Tell us why: I submit that it is critical that KLB invest in permanent baseball infrastructure at Stafford Park in Northcote Point during the 2022/23 capital cycle. Specifically, during winter 2022 in support of the 22/23 season from October 2022.

For health and safety purposes, this investment must include a permanent backstop capable of more effectively preventing balls from exiting the field of play and landing on or amongst spectators, parked cars, neighbouring properties, and other users of the park. The current netting based system is full of holes (including from council mowing contractors) and should not have been used in the 21/22 season due to its poor condition. Furthermore, it extends insufficiently far down the baselines to prevent hard hit balls from exiting into spectator and benched player areas. This backstop should include built-in home and away dugouts for both player safety and protection from the sun. Stafford currently has no built shelter from the sun. Additionally, moveable outfield fencing should be provided to prevent balls from being hit onto nearby roadways.

Although the health and safety need for this infrastructure is paramount, it should also be noted that all of these items will improve the recreational capacity of Stafford Park for baseball purposes. Baseball is a growing, diverse, and inclusive sport and Stafford Park is the only baseball facility for those aged 14 and over currently operational on the North Shore. Even as other facilities are developed it will continue to be put to more and more use for both training and competitive games across a range of ages and grades.

In short, Stafford is one of the most heavily used baseball facilities in Auckland but is also the most run-down, dangerous, and unsuitable. It is critical that capital improvements be undertaken during winter 2022 for use in the next season. Any delay risks damage to property, injuries to participants and others, and a decline in recreational participation in our community.

Then the individual products can be sent off to the main recycling centres, in each electorate. These could go to

centres that can re/up-cycle or reuse and refashion particular waste materials. This is absurd.

How about resuming all the hundreds of bus services from Papakura to the city along the Great South Road through Takanini Manurewa Papatoetoe Otahuhu and Penrose that were removed in 2016 to make people use a train service that doesn't even run half the time and almost impossible to get to for those living in Otara or Mt Wellington. The single bus service to Highbrook should be improved rather than removed. The existing service does not take into account the hours of work of the factories at Highbrook that run 24 hour shifts. Referencing the TABLE 1 - TŪPUNA MAUNGA WORK PROGRAMME 2021-31 (pages 17 to 20 of the plan) I make submission points specific to the following items of the programme: WAIRUATANGA / SPIRITUAL, Protection and restoration of tihi, "vegetation management – remove weed species, manage health and safety risks and inappropriate exotics" MANA AOTŪROA / CULTURAL AND HERITAGE, Protection and restoration of integrity of the Tūpuna Maunga, "vegetation removal - weed species, health and safety risks, and inappropriate exotics in accordance with the Integrated Management Plan and Strategies" MAURI PŪNAHA HAUROPI / ECOLOGY AND BIODIVERSITY all topics of "Pest Management and Biosecurity programme, monitoring and research" WHAI RAWA WHAKAUKA / ECONOMIC AND COMMERCIAL, "Facilitate and promote commercial activities that promote the values of the Tūpuna Maunga" Drawing on TMA Core Values related to preservation of biodiversity and enjoyment (presented in both the proposed TMA operational plan and prior TMA Integrated Management Plan 2016 including "Biodiversity" including "if the Maunga are well, Auckland is well" including "Promote health and wellbeing"

Many of Auckland's volcanic parks under the TMA scope currently contribute natural outdoor spaces of mature tree canopy that invokes a sense of grandness and wild space which is rather unique within city limits. I personally feel a sense of enjoyment and restorative calm when experiencing these spaces. I note such experiential mental health benefits are also likely a significant component of "pull" for many visitors. For many these spaces provide an important reprieve from city sensory intensity, in particular for those living in projected high-growth high-density housing developments and associated nihilation of surrounding natural habitats. I live in the Māngere/Ōtāhuhu area where the impact of lost green space and increased housing densities is especially pronounced, the area is said to have the lowest tree coverage of Auckland suburbs. It can be realized the Maunga is currently already offering an important space to counteract those affects, as enjoyed by many tens of thousands of public visitors daily. The TMA vision of revegetating the Maunga with wholly native species is an aspiring and worthwhile project. Practically the project is inherently long duration and can be imagined will produce excellent outcomes beyond a 50+ year time horizon. I raise issue with the plan as presented that it does not provide meaningful protections for biodiversity and enjoyment perspectives during the interim period (of multiple decades.) Approval of the proposed Operational Plan must be dependent on providing an implementation plan for the revegetation project which provides the highest possible continuity of mature tree canopy and takes all practical steps possible to achieve that goal. For clarification it is not acceptable to remove any native or exotic mature trees before nurturing comparably sized replacement native species adjacent at the site. The work plan items relating to topics of "Pest Management and Biosecurity programme, monitoring and research" I believe are excellent and should be encouraged at all stages of implementation, with exception of the removal of mature Morton Bay fig trees which although classified as a mild pest the benefits from their contribution to the continuity of tree canopy outweigh their mild nuisance characteristics and would not significantly hinder progress of the overall native revegetation project. The topic of "Facilitate and promote commercial activities that promote the values of the Tūpuna Maunga" I believe should not be permitted to proceed due to high likelihood of interests conflicting with core objectives of preservation of biodiversity and quality of outdoor nature spaces for enjoyment by the general public and the various entomology, herpetology and bird species residing on the Maunga.
