied at a total rate of 0.40 – 0.50 Lt/m² (0.60 – 0.75 kg/m² for two coats.)
- 5.4 **Rebound Ultra Topcoat** at a rate of 0.25 - 0.35 Ltr/m²/coat (0.4 – 0.6 kg/m²/coat
- 5.5 **Rebound Linemarking AS** as required





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2. Requirements and Conditions

Court Sizes

The courts have been divided into four sections.



We have conducted adhesion tests in all four areas to determine the suitability of the mat adhering to the surface.

In all tests there appears to be sufficient strength in the surface to accommodate the Rebound Ace surface albeit with varying degrees of preparation depending on the age and condition of each section.

Note:

- In the schematic section C shows full area coverage although we only have quoted on half a section being completed.
- Section D is highlighted as including the whole asphalt area but we have not quoted to coat outside the two longitudinal drains on the outside of the courts.



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Example of an adhesion check on the surface showing the mat completely stuck to the surface and very difficult to remove.



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We have outlined the current conditions as follows:

Section A

70.7m x 58.1m = area 4,108m²

This area is made up of six netball courts.



The asphalt surface is in reasonable condition with thick lines painted on the courts. There are some seam areas and patches which are low and the slightly boney overall nature of the surface means that a filler coat would be required before application of the Rebound Ace surface.

There is one section next to the road which is heavily cracked just off the playing surface. This would need work done to it and then a special filling compound applied as preparation.

- Removal of all the games lines by grinding
- Fully waterblast all of the courts clean
- Vee out any cracked or low seams

- Apply Rebound Acrylic Resurfacer to low seams and cracks

No allowances have been made for any further asphalt levelling if required.



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Section B

71.4m x 60.3m = area 4,305m²

This area is made up of six netball courts.



The asphalt surface is quite smooth and we understand this is the problem section associated with slipperiness in the wet. There are seam areas which are low and will need some filling, however, the main surface condition does not require additional preparation work before application of the Rebound Ace surface.

There is a cable and conduit positioned at ground level along the concrete wall at the top of the courts. Ideally this cable should be lifted up approximately 20mm to allow the new rubber surface to be butted in against this wall. See photo

Court Preparation

- Removal of all the games lines by grinding
- Fully waterblast all of the courts clean
- Apply Rebound Acrylic Resurfacer to any low seams
- Grind flat

No allowances have been made for any further asphalt levelling if required.



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Section C

This area is made up of six netball courts, however, only the top three courts are suitable for the surface to be applied over in their current condition. Therefore the area is as follows:

34.1m x 57m = area 1,944m²



Top three courts which could be resurfaced

The six courts are divided by a concrete dished drain. In our opinion the bottom three courts have seams and cracks which have deteriorated to the point where water has got down below the surface and is potentially affecting the integrity of the base construction. This is obvious on a fine day where water is coming up out of the cracked seams on an otherwise dry surface.

See photo of example.

There is also some significant cracking on the three lower courts around the grass strip areas where the asphalt does not look to have been compacted adequately.

Going forward it would be our recommendation that these bottom three courts and the entrance section in front of the double gates is re-asphalted before any new Rebound Ace surface could be applied.

The three top courts do show some degradation but could be prepared to accept the Rebound Ace surface in our opinion.

Court Preparation

- Removal of all the three games lines by grinding
- Fully waterblast all of the courts clean
- Vee out any cracked or low seams
- Apply Rebound Acrylic Resurfacer to any low seams and cracks
- Sand/grind flat
- Apply one coat of Rebound Acrylic Filler

No allowances have been made for any further asphalt levelling if required.



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Section D

72.6m x 44.4m = area 3,223m²

This area is made up of four netball courts and divided by a concrete strip through the centre which would not be coated.



The asphalt surface is quite open and boney with thick lines painted on the courts. There are some seam areas which are low and the very boney overall nature of the surface means that a full resurfacer coat would be required before application of the Rebound Ace surface. This is the roughest surface of all the sections.

The courts would be laid as two sections with the centre concrete strip uncoated. The surface would extend out only to the slot drains leaving the asphalt sections on the other side untouched.



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Section to the right of the drain would remain uncoated

Court Preparation

- Removal of all the games lines by grinding
- Fully grind the entire surface
- Fully waterblast all of the courts clean
- Vee out any cracked or low seams
- Apply Rebound Acrylic Resurfacer to low seams
- Sand/grind flat
- Apply one coat of Rebound Resurfacer
- Sand/grind the entire surface flat again

No allowances have been made for any further asphalt levelling if required.



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Court Finishes

The texture of the courts is extremely important for netball use. We will use a proven sharper sand filler in the final coat and a broomed texture **MUST** be applied to the inner netball court paint. Failure to not add this additional texture will result in a more slippery surface.

All court areas outside the netball court markings will be in a squeegee finish.

Court Colours – we have allowed for a two colour system. We have also allowed for the internal colour to extend outside of the netball outlines by 1.1m to create an umpire zone without the need for additional umpire lines,

At the point where the rubber mat finishes around the perimeter there may be a slight ridge in the surface due to the tapering down to the asphalt.

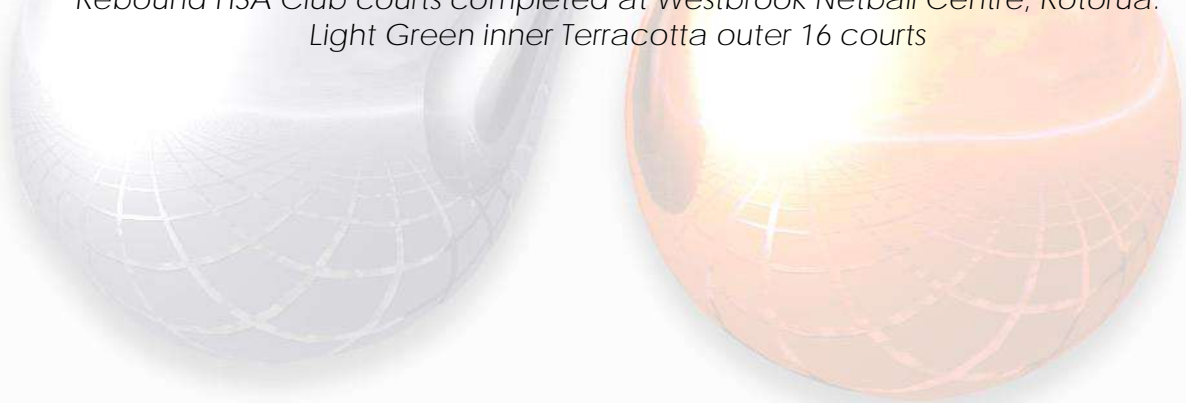

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Line Colours

All netball courts will be painted yellow. All dimensions will match international standards and original Rebound Ace line paint will be used. Lines will be masked and Rebound Linesharp will be used.

