### 1. Operating spending reductions

Auckland Council have already decided to reduce costs by simplifying management structures and sharing resources more across the Council group (including Auckland Transport and other Council Controlled Organisations).

Our proposal to save \$130 million would also require us to make other reductions, including:

- Maintaining the currently reduced number of public transport services (as of December 2022) for 2023/2024 to save \$21 million
- Reducing our funding to Tataki Auckland Unlimited to save \$17.5m, with some effects on service delivery and pricing at venues it manages such as Auckland Zoo, Auckland Art Gallery, and stadiums and venues in Auckland
- Reducing regional services such as community and education programmes, regional events, economic development, and other social services activities such as homelessness funding, community empowerment and funding for youth centres to save \$22 million
- Reducing local board funded activities across all boards to save \$16 million
- Reducing regional grants to save \$6 million
- No longer directly providing early childhood education services to save \$1 million.

### 2. Amending Auckland International Airport Limited (AIAL) Shareholding Policy

Our proposed budget includes a planned change to the AIAL shareholding policy. This will allow us to sell some or all our shares in AIAL.

Selling all our shareholding (currently around 18% of shares in Auckland Airport) would reduce our debt by an estimated \$1.9 billion. This would reduce interest costs on our debt by around \$88 million per year, which is greater than what we'd expect to earn from the dividends if we kept the shares.

We have also considered other options, including both keeping all our shares and a partial sale that reduces our shareholding while maintaining at least 10 per cent (a so-called "blocking stake"). These options would contribute less towards our budget reduction target and require other actions – most likely by further increasing rates or debt (within existing policy limits).

**What is your preference on this proposal to change the AIAL shareholding policy to enable the sale of all Auckland Council's shares?** Other

### 3. Managing rates and debt

To help with our budget challenge, we propose a total rates increase for the average value residential property of around **4.66 per cent or \$154 a year** (around \$3 a week) and to increase our use of debt by up to **\$75 million** in 2023/2024.

#### Rates

Our proposed 4.66 per cent total rates increase would be achieved by:

- An average increase in general rates of 7.0 per cent across all existing properties, including non-residential
- Reducing the Natural Environment Targeted Rate (NETR) and Water Quality Targeted Rate (WQTR) by around two thirds and using the money we have already collected from these targeted rates to continue delivering these work programmes as planned in 2023/2024
- Pausing our change to the split between business and residential rates. Under our current policy, annual increases to general rates for business properties are less than for non-business (residential and farm/lifestyle) properties, so that over time the share of general rates paid by business properties is fairer. Our proposal is to put this change on hold for one year

#### Debt

We propose to increase our use of debt by up to \$75 million for 2023/2024. This will be used to fund some capital expenditure (assets such as roads, pipes and buildings) that is currently planned to be funded by operating revenue (such as rates and user charges). This will free up that operating revenue to help address our budget shortfall.

**What is your preference on our proposal to manage rates and debt?** Set a lower general rates increase and make greater use of debt

### 4. Storm Response

The impacts of the recent storm events beginning on Auckland Anniversary weekend could be substantial over time and we don't yet know the full costs.

Changes to our investment in land, infrastructure, buildings and equipment will be needed. Some new investments will be delayed so we can undertake urgent repairs and replacements.

Additionally, from 2023/2024, we are proposing to increase our operating budgets by around \$20 million each year to improve our ability to prepare for and respond to future storms. This would likely require rates to increase for 2023/2024 by around an additional 1 per cent (on top of the 4.66 per cent increase proposed to address our budget shortfall).

**Tell us why, and which reductions you would not proceed with if any:** Our community came from what was previously the Manukau City Council, an entity that acknowledged the socio-economic realities of our diverse population, and took good care to spread the largesse of the better off into the less well-off parts of our community.

This reflected a consensus view within the south whpvide much of the glue which hold our communities together which, unfortunately we have seen very little of since the unitary authority was formed in 2010 under the unitary authority which is Auckland Council.

Many of the Community Facilities ( including those categorised as 'Arts Centres', Libraries etc ) which are currently Council Funded and operating well within many southern Local Board areas. They are very much a part of us, and our communities rely on them in numerous ways.

