Your feedback

1. Climate action targeted rate

To meet our climate ambitions, we must reduce transport emissions in Auckland by 64 per cent by 2030. To address the climate emergency and contribute to this climate goal, we are proposing spending an additional \$1.045 billion (including government funding and other sources) over the next 10 years on a series of targeted actions to reduce emissions and support adaptation. This includes:

- improving transport choice for over one million Aucklanders who will be living within 500 meters of new or improved bus services
- moving to low-emission ferry services
- increasing provision for walking and cycling, and
- increasing tree canopy cover in communities that need it most.

We propose introducing a climate action targeted rate (separate from general rates) to pay for \$574 million of this over the next 10 years. We estimate the targeted rate to be about \$1.12 per week (about \$58 a year) for the median value residential property.

Tell us why: I believe it should be central government who should tax us on this matter. I find it increasingly difficult to afford my rates bill.

2. Managing on-going budget pressures

Due to on-going impacts of COVID-19 on our revenue, and growing inflationary pressure, we are forecasting a budget shortfall of \$85 million for 2022/2023 compared to what was budgeted for in the 10-year Budget 2021-2031. Some of the budget pressures would be ongoing.

- using the Government's Better Off support package funding
- changing the timing of some capital spending

We never put food scraps in the bag as we share this kind of waste between our 2 hens and the compost heap. We would never use a food scraps bin and we should not have to pay for it.

We are fastidious about separating recyclable items from the waste but it is many weeks before the green recycle bin needs to go out.

Your proposed across the board system offers little incentive for the householder to think carefully about minimising waste on their property but a PAYT system does.

The information in the waste management section is unclear as to what the effect would be on rural lifestyle properties. On the one hand it states that bags will still be available in rural areas, but then states that the region-wide rates funding for kerbside collection applies to lifestyle properties. Many, if not most, lifestyle properties are rural. Use of bins in rural areas is problematic as many properties (including lifestyle properties) have very long driveways (we are almost a kilometre from the road where our rubbish is collected). Getting our small recycling bin into the car is hard enough - if bin collection for rubbish becomes the standard, it will require multiple trips with the car, risking having the contents of the bin spill out into the car (which sometimes happens with the recycling, but we wash it first so no biggy - but not so great if it is

landfill waste). The little "trailers" that are occasionally provided to tow bins to the road are simply not durable enough to cope with a gravel driveway (nor do they have the suspension required to cope with such an uneven surface).

Having said this, the bag system currently uses plastic bags, meaning more plastic waste into the environment every time we put our rubbish out (despite recycling and composting everything we practically can). Perhaps some of the climate change targeted rate could be put towards finding an alternative material to plastic (heavily waxed paper, maybe?).

Better yet, put some of that fund towards enabling local recycling of the plastics which are currently being sent off shore for recycling (or to be burnt or buried, rather than recycled, which is what happens in a lot of cases). Our waste should not be a poorer countries problem, and many of them are not actually recycling the products, harming the environment in the process. Local recycling would also reduce the carbon involved with sending them overseas and create jobs.

Borrowing - I think, with high inflation (and likely currency devaluation), it is not a bad time to be borrowing, so would agree with the Council expanding borrowing.

Capital Investment - I think that planned infrastructure projects for growing communities (such as in North-West Auckland, where I live) can not afford to be deferred, and should continue.

Asset Recycling - Council car-parks currently provide a reasonable-cost option for those who need to drive to central areas. I am concerned, if all these assets are sold, parking in the CBD will become a monopoly or duopoly of operators, who are able to charge as much as they like. I think the Council should instead consider selling major investments (e.g. Ports of Auckland), which are generating minimal return & would generate a huge amount of immediate revenue.

Response to Auckland Council 10 year budget 2021/31 Long term Plan consultation

Dear Mayor,

Rating policy and strategic assets

Your "Vision for Auckland" on the AC website says:

"We want Auckland to be a high performing city, strongly governed and managed, efficient and transparent in how it provides services to its people"

Northern Action Group (NAG)¹ acknowledges that Auckland Council needs an increase in rates revenue at least of the amount you propose, in order to:

- cover the shortfall from the decline in service/activity revenues and investment dividends;
- fix an infrastructure deficit;
- maintain a level of service provision of basic services which ratepayers expect of the council; and
- satisfy demands on Council for new investments and services to match the expectations of significantly wealthier ratepayers..

We also acknowledge the concerns of many ratepayers about Council's priorities, wasteful spending, bureaucracy, inefficiency and inadequate development planning coupled with poor enforcement of rules such as consent requirements.

In this submission we offer some suggestions for you on:

- selling the rate increase proposal;
- future rating strategies;
- · setting investment and service priorities; and
- more efficient delivery processes.

These should go some way to helping you address ratepayer concerns.

Selling the rate increase: by linking rate changes to property values.

Auckland ratepayers have had an unprecedented hike in their net wealth with the rise in housing prices.

¹ NAG remains committed to improving local democracy for the people of North Rodney. This include getting a vote which the people were denied on whether or not they want to be part of AC, and seeking improvement to the governance model of AC which we have frequently shown to be dysfunctional and inefficient for such a large Unitary Authority.

