Attracting visitors and securing, promoting and delivering major events are vital to Auckland being a dynamic and exciting city. In our Long-term Plan 2024-2034, we said we would continue to fund cultural festivals and other significant community events. However, without a bed night visitor levy, there will be a \$7 million budget shortfall for funding of major events that are expected to attract visitor expenditure, such as the ASB Classic, Auckland Marathon and Auckland Writers Festival, from the 2025/2026 financial year. We continue to advocate to central government to introduce this levy. A bed night visitor levy of 2.5 per cent to 3 per cent paid by those in short-stay accommodation, would raise around \$27 million each year to fund even more destination management, marketing and major events activities in Auckland.

Piha weed bin programme-while welcomed by community, it isn't the best way to deal with green waste, costly and often unsightly/abused by the wrong materials, etc. Suggest a Green Waste Hub be established on land at the end of GlenEsk Rd. An area for normal garden waste that will be easily compostable, an area for noxious weeds to be dealt with and space for other materials such as wood to be collected for recycling/reusing. Staffed with some paid staff, and some local volunteers, this centre could cut down the waste needed to be trucked out of the district at great expense, and would fit with the ethos of the community.

Piha Traffic Behaviour. There needs to be urgent traffic calming put in place around the built-up areas of Piha, namely Glen Esk Rd and Seaview Rd. This would involve speed humps along GlenEsk, and Seaview from the end with Piha Rd right down to the Gallery. These are high risk areas for pedestrians. We live at 72 Seaview-a straight section between 2 blind corners and no footpath. In the 10 years we have lived here there have been 12 accidents, all caused by excessive speed, lost control, cars rolling, and colliding with houses. Suggest, as well as humps, cats eyes and reflective road paint, double yellow lines. Thousands of visitors pour into Piha every year, and there are also many commercial and heavy duty vehicles everyday servicing construction, etc. At night we have convoys of boy-racers, speeding, doing wheelies, etc. This is not a safe place along the roads.

Future-proofing & preservation of the West Coast Gallery and Old Schoolhouse. These buildings are under threat from the eroding stream. No remedial work has been carried out to shore up the bank even though it obviously needs it. If this isn't going to be done then steps must be taken to uplift and relocate these iconic and historically important community assets.

Many international tourists already find New Zealand an expensive destination due to high costs of accommodation, food, and activities. Adding an additional levy may deter visitors from staying longer or even choosing Auckland as a destination, directing tourism revenue elsewhere. From a recent experience we had friends from the Netherland say and they have said they would not visit again not encourage visitors as Auckland is too dear, even with favourable exchange rates. Auckland Council decision makers must not be blinkered in making these try of financial decisions. Travellers often plan their trips based on cost, and additional levies make accommodation less attractive compared to other regions or countries. Budget-conscious travellers, including families and backpackers, may opt for alternative destinations or seek informal accommodation options (e.g., private rentals), reducing revenue for established accommodation providers. Auckland Council's proposed rates increases over the next three years are completely unacceptable. In the first year (2024/2025), my rates will rise by 7.5%, adding \$271 per year or \$5.21 per week. The following year (2025/2026), they'll go up another 5.8% (\$223 per year, \$4.29 per week). By 2026/2027, I'll be paying 8.0% more (\$290 per year, \$5.58 per week). That's a 20.5% increase over three years, putting even more financial pressure on homeowners.

As a ratepayer, I'm already covering the cost of essential services, yet the Council continues to impose excessive increases, claiming they're necessary for waste management, climate action, and other projects. However, it is unacceptable that minority group advisory panels have gained a disturbing and undue influence over Auckland Council's elected officials, diverting their attention from their primary responsibility—serving Auckland ratepayers. These panels, comprised of unelected individuals with niche political and ideological agendas, are steering Council policies and expenditure in directions that do not reflect the priorities of the broader community.

I am deeply concerned about the Auckland Council's organisational structure, which reveals an astounding level of minority political, cultural, and—more concerning—radical left cultist participation in setting Council direction and spending priorities. This is not governance; it is blatant ideological capture, where special interest groups dictate policy at the expense of the average Aucklander struggling with rates increases and a rising cost of living. This is a cultural milestone, marking a decade of arts and community engagement in Titirangi. While it's nice to pat themselves on the back, celebrations don't fix footpaths or reduce crime. It's a symbolic gesture, not a solution to pressing issues.

Developing a Deed of Acknowledgement with Te Kawerau ā Maki

This involves formalizing a relationship with local iwi under the Waitākere Ranges Heritage Area Act 2008. It's a nod to cultural recognition, but there's a risk here of prioritizing neo-tribal ideology—where decisions are swayed more by symbolic gestures than practical outcomes. If this translates into real collaboration on conservation or community safety, great. But if it's just performative, it's a distraction. until 2010, Waitakere Council delivered. Since the Super city all I have experienced is gross under delivery to most local initiatives, with an undue focus on vanity neo-cultural and climate initiative ideological projects. Simple solution. Placemaking: a community-led plan for Glen Eden

On paper, this sounds promising—engaging locals to revitalize Glen Eden. But as you've pointed out, past efforts have been a disaster. The town centre remains a decrepit eyesore, plagued by fights and intimidation. Plans are meaningless without execution, and there's no evidence here of concrete steps to address the decay or safety concerns of residents.

