Tell us why: Rates should not increase again for at least 3 years, and the Council should learn to live within its current budget. Auckland Council should call in independent auditors or the Auditor general to look at its budget and operating expenses and cut non-essential spending out of the budget. The focus should be on essential or core services not social services – the latter is the responsibility of central Government.

Increasing rates every year is a not a sustainable proposition for ratepayers and nor is it remotely fair or appropriate in the current environment.

After three years of no rates increases, Auckland Council rates should not be able to increase more than the historical average on the CPI over the previous 5 years. It shall not be a matter of course that rates increase in future, and the opinion of key ratepayer organisations such as the Auckland Ratepayer's Alliance and the Employer's and Manufacturers Association must be consulted directly.

I have been a ratepayer in Auckland for around 30 years and I am tired of having my requests ignored. Instead we have faced multiple rates increases irrespective of the ability of each ratepayer to pay. Auckland Council now has a large employee workforce at the expense of ratepayers. Auckland Council should consider options to apply rates to people who do not own their own homes, and not just home owners – these residents use the public services just as much if not more than the ratepayers. This would add additional revenue for the Council and spread the ratepayer burden.

Auckland Council should not spend anymore than it is now on public transport (over 30% of total rates) – and the public must continue to pay for fares on trains, buses and ferries. Public transport cannot be free as this would place an intolerable burden on already over burdened ratepayers.

Auckland Council ought to have a ceiling on future employment for three years. An external independent review of Auckland Council's employment structures and staffing must occur from 2022 onwards, with emphasis on essential services vis a vis non essential administration and management.

In summary, I would ask that the Council behave in a fiscally prudent manner rather than using ratepayer funds and asking ratepayers' for even more money.

General Comment: This budget document feels more like let's spend and see if it works rather than using data of what is actually happening around the city to inform whether the approach is working and other forms needs to be considered. Are more people taking business, cycling etc. Has congestion worsened and if so where. To open the document, there should commentary of prior year performance versus plan including which aspects have contributed to the \$900 million revenue short fall? Has Auckland Council lived within their budget and actual vs prior year numbers. If the answer is no then why is the council presenting a budget that they never meet?

Loss of \$900 million in forecast revenue, Q. Where has the revenue shortfall coming from?

There is nothing included in the document about how much is spent annually on Staffing. Contracting costs and FTE vs other costs.. What is happening here and the trends. What efficiencies have been achieved in 2021 to assure tax payers of fiscal prudence.

On top of the increases, the budget includes extra government funding of \$471 million from Government subsidies and other sources to help us meet our climate commitments plus \$127 million of "better off" funding from 1 July 2022 as part of central government's Three Waters Reform Programme. Q. These amounts are incremental income and should be included below the annual budget line to ensure there is not subsidising other spends and should be reflected as such. Where is this being spent? Cynically, this about, coming from he government seems to be funded by the separate 7% increase in Watercare.

Cycling and walking will benefit from a \$228 million investment in new infrastructure and improvements or extensions to existing routes, - Where is this being spent?

There is no breakdown on where in Auckland the money is being spent. There should be a distribution across South, City, North Shore etc. I do not feel North Shore is getting value for money or their fair share of the rates revenue.

Now you want people like us to pay for more than what normally need. Why do we need to reduce the waste at all? We will fill up all the bins as we can because that's what you make us pay for.

Your rate-based collection completely ignore the people who produce less waste, and will make people to product more waste.

As for food scrap collection, this shouldn't be included to the rate as well for the same reason above. People should reduce the food waste as well, so cannot use one rate to fit all. The only reason to get these setup is just because you want to increase the council rate to fund your unnecessary spending, including the pay raise to those directors.

Garbage collection fee should based on the amount of the waste you produce. Shouldn't use higher rate or include into council rate. People won't save. They never save until they see how much they have to pay for it.

I am writing in support of COMET Auckland's annual budget review submission to Council for its request for increased funding, and for its funding in future to be inflation-adjusted. With no inflation adjustment since 2014, COMET Auckland's funding from Auckland Council is now worth significantly less than when it was last adjusted in 2015 and this is at a time when the trust is meeting rising employment and project costs for its existing and proposed programmes.

Founded in 1999 COMET Auckland has a proud and effective record of initiating education programmes designed to add to and enhance the delivery of education outcomes for Auckland City's residents. Such programmes have been designed to support educators, employers and community in Auckland to collaborate around common goals to enrich the delivery of education and learning outcomes for all residents of the city.