Under no circumstances will we outsource the line marking work. We are the most experienced linemarkers in New Zealand for indoor and outdoor premier surfaces and believe we provide the highest quality lines available.

Future Conditions

As the surface to be applied over is old asphalt, it is almost certain there will be some future movement in the base and cracks may appear or new ones may form. We will not warranty our surface against this occurrence. We also cannot warranty against any damage to the surface caused by any underground water pressure or underground tree roots.

Site Storage and Services

We may have a requirement to use a container for storage on site and will require access to water and single phase power near the courts.

Installation Timing

All pricing has been based on completing each section of work as a project on its own, independent of other sections being completed at the same time. If some of the sections were completed together then there would be additional savings in the project prices.

Base Preparation

Where significant base preparation work is required then a resurfacer is applied to the asphalt. This is manufactured by Rebound and so is fully compatible with the complete system. Details of this product is listed on the following pages.

ACRYLIC RESURFACER APPLICATION PROCEDURE

Acrylic Resurfacer is a 100% acrylic resin based liquid mixed with sand and cement to be used for patching and repairing of damaged or eroded asphalt court surfaces. **Acrylic Resurfacer** is used to fill the voids in the asphalt surface in preparation for the application of **Rebound Ace Sports** systems. It is also the standard primer used for **Rebound Ace Pro on Asphalt**.

Acrylic Resurfacer Liquid can be mixed with **Acrylic Resurfacer Powder**

OR

Acrylic Resurfacer Liquid can be mixed with locally sourced cement and graded silica sand. Application viscosity is adjusted by increases or decreases in added water level, without any problems of rapid settling or quick set up of mixture.

Surface Preparation

Thoroughly clean the surface with a high pressure water cleaner. Remove all dirt and loose material. Use compactor or grinder to smooth lumps and cracks in the surface.

Suggested Mixing Ratios & Coverages

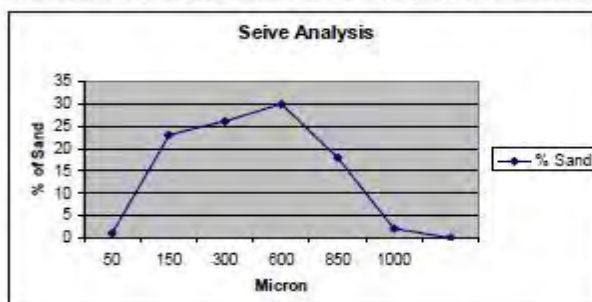
(a) Using RAS Premixed Powder

Acrylic Resurfacer Powder is a pre mix powder blend (5:1 Silica sand/Portland cement) which can be mixed directly with **Acrylic Resurfacer Liquid** in a ratio of 3 bags of **Acrylic Resurfacer Powder** to 20 litres of **Acrylic Resurfacer Liquid** with the addition of 10 to 20 litres of water depending on the porosity and profile of the surface and the preferred mix consistency suitable for application. Water level should be adjusted to achieve required consistency for squeegee application.

Coverage: Whilst all surfaces are different, we suggest a guide for total coverage on boney open asphalt is approximately 1 litre per square metre of mixed materials in one or two coats.

(b) Using Separate Locally Sourced Powder Materials Mixed on Site.

Aim to use (if practicable) sands which provide the grading shown on the table/graph below. Trials should be conducted to confirm sand suitability for use before starting the project. The sand/cement ratio should always be maintained at 5:1 by weight irrespective of the grading of the sand. Do not use higher levels of cement as this can lead to problems of efflorescence and delamination. Generally, a more coarse sand grading requires less water and a finer sand grading requires more water. The following is indicative Sieve Analysis of sand used in RAS 'Acrylic Resurfacer Powder'.

ACRYLIC RESURFACER APPLICATION PROCEDURE

Mixing Instructions

Add approximately half the required amount of water to **Acrylic Resurfacer Liquid** while stirring with an electric mixer (High Performance long shaft mixer, or similar). Slowly add **Acrylic Resurfacer Powder**, or if using 'site mixed powder', mix sand and cement and slowly add to liquid mix while stirring. Mix until a smooth consistency free of lumps is achieved and then add balance of water sufficient to achieve a consistency suitable for squeegee application. Patch and repair cracks with **Rebound Patch Compound** (refer separate technical bulletin) prior to application of **Acrylic Resurfacer**. Pot Life after mixing is approximately 1 hour depending on temperature.

Recoating

Cement modified systems can be recoated by themselves as soon as the coating has set (4-16 hours depending on thickness of fill). They must be allowed to cure for 24 hours minimum (no maximum) before application of **Rebound Ace Sports** systems. Cure time will vary depending on thickness, temperature and humidity conditions.

Note:

1. Coverage rate and hence quantity of **Resurfacer Liquid** required will vary considerably depending on roughness and porosity of asphalt substrate. The above figures are given as a guide only. Applicators should apply test areas if necessary on poor quality asphalt substrates to estimate actual coverage required.
2. A stiff rubber squeegee should be used for application.
3. Silica sand / cement ratio should always be kept at 5 : 1 regardless of the sand grading.
4. If asphalt is particularly coarse and open ("bony") it is often better to use an angled squeegee blade and push it rather than pull it during application.
5. A coarse, graded silica sand mix is best for filling in cracks, voids and depressions deeper than 4mm.

Clean Up

Promptly clean all equipment with water before coating has set. Dried/cured material may be removed with Acrylic thinners or Xylene and scraping.