Community resilience planning

This is vague. It could mean preparing for emergencies, but without specifics, it's hard to see how this tackles immediate issues like crime or infrastructure disrepair. If it's just more meetings and reports, it's a waste of time.

Preparing a Waitākere Ranges Climate Action Plan

Climate action plans are trendy, but they often devolve into expensive, feel-good initiatives with little measurable impact. Relocating lifeguard facilities away from flood plains makes sense—but it's a small piece of the puzzle. The obsession with climate as a primary focus can divert resources from urgent, ground-level problems like footpaths or safety. It risks becoming a box-ticking exercise rather than addressing what locals actually need.

Species spotlight campaign by Waitākere Ranges Pest Free Alliance

Highlighting native species and pest control is fine for conservationists, but it's not a priority when people feel unsafe walking the streets or can't navigate crumbling footpaths. Nature's important, but human safety and functionality should come first.

Initiating the community-led Waitākere Ranges Dark Sky Project

Aiming for a dark sky designation to reduce light pollution sounds poetic, but how does this help Titirangi's crumbling infrastructure or Glen Eden's crime? It's another niche project that feels disconnected from the community's core needs.

Supporting a Kaitūhono / stakeholder engagement role at Hoani Waititi Marae

Building relationships with Māori stakeholders could be valuable if it leads to practical outcomes—like safer streets or better facilities. But if it's just more cultural posturing without results, it's a hollow gesture.

Climate adaptation: relocating lifeguard facilities

Moving the United North Piha Lifeguard campground and Bethells Beach Surf Lifesaving Patrol clubhouse away from flood-prone areas is a practical step. But it's a drop in the bucket compared to the broader neglect of infrastructure and safety across the region.

Concerns About Neo-Tribal Ideology and Superstition

The emphasis on initiatives like the Deed of Acknowledgement and the Kaitūhono role raises a red flag about neo-tribal ideology taking precedence over practical governance. I am deeply concerned as a ratepayer about the direction Auckland Council is taking in its 2024-2035 Annual Plan. The structure and governance of the council continue to allow politically

motivated groups with radical ideological leanings to shape decisions, rather than focusing on the real needs of residents. The ever-increasing financial burden placed on ratepayers, combined with poor infrastructure maintenance and lack of representation for all communities, highlights a system that is failing those it is meant to serve.

One of the most alarming aspects of the Annual Plan is the rampant rates increase, which will see a staggering 20.5% rise over the next three years. This is unacceptable, especially when these funds are being allocated to advisory panels and boards that do not serve the broader ratepayer community. The cost to ratepayers of groups such as the Independent Māori Statutory Board (Houkura), the Public Art Advisory Panel, Pacific Peoples Advisory Panel, Disability Advisory Panel, Rainbow Communities Advisory Panel, Ethnic Communities Advisory Panel, Seniors Advisory Panel, City Centre Advisory Panel, Youth Advisory Panel, Auckland Urban Design Panel, and Rural Advisory Panel must be scrutinized.

Of particular concern is the Independent Māori Statutory Board (Houkura) and all advisory panels, where their delivery, direction, and cultural input create unacceptable financial, governance, and productivity overheads. The inclusion of both Māori and English, interlaced with Māori culture and superstitions, makes the whole exercise a mockery of good governance and financial management. In any business, a structure such as this would fail in its ability to serve those it represents. I would recommend disestablishing all local boards as a starting point, as it is Auckland Council's duly elected officers who should set both governance tone and direction. The present organisational structure clearly indicates that political, cultural, and neo-cult interests unduly influence and direct the functioning (or dysfunction) of Auckland Council.

I am particularly concerned that organisations like the Rainbow Communities Advisory Panel have direct input into council affairs, yet there is no equivalent representation for other groups. If these panels are permitted to exist, then where is the European Peoples Advisory Panel, the Indian Peoples Advisory Panel, or the Asian Peoples Advisory Panel? The Ethnic Communities Advisory Panel cannot adequately represent all ethnic groups, just as the Rainbow Communities Advisory Panel does not speak for all Aucklanders. If identity-based panels are to be maintained, then an Ethnic Peoples Religious Advisory Panel and a Christian Communities Advisory Panel should also be established to ensure fair representation. At present, traditional communities with deeply held values are being silenced by radical leftist influences shaping Auckland's policies and governance.

Another area of grave concern is the neglected state of infrastructure, particularly in Titirangi and the surrounding areas. The well-known pipe track and walkways within a 20-kilometre radius of Titirangi Village have been left in a state of dangerous disrepair. Consecutive councils have failed to address this, and the current long-term plan provides no indication that remedial action or development is even being considered.

Auckland Council, along with the local (Waitakere) board, has been poorly managed for years. Ideology now dictates local strategic plans to the point where they are entirely unworkable. If this continues, I firmly believe that in ten years, no tangible progress will have been made. However, I

do fully support the current Mayor, Wayne Brown, who has worked tirelessly for ratepayers despite constant opposition from radical factions within the council and local boards.