As a trustee of COMET from 2002 to 2011, and Chairman of the Trust from 2007 to 2009, I became well aware of the valuable education work that COMET achieved, through the skilled work of its chief executive and through the voluntary work of knowledgeable and motivated trustees. The programmes initiated to benefit the youth of Auckland have been successful and significant.

My submission on the Annual Budget 2022/2023 is limited to the budget for the Tupuna Maunga Authority as outlined by Council under 'Other Matters' on pages 142-148 of its 'Supporting Information for Consultation Document'.


I have become aware through the media of a High Court judicial review: Normans v Tūpuna Maunga Authority and Auckland Council. This revealed that over 2,500 healthy trees are proposed for mass-felling across maungas of Auckland that are administered by the TMA under the Reserves Act for the benefit of mana whenua and all Aucklanders. One of the worst examples is the Mangere/Otahuhu Local Board area with the lowest tree coverage in Auckland, where over 440 large healthy trees are apparently set for mass felling on Mt Otahuhu/Richmond (see photo above), simply because they aren't native!

It is not apparent from the TMA's Operational Plan (or the 2016 Integrated Management Plan on which the operational plan is based) that this mass felling is even happening, or that more felling is planned. Neither is the mass-felling or its funding disclosed in Council's consultation document, or the supporting information, nor in the TMA's summary operational plan, or in its full operational plan, or in any of the contextual documents to which the TMA refers.

The current climate change emergency requires Council to stop aiding and abetting this eco-vandalism. The inappropriateness of unnecessarily felling over 2,500 healthy trees in a climate emergency far outweighs the perceived 'inappropriateness' of healthy exotic trees, and Council should stop funding any TMA activity involving its proposed mass-felling of trees.

Auckland Council has been courageous and farsighted over the last decade in supporting an education CCO, Te Hononga Akoranga COMET Auckland. The education sector is highly fragmented and siloed, particularly in Auckland with so many children and families challenged through inequities. COMET has been an important and effective advocate for education initiatives that add value to Auckland such as; science education, early oral language, financial and digital literacy, family learning and intergenerational literacy and incorporating the voices of rangatahi and tamariki into education planning.

We understand the challenges the city faces in balancing the budget post-COVID. It is tempting to cut back to basics. However, innovation and sector coordination in and across education sectors in Tamaki Makaurau is more important than ever post-Covid, so we are advocating for both continuation of COMET funding and a cost of living increase. Effective advocacy and sector coordination is vital as our city faces lower literacy levels, poor school attendance, reduced NCEA completion, issues such as young people's mental health and the myriad of issues that result from poor housing and health outcomes. COMET's future work programme of Maori and Pasifika education advocacy is more important than ever.

COMET has been highly effective in leveraging additional investment from Council's CCO contribution, as it raises a proportion of project funding from external sources. However COMET has not had a funding increase since 2014. The lack of an increase together with inflationary pressure means Council funding has been effectively reduced by \$81,000 over the past 6 years. Funding is going backwards at a time when advocacy for Auckland's education issues is going to be more important than ever. COMET's new initiatives focused on Maori and Pasifika education success are more necessary than ever because the pandemic has hit Maori and Pasifika communities more heavily than others.

We support COMET Auckland's request for increased funding and for inflation-adjusted funding going forward. This will ensure more tamariki and rangatahi will reach their potential and thus contribute to the success of their whanau and of Tamaki Makaurau.

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What do you think of this proposal?

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What do you think about our proposal to move from a planned region-wide PAYT system to a region-wide ratesfunded rubbish collection system?

Tell us why: I forgot to add that I think apartments should be exempt from waste, recycling and food scrap charges as private services work better in this situation. Expecting someone to clean out food scraps bins before others put food in them is unrealistic when you have 100 apartments using the bins. Council needs to take the bins and replace them with clean bins if it wants to compete with private waste services. Finding a resident willing to deal with maggoty bins is a tall order too.

Every time we've raised this with council, we've been told that North Shore residents have to pay due to legacy rules. It's been over a decade since amalgamation so that's not a great response.

There was no option to say what kind of standardisation residents would prefer in the consultation questions so it would have been good to be able to specify our preference.

Submission to: Tūpuna Maunga (TMA) Authority's Draft Operational Plan (DOP) and 2022-23 Budget

I would expect the Council to vote on the DOP Budget bearing in mind any objections and concerns voiced in the majority of submissions and in light of its declared climate emergency.

Points made refer to all Maunga - even if only Ōwairaka is given as an example.

1. OPPOSE FUNDING BLANKET FELLING OF EXOTIC TREES IN A CLIMATE CRISIS

I oppose the intent to fell all exotic trees (2500) on Ōwairaka (and other Maunga) very vaguely referred to in the DOP as it goes against its following value statements (pg 10), and for the reasons given below that these mature trees freely provide.