Precautions

- Store product unopened in a cool place, never in hot sun
- Protect from freezing
- Do not apply if surface temperature is below 10°C or above 30°C
- Allow new asphalt surfaces to cure 14 days in good conditions before application
- Do not apply if rain is imminent
- Sands added must be washed and free of clay, salt and other foreign matter
- Do not apply over tar emulsions

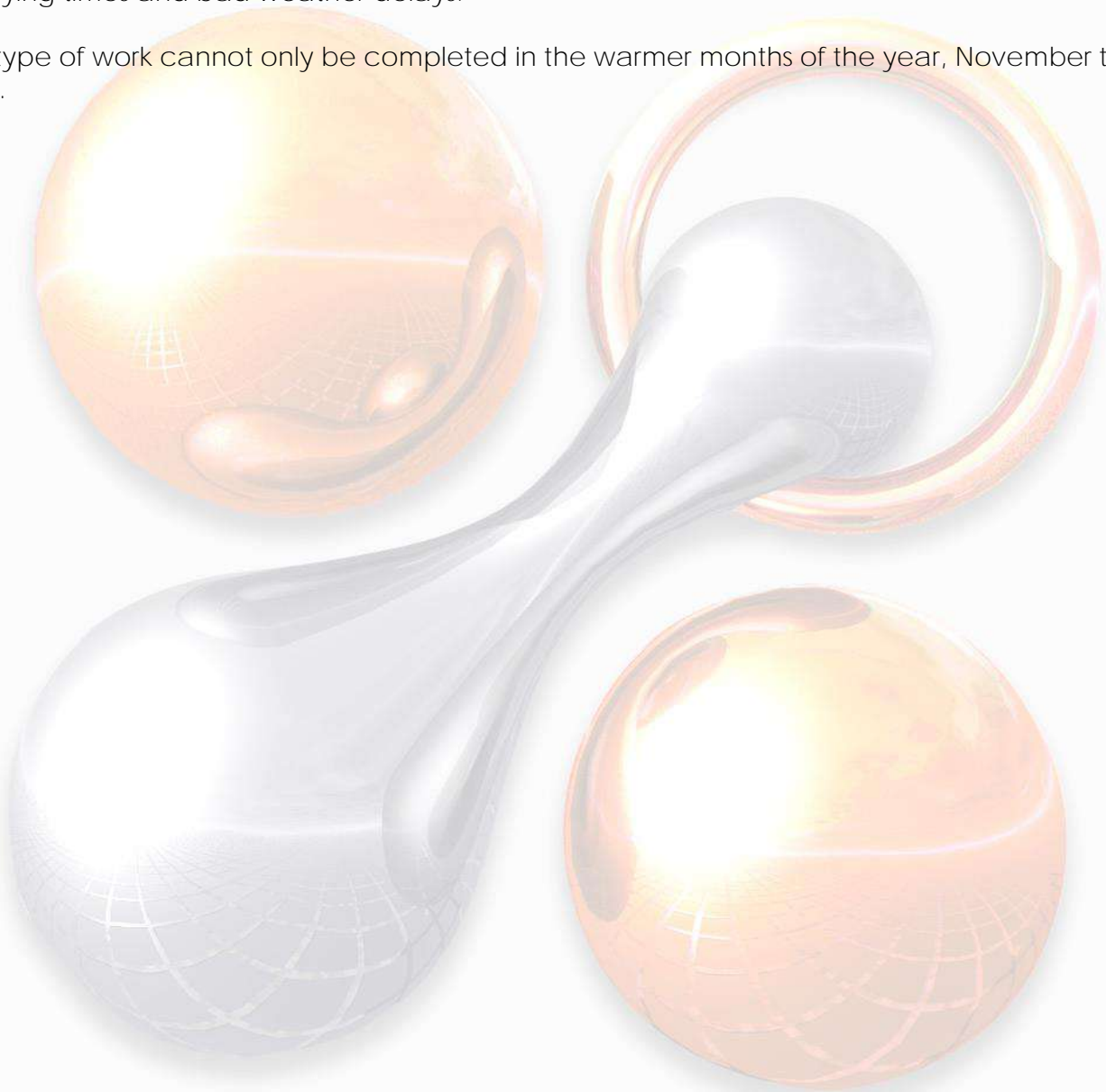
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Programme

The length of installation is partly determined by the amount of preparation work required in each section. A programme can be put together but a typical six court section would estimate to take 3-4 weeks to complete including preparation.

These allowances are only estimates as conditions are dependent on the weather both in terms of drying times and bad weather delays.

This type of work cannot only be completed in the warmer months of the year, November to April.