I have been resident in Counties Manukau since 1976, and raised a family of four here. I am a consulting engineer, and have been previously appointed by central government to governance roles in Crown Entities, and other non-government organisations. My wife was a Councillor in the legacy entity, the Manukau City Council (MCC) for 9 years.

On this basis, I am familiar with some of the challenges your council is facing, but have to say that I am appalled by at the 'one size fits all' manner in which your present council is going about the process.

There appear to be some on the Council who see this line-by-line economizing as an exercise in identifying the low hanging fruit, rather than looking at who is best able to make the sacrifices the city is seeking a benefit from. Very reminiscent in my view to central governments' approach to budget austerity in the early 1990s that our poorer communities are still suffering the effects of.

Previous community focused policies eg Free Swimming Pool Entry was a community focussed line item in the MCC budget that delivered real benefits to the financially challenged in our community and was seen as a cost all were prepared to support.

Since amalgamation, no more.

Similarly, the Council's proposed removal of sub-regional support via the Southern Initiative is in my view unconscionable.

As a case in point, the Nathan Homestead, a heritage building which forms a vibrant focal point of our local community in Hillpark, Manurewa. Staffed by Council, it hosts numerous arts, education and community activities, as well as a small restaurant ('The Hill Cafe') which is commercially successful and a meeting place for many from around the south.

We are advised that our Local Board is required to consider two options for cutting its 'cost of operations' - Option #1 - \$419k which is the full staffing cost, or option #2 - \$99k which leaves us with a caretaker. There is no Option #3 which is to leave everything as it is, which is the community's wish - and required a discretionary ability to use other sources of adding income, or reducing cost. I think of several ways in achieving this.

There is no available information on the income that Nathan Homestead brings in the consultation documents we have received - this recently indicated at around \$250k over the lower than average use annual period which has been subject to Covid restrictions.

If this is a serious proposal, then where is the 'benefit/cost' analysis that gives consideration to the communities loss of wellbeing benefits. Our questions to the Local Board has drawn a blank, primarily because (reportedly) this item only became their responsibility in 12/2022, now to be taken away.

We will make our views known to the Local Board, but in fairness to them, it is clear that that entity will have very little say in the final outcome. But be sure, we will be demanding they provide a 'benefit cost' analysis

NB:- In this situation, the cost will manifest as 'reductions in community health and wellbeing', whilst the benefit will be an adjustment to the city's bottom line which (with all due respect) seem to be all council officers seem to be considering at the moment

Auckland is known for having a high standard of living. This is largely attributable to its breathtakingly gorgeous natural surroundings and the lifestyle options it provides.

As a centre of opportunity, Auckland has enjoyed long-term, consistent increases in population. The pandemic-related closure of international borders and rising internal migration has slowed that increase, causing Auckland's population to decline for the first time in 2021. Auckland remains the greatest commercial hub in New Zealand and contributed 38% of the country's gross domestic product (GDP) over the five years ending in March 2020, accounting for 42% of overall GDP growth during that period.

At the height of the global COVID-19 pandemic, Auckland clinched the title of "World's Most Liveable City" from Vienna according to the Global Liveability Index 2022. It has since dropped to 34<sup>th</sup> place.

According to research commissioned by the Ministry of Culture and Heritage, in 2019 the arts and creative sector contributed \$10.8 billion to New Zealand's GDP and created more than 92,000 jobs (with the film industry alone adding \$1.5B to Auckland's local economy in 2020), compared to Sport and active recreation, which contributes \$4.9 billion to the country's annual GDP, with the sector employing approximately 53,000 New Zealanders.

"The creative sector is recognised by Auckland Council as an important element in Auckland's economy and quality of life, as reflected in several strategic documents including the Auckland Plan 2050, and Auckland Council's Toi Whītiki – Auckland's arts and culture strategic action plan, released in 2015" – Ross Wilson (RIMU report 2020)

Due to inflationary pressure and unprecedented interest rates rises Auckland Council now faces \$295M deficit in its operating budget. As such, the Mayor's LTP (long term plan) budget proposes wide-ranging cutbacks to services and activities including funding cuts to Arts & Culture programmes and initiatives totaling \$41M.

The Auckland Council funds and supports arts and culture initiatives in the city. According to the Auckland Council's Annual Plan for 2021/2022, the Council's budget for arts, community, and events is approximately NZD 232.8 million. This budget includes funding for a range of initiatives, including public art, community events, and cultural facilities, among others. It is important to note that this budget is not exclusively for arts and culture, but also includes funding for other community-related initiatives.