Ultimately, the so-called feedback process for ratepayers is nothing more than a rubber-stamp exercise. The council, in its current form, does not represent the democratic norms, values, and beliefs of the vast majority of Auckland residents. It operates more like a political cartel, where power, greed, and ideological interests take precedence over genuine public service.

It is imperative that the National government and its coalition partners step in to review the economic viability of Auckland Council. The amalgamation of Auckland's local councils into a single entity (Rodney Hide's Greater Auckland Plan) has not delivered on its promises. The failure to achieve these goals has resulted in inefficiency, bureaucracy, and a lack of service culture. This is about improvement and greater efficiency. This is about what's good for ratepayers. This is about providing a service culture. This is about fixing Auckland. Making it better.

As a ratepayer, I express deep concern over the lack of transparency, accountability, and fairness in how Auckland Council operates. The current trajectory is unsustainable, and significant reform is urgently needed to restore proper governance, responsible financial management, and true democratic representation for all residents of Auckland

I believe the system for calculating rates is highly unfair and lacks absolute clarity about how the figures are constructed /calculated.

How can a 6.8% average equate to between 10.13% (mine) and up to 12.88% for five other properties in CLOSE proximity to my property, all of which are older than my place and in arguably worse condition; makes me wonder how many more properties I would have to check before I find one that is the 6.8% number or indeed one that is LOWER than the so-called Average?

The system is seriously flawed, pretty much totally lacking in transparency and arguably containing intended misinformation.

The system that uses land value, rateable value and capital value rankings is seriously lacking common sense and logic and I am certain is largely misunderstood by the majority of ratepayers.

I have made an earlier submission. In this version I wish to continue to be critical of the proposed increases in Rates, and how they are calculated from so-called Valuations. At present it seems likely we are up for a 5.8% increase in rates for the AVERAGE VALUE RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY?

This scares the living daylights out of me and family and friends on the basis that if we use last year's numbers (a supposed 6.8% increase) which resulted in ACTUAL increases of 10.13% to 12.88 %, a simple arithmetical calculation could well result in escalation of rates between 8.65% and 10.99% for ourselves, family and friends in the immediate vicinity! AC"s inclusionary use of the word AVERAGE is in my view rather shambolic; there is no evident transparency and/or clarity about how rates are ACTUALLY calculated so that the average Joe Public can follow the methodology. Information shrouded in secrecy is Misinformation!

'I have made two earlier submissions but now wish to expand my thoughts on the increase in rates and how they are calculated. I have been in regular contact with one of the AC team in recent weeks, Karin Gosselman, and she has been absolutely wonderful in attempting to answer all of my (many) concerns. Given that her responses are basically toeing the Company line as it were, I am not fully satisfied (NOT HER FAULT)!

Many ratepayers in Auckland have only superannuation as an income in their advanced years as senior citizens.

Never once have I experienced the situation where the Super rate INCOME covers the charges made by INSURANCE /COUNCIL RATES/POWER /PHONE BILLS/ INTERNET ACCESS/WATER RATES and GENERAL COST-OF-LIVING EVERYDAY EXPENSES.

All of these far exceed the Super Income increases, and I believe it is past time for AC to seriously investigate a reduction in rates for senior citizens.

Don't try to tell me the (in my case only very recently discovered) Rates Rebate will compensate for the stark differences between Income and All other Expenses.

I could go on much further (in fact I did so an hour or more ago but through the idiosyncrasies of modern technology, could not get the NEXT button to move, and thus lost the whole ********* lot).

Furthermore I will simply here repeat myextreme concerns about how AC calculates rates increases from what I would describe as very questionable (in terms of clarity and common sense and logic) means of land and property valuations. My recent correspondence with Karin Gosselman includes Rate values of 5-6 other properties very close and adjacent to mine, and there's visibly no sign of meaningful comparisons. I strongly believe this matter requires earliest attention from AC, to come up with more explanation and clarity of the methods used, than is currently and easily available.

The sheer numbers of staff employed on these projects probably suggests examination is necessary, as it is likely to be just another case of unnecessary expenses paid by the ratepayers; I would imagine the outcome of any such examination could be an eye-opener!

There are several other issues that I could easily raise if only I could find the time to look into them more thoroughly than my current time available permits.

BirdCare Aotearoa supports the council's long-term vision to deliver programmes that create a beautiful, thriving and safe city for the people and visitors of Auckland. As a community-centred environmental charity, our submission focuses on the priority areas of Natural Environment, Community, and Built Environment.

In particular, we are in full-support of increasing funding and extension of the Natural Environment Targeted Rate- as this delivers funding to key community- and council- led activities in controlling, protecting and restoring Te Taiao.

We also commend the commitment to implement fairer funding for local boards, ensuring that local community-led initiatives are adequately resourced to maintain their unique expertise. This includes our avian rehabilitation centre, but also our peers in the pest-free movement, wetland and ngahere restoration, education/advocacy.

Note, these Te Taiao-focussed groups are often driven by, or in the case of BirdCare collaborate with mana whenua, raising Te Ao Māori aspirations for the region.

