I would like to add comment to the Transportation part: Transportation is the engine to the city's prosperity because without it people would not move, then no spend on anything else. Though there are plans to build to improve transport which takes long time and covers only certain areas only, there is a quick and better way to move all people around. This is by reducing the bus/train tickets to \$1-\$2 per trip. Currently the cost of two stages to the city is \$8.5 return. (if you drive parking is \$11 in some area). There is no much incentive to take bus. With transport price so high, people would not want to go to town to enjoy any types of events casually (unless there is specific good one like the Guo Pei exhibition). If people are willing to use bus with affordable pricing (a



price level that people dont need to have a second thought), then people will go wherever/whenever they want to. The lost on the short term transport income can be compensated by more people willing to go out using buses/trains, more spend on events/activities which will benefit the businesses, better viable Auckland city, less traffic congestion etc (with a similar bus ticket price to the town parking price, who wants to take bus, especially if you live 3 stages away, this increase the traffic more).
