Thank you for this opportunity to have a say.

I wish to make comments about the ENVIRONMENT and the Gene Technology Bill .

The Gene Technology Bill was debated in the first half of December 2024.

Most New Zealanders have neither heard of it, or know what it is about.

It deals with an issue that takes pages to explain and much knowledge and careful thought to understand.

Yet it has passed its first reading and there was a short time before 17th February to make a submission on it.

The timing and naming of this Bill meant that most New Zealanders had no idea they should respond to an issue that needs a binding referendum- at the very least- before any decisions are made.

The Councils of the North have decided to retain their existing Precautionary Regulations. They, like the Auckland Council, belong to the Inter-council Working Party on GMO and Risk Evaluation and Management Options (Inter-council W P). Their regulations were the outcome of the work done in this working party and experience.

The Councils of the North fought and won, with the help of other public groups and the support of the population, TWO COURT CASES to earn the right to regulate GE and GMOs in the NORTH . The first was in the Environment Court , the second was in the High Court. It gave the people of Northland the right to have precautionary regulations on GE and GMOs in the North. It was a legal decision .

In a democracy the Executive branch of Government cannot interfere with the BRANCH FOR LAW AND JUSTICE.

We have fought hard and worked hard to have the right to have precautionary regulations on GE and GMOs.

I hope Auckland will continue to belong to the Inter-council WP, and confirm its precautionary regulations on GE and GMOs in their Annual Plan for 2025-2026.

GE and GMOs are a threat to the environment.



Experiments need to be in closed laboratories. GE and GMOs experimenters have a very poor record in NZ (Tree Tomatoes Tamarillo experiment not cleared and cleansed. Careless escape of a GMO brassica. A flowering grass left unattended and only chance intervened. Inadequate disposal of GMO animals at Ruakura.) Anything involving human input is a risk. Humans are fallible. precautions are needed.

Anything to do with medicine is ringed with precautions already. So the argument that medical triumphs are prevented by precautions does not fit the argument that precautions prevent groundbreaking medical discoveries. It does not apply.

GMOs are not natural . A natural grass for example is host to thousands of life forms, from the microbial in the soil to the large mammals (They are of many kinds: cows , sheep , goats, horses...All have different dietary needs) in the paddock. It affects the ECOLOGY of its environment , and that includes the soil . Anything with this amount of influence has to be tested over a long period over every life form: ECOLOGY. This is expensive, unless it is skimped. So , precautions against profiteering and degradation of the environment are needed. Risk takers need to be able to pay for their risks...not the NZ public. Corporations tend to: use , abuse , take the money and run. (Pyke River).

GE plants have "built in" poisonous pesticides. Some GE corn poisoned people but cattle could eat it.

BIG chemical companies like Monsanto and Bayer like places to profit from . In order to grow , Monsanto 's GMOs need to be drenched in the weed killer Roundup (glyphosate). It is absorbed by the plant , goes into the soil, and is eaten by the consumer. A large percentage of the population of the USA have it in their systems . It has been declared a carcinogen by the UNO after the many cases of its cancer victims in the International Court at the Hague. It is banned in most developed countries , but not N.Z.. No precautions.

GE and GMOs are not a fast track to profits . They are costly and take time and are a serious threat to ecology and the environment.

This is just the beginning of what could be pages of reasons for having precautionary regulations for GE and GMOs. I will spare you the rest. These should be sufficient reason to retain your precautionary regulations.

Just a few more points

We will lose our big selling point of GE FREE which is required by most of the countries we trade with.

The Gene Technology Bill has been rushed through without due thought and consideration. It is a threat to the economy, community, health and environment of NZ.. These are all covered in your



existing regulations and these are your only protection if this Bill goes through .You need to keep them and fight for them if necessary.

Please retain your precautionary regulations on GMOs and GE.

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

THREE KEY FACTS

Auckland Mayor Wayne Brown has proposed a bed tax of 2.5% to 3% to fund a \$7m shortfall for major events.

Implementing any bed tax or levy would require central government legislation.