Auckland Council is committed to supporting and promoting arts & culture and has several stated priorities in this area. Some of the key priorities include:

1. Investing in the arts: Auckland City is committed to investing in the arts through funding and support for arts organisations, individual artists, and creative projects. This includes providing funding through grants and other programmes, as well as support for public art and cultural events.

2. Celebrating diversity: Auckland City recognises the importance of celebrating the diverse cultures that make up the city and aims to support and promote cultural events and activities that reflect this diversity.
3. Encouraging participation: Auckland City is committed to encouraging participation in the arts and cultural activities, particularly among young people and those from underrepresented communities. This includes providing opportunities for education and training in the arts, as well as support for community-based cultural projects.
4. Promoting access: Auckland City is committed to promoting access to arts and culture and aims to ensure that all members of the community have opportunities to participate in and experience the arts. This includes supporting initiatives that make the arts more accessible to those with disabilities or who may face other barriers to access, especially in communities of greatest need.
5. Fostering innovation: Auckland City recognises the importance of innovation in the arts and aims to support and promote creative and experimental projects and initiatives that push boundaries and challenge traditional ways of thinking about art and culture.

These priorities are reflected in the policies and programmes that Auckland Council has implemented in the arts and cultural sector and are aimed at promoting a vibrant, diverse, and engaged cultural community in the city.

To meet its agreed outcomes Auckland Council supports arts and culture initiatives, programmes, and funding in a number of ways, which include:

1. Direct funding: Auckland Council provides direct funding to arts and culture organisations, artists, and events through grants, subsidies, and other funding mechanisms. This funding is used to support a range of initiatives, such as the development of new works, the provision of training and education, and the organisation of cultural events as well as funding for operational expenditure for Community arts groups.
2. Provision of arts & culture facilities: Auckland Council provides facilities and spaces for artists and arts organisations to use. This includes performance spaces, galleries, and other facilities that can be used for exhibitions, rehearsals, and other arts-related activities.
3. Public art: Auckland Council also supports arts & culture through the creation and installation of public art, including the commissioning of new works, and the restoration and preservation of existing works.
4. Cultural events: Auckland Councils arts and culture programming team are responsible for organising and delivering cultural events and festivals. These events showcase a range of art forms, including music, dance, theatre, visual arts, and more, and help to bring communities together and promote cultural understanding and appreciation and inclusion.
5. Arts education and training: Various Auckland Council facilities provide space and funding for education and training opportunities for artists and members of the community. This can include programmes for children and youth, workshops and seminars for emerging artists, and training opportunities for those interested in working in the arts and cultural sectors.

## Grassroots Arts & Culture

The impact of Auckland Council's support of Arts & Culture initiatives from a local community level is most keenly felt at a grassroots level.

Grassroots arts play an essential role in shaping the cultural identity and social fabric of a world-class city. The term "grassroots arts" refers to the creative and cultural activities that emerge from communities, often outside of traditional art institutions or commercial settings. These can include everything from street art and public installations to community festivals and independent theatre productions.

One of the key ways that grassroots arts contribute to a city's cultural identity is by reflecting the diversity and creativity of its residents. Grassroots arts are driven by local communities and are often influenced by their history, traditions, and values. This creates a rich tapestry of cultural expression that can be seen and experienced throughout the city.

Moreover, grassroots arts can help promote social cohesion by bringing people from different backgrounds together to collaborate and celebrate their shared interests. They can help build a sense of community by providing opportunities for individuals to connect and share their experiences, values, and perspectives. In this way, grassroots arts can serve as a powerful tool for fostering social inclusion and promoting understanding across diverse groups.

In addition, grassroots arts can have a significant economic impact on a city. They can attract tourism, promote local businesses, and stimulate job growth. They can also provide opportunities for artists and cultural workers to earn a living and contribute to the local economy.

The importance of grassroots arts in a world-class city cannot be overstated. They are integral to the cultural identity and social fabric of the city, promote social cohesion and have significant economic benefits. Supporting and investing in grassroots arts can help ensure that a city remains vibrant, diverse, and culturally rich.

