1. Operating spending reductions

Auckland Council have already decided to reduce costs by simplifying management structures and sharing resources more across the Council group (including Auckland Transport and other Council Controlled Organisations).

Our proposal to save \$130 million would also require us to make other reductions, including:

- Maintaining the currently reduced number of public transport services (as of December 2022) for 2023/2024 to save \$21 million
- Reducing our funding to Tataki Auckland Unlimited to save \$17.5m, with some effects on service delivery and pricing at venues it manages such as Auckland Zoo, Auckland Art Gallery, and stadiums and venues in Auckland
- Reducing regional services such as community and education programmes, regional events, economic development, and other social services activities such as homelessness funding, community empowerment and funding for youth centres to save \$22 million
- Reducing local board funded activities across all boards to save \$16 million
- Reducing regional grants to save \$6 million
- No longer directly providing early childhood education services to save \$1 million.

What is your preference on the proposed operating cost reductions?

Do not proceed with some reductions and instead further increase rates and/or debt

Tell us why, and which reductions you would not proceed with if any: Expand public transport systems so that it is something people prefer to take over driving rental cars, this will in turn reduce cars on the road, cause less traffic delays, car accidents, inconvenience when roadworks start

2. Amending Auckland International Airport Limited (AIAL) Shareholding Policy

Our proposed budget includes a planned change to the AIAL shareholding policy. This will allow us to sell some or all our shares in AIAL.

Selling all our shareholding (currently around 18% of shares in Auckland Airport) would reduce our debt by an estimated \$1.9 billion. This would reduce interest costs on our debt by around \$88 million per year, which is greater than what we'd expect to earn from the dividends if we kept the shares.

We have also considered other options, including both keeping all our shares and a partial sale that reduces our shareholding while maintaining at least 10 per cent (a so-called "blocking stake"). These options would contribute less towards our budget reduction target and require other actions – most likely by further increasing rates or debt (within existing policy limits).

What is your preference on this proposal to change the AIAL shareholding policy to enable the sale of all Auckland Council's shares? Proceed with the proposal to enable the sale of all our shares in AIAL and use the proceeds to reduce debt and therefore annual interest costs by around \$87 million per year

Tell us why:

3. Managing rates and debt

To help with our budget challenge, we propose a total rates increase for the average value residential property of around **4.66 per cent or \$154 a year** (around \$3 a week) and to increase our use of debt by up to **\$75 million** in 2023/2024.

Rates

Our proposed 4.66 per cent total rates increase would be achieved by:

- An average increase in general rates of 7.0 per cent across all existing properties, including non-residential
- Reducing the Natural Environment Targeted Rate (NETR) and Water Quality Targeted Rate (WQTR) by around two thirds and using the money we have already collected from these targeted rates to continue delivering these work programmes as planned in 2023/2024
- Pausing our change to the split between business and residential rates. Under our current policy, annual increases to general rates for business properties are less than for non-business (residential and farm/lifestyle) properties, so that over time the share of general rates paid by business properties is fairer. Our proposal is to put this change on hold for one year

Debt

We propose to increase our use of debt by up to \$75 million for 2023/2024. This will be used to fund some capital expenditure (assets such as roads, pipes and buildings) that is currently planned to be funded by operating revenue (such as rates and user charges). This will free up that operating revenue to help address our budget shortfall.

After three years of pandemic this will increase levels of inequality and inequity and I don't support this. The Auckland Plan has four key areas of focus which all directly relate to the community. The latest progress report on the Plan outcomes clearly highlights that none are being met and, in some areas, there has been a reduction in benefit to the community due to the pandemic exacerbating the loss of connection and loneliness. The report does not take into consideration the impact of the increased cost of living which is particularly impacting those already most disadvantaged.

Belonging and Participation: The West and South areas are where deprivation is concentrated and is where most of Community Impact's support and projects are focused. The report highlights that the sense of community has declined and now is the time to continue programmes and invest in these vital areas of need.

Programmes that promote connection and resilience post COVID, increasing spaces for activity and connection and supporting our communities of greatest need are opportunities to support all Aucklanders to come out of the pandemic stronger and more resilient.

The proposed budget reduction will mean that none of the above will be able to be implemented and the gap in equity will only increase. I believe that this will require larger investment in the longterm if the funding is withdrawn now and all the progress made to date lost.

Opportunity and Prosperity: Stopping the CSI and employment opportunities for Māori and Pacific Peoples is counterproductive. They leverage the small Council investment to create bigger and better outcomes by attracting funds from external organisations. 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A Better Budget for Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland

The Council – led by Mayor Wayne Brown – has put forward a 2023-2024 draft budget for public consultation. The Council says a \$295m financial hole needs to be filled. It proposes: general spending cuts, selling the Council's shares in Auckland International Airport, an average 4.66% rates increase, up to \$75 million in borrowing.

How did we get here?

The Council proposal says the financial pressures come from an expansion in services and assets that has brought higher maintenance costs, worsened by high interest rates and inflation. Cyclone Gabrielle and recent flooding events have added further financial strain.

Recent years have seen increased inflation and interest rates. **But some of the pressures on Council are temporary and others have been overstated.** A major reason for revenue being lower than it otherwise would be is COVID-19, a pandemic experienced by thousands of councils and governments worldwide. Non-rates revenue has remained steady, as the table on the left shows. Revenue from Council venues, services, and public transport is likely to grow over time as Auckland recovers from COVID-19.

Interest rates are projected to fall over time,¹ and Council acknowledges that 80-100% of its borrowing is at fixed rates – which means only a small part of its borrowing is affected by short-term increases in interest rates.² The budget was prepared before floods and Cyclone Gabrielle; these events will require reconstruction, but central government has partnered for that.

“Signs that inflation will ease meaningfully over 2023 are becoming increasing clear.”³

Auckland Council is not facing a debt crisis: Auckland's debt is at 250% of its revenue, well below the 290% debt ceiling. Total debt as a ratio to revenue has been relatively stable (see graph on the right). The cost of servicing interest increased in 2022 as a proportion of total revenues, but the overall trend is declining.

Why can we do better?

The proposed cuts will have irreversible long-term impacts.

The axing of operational spending could mean a permanent end to the services and institutions that help to make Auckland a community.


The cuts could affect – among other things – cultural events, library services (including services that support community safety), Māori and Pasifika employment (through reduced support of The Southern Initiative and The Western Initiative), Early Childhood Education services, and organisations like the Citizens Advice Bureau that allow people to access their minimum legal rights. Events and organisations may disappear due to the cuts.