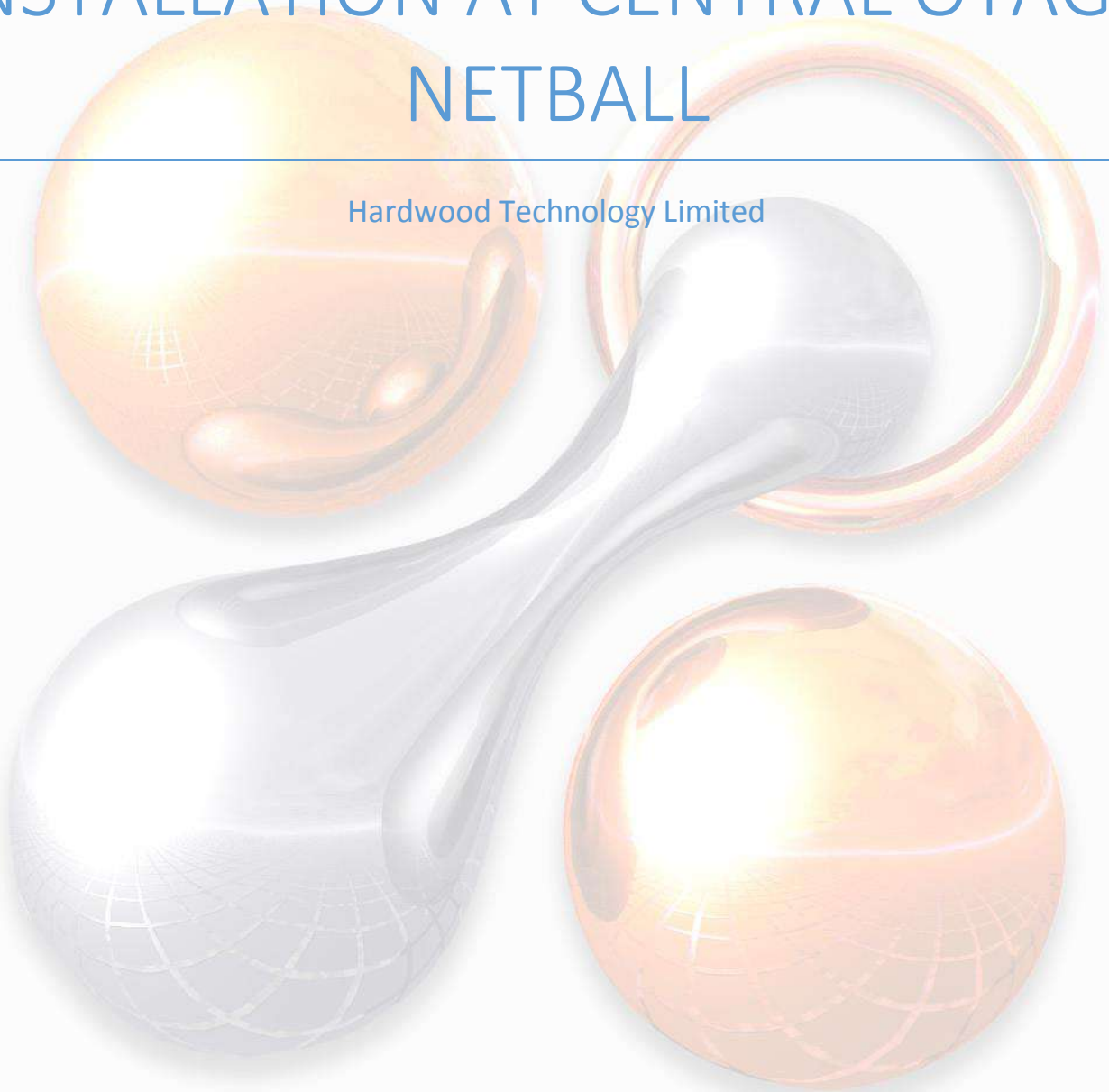

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5. Company profile

Hardwood Technology Limited is a subsidiary company of Hammerking Group Limited (formerly Printers Roller Specialists).

Printers Roller Specialists Limited was originally formed in 1976 by Lindsay Farr, one of the existing directors of Hardwood Technology. The company primarily specialised in the refurbishment of worn printing and coating rollers for a variety of applications throughout the country. The company manufactured polyurethane products and was licensed to manufacture RYNO® Rollers in New Zealand and this sole agency is still held today.

During the next few years Hammerking urethane was developed in to a variety of applications and in 1988, the company name was changed to Hammerking Rollers Limited to better reflect the developing operations. Another company, Hammerking Products Limited was also formed. While Hammerking Rollers continued to focus on the printing market it had also developed a range of other processes including polyurethane elastomers for rollers and other industrial applications. Hammerking Products limited was the first company in New Zealand to develop polyurethane bound rubber granules for use in many safety- surfacing applications including Hockey sports fields and gymnasium floors.

This area of operation expanded into play structure and other leisure sports surfaces including Junckers® wooden gymnasium floors.

In 1994 the playground and rubber products companies were sold and Hardwood Technology Limited was formed to specialise in the wooden flooring systems. A partnership with the Danish company, Junckers Industries, was formed who are the largest manufacturer of solid wood sports floors in Europe.

Over the last 25 years, Hardwood Technology has specialised in the supply of Junckers sports floors and has now become New Zealand's largest supplier of these systems. The sports floor range has also been extended to include locally produced systems. These systems are now installed in Australia and the Pacific Islands. The company also supplies and installs a range of high quality domestic timber floors as part of the Junckers range.

In 1999, the company added two new shareholders to the business, Selwyn Pratt and Mark Slane.

In late 2002, Hardwood Technology also became an official agent and applicator of the range of Rebound Ace® sports surfaces. This direction enabled the company to offer a wider range of sports surfaces both for indoor complexes and also for outdoor applications such as tennis and netball courts.

In 2005, Hammerking Group Ltd was formed and Hammerking Rollers and Hardwood Technology became subsidiary companies of the group.



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In 2012, Hammerking Group acquired a majority shareholding in Maxwood Manufacturing Ltd based in Christchurch. This formed part of an expansion plan into bollards, retractable, bleacher and auditorium seating throughout New Zealand but also provided a launching pad into Australia.

In 2014, Maxwood Technology Australia Ltd was formed to continue the expansion of seating solutions for the sport leisure and education markets in Australia. It also enabled the company to introduce sports flooring into those same markets primarily through the Junckers branding and expertise from the New Zealand operation.

With offices and warehouses in Auckland, Christchurch and Sydney, this enabled more efficient distribution of the total range of group products.

In 2015, the group added two new shareholders to the business, Shaun Clark and Jason Smith as part of the succession plan for the retiring original owner, Lindsay Farr.

In late 2018, Hammerking Rollers Ltd was divested to enable a greater focus on the core businesses and expansion into Australia.

Hardwood Technology Limited has also experienced considerable growth with approximately 60% of the business being the supply, installation and maintenance of gymnasium sports floors including the largest gym floors in New Zealand being 10,000m² at the ASB Kilburnie Stadium in Wellington and the 6,000m² facility at Pulman Arena in Papakura.