The proposed cutbacks to arts & culture funding of \$41M has very serious social, economic, environmental, and cultural ramifications.

## Potential impacts of reduced funding for Arts & Culture initiatives.

Based on information available through the Creative New Zealand website, the below table summarises the potential impacts of reducing funding for grassroots arts programs and initiatives in a city of 1.5 million people, with varying percentage reductions, considering the city's large multi-cultural population as well as existing inequities.

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The information used to populate this table is available on the Creative New Zealand website and supports the idea that the arts play an important role in promoting social connection, economic development, environmental awareness, and cultural identity, particularly for marginalised and underrepresented communities and those of greatest need.

From a city-wide perspective, reductions in arts & culture funding could limit opportunities for social connection and community building, reduce access to cultural diversity and understanding, and limit opportunities for economic development. The proposed cutbacks could be particularly impactful in communities that are already underserved, such as rural areas and Māori and Pasifika communities. Communities often described as being of greatest need.

These Communities of greatest need, in comparison to the general population, have a limited ability to access social and economic resources and opportunities. Their capacity to fully engage in society and pursuits that are meaningful and valuable to them are limited. These communities deal with several interrelated social, economic, and environmental issues, such as low educational attainment, low incomes, high unemployment, low-value skills, social marginalisation, subpar housing, high crime rates, bad health, which are often paired with family dissolution.

Impacts of funding reductions could also be felt in other subsets of the underserved population such as the LGTBQAI+ and migrant communities.

The information available on the CNZ website notes that the arts can help to build social connections and a sense of community, as well as promote cultural diversity and understanding. In addition, the arts can contribute to economic development by creating jobs, attracting tourism, and promoting innovation.

Reducing, or removing funding for grassroots arts programs and initiatives could have negative impacts on the social, economic, environmental, and cultural well-being of the city which could eventually lead to cultural stagnation, which in turn has the potential to see Auckland City fall behind other comparable large metropolitan centres.

### The Post-pandemic New Renaissance and Cultural Stagnation

We're in the post COVID-19 recovery phase. Without support for Arts & Culture Auckland runs the risk of being left behind in the dawning "Generation Age" where creativity will be the driving force behind innovation and societal growth and evolution on a scale not seen the Renaissance. New technologies and industries are

rapidly emerging with the advent of artificial intelligence which is opening up new worlds of possibilities and democratising creative output on every level.

The Renaissance, a period of cultural and intellectual growth that took place in Europe from the 14th to the 17th century, brought about significant changes to society in terms of social, cultural, environmental, and economic development. Here are some of the ways that the Renaissance impacted society for the better:

A society that is unable to embrace an art and culture-centric approach in the emerging new age could potentially suffer in several ways:

1. **Lack of Innovation and Creativity:** Without an emphasis on the arts and culture, society may lack the innovation and creativity needed to drive progress in fields such as technology, science, and medicine.
2. **Limited Social and Environmental Awareness:** A society that does not prioritise the arts and culture may have a limited understanding of social and environmental issues, which could hinder progress and lead to greater social and environmental problems.
3. **Economic Stagnation:** The arts and culture industries can be significant drivers of economic growth, and a society that does not prioritize these fields may suffer from economic stagnation and limited opportunities.

If Auckland Council were to withdraw funding and support for arts and culture initiatives, programmes, it could have significant impacts on the community and the broader society in a number of ways. Some potential impacts may include:

Reduction or removal of funding and support for arts and culture initiatives will have far-reaching impacts on communities and the broader society, affecting the social, cultural, and economic well-being of the communities.

#### Lack of alternative funding for Arts & Culture initiatives.

There are fewer and fewer opportunities for funding, for example, artists applying to Creative New Zealand for funding formerly had a success rate of one in three applications securing funding. Now it's one in five.

The options left open to artist's are that the self-fund projects, although this is not viable given the average wage for artists is already below minimum wage according to a Colmar Brunton 2019 survey.

The other option is that artists leave the sector altogether, we've already seen that with experienced subject matter experts and practitioners leaving the music and event production industry after COVID-19 shutdown all productions for sustained periods.

The third option is that artists leave Tamaki and Aotearoa to ply their trade elsewhere, with the most likely destination being Australia where the Australian Government has come out with enacted the National Cultural Policy—Revive: a place for every story, a story for every place with A\$300M boost to the arts sector to "Put the arts back where they need to be, at the heart of our National life".