Selling the airport shares does not add up. The loss of the 18% shareholding in Auckland International Airport would make the city permanently poorer and would remove people's level of control over a strategic asset. The Council proposal does not consider the loss of a stake in the airport's extensive landholding. It will be very difficult to return the land and future value of the shares to the public once these shares are sold. This has implications for:

1. **Māori land interests: the Waitangi Tribunal cannot recommend return of private land, so airport land will be permanently alienated from Māori.**
2. **Future climate and other emergencies: we need coordinated transport hubs, which is harder when airports are privatised.**

Our communities are more important than ever. Cyclone Gabrielle and the recent floods show that community organisations (such as Visionwest Community Trust, which will be affected by the cuts) are essential as a source of food, shelter, and social support in times of emergency. These organisations make a community resilient. Eliminating these organisations makes individuals and communities more vulnerable and precarious.





Citizens Advice Bureaus face closure as a result of proposed cuts. Going by 2022 figures, this is estimated to impact 163,000 people seeking access to assistance concerning their legal rights, including in relation to immigration, MSD, and KiwiSaver.

There are many more options available than what the Budget Proposal suggests. The proposal suggests the public will have to accept the budget, or face a 13.5% increase in rates, or increased borrowing. But many other combinations of rates, borrowing, charges, and central government support are possible, such as:



How can we do better?



Local Government Act 2002

When considering alternative options, a starting point is that the Council does not have to run a 'balanced budget'. The law says councils have a Balanced budget requirement but that they only have to 'balance the books' if it would not be "financially prudent" to do so (for example, if cutting services creates its own financial costs), factoring in the need to maintain services set out in a long-term plan. **But if the Council is intent on 'balancing the books', another budget is possible.** The Council has not made it easy to construct another budget by imposing a very short (one month) timeframe on the consultation process, but a budget does not need to be finalised until June and it is still feasible to develop alternative proposals.

Council is opting to pause two important targeted rates and they don't have to do that. The Council says its reserves from the Water Quality Targeted Rate and the Natural Environment Targeted Rate are not spent, and that these rates can be suspended for a year. Now is not the time to freeze funding for water quality or the natural environment.

Increasing borrowing avoids the need for community cuts and sale of airport shares

Council can borrow more. The Council is proposing to borrow \$75 million. Council says that it cannot borrow more than \$140m without breaching internal policy, but as the Council these policies can be adjusted (as the Council has recognised by acknowledging it would need to amend its airport shareholding policy to sell off its shares). Combining borrowing with a strong revenue plan, ensures Auckland's strong credit rating is not impacted.

The existing rates proposal will provide necessary revenue. This general rates increase, along with increased borrowing and unfreezing targeted rates, can provide \$295m in revenue.⁴ This alternative budget plan will address the shortfall and provide the foundation for a budget that is more flexible, fairer, and better for Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland over the long-term. Building on this foundation, **Auckland Council should be investing now** – in tourism, public transport, the arts, and other social services. Investing in the city will bring revenue back. That investment can be funded through the same mix of borrowing and rates set out here. This plan demonstrates that the budget shortfall can be addressed, if necessary. Cutting and selling are no way to bring Auckland back on its feet – and back to its best.

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Kia ora Mayor Brown,

As a freelance dancer, choreographer and arts administrator, I do not support the proposed cost reductions of local board funded activities or a reduction in regional contestable grants and appeals to Auckland Council to proceed with an alternative solution to remedy the budget deficit. The cumulative outcome of the proposed cuts to funding will devastate the heart and soul of Tāmaki Makaurau - Auckland's culture, art and community sectors with ruinous consequences to the local economy.

As an artist I work with a range of different arts organisations in Tāmaki Makaurau. To produce art of quality, that is distinctly New Zealand, requires a significant amount of funding. Most organisations I work with have severely inadequate funding and many projects I have given countless volunteer hours in order to ensure it goes on stage. This should not be how we deliver arts and culture in Aotearoa. Countless other cities around the world (that we aspire to be like) have an engrained arts and culture strategy, that contributes to vibrant, positive and connected communities and this has been the way for centuries. It is therefore idiotic to believe that reducing funding towards the arts and culture sector will not have a long term impact on our city. It's not just the diverse people and communities in our city that will not be exposed to essential cultural and arts experience but it will lower the perception our tourism industry has for this city which will also have lasting consequences.

Creative industries are the cornerstone and the beating heart of a forward-thinking city and post COVID-19, more than ever, arts events and cultural activities are key to reinvigorating the city. A vital cultural city not only allows for direct creation of employment opportunities for artists but ensures the legacy of artistic excellence is continued. An investment reduction of this size will send our city backwards and see a mass exodus of local talent depart Aotearoa for job opportunities overseas.

We have world class talent here in Aotearoa and to once again pick on a sector that is already so under resourced, will undeniably cause a mass exodus. In Te Ao Maori, it is essential that we stay connected to our community and whenua, but by reducing the opportunities in Tāmaki Makaurau even further, our people will either lose that connection with their community or be forced to give up their passion in order to stay in Aotearoa. If this goes ahead, later down the track the council will realise the significant loss to our communities and ecology as a whole. When Auckland's communities are thriving and our arts and cultural sector is prospering, the entire city benefits. These services directly improve social cohesion, wellbeing and our quality of life. They make our city more inclusive and welcoming helping us to attract and retain new residents and industry. They also boost the local economy, create jobs and make the city more prosperous.

Cutting this funding will have a negatively impact on sectors such as hospitality to generate revenue, as they benefit from a prosperous arts and cultural events and precincts. And it will negatively impact the quality and diversity of education in our schools and communities.

These are not nice-to-haves that can be turned on or off at will. Jobs will be lost and some of the organisations responsible for delivering these services will shutter.

A reduction of this size will send our city backwards and cost us more in the long run.

Auckland Philharmonia Orchestra does not support these cost reductions. The net effect of such a sizeable reduction in funding will negatively impact the local economy and devastate Auckland's culture, art and community sectors.

This is not the time to be cutting back. Now is the time to invest in Auckland's future. Our arts events, music, cultural festivals, theatre, dance, comedy and other creative activities bring life to our city, bring Auckland communities together, and attract domestic and international tourists. This also has a positive knock-on effect to our restaurants, hotels, transport and other sectors.

