In part this is due to the last CV valuations being too high, resulting in purchasers paying too much for properties and having mortgages that are extremely high, while their properties have decreased in value. The council errored in these valuations, and should not be asking households to fund bad decisions such as excessive road cones and unused raised pedestrian crossings.

By and large I applaud the initiatives of the council presented here and think they are mostly sensible. I have lived in Auckland for just over four years and think it is one of the most beautiful cities I have ever lived in. However, the single thing that holds Auckland back in my view is its outdated transport system. I choose to cycle to work whenever possible from Onehunga to Grey Lynn, but for most of that trip I am risking my life by sharing lanes with cars. Much like most of the rest of Aotearoa, we are now suffering the results of decades of car-dependent development and underinvestment in public and active transport. This has now resulted in congestion that is far greater than warranted for the size of our city, increased air pollution and the health problems that come with it, and soaring greenhouse gas emissions. I would like to see much more emphasis put on reversing this ugly trend and investing heavily in healthy and sustainable transport infrastructure. This is much cheaper than building more roads, and results in benefits that are well established and too many to list here. This can be done by: - Investing in fast and affordable cycleways (e.g. pop-up bike lanes a.k.a. the Concrete Tim Tam) and public transport infrastructure (e.g. bus priority lanes). This can be done quickly and cheaply by reallocating road space e.g. parking, and building in improvements during routine road upgrades. - Delivering planned cycleways e.g. the Te Whau pathway and Hobsonville Cycleway as priorities - Progressing the City Centre Master Plan, including retaining the safe cycleway the length of Victoria Street. - Replacing level crossings with walking and cycling over/underpasses. - Building traffic calming features into roads (which again can be done during routine roadworks) - Investing more into climate action programmes e.g. Live Lightly and the Climate Action Grant - Centring new developments on public transport hubs e.g. train stations - Providing cycling connectivity to and bicycle parking at public transport hubs - Providing access for bicycles on buses (e.g. onboard bike racks). - Removing barriers for the intensification of housing to medium density, and allowing mixed use neighbourhoods in most areas of the city, rather than continuing the endless expansion of car-dependent low-density suburbs. I want my kids to be able to get around our city quickly, cheaply and safely with or without a car, and adopting transit-oriented development is the best and most cost-effective way to achieve this.

What about Mangere, I've loved watching a few performances at Mangere Arts Centre but some locals say it sits dead most of the week, so why couldn't the library be added into this facility and make it a real asset for the community especially for the youth who could do with more reading if access to books were more visible! Be more strategic with how you are targeting the youth! And what about that gallery space in Otara, a waste of space really I've only ever seen it with staff! I am not discrediting or disregarding for artists, I am surrounded by family of artists but have seen them work in different community settings to talk art and show art and most important they need exposure and from what I've seen I will have to work really hard myself to promote any work in a gallery setting. Artists should be able to take the space and create from so Why couldn't an artist do that in your library space or other well used spaces or centres where I would get more exposure? It is likely because they haven't really been asked to. Your gallery space only seems open to a niche audience but art is for everyone! Can't you combine these services and save our public money on asset maintenance and wont you reduce overhead by combining these types of community services? Redirect some of those funds to pay for more local art in your busy centres.

## Question 2: Destination management and major events

Attracting visitors and securing, promoting and delivering major events are vital to Auckland being a dynamic and exciting city. In our Long-term Plan 2024-2034, we said we would continue to fund cultural festivals and other significant community events. However, without a bed night visitor levy, there will be a \$7 million budget shortfall for funding of major events that are expected to attract visitor expenditure, such as the ASB Classic, Auckland Marathon and Auckland Writers Festival, from the 2025/2026 financial year. We continue to advocate to central government to introduce this levy. A bed night visitor levy of 2.5 per cent to 3 per cent paid by those in short-stay accommodation, would raise around \$27 million each year to fund even more destination management, marketing and major events activities in Auckland.