The General Rate is based on a proportion (ratio) of Capital Value (we believe this should be Land Value – see below) because originally the idea was to pay for property related services - 3 waters, transport, waste and related urban community services.

In equity terms it is fair that people whose wealth have increased most have benefited more and should pay more for the AC services they receive. They also can afford it (if necessary by borrowing against their equity since rates are so low – AC even has a scheme for that).

The General Rate also endeavours to provide fairness in relation to the different level of services provided by having different rates for rural, residential etc.

AC was meant to do a general property revaluation this year, but has deferred it to next year because of Covid. If it was urgent (i.e.for this year's budget) we expect it could be done quickly, or on a temporary (for this year) basis. (there are always provisions for people to object to their own valuation).

Instead of talking about a rate INCREASE - why not plan to, and say that AC intends to, keep the **ratio** the same this year, and not increase it. Make this the selling point – **no ratio increase**. Complete the valuation review urgently and base the rates on that.

[Officials will no doubt argue that it is now too late for a rating review for this year's rates accounts. If that is the case, we suggest the policy receive serious consideration for next year's rates exercise.]

AC would take on the risk of the effect of property price volatility on rating revenues. This is a manageable risk over time and would create an added incentive for AC to make Auckland an attractive place to live, work and play - keeping up property prices.

Ratepayers will appreciate knowing that if their property values decline they will see a matching reduction in rates.

Furthermore if the ratio is based on land values rather than capital values this would reduce variability, as the supply of land remains fixed and demand for land uses is growing. The package would then be tailored, fair, equitable and efficient.

AC could plan to do a valuation review (even if only a broad brush one) every year and keep the ratios the same. [A ratio review would then be a major exercise - like a representation review - done say every 6 years.]

If property values have gone up 10%, then rates revenue will increase accordingly - but you can say the general rates ratio hasn't increased. People are just paying more because they have become wealthier and the cost of providing AC services has increased. (Depending on the modelling AC might even be able to decrease the ratios initially and still achieve its target revenues.)

The appeal of this approach from the viewpoint of those who oppose AC expansion is that if property prices fall, AC would be under pressure to be more efficient, and cut out wasteful spending.

Even if you must reject this rating idea for this year because of time constraints, your communications team can still say rates are actually coming down relative to people's wealth increase in the value of their property. (AC property values have gone up by nearly 20% compared with your proposed 5% + rate increase).

Future Rating Strategies

1) Land Value based rating

The argument for Land Value based rating is clear and has been made regularly by your own Research and Evaluation Unit (RIMU).

"In summary, a land value (LV) based rates system approach has several strengths:

- 1. It incentivises efficient use of land and doesn't reward those who do not develop their land
- 2. It is easy to administer.
- 3. It is difficult to evade.
- 4. It doesn't distort production in the economy land is fixed and a tax on it won't mean less of it is produced.
- 5. It better aligns timing between infrastructure provision and take-up of that infrastructure.
- 6. It is progressive. Those with more valuable land pay more."

Recent property price increases have likely exaggerated the disadvantages of a Capital Value based rating system.

We are disappointed to see that AC has not raised this as a topic for consideration in the 10-year budget/Long Term Plan consultation. A more nuanced approach to rate increases through reconsideration of rating policy at a time of potential "transformational change" would likely have considerably defused the polarised debate around simple general percentage rate increases.

Also the main (and reasonable) concern about changes between CV and LV based rating systems is that one group or another is unfairly penalised through the change. Since properties are rated at a different ratio depending on their use category, adjustments can be made to allow for the fact that e.g. the ratio of improvements to land value in rural farms is much less than that for urban dwellings and the rating ratio reduced accordingly to allow for that.

2) Rating policy and targeted rates

In the first full year of AC's operation as a Unitary Authority (2010/11), revenue from targeted rates was \$242m against \$693m of General rates (or 35%). Since then General

rates have grown 137% to \$1,642m in 2019/2020 and Targeted rates were still at \$224m (or 14% of General Rates). Activity revenue grew during this period by 357% to \$1,316m for 2019/20.

This reflected a strategic AC rating policy of growing activity revenue while increasing the effect of the uniform rating policy to spread revenue across AC ratepayers to support the growth in non-core activity.

As maintenance and renewal of core infrastructures have been progressively neglected, new investments prioritised, and reasonable Gereral Rate increases maximized but limited, service/activity levels and investment returns (and new income, like the RFT) have made up any shortfalls.

Now activity and investment revenue has shrunk, and general rate increases have been self-limited, AC is having to turn to greater use of targeted rates to fund increases in revenue.

Targeted rates are thought of firstly as specifying the purpose the funds are to be applied for. But the generally accepted principle of targeted rates is that those who benefit, pay. i.e the ratepayers who benefit are targeted to pay the rate.

To the extent that payments and spending are not directly linked at the individual level, and payments and benefits are at a suburban or community level, the principle of proportionality should apply – the money raised should be spent on ratepayers generally in proportion to their contribution.