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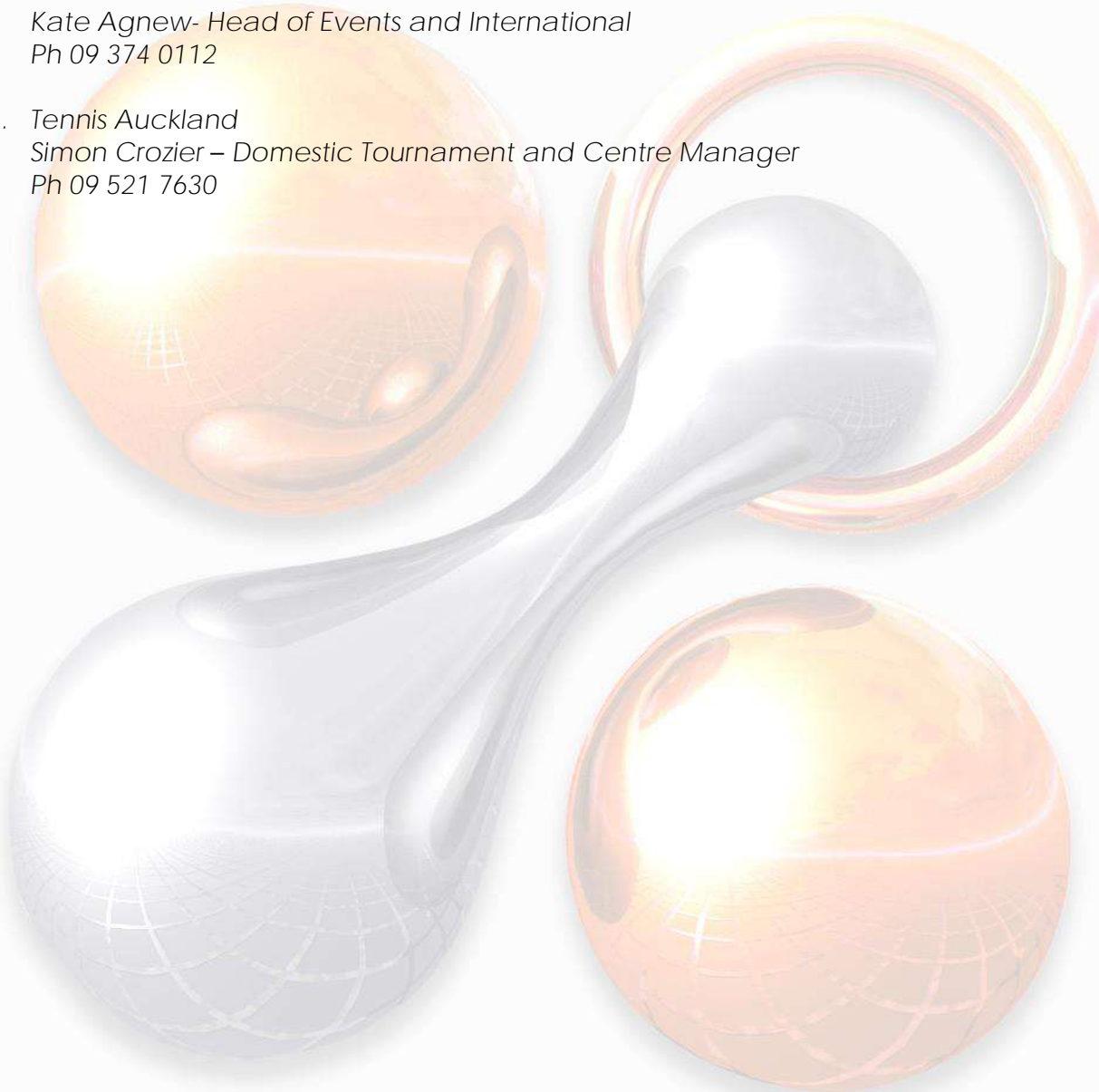

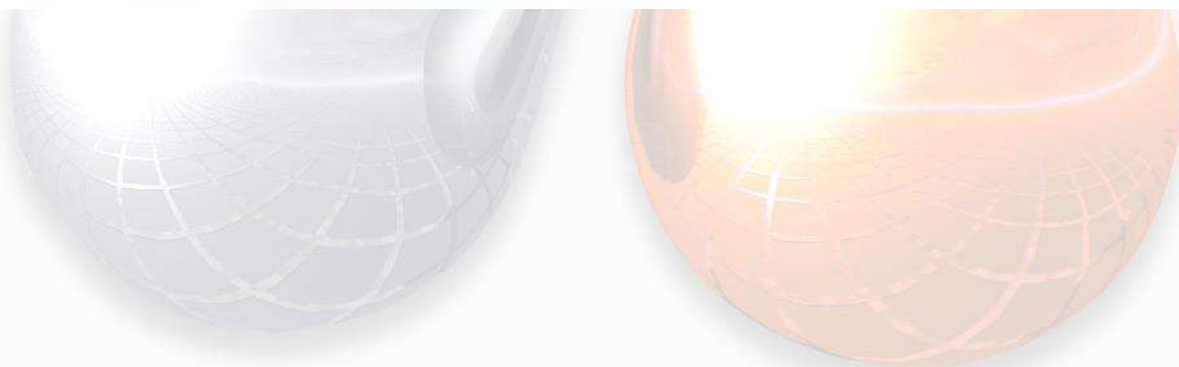

Proposed Recovery Budget

Our proposed 10-year budget would see capital investment of \$31 billion in Auckland over the next 10 years. This would allow us to deliver key services Aucklanders rely on, renew our aging assets, have a focused approach to building infrastructure to support population growth, and make progress on addressing the challenges of climate change and environmental sustainability.

As a result of COVID-19, it is projected that our revenue will be impacted by around \$1 billion. In light of this, and to provide the investment outlined above, we are proposing a one-off 5 per cent average general rates increase for 2021/2022, rather than the previously planned 3.5 per cent increase. The increases would return to 3.5 per cent each year thereafter. We are also proposing to increase our borrowing in the short term, continue to make cost saving and sell more surplus property.

2. Climate change

Through Te Tāruke-ā-Tāwhiri: Auckland's Climate Plan, we heard Aucklanders want greater action on climate change. The proposed 10-year budget includes additional investment to respond to the challenges of climate change.

The proposed additional investment will mean we do not need to buy any more diesel buses and it will help us replace our diesel buses with electric and hydrogen buses sooner. It will also help us divert more waste from landfill, plant over 2 million more native trees and other initiatives.

To start construction on the above major new water quality projects six years earlier (in 2022/2023), and to increase our investment in regional water quality programmes across all of Auckland, we are also proposing to increase this targeted rate annually in line with proposed average increases in general rates.

You'd use world class venues and facilities to host your own enrichment activities and your hosts would build a brand new operations centre in their facilities specifically for your planned activities, and they'd upgrade the overall facilities to suit your exacting needs!

And, they'd disrupt the lives of all those around the facilities to give you total freedom to do what you like, when you like, and for as long as you like! You'd be the master over those who need the facilities for their daily lives!