However, our concerns are:

- (1)The proposal highlights the value of places stunning harbours, beaches, forests... without committing to protect the unique biodiversity. E.g., our bird hospital attends to several endemic and native avian casualties from Auckland; these species play essential ecological and tourist-attracting roles for said stunning natural environment.
- (2) We commend the commitment to undertake marine biosecurity education- e.g. re Caulerpa seaweed. We also need to highlight the very real threat of exotic bird-borne diseases to the region (e.g., Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza), which arrive via seabirds. Please note that our hospital's urgent preparation for this disease was funded through Local Board grants (disinfectants, infrastructure upgrades).

Finally, we urge the council to thoughtfully evaluate Built Environment commitments relative to environmental impacts- e.g., Artificial Night Light Pollution, habitat loss with urban sprawl.

We strongly believe that a Te Taiao nature-focussed approach to Council investments is essential to maintain a vibrant city, with economic and social opportunities for current and future generations.

I'm also curious to know why the Fix & Finish fund will only target projects in the legacy Manukau City & Auckland City? The gains from the Auckland Future Fund should be spread to benefit projects across the region.

in Regard of CCO reforms mentioned in the Annual plan is also unclear what mechanisms are in place to ensure that CCO such as Watercare don't continuously increase charges to the public. For example, the recent announcement of a 7.2% increase in water and wastewater from March 2025, less than a year from previous increase, which has come as a surprise. How has the cost from the proposed Huia wastewater treatment plant upgrade skyrocketed to over a billion dollars? There seems to be a total lack of transparency. Ratepayers need some certainty that CCOs cannot just keep increasing prices randomly at their whim. The council should ensure that these are kept within a capped maximum rate, or it becomes unsustainable for households to meet these increasing costs on top of already increasing council rates and cost of living.

If you compare areas they range from 11 pools (South), North (6), East (2), Central (11) to ONE in West Auckland. And this is where the population growth is occurring. This isn't good enough. It's made worse because other areas are allowed to use West Wave due to the nature of the .deed it was set up under.

West Auckland also desperately needs EV chargers. The government has failed in its promise to build 10000 EV chargers.

Scenic Drive has been mostly closed for over two years which reflects the lack of willingness to provide us services. There is no footpath for most of the road, few proper drains, narrow twisting roads that are poorly maintained, poor bus service. It's also frustrating meeting large buses and trucks driving up Shaw Road which is barely more than one lane in parts. On many occasions I've had to pull over or back track to let a rubbish truck or bus pass. It needs widening. The electricity lines should be buried underground as we have many electricity outages due to the trees. Vector says this won't happen because of the roots. Yet Watercare managed to replace a pipe and Chorus to install fibre cable so I don't see this as a true impediment. I would also like to see fewer townhouses built. This is where most of the density is happening but we've only got one pool, a small hospital, poorly maintained roads. I don't agree with special character areas. This is

NIMBYISM by another name. Devonport, Ponsonby, Remuera etc should all have more highrise buildings as they are closer to amenities and transport.

Housing: As you know the government has tightened the criteria for getting emergency housing in dereliction of their duty and homelessness has increased in Auckland. I would like to see ghost houses taxed to force landlords to rent them. The council should either provide charities with more money to provide housing or build accommodation itself. This is an important issue as homeless people die much younger due to tough living conditions, poverty and neglect. Young people in particular should be housed first.

I would like the number of houses people can own be capped. I believe that landlords have driven up the cost of housing so it's almost impossible for people to own a house in Auckland. All young people with houses that I know, had to have parental help. If your family isn't able to do this then you're locked out or condemned to expensive rentals. Housing shouldnt be seen as an investment.

I think the council needs to have a genuinely poor person give feedback on all your issues in council. That kind of person isn't likely to have a computer to participate in online feedback.

I'm happy for local Maori to manage the maunga in Auckland. However, I think that there should be a longer time-frame to allow for a transition from exotic species to native ones. I recall going to Kai lwi Lakes one summer and the council had cut down every tree. Campers had no shelter for many years as a result and it looked ugly. So a gradual tree planting replacement plan should be presented.

Auckland Central. The mayor of Paris has increased bike lanes and banned cars from central areas. The key street in Seoul had its stream daylighted and a canal formed leading to a 'canal main street' and tourist attraction. It also provides a cooling device and water soak helping to create a spongy more resilient city. Just imagine Queen Street with its stream daylighted, running down to the sea.

GE technology. The government is planning to introduce GE technology. I think it's important that Auckland takes a precautionary approach. We don't want to kill the farm goose that lays the golden egg. Many countries that we sell to want GE labelling which at the moment isn't included in the government bill. I saw a film Percy vs Monsanto where the farmer was sued by Monsanto for not



paying for their seed. It turned out that their seed blew over the fence to his farm and contaminated his crops. For decades NZ has successfully marketed itself to the world as 100% Pure NZ. If we introduce GE tech this won't be true and we'll lose market share, especially in Europe where many countries have banned GMOs. I'm happy to introduce GE tech for medical purposes as this is contained in a lab scenario and not in the open air.