When Auckland's communities are thriving and our arts and cultural sector is prospering, the entire city benefits. These services directly improve social cohesion, wellbeing and our quality of life. They make our city more inclusive and welcoming, helping us to attract and retain new residents and industry. They also boost the local economy, create jobs and make the city more prosperous.

Cutting this funding will negatively impact the local economy and the ability for our restaurants, hotels and retail sectors to generate revenue. And it will negatively impact the quality and diversity of education in our schools and communities.

These are not "nice-to-haves" that can be turned on or off at will. Jobs will be lost and some of the organisations responsible for delivering these services will close. I strongly disagree with the recommended cuts and urge Auckland Council to instead look to rates and borrowing as required.

Auckland's arts, culture and creative sector helps make Auckland a hugely enjoyable place to live and to visit. Our arts events, cultural festivals, and our lively theatre, dance, music, comedy and other creative activities bring life to our city, and bring Auckland communities together.

Recently I have been to events such as Auckland Arts Festival, Auckland Pride, Big Gay Out, Basement Theatre, Q Theatre, Mangere Arts Centre, Te Pou and Auckland Live events. These have all given me huge pride in our city and have been super exciting to introduce our international and national visitors to them. This is what makes Auckland the city I want to live in in New Zealand.

The proposed cuts to contestable grants, regional services, local board funding and Tataki Auckland, while small in terms of the Council's overall budget, will have an outsize impact on our arts, culture and creative sector. This has been evidenced across my whole career in the arts - which simply wouldn't exist without the support of grants, local board funding and Tataki Auckland.

The arts, culture and creative sector was hard hit by COVID-19. Lockdowns and audience hesitancy knocked out many of Auckland's festivals, events, and many performing arts events - theatre, dance, music and comedy.

It is hard to put into words the level of impact this has had on individuals, organisations and hope for the sector at large. A public art gallery is an institution for human flourishing, guiding us all to new possibilities as we imagine and create more fulfilling lives and thriving communities. Art changes lives and the Auckland Art Gallery provides transformational experiences to a diverse audience.

Cuts already proposed to the Gallery's operating budget leaves it with a bare bones operating budget of \$9.5m pa, after shared TAU services fees are deducted. This is compared to \$32.2m and \$18.6m that Auckland Museum and MOTAT received in full respectively in 2022-2023. This imbalance between the city's major cultural institutions leads to a great loss for the city – of people, of access to and care of the art treasures and of the future creation of culture in New Zealand. And, unbelievably, TAU is expected to propose even more cuts.

The people at the Auckland Art Gallery believe deeply in the significance of art to impact our everyday lives. Their knowledge and experience cannot easily be replaced. Highly skilled in developing outstanding visual art exhibitions, public programmes and valuable archives, they provide stimulation, education and well-being for all who visit the gallery. Close to 500,000 will visit in 2023. (MOTAT, 2022: 100,554 visits, Museum, 2022: 488,553 visits)

As guardians, skilled visual art specialists care for the Gallery's irreplaceable collection. The 17,000 artworks are our national treasure, owned by the citizens of Auckland, with national and international importance. As a leader, the Gallery then attracts bequests, gifts and long term loans.

Entry charges do not work. There is plenty of data from independent researchers to demonstrate that the introduction of entry charges to the Gallery in 2018/19 caused significant harm for the gallery – around 30% less visitors, 60% less people joining guided tours and significant losses for the Gallery's other income revenue offerings, such as the shop and the café.

We strongly advocate for Council to recognise how vital it is to support the very core of the human creative spirit in the city through the work of the Auckland Art Gallery. The Gallery provides opportunities for people to understand and celebrate who they are, were, and might be. A well-resourced public gallery is at the heart of a city's creative economy and can lead change for our future. We need to be able to re-imagine that new future, for our communities and cities as creativity is fast becoming one of the most influential forces driving today's global environment. The Gallery plays a vital role in enabling Auckland Council to achieve its goals for the four well-beings, social, cultural, environmental and economic, to support a creative, flourishing city.

The Auckland Art Gallery is a world class public art gallery where creative talents can shine –let it grow and flourish through an equitable and sustainable funding partnership between Tātaki Auckland Unlimited and Auckland Council.

A public art gallery is an institution for human flourishing, guiding us all to new possibilities as we imagine and create more fulfilling lives and thriving communities. Art changes lives and the Auckland Art Gallery Toi o Tāmaki provides transformational experiences to a diverse audience.

Cuts already proposed to the Gallery's operating budget leaves it with a bare bones operating budget of \$9.5m pa, after shared TAU services fees are deducted. This is compared to \$32.2m and \$18.6m that Auckland Museum and MOTAT received in full respectively in 2022-2023. This imbalance between the city's major cultural institutions leads to a great loss for the city – of tangata/people, of access to and care of the art taonga/treasures and of the future creation of culture in Aotearoa. visual art exhibitions, public programmes and valuable archives, they provide stimulation, education and well-being for all who visit the gallery. Close to 500,000 will visit in 2023. (MOTAT, 2022: 100,554 visits, Museum, 2022: 488,553 visits)

As kaitiaki/guardians, skilled visual art specialists care for the Gallery's irreplaceable collection. The 17,000 artworks are our national treasure, owned by the citizens of Auckland, with national and international importance. As a leader, the Gallery then attracts bequests, gifts and long term loans.

Entry charges do not work. There is plenty of data from independent researchers to demonstrate that the introduction of entry charges to the Gallery in 2018/19 caused significant harm for the gallery – around 30% less visitors, 60% less people joining guided tours and significant losses for the Gallery's other income revenue offerings, such as the shop and the café.

We strongly advocate for Council to recognise how vital it is to support the very core of the human creative spirit in the city through the work of the Auckland Art Gallery Toi o Tāmaki. The Gallery provides opportunities for people to understand and celebrate who they are, were, and might be. A well-resourced public gallery is at the heart of a city's creative economy and can lead change for our future. We need to be able to re-imagine that new future, for our communities and cities as creativity is fast becoming one of the most influential forces driving today's global environment. The Gallery plays a vital role in enabling Auckland Council to achieve its goals for the four well-beings, social, cultural, environmental and economic, to support a creative, flourishing city.

The Auckland Art Gallery Toi o Tāmaki is a world class public art gallery where creative talents can shine –let it grow and flourish through an equitable and sustainable funding partnership between Tātaki Auckland Unlimited and Auckland Council.

