1 PREFACE

FIRST, the world-system is facing increasing disorder. 'The central dilemma is this. As we move from a world where humanity can impose a direction on the planet, to one in which nature itself is imposing on us, the weakness of the structures we have in place to manage and resolve the conflicts that are inherent to a system of competing states and capitals will become more apparent' (Meadway, J. 2023).

To be blunt, we are moving from a world where capitalism can impose itself on the planet to a world where nature is imposing itself on capitalism.

SECOND, Shaping Tomorrow Together, Exploring the deliberative democracy journey, constitutes autocratic brainwashing, elite bullshit, municipal disinformation, & provider capture propaganda. Aristotle, the ancient Greek philosopher considered to be the father of politics, described Auckland City very well in Politics, Book III, Chapter 3 (1278b). From my public experience of Auckland City, I would describe Auckland City by Ausnahmezustand.

To be blunt, 'Auckland's next long-term plan (TTP), also known as the tenyear budget, is due to take effect 2024 June, with public consultation open from February 28 until March 28' illustrates the problem. There is the Auckland Ausnahmezustand, Aristotle's Politics, Book III, Chapter 3 (1278b). Cooler Futures, Degrowth, & a Lighter Economy mandates (1) Less carbon; (2) Less cement; (3) Less consumption; (4) Less construction; (5) less kilometres driven; (6) no mega-projects; (7) shorter supply chains; and (8) a network of village-type communities.

3 The Long-term Plan 2024-2034 (10-year Budget)

The Mayoral Proposal & Vision

"Auckland Super City has reached its teenage years." This explains the immaturity of the Mayoral Proposal & Vision, it's nonsense, its superficiality, & its vagueness. The entire Mayoral Proposal & Vision is non-sequitur. For instance, 'I want Aucklanders to experience daily the stunning natural environment & to move easily around the region'. This maximizes emissions.

The big challenges faced by the Council are the product of Councils past. Stop Attraction. Stop Development contributions. Stop Funding Growth Infrastructure. Stop funding economic development & events. Stop Immigration. Stop Investment. Stop Mega-Projects. Stop your Spending Habits. Of course there is under-recovery. The law of diminishing returns makes the economic paradigm unsustainable. Of course the public doesn't trust you. We see the entire system is rigged towards siphoning our funds towards constructors, developers, & profiteers.

Don't work with government to devise better ways to fund growth. Work with government to devise better ways to defund growth. Fund degrowth.

GETTING BACK TO BASICS in the LTP requires fixing the challenges baked-in by past mayoral plans beginning from Les MILLS & Christine FLETCHER. Fixing what is broken requires more than 'Better, Faster, Cheaper, Finish, & Optimize. Empowerment at the local level is an excellent path forward. Local boards are best placed to respond to local priorities.

Fixing Auckland

A fact-led process would have been much better than a politically-led process. Either we are Aucklanders or we are not. End your Identity politics.

Reduce debt to revenue ratio. YES. Reduce net operating costs of Auckland Council group. YES. Slow growth in capital expenditure. YES. YES. YES.

Debt reduction & emission reduction can be two sides of the same coin.

Get debt down to zero by 2030.

TRANSPORT. Fix the roads. YES. Cut low value initiatives. YES. Make public transport cheaper, easier to use, faster, & more reliable. YES.

But where are our zero-emission buses? EV charging stations?

FINANCIAL RESILIENCE.

The Auckland Future Fund. This does not stack up. Delete in the trash can.

PHYSICAL RESILIENCE

Making Space for Water. Yes. Yes. Yes.

Auckland's prime waterfront land. Auckland Ports are a national security asset. DON'T BE STUPID like Darwin City Council. Enhanced status quo.

Renewable energy. Be bold. Reduce emissions across AC. Aim for 2030.

LOCAL BOARD EMPOWERMENT. Yes. Trash the Democratic Advisors.

