Auckland Council should focus on improving the efficiency and effectiveness of its existing expenditures rather than continuously expanding spending and requesting additional funds. There



is a growing concern about financial mismanagement, with public funds not always being allocated in the most effective way. Additionally, there is a perception that government employees are struggling to deliver even the most essential services to an acceptable standard.

I have attempted to contact three different departments multiple times a day at varying times during business hours, only to receive an out of office notice each time. This raises concerns that a significant number of government employees may be spending a large portion of their workday avoiding their responsibilities. Addressing these inefficiencies should be a priority before seeking further financial contributions from ratepayers.





I have some feedback on your annual plan. I'm focussing on just two policies. You can read that as an implicit endorsement or acquiescence to the other policies.

Public transport funding. The \$50 cap is a good idea. But it highlights the inequities faced by Waiheke Islanders. A single return trip to the island using a HOP card costs \$59. That's more than other Aucklanders have to pay for a week's travel on public transport. Yet you tax Waihekeans to pay for public transport that is primarily provided for others. You have real issues with farebox recovery from ferries. So, your policy should be to bring the Waiheke ferry into council/AT control. It's highly profitable, so that should really help your farebox recovery rates. Even if you think for some reason outside of your control that it isn't achievable, it should still be your policy. If it isn't to be your policy, you should apply a 100% discount on the rates component which pays for transport in remaining area, to go a small way towards redressing the gross unfairness (cost disparity) of Waiheke's public transport being run for maximal profit.

Supposedly fairer Local Board funding. This is a crock. Your 'fairer funding' approach calculates funding mostly based on population (80%) and hardly at all based on land area (5%). That obviously adversely impacts board areas with large land areas, with things like public reserves and walkways. That describes Waiheke. It also makes no consideration of visitor populations (only resident populations). Many community services which are funded by local boards are used by tourists and that requires more expenditure on those services. The implications of insufficient funding for all service users, is that services will be insufficient for all users. Resulting in some services being lacking (e.g. not enough toilets and overflowing septic tanks in public areas and pollution of beaches) and in a total lack of some other services (one can't choose to fund an arts gallery when the *********** tanks are overflowing into the streets). Right now, Waiheke is Canada, and you are Donald Trump. So, you should change the funding calculations to account for visitor as well as resident populations. Or find other ways of paying for tourism infrastructure. Or stop promoting Waiheke as a holiday destination. Or enable the local board to fund itself through a visitor levy.

1. Language Used Not to Communicate but to Deceive

The mix of old and new (unknowable) languages and manipulative pictures are purposefully used to virtue signal and to disguise the facts of where and to whom our money goes, and how our Council is no longer a democratic organisation answerable to all Aucklanders. The re-naming of departments, the IMSB and long-established streets, parks and areas in the newly expanded Mäori language is perverse and an insult to Aucklanders (past and present).

3. Public Amenities (like the Waitakere Ranges and its Dams) Must Stay Public

The Council has no right to transfer control of any public asset to any unelected/accountable group. It is an established fact than activist Mäori want to take control of all fresh water in New Zealand, keep New Zealanders confined and out of the bush, with much worse to come.

Consequently, I strongly object to the Auckland's Waitakere Ranges Regional Park and Heritage Area being transferred from Council to race-based control under co-governance with two tribes - Te Kawerau a Maki and Ngāti Whātua. Te Kawerau a Maki wants to restrict public access to 35% of the regional park and eliminate 19 tracks – to start with. It also wants the establishment of a co-managed Waitakere Ranges Heritage Area Forum, which would control approximately 27,700ha of public and private land, including the Waitākere Ranges, foothills, coastal areas and the municipal water supply infrastructure which includes five dams.

The Waitakere Ranges are a much-valued public amenity for its environment, recreation and our water infrastructure with its dams. It would be a treacherous act to allow race-based control of the Waitakeres or any other public amenity/asset.



The reality of co-governance is Separatist Control, Closure, Degradation and 'Decolonisation' permanently funded by the Ratepayers/Taxpayers' Gravy Train. This has been very evident in how the TMA has managed Auckland's volcanic parks (maungas) and all other racist-co-management systems anywhere around the country.

4. Ancestral-based Priority & Authoritarianism Thriving in Council

The Council has no partner. It is a public entity formed by the Government to make the city function effectively. The Council is a servant of the ratepayers, and is responsible to the ratepayers.

Question 2: Destination management and major events

Attracting visitors and securing, promoting and delivering major events are vital to Auckland being a dynamic and exciting city. In our Long-term Plan 2024-2034, we said we would continue to fund cultural festivals and other significant community events. However, without a bed night visitor levy, there will be a \$7 million budget shortfall for funding of major events that are expected to attract visitor expenditure, such as the ASB Classic, Auckland Marathon and Auckland Writers Festival, from the 2025/2026 financial year. We continue to advocate to central government to introduce this levy. A bed night visitor levy of 2.5 per cent to 3 per cent paid by those in short-stay accommodation, would raise around \$27 million each year to fund even more destination management, marketing and major events activities in Auckland.

A bed night visitor levy requires central government legislative change and they have yet to agree to introduce this legislation. We continue to work with central government on this and your views will help inform this work.