Public consultation on Auckland Council's 2025/2026 Annual Plan opens at midday today and closes on March 28.

Don't fall for Auckland Council's consultation hocus-pocus on tourism funding and bed taxes.

It started with Mayor Wayne Brown regularly appearing on radio in full get things done re-election mode. Councillor Desley Simpson wrote an opinion piece in this newspaper (Feb 28). What's going on?

Each year regional authorities consult with ratepayers about their annual budgets. Auckland Council is this year asking ratepayers about hotel bed taxes - something it has no power to implement.

The arguments put forward are flimsy, but sound plausible in parts.

First, it says events are vital for Auckland's economy. True.

Second, the council tells you that events might not come to Auckland in future without funding. This is also true. Since events drive verifiable economic benefits for host cities, making a contribution towards running costs – called subvention funding – is a legitimate use of ratepayer funds.

After a solid start, here's where the reasoning falls apart.

Auckland has no source of funding for events, it claims. Therefore [so the argument goes], central government must empower Auckland Council to impose bed taxes and spend the money on event attraction and destination marketing.

This weak claim is propped up with pure populism. Apparently the only way New Zealand can host the America's Cup again is if we give Auckland Council new powers of taxation.

Smart observers will start to smell a rat. Auckland Council has rivers of incoming cash but chooses to prioritise other things.

Back in 2017, Auckland Council provided \$53 million in funding to Ateed (Auckland Tourism Events and Economic Development). Ateed used to put around \$15m annually into event attraction. That amount is chump change out of total 2017 council revenues of \$4.12 billion – less than four-tenths of 1% and by no means excessive.



Nowadays, Auckland Council has slashed annual spending on events to around \$7m. Meanwhile, total council revenues ballooned by 62% across the same period, reaching \$6.67b in 2023.

When it comes to tourism, Auckland Council really is doing less with more – it takes way more from you in rates and spends way less on attracting world-class events.

Auckland is miles behind even the mid-size Australian states, and yet the Aussies have just 10% GST and no bed taxes.

The civic de-funding of tourism and events is a political choice that Auckland Council has made for reasons I don't fully understand. If it cannot find half of 1% of total revenues to activate the city properly, then perhaps we need new councillors?

The sources of possible funding are many – not just rates. For example, Auckland Council received a combined \$2.14b in 2023 and 2024 for selling Auckland Airport shares. This very recent tourism-related asset sale windfall could have been the catalyst to unblock event attraction funding, but councillors decided to go in a different direction.

There's money at central government level too, with \$4.1b in tourism GST collected last year, some of which could support events of national significance in Auckland.

It's not for me to list out all the wasteful Auckland Council spending over the past decade. Brown himself has done a great job of starting to get that under control.

Smart event attraction funding is never wasteful and delivers a positive return. It should be a much higher priority for Brown to dial up event attraction and give hospitality businesses some support.

The hotel sector is not against the idea of a new accommodation levy, provided it is done once and done right for all New Zealand. Accommodation providers are trying to end a three-way tourism funding deadlock between industry, central government and local government.

Hotel Council Aotearoa has repeatedly proposed collaboration with Auckland Council on this issue of critical importance to all New Zealand. Our industry-backed national scheme delivers an ongoing tourism dividend to every destination that welcomes visitors anywhere in the country, not just in Auckland.

As landing spot for 70% of international travellers, Auckland has a privileged position, but there's no good reason for an Auckland first approach to new tourism taxes. Many international tourists don't exactly choose New Zealand because of Auckland.

Auckland Council knows that an Auckland-only bed tax is simply not supported by anyone who matters in the accommodation sector. The consultation materials skim ove...

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

About separating food waste

In Toyohashi City, since fiscal year 2017, the Biomass Utilization Center has been conducting methane fermentation treatment of sewage sludge, human waste, septic tank sludge, and food waste, and generating electricity from the methane gas that is produced. In addition, the residue from the fermentation process is turned into carbonized fuel, so 100% of food waste is converted into energy. For this reason, we ask that you separate

your "burnable waste" from your " food waste " before bringing it out.