In terms of engagement in arts & culture activities and well-being, 73% of young people report feeling better about their lives when they have the opportunity to engage in arts & culture activities. According to a recent audience survey, 96% of people in Aotearoa are in the "Cultural market", meaning 96% of all New Zealanders have had an arts experience during the timeframe the survey was looking at.

In summary, removing or significantly reducing arts funding runs the risk of us losing the ability to tell our stories, in our voices, and to connect as communities. We will lose sense of what it means to be a member of this city and Country.

Art challenges, it inspires, it evokes and provokes, it speaks truth to power, but most importantly it reminds us of our unique place in the world, it allows us to have shared experiences that let us know we're not alone. A piece of music, a poem, a film or a painting can speak to a person on a very personal level, while connecting groups of people on a level.

The proposed cutbacks in funding for the arts will set the city of Auckland back by a generation when it comes to our cultural, social, economic, and environmental well-being.

# Annual Budget 2023/2024

## Your feedback

### 1. Operating spending reductions

Auckland Council have already decided to reduce costs by simplifying management structures and sharing resources more across the Council group (including Auckland Transport and other Council Controlled Organisations).

Our proposal to save \$130 million would also require us to make other reductions, including:

- Maintaining the currently reduced number of public transport services (as of December 2022) for 2023/2024 to save \$21 million
- Reducing our funding to Tataki Auckland Unlimited to save \$17.5m, with some effects on service delivery and pricing at venues it manages such as Auckland Zoo, Auckland Art Gallery, and stadiums and venues in Auckland
- Reducing regional services such as community and education programmes, regional events, economic development, and other social services activities such as homelessness funding, community empowerment and funding for youth centres to save \$22 million
- Reducing local board funded activities across all boards to save \$16 million
- Reducing regional grants to save \$6 million
- No longer directly providing early childhood education services to save \$1 million.

#### What is your preference on the proposed operating cost reductions?

Do not proceed with some reductions and instead further increase rates and/or debt

**Tell us why, and which reductions you would not proceed with if any:** Community Facilities must remain available for community organisations, libraries, swimming pools and sports clubs. Their costs should not be increased as many are only just able to continue.

The core business of the council should be to make sure these remain available.

### 2. Amending Auckland International Airport Limited (AIAL) Shareholding Policy

Our proposed budget includes a planned change to the AIAL shareholding policy. This will allow us to sell some or all our shares in AIAL.

Selling all our shareholding (currently around 18% of shares in Auckland Airport) would reduce our debt by an estimated \$1.9 billion. This would reduce interest costs on our debt by around \$88 million per year, which is greater than what we'd expect to earn from the dividends if we kept the shares.

We have also considered other options, including both keeping all our shares and a partial sale that reduces our shareholding while maintaining at least 10 per cent (a so-called "blocking stake"). These options would contribute less

towards our budget reduction target and require other actions – most likely by further increasing rates or debt (within existing policy limits).

**What is your preference on this proposal to change the AIAL shareholding policy to enable the sale of all Auckland Council's shares?** Don't change the policy, keep all our shares and further increase rates and/or debt

**Tell us why:** These shares earn money every year. Selling them will only provide income for one year.

### 3. Managing rates and debt

To help with our budget challenge, we propose a total rates increase for the average value residential property of around **4.66 per cent or \$154 a year** (around \$3 a week) and to increase our use of debt by up to **\$75 million** in 2023/2024.

#### Rates

Our proposed 4.66 per cent total rates increase would be achieved by:

- An average increase in general rates of 7.0 per cent across all existing properties, including non-residential
- Reducing the Natural Environment Targeted Rate (NETR) and Water Quality Targeted Rate (WQTR) by around two thirds and using the money we have already collected from these targeted rates to continue delivering these work programmes as planned in 2023/2024
- Pausing our change to the split between business and residential rates. Under our current policy, annual increases to general rates for business properties are less than for non-business (residential and farm/lifestyle) properties, so that over time the share of general rates paid by business properties is fairer. Our proposal is to put this change on hold for one year

#### Debt

We propose to increase our use of debt by up to \$75 million for 2023/2024. This will be used to fund some capital expenditure (assets such as roads, pipes and buildings) that is currently planned to be funded by operating revenue (such as rates and user charges). This will free up that operating revenue to help address our budget shortfall.