COMMUNITY ASSETS, SERVICES, & OPEN SPACES

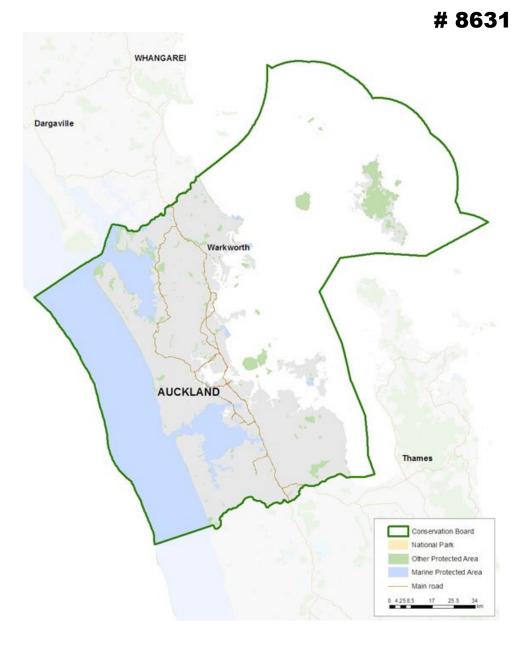

Recognition of the environment is clear in the proposal and this is welcome

...but more investment and focus on outcomes is needed

- The vision and objectives are not achievable without more targeted action and investment
- The options discussed (Central, Pay More, & Pay Less) are not the only options
- Restoring NETR and WQTR should be a bottom line for the 2024-2034 LTP
- Even with this investment, more needs to be done to reverse biodiversity and ecosystem declines

Local Boards are key

- But most of the significant natural taonga in the region are found in a few Local Board areas – and those communities and iwi need to be supported long term to protect them
- "Fairness of funding" is therefore also needed to achieve better natural environment outcomes
- Consider which Local Boards can enable the best outcomes and fund them accordingly eg Aotea, Rodney, Waitakere Ranges, Franklin



We support furthe# 8631 investment in Māori outcomes in the LTP in relation to te Taiao

"Kaitiakitanga: the council actively provides for Māori participation in the management of taonga resources. OVERVIEW

The well-being of te Taiao, communities, whanau and hapū on Aotea Great Barrier Island are supported by investment in iwi and community led conservation and specialist council Environmental Services. Councillors need to ensure Local Board and centrally held budgets for all-natural environment work on Aotea and iwi and community led conservation continue - to avoid losing the value of past investments. This will in turn help towards meeting Auckland Council's legislative obligations to maintain indigenous biodiversity across the region.

To achieve this, we support restoring the Natural Environment Targeted Rate (NETR) and Water Quality Targeted Rate (WQTR) to their previous levels plus an adjustment for inflation.

Specifically for Aotea it means supporting the Local Board's priorities over the ten-year timeframe, as stated in the consultation document, which are in the Council's power to deliver. Aotea is regionally very significant for freshwater, terrestrial and marine biodiversity and warrants this long-term investment relative to other board areas. In particular we support:

- Long term funding for Tū Mai Taonga in the 10-year budget (see below).
- An increase in the resourcing and funding of the Marine Biosecurity team, who will be critical in preventing the spread of Caulerpa in the region from Aotea. Current staffing and budgets are a drop in the ocean, as is the proposed allocation of \$200,000 to Caulerpa noted in the Discussion Document given Auckland's long coastline and Marine Biosecurity risks.
- Ongoing support for community conservation, restoration and pest animal and plant management through regional budgets to ensure past investment is not wasted and gains can continue.
- Support for increased investment in Ahu Moana and related initiatives to protect the coastal waters and ecosystems of Aotea.
- Specialist seabird capability being appropriately resourced and funded within Auckland Council to reflect the global significance of the region for ground nesting seabirds.

FURTHER SUBMISSION DETAIL

Auckland Council is the single biggest influencer of natural environment outcomes in the region:

- The heavy lifting of conservation in the Auckland region is done by Auckland Council, tangata whenua and communities.
- Auckland Council alone is responsible for maintaining indigenous biodiversity in the region and in our coastal waters.
- The 2024-2034 LTP must resource Council teams, iwi, and communities efficiently to continue work already started.
- And ensure negative environmental impacts from growth, infrastructure and land use do not occur.

