Many of the funds raised from the rates are going into over priced or wasted areas of spending. Redirecting existing rates from overspending in other areas, eg, consultants, events that the private sector should be organising, expensive local boards and other costly areas would be more prudent.

We already have many walking and cycling areas that are barely used. I use them myself and they are often empty of people using them or have very few people utilising them. Aucklands climate is not always suitable for people to use them as a normal mode of everyday transport to and from destinations. And it is unrealistic when most people combine their journeys to do a number of different activities that are not able to be done by walking or cylcing. These activities are recreational and it is an ideal to thing otherwise.

Low- emission ferrys is very ambiguous. What are these low-emission ferrys? How do they run? How much will they cost? And how much will they save on emissions and fuel? And how many Aucklanders use them? The majority of Aucklanders never use ferrys and we should not be paying for them? Where will our money go and is it suitable spending? Until a full report and discussion is available we should not be paying for any of this. These questions cannot be answered so our money should not be taken for this until they can be.

Improving transport services when we already have transport services that spend most each day empty. Make the existing transport services profitable (or at least increase the revenue) before more under utilitised services are offered. A waste of rate payer funds again. I do not support the selling of the Ardmore Hall. The Ardmore Hall was a vision of the early Ardmore people to provide Ardmore with a place that they could all gather together and use as a community and the Hall is a part of Ardmore's history.

It was built by the people with passion, drive, hard work with the land being gifted to the district for the people of the Ardmore community. It was financed, run and maintained by those same people and families up until 1941.

It was a place used by local families for weddings, 21st, engagements, funerals, Ardmore indoor Bowls, gymnastics, Woman's Division, table tennis, dancing, the school even the Army during the War while solders camped in the nearby bush while giving up their barracks in Papakura Army Camp for the Americans and many more users.

This is all part of Ardmore's history and heritage. Take this away and Ardmore loses some of it's history and that only leaves the school, church and airport.

The slow actions of fixing the Hall after the 'fire' has meant those using its facilities have now had to secure other premises. Maybe a purposed move?

The selling of the Hall would be a sad day for Ardmore and any money from the selling of the hall should be retained in the Ardmore community e.g. the Church & school.

I'm sure all from previous years of people who worked hard and giving of land and materials and time would want the money retained in their community and not that of another.

Ardmore is a growing community itself as is Papakura and Clevedon and in no time both will meet up with Ardmore.

Will Clevedon A&P grounds have the space for growth as spoken of in the video or would the retention of the Ardmore grounds become an asset in the end.

Maybe bringing the grounds up to the same standard as other grounds being used would be the answer.

Of all places 'local area' to benefit from the release of this land it would be great to see the land given to the Ardmore School. It would give the school the capacity for growth but more importantly to provide parking for drop off and pickup in a safe environment which as to date is a dangerous catastrophe waiting to happen with the accumulation of cars parked around the school road and coming and going from the school in the morning and afternoons not to mention the speed in which cars are travelling past the school be it speed restrictions in place or not. These grounds are being used now for this.

The cenotaph has been moved once already from the old tennis club on the corner of Church & Clevedon Rd's to its fitting place where it is today.

There would only be two places fitting for the cenotaph to go for its last resting place to be:

1. First and foremost would be the Ardmore St James Church on Church Rd. Along side the names on the cenotaph would lay the decedents of those fallen men many of who also built the hall.

2. Secondly would be the school as the planted trees are there - one for each of the fallen Ardmore solders during the war.

Wherever the cenotaph was to go would need to be a place where public access was available 24/7.

I am a forth generation of these early Ardmore people, having spent my life around Ardmore and also lived there for 20 years. I live just down the road in Clevedon but clearly hold great interest in Ardmore due to family history there.

We spend a lot of time in New Plymouth in an area with high rental and housing NZ population where there is a rates based rubbish collection. From our observation most tenants both private and Housing NZ don't give a hoot about recycling and what is rubbish as they don't have to pay. The same thing will happen in Auckland and will be another kick in the guts for landlords.