- •By subjecting food waste to methane fermentation processing, it is possible to reduce CO2 emissions by approximately 14,000 tons per year.
- •It is possible to generate approximately 6.8 million kWh of electricity per year (enough to power approximately 1,890 average households).

What is food waste?

Food waste and cooking scraps. Leftover food is also considered " food waste ."

Examples: vegetables, prepared foods, fruits, grains, cooking waste, sweets, meat, seafood, used tea leaves, coffee leaves, etc.

*Medicine, tobacco, gum, toothpaste, etc. cannot be taken out as "food waste" even if they come from the kitchen.

Food waste collection day

Collection is twice a week (Monday and Thursday or Tuesday and Friday).

*Starting in April 2018, food waste will be collected on the same day as burnable waste.

Burnable waste and food waste are collected by different collection vehicles. Please separate your waste by type and place it at the garbage station.

Designated garbage bags for food waste

In April 2016, Toyohashi City introduced a designated garbage bag system for burnable garbage and crushable garbage, and we ask for your cooperation in taking out your garbage. We have also introduced a designated garbage bag system for food waste, and we ask for your cooperation in taking out your garbage. The designated bags are as follows. Sizes: 2L, 5L, 10L, 15L, 30L *The garbage type is classified by the color of the bag, so there are no letters such as "for food waste" written on them.



Like the bags of burnable garbage and crushable garbage, they are sold at market price at supermarkets, convenience stores, drugstores, etc. in the city.

1. Enhancing Council Efficiency and Value for Money



While the plan emphasises delivering value for money to Aucklanders, I believe a critical component involves restructuring the council to prioritise roles that demonstrably add value and enhance efficiency. Streamlining operations in this manner could lead to significant cost savings and improved service delivery for resident

Question 2: Destination management and major events

Attracting visitors and securing, promoting and delivering major events are vital to Auckland being a dynamic and exciting city. In our Long-term Plan 2024-2034, we said we would continue to fund cultural festivals and other significant community events. However, without a bed night visitor levy, there will be a \$7 million budget shortfall for funding of major events that are expected to attract visitor expenditure, such as the ASB Classic, Auckland Marathon and Auckland Writers Festival, from the 2025/2026 financial year. We continue to advocate to central government to introduce this levy. A bed night visitor levy of 2.5 per cent to 3 per cent paid by those in short-stay accommodation, would raise around \$27 million each year to fund even more destination management, marketing and major events activities in Auckland.

A bed night visitor levy requires central government legislative change and they have yet to agree to introduce this legislation. We continue to work with central government on this and your views will help inform this work.

- Accessibility and Infrastructure: Challenges related to transportation, parking, and the prevalence of construction scaffolding make accessing the city cumbersome and less appealing.

Furthermore, considering the high costs associated with traveling to and within New Zealand, it is important to clearly identify and target the demographics we aim to attract to Auckland.

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3. Investment Priorities: Enhancing Public Safety

Investing in public safety should be a paramount concern. I propose that local boards prioritize the installation of surveillance cameras across all roads to deter criminal activities and aid in apprehending offenders. The council's commitment to community safety is evident in initiatives like the City Centre Community Safety Plan, which has received significant funding. However, a comprehensive strategy that includes widespread surveillance could further enhance safety across Auckland.

4. Transportation: Considering Privatisation

The current public transport system faces challenges that impact efficiency and user satisfaction. Exploring privatization could potentially streamline operations and improve service delivery.



Additionally, expanding the city's perimeters and incentivising businesses to establish offices in suburban areas could alleviate congestion and promote balanced regional development.

5. Crime Control: Strengthening Security Measures

Personal experiences, such as the recent break-in at my husband's car resulting in the loss of items with sentimental value, highlight the need for robust security measures. While we installed cameras, they failed to capture useful footage due to sensitivity issues. Investing in advanced surveillance technology is costly, and there is a prevailing perception that law enforcement responses are inadequate. Implementing widespread camera surveillance, as seen in countries like China, South Korea, and Singapore, could serve as a deterrent and aid in crime reduction.