- Reducing our funding to Tataki Auckland Unlimited to save \$17.5m, with some effects on service delivery and pricing at venues it manages such as Auckland Zoo, Auckland Art Gallery, and stadiums and venues in Auckland
- Reducing regional services such as community and education programmes, regional events, economic development, and other social services activities such as homelessness funding, community empowerment and funding for youth centres to save \$22 million
- Reducing local board funded activities across all boards to save \$16 million
- Reducing regional grants to save \$6 million
- No longer directly providing early childhood education services to save \$1 million.

What is your preference on the proposed operating cost reductions?

Do not proceed with any reductions and instead further increase rates and/or debt

Tell us why, and which reductions you would not proceed with if any: I'm totally against the proposed reductions. Cutting funding to arts, culture, transportation, climate change readiness, early childhood education, social services, and homelessness prevention will only exacerbate the problems faced by Aucklanders now and in the future. I do not accept that extreme austerity is the sane response to this budget problem; I think that increasing rates in line with inflation and borrowing money makes sense and can be managed reasonably. I would also suggest that the council consider the benefits of taxing higher earners more. Stripping social services, arts, culture, and education in Auckland will destroy the wellbeing of so many people, and it will only make economic inequality worse for the majority of us. It's also the worst time to cut funding to climate readiness; I cannot believe this is even being considered following the destruction of Cyclone Gabrielle. We need to be spending more on climate change preparedness, not ignoring the problem.

2. Amending Auckland International Airport Limited (AIAL) Shareholding Policy

Our proposed budget includes a planned change to the AIAL shareholding policy. This will allow us to sell some or all our shares in AIAL.

Selling all our shareholding (currently around 18% of shares in Auckland Airport) would reduce our debt by an estimated \$1.9 billion. This would reduce interest costs on our debt by around \$88 million per year, which is greater than what we'd expect to earn from the dividends if we kept the shares.

We have also considered other options, including both keeping all our shares and a partial sale that reduces our shareholding while maintaining at least 10 per cent (a so-called "blocking stake"). These options would contribute less towards our budget reduction target and require other actions – most likely by further increasing rates or debt (within existing policy limits).

What is your preference on this proposal to change the AIAL shareholding policy to enable the sale of all Auckland Council's shares? Enable a partial sale of our shares, maintaining a 10 per cent shareholding in AIAL (reducing our interest costs by around \$40 million per year), and further increase rates and/or debt

Tell us why: A partial sale of shares makes sense, but I would recommend keeping at least a 10% share in AIA for the reasons given above.

3. Managing rates and debt

To help with our budget challenge, we propose a total rates increase for the average value residential property of around **4.66 per cent or \$154 a year** (around \$3 a week) and to increase our use of debt by up to **\$75 million** in 2023/2024.

Rates

Our proposed 4.66 per cent total rates increase would be achieved by:

- An average increase in general rates of 7.0 per cent across all existing properties, including non-residential
- Reducing the Natural Environment Targeted Rate (NETR) and Water Quality Targeted Rate (WQTR) by around two thirds and using the money we have already collected from these targeted rates to continue delivering these work programmes as planned in 2023/2024
- Pausing our change to the split between business and residential rates. Under our current policy, annual increases to general rates for business properties are less than for non-business (residential and farm/lifestyle) properties, so that over time the share of general rates paid by business properties is fairer. Our proposal is to put this change on hold for one year

Debt

We propose to increase our use of debt by up to \$75 million for 2023/2024. This will be used to fund some capital expenditure (assets such as roads, pipes and buildings) that is currently planned to be funded by operating revenue (such as rates and user charges). This will free up that operating revenue to help address our budget shortfall.

What is your preference on our proposal to manage rates and debt? Other

Tell us why: My preference is to set a higher general rates increase (in line with current inflation), implement more taxes on the highest earners (especially for multiple home owners), and also make greater use of debt.

4. Storm Response

The impacts of the recent storm events beginning on Auckland Anniversary weekend could be substantial over time and we don't yet know the full costs.

Changes to our investment in land, infrastructure, buildings and equipment will be needed. Some new investments will be delayed so we can undertake urgent repairs and replacements.

Additionally, from 2023/2024, we are proposing to increase our operating budgets by around \$20 million each year to improve our ability to prepare for and respond to future storms. This would likely require rates to increase for 2023/2024 by around an additional 1 per cent (on top of the 4.66 per cent increase proposed to address our budget shortfall).

RESPONSE TO AUCKLAND COUNCIL'S PROPOSED BUDGET 2023-24

The Auckland creative sector is a significant economic contributor and generator of work and employment. The sector's future and growth in Tāmaki Makaurau relies on the experiences and skills that are, in part, developed through community arts and culture programmes, along with Tātaki Auckland Unlimited's economic development initiatives.

WeCreate is the alliance of Aotearoa's creative industries and major arts organisations, who collectively represent 30,000+ creators and creative businesses, over 40% of whom are based in Auckland¹.

Auckland is the 'Powerhouse' of Aotearoa New Zealand's economy. According to Infometrics, in the year to March 2022:

- GDP in Auckland measured \$133,749m, up 4.5% from a year earlier, and accounting for 37.4% of national GDP.
- Total employment in Auckland averaged 949,891, up 3.2% from a year earlier. Employment in New Zealand increased by 3.0% over the same period.

It is the region most severely impacted by COVID restrictions, and has recently suffered severe flood and cyclone damage, all of which it is still recovering from. Auckland and its people are currently the most fragile and vulnerable they have been for generations. Now is not the time to take away the things that give 'colour' and joy to the city, nor which keep people wanting to work, learn and visit here, and thereby keep our economy pumping. Creativity makes a city live - and be liveable.

WeCreate are aware that Council will be receiving numerous submissions from arts and culture organisations on the potentially devastating impacts of these Budget cuts to Auckland's liveability, vibrancy, and social cohesion and identity. Our individual member industries and organisations will also be making submissions specific to their own areas of concern. Whilst we have been engaged with the high-level development of these other submissions, and we share their concerns, our submission will focus on the likely highly negative impacts of the proposed Budget cuts on sustainable careers for Aucklanders, and the substantial risks to Auckland's future economic resilience and prosperity.