Charity Hospital. Christchurch has one, Wellington is going to set one up, perhaps it's time for Auckland to also consider this as waiting lists and wait times extend further and further leading to people dying waiting for heart scans and so on.

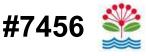

Submission by SCOW Incorporated

Thank you for continuing to fund the activities of our trapping group, the Cornwallis Petrelheads. Your support is essential to us maintaining the network of traps we have across the peninsula. In so doing you are helping protect the colony of grey-faced petrels and the nesting sites of reef herons as well as enabling the regeneration of our native bush and bird life.

Thus we support the priority in the annual plan to fund "environmental programmes that help protect and restore the Waitakere Ranges", particularly grant programs that fund volunteer groups across the Board's area.

As part of the capital spending we ask that improving the footpath along Cornwallis Road from Firebreak Rd to the Wharf be included as a project. As we've discussed with you many times, Cornwallis Road is being used by an increasing number of vehicles, especially large vehicles towing large boats, which encroach on the opposite lane and shoulder. This is very dangerous for pedestrians. Council estimates over 450,000 people visit Cornwallis every year. Many try to walk along the road. Our lack of a decent footpath is becoming an increasing safety issue.

Not mentioned in the proposed budget is allocating funding for cleaning out storm drains and removing weeds from the road reserves and regional park land. Some of our storm drains have been improved recently but will only be effective if they're maintained regularly by Council, including removing leaves and debris that accumulate in them. We ask that you make improving storm drainage maintenance a high priority in your discussions on the appropriate Council contracts.

Similarly, Cornwallis property owners are being targeted by Council and required to remove weeds from our properties. We find it frustrating keeping our properties weed free when we are surrounded by extensive areas of Council land, (the road reserves and regional park land), in which weeds proliferate. Again we would ask that in discussions you have with Council departments on weed programs, that removing weeds from the local road

reserves and park boundaries with private land be made a higher and visible priority.

And just as an update, we continue to work with Council staff to ensure ongoing adequate maintenance of the Cornwallis wharf, a capital asset serving the wider Manukau Harbour community.

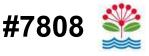

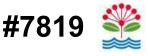

I would like to make a comment for the Waitākere Ranges Local Board. I would like to applaud them for their long term commitment and far sighted support for the Going West Festival - since the formation of the Super City, and through the challenges of COVID and now as the festival focuses on finding a new way forward in an environment where so much funding has dried up, or greatly reduced, for community arts projects.

However, I was pleased to see in the plan for the 25-26 year that the WRLB has committed to deliver arts & culture programmes through our community arts partners and would strongly encourage them to continue to include Going West in this delivery.

Going West is a flagship event for the Waitākere Ranges - one that contributes to the sense of identity and belonging for those that call the West home. It honours the stories and ideas generated by the writers, thinkers, artists and poets of West Auckland and from around Aotearoa/NZ.

Now more than ever we need places where community can come together to hear and experience a diverse range of stories, learn about our past and create shared sense of hope for our future in this place.

The festival is slowly taking shape again in the aftermath of COVID, the necessary pivot to online delivery and funding cuts from the likes of Creative NZ - a previously reliable source of funds but no longer (the case for many other incredible long-running projects around the country too). At the heart of Going West is the rehabilitation of Maurice Shadbolt's house in Arapito Road. With the local board's support, alongside others, this house will become a treasured taonga for the area, much like Colin McCahon House. It will become a Writers Residence, a launching pad or finishing post for important new works of literature and journalism. A place where community can gather for salons and workshops, book launches and poetry readings, mini happenings in the home of one of the 20th century's master NZ writers, and in the heart of the Waitakere Ranges.

Alongside the residency, with the appropriate financial support the festival will reawaken and begin to deliver events in Titirangi, at the library, the war memorial hall, in collaboration with Te Uru, in Glen Eden, out at our stunning beaches - Poetry at Piha is happening next weekend thanks to the local board. We're on our way, but we need continuing financial support.

I have a long association with Going West over the last 20 years, mostly as a volunteer serving on the Going West Trust, but sometimes in a paid capacity working in programme design and coordination and I believe wholeheartedly in this festival and the important contribution it makes to this community, to our collective well being and to our understanding of ourselves.



I urge the local board to continue investing in the festival in the coming financial year and beyond - and we will all reap the rewards.

1. Introduction

- 1.1. Thank you for the opportunity to present **Titirangi Residents & Ratepayers Association** (TRRA)'s submissions on the **Annual Plan 2025-26**.
- 1.2. This submission is made by The Titirangi Residents and Ratepayers Association, a non-profit incorporated society formed in 1987 to promote and represent the interests of ratepayers and residents in the Titirangi area. The Association can be traced back to the 1920s when an unincorporated society is recorded as lobbying Council regarding roads.
- 1.3. We wish to speak to our submission if that opportunity is provided.

2. Key Points

2.1 Natural Environment:

Meet council's obligations set out in the Regional Pest Management Plan 2020-2030 and increased funding and extension of the Environment Targeted Rate in delivering pest plan, animal and pathogen control and restoration activities. - SUPPORT.