And, they'd invite the local media in to give you all the advertising that you could possibly want, and use these media to generate massive hype for your activities so that you gain further exposure! All for free!

And, for all this, they would not charge you even one single cent for the hire of the facilities or the marketing activities that they provide!

And, you can even whine about the weather!

Would you turn that down?

As a funder of these things, are you happy to have your life disrupted to provide free marketing for some of the world's largest companies who take over our facilities entirely rent free, and not receive a single cent back for marketing fees, facilities rental, or the construction of additional facilities specific to the needs of the intruders?

So why are Aucklanders forced pay for huge multi-national companies to use our facilities to advertise their brands while disrupting our lives and receive zero back from advertising fees or rental fees for our facilities?

In any normal business arrangement, if you want to use someone's facilities for your activities then you need to pay rent for them. Unless you're a genuine registered charity, in which case you really should get it for free.

Yet Auckland council spend \$113million to provide global companies free advertising and free use of our space for as long as they like!

They will obviously claim that it's an investment and that we'll recover the costs. But when? Our borders are closed, and have been for more than a year! It's not just profit and loss. It's also cash flow! They want to close libraries, sell off rate-payer assets, and hike our already exorbitant rates with the threat that without that they will stop investment, but they have given away not only the \$113M in direct costs, but also the massive rent revenue that they could and should have charged to these users of our facilities and the even more gargantuan revenue that they could and should have charged for the most costly of industry services – marketing! The cost of a 30second ad on TV around news time is tens of thousands of dollars, yet we had hours of advertising in this time with not a single cent paid for that!

Where is our return on all that investment and lost opportunity? How much did this massive event give back to the rates coffers – beyond what would normally be the case? Remember, we just had two rapid-fire lock-downs! Obviously people will go out. It was also St Patricks Day, and again, obviously people will go out! I did, and places were full, even away from the Viaduct! Because people go out anyway on special occasions and after repeated lock-downs!

So, how much EXTRA resulting from this diabolical event did our rates coffers actually increase? Without all that obvious spend?

In other words, how much profit (loss) did Auckland's rates coffers make?

And please don't refer to the Viaduct upgrades, as those were already planned anyway, long before 2017, and would have gone ahead regardless!

That's just one aspect to it! There are far more pressing needs that desperately require our attention! I'll refer to just a tiny selection.

Sport:

I'd far rather have our council invest in local sport facilities for us all to enjoy. Let's consider my sport - badminton...

It is nigh impossible to book a court at almost any of the venues at suitable times because of the clubs and tournaments. Some clubs, like the one I play at on Thursday evenings, have lost some of their courts due to a tournament that needs courts. That forces us to reject all visitors – including regular visitors and those who have directly asked me if they can play, and also members get one game on and two games off because of the restricted number of courts available. We should have three games on and one off to rest if there are enough courts.

I am hugely happy that there is such demand for my chosen sport. It's open to the public to play and it's a sport that provides excellent cardio-vascular exercise which is hugely beneficial for overall health. As many sports are. I encourage everyone who is able to play some sport that they enjoy. It's good for physical and mental health, and ultimately reduces the loading on our health care system! But we need the facilities!

The \$113million and the hundreds of millions of dollars of lost rental and marketing revenue can go a LONG way to building a couple more halls to provide more courts for this huge demand. And, obviously, into building of more facilities and maintenance of existing facilities for many other sports, too. It's not all about badminton. It's about healthy living for everyone, regardless of their chosen sport.

Housing:

We also (according to the government, anyway) have a housing shortage. We could build hundreds, probably thousands, of houses for this expense and lost revenue, and still have change left over.

They could even relocate massive golf courses to the periphery of the urban areas and free up some space in established residential areas for that much needed housing! Yes, I realise that not all golf course space is suitable for building on, but some is, and the rest can be public parks for everyone to use without fear of a glob of rubber penetrating their skulls.

Water:

Auckland has a severe and threatening water supply disaster, thanks to the gross incompetence of Jaduram and his ilk (thankfully he's gone, but his lousy legacy is very much alive and strong!). Imagine the water supply that could be achieved with all that investment! And that's for ALL Aucklanders!

Small Business Compensation

1. Proposed 10-year budget

Our proposed 10-year budget would see capital investment of \$31 billion in Auckland over the next 10 years. This would allow us to deliver key services Aucklanders rely on, renew our aging assets, have a focused approach to building infrastructure to support population growth, and make progress on addressing the challenges of climate change and environmental sustainability.

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Without this greater use of rates and debt, around \$900 million of much needed investment in Auckland would be delayed from the next three years to later in the decade. This would slow Auckland's recovery, put our services and assets at risk, lose hundreds of millions of dollars in matching government subsidies, and limit our response to our climate and environmental challenges.

What is your opinion on the proposed 10-year budget?

Support

Tell us why: I am pleased that there is the intention to invest money in the maintenance of existing buildings. Our Flat Bush Old School Hall was built in 1875 and moved to its current site in 1893. It has been maintained in reasonable condition, but was described in the 2018 Council-commissioned report 10698-B002 (attached) as needing substantial preventative maintenance to save it from collapsing in disrepair. With the enormous growth in the Flat Bush area, this is

the ONLY hall suitable for community activities - regularly used by our Probus club and U3A club in addition to many parties, weddings, etc. This is especially so since the deferment of the council facilities in the new Ormiston Town Centre. The report copy is attached, and we need reasonably prompt action to ensure the weathertightness of the roof, and the replacement of rotten weatherboards etc. A Conservation Plan for this historical building was prepared by Symon Guantero of Auckland University in June 2018 which would have emphasised the importance of this structure. It is currently managed by a volunteer Management Committee, of which I am a member and it seems difficult to find the appropriate channel to seek the necessary funds. Another 2 or 3 years, and the building may be beyond repair. I am supported in this submission by Ms. Diane Chandler Chairperson of the Hall Committee, Mr. Mike Groves President of U3A Ormiston, as well as myself the President of Probus Ormiston (a retired professional Engineer). Without this hall, our organisations would have nowhere suitable to meet - school halls are not available during school hours, and there is nowhere else in Flat Bush for us to meet.