Spiritual Value 'tread gently'

Cultural & Heritage 'recognize European and other histories and interaction with the

Maunga'

Landscape 'Protect the integrity of the landscape of the Tūpuna Maunga

'Active restoration and enhancement of the natural features...'

Ecology & Biodiversity 'If the Maunga are well, Auckland is well'

'Protect and restore the biodiversity of the Tūpuna Maunga'

Living Connection 'Rekindle the sense of living connection between the Maunga and

the people'

'Actively nurture positive relationships'

Recreational 'Promote health and wellbeing'

- Improved air quality by removing pollutants, carbon dioxide and provide oxygen.
- Shade and cooled air for park users, fauna and flora
- A variety of food and habitat for the abundant birds and insects that rely on them. Exotics often providing abundant nectar as well as berries. This often fills gaps when native food for birds is unavailable or unable to support the large number of birds currently there (e.g. on Ōwairaka where kākā, wood pigeon etc. have come to rely on them).

- Aesthetic beauty
- Increased sense of physical and mental wellbeing for users.
- A nursery for flourishing natives which seed naturally under them E.g. Ōwairaka, Mt Roskill, Mt Eden. Rather than clear felling, using nursery trees is international best practice and any removal should take years once seedlings have grown to replace them ensuring their survival and the survival of the species grown dependent on the exotic trees.
- Shelter for trees and nests from severe winds on these exposed maunga which are becoming stronger and more frequent.
- Prevents soil from drying up and keeps the kikuyu at bay which smothers seedlings. In open areas kikuyu then needs mowing or spraying (which creates a fire hazard). Spraying allows herbicide to enter the underground waterways which link into historically significant areas to Maori such as and the drinkable spring water at Unitec. Grasses thrive under the exotic trees, which birds and insects eat.
- Reduction of runoff from increasingly heavy downpours which create erosion and flooding.
- Stabilisation of hillsides (for which many were planted in the first place) preventing the need to then put up warning signs to this effect after felling (e.g. Mt Wellington).
- Living examples of exotic trees from many heritages, (often with significant historical, religious and cultural importance), being a huge educational benefit e.g. olives, oak, magnolia, ash, morton bay figs and giant macrocarpa. The seeds of the olive grove on Ōwairaka were bought by WWII soldiers. Olive branches are currently plucked for religious practices. Many species of trees from their origin countries have succumbed to disease such as elms, or even fire as in some rare gums. Even the macrocarpas (Monterey cypress) is now endangered in Monterey.
- A large proportion of the total canopy on some maunga, e.g. 45% on Ōwairaka and up to 75% on others.
- This controversial intent of felling all exotic trees has created racial division in the public (with those wishing to question and give nature a voice are being shut down by being labelled racist), and a lack of trust in the co-governance model is being created by the lack of transparency and specificity preventing public input.
- Where the exotic trees were felled from the maunga e.g. Mt Richmond and Pigeon Mountain (which totaled over \$2.1M) many of the birds such ruru have not returned. Some people living nearby have been so affected that they also no longer return.
- An intrinsic part of the biodiversity and health and wairua of the Maunga and are an increasingly valuable asset.

2. OPPOSE THE USE OF NON-NOTIFIED RESOURCE CONSENTS ALREADY APPROVED AS THESE ARE POTENTIALLY UNLAWFUL

The recent Judicial Review Appeal found the TMA acted unlawfully in making their resource consent to fell 345 exotic trees on Ōwairaka/Mt Albert non-notifed. Auckland Council also acted unlawfully in approving this and not making this resource consent publicly notifiable.

Thus a precedent was made for non-notified consents still active on other maunga – potentially making them also unlawful.

As these non-notified consents are also potentially unlawful, they should therefore be cancelled and not actioned (e.g. for Mt Roskill and Mt Richmond) as they go against the Reserves Act. Also in no way will this removal of canopy have a less than minor impact on the ecology and aesthetic beauty, wairua etc. Obviously using chainsaws and helicopters will cause major disturbance to wildlife and those using or living near the Maunga. The original timing of Ōwairaka's to be actioned was November 2019 – springtime and the middle of nesting season. The vast majority of last year's submissions opposed the tree felling.

Unfortunately it is too late to contest those non-notified consents already actioned.

3. NEED TO CREATE MORE OPEN DISCUSSION AND ALLOW DEMOCRATIC FEEDBACK AND PROCESS TO OCCUR.

I also oppose the decisions around this controversial issue were made behind closed doors - even though assurances were made by the Mayor that this would not happen and the public would have proper submission processes in place.