Most Auckland creative businesses are now highly digital and are 'weightless' exporters (eg. screen and music streaming, games & interactive media, digital publishing, digital visual arts, design and advertising, immersive cultural experiences, even fashion design and architecture), and they are therefore critical to our economic adaptation and resilience to climate change. Almost all parts of our creative ecosystem adapted to 'digital and online' during COVID restrictions – for many it was 'digital business-as-usual', reaching customers and audiences in New Zealand, and overseas.

The Auckland Plan 2050 states the aim that **‘Auckland is prosperous with many opportunities and delivers a better standard of living for everyone’**. Auckland Council has an economic development plan for the region – the most recent of these for 2021-2024 has the objectives of:

- Attracting people and investment
- Enabling thriving local economies
- Supporting quality jobs and skill development
- Preparing businesses for Auckland’s future
- Infrastructure that enables economic development
- Regulations that enable economic development

WeCreate submits that the proposed Budget cuts to arts & culture funding (including via Local Board funding), and to Tātaki Auckland Unlimited’s economic development strategies, expertise, and support, will result in failure to achieve these objectives. This poses an immense and imminent risk to the prosperity and opportunities for Aucklanders and their businesses, which will have a consequent economic effect nationally, and on Aotearoa’s talent pipeline and international reputation.

The Value of the Creative Economy to Auckland

According to Tātaki Auckland Unlimited (TAU) in 2022, the creative economy in Auckland:

- **Made up 5% of Auckland’s economy**
- **Directly employed more than 57,500 people**
- **Generated \$7.8bn in GDP (50% of NZ’s total creative GDP) and \$1.59bn in exports**
- **Grew by 5.4% on average over the past five years, outpacing the rest of the Auckland economy**
- **Has significant growth potential (forecasts predict 7,500 new jobs 2023-2028)**

Screen Auckland’s latest data shows that:

- **Screen (including production, post-production, and visual effects) is worth \$1.523 billion to the Auckland economy.**
- The sector directly employs 8405 people in Auckland – up from 7500 in 2021.
- There are 2322 screen business units located here – 48% of the national screen sector.

36% of NZ’s game development businesses are in Auckland, the largest concentration of any city in NZ.

- Interactive/game development is one of our fastest growing industries – worth \$407m in 2022 (97% of which is digital exports), and given the right support, is on track to be a \$1bn industry by 2025.²

Auckland is the **main hub of the NZ music industry, and a UNESCO City of Music** – with an estimated:

- 6000 songwriters, 2000 recording artists, 120 independent record labels, 254 venues reporting live music to OneMusic (licensing agency), including approximately 20 dedicated music venues, over 100 audio producers and approximately 35 recording studios, 173 artist managers and over 20 representative organisations.
- The music ecosystem is also comprised of event producers and contractors, independent record stores, music educators, music technology companies, music media companies,

designers, photographers and video makers and the live music segment has spill-over effects into hospitality and the visitor economy.

Auckland is the main hub for all other NZ creative industries – advertising, architecture, design, media, performing arts, photography, book publishing, creative tech and visual arts. There are 17,100 creative business units³ in Auckland – 47% of New Zealand’s creative companies – all people who are currently choosing to live and work in Auckland.

What’s good for Auckland is (almost always) good for Aotearoa New Zealand.

Work and Employment for Aucklanders

- **All creative industries derive their ideas and talent from artists.** Creative skills grow from exposure to creativity – at home, in arts education, and via community arts programmes. **Without these career pipelines, the economic viability of the sector in Auckland is at risk.**
- **Local government investment in arts and culture supports the grassroots of artists’ careers and the creative economy ecosystem** – it is the breeding ground for experimentation, which is often where innovation, new ideas, and the economic benefits of ‘the next big thing’ comes from.
- An artist’s creative practice is their ‘work’ or ‘job’, and this is often not well-understood by those who do not know the sector. The creative sector has double the number of freelancers and contractors than any other sector in the economy, and it is critical to support those individuals to enable their contribution to our society and economy.
- **Many of our least advantaged creatives get their careers started through community arts and culture organisations and programmes.**
- Access to arts and culture enables access to a rich and diverse education, enhancing social cohesion, and preparing young people with the skills needed in a changing world of work.

Economic Development Support and Strategy

- **Auckland is the only city in Aotearoa which has a comprehensive development plan for its creative economy, informed by sector leaders – [Create Auckland 2030](#) – which is led by TAU and has the ambition of making Tāmaki Makaurau a ‘global creative capital’. This type of coordinated support improves economic efficiency and contributes to improved productivity.**
- TAU has recognised the **economic importance of the creative ecosystem**, and its rapidly growing digital permutations (creative tech) to Aucklanders, and to visitors; now, and especially for the future.
- They are actively supporting creative Aucklanders, creative businesses and seeking investors for the city and the sector. **Every dollar TAU spends returns \$2 - \$4 in direct, indirect, and induced impacts within the city’s economy.⁴**
- **De-funding TAU’s economic development initiatives – via the loss of a significant portion of its operating budget and 100+ jobs for Aucklanders - is likely to eliminate [Create Auckland 2030](#), and the valuable data and insights, expertise, and connections which TAU have built up over many years.**

- **There will be particularly dire impacts on Auckland's burgeoning and highly productive screen, music, interactive and creative tech industries, and a negative impact on our growing international reputation and business prospects.**
- It is **international best-practice** for cities of scale, such as Auckland, to have **local/regional government agencies with a focus on growing and developing the Creative Economy**. (eg. multiple cities in the UK, Creative Victoria, Screen Queensland – please see the end of this document for Further Information).

Other Key Considerations

- **People with creative skills are vital to the Future of Work in all industries, and their roles are less susceptible to automation/Artificial Intelligence.**
- The 2019 Australian Government Report [Creative Skills for the Future Economy](#) found that creative skills, requiring original thought and innovation, are particularly resistant to automation and are likely to face relatively higher demand in the future across a wide range of industries. **Of Australia's top five most innovation-active industries, between 10 and 28 percent of employees held a creative qualification.**
- **Australia is incentivising games and screen production** people and businesses to work there – far more than NZ can currently compete with - this is a threat to the Auckland creative economy and talent pipeline.
- These incentives are included in Australia's [National Cultural Policy - Revive](#) – as they have recognised the contribution their creative industries have the potential to make. This policy will include the **establishment of new support bodies and programmes for music and literature, which will also likely incentivise more Auckland creatives to migrate to Australia.**
- The 'clustering' of industries within the creative economy creates **an agglomeration effect, driving productivity**. An example would be how a thriving screen sector creates opportunities for writers, musicians, tradespeople, and hospitality workers.
- **The creative economy creates 'spill-overs' into all areas of society and business:**
 - **Knowledge** – where new ideas, skills, innovations, and processes developed within the creative sector spill-over into the wider economy and society.
 - **Industry** – seen in productivity gains and innovations that flow from the creative sector into other types of businesses. **This is especially true of the impact of screen production and live events on the visitor and hospitality economies.**
 - **Network** – the spread of tacit knowledge and deeper/broader labour markets (agglomeration effects) which arise from a high density of arts or creative industries in a specific location.