6. Managing Taxpayers' Money: Reviewing Benefit Allocations

A thorough review of benefit allocations is necessary to ensure that assistance is provided appropriately and for suitable durations. Introducing a privatised process for managing these allocations could enhance efficiency and accountability.

7. Environmental Initiatives: Encouraging Sustainable Practices

The removal of rebates for electric vehicle (EV) buyers was a disappointing development. A more impactful approach might involve offering rebates for solar panel installations, promoting renewable energy adoption. Additionally, imposing road user charges (RUC) on EV owners seems counterintuitive when non-EV vehicles contribute more significantly to environmental degradation. Given that a substantial portion of New Zealand's electricity is generated from renewable sources, promoting EV usage aligns with our sustainability goals.





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Other

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I see there are 3 yearly properties valuations coming. The current way properties are valued are unfair and do not reflect the price a property will fetch on the market. For example in our apartment block the third floor properties are valued the highest and the ground floor the lowest. The two 3rd floor apartments are valued much higher than the ground and first floor apartments but they are far more inferior. They have better views which appears to be the sole reason for their higher valuations but they have no front access (only one rear access up stairs from the car park) and they are in poor condition and compared to the ground and first floor apartments and do not have access to outdoor areas and the swimming pool like the rest. The front ground floor apartment has the lowest valuation and is by far the superior unit. It has direct outdoor access to amenities, it is closest to the beach and it's has been beautifully renovated. Many ground

My previous objections to last revaluation were totally disregarded. Values need to look inside properties, not just a visual inspection from outside.

Why Auckland Council leaders' calls for a hotel bed tax won't help attract world-class events - Opinion

Don't fall for Auckland Council's consultation hocus-pocus on tourism funding and bed taxes.

It started with Mayor Wayne Brown regularly appearing on radio in full "get things done" re-election mode. Councillor Desiey Simpson wrote an opinion piece in this newspaper (Feb 28). What's going on?

Each year regional authorities consult with ratepayers about their annual budgets. Auckland Council is this year asking ratepayers about hotel bed taxes - something it has no power to implement.

The arguments put forward are flimsy, but sound plausible in parts.

First, it says events are vital for Auckland's economy. True.

Second, the council tells you that events might not come to Auckland in future without funding. This is also true. Since events drive verifiable economic benefits for host cities, making a contribution towards running costs – called "subvention funding" – is a legitimate use of ratepayer funds.

After a solid start, here's where the reasoning falls apart.

"Auckland has no source of funding for events," it claims. Therefore [so the argument goes], central government must empower Auckland Council to impose bed taxes and spend the money on event attraction and destination marketing.

This weak claim is propped up with pure populism. Apparently the only way New Zealand can host the America's Cup again is if

Development). Ateed used to put around \$15m annually into event attraction. That amount is chump change out of total 2017 council revenues of \$4.12 billion – less than four-tenths of 1% and by no means excessive.

Nowadays, Auckland Council has slashed annual spending on events to around \$7m. Meanwhile, total council revenues ballooned by 62% across the same period, reaching \$6.67b in 2023.

When it comes to tourism, Auckland Council really is "doing less with more" – it takes way more from you in rates and spends way less on attracting world-class events.

Auckland is miles behind even the mid-size Australian states, and yet the Aussies have just 10% GST and no bed taxes.

The civic de-funding of tourism and events is a political choice that Auckland Council has made for reasons I don't fully understand. If it cannot find half of 1% of total revenues to activate the city properly, then perhaps we need new councillors?

The sources of possible funding are many – not just rates. For example, Auckland Council received a combined \$2.14b in 2023 and 2024 for selling Auckland Airport shares. This very recent tourism-related asset sale windfall could have been the catalyst to unblock event attraction funding, but councillors decided to go in a different direction.

There's money at central government level too, with \$4.1b in tourism GST collected last year, some of which could support events of national significance in Auckland.