4. NEED FOR GREATER TRANSPARENCY AND SPECIFICITY

4.1 LANDSCAPE: 'Network-wide programme to remove vegetation and reinstate and/or revegetate – actions and staging to be confirmed.'

I strongly oppose the misleading and hidden agenda and lack of any useful information regarding the felling of exotics across the Maunga as it prevents the public making informed submissions effectively shutting down democratic feedback. Detail should be provided on: Percentage of canopy, numbers, species and reasons given for removal.

'Vegetation management – remove weed species, manage health and safety risks and inappropriate exotics...'

Does this refer to replanting and exotic tree removal? If so why is this not mentioned as well as the numbers, the species and detail as to why removal is necessary and why exotic trees are 'inappropriate'. Clarity and detailed information is required in the TMA's DOP (and IMP) for proper public feedback as this is the purpose of the DOP!

The description used under Vegetation Management - 'Annual Vegetation Maintenance programme including control of cherry, privet', also in no way informs the public of intent and infers the cherrys on Ōwairaka are pest species which they are not (they are the old-fashioned Japanese type).

4.2 STORYTELLING: 'Network-wide programme to develop unique infrastructure that bring Mana Whenua stories and values to life on the maunga'

Lacks detail explaining what this is to enable public to informatively submit.

5. LACK OF ACCOUNTABILITY AND INAPPROPRIATE BUDGET INCREASES IN TIME OF FINANCIAL STRAIN AND CLIMATE CRISIS

- 5.1 STORYTELLING I submit that \$2.1M is excessive for 'Storytelling'
- **5.2 LANDSCAPE:** 'Network-wide programme to remove vegetation and reinstate and/or revegetate actions and staging to be confirmed.'

I submit that the needless and harmful destruction of mature exotic trees is an extreme waste (for Ōwairaka – close to \$1.2M), in a time of climate crisis and economic hardship – as is the money spent on 'replacing' them with small vegetation (and having to replace the replacements in the following years).

I suggest that any removal of exotic trees is done (if at all) once the native understory has grown to replace them – over many years. This would give the ecosystem a chance to recover gradually and for the trees to continue to nurse the self-seeded natives underneath them as canopy native trees are slow growing. These seedlings cost nothing and need no planting, weeding or spraying as they are in the shade. The vast majority of plantings have not survived due to lack of planting knowledge, weeding, watering and mulching, and are mainly only small shrubs, flaxes and grasses.

5.3 BUDGET INCREASES I oppose the DOP increasing budgets year on year. Rather the budget should be cut as per Council's cost cutting and certainly not exceed last year's Budget.

5.3 ABANDON FURTHER LEGAL APPEALS

The lost Judicial Appeal found the non-notified consent for Ōwairaka unlawful and cost nearly \$1M. Any further spending to appeal this finding should be abandoned as a gross waste of ratepayer's money.

- **5.4 LEGISLATIVE CHANGE** The Council should not approve expenditure leading to legislative changer relating to the recent judicial decision regarding Ōwairaka's trees
- **5.5** I oppose approving any budget for the UNESCO World Heritage bid on the Maunga as it is financially and practically not feasible.

6. LACK OF ACCOUNTABILITY AND DEMOCRACY

I oppose the lack of accountability for projects budgeted for but not actioned or poorly actioned such as:

- The playground on Mangere Mountain (around \$1M) not actioned.
- The failed native plantings that have had to be replanted year on year intended to 'cloak' the maunga.

The impression given that these plantings would 'cloak' the Maunga and actually survive was extremely misleading and would have been the main reason the Integrated Management Plan (IMP) was originally accepted by most. The areas planted are tiny when compared to the huge size of the park and is extremely doubtful they will ever come close to replacing the canopy lost or the natives regenerating under it. Together with the fact that major removal of canopy trees (45% on Ōwairaka) was never stated in the DOP or the IMP.

Auckland Council and its Councilors elected to the TMA committee has acted unlawfully in not questioning or ensuring openness and seeing that democracy is done regarding the unlawful non-notified consents approved. This needs to be corrected in future.

Mayor Phil Goff assured the public that they would have a chance to fully submit to the original IMP and that any final decision would be open to public. However the meetings and discussions regarding felling exotic trees were not open to the public (apart from submissions) and public were only presented with a final decision.

Therefore the Council needs to ensure the public are able to witness discussion around final decisions and reasons given for them as well as ensuring full disclosure to allow informed public submissions.