2. Climate change

Through Te Tāruke-ā-Tāwhiri: Auckland's Climate Plan, we heard Aucklanders want greater action on climate change. The proposed 10-year budget includes additional investment to respond to the challenges of climate change.

The proposed additional investment will mean we do not need to buy any more diesel buses and it will help us replace our diesel buses with electric and hydrogen buses sooner. It will also help us divert more waste from landfill, plant over 2 million more native trees and other initiatives.

This hall is the only suitable hall in Flat Bush, especially since the planned Council development in the new Ormiston Town Centre has been deferred. Apart from the reasons mentioned there, it is surely just common sense for the Council to protect this valuable historical community asset rather than let it deteriorate through lack of essential maintenance. The 2018 suggested a possible cost of about \$200,000 which seems realistic as the roof leaks and needs replacement, and many kauri weatherboards are rotten and need replacement.

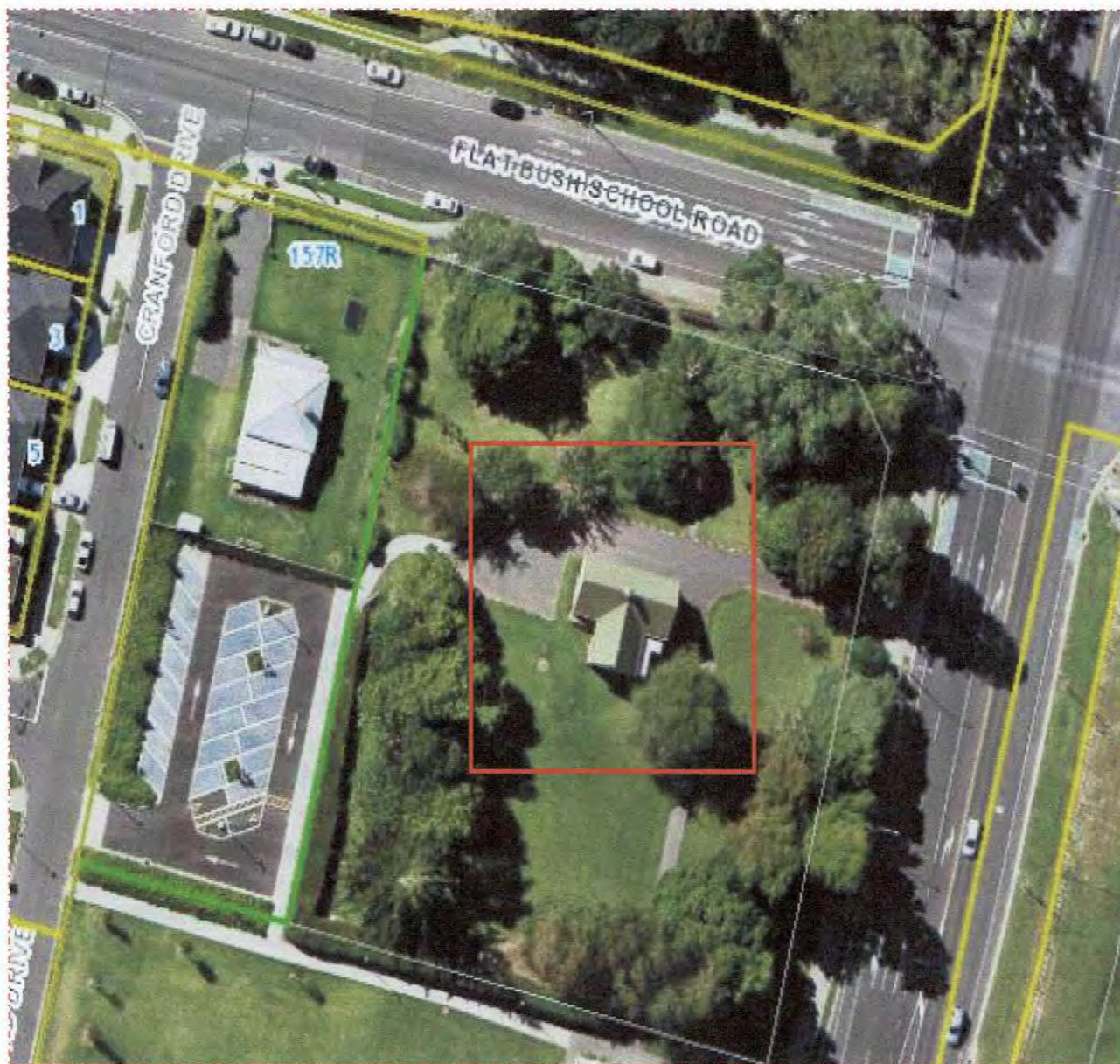

The building is constructed of Kauri timber weather board cladding, corrugated roofing iron and timber floor built in 1875 and was relocated to its present site in 1893. Currently the building is owned by Auckland Council. The building is operated by the Flat Bush Community group. The hall is venue for hire and used for Community meeting, wedding, youth groups and hobby group.

3 RECOMENDATION

3.1 Overview

Generally the Building is in satisfactory condition considering its age and use.

The building has been assessed and the overall condition is satisfactory [CG3]. It is recommended that the following Required Works and Recommended works to be carried out in order to improve the condition of the building to an acceptable level.

3.2 Required Works

The followings works are required immediately to ensure the structural integrity of the building;

OPEX:

- Gutters covered with debris to be removed and gutters cleaned.[Figure 5]
- Gully dish grate cover missing and filled with toilet paper to be cleaned and grate cover to be installed and also need to check blocked waste pipes. [Figure 18]This is a Health and Safety issue.
- The two "Fire Exit doors" at the South end is inoperable to be repaired and also signage on door to be installed "Push to open ". This is a health and safety Fire safety Hazard issue. [Figure 19]
- Window pane on west side cracked to be replaced. [Figure 22] This is health and safety issue.
- Sash window latch broken and not in working condition to be replaced.[Figure 22]
- Sash window cord broken and windows hard to open to be repaired.[Figure 21]

CAPEX:

- Repair kauri timber weather board which is split and decayed.[Figure 6 & 7]
- Repair External timber boxed corners flashing which are decayed. [Figure 7 & 9]