Recognition of the environment is clear in the proposal, and this is welcomed, but more investment and focus on outcomes is needed:

- The vision and objectives are not achievable without more targeted action and investment.
- The options discussed (Central, Pay More, & Pay Less) are not the only options.
- Restoring NETR and WQTR should be a bottom line for the 2024-2034 LTP.
- Even with this investment, more needs to be done to reverse biodiversity and ecosystem declines.

This LTP sets a vision for Auckland's environment:

"We want to create an Auckland that is beautiful, thriving, and safe, for all Aucklanders... a stunning natural environment – harbours, beaches, forests, maunga, islands, urban trees – that can be accessed and enjoyed by Aucklanders across the region".

But how will it be made a reality, given the scale of the problems we need to solve?

- Access to nature is limited for many Aucklanders.
- Native species are under threat from pest plants and predators.
- Wetland and freshwater systems lost or degraded.
- Multiple threats to harbours.
- Hauraki Gulf has been declining for more than two decades.
- Twenty-five species of seabirds breed in the region, all threatened.
- Marine life in coastal waters is a shadow of what it was.



Auckland's biodiversity will continue to decline under the 2024-2034 LTP proposal:

- No significant environmental outcomes are specified.
- No goals for water quality freshwater bodies, harbours or estuaries No goals for invasive species control.
- Silent on species abundance and species extinctions.
- Marine biodiversity and ecosystems are under huge pressure but there is little investment in these areas.
- Climate warming will increase threats.

What does Priority 5: "making the most of our harbours and environment" mean in reality in 2024-2034?

- NETR and WQTR were created because Auckland Council had not prioritised the natural environment or water quality.
- Historic levels of investment had not been enough, and the environment suffered.
- On the other hand, community and iwi participation and support have increased markedly in the last 6 years.
- And blue/green infrastructure is now known to be critical as out climate warms.
- Now is not the time to trade off Auckland's natural assets.

Caulerpa: LTP can do more than allocate \$200k – and can change the outcomes...

- Advocate to government for a fit for purpose plan and budget.
- Increase marine biosecurity capacity to match Auckland's coastal risks.
- Regional co-ordination and control/removal plan.
- Truly enable local response from iwi and communities.
- Streamline approvals.
- Build long term marine capacity and knowledge systems at same time.
- Include invasive marine species in RPMP.

Local boards are key:

- But most of the significant natural taonga in the region are found in a few Local Board areas –
 and those communities and iwi need to be supported long term to protect them.
- "Fairness of funding" is therefore also needed to achieve better natural environment outcomes.
- Consider which Local Boards can enable the best outcomes and fund them accordingly e.g. Aotea Great Barrier, which has regionally significant wetlands, forests and freshwater as well as marine ecosystems and a number of endemic species.



We support further investment in Māori outcomes in the LTP in relation to te Taiao as the discussion document states:

"Kaitiakitanga: the council actively provides for Māori participation in the management of taonga resources. The council works with mana whenua and Māori in the management, restoration, and protection of our water resources, and works with mana whenua and Māori to design/co-design and deliver environmental management and community-led conservation initiatives".

- The LTP investment in Māori Outcomes should support this intent.
- The Ngāti Rehua Ngātiwai ki Aotea led Tū Mai Taonga project is generating environmental, social and Māori outcomes and should be supported by Nga Matarae and Environmental Services with long term funding over the 10-year plan. This will anchor the project and attract other government and philanthropic investment as has been the case in the first two years of its operation.
- We note that this project is also a 10-year priority for the Aotea Great Barrier Local Board.

Aotea is a very isolated island with very special terrestrial and marine environments that need to be protected. With increasing costs it is not easy for many to live on this isolated island. Council services are very important. Support for community welfare and health are really important. The marine and terrestrial environment is very important to protect. Provision of funding for environmental restoration work is invaluable in restoring the ecosystems but importantly provides employment for people on the island. There are so many wonderful programmes underway on the island that need ongoing support. In particular the Tu Mai Taonga project as well as resources to help stop the spread of caulerpa. MPI abandoned GBI and have been negligent in allowing it to spread all along the western coast. Boats will continue to come here so it is absolutely vital some harbours are kept caulerpa free otherwise this horrible weed will spread all around the HG and destroy marine ecosystems. Just dive in Okupe bay and you will see a seabed like astroturf - just devastating. We would not wish that on any other community. There is still no national management plan from MPI so we need the AC biosecurity team to be well resourced to help support control efforts on the island and advocate for us in Wellington. The management of this incursion by MPI has been nothing short of woeful. What's worse is their reluctance to share reports on ecosystem studies, dredging etc with the community. They continue to block OIA requests - just appalling.