- **WeCreate has asked Auckland Council:**
 - **What economic analysis has been done by Council on the impacts these cuts will have on Auckland's economy and employment, over the short, medium, and long term?**
 - **How many Aucklanders' jobs (outside those at Council and within CCOs) will be at risk – both via direct and indirect employment?**

We have not yet received a response to these questions.

Response to Auckland Council's Request for proposed solutions:

It is difficult to propose detailed solutions/options to overcome the Budget shortfall due to the lack of detailed financial information, and especially economic analysis of the impacts of the proposed cuts on Auckland's economy and employment prospects in the Consultation Documents. When faced with making difficult decisions – either in expenditure or in policy – best practice is to start with an evidence base. There is no evidence base for the proposed budget.

We are very concerned that the Budget proposals have been prepared without due diligence, and the impact on current and future generations of Aucklanders has not been properly considered and understood.

We suggest that a different mix of the levers available to Council be seriously considered:

- Further rates increases inclined towards owners of above average CV properties. The proposed rates increases are below the current rate of inflation, and they would disproportionately impact the owners of low-value properties, who would pay a greater percentage increase than the owners of high-value properties. Wellington, which faces significant issues of its own, is proposing a 12.8% rates increase for 2023-24.
- Borrowing – the consultation document states that Council will make 'modest' use of debt of up to \$75m to protect from future uncertainty. We propose that due to the current social and economic vulnerability of Auckland, now is the time to borrow and invest to future-proof the city. There could be a role for central Government in supporting/underwriting further borrowing.
- Consider further asset sales in addition to the Council shareholding in Auckland International Airport – but being careful not to damage the provision of much-needed community facilities.
- Consider adjustments to current accounting practices, such as how depreciation of assets impacts the Council's Budget.

We urge Councillors to reject this current Budget proposal, to consider a different mix of financial levers other than decimating community investment, and to immediately undertake robust analysis of the impact that any revised proposal will have on the prosperity and prospects of all Aucklanders.

Now is the time to invest in the recovery, and future resilience and prosperity, of Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland, and its people.



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A Better Budget for Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland

The Council – led by Mayor Wayne Brown – has put forward a 2023-2024 draft budget for public consultation. The Council says a \$295m financial hole needs to be filled. It proposes: general spending cuts, selling the Council's shares in Auckland International Airport, an average 4.66% rates increase, up to \$75 million in borrowing.

How did we get here?

The Council proposal says the financial pressures come from an expansion in services and assets that has brought higher maintenance costs, worsened by high interest rates and inflation. Cyclone Gabrielle and recent flooding events have added further financial strain.

Recent years have seen increased inflation and interest rates. **But some of the pressures on Council are temporary and others have been overstated.** A major reason for revenue being lower than it otherwise would be is COVID-19, a pandemic experienced by thousands of councils and governments worldwide. Non-rates revenue has remained steady, as the table on the left shows. Revenue from Council venues, services, and public transport is likely to grow over time as Auckland recovers from COVID-19.

Interest rates are projected to fall over time,¹ and Council acknowledges that 80-100% of its borrowing is at fixed rates – which means only a small part of its borrowing is affected by short-term increases in interest rates.² The budget was prepared before floods and Cyclone Gabrielle; these events will require reconstruction, but central government has partnered for that.

“Signs that inflation will ease meaningfully over 2023 are becoming increasing clear.”³

Auckland Council is not facing a debt crisis: Auckland's debt is at 250% of its revenue, well below the 290% debt ceiling. Total debt as a ratio to revenue has been relatively stable (see graph on the right). The cost of servicing interest increased in 2022 as a proportion of total revenues, but the overall trend is declining.

Why can we do better?

The proposed cuts will have irreversible long-term impacts.

The axing of operational spending could mean a permanent end to the services and institutions that help to make Auckland a community.


The cuts could affect – among other things – cultural events, library services (including services that support community safety), Māori and Pasifika employment (through reduced support of The Southern Initiative and The Western Initiative), Early Childhood Education services, and organisations like the Citizens Advice Bureau that allow people to access their minimum legal rights. Events and organisations may disappear due to the cuts.

Selling the airport shares does not add up. The loss of the 18% shareholding in Auckland International Airport would make the city permanently poorer and would remove people's level of control over a strategic asset. The Council proposal does not consider the loss of a stake in the airport's extensive landholding. It will be very difficult to return the land and future value of the shares to the public once these shares are sold. This has implications for:

1. **Māori land interests: the Waitangi Tribunal cannot recommend return of private land, so airport land will be permanently alienated from Māori.**
2. **Future climate and other emergencies: we need coordinated transport hubs, which is harder when airports are privatised.**

Our communities are more important than ever. Cyclone Gabrielle and the recent floods show that community organisations (such as Visionwest Community Trust, which will be affected by the cuts) are essential as a source of food, shelter, and social support in times of emergency. These organisations make a community resilient. Eliminating these organisations makes individuals and communities more vulnerable and precarious.



Citizens Advice Bureaus face closure as a result of proposed cuts. Going by 2022 figures, this is estimated to impact 163,000 people seeking access to assistance concerning their legal rights, including in relation to immigration, MSD, and KiwiSaver.

There are many more options available than what the Budget Proposal suggests. The proposal suggests the public will have to accept the budget, or face a 13.5% increase in rates, or increased borrowing. But many other combinations of rates, borrowing, charges, and central government support are possible, such as:



How can we do better?



Local Government Act 2002

When considering alternative options, a starting point is that the Council does not have to run a 'balanced budget'. The law says councils have a Balanced budget requirement but that they only have to 'balance the books' if it would not be "financially prudent" to do so (for example, if cutting services creates its own financial costs), factoring in the need to maintain services set out in a long-term plan. **But if the Council is intent on 'balancing the books', another budget is possible.** The Council has not made it easy to construct another budget by imposing a very short (one month) timeframe on the consultation process, but a budget does not need to be finalised until June and it is still feasible to develop alternative proposals.