Council needs to hold the TMA accountable and encourage changes to the DOP Budget by not approving the Budget until it is fully transparent about its projects and financial needs and until steps are taken to ensure full reporting is done on the spending on the budget for the previous year. What happened to the budget for 'vegetation maintenance' (tree cutting) in last year's budget? What happens to any unspent budget approved for projects either not done or don

e under budget. Where is the reporting on this?



PLEASE READ BEFORE CONSIDERING MY SUBMISSION

Despite assurances last year by the Mayor and Phil Wilson that our submissions, sent in good faith by genuine ratepayers – would be dealt with openly, and changes made to the DOP if required - the whole process of dealing with public submissions was totally unacceptable:

- involving secretive feedback meetings with no decisions or minutes taken (app 1) (appendix)
- No mention of the submissions AT ALL at TMA public hui
- No changes to the Draft Operational Plan in relation to the 'single phase removal' despite overwhelming opposition.
- Draft Operational Plan woolly and confusing with no mention of maunga wide tree felling process.
- Numerous Council members expressed concern with the lack of specificity in the TMA DOP (apps 5-7)

The quotes below show both failed promises (By Phil Wilson and Phil Goff) and concern about TMA/ Council processes (Cr Fletcher and Cr Walker)

Phil Wilson Head of Governance Auckland Council (app 1)

'I remind that the meetings where any decisions are made on a final Operational Plan will be open and in public.'

Mayor Phil Goff (app2)

...'this year there's obviously an issue that's controversial in some sections of the public and it's important that the public knows that they have the opportunity to have proper input – to express their views on the operational plan. And that involves as I understand ita formal process by the Maunga Authority to ask for submissions to hold formal hearings and having done that to bring that feedback back to the Governing Body where will be there be a joint Governing Body meeting where we go through that feedback and we can have discussions on what that feedback says and whether that requires any change in the Operational Plan but I think it's important that everybody understands that this process is there, is in place and will be followed.'

(Extraordinary Meeting of the Govt Body Feb 12 2020)

Cr Christine Fletcher (app7)

'I want more detailed information on the Operational Plan to be included in this consultation in order for it to have integrity and in order for it to satisfy what I believe is genuine consultation'

Cr Wayne Walker

'What I see is something that's much more than just occasional maintenance —it's the removal of significant amount of stock of trees that have established over many years and will be very difficult to replace and they've very visible and some of them arguably are quite special to certainly people in the vicinity and others and my concern as far the Council is concerned it's our operational budget that's funding that and we may have some limitations but it would be useful to have more visibility over what is occurring.'

I have attended numerous Tupuna Maunga Authority hui and have yet to hear ONE mention of the submissions or decisions contingent on them, despite overwhelming public concern over the tree felling across the maunga and no changes were made to the Draft Operational Plan.

For realistic 'Co-governance' to work, Auckland councillors and TMA members need to be able to have freedom (a responsibility actually) to comment, criticize and even withhold voting on TMA Operational Plans if they are not specific, transparent or fiscally responsible. At present the lack of specificity on both information and spending on large projects makes it impossible for councillors or the public to know what they are agreeing to.

The Appeal Court decision found that neither the TMA nor Auckland Council fulfilled their legal obligations under the Reserves Act and Resource Management Act. The consequence is ratepayer's money spent on Council and the TMA fighting to defend themselves. There has been concern from numerous councillors about how the DOP is presented to the public, the lack of specificity – to date they have had no effect. THIS NEEDS TO CHANGE. If concerns by councillors such as Cr Fletcher had been heeded - expensive court cases could have been avoided.

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Tēnā koutou

Introduction

Tupuna Maunga Authority (TMA) is a ratepayer funded co–governance model, so the Authority must be open to feedback and be prepared to make changes if necessary to reflect valid public input. (*This has not been done in previous years as confirmed by the Appeals Court*)

The fact that Auckland Council has declared a 'Climate Emergency' means this is a time to only spend what is necessary such as maintenance, educational projects and walkways – not the divisive, expensive and totally unnecessary felling of thousands of trees across these reserves.

The Authority also needs to be far more transparent about where the ratepayers spend is going – especially on large scale capital projects – proving cost effectiveness, timely completion and a proper oversight process so the public knows the costs and when the projects were finished.

The Chairman of the TMA often quotes the support of big groups like the Tree Council and Forest and Bird. Yet while they may have voted in favour of the original and attractive Integrated Management Plan – no one had any knowledge of the major tree felling known as 'single phase removal'. It is not hard to see why they agreed – with statements such as '..... we're going to have the re-emergence of indigenous forest species in terms of puriri forest; the return of important taonga species. The vision and hopefully more than that – in terms of the reality - the bringing back of kiwi to Maungakiekie.' (App 8) But how accurate and achievable are these statements given the reality of the 'plantings' to date on the maunga.?