With the proposed system those like ourselves will be subsidising the heavy users no matter the size of the bin. How can it be equitable for someone who puts a bin out once a month to someone who puts it out every week when they will pay the same for the same size bin? At least the tag system makes people aware of recycling and is a fair user pays system. Your proposed system will only go to increasing landfill as people will either be paying no matter how much waste they have or tenants won't care as they are not paying. Your statement that everyone with the same size bin pays the same which is what happens with the tag system anyway does not take into account how often you put your bin out so is not equitable. We have user pays for almost everything else like water, power, and road usage through petrol tax to name a few so why is rubbish collection being changed from a user pays system.

We can only see this as a rates increase for low use rubbish collection.

The Park is located within the Papakura Local Board area; however, we recognise that we provide sporting facilities that are significant in a sub-regional or regional context and therefore seek funding support from both Council and the Local Board. The introduction of bins (with tags) coincided with the introduction of the food waste bins and the two systems have been amazing for our household because previously food waste, particularly bones went out each week in the old orange bags for health reasons. In 2021 we put out our small general rubbish bin only 6 times for collection and our food scraps bin each week. The \$69.88 on our rates for the food waste service is a very worthwhile cost and our 6 bin tags totalling \$17.10 for pensioners was a big reduction in cost compared to a bag a week plus a huge reduction in what went into landfill. This cost helped offset other price increases for our household such as with food.

In our cul-de-sac of 39 homes only 10 general rubbish bins were out for collection today which shows householders are reducing their waste and maybe using the recycle bins more efficiently because every house had their bin out. What is a concern is that only about half are using the food waste bins although I know a number of my neighbours have compost bins for their gardens.

We understand that having even a low paid employee taking the tags off bins is not cost effective and some other method needs to be found but please note our objection to returning to a rates based general rubbish collection system.

I have been living in Wattle Downs since 1996. When we at that time were considering purchasing a house here, one of the selling points by developer Ross Roofing was that there was going to be a bridge built across the Papakura stream that would give Wattle Downs residents direct road access to the Great South rd via the Manukau Golf course.

For whatever reason that never happened.

Nearly twenty years later the Golf Course got sold to Fletcher who is currently developing the land into a new suburb called Waiata Shores.

Soon there again were new promises/rumours going around that as part of the Waiata Shores development, Fletcher was going to build a smaller bridge (for pedestrians and cyclists only) across the Papakura stream that would now connect the waterfront footpaths/cycle lanes in Wattle Downs with the new footpaths/cycle lanes in Waiata Shores.

Perfect, because this would give cyclists and pedestrians via Waiata Shores also direct access to the footpaths/cycle lanes in Conifer Grove as well as the new footpath/cycle lane along the southern motorway all the way to Karaka.

- AC should look into more sustainable and eco-friendly buses as they are used more by the public and therefore have more impact on the environment in comparison to Ferries.
- New Metro System: Making buses and bus stops more accessible.



- Recent studies show Around 320 million to be fares free an option that would help combat this issue the fastest and encourage the use of public transport.
- Youth will be the ones being affected by climate change in the future so we should look at making more drastic changes



AK HaveYourSay Question 2 – Managing on-going budget pressures

Due to on-going impacts of COVID-19 on our revenue, and growing inflationary pressure, we are forecasting a budget shortfall of \$85 million for 2022/2023 compared to what was budgeted for in the 10-year Budget 2021-2031. Some of the budget pressures would be ongoing.

We plan to use a range of levers to manage next year's, and on-going, budget pressures, including:

- Using the Government's Better Off support package funding
- Changing the timing of some capital spending
- Implementing cost reductions in the form of efficiency savings and potential reduction in some services
- Keeping the previously agreed general rates increase of 3.5 per cent for 2022/2023
- Continue work on the sale or long-term lease of non-strategic assets as required.

What does PYC think of the proposal to manage their on-going budget pressure:

- With the changing of timing of some capital spending it would be better to know where this capital spending is going.
- Would be putting climate change and standard of living first and then looking at things like building roads.
- With the same increase (3.5%) once again, when do we stop the rise? When we are ratepayers we will be paying much more to the local government than our parents did. With an increase of homes, there should be a balance to the amount of rates received.

- · Continue to work with neighbouring local boards, local communities and mana whenua on projects that improve our environment and and the health of our waterways.


What does PYC think about the Papakura Local Board Priorities?

- Having seen that there is a budget from Auckland Council put towards removing Mangroves from the Papakura area, why?







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