AC has undermined that principle by just using the first half – specifying the purpose – but broadening the base of ratepayers who pay the rate - without applying the funds proportionately. The Water Quality and Waste Management "targeted rates" are a good example. People in our local Board area (Rodney) derive no (or little) benefit from a rate used to improve water quality in Auckland city or Manakau harbour.

It's basically unfair (and simply cross subsidy or an income transfer) to tax (rate) one group to pay for another's benefits unless something is offered in return.

Under AC's new formulation, the distinction is being lost. General rates could be called targeted because they tax Auckland ratepayers and are applied across the district to benefit

Auckland ratepayers, and increasingly, targeted rates can be called general because they rate everyone to pay for district wide basic services.

Targeted rates have become another AC device to increase rates in a period of revenue shortfall - to maintain spending on basic property related services (aren't clean water, a clean environment and waste management basic services?) that general rates should pay for.

AC is doing this to avoid cutting back on services while not increasing the General Rate. Progressively turning General Rates and Targeted rates upside down and making our basics seem like extras is a poor substitute for setting a realistic rate for services AC should be providing generally to all ratepayers. If this demand for services is expanding, it should be met by strategic changes to rating policy as we suggest above, coupled with sensible usage related charges to control quantities (e.g. waste generation and processing, water use and transport asset use), not by political and tactical rating targeting of "hot-button" issues like the environment and waste.

3) Sell non-performing "Strategic' Assets

Auckland Port and Auckland Airport are strategic "gateway" land-based assets for the Auckland region, but so are the national roads that Aucklanders use and NZTA owns those. NZTA does not own transport companies and AC does not need to own the Ports or Airport businesses.

Local Authorities can control asset allocation and use regionally through regulation, by-laws and policies (in cooperation with Government). While property rights are more certain and direct in ensuring control of resources, they are not necessary.

Money raised from the sale of investment businesses (not land) can allow AC to strengthen its currently woeful enforcement and penalties regime in the event of breaches of its consents and rules.

The weakness of increasing reliance on dividends from shareholding investments has been exposed during the Covid epidemic and lock downs, with ratepayers being the "owners of last resort" and asked to make up the shortfall.

If the investments were made in AC's infrastructure assets instead (3 waters, transport and waste management), ratepayers would benefit from better services and reduced borrowing.

AC is largely a passive investor in the Ports and Airport companies and has enough governance worries properly guiding its CCO's.

It is past time to have a managed sale of AC's Ports and Airport shareholdings and repay debt or finance needed for infrastructure renewal and development.

4) Ensure infrastructure keeps pace with development – financially

Auckland has been one of the country's fastest growing areas. Population has grown 18% from 2011 to 2020. Few would argue that basic infrastructure (for water, waste management and transport) has not kept up with the development.

Successive Government have also failed to pre-provide the social infrastructures they are responsible for (schools, hospitals, civil defence, fire, police, justice.. etc.)

Worse, the cost of borrowing to support local authority infrastructure renewal and upgrades falls across the bulk of existing ratepayers - who have neither been responsible for, nor benefitted from, the population (and dwelling) growth.

AC needs to ensure that any property development that adds to current infrastructures (and thus burdens their capacity) must, before approval, ensure that the full (average, not just marginal) costs of operation, maintenance and replacement, over the life of the infrastructure used, will be met by cash flows generated by or from rates paid by the owners of those properties – not ratepayers at large.

This mostly means a targeted (permanent) infrastructure rate on new properties, to cover the extent by which current developer contributions do not cover the full average costs over time of capacity upgrades to the systems their developments connect to.

It is simply unfair to expect todays ratepayers to help pay for the costs of services provided to new ratepayers, especially when they are not currently receiving the quality of service from AC that should be standard.

AC has struggled with that since inception in 2010 and only recently completed studies on service levels and quality. These show that many legacy inequalities remain across Local Board areas in terms of core assets and community services. Little, if anything, is proposed to be done about that in this long-term plan.

In addition to developer contributions and requirements, which assist with initial asset provision, a targeted rate for all new properties is essential to help AC get on top of its asset maintenance and renewal backlog.

For too long, AC's iconic city investment development projects have not been ranked for ratepayer consideration in terms of cost/benefit and assurance of future cash flows to meet ongoing operation and maintenance and replacement needs.

The result is a system of investment prioritization selected by political decision and the creation of assets that have no future cash flows foreseen to pay for their operation, upkeep and replacement – perpetuating a cycle of wasteful spending, never-ending real rate increases, and a growing collection of deteriorating community assets. Selling assets to get finance is not addressing the fundamental weakness in AC's project evaluation methods.

Worse there is not a unified community or ratepayer level focused evaluation approach across the different prioritization criteria used by AC's different CCO's. Only the big projects

go to the GB and then the decision made is political and not based on profitability or cash flow considerations. The system is further distorted by a mesh of service cross-subsidisation.

User pays for transport services will solve many problems and remove distortions.

Why does AC not require AT to ensure public transport covers its costs?

Transparency and fairness: community engagement and accountability

Persistent refusal to provide a pro forma accounting of the financial performance and financial position for each local board area - consistent with but supplementary to the AC annual financial accounts - gives the lie to any assertion of transparency and fairness.