It's not for me to list out all the wasteful Auckland Council spending over the past decade, Brown himself has done a great job of starting to get that under control.

Smart event attraction funding is never wasteful and delivers a positive return. It should be a much higher priority for Brown to dial up event attraction and give hospitality businesses some support.

The hotel sector is not against the idea of a new accommodation levy, provided it is done once and done right for all New Zealand. Accommodation providers are trying to end a three-way tourism funding deadlock between industry, central government and local government.

Hotel Council Actearoa has repeatedly proposed collaboration with Auckland Council on this issue of critical importance to all New Zealand. Our industry-backed national scheme delivers an ongoing tourism dividend to every destination that welcomes visitors anywhere in the country, not just in Auckland.

As landing spot for 70% of international travellers, Auckland has a privileged position, but there's no good reason for an "Auckland first" approach to new tourism taxes. Many international tourists don't exactly choose New Zealand because of Auckland.

Auckland Council knows that an Auckland-only bed tax is simply not supported by anyone who matters in the accommodation sector. The consultation materials skim over what industry wants.

Brown sometimes declares he's "not a tourism guy", but credit is due for his great work raising the profile of Auckland and looking to attract more airlines. As someone who admits to being a passionate tourism guy, I believe Auckland is on the wrong path when it comes to attracting events. Brown has a chance to fix Phil Goff's mistakes and restore funding guickly.

Here's what I'll be saying to the Auckland Council consultation on event funding: "If event attraction and destination marketing is as important as you say it is, please stop wasting money elsewhere. Take a tiny part of your annual budget and return tourism funding to where it was a decade ago. This stuff is important to all Aucklanders and it drives future economic growth. Work as partners with industry on a sustainable national plan."

If he quickly restored Auckland's event attraction funding to what it was 10 years ago, then no-nonsense Brown would immediately become a tourism and hospitality industry hero.

Why Auckland Council leaders' calls for a hotel bed tax won't help attract world-class events - Opinion

THREE KEY FACTS

- Auckland Mayor Wayne Brown has proposed a bed tax of 2.5% to 3% to fund a \$7m shortfall for major events.
- · Implementing any bed tax or levy would require central government legislation.
- · Public consultation on Auckland Council's 2025/2026 Annual Plan opens at midday today and closes on March 28.

Don't fall for Auckland Council's consultation hocus-pocus on tourism funding and bed taxes.

It started with Mayor Wayne Brown regularly appearing on radio in full "get things done" re-election mode. Councillor Desiey Simpson wrote an opinion piece in this newspaper (Feb 28). What's going on?

Each year regional authorities consult with ratepayers about their annual budgets. Auckland Council is this year asking ratepayers about hotel bed taxes - something it has no power to implement.

The arguments put forward are flimsy, but sound plausible in parts.

First, it says events are vital for Auckland's economy. True.

Second, the council tells you that events might not come to Auckland in future without funding. This is also true. Since events drive verifiable economic benefits for host cities, making a contribution towards running costs – called "subvention funding" – is a legitimate use of ratepayer funds.

After a solid start, here's where the reasoning falls apart.

"Auckland has no source of funding for events," it claims. Therefore [so the argument goes], central government must empower Auckland Council to impose bed taxes and spend the money on event attraction and destination marketing.

This weak claim is propped up with pure populism. Apparently the only way New Zealand can host the America's Cup again is if

Development). Ateed used to put around \$15m annually into event attraction. That amount is chump change out of total 2017 council revenues of \$4.12 billion – less than four-tenths of 1% and by no means excessive.

Nowadays, Auckland Council has slashed annual spending on events to around \$7m. Meanwhile, total council revenues ballooned by 62% across the same period, reaching \$6.67b in 2023.

When it comes to tourism, Auckland Council really is "doing less with more" – it takes way more from you in rates and spends way less on attracting world-class events.

Auckland is miles behind even the mid-size Australian states, and yet the Aussies have just 10% GST and no bed taxes.