A bed night visitor levy requires central government legislative change and they have yet to agree to introduce this legislation. We continue to work with central government on this and your views will help inform this work.

I am picking rubbish once a week and sick of seeing people dumping stuff all around. Such a great country with unique nature - but some people don't understand. Other than that - I am happy with Auckland Council and would love to thank you for everything you're doing. Called you multiple times on different issues (rubbish, people uprooting freshly planted trees, bad smell, abandoned cars) - every single time you deliver and I am grateful for this.

My local guests (NZers) versus International is approx 5%NZ & 95% International. Very seldom do my International guests come for the events Auckland Council provide, and if they do they only stay a short time 1 to 4 nights but usually 1 to 2 nights. Locals often only stay 1 night. Never more than 2 they have responsibilities at home to get back to. They almost all come to stay with me to attend a concert. Almost never an event put on by Auckland Council. I always ask what they have come to Auckland for. Why should 95% of my guests pay a bed tax for every night of the year, to support events they have not come to NZ to be part of. It would make much more sense to have a USER PAY CHARGE. That is add a surcharge to the event ticket not to a bed that is not being slept in by most of the attendees at the event. A surcharge per event attendee is a much fairer, targeted way to ask for funding. User pays. If you add a bed tax to the other charges paid by visitors - Arrival fee at border, GST, STR platform fee and host service fee, you will completely kill tourism in Auckland. It is teetering on the edge now as winter approaches. A bed tax could be the death knell not only for STR but also many hotels are struggling with up to 15 new hotels opened in the last few years and 17% fewer tourists compared to pre covid. A bed night visitor levy should be approved at central government level and not local government if it is ever going to be introduced.. As much as applying a bed night visitor levy is the most convenient method to collect this tax, accommodation providers are not the only business that benefits from increased visitor numbers i.e. restaurants, bars, taxi, retail, tourist operators). This levy will only every be collected by legitimate hotel accommodation providers (who already comply with all regulations at great cost) with Air bnb businesses potentially slipping though the catchment even though they are also a provider of short-stay accommodation. In the current market it is increasingly difficult to sustain the discounting that hotels are having to endure to attract visitors to their properties. Numbers are not there and competition is huge especially when you factor in the third party on-line travel agents like Booking.com & Expedia who are collecting huge amounts of commission on the back of the current low occupancy levels. We do not want to kill the Auckland accommodation industry which is already perceived as expensive by New Zealanders (and Australians). Pricing and additonal levies will impact how people travel by either shortening a stay or by reducing the times that they will come. Guest expectation would be that hotels reduce their rates in order to compensate for the applied levy. This in turn would affect the GST take which currently is significant from this industry with not a lot going back to the regions that it was collected from. The last thing we want to do it kill the golden goose. What about business travellers (especially New Zealand business travellers) - this is just another cost to factor in to their pricing and can they claim it back as a business expense? As it is, businesses are looking for the cheapest room rates. I would not want to see Auckland or Queenstown singled out for a bed night levy. If a levy is to be introduced by central government then it should apply across the board i.e. all of New Zealand. I do not believe small accommodation providers i.e. motels, hostels, airbnb etc (i.e. under 40 rooms) should be included in a bed night visitor levy as their rates generally stay stable all year round and they are used mainly by tradies, families, retirees, those with medical appointments, those that require accommodation between houses or after a disaster etc). Central government collected \$4.1 billion in tourism GST in FY2024, but not enough of that was reinvested

into the tourism industry or shared with the regions where it was collected. This is where funding for events and conventions should come from.

### **Have Your Say – Auckland Council Annual Plan 2025-26**

*We submit on behalf of 57 member hotels*

Hotel Council Aotearoa (**HCA**) represents 255 New Zealand hotels, 57 of which are in Auckland. Those 57 hotels in Tamaki Makaurau have a combined 9,415 guest rooms.