- However, this must include a increased budget for weed and pest control in Regional Parks, especially the Waitākere Ranges Heritage Area.
- We also consider that Council should be socialising the need for using 1080 to control pests effectively in the Waitākere Ranges Regional Park.

Coordinate and implement the kauri dieback management programme to protect our kauri forests - SUPPORT.

- However there is an urgent need to include an annual budget for ongoing phosphite treatment on parks (Regional & Local) otherwise all currently infected trees will die - and this will mean the upgraded track infrastructure will go through dead and dying forest with huge H&S implications.
- Plus increased financial support is needed for Kauri Rescue Trust's services for private landowners with kauri dieback. This is only service in the regional that helps landowners to keep their infected trees alive (rather than letting them die) and provides outreach and education about the disease and preventing its spread. There is a huge demand but services are severely limited by budget which has been cut by over 50% since 2022-23.
- Additional funding must be provided to Regional Parks, specifically to fund repairs to the
 damaged tracks as a result of the cyclone. There is up to \$10M of unfunded work that needs
 to be done to enable tracks to reopen to the public. This cannot be funded from savings
 within Regional Parks or it will take decades to complete. The public funded these track
 upgrades via the NETR targeted rate, they deserve to have them repaired not remain shut
 indefinitely.

Not mentioned but needs to include:

- More budget for Compliance to investigate tree issues (and other things) especially re damage to scheduled Notable Trees, trees in Significant Ecological Areas, Coastal Zone, Riparian Margins & in parks.
- Budget for effective management of the Schedule of Notable Trees, including proactive
 adding of trees to the schedule and review of scheduling criteria to make it easier to protect
 more of Auckland's mature trees.

2.2 Economic & cultural development:

We DO NOT SUPPORT any of these realities. Parks and community assets are some of the most important and accessible services that Council provides to ratepayers. They must not be degraded by a lack of investment in them as assets.

Enhance animal control services through increased resourcing, improvements and increasing capacity at our animal shelters - SUPPORT

• This also needs to include a budget for dog control on beaches and in parks to protect wildlife, including signage.

Expand Auckland libraries' physical and digital offerings, including e-books and e-magazines, to meet growing digital demand - SUPPORT

2.5 Rates payments

Penalties on rates not paid by due date

These penalties should be calculated on an annual, not a quarterly basis. Many ratepayers prefer to spread their payments over 12 smaller payments rather than four large ones during the year. At the moment this approach incurs financial penalties. This is unfair. Penalties should only be calculated at the end of the year based on whether the full rates have been paid, not based on how the ratepayer chooses to pay them during the year. A single calculation per year would also be cheaper to administer than four. P159

Discount for paying rates early

The penalty for late payment is 10% and the discount for early payment is only 1.59% - this is not much of an incentive! If Council wants people to pay early it should offer a larger discount, comparable to the size of penalties for late payment. P159

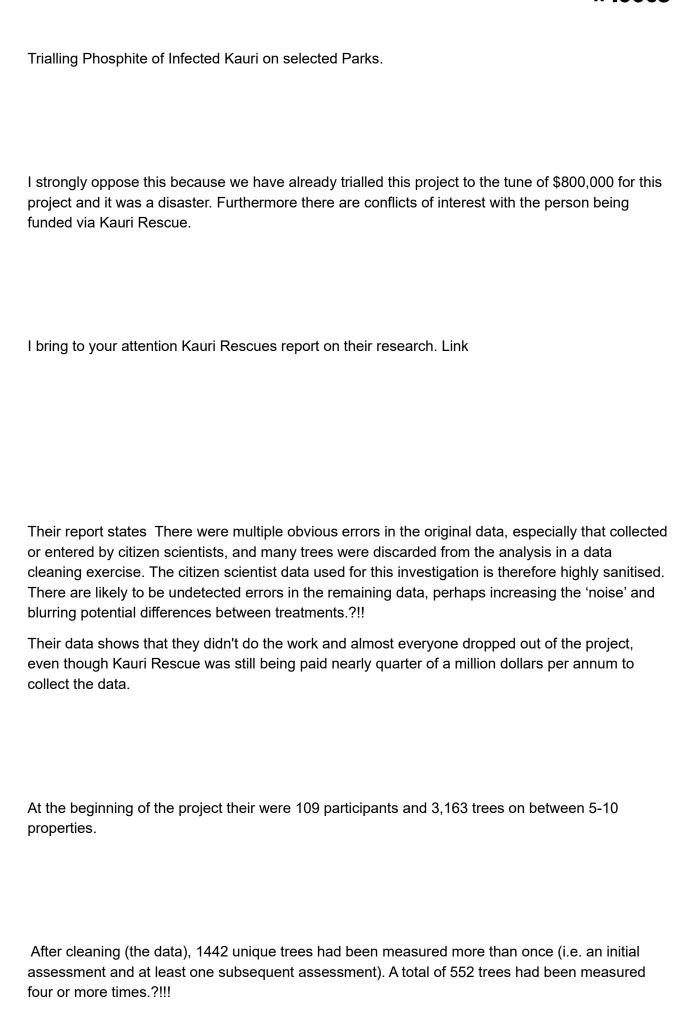

I was filling out the Long Term Plan consultation and was shocked to find that the Local Board has as prioritised funding another year for