The civic de-funding of tourism and events is a political choice that Auckland Council has made for reasons I don't fully understand. If it cannot find half of 1% of total revenues to activate the city properly, then perhaps we need new councillors?

The sources of possible funding are many – not just rates. For example, Auckland Council received a combined \$2.14b in 2023 and 2024 for selling Auckland Airport shares. This very recent tourism-related asset sale windfall could have been the catalyst to unblock event attraction funding, but councillors decided to go in a different direction.

There's money at central government level too, with \$4.1b in tourism GST collected last year, some of which could support events of national significance in Auckland.

It's not for me to list out all the wasteful Auckland Council spending over the past decade, Brown himself has done a great job of starting to get that under control.

Smart event attraction funding is never wasteful and delivers a positive return. It should be a much higher priority for Brown to dial up event attraction and give hospitality businesses some support.

The hotel sector is not against the idea of a new accommodation levy, provided it is done once and done right for all New Zealand. Accommodation providers are trying to end a three-way tourism funding deadlock between industry, central government and local government.

Hotel Council Actearoa has repeatedly proposed collaboration with Auckland Council on this issue of critical importance to all New Zealand. Our industry-backed national scheme delivers an ongoing tourism dividend to every destination that welcomes visitors anywhere in the country, not just in Auckland.

As landing spot for 70% of international travellers, Auckland has a privileged position, but there's no good reason for an "Auckland first" approach to new tourism taxes. Many international tourists don't exactly choose New Zealand because of Auckland

Auckland Council knows that an Auckland-only bed tax is simply not supported by anyone who matters in the accommodation sector. The consultation materials skim over what industry wants.

Brown sometimes declares he's "not a tourism guy", but credit is due for his great work raising the profile of Auckland and looking to attract more airlines. As someone who admits to being a passionate tourism guy, I believe Auckland is on the wrong path when it comes to attracting events. Brown has a chance to fix Phil Goff's mistakes and restore funding guickly.

Here's what I'll be saying to the Auckland Council consultation on event funding: "If event attraction and destination marketing is as important as you say it is, please stop wasting money elsewhere. Take a tiny part of your annual budget and return tourism funding to where it was a decade ago. This stuff is important to all Aucklanders and it drives future economic growth. Work as partners with industry on a sustainable national plan."

If he quickly restored Auckland's event attraction funding to what it was 10 years ago, then no-nonsense Brown would immediately become a tourism and hospitality industry hero.

Additionally, the T3 lane on Onewa Road in Northcote needs urgent attention. It's impractical to have four large suburbs feeding into a single lane. Auckland Transport needs to rethink this—how many people are actually working in the City itself? Very few. Most people are commuting to various suburbs, often requiring multiple bus changes and up to two hours of travel just to get where they need to go. Who works in the same place as two other people, all starting at the same time? This is not realistic. Also, consider the three schools along this road—parents often sit in traffic for half an hour just to travel 200 meters. And let's be clear: five-year-olds can't catch a bus.

Parking: Hospitals should provide free or affordably priced parking for patients and their visitors. Many individuals visiting hospitals are either unwell themselves or are supporting loved ones who are ill. Unfortunately, all previously free parking spaces on surrounding side roads are now subject to council fees. The hospital car parks are excessively priced, to the point where even hospital staff cannot afford to park on the premises and are forced to walk long distances to find free parking. To address this, it is recommended that parking charges for both patients and staff be eliminated, or reduced, alternatively, the paid parking on the surrounding side roads be removed, along with the yellow lines that currently prevent both staff and patients from parking in these areas during work hours or visits.

Auckland Council needs to think more strategically. It's time to focus on real-life experiences, not just statistics on paper. Increasing costs for struggling families will only deepen the suffering of those already struggling to make ends meet. The rising rates of drug use, alcohol abuse, theft, and violence are a direct result of people in pain, trying to cope with an increasingly unaffordable way of life.