Auckland hotels employ approximately 7,080 full-time and part-time staff. In addition, hotels make massive investments in promoting both Auckland and New Zealand. We estimate that Auckland hotels collectively spent \$100-130 million in sales/promotion and agent commissions during 2024 alone, which is substantially more than any tourism marketing carried out by Auckland Council and/or Tataki Auckland Unlimited (**TAU**). Auckland hotels also contribute \$2-3 million in funding towards the voluntary Destination Partnership Programme established by TAU.

Hotels are one of Auckland Council's key constituencies. HCA estimates Auckland's hotels paid \$15.5 million in rates during the 2023 calendar year, but no doubt Auckland Council has access to the actual number.

HCA's policy positions are member-led and ultimately set by a board of elected officers. Many of our member hotels are reluctant to provide individual feedback or make public comment about Auckland Council for fear of backlash. Therefore, when Auckland Council analyses the results of this consultation exercise, we ask that you give appropriate weight to our submission including recognising the full extent of our contribution to what should be a thriving and prosperous Auckland visitor economy.

#### *Hotel sector's feedback, in short*

In HCA's submission, these three things are true:

1. **Auckland Council is underinvesting in event attraction and destination marketing**, which is having a negative impact on the Auckland visitor economy, ultimately to the detriment of all Aucklanders. This is something that Auckland Council has the power to quickly remedy, if it has the political will to do so.
2. **Aucklanders should receive more of a direct economic benefit from tourism in Auckland.** This is a challenging and long-standing problem not just in Auckland, but across all of New Zealand. Central government collected \$4.1 billion in tourism GST in FY2024, but not enough of that was reinvested into the tourism industry or shared with the regions where it

was collected. It will take trust-building and collaboration to resolve the tourism funding problem once and for all. Solutions are unlikely to be quick or easy.

3. **Auckland Council has for many years now chosen to work independently of industry on the tourism funding problem** outlined in 2 above. Instead of partnering with industry and supporting a unified message to central government and the public, Auckland Council has instead promoted schemes and ideas *at odds with what industry can support*, at times taking pot-shots at our sector. Unfortunately, these tactics decrease the likelihood of solving the national tourism funding problem in the near term.

*Auckland Council should find funds to support event attraction and destination marketing*

We have submitted on this issue in three previous Annual Plan consultations. HCA acknowledges that Councillors must always balance competing spending priorities. However, it is *not correct* for Auckland Council to claim it lacks the tools or revenue streams to support event attraction and destination marketing at reasonable levels.

Auckland Council has:

- **More than \$6.67 billion in annual revenue**, an increase of 67% since 2017 when total revenue was \$4.12 billion. Back then, Auckland Council readily found funding to support Auckland Tourism Events & Economic Development (**ATEED**);
- **Significant growth in hotel sector-connected rates income**, given that Auckland hotel rooms supply has increased by almost one-third since 2017;
- **A geographic targeted rate mechanism funding Heart of the City**, which could readily be adjusted to help raise additional funds for CBD event attraction and destination marketing, noting that accommodation providers receive just 10 cents out of every dollar of tourist spending; and
- **Recent liquidation of its investment in Auckland International Airport for \$2.14 billion**, which could have easily supported event attraction and destination marketing for the foreseeable future, without materially compromising Auckland Council's other plans for use of the money raised.

The New Zealand International Convention Centre opens soon in Auckland. Auckland Council has endorsed a revamped Eden Park over the idea of a new CBD stadium. The City Rail Link comes online next year. It seems inconceivable that Auckland Council can champion these sorts of multi-billion dollar tourism infrastructure initiatives while at the same time essentially defunding event attraction and destination marketing. As each of these assets opens for business, it becomes even more important for Auckland Council to set aside funds for activating the visitor economy and attracting high-spending domestic and international tourists to actually use them.