Since amalgamation and the conscious decision to unify rating across the then constituent Council, and now Local Board, areas, citizens and ratepayers of each Local Board area have been denied a transparent annual assessment of the financial performance of their local board area as part of AC - either as a segment breakdown of the accounts or (better still) as if Local Board areas were subsidiaries and accounted for accordingly.

The idea that all Aucklanders are the same, or part of one homogenous group is a promotional and PR chimera. There is a very wide disparity of cultures and lifestyles and activities and local government service needs across the different Auckland areas. Also as the Service Level Review has shown there are significant legacy disparities in community asset provision (which AC has done nothing to address in its 10 years of consolidation).

Ratepayers and citizens have loyalty first to their local community and district, and want (and have a right) to know where their rates are going - not just on what AC activities (since mixing the different revenue streams and accounting for expenditure on cross-area activities (intentionally?) confuses and muddles the picture), but people want to know where (the places) the money is being spent and for whose benefit.

The principle of subsidiarity demands that level of information transparency, even if the management structure persistently avoids any devolution which would make the accounting easier.

Governance and management (control and data collection) of AC on a centralized functional silo and CCO model makes this a non-trivial exercise, but some limited efforts have been made to indicate this (e.g. estimates in the Governance Framework Review and work for the LGC for the NR application for a separate Unitary Council.

Councillors like Rodney's Greg Sayers have consistently asked for this level of transparency, but the Council, led by the mayor, has refused to move, presumably fearing that local board ratepayers will see the disparities in who pays for what across Auckland and want to know why?

This does not necessarily mean that people would object, since a case can be made for investment in some areas being paid for by ratepayers in others in return for future benefits. But people want want to see the fairness in that, i.e when does their turn come for the investment that other ratepayers can help pay for. and the case is not currently being made. Auckland central is taking for granted that it knows how its ratepayers and services users want their money to be spent.

Rodney Local Board Priorities

We strongly support the Rodney Local Board's advocacy for more roading funding for our local board area and increased investment in local community assets to improve the service quality of asset based services in Rodney.

At the very least, AC's commitment to \$121m of roading funding over 10 years should be restored. At a time when AC is increasing its spending overall, the proposed reduction to \$40m is a hurtful political decision to further penalise Rodney ratepayers for complaining about, and not supporting, your wasteful spending, and poor treatment of Rodney communities relative to other AC Local Board areas.

We have no particular comments about other board priorities, given that the amount of LDI spending is extremely limited. Our view is that through devolution and enhanced localism the Board should be given more authority over the spending by Auckland Council in our area, helping to coordinate activities across AC's functional silos that don't talk to each other and having input into poor AC planning decisions that don't fully recognize local factors. This would encourage community engagement and provide some accountability for local board members.

Consistent with our view that subsidizing public transport distorts transport mode incentives, we do not support the Local Board's continued subsidy of busses and Park-n-Rides though a local targeted transport rate. On some routes there are so few passengers it would be cheaper to provide taxis.

It is vital that council and government lead the way with this. Cheaper, more frequent, better-connected and low (or no) carbon public transport is the most impactful thing council can do. These options have to be compelling (as opposed to merely adequate) for the level of change we need to take place.

Making it easier for people to park and ride or, better yet, bike and ride in greatly increased numbers is critical to people switching modes. I am lucky to catch the train from Swanson and have flexible hours so I can always easily park and get a seat. For many others, it becomes a lottery and they cannot be late for work so they stick with what they know. Also, the services need to be much more reliable.

All of these things cost money so a targeted rate makes complete sense. Any money invested on these things will be returned many times over. It is the job of local and central government to invest in the things with much longer ROI than businesses would ever contemplate.

Council need to have a much more robust strategic view on it's decisions including assessing the whole of life carbon cost of changes such as public transport. Introducing more cycle lanes to existing roads causes congestion which is defeating the whole purpose of carbon emission reduction. Trying to force people out of cars is not going to work as many have little choice due to their health, mobility, place of work (no simple bus routes). Cycleways away from existing road networks and linking communities is more acceptable provided the whole-of-life carbon cost is beneficial.

Increasing tree cover whilst a possible carbon sink needs to be no secured land as otherwise the carbon sinks are useless.

There are no hydrological initiatives within the proposal for managing climate effects such as due to increased rainfall intensity. So we have a situation in Rodney where we are losing mature tree canopy due to trees being undermined by river and stream flows, as there are no Council plans for monitoring and managing river systems to reduce flooding and protect riparian plantings and large trees in the catchments. So planting more trees is not going to work without a thorough understanding of the wider effects on their sustainability. A comprehensive sustainable integrated catchment wide management plan to address soil loss and to plan for changes in the climate is needed.

The Council needs to only focus on it's core work and stop wasting funds on non-essential activities. For example we do not need a department to promote Auckland as a destination. The CRL only services a very small number of Aucklanders ("up to 50,000 people per hour in the peak"= about 250,000 maximum twice a day whereas the population of Auckland is about 1.5M. so it doesn't service most of Auckland. Also with working from home now the norm I suspect these promoted benefits will be much less. So let's finish this project as cheaply as possible without any frills as it was ill conceived in my view.