All my email and LGOIMA requests to TMA for information on the single phase removal have come back devoid of any references to that plan - as the Appeal Court found —there never had been any information anywhere about this expensive plan until local residents found notices in their letter boxes informing them of felling on their local maunga. Despite the chairman of the TMA stating '......this is part of the vision of the Tupuna Maunga Authority clearly signaled in the Integrated Management Plan and The Strategies. Those are the subject of public submissions. The submissions made it clear that the public were quite aware of what was proposed in terms of the of overall vegetation restoration programe' (App 8) This is totally in contrast to what the Appeal Court decided in March 2022 as shown below:

- That the consultation process to date of the TMA and Auckland Council has been unlawful, and did not explain, show or itemize the 'single phase removal' process, or engage in adequate consultation which would have allowed better transparency.
- That the awarding of a 'non -notified' resource consent by Council to the TMA by was unlawful and therefore did NOT give the public due process input to a plan it had no knowledge of.

As the Court of Appeals ruling explained:

[212] 'In summary, the proposed removal of all exotic trees on \bar{O} wairaka, and revegetation with indigenous fauna, was a proposal of such significance that it needed to be provided for in the IMP. That would ensure appropriate, informed, public consultation about the proposal. The proposal to remove the trees was not made plain in the initial IMP, and no individual management plan for \bar{O} wairaka setting out the proposal had yet been prepared. As a result, the public consultation that took place did not properly inform the public about what was intended'

1) 'Single phase' tree removal projects need to cease immediately And funds used for general maintenance or returned to ratepayers.

The recent unanimous appeal Court decision as quashed the felling process on Ōwairaka. The 'single phase removal process' was never put out for any kind of consultation as there was simply no mention of it anywhere. A LGOIMA I sent in to TMA and Auckland Council asking for clarity on the genesis of this expensive plan and how it was made public came back with confusing information referring me to places where no information was found (App 3) the Appeal Court ruling agreed and said that the plan was not public and therefore no true consultation had been possible.

The single phase removal process was both prohibitively expensive and environmentally unsustainable and ratepayers must not have to bear this unjustifiable waste of their funds. The table below (acquired by LGOIMA) shows that over \$2 million has already been spent on the first three maunga, with a further projected budget of well over \$1 million for Ōwairaka, whilst other consents are active for further maunga (see next point)

Ōhuiarangi/ Pigeon Mountain	\$462,018.03
Maungarei / Mt Wellington	\$876,260.00
Te Pane O Mataaho/ Mangere Mountain	\$763,751.03
Ōwairaka / Te Ahi Kaa O Rakataura / Mt Albert (projected)	\$1,176,978.64

In light of the Appeal Court decision – the logical legal argument would be that all past and extant resource consents were/are technically unlawful, owing to no transparency, lack of consultation a non-notified resource consent. (The same arguments as found by the Appeals Court for Ōwairaka)

All active resource consents for other maunga such as Mt Roskill and Mt Richmond should be withdrawn by Auckland Council or cancelled immediately. No more resource consents for single phase removal on any of Auckland's maunga should be considered.

2) The TMA must cease spending any more rates on pursuing further court action following the 2022 Appeal Court ruling

The recent Appeal Court ruling found that both TMA and Auckland Council had acted unlawfully in their processes aimed at removing the exotic trees on Ōwairaka/ Mt Albert. The High Court and Supreme Court actions have cost ratepayers dearly – not to mention the private costs taken by ratepayers to bring the original judicial review and the Appeal. None of this ever needed to happen if the Reserves Act law had simply been followed.

Towards the end of 2021, legal fees for the Ōwairaka judicial review had cost the following:

Tūpuna Maunga Authority's defense: over \$706,000

Auckland Council's defense: over \$292,000

A total now of probably well over \$1 million of ratepayer's money

Following the recent Appeal Court judicial decision which found in favour of the applicants, Paul Majurey has publicly announced he is considering an appeal. He has also mentioned that he might seek to change the Reserves Act. Ratepayers should not be expected to fund any more court action or attempts at changing Governmental statute.

TMA and Auckland Council must not spend any more ratepayer's money on pursuing further appeals or court action or attempts to change Governmental statute regarding the felling of healthy trees on any of the maunga

3) Oversight and accountability for capital expenditure projects needed

Ratepayers are entitled to know how much is allocated for big spend projects; when they are finished; and total cost.