Council is opting to pause two important targeted rates and they don't have to do that. The Council says its reserves from the Water Quality Targeted Rate and the Natural Environment Targeted Rate are not spent, and that these rates can be suspended for a year. Now is not the time to freeze funding for water quality or the natural environment.

Increasing borrowing avoids the need for community cuts and sale of airport shares

Council can borrow more. The Council is proposing to borrow \$75 million. Council says that it cannot borrow more than \$140m without breaching internal policy, but as the Council these policies can be adjusted (as the Council has recognised by acknowledging it would need to amend its airport shareholding policy to sell off its shares). Combining borrowing with a strong revenue plan, ensures Auckland's strong credit rating is not impacted.

The existing rates proposal will provide necessary revenue. This general rates increase, along with increased borrowing and unfreezing targeted rates, can provide \$295m in revenue.⁴ This alternative budget plan will address the shortfall and provide the foundation for a budget that is more flexible, fairer, and better for Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland over the long-term. Building on this foundation, **Auckland Council should be investing now** – in tourism, public transport, the arts, and other social services. Investing in the city will bring revenue back. That investment can be funded through the same mix of borrowing and rates set out here. This plan demonstrates that the budget shortfall can be addressed, if necessary. Cutting and selling are no way to bring Auckland back on its feet – and back to its best.

Reducing public transport services will not save \$21 million, it will in fact cost Aucklanders. By cutting public transport, Aucklanders will be reliant on expensive and inefficient cars. The operating costs of increased car use will vastly outweigh the projected \$21 million savings. Furthermore, the requirement to continue investing in inefficient car infrastructure will push Auckland council's roading upkeep bill ever higher, increasing debt, and worsening our council's ability to service the population. A small increase in rates is the cheapest and most efficient way of covering the transport needs of Aucklanders.

AA calculated that the cost of owning and operating a small, fuel efficient car is around \$8,000 a year [1]. The cost of rates for a house valued near the average of \$1,000,000 will be around \$2,500. These numbers speak for themselves but I'll spell it out: a single car household is spending 4x as much on their car than on their rates. A double car household is paying 8x as much on their cars as on their rates. The cost of rates is trivial compared to the cost of car ownership. Cutting bus services will force greater car usage, and greater car ownership. Aucklanders will not save \$21 million dollars by cutting bus services. Cutting services will make Aucklanders poorer.

On the infrastructure cost side of the equation, let's take the Northern transport corridor as an example. There are, in places, 5 lanes of motorway running from the city center to the North. 1 is reserved for busses, the Northern Expressway. 4 are mixed use, mostly cars. Last year, more than 50% of trips over the harbour bridge were made in busses traveling along the Northern Expressway. The 1 bus lane is responsible for over 50% of trips, each of the other 4 are responsible for less than 12.5% each. So this singular bus lane is more than 4x as efficient at transporting Aucklanders than our regular roads. This difference in efficiency is common across all of Auckland. Our public transport infrastructure moves more people for less money than our regular roading infrastructure. Suggesting we can save money by cutting investment into the more efficient transport infrastructure is wrong.

It is simply not plausible to claim that reducing public transport services will save Aucklanders money.

Submission: Do not proceed with reducing funding to Tātaki Auckland Unlimited, (TAU) as it affects the operating budget of the Auckland Art Gallery Toi o Tāmaki. Do not proceed with reduced opening hours or introduction of entry charges at the Auckland Art Gallery Toi o Tāmaki.

A public art gallery is an institution for human flourishing, guiding us all to new possibilities as we imagine and create more fulfilling lives and thriving communities. Art changes lives and the Auckland Art Gallery Toi o Tāmaki provides transformational experiences to a diverse audience.

Cuts already proposed to the Gallery's operating budget leaves it with a bare bones operating budget of \$9.5m pa, after shared TAU services fees are deducted. This is compared to \$32.2m and \$18.6m that Auckland Museum and MOTAT received in full respectively in 2022-2023. This imbalance between the city's major cultural institutions leads to a great loss for the city – of tangata/people, of access to and care of the art taonga/treasures and of the future creation of culture in Aotearoa. And, unbelievably, TAU is expected to propose even more cuts.

The tangata/people at the Auckland Art Gallery Toi o Tāmaki believe deeply in the significance of art to impact our everyday lives. Their knowledge and experience cannot easily be replaced. Highly skilled in developing outstanding visual art exhibitions, public programmes and valuable archives, they provide stimulation, education and well-being for all who visit the gallery. Close to 500,000 will visit in 2023. (MOTAT, 2022: 100,554 visits, Museum, 2022: 488,553 visits)

As kaitiaki/guardians, skilled visual art specialists care for the Gallery's irreplaceable collection. The 17,000 artworks are our national treasure, owned by the citizens of Auckland, with national and international importance. As a leader, the Gallery then attracts bequests, gifts and long term loans.

Entry charges do not work. There is plenty of data from independent researchers to demonstrate that the introduction of entry charges to the Gallery in 2018/19 caused significant harm for the gallery – around 30% less visitors, 60% less people joining guided tours and significant losses for the Gallery's other income revenue offerings, such as the shop and the café.

Key community services like public transportation, safe cycling infrastructure, access to community spaces and libraries, services like the CAB, and arts and culture are critical to making it through. Furthermore, those who are already most disadvantaged will be pushed to the brink by this strategy. I, a person with decent means, would rather pay increased rates and see the city take on necessary debt than lose access to the things that make this city a decent place to live.

Auckland Council funding is crucial to us as a \$1.46m (2022 turnover) performing arts organisation. Even with Covid-19 continuing to have a major impact on our outcomes last year, forcing the cancellation of a 4 week tour in April/May, our company presented 151 performances in 2022.

Regional Arts & Culture has provided invaluable funds towards our business and board development without which our recent Strategic Plan would not be as robust, and Local Board funding provides assistance in a myriad of ways from theatre venue hire to providing equitable access to our shows to children who would normally never attend a theatre production.

In light of climate change and given the congestion on Auckland roads cutting back on public transport seems ridiculous. Council should support the use of public transport not through multi-million dollar vanity projects by ensuring busses, ferries and trains run regularly and on time and offer a real alternative to driving cars around town. Local board funding should not be cut neither the \$3million contestable art funding. These funding opportunities are vital for many grass roots organizations and local community and support building and strengthening communities.