I do not support the sale of longer term assets built up over generations, such as ownership in the airport and port. I support the sale of land that is truly surplus to requirements but this must not include paper roads which may someday be used as access/cycleways or access to Mana Whenua land.

The expenditure on urban roading needs to reduce and more funds spent on, for example gravel roads to minimise climate change costs (as there are multiple climate change benefits of improving gravel roads).

Separating food waste has never made climate change sense (refer to Waste Management presentation to the committee studying this topic where they can clearly show it produces more greenhouse gases than current setup). Unfortunately Council seem to have their head in the sand on this topic as whilst landfills produce methane (as do the anaerobic in-bin food waste digesters) there is a very strong incentive to capture all of this gas. In working on landfills on and off for over 30 years we have struggled to find any methane emissions even using very sensitive instrumentation. The landfill gas is reused for power generation. So this is a case of misdirection by Council which is concerning particularly as the overall carbon footprint of the waste collection system is so large. I also note that most of the reserves in Auckland are old landfill sites so providing long term open spaces for the enjoyment of locals.

The next question 4B is very badly worded and there is no scope for individual properties to opt out of one or more of the services. For example people already process oor compost all the green and kitchen wastes.

There is no discussion on the use of insinkaerators which are widely installed in apartments but add about 20% to the biological load of the wastewater treatment systems. Again a wider more strategic view needs to be thought through thorouhly.

We know in rural Rodney that our targeted transport rate has not gone to maintain rural roads including an enhanced sealing programme and what public transport there is, obviously does not serve the needs of rural dwellers. Why would I think this targeted rate would be any different. For example Council has just enabled the removal of perfectly good full grown trees from the slopes of Mt Albert without giving any new trees an opportunity to establish themselves under the protective canopy. The senseless destruction of one urban forest does not bode well for this funding to include the establishment of urban forests.

I would like to know how a climate targeted rate would enhance the environment for those of us who live in the mainly rural northern Rodney area. Can we opt out? Could it be a standard lesser rate for rural properties with no access to public transport?

For example, on my property, three quarters of it is in covenanted native bush so I consider I am playing my part in reducing emissions. and I get no rates remission for the fact that most of my land is not available for other use. If I lived in an urban area south of the Puhoi tunnels I would possibly support a rates based system just for ease of management of all four waste collections, that is recycling, general rubbish, food waste and an inorganic collection. But I'm not sure how a rates based scheme would encourage people to minimise their waste, and contribute to the Council's Waste Minimisation Plan. Even though there are choices of bin size, the bins will still be filled up and put out every week because they are already paid for.

However, I currently live in north Rodney and Auckland Council apparently does not provide a waste collection service to our area according to the information I have just read. However my Auckland Council rates show a Waste Management Base Service rate of \$142.70. I assume that covers the supply and kerbside collection of my yellow lid recycling bin each fortnight and access to one inorganic collection each year. On top of this I pay \$3.50 at the grocery store for each orange rubbish bag which is collected by Northland Waste from the end of the road. This extra cost for bags does make me think about the number of bags I put out, thus minimising my rubbish which goes directly to landfill. Most of my food waste goes to my worm bin or my compost bin but there is always some like bones and fatty meat trimmings that currently have to go into my general rubbish bag.

I have not seen the list of suitable items that go into the trial food collection bins but would doubt that the aforementioned items would be suitable. And it is obviously not practical to collect food waste from rural properties as most of us deal with it anyway.

Part of the information document discusses Council's Waste Minimisation policy but there is no specific space to comment on this. So here are my thoughts.

As part of their Waste Minimisation Plan 2018, Council set a target of Zero Waste by 2040 which is very aspirational but currently Auckland is not making good enough progress towards achieving this target.

There has been some improvement in reducing household waste to landfill but why commercial waste tonnage has increased in the past few years? Landfill levies need to be much higher so Councils can support Community Recycling Centres enabling them to be free to drop off or very inexpensive to encourage people to recycle items that don't fit in their bins. Also what they accept is limited and inconsistent, even within the Auckland area. (nationwide there are bigger gaps)

There needs to be much wider education about what households can put in their kerbside recycling bins or it all ends up in landfill anyway. eg clean plastic containers before putting them in the bin.

Tell us why: I am giving this feedback in my role as Secretary, on behalf of Fight the Tip: Tiaki te Whenua Incorporated, a community group currently opposing the proposed landfill in Wayby Valley. This large landfill requires the reclamation of approximately 14km of streams and hectares of wetlands. It will contaminate waterways such as the Hoteo River and the Kaipara Harbour which have important cultural and recreational values, let alone their importance as food sources. The landfill also presents a long-term risk to our environment – when it fails. This is only a brief summary of our concerns.