The data collection was so bad as to be laughable. Over half the trees had been measured more than once?! And 20% measured four or more times.
From the chart we can see the drop out rate of the participants was so high as to make the data meaningless. It's not clear why volunteers were left to check the trees when the Charity was paid \$200,000 per year to check 10 properties for dieback symptoms of moss. That's \$20,000 per year per property to check if the trees had moss!!! And they made volunteers do the work and they didn't check the data. So what did they do with the money and who go paid?
For example, The Basal Bleed chart shows that in year 1, 35 Untreated trees with lesions recorded, but in year 2 only 1 of those trees data was recorded and in year 6 only 2 trees data was recorded.
372 trees with no lesions and no treatments were recorded in year 1, and by year 6 only a single tree was followed up.
167 trees with Basal bleeds treated with level 4 phosphite were observed in year 1, and in year 6, zero trees were followed up. 452 Level 4 treated trees with no lesions were observed, but only 22 trees were followed up in year 6.
I will repeat again that they were paid \$200,000 per year and their sole job was to observe and record these trees.

The data is meaningless and Kauri Rescue failed to complete the work they were paid for. The funding should not be continued and they should be returning the funding they were given.

The volunteers data should have been verified and authorised on the day of collection as we can see in pictures that a whole team showed up to do the work, instead they seem to have only noticed the work hadn't been done in year 6 rendering the research useless.

Kauri Rescue failed to manage the work and to ensure the tree checks were done in the following years..They were paid enough that they could have paid tree checkers a real living wage but instead they relied on unpaid people.

Furthermore the research didn't use diagnostic tests, but relied on observations like like the amount of moss on a tree. Kauri Rescue says, Trees not initially showing symptoms were presumably either in areas where PA was not present, not infected by the pathogen or were still at an early stage where symptoms were not yet observable. Presumably? So they didn't check if the trees they were observing had PA.

An absolute racket clearly nothing to do with tree health, I ask for this to be voted down and for the funding to be invested in Glen Eden township which is what you campaigned on.

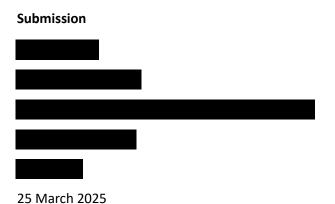

Firstly, I wish to complain about the lack of specific detail in the consultation material. I am particularly interested in regional parks and the NETR. In neither case was there comprehensive budget detail to make any kind of assessment about what Council was proposing to spend in these areas.

Through the online portal I requested a budget for regional parks and a breakdown of expenditure on the NETR. Neither was forthcoming; neither was there any explanation as to why I could not see these budgets.

My submission applies to a few matters:

- Regional Parks
- Track repairs following cycle
- Fire risk at the Taitomo Block
- NETR
- Other fees
- Waste charges

1. Regional Parks

On amalgamation the Auckland Council inherited 28 regional parks. Four of these parks – Te Rau Puriri, Pakiri, Te Muri and Te Arai – were new purchases by Auckland Regional Council and require substantial development eg toilet facilities, roads and parking, and campgrounds where appropriate.

In the 15 years since amalgamation, virtually none of these improvements have been made and it seems there is no immediate plan to do so. For example, for Pakiri FY25-FY28+ there is \$20,000 budgetted for "design and install new signage which clearly defines park boundaries and public access routes". Still no parking, toilets or campground.

For implementation of the Regional Parks Management Plan, no budget is provided for 2025 and over the following four years \$5,900,000 is allocated which will not go very far. For Te Rau Puriri, \$220,000 is allocated for "development" to "improve park Infrastructure". This is called "provisional

allocation anticipating the need for investment". In other words, it is initial design stage and will not provide any substantial development.

No development is Identified for new parkland at Te Muri and Te Arai.

It is impossible to see just what the budgets are for regional parks because budget lines are bundled up with cemeteries and "residential and commercial leases" and for "development" with cemeteries, crematoria and slip prevention.

I am seeking that the Annual Plan include a substantial amount to begin development on the regional parks at Te Rau Puriri, Pakiri, Te Arai and Te Muri, such as roads, parking areas, and campgrounds etc. This will enable the parkland to grow alongside the growth of the population of Auckland.

2. Track repairs following cyclone

I understand no additional funds have been allocated for track repairs in the Waitākere Ranges Regional Parkland following Cyclone Gabrielle. The Council has not and does not intend to allocate any additional budget to repair storm-damaged tracks. Regional Parks has been told it must reprioritise within existing capital works budgets.

Further, I understand it is estimated that the cost to repair these storm-damaged tracks in the Waitākere Ranges is cumulatively \$9.8 million indicative cost.

Many of these tracks are closed and have been for over two years. At Piha, people regularly ignore the closed track signs and climb over fences. Rescues by helicopter have been necessary in some cases. If someone dies it will be on Auckland Council's head that deaths occurred.