Parts of Bucklands Beach roads and properties are under water at spring high tides and housing intensification has been allowed to happen. As noted, all the properties in question are located Countryside Living zone. Only the property at 31 Kinmont Rise is presently located within the Urban Rating area. Our stretch of the street only has a footpath on one side of it. It doesn't have ANY streetlights on our stretch of the road. In reference to Proposal Number 2: I have read your proposed calculation for rates on my property at 39 Gracechurch Drive, Flat Bush, post code 2016, to be implemented July 2021. This would mean an increase of (\$1,489) on my lifestyle property to bring the rates into alignment with those of neighbouring Urban properties, supposedly because we "have access to a similar level of services"! Furthermore there is an additional proposed (\$11 charge) for "change to the water quality". On these two counts I cannot see the justification for which I will support with my following points:

1. I have no sewage connection on my property, unlike my urban counterparts.
2. I am on tank water and am at the mercy of the weather. So why am I asked to pay an extra \$11 for something I don't even have? Again, unlike my urban neighbours!
3. I have no street lighting on my street which makes it dark and dangerous.
4. There is no footpath on my side of the road which means I have to cross that busy road every day I go walking. I am 66years of age.

The only things I do share with my urban neighbours is the 'rubbish collection' and the street I drive to work on.

I would also like to see further investment to ensure ALL council developments and projects are low-emission and future-proofed, i.e. they don't add further emissions in their construction and operation and they are built (to adapt) for our changing climate. There also needs to be additional investment in council's Sustainable Schools programme to ensure climate change education and action is enabled through Auckland's 550 schools. Council funded programmes like Para Kore, Live Lightly, Compost Collective, Waste Free Parenting and FutureFit are great community resources and these should be expanded.

I don't think this question was fairly worded and the set responses are biased towards status quo or a small investment, i.e. I have to choose other - as there is not an option to support increased investment that is higher than that proposed. (but there is an option to not support any investment). The narrative that this 'extra' funding could be spent to improve other council services is also a dangerous distraction and is not transparent for the public (i.e. it's great if we get an extra playground, but may be useless due to climate change impacts - if it floods, has no shade due to loss mature trees and our climate is too hot to use it!!) The real costs of climate impacts and inaction need to be forecast and disclosed to the public, so they can make an informed choice, not just a package of what the politician's think is a priority or will be 'acceptable'. While I appreciate that there are many trade-offs in services to adequately run the city - there will be no future environment habitable to live in if council does not urgently address climate change by investing now. As elected members you cannot endorse a climate plan and then fail to fund it - you will lose your international memberships, your credibility, your social license to operate and your public reputation and trust.

It is not sufficient, realistic or honest to say that \$170 million of other planned expenditure could be reprioritised for climate (and accept any impact that might have on other council services) - this will not happen without the explicit direction and budget from elected members through the LTP process - once budgets are set who will lead reprioritisation? The departments responsible for delivering climate outcomes, cannot be begging for other units to give them budget. There hasn't been a playground or footpath or library emergency declared - so while important, 'other' council services may need to reduce in order to fund our life support- safeguard our climate. It is council's responsibility to explain/justify and better make the case for why climate investment is not an added extra cost, but a significant risk that must be embedded into all financial decision-making.

Proposed Recovery Budget

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As a result of COVID-19, it is projected that our revenue will be impacted by around \$1 billion. In light of this, and to provide the investment outlined above, we are proposing a one-off 5 per cent average general rates increase for 2021/2022, rather than the previously planned 3.5 per cent increase. The increases would return to 3.5 per cent each year thereafter. We are also proposing to increase our borrowing in the short term, continue to make cost saving and sell more surplus property.

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Without this greater use of rates and debt, around \$900 million of much needed investment in Auckland would be delayed from the next three years to later in the decade. Tell us why: We do not support the proposed 10 year budget of removing the farm and lifestyle rates differential in the Urban Rating Area, As our property assessment number of 12344409291, we disagree with the reason provided as having the same access to council services as our urban rated neighbors and also don't think we have much higher access to council services than farm and lifestyle properties in rural areas. We have a number of reasons for this, firstly we do not have access to city council water supplies as well as the wastewater and sewage system. If the proposed plan

is to change our rates, we would expect the same access to water and sewage treatment facilities as our urban-rated counterparts. Secondly in our lifestyle block area, We experience a large amount of illegal dumping and a lack of CCTV footage of young teenagers doing marijuana on our no exit streets. We have reported this to the council before to no avail as well as a popular hiking trail from our street to point view drive being abandoned by the council and allowed to become overgrown. We have spoken to the council in regards to this with no change. We are finding a lack in council services already and to be asked to have our rates increased without all these issues to be addressed first just seems very unreasonable. To even consider us to have the same access to the urban-rated areas without providing us with the basics of water and a sewage system just seems preposterous.

2. Climate change

Through Te Tāruke-ā-Tāwhiri: Auckland's Climate Plan, we heard Aucklanders want greater action on climate change. The proposed 10-year budget includes additional investment to respond to the challenges of climate change.

The proposed additional investment will mean we do not need to buy any more diesel buses and it will help us replace our diesel buses with electric and hydrogen buses sooner. It will also help us divert more waste from landfill, plant over 2 million more native trees and other initiatives.

What is your opinion on this proposal to invest more in responding to climate change?

Support the proposed increased investment

Tell us why: To address climate change, I feel we need to do more than just change over our busses from diesel to electric. A large portion could be to make public transport free to encourage the use and lower the individual household emissions especially with a large number of traffic jams, the road expansion planning of the city would be harder to correct than just switching over busses.

3. Water quality

Since 2018 the Water Quality Targeted Rate has allowed us to fund initiatives to improve the water quality of our harbours, beaches and streams. This was initially intended to run from 2018 to 2028.

We are proposing to extend the Water Quality Targeted Rate until June 2031.

Extending the targeted rate

Extending this targeted rate to June 2031 will help continue to improve water quality in other areas of the city, including coastal water quality from Hobson Bay to St Heliers, as well as the Manukau Harbour. Extending this targeted rate would enable this additional work to begin in 2028/2029.

Increasing the targeted rate

To start construction on the above major new water quality projects six years earlier (in 2022/2023), and to increase our investment in regional water quality programmes across all of Auckland, we are also proposing to increase this targeted rate annually in line with proposed average increases in general rates.

4. Community investment