**What is your preference on our proposal to manage rates and debt?** Proceed with the proposed increases to rates (4.66 per cent overall for the average value residential property) and debt (up to \$75 million of additional debt)

**Tell us why:** Debt should only be increased where the work is essential for maintenance or growth.

### 4. Storm Response

The impacts of the recent storm events beginning on Auckland Anniversary weekend could be substantial over time and we don't yet know the full costs.

Changes to our investment in land, infrastructure, buildings and equipment will be needed. Some new investments will be delayed so we can undertake urgent repairs and replacements.

Additionally, from 2023/2024, we are proposing to increase our operating budgets by around \$20 million each year to improve our ability to prepare for and respond to future storms. This would likely require rates to increase for 2023/2024 by around an additional 1 per cent (on top of the 4.66 per cent increase proposed to address our budget shortfall).

**What is your preference on our proposal to manage the impact of future storms?** Do not proceed with the proposal

**Tell us why:** Identify areas likely to be impacted by storms.

Do not permit development of areas likely to be affected.

This should be undertaken within the existing budget.

### 5. Local Boards

#### Manurewa Local Board

It is proposed to reduce funding by \$16 million across all local boards which will impact the activities and services delivered by local boards. Given this possible reduction in funding, **what do you think of our proposed priorities for services and activities in this local board in 2023/2024?** I support most priorities

**Tell us why:**

**If funding for local board activities is reduced, which three of our services do you not want to reduce funding for? (i.e. which are most important to you?)** Potential closure of local facilities, Community lease charges, Local community grants

## 6. Changes to other rates and fees and charges

Do not proceed with any reductions and instead further increase rates and/or debt

**Tell us why, and which reductions you would not proceed with if any:** RaWiri is a community organisation, based in Rata Vine Manurewa. We need our community assets, especially our community house which is owned by Kainga Ora, with partial payments from Auckland Council for things like power and the internet. We fund raise for our staff and for many of the activities our community undertakes in the Community House. Many of the identifiable cuts proposed in the Mayor's budget will impact on our community especially our children, who attend Wiri Central School - with one of the lowest deciles in NZ.

Rata Vine and Wiri is an area of high need. We supply food to people from not only our community but across Auckland. We have done so for a number of years, stepping up when the pandemic arrived. We have hundreds of families that rely on the services of RaWiri Community house. In addition we provide a range of goods to people in need the length and breadth of the North Island. Many people living here work a number of jobs to keep their heads above water. They might rent homes, or own them - they would rather have a known rate increase than the unknowns - increase in sports fees for their children through use of council facilities, increase in fees to use community halls for gatherings, passed on increased costs for using the swimming pools or community art centres. If you have a known increase you can budget for it - its all the unknowns that add up.



We do not support raising the rents on any community facility. Every month we give a morning tea for our elderly residents living in Wiri. We use a council facility. We often pay for the food ourselves. If there are rent increases for the use of such a facility it will destroy these elderly people's often one fun thing they have to look forward to. Our Community House manager Liz looked after the elderly in three Council-owned facilities during Covid. She didn't get paid for doing that; but because the Community House operated right through the pandemic, the elderly residents on ALL those facilities were reassured that someone was looking out for them and their well-being.

We do not support slashing the budget for CABs. we have volunteers from our community that work in the CAB because they know how to navigate the systems people find troublesome and hard to understand. Often people are directed to us for food and support with their issues - possibly with Kainga Ora, Work and Income. We can direct people to the CAB to get legal advice and the JP service. Many people in our community work a number of jobs they need to have a place to go that gives reliable information and offers free services like legal aid. How on earth will people find this information? People here do not have money to spend on 'unlimited data' for their phones. They need to be able to find it out from trusted people that they can talk to face to face - kanohi ki te kanohi.

We do not support slashing the Local Board's budgets. Our community has a lot of needs and the Local Board tries to meet those needs. We have had funding for our elderly and for our sewing classes from our Local Board. Cutting the budget in communities like ours will only make our life much harder. Many of the people who use the services of our Community House are trying very hard to make a better life for themselves and their whanau. The trustees of RaWiri Residents' Association and Community House believe Councillors are elected to care for not only the assets of a city but also the well-being of the people who live there. Stripping communities of the very things that bring them hope and joy is not, in our view, good governance.