The grant system for community projects is just so valuable for the island in providing job opportunities.

Empower and resource communities.

Importantly many of these projects bring community and tangata whenua together on the island which is so important.

GBI is an important destination for many Aucklanders so appropriate support is needed for the island to manage these large numbers of visitors. So much still needs







to be done to improve the health of the marine environment. Ahu Moana is a project that needs further support as it is helping community to see the ocean as a dynamic living system rather than just a place where you go to catch snapper and remove all the crayfish.

The three options (central, more, & less) proposed in the consultation are not the only options, the same goes for the corresponding rates rises. For example, we could get much-needed investment in transport services and climate resilience, as stated under the 'pay more get more' option, with a rate rise of less than 14% in year one. There are





other areas where savings could be made which are not interdependent. The 'overall direction' oversimplifies very complex decisions.

We must prioritise looking after our people and planet by investing in the things that provide us with life's essentials, such as fresh air, clean drinking water, hazard resilient landscapes and basic needs, like accessible transport and a sustainable waste network.

Where I'd like Auckland Council to do/spend more

- Public Transport Ensure public transport is affordable, accessible, and reliable, prioritising investment in public transport infrastructure over road spending.
- Active Transport Urgently transition towards low emissions communities by prioritising and increasing, not reducing, investment in walking and cycling infrastructure.
- Water Quality Re-establish the full funding of the Water Quality Targeted Rate (WQTR) to pre-2023/2024 budget levels to ensure delivery and growth of related work programmes.
- Environment and Regulation Ensure appropriate funding is allocated to increase monitoring activity of current/active and future resource consents to enable better environmental outcomes.

As well as the options provided in the structured consultation, I would also like the Council to do more of the following:

- Protecting and working with communities by continuing to prioritise the funding and delivery of Making Space for Water in partnership with Central Government.

Auckland Council's Transport Emissions Reduction Pathway sets out actions required to reduce the region's transport emissions by 64% by the year 2030. Transport is the biggest emitter contributing to over 40% of the region's total emissions. Within the transport emissions, 86% come from road transport. This sets a clear directive. We need to get people out of private cars, into buses, trains and ferries and onto cycleways. Failing to understand and action this will result in a continuation of over investment in roading projects and underinvestment in the public and active transport networks. The evidence is there and the evidence is clear.

Regarding the Mayoral proposal, I am encouraged to see initiatives to make public transport more accessible, such as the \$50 weekly cap and introduction of diverse payment options. Another positive is the work programmes which look to improve public transport services, such as network optimisation, expansion of the electric train fleet and completion of the City Rail Link. Unfortunately, alongside these positives, there are some concerns. A couple of examples are; the removal of 'low performing' bus services, and the several references to roading focused projects.

As well as continuing to invest and improve our public transport network, it is essential that the Council urgently supports the transition towards low emissions communities by prioritising and increasing, not reducing, investment in walking and cycling infrastructure.

Cutting "low-value initiatives, including raised pedestrian crossings and expensive gold-plated cycleways" is an ideological move that fails to align with the Council's own Transport Emissions Reduction Pathway. In monetary terms, this means cutting funding for cycleways by \$141.5 million. This makes no sense as we know increasing funding for active transport infrastructure is a smart investment that can benefit the





economy, the environment, and public health. Cycling is a low-cost, low-carbon and low-impact mode of transport that can reduce congestion, pollution, and greenhouse gas emissions. Cycling also promotes daily, incidental physical activity, mental wellbeing and social inclusion. By improving the safety, accessibility and attractiveness of walking and cycling, more people will be encouraged to choose it as a regular means of travel, creating a virtuous cycle of benefits. This approach also creates better use of existing roading assets by making space for those who cannot choose cycling, walking or public transport.