It is completely unreasonable that a Council of the scale of Auckland Council cannot find this amount to enable the tracks to be repaired. Given the history of the park and the fact that some of it was made up through gifts of land, it is insulting that Auckland Council is happy to leave prime tracks in this damaged condition.

The blurb accompanying this consultation proclaims that "We are creating an Auckland that is beautiful, thriving and safe for all Aucklanders", but I don't know what councillors mean if they can leave the tracks in the Waitākeres in the states they are in.

The Waitākere Ranges Regional Parkland is within less than an hour for most residents of Auckland. This is a key recreational destination for many Aucklanders as well as an opportunity to experience and gain respite from the wilderness.

As well, the loss of these tracks means the Hillary Trail is not functioning, yet this is a peak recreational track for Aucklanders, especially youth, and tourists.

I note that not one of the "major projects in progress for 2025/2026" (page 14) for West Auckland, include anything in the Waitākere Ranges.

I am seeking that the Annual Plan include \$9.8 million to enable storm-damaged tracks in the Waitakere Ranges Regional Parks to be repaired.

3. Fire risk at Taitomo Block, Waitākere Ranges Regional Park.

At Reference Piha, I am a neighbour with regional parks with long boundaries with the Taitomo/ Tasman Gap and Lookouts in the Waitakere Ranges Regional Park. For some years I have

restored and cared for part of this parkland between Tasman Lookout Track and my boundary, carrying out weed control and planting.

Fires in 1994 and 1997 entered my property from the parkland and caused extensive damage. My family restored this land and some adjoining parkland. In 2017 fires were lit in the parkland and entered my property and caused further extensive damage in regenerating parts of the property.

During public hearings on the Taitomo Variation to the Regional Park Management Plan in 2016, I and others made submissions about the need to restore the new land before tracks were built and also the need for a firefighting plan for the block. The commissioners agreed with us as submitters and it was recommended that water tanks be installed in the area where the fires have occurred. Unfortunately, the tanks were installed higher up, at the entrance to the block on Piha Road, so are not fit for purpose for accessing water for fire fighting in the lower area.

In the meantime, the Tasman Lookout Track which provided some access from Marine Parade South to the parkland was severely damaged in Cyclone Gabrielle and is closed so that firefighters cannot use it for access. In addition, following Cyclone Gabrielle, the service road from Piha Road to The Gap is damaged and only able to be used on foot. Consequently access to the area where fires have occurred in the past is severely compromised and fighting a wildfire would be very difficult.

The Regional Parks Implementation Plan July 2024- June 2025 mentions a Regional Parks Risk Reduction Plan and parks- specific fire plans for Duder and Waitawa. (page 11). Page 15 says a fire plan for Piha would be completed by August 2024, but I have not seen it.

I am seeking urgent action to ensure there is a plan for fighting fires in the Taitomo Block and that the necessary infrastructure is put in place.

4. Natural Environment Targetted Rate

I object to the NETR being used to help keep down the total rates. The NETR should be increased at the same rate as the general rate. What is proposed is that the general rate go up 5.29%, while the NETR goes up 3.5%. Then the total rates would go up 5.8%. I have been unable to obtain how it is intended to spend the NETR, but it is one of the main methods by which the environment is protected and enhanced and it provides the main source of funds for supporting volunteer groups who undertake pest control on parkland and on private land.

The Consultation Document (page 10) talks about "increased funding and extension of the Environment Targeted Rate in delivering pest plan, animal and pathogen control and restoration activities." This is not even proper English – it is Natural Environment – and pest plant - but it is completely untrue that there is increased funding and extension of activities. The Council falls well short of what is required under the Regional Pest Management Plan.

I am seeking that the NETR be increased at the same rate as the General Rate and that information as to how it is to be spent is publicly available.

5. Changes to other fees and charges that are over and above inflationary adjustments

On page 134 it is proposed to change the charges for people hiring one of the baches on regional parks in the Bach Escapes programme. A few of these are going down, but it is proposed that the charges for the following venues go up:

Courtyard House

Schiska House
Tawharanui House

There is no case for increasing these costs. The programme was designed to enable Auckland families to enjoy a low-cost traditional holiday at a beach or park. It was not designed to make money for Council.

I am seeking that the rates for the public renting these properties not be increased.

6. Waste management

The move from user pays for rubbish disposal to a single scheme for the whole of Auckland has resulted in very increased costs for households in Waitākere who are modest producers of waste. This includes single person households, people who compost or bach owners who only occupy their properties for about one-third of the week.

Under the old system that would have cost around \$59.50 a year (17 bags @ \$3.50 each, bought in lot of 5). Now the minimum cost is \$143.71.

One of the problems is that the smallest size - 80L or 70 bags - is too big for residents who only generate a small amount of waste. Consequently, they are paying a lot more than they would have under the old system, more than double. When the Governing Body adopted the new scheme in June 2022, they did not specify a size of bin. The resolution only talked about "A choice of three bin sizes to accommodate different household needs." The size of the smallest bin available need to be reduced to accommodate such households.

I am seeking that the smallest size of bin (and smallest number of bags) is reduced to accommodate households which generate little waste and who are being seriously over-charged with the current scheme.