Auckland Council is responsible for both carrying out and funding all the work on the maunga – but who oversees these projects and ensures that:

- The ratepayers are getting good value for their money (do contractors have to bid for work?)
- That the projects are finished within their temporal and budgetary timeframes

For example

- I believe \$1 million dollars was allotted for a children's playground at Mangere Mountain
- A children's popular BMX track was bulldozed at Pigeon Mountain and was to be replaced with terraced gardens.
- Failed plantings on Maungarei, Pigeon Mountain, Mangere Mountain & Ōwairaka how much money was wasted on poor experimental methods?
- Maungawhau walkway very nice but ratepayers should know what it cost.

I suggest that a joint Council/ TMA body (or an independent oversight group) is established to monitor all major Capex projects and the progress, completion and final cost should be easily available to the public.

4) Explanation for nearly 300% increase in capital expenditure

- <u>298% increase in Capital expenditure</u> This chart from the Draft Operational Plan shows some astounding figures. It appears the budget has gone from *\$1,750,00 in 21/22 to \$5,220,000 for 22/23; an increase of 298%. G*iven that owing to Covid, many large scale projects have no doubt been delayed. I can't see why money wasn't deferred to the upcoming financial year. I am most surprised that the Auckland Council did not query these figures.
- Lack of specificity where is the detail on what this money is to be spent on? One can only guess that the 'single phase removal' figure of \$1.7 million is hidden in the 'vegetation' section.
 But as the Appeal Court ruling said this is not acceptable and projects of this size obviously need to be itemized.

I suggest that every capital expenditure project of larger than \$50,000 is itemized with start and completion dates provided – and this should be easily available to the public.

5) Oversight and accountability for capital expenditure projects needed

Ratepayers are entitled to know how much is allocated for big spend projects; when they are finished; and total cost.

Auckland Council is responsible for both carrying out and funding all the work on the maunga – but who oversees these projects and ensures that:

- The ratepayers are getting good value for their money (do contractors have to bid for work?)
- That the projects are finished within their temporal and budgetary timeframes

For example

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- Maungawhau walkway very nice but ratepayers should know what it cost.

I suggest that a joint Council/TMA body (or an independent oversight group) is established to monitor all major Capex projects and the progress, completion and final cost should be easily available to the public.

6) TMA hui and public meetings must be safe for members of the public to question and offer suggestions and criticism about TMA plans

The Tupuna Maunga Authority frequently boasts of its robust submission and information programme, yet in reality things are not what they seem. In the situation below, members of the public were left traumatized and the Chairman failed to intercede when presenters were screamed at. An 'in house' investigation by the Auckland Chief Executive dismissed a code of conduct complaint absolving the perpetrator of any responsibility.

Case study: Mangere Mountain public meeting

In a public meeting regarding opposition to tree felling on Mangere mountain – a presenter was shouted at and accused of being 'disgusting'. There were two women and a teenage boy giving (already traumatized by seeing his favourite macrocarpa trees felled on Pigeon mountain) giving submissions. Although the Council investigation dismissed the complaint on a techincality- this event had profound emotional and psychological effects on those people, some of who were in tears after the attack and are still affected years later. (App 4)

- 1) It is the Chairman's job to keep meetings safe for the public. If the TMA Chairman is unable to do this in a fair and independent manner then an external chairman should be employed.
- 2) Where an issue of bullying like this is experienced it is simply unacceptable for the Auckland Council to just throw it out this reeks of a conflict of interest and certainly not <u>independent</u> oversight.

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7) New processes needed for how Council members provide input to the DOP and TMA need to take feedback on board

The Redress act says that Auckland Council must approve the TMA budget, **but that does NOT** mean that the former has to adopt it every year without requesting changes (which appears to be the status quo) For the 2021/22 Draft Operational Plan, Council members were well aware of both the single phase removal plans and the strong outcry from the community. Some Council members raised this issue at the Extraordinary Meeting of the Govt Body Feb 12 and expressed genuine concern about the extent of tree felling and lack of public consultation (there was none, as found by the Appeal Court)

Councillors were clear in questioning either Paul Majurey or Phil Wilson, yet their very valid questions were not able to create any changes to the DOP (Apps 5, 6,7)

It is very telling that the chairman of the Tupuna Maunga Authority cannot quote ONE change in the DOP over the many years he has held that office. One can only question if any changes of note have EVER been made as a result of public submissions.

I requested that **the joint feedback meeting of the TMA and Auckland Council** to consider submissions, was recorded or made public as a part of due process and transparency. I was told that no this was private meeting with no decisions made or minutes taken. (*App 1*) I notice that in contrast to the Feb 2020 Finance and Performance and Governing Body meetings where there were many questions (Cr Fletcher and Cr Walker) there was NOTHING in the meetings later in the year for the 2022/23 Operational Plan. This begs the question WHY? There was obviously comprehensive public knowledge and controversy over tree felling and a High Court case in progress – yet not even a mention of this in the meetings – was pressure put on councillors?