Albert-Eden Local Board Priorities

So the first thing that's coming up is an issue in some of the areas about the organisation of the community with regard to BIDs and business associations and one of the examples of that is Point Cheveliar and another would be the Mount Albert shops which don't really have the organisation of other areas which are thriving because they come under the BID system. So I have been quite concerned about the Point Cheveliar area and some of the vibe in that area is that it's run down and it's got anti-social behaviour going on, and had the unfortunate reality that the library has been closed, which has really not helped and it shows how amazing libraries are, at growing communities together. But I just wanted to raise the issue- it is really a question whether the issue of the BID might be that because they have to be so big and because people are voting for a higher rate, that we may need to have a look at that area in terms of how we do those things better. I was concerned that because it wasn't an organised BID despite the fact there were issues in that community, they really didn't have the same access to funding for security etc. I appreciate that the business association could be formed at anytime by these groups, but they tend to be disorganised because they're and a lot of them are in private ownership and often the owners are overseas.

The second issue is the issue of helicopters. We had a public meeting on the helicopter consent requested in Rawene in Westmere. We got a lot of people come to that meeting. I was surprised at how many came and how quickly they came, and how articulate they were about the many issues that were involved, including really whether helicopters were appropriate in urbanly intensified areas and the kinds of effects that they have on people in terms of the type of noise it is. We had a speaker talk, who basically gave us some pretty good science on the impact of the noise being different from the actual noisiness because of the sort of slappy nature of the roses?. And so I thought that's an issue that I've now finding coming up in anywhere that's got any coastline. And I thought you should know it's out there.

There's an issue about some of the buildings and dilapidated sites around. Some of which are historic sites. And I'm thinking in particular in Richmond Road are one that's next to the Tongan church and it's just deteriorating in front of people's eyes. And I appreciate the Council has made efforts to buy that building, that had been resisted. But I was actually wondering whether there was anything that central government could do or anything that needed to be done to make that disincentivize, buildings like that being around and just being left to break beyond repair.

And then also getting constituents talk to me about other areas of land which just be land or they've got very dilapidated buildings on them and that attracts real crime issues or people sleeping inside of the buildings, and they become really, really much part of the problem. So maybe when that central government needs to help, local governments have the tools to deal with those situations.

There is also the issue of the Carrington development, and that's an interesting one. It's a wonderful project. We're going to have a lot of houses going at Carrington, but I surveyed that community and very few people knew exactly what was going on at Carrington. In how it's supposed to be in charge of their development, but actually when they meet with them, they say they're not in charge of the communications to the community, they're really in a situation where there's a lot of different players at Carrington. There are issues that definitely Council issues like the facilities that will support that development, but there are also issues like Ministry of Education issues like where are people going to be schooled, and that was really hard to get any kind of



answer from the Education Department on. So it's a real issue about really when a development happening like that, which was very well-intentioned, there are lots of good things about it, how does the community get updated and who's in charge of that and how does the community get assured that we're gonna have Primary Health services that supply that education facilities that are gonna make sure that people have school to go through at the moment. I understand the children are expected to go across the Waterview, which is across the motorway and that the secondary schools are absolutely bursting at the seams. So that is an issue. We've got Mount Albert grammar was there yesterday, they've got 3.5k children and that's not the only school of that size. They are absolutely bursting at the seams. So how are we planning for those things and how are we cooperating and how are we letting the local residents know what's going on.

And then finally on my list, I've got an issue about just a little one about that came up from the rugby league club that's in Spause? park and it was an application that they've made for a cafe and that really beautiful renovated clubhouse, and it had been turned down and I was concerned that we had these clubs that are doing a lot in terms of social cohesion. They take some of our most troubled children on and they make sure that they are actually experiencing a lot of integration through rugby league. And they've become community hub and I was concerned that something like the cafe which would support the work they do and it's also another tool of social and community cohesion was being turned down because it was seen as a council owned property and therefore it shouldn't have something like a cafe within it. As we intensify, it's really important that people can go to places like that and that we're really supporting them do it. And that those spaces are being used in many different ways and so I just wanted to raise that issue that had come up.