You cannot have lots of expensive hardware and then refuse to buy software. If we want “nice things” like modern CBD public transport, world-class stadia, America’s Cup visits and lucrative international conventions, then Auckland Council simply must take event attraction and destination marketing seriously.

Plenty of other regional authorities across New Zealand and Australia support event attraction and destination marketing properly with the *exact same revenue-raising tools that Auckland Council already has at its disposal*.



For many tourism industry businesses – including for hotels – it feels as if Auckland Council has been “playing chicken” with event attraction and destination marketing spend, perhaps as punishment for industry’s longstanding opposition to the Accommodation Provider Targeted Rate or to build pressure on central government.

It is beyond time for Auckland Council to normalise levels of event attraction and destination funding, taking account of its fortunate position as gateway for 70% of international visitors and New Zealand’s most international city.

With political will around the Council table, HCA is confident that \$15-20 million in funding could be re-prioritised towards event attraction and destination marketing. Unfortunately, however, it may be too late for TAU to build a reasonable calendar of events for winter 2025.

*Next steps on solving the longstanding tourism funding problem in New Zealand*

HCA has long called for Auckland Council to work in genuine partnership with industry around principles for a fair and reasonable tourism funding solution based on international best-practice. HCA is not against creation of a new tourism levy attaching to accommodation stays, provided such a mechanism is “done once and done right” across New Zealand with comprehensive central government legislation. There are many technical issues to plan for in creating a new levy on all accommodation sector revenues, but these are readily solved for if everyone works together.

Industry is firmly against “quick fix” local bed taxes based on the regional fuel levy or with detail/technical issues pushed down to non-expert council bureaucrats. Old-fashioned American or European bed taxes have come under pressure since COVID with many of them being repurposed away from tourism. In return for potentially supporting a new national levy on accommodation, the hotel sector is entitled to stand firm when calling for a modern and sustainable new mechanism rather than quick fix solutions based on old-fashioned precedents.

HCA and other accommodation sector and tourism industry lobby groups continue to promote a national funding solution with central government Ministers and also opposition parties. Cross-bench collaboration on tourism funding solutions is both desirable and achievable. HCA has good insight into central government’s views with regards to sharing future tourism receipts with local authorities.

Once again, we invite Auckland Council to work more closely with industry on this issue of critical importance to Auckland and all of New Zealand. HCA fully understands Auckland Council’s key concerns and needs around tourism funding. We are *still* not convinced that Auckland Council officials fully understand the needs and concerns of the hotel sector.

Business Onehunga hereby submits its strong objection to the proposed 6.8% increase in business rates for average-value business properties, as outlined in the Annual Plan 2025-2026. We recall that during the Long-Term Plan Budget deliberations last year, Auckland Council, despite significant objections from OBA and other Business Improvement Districts, resolved to maintain the Business Rates Differential at 31%. This decision was made against previous agreements to reduce the differential to approximately 25% over the coming years. The current proposal to further increase business rates to ensure the collection of 31% of total rates income from business properties represents an inequitable burden on our business community. This increase is particularly concerning given the already challenging economic climate and the council's previous

commitment to reducing the rates burden on businesses. This increase will disproportionately affect small businesses, which form the backbone of our community. Mixed use zones provide important business spaces in BID areas. It provides for transitional areas between residential and business zones. It is often characterised by smaller lot sizes and smaller businesses than business or industrial zones and often has service and retail. To support compact urban form, provide work opportunities close to residential areas and the ability to service daily household needs with minimal travel it is important that mixed use, business and industrial zones remain attractive and viable for small businesses. There is the risk that mixed use zones transition to being residential dominated at the expense of business space as costs increase. We maintain that this proposed increase is unfair and unsustainable. It undermines the economic vitality of Onehunga and the wider Auckland region. The current rate burden on businesses is already substantial, and an additional 6.8% increase will significantly impact our members' ability to operate and invest in their businesses. We urge Auckland Council to reconsider this proposal and to adhere to the previously agreed-upon trajectory of reducing the Business Rates Differential. We believe that a fair and balanced approach to rates setting is essential for fostering a thriving business environment and ensuring the long-term prosperity of Auckland.