8) All TMA meetings/ hui should be recorded - as are council meetings - and decisions that have real public interest must be discussed openly at meetings not behind closed doors.

We have attended TMA meetings where we were informed that our submissions would be discussed in open forum. This was not true: nowhere in the meetings was there any mention of the submissions – the fact that they were overwhelmingly AGAINST any felling of healthy mature exotic trees and of any decisions by the TMA to change the DOP in response to the submissions. *Appendix point 1*

In conclusion, while the joint hui of the Auckland Council and Tūpuna Maunga Authority was a private and confidential workshop I remind that the meetings where any decisions are made on a final Operational Plan will be open and in public. (Email from Head of Governance Phil Wilson)

It appears to the public ALL DECISION MAKING PROCESSES pertaining to the DOP are discussed and decided BEHIND CLOSED DOORS - In direct contrast to the letter above – there was NO OPEN AND PUBLIC DECISION MAKING at any meetings – neither was the content or thrust of the submissions even mentioned. And if the Council cannot 'instruct' the TMA to change its plans based on public input, what is the point of these meetings? (App 6)

TMA hui and combined Council meetings discussing submissions need to be recorded and made available to the public. Having 'private and confidential' workshops with no decisions made and no minutes taken – is not democratic or transparent and could seek to avoid acting on the strong messages sent by ratepayers and to silence Councillors who challenge the Draft Operational Plage ther TMA activities.

The joint hui is held annually in accordance with s60(5) of Nga Mana Whenua o Tamaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. This section provides that the Authority and the Council must jointly consider submissions relation to the summary of the Operational Plan. Code of conduct complaint against Auckland councillor Josephine Bartley thrown out

Auckland Council chief executive Stephen Town has thrown out a code of conduct complaint against Maungakiekie-Tāmaki councillor Josephine Bartley.

The complaint followed Bartley's alleged outburst in response a member of the public's presentation about tree removal from Mangere Mountain and other Auckland maunga.

It was initially sent to Mayor Phil Goff's office before being passed to Town to investigate. In a statement, the chief executive said he would not be taking the complaint further.

"The code of conduct complaint received by the Chief Executive's office on 12 November in relation to the conduct of Councillor Josephine Bartley at a Tüpuna Maunga Authority meeting in May, has been reviewed by myself and Professor Ron Paterson the Convenor or the Independent Conduct Panel," Town said.

"We have jointly agreed that the matter does not meet the criteria for further investigation and we will therefore not be taking the matter any further."

The complaint was made by a member of the public, Kirsty Hunt, who earlier this year addressed members of the TMA on the removal of 152 exotic trees from Mangere Mountain and tree removals from other Auckland maunga.

"I went specifically to object to the removal of 152 trees from Mangere Mountain and the planned removal of all non-native trees from the 14 maunga of Auckland," it read. Included in the Mangere Bridge resident's complaint was an allegation Bartley went on a "rant" following the presentation.

"Ms Bartley began shouting at me and on four occasions yelled directly at me 'you are disgusting'!" Hunt claimed.


In response, Bartley labelled the complaint "out of context".


"I can see what's happening, I can see what they're trying to do and I don't like it," she said.

I want to know today and I believe I have a responsibility as a decision maker sitting around this Council table – I want more detailed information on the Operational Plan to be included in this consultation in order for it to have integrity and in order for it to satisfy what I believe is genuine consultation'

Point 8 Paul Majurey answer to question by Cr Wayne Walker

'I'll probably get the numbers slightly askew but I think the order of magnitude will be relevant. So over the next several years around 75,000 new native **species** will be planted – several thousand have already been planted – by comparison to - and I won't have the exact number around 1500, 2000 exotic trees and that's **not every tree on every maunga**. And so the point is this is part of the vision of the Tupuna Maunga Authority **clearly signaled** in the Integrated Management Plan and The Strategies. Those are the subject of public submissions. **The submissions made it clear that the public were quite aware of what was proposed in terms of the of overall vegetation restoration programme** and the vision the Authority has is a very long term one that in terms of the restoration of the mauri of these significant and iconic and cultural places we're going to have the re-emergence of indigenous forest species in terms of **puriri forest**; the return of important taonga species. The vision and hopefully more than that – in terms of the reality - the **bringing back of kiwi to Maungakiekie (One Tree Hill)** and other native species maunga by maunga.'