I'm happy for Council to cut money from Tātaki Auckland Unlimited budget to deliver services such as and including economic development and tourism promotion. Private tourism operators, companies and corporates benefitting from tourism and other economic development should pay for promoting these initiatives and not the ratepayers of Auckland. The same with Council directly providing early childhood education services. There are plenty of private operators who can do this instead.

Charging tourists and out of towners a nominal entrance charge to some arts and cultural organizations is not unreasonable and especially given they do not contribute via rates or taxes to the upkeep of any of these organizations. For example, Auckland Museum successfully charges international tourists while Auckland Art Gallery does not.

Submission to Auckland Council on 2023/2024 Annual Plan and budget

Introducing SASOC

SASOC is a coalition of community groups spread around the northern edge of the Waitemata Harbour and within the central Auckland isthmus. It was formed to represent their general concern about water quality withing the Auckland isthmus and the wider Auckland region generally.

SASOC's specific concerns include

- the aging Victorian era combined stormwater/wastewater pipe network,
- the role of stormwater on the overflows from that network, and
- the effects of stormwater run-off from roading and other impermeable surfaces (some of the latter resulting from intensification of building within the isthmus).

Although focused on the isthmus, SASOC supports a holistic Auckland-wide solution to the city's water quality issues.

AUCKLAND ISTHMUS WATER QUALITY IMPROVEMENTS

The need for improvement of the combined sewer system was first raised in 1917 (source: Auckland Council). Since then, a number of plans have been made for sewer separation on the isthmus. None has so far been completed. In the late 1990's the then Auckland City Council designed a multi-year plan for incremental wastewater and sewer separation. Considerable work was done until the Auckland Supercity amalgamation when the process ceased.

More recently, starting with Council's long term plan in 2018, a new initiative to improve water quality was established for the western parts of the Auckland isthmus – this included a joint venture between Watercare and Auckland

Council known as the Western Isthmus Water Quality Improvement Programme, or, more simply, the Western Isthmus programme (WIP). Its objective was to reduce combined sewer overflows substantially, through separation and use of the new Central Interceptor. A Water Quality Targeted Rate (WQTR) was introduced. Most of this rate is used to finance Auckland Council's agreed \$350m contribution to the WIP. A similar programme has been put in place for parts of the eastern isthmus, with provision in the WQTR for some funding of infrastructure improvements in that programme.

EFFECTS OF INFLATION ON WESTERN ISTHMUS PROJECT

When the project was set up all parties acknowledged that the WIP was based on 2018-dollar values for infrastructure construction. Cost inflation since then has increased the projected cost significantly – there is currently a shortfall of \$100m on the Auckland Council contribution to the WIP (source: Auckland Council; Healthy Waters department).

AUCKLAND COUNCIL ANNUAL BUDGET 2023/2024

The Annual Budget 2023/2024 Consultation Document discusses the western and eastern isthmus water quality projects:

- It proposes reducing the WQTR “by around two-thirds” (at p 16):
 - “...we are also proposing the following changes to our current rates charges:
 - reducing the Natural Environment Targeted Rate and Water Quality Targeted Rate by around two-thirds and utilising the money we have already collected from these targeted rates to continue to deliver these work programmes in 2023/2024.”
- Under the heading ‘What are we planning to deliver in 2023/2024’ it states that the Water Quality Targeted Rate programme will continue in 2023/2024 (at p 26)”:
 - “Continue the Water Quality Targeted Rate programme
 - Western and eastern isthmus water quality improvement programmes.
 - Safe Networks – investigate and eliminate sources of wastewater entering our popular swimming beaches.
 - Safe septic – a proactive regional compliance monitoring for private onsite wastewater systems, such as septic tanks.
 - Restore the health and mauri of the Kaipara Harbour through the Kaipara Moana Remediation programme.”

- Later under the heading ‘Temporarily reducing the Natural Environment Targeted Rate and Water Quality Targeted Rate’ it refers to the purpose and effect of the introduction of the WQTR (at p 53):

“In 2018 ... we ... introduced the WQTR to bring forward our 30- year plan to invest in cleaning up Auckland’s beaches, harbours, streams, and aquifers. To date, revenue collected from these rates has been more than what we have spent due to different phasing of revenue and expenditure and the impacts that COVID has had on our planned investments. This has resulted in the WQTR ... accumulating reserve funds of \$33m ... as at 30 June 2022.

Temporarily reducing these rates and using funding from reserves enables us to continue delivering these programmes as planned while providing temporary support to ratepayers. This will reduce rates for an average residential property by around ... \$46 for the WQTR

We would need to return these targeted rates to their full level in 2024/2025 to ensure that these programmes continue within the planned timeframes.”

These “reserve funds” were part of the planning for the WIP, which anticipated that the majority of funds would be spent toward the end of the programme. The WQTR was designed to even out the impact on ratepayers (ie to avoid an annually fluctuating targeted rate). The “reserve funds” are already allocated, just not yet spent.

The statement that Council “would need to return to these targeted rates to their full level in 2024/2025 to ensure these programmes continue within the planned timeframes” appears to be a statement of hope rather than one of intention.

EFFECTS OF AUCKLAND COUNCIL ANNUAL 2023/2024 BUDGET ON THE WIP

What seems clear from this is that, depending on what proportion of the proposed WQTR is to be provided for the WIP, there will be a further WIP shortfall of some \$20-24 M. That will exacerbate the overall shortfall to at least \$120M.

CONCLUSION AND SUBMISSION

The statement that the proposed WQTR hiatus would permit the western isthmus programme to continue within the planned timeframe is untenable (we suspect that the same issue applies to the eastern isthmus programme).

The budget for the western isthmus programme was set on a predetermined annual level of rates input via the WQTR. The “reserve funds” outlined in the Annual Budget 2023/2024 Consultation Document do not exist. Any reduction in the Water Quality Targeted Rate will exacerbate the already existing \$100m shortfall.

We request that the Water Quality Targeted Rate be retained at its designed level as was intended. This is essential so that Auckland Council can meet the requirements for the WIP joint venture (as well as the planned eastern isthmus programme). The cost of retaining the WQTR will be minimal on a per ratepayer basis.

The alternative, further deferral of infrastructure “catch up”, is indefensible in light of history of under-funding, the effects of which were demonstrated so obviously in late January/early February.