We need to think about the following quote:

I am unconvinced you need to reduce the number of public transport services available to Aucklanders; I also think that a reduction such as the proposed cancellation of 1000 bus services/routes is unwise. That said without more context it is difficult to provide more meaningful feedback. However, better integration of the ferry services with AT services should happen, and the monopoly that Fullers has should cease.

In so far as getting about Auckland goes, restore the coffers by introducing a car tax. Not just a fuel tax but a tax per vehicle once a set limit per dwelling is exceeded - perhaps base the number limitation on the garaging (including carports) that each property has - that's most logical. In this time of climate change do all households need more than two cars? Especially when so many other modes of transportation are now available, and you need to increase the bicycle network.

Already, individual rights are far too indulged at the expense of the environment and common/greater good in terms of traffic congestion, air quality, a warming climate... you aren't properly protecting our trees across all of the region, so, naturally, there are fewer and fewer to take up all the carbon emitted by vehicles ... this should now mean that our

vehicle reliance should reduce there-by ensuring that the carbon emissions are more proportionate to the carbon sinks we have.

If you increase the bicycle network across Auckland (including the distances between places like Clevedon and Papakura etc.), people can and would ride bikes more because more of their peers would. There would be so many benefits to this - we'd all be safer because there'd be less vehicles. With the variety of alternative transport modes now available, the air will be cleaner, our water will be healthier. The medical system would be less burdened because our citizens would be fitter and have warded off diabetes and other illnesses. If people think that walking or riding to work or school is too long-a-journey, that's mostly their problem, not yours (beyond quality zoning and overlays); they can move.

Stuff like this has to happen; for everyone's sake, including the financial situation that Council is in.

#### RE. THE FUNDING OF TATAKI AUCKLAND UNLIMITED

I don't really understand why businesses expect governments to support them as much as they are supported in this country. They seem to get too many hand outs from governments (local and central). People are in business to make money. Period. In this regard, do not support business initiatives; the Chamber of Commerce, Rotary and others can do that instead; let business support business.

The best thing you can do to support economic development and tourism is work with central government organisations (i.e. DoC) and iwis to the best of your ability; and, focus on doing your core business well. I want to live, work and visit attractions in a clean and tidy city – this is what best expresses dignity, pride and that you care about your visitors and citizens.

Generally, I endorse an increase of admission fees to attractions such as the Auckland Zoo, Auckland Art Gallery, and stadiums and venues. Admission fees for those who are low-income earners and on benefits of all kinds should still be able to access these facilities via the current admission arrangements, however.

'Grassroots' activities such as community exercise (including yoga, Pilates, etc.), art, craft and culture programmes at places such as Nathan Homestead should, and must continue as are. Likewise for facilities such as libraries and council-owned gyms and recreation centres. These are all precious civic places where people increase their knowledge, learn new skills, network, and rehabilitate. We need strong, clever, healthy, skilled, knowledgeable and inspired citizens – globally we are in precarious times and these kinds of facilities are key to keeping people open-minded, in fellowship and growing. These facilities are our life-support and are vital to the survival of our civic and social cohesion.

I am happy to see you forego the supporting of events such as the Santa parade, Pride parade and Diwali, etc. These groups can organise their own events if they really matter, and, you can charge them fully for the privilege of providing it.

You must continue to fully support (as you currently do, or better), social services activities such as homelessness funding, community empowerment and funding for youth centres. Our misguided, unwell, hopeless, vulnerable and marginalised must be supported, so that everyone remains as safe as possible... while it helps individuals, this funding also contributes to the common good and wellbeing of all citizens.

The Citizens Advice Bureau must also remain as is. It's a no-brainer as to why, and I believe you would be undermining our human rights if you do terminate or tinker with them so that they'd be undermined.

The Southern Initiative should remain as is. It would be utterly foolish to reduce the funding for this, not to mention cancellation. In the minimum this is the least you could do for this part of Auckland considering you indulge other areas with new town centre squares, main street gardens, decorative paving; while we're lucky to get a playground installed in the local park.