**BUSINESS ONEHUNGA'S SUBMISSION TO  
AUCKLAND COUNCIL ANNUAL BUDGET 2025/26**

Business Onehunga, established in 1937, has been a cornerstone of our community for over 85 years. We provide vital support to our approximately 1100 member businesses through advocacy, crime prevention, member engagement, and events, working in close partnership with local residents and government. We would like to acknowledge Auckland Council's continued support in maintaining our targeted rate at \$1 million for the upcoming financial year, enabling us to effectively serve our membership. This proactive approach significantly alleviates the burden on Auckland Council within our vibrant town centre.

In 2024, we successfully expanded our membership following extensive consultation and engagement. This growth reflects the significant role Onehunga plays in Auckland and New Zealand's economy. Alongside Penrose, Onehunga houses critical infrastructure and industries, including heavy rail distribution, the Police helicopter base, electricity transmission, waste management, and significant recreational assets such as Waikaraka Speedway and Mt Smart Stadium.

Strategically located at the geographic centre of Auckland, Onehunga has been a focal point for numerous regional and national projects. While these projects have brought benefits, we are eager to collaborate with Auckland Council to unlock the full potential of our business community, complementing the substantial private sector investment of the past decade.

As part of Auckland's network of 51 Business Improvement Districts (BIDs), representing an estimated \$72.7 billion in capital value, Business Onehunga plays a crucial role in fostering a thriving business environment. We are committed to driving innovation, prosperity, and employment, attracting new businesses, customers, and visitors to Onehunga.

We share Auckland Council's vision of promoting the city's economic prosperity. The Council's role in delivering efficient core services is essential to this goal. To maintain Auckland's competitive edge, continued investment in attracting visitors, securing major events, and supporting economic development is paramount.

**Managing rates and debt in business zones**

Business Onehunga hereby submits its strong objection to the proposed 6.8% increase in business rates for average-value business properties, as outlined in the Annual Plan 2025–2026.

We recall that during the Long-Term Plan Budget deliberations last year, Auckland Council, despite significant objections from OBA and other Business Improvement Districts, resolved to maintain the Business Rates Differential at 31%. This decision was made against previous agreements to reduce the differential to approximately 25% over the coming years.

The current proposal to further increase business rates to ensure the collection of 31% of total rates income from business properties represents an inequitable burden on our business community. This increase is particularly concerning given the already challenging economic climate and the council's previous commitment to reducing the rates burden on businesses. This increase will disproportionately affect small businesses, which form the backbone of our community.

Mixed use zones provide important business spaces in BID areas. It provides for transitional areas between residential and business zones. It is often characterised by smaller lot sizes and smaller businesses than business or industrial zones and often has service and retail. To support compact urban form, provide work opportunities close to residential areas and the ability to service daily household needs with minimal travel it is important that mixed use, business and industrial zones remain attractive and viable for small businesses. There is the risk that mixed use zones transition to being residential dominated at the expense of business space as costs increase.

We maintain that this proposed increase is unfair and unsustainable. It undermines the economic vitality of Onehunga and the wider Auckland region. The current rate burden on businesses is already substantial, and an additional 6.8% increase will significantly impact our members' ability to operate and invest in their businesses.

We urge Auckland Council to reconsider this proposal and to adhere to the previously agreed-upon trajectory of reducing the Business Rates Differential. We believe that a fair and balanced approach to rates setting is essential for fostering a thriving business environment and ensuring the long-term prosperity of Auckland.

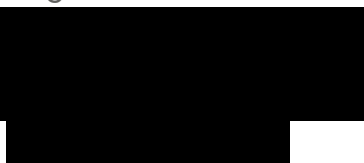