Fight the Tip: Tiaki te Whenua Incorporated along with many other parties have appealed the Wayby Valley decision to the Environment Court. Other parties include:

- Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Whātua
- Royal Forest and Bird Protection Society Of New Zealand
- Director-General Of Conservation
- Manuhiri Kaitiaki Charitable Trust
- Trustees of Ngā Maunga Whakahii o Kaipara Development Trust

- Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei & Environs Holdings Limited

This consent application highlights that Auckland Council is not making sufficient progress towards achieving their target of Zero Waste by 2040 as set out in their Waste Management and Minimisation Plan 2018. The lack of progress in this regard also has implications for environmental and climate action initiatives.

Auckland Council needs to be honest with its communities; either put in place sufficient and effective measures to achieve Zero Waste by 2040 – or tell your ratepayers and voters that you are not willing to do so.

Auckland's Waste Management and Minimisation Plan also highlights the shared aspirations of mana whenua and mataawaka, their unique roles and responsibilities that they play and seeks to ensure the teachings of Te Ao Māori underpin and inform waste management decisions. While we cannot directly speak to the importance of Te Ao Maori, it is clear that achieving the 2040 zero waste goal also has significant cultural importance; a point highlighted by the common voice of the appeals by iwi authorities.

If you do not act now, Auckland will have no hope of even coming close to achieving zero waste by 2040. Auckland Council's failure to achieve these goals will contribute to climate change and lead companies like Waste Management to believe that they can and should make a profit from reclaiming kilometres of streams and hectares of wetlands — because 'it is needed'. It should not be needed — at least not to the point where an entirely new landfill is needed.

The Minimisation Plan sets out three options, actions and steps that are needed to achieve the desired outcome by 2040.

Option 1 is focussed on household and kerbside resource recovery.

Option 2 has an increased focus on priority waste streams which are mostly from commercial enterprises.

Option 3 considers investment in residual waste technologies which reduce waste to landfill by treating residual waste in other ways.

Currently there has been some progress within option one with the establishment and support of community Recycling Centres and moves towards standardising kerbside collection of household waste and recycling. Option 1 is the easiest entry into encouraging waste minimisation and Council rightly is concentrating on this now.

This year the option to move to a full rates based system with choices of different bin sizes and corresponding differences in charges may help households consider what they put in their rubbish bins but I am not sure it will. The alternative of Pay As You Throw (PAYT) bins and bags for kerbside collection seems to have been discounted, yet it appears that residents currently on this system put out less waste that those already on a rates based system.

If Council is serious about reducing waste which currently goes to landfill the other two options need to be progressed alongside Option 1 initiatives and actions.

Under option 2 Council should continue to lobby Central Government for considerable increases to the Waste Levy and demands for product stewardship from manufacturers, importers and some retailers. Funds received from the Waste Levy could be used to support community Recycling Centres so they are free or less expensive for residents to dispose of items they no longer need. It could also support more community education on how to use kerbside recycling bins effectively to stop whole contaminated loads ending up in landfill.

Under option 3 we are disappointed that investment in alternative residual waste technologies seems to have been discounted as requiring more capital investment than would fit Council's budget. We know there are alternative options and believe that Council in partnership with Central Government should at least be open to investigating these and using some of the anticipated \$1 Billion for the climate package (including local and central government funding).

Clearly a lot more work is needed.

We would also support a nationwide, consistent waste strategy which would enable some of these important decisions to made knowing that funding sources were available; however the lack of stronger national tools must not be used as an excuse for Auckland to fail to meet its zero waste 2040 commitment.

Thank you for this opportunity to submit on the proposed 2022/2023 budget.

Kumeu Arts Centre (now operating under the name Kumeu Arts) is a non-profit, charitable, Incorporated Society with objectives of encouraging and supporting all arts in our area as well as artists and craftspeople: it's a key civic amenity for local cultural life and a thriving community organisation with classes, groups, workshops, exhibitions and events. Every year we have over 12, 000 visitors through our doors and on average 7000 - 8000 participants of all ages in our programmes.

Kumeu Arts is a true community-led initiative. Presently, about 80% of annual funding comes from outside sources or is self-generated. Our submission is that Auckland Council should continue to support and fund arts generally and Kumeu Arts in particular. In fact, we would like Auckland Council to increase funding for Kumeu Arts and Helensville Art Centre providing asset based funding for Rodney's arts facilities equal to that other Wards in Auckland receive. Increases in opex and capex allocations need to recognise the particular, immediate housing growth in our area and the increased demand for our services. Many of our programmes and services contribute to the Council's own stated outcomes: we excel in delivering these and accounting for them to the Local Board and Council. In relation to community investment—we strongly agree that community facilities (such as but not limited to ours) should continue to receive support. Like many community programmes, Kumeu Arts is only able to operate because of our community lease with Auckland Council.

We support the development of new facilities that accommodate a range of uses in principle. When planning for new facilities it makes sense to co-locate cultural activities such as libraries and arts centres. 

Introduction


Matakana Trail Trust is seeking to deliver 120km of recreational trail from Puhoi to Mangawhai along the east coast of Auckland. The trail is planned in three stages. See map below.



While recreation is the focus of the trail network, Stage 1 falls within the urban growth zones of Auckland. Multiple master plans or spatial plans are currently in development by local and central government.

Patronage

High level analysis was completed to estimate the number of people that would be using Stage 1 of the trail, who would otherwise be using private vehicles.