I would far prefer it if the so-called elite and exclusive sports paid more for the privilege of enjoying their activities (sailing, golf, maybe tennis). I cannot comprehend why it is that the golf clubs fail to face budget cuts or similar with this proposed budget. It appears prejudicial towards everyone but the city's privileged. This is utterly wrong. I want the golf courses to be opened up – to for a portion of their time, operate as proper public parks. With increasing density, these green spaces – as polluted as they are, actually offer wide open spaces to behold, mature trees to enjoy. We are becoming deprived of such landscapes, and golf courses go some way to offsetting all the negative effects of the built environment (heat island effect, short-views (no long views (this is bad for eyesight)), absence of vegetation, too much volume, not enough void, too much noise, bad odours due to waste and unwelcome cooking sessions) in a tree and green-space deprived city.

Please also develop a strategy to improve the health of golf courses, including a shift to links courses so that the increased vegetation captures more overland water flow, provides more habitat, emits less carbon and methane, etc., etc.

I DO NOT EVER support you funding private sport such as The America's Cup, Sail GP, etc. (And I sail, horse-ride etc., just so you know I am not bias). If people want to live in the sphere of privilege and private services etc., they can stay in that world without expecting special benefits from community organisations such as councils.

Auckland Council have already decided to reduce costs by simplifying management structures and sharing resources more across the Council group (including Auckland Transport and other Council Controlled Organisations).

Our proposal to save \$130 million would also require us to make other reductions, including:

- Maintaining the currently reduced number of public transport services (as of December 2022) for 2023/2024 to save \$21 million
- Reducing our funding to Tataki Auckland Unlimited to save \$17.5m, with some effects on service delivery and pricing at venues it manages such as Auckland Zoo, Auckland Art Gallery, and stadiums and venues in Auckland
- Reducing regional services such as community and education programmes, regional events, economic development, and other social services activities such as homelessness funding, community empowerment and funding for youth centres to save \$22 million
- Reducing local board funded activities across all boards to save \$16 million
- Reducing regional grants to save \$6 million
- No longer directly providing early childhood education services to save \$1 million.

**Tell us why, and which reductions you would not proceed with if any:** Community events and services for youth, seniors and community in general is essential for community wellbeing. Reducing these services and access to facilities would cause far more social harm than good. OUR Arts & cultural programs are essential to our identity and wellbeing as Pasifika people in Auckland. Libraries are needed, already in Manurewa our Library has reduced hours and the rec hall is closed to the community and the Seniors are being told to do their zumbas outside in the car park or inside the library. This is inhumane. This budget puts people behind and money first when it should be the other way around. Community services for youth is essential given post covid that families are still feeling its impact which is compounded by the high cost of living - its too much. Rec Centres and community facilities are critical for Senior programs and youth spaces to connect. Please don't cut these.

### 2. Amending Auckland International Airport Limited (AIAL) Shareholding Policy

Our proposed budget includes a planned change to the AIAL shareholding policy. This will allow us to sell some or all our shares in AIAL.

Selling all our shareholding (currently around 18% of shares in Auckland Airport) would reduce our debt by an estimated \$1.9 billion. This would reduce interest costs on our debt by around \$88 million per year, which is greater than what we'd expect to earn from the dividends if we kept the shares.

We have also considered other options, including both keeping all our shares and a partial sale that reduces our shareholding while maintaining at least 10 per cent (a so-called "blocking stake"). These options would contribute less towards our budget reduction target and require other actions – most likely by further increasing rates or debt (within existing policy limits).

#### Rates

Our proposed 4.66 per cent total rates increase would be achieved by:

- An average increase in general rates of 7.0 per cent across all existing properties, including non-residential
- Reducing the Natural Environment Targeted Rate (NETR) and Water Quality Targeted Rate (WQTR) by around two thirds and using the money we have already collected from these targeted rates to continue delivering these work programmes as planned in 2023/2024
- Pausing our change to the split between business and residential rates. Under our current policy, annual increases to general rates for business properties are less than for non-business (residential and farm/lifestyle) properties, so that over time the share of general rates paid by business properties is fairer. Our proposal is to put this change on hold for one year

#### Debt

We propose to increase our use of debt by up to \$75 million for 2023/2024. This will be used to fund some capital expenditure (assets such as roads, pipes and buildings) that is currently planned to be funded by operating revenue (such as rates and user charges). This will free up that operating revenue to help address our budget shortfall.