Three types of users are expected to use the trail:

- Recreational users
- People commuting to work
- School kids

Recreational users by nature use the trail for leisure activities, therefore for the purpose of the emissions reduction calculation, the patronage analysis was focused on commuting to work and trips to schools.

Mode share is used as the main indicator for analysis. The cycle mode share in this context is influenced by the land use, demographic, transport infrastructure and the pace of population growth. The xisting mode share for both commuting and school strips are estimated at 0.5% based on the current data.

Two results are shown below. One is based on the existing travel pattern and mode share. This should be considered at the baseline, or the conservative indicator.

Over time as the intensification materialises and additional cycle facilities are constructed in the para-urban or urban area, the mode shift is expected to shift. This increase is shown in the table 2 below.

Note that increase mode share estimated here is less than three times the required cycle mode share to achieve the Auckland's regional emissions reduction target. Therefore, the forecasts here will likely increase as Auckland focus more investment on increasing cycle mode share.

Emissions Reduction

Emissions reductions can be made on the amount of carbon that could be removed from the transport network due to the mode shift from private vehicles to cycling due to the new trail. This was calculated based on the existing mode share values and the increased mode shift values.

A range of assumptions were made to underpin the calculations. The methodology is based on Climate Change Commission's current policy scenario and Ministry for the Environment data. More information can be found in Appendix B.

Introduction

The purpose of this report is to present the analysis of numbers of people using Stage 1 of the Matakana Trail who would otherwise be using private vehicles. This patronage analysis is undertaken to support emission reduction calculations.



Figure 1: Stage 1 of the Matakana Trail

People using the Stage 1 of the Matakana Trail

Three types of users are expected to use the trail:

- Recreational users
- People commuting to work
- School kids

Emission reduction can be expected from those people using the trail who would have otherwise used a private vehicle either as a driver or passenger to get to their destination. Although some recreational users may be converted from car trips, it is primarily commuters and school kids rather than recreational cyclists that are expected to be converted from private vehicles. Therefore, the following analysis focusses on the trips made by commuters and school trips.



Expected growth

Projections of population growth in the Warkworth - Matakana - Snells Beach area from 2016 to 2048. show:

- Doubling of the number of children in Warkworth
- Two and a half times more workers in Warkworth

Over the same period the population of school children and workers in Snells Beach and Matakana areas is expected to be flat or even reduce, with growth of population being driven by growth of non-workers and retirees.

Commuter trips

Based on current population in the area surrounding the Matakana Trail and the existing commute mode share by bicycle, commuter trips are expected to be approximately 36 per day¹ for stage 1 of the Matakana trail but this would be expected to more than double by 2048 to 90 cycle trips per day.

However, cycling mode share could be expected to further increase with the provision of a good cycling facility above the existing mode share. With such a low existing bicycle mode share there is a large opportunity to increase cycling mode share. A doubling of the cycling mode share from 0.5% to 1% in the area would see the projected demands also double.

School trips

The following schools are within Matakana, Warkworth, and Snells Beach²:

- Warkworth Primary School 550 students
- Mahurangi College 1300
- Matakana Primary School 300 students
- Snells Beach School 200 students
- Horizon School 100
- TOTAL Students = 2,450

There are also several kindergartens, day cares, and extracurricular activity centres such as pony clubs that could use the trail. Trips to these destinations have been excluded from the analysis, so the analysis is considered conservative.

Based on school roll within catchment distance of the Matakana Trail, 22 cycle trips are expected to use the trail per day³. This represents less than 0.5% of the student population cycling on the trail; however, 10% of the student population live within the cycle trail catchment area (ie 250 students).

A less conservative assumption would be 2.5% of the 2,450 students choosing to use the trail⁴. The number of people using the trail to access schools would be 60 people, this would be a quarter of the students within the cycle catchment of the Matakana Trail. Student roll is expected to double by 2048, so 120 students would be using the trail by 2048. With each student riding to and from school, this would be 120 trips per day in 2021 and 240 per day by 2048.

Executive Summary

The purpose of this memo is to quantify the reduction in carbon emissions from the implementation of Stage 1 of the Matakana Trail. Emissions reductions are achieved from people who would have initially been travelling via private vehicle but have since been converted to cycling on the trail.

Methodology

In both Table 1 & Table 2 an estimate has been made on the amount of carbon that will be removed from the network due to the mode shift from private vehicles to cycling. These values are calculated using the following methodology and assumptions (see Table 3):

- 1. Calculate annual Vehicle Kilometres Travelled (VKT) by assuming converted commuter private vehicles travelled on average 11km and school trips by private vehicles travelled 4km. Assume 250 working days and 200 school days in a year.
- 2. Using the Climate Change Commission's current policy scenario determine proportion of Light Passenger Vehicle of each fuel type (Petrol, Diesel and EV) for the year 2021 and 2035.




Figure 1: CCC's current policy scenario fuel type distribution

 - Note the year 2035 is used instead of 2048 as it is expected the removal of private vehicle trips is distributed between 2021 and 2048 and thus the fuel type distribution of the mid-point is used. The projected fuel type distribution over time for the current policy scenario is shown in Figure 1.
- 3. Calculate the VKT for each fuel type and multiply by the Ministry for the Environment (MfE) travel emission factors to calculate carbon emissions due to travel in a private petrol diesel or EV vehicle. Sum values for total equivalent carbon removed.

I want to firstly thank you for introducing the new bus network through Coatesville as this has opened up the option for getting to and from town on Public Transport.

With the local monthly markets, black cottage café, connecting bus networks and day care we are seeing positive growth in the community. As a flow on effect we are seeing a lot more pedestrian traffic in Coatesville more specifically on Sunnyside Road; on any given day you can see children walking to and from school, parents walking prams to the Coatesville day care, horse riders going to the local pony club, cyclists and other pedestrians. In addition to this, Sunnyside Road has turned into a busy road with traffic from Dairy Flat connecting to the Coatesville Riverhead highway via Sunnyside Road. The issue that there is no footpath or shoulder on Sunnyside Road so it is dangerous for pedestrians. In winter months the grass on the side of the road is unstable to walk on and often gets muddy.

You have built a fantastic pathway along the Coatesville Riverhead Highway to the start of Sunnyside Road. It would be fantastic to extend this down Sunnyside Road so residents and people within the community can safely walk to and from Coatesville township. With the markets each month we also see a lot of car's parking on Sunnyside road and walking down to the markets from there.

Tell us why: WALG has no major disagreement with broad objectives but there needs to be greater attention to North East Rodney's needs having been identified as a rapid future development zone by Auckland Council.

a. PUBLIC TRANSPORT - Get public transport closer to where people study and work so ADD shops, health and sport facilities.

Submission - Warkworth needs more frequent services to Silverdale for NX connections and local services such as a frequent (15 minute) free feeder service between new high density housing and schools, health facilities, shops and workplaces and the Transport Hub being currently constructed. Parking is already at a premium within Warkworth and we do not want 20,000 future residents to be 2 car families with associated onroad parking.

b. More low emission buses.

Submission - The stated number of 79 low emission buses is not enough - this needs to be every year until all buses are carbon free.

c. ACTIVE NETWORK.

Submission - The proposed Climate Action Targeted Rate Budget allows for a mere 35 km of walking improvements and some additions to the urban cycling network. The cycling and pedestrian networks fully

integrated with public transport capacity increases need to be extended far beyond what is proposed if the Council is serious about achieving climate change objectives.

The proposed 3 stage cycle and pedestrian trail through Rodney being promoted by the Matakana Coast Trail Trust from Puhoi to Mangawhai, eventually linking existing and proposed trails in Northland and East Coast Bays, has the potential to provide a stunning public and tourism amenity meeting all the following objectives:-

- c.i Safety there is practically no off road pedestrian and cycle trails in North East Rodney. Rodney roads are generally minimum width for vehicles only so rarely have provision for pedestrians and cyclists.
- c.ii Reduction in use of private vehicles there is wide community support for the development of a network which provides active commuter linkages between Matakana, Warkworth and Snells Beach/Algies Bay (Stage 1 of Matakana Coast Trail Trust).
- c.iii Reduction in congestion Hill Street is one of the worst congestion points in the Auckland roading network. Congestion occurs at a number of times through the week with commuter traffic peaks and schools' traffic being two of the main offenders, along with summer weekends. The proposed cycle network will contribute significantly to the reduction of this congestion as well as improving safety during start and finish of the school day. Growth of exponential with zero provision for access to schools and CBD. Matakana and Sandspit Roads are totally unsuitable and unsafe for pedestrians and cyclists due to the minimum width of the sealed
- c.iv Health more safe walking and cycling routes will contribute to improved fitness and wellbeing of the community.
- c.v Recreation facilities economic benefits of further walking/cycling routes to the region is estimated at 390,000 users annually with \$24m economic benefit from international visitors and \$60m economic benefit from local visitors.

Council is already seriously failing to live up to its Climate Change Commitments with the consents it issues.

An example is the consent for the Wayby Landfill north of Warkworth. Despite several submissions to the contrary neither the planners nor planning commissioners recognised the implications on Climate Change. Choosing a site 50km north from the existing Redvale landfill with 400 -600 truck and trailer unit movements each day, each way. This represents 20,000 tonnes of carbon per year of additional emissions from fuel alone. The alternative of rail transport via a short spur line would reduce that 20,000 tonnes of Carbon to 750 tonnes per year.

d. URBAN NGAHERE (FOREST) -

- d.i WALG fully supports the planting of more trees in areas with low tree cover. These plantings must be appropriate to their position so far as growth space available, soil variety, water availability, surrounding environment and needs of public use of the area being planted.

North East Rodney is largely rural and has many beach side areas with many part-time residents. The need to place and retrieve wheely bins simply does not work in these circumstances. The bins would need to be left out for extended periods which is not desirable.

The small percentage who find wheely bins convenient pay annually for a private collection service.

Any change considered by Council needs to take into account the business impact on the private collection companies who are also very generous supporters of their community.

WALG fully supports the continued recycling service already included in base rates charge.
