The health benefits of green spaces

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An increasing body of evidence suggests that a closer connection to nature is good for our heads, our hearts and our lungs. But as Auckland grows, our precious green spaces and trees are increasingly under threat. In the first part of a three-part series for OurAuckland, Elly Strang looks at the many benefits green spaces bring to the health of our people and our city.

Humans have long believed that being in or around nature has healing properties. But the idea was previously more intuitive than evidential – a warm glow rather than hard science. Now, with large-scale public-health problems such as obesity and depression being linked to a rise in technology, a disconnect from the outdoors and more time spent inside, researchers are showing renewed interest in the topic, and studies from around the world are finding that those who live close to green spaces enjoy positive impacts on both their physical and mental wellbeing.

The science behind green wellbeing

A new Danish study has found that when children grow up with green space around them, they have 55 per cent less risk of developing a range of mental-health problems later in life. Researchers from Aarhus University found that the more greenery a person is exposed to up to the age of 10, the lower the risk of 16 mental

disorders, including anxiety and depression, even when controlling for factors such as socio-economics and urbanisation.

“Our findings affirm that integrating natural environments into urban planning is a promising approach to improve mental health and reduce the rising global burden of psychiatric disorders,” the study’s authors say.

Closer to home, a team led by University of Canterbury professor Simon Kingham has studied the effects of public and private green spaces on physical health. The research analysed the activities of 12,500 New Zealanders, including 2500 Aucklanders, and found they were less likely to be overweight or suffer from obesity if they lived close to a park.

“Globally, nearly every study I’ve read says the more green space you’ve got near where you live, the better your health is,” Kingham says. “Park creation and planting in existing public spaces may serve as low-cost disease prevention options.”

In its 10-year budget released last year, Auckland Council boosted funding for parks, open spaces and community facilities to \$3.7 billion, with \$1.4 billion set aside for acquiring and developing public open spaces and parks. This was ahead of infrastructure as the single biggest increase within the budget.



Improving equity of access to green space

Kingham says another finding of his team’s study was that people in lower socioeconomic areas tended to have less access to good-quality green spaces. “All green space is not the same.”

This is why Auckland Council's [Urban Ngahere \(Forest\) Strategy](#) is vital to the health of the city. It aims to address the unequal distribution of trees across the region and increase the benefits of a green city for all.

It also aims to undo some of the damage done by urbanisation, rising inequality and climate change. The plan is to increase Auckland's average tree-canopy cover from 18 to 30 per cent, while targeting areas where cover is scarce, such as parts of south Auckland, so that all local board areas have at least 15 per cent cover.

Councillor Penny Hulse, chair of the council's Environment and Community Committee, says Auckland's rapid urban growth has swallowed up native bush and open spaces.

"It hasn't always been the norm to replant trees in areas that have been developed since the 1980s," she says. "With higher-density housing we've lost a lot of urban trees, as people haven't always valued them as much as they should."

Hulse says so-called "leafy suburbs" have fantastic tree cover, but the urban canopy is not evenly distributed across Auckland. In some neighbourhoods, streetscape planting – where trees are planted along the roadside – is also lacking.

"The amalgamation of Auckland's former councils means we get to look across the whole region to see where those gaps are," she says. "Among the lowest on the canopy cover statistics are places like Ōtara and Papatoetoe. We'd like to make them as leafy as the suburbs in Waitemata, not just because it's beautiful, but because it's better for communities."

'Knowing, growing and protecting'

The Urban Ngahere Strategy is underpinned by a three-pillar framework: knowing, growing and protecting. This involves tracking the size, health, condition and distribution of trees around Auckland and increasing the number to boost the benefits and address inequity, while also protecting existing trees.

Hulse says local boards are organising planting in areas that have been degraded, and Mayor Phil Goff's [Million Trees programme](#) is a great example of a planting project making big strides. Under the scheme, 648,000 trees were planted around Auckland in the first two planting seasons, and the millionth tree is being planted in Tōtara Park on 14 June. Auckland Council collaborates with a range of groups on the plantings, from schools, to community groups, to prison inmates.

"We're getting huge numbers of volunteers for planting," Goff says. "They're not as fast as the professionals we use, but they're there and ready. It's all about what you want to leave as a legacy. I went and planted 50 native trees, and I'm going to take my grandkids back there and show them the trees when they're 30, 40, 50 metres high. People get a thrill out of that and know we're undoing some of the damage done; they see it as a way they can make a difference."



Hulse says planting more trees now is crucial to combat growing inequity as the climate gets warmer.

“Climate change is talked about as an inequity magnifier. In other words, the people most vulnerable to climate change are those at the challenging end of the social scale, and if you look at where the least tree cover is, it’s the vulnerable areas. Internationally, it’s been shown that communities who live in areas where there are lots of trees are able to adapt to warmth more easily, so let’s address those two things together.”

Council previous popular, rather than good, fiscal decisions to keep rate rises lower than required have led us to our present situation and we should not continue this process.

My mokopuna (generation Z) are now faced with paying for fundamental infrastructure upgrading and renewals that should have been paid for by previous generations. It is grossly unfair that they should have to pay for loans for works that should have been fully funded by previous generations such as baby boomers and generation Xers. My mokopuna's generation have enough fiscal challenges saving for a deposit for their first home.

For this reason, I see rate funding for infrastructure catch-up work, rather than loans, being the only fair way to fund the backlog of infrastructure work. Most home owning baby boomers and generation Xers should be able to easily afford it.

Auckland, like many other Councils, have historically dropped the ball on asset renewal and upgrading programs which should have been largely paid for by past and present mostly asset rich generations, like Baby Boomers and Generation Xers.

This approach is consistent with the principles of economic intergenerational equity where each generation should pay for a fair and just share of their community's infrastructure. For new assets, this would often include paying off long term loans, for older assets well past their optimal renewal dates. Future generations should not have to pay for this work.

More funds to address identified people issues associated with the 6 Outcomes sought from the Auckland Plan 2050,

The Auckland Plan 2050 (2018) described the 6 Outcomes, 20 Strategic directions and 37 Focus areas targeted for Auckland by 2050. The 2023 review of the Auckland Plan 2050 document identified that we are going backwards in most of the Strategic directions, particularly those related to individual wellbeing and trust. These are further identified and discussed under 6B below.

Accordingly, I would want to see Council spending much more money addressing the many significant "people issues" raised in the above review. There is little in the discussion document about the funding required for this important issue.

Back to basics approach

I fully agree with getting back to basics approach driven by outcomes and would be prepared to pay much more for bringing the horizontal infrastructure up to scratch, particularly the three water services and transportation networks. This includes delivering on the Outcomes from the Resilient Auckland 2016-2021 CDEM document, or an updated version of it.

This would require the Council to take back control of its CCOs and their outcomes, and to adopt a focus on outcomes within Council, rather than processes, as stated on Page 18 “Ultimately this LTP is about Auckland and Aucklanders, and council delivering outcomes for our region. An outcome focused approach to investment is included to deliver on our priorities”.

I see this as a paradigm shift from previous Council planning and funding approaches which have got Auckland infrastructure and its culture to where it is today despite the intention of the LG Act 2002, intended to prevent this situation from happening. Accordingly, I endorse the mayor’s comments and the principles in part 1

Urgent need to fund a Marine Strategy

I would also see the urgent reinstatement of the funds for development of a Marine Strategy to allow ordinary Aucklanders the ability to access e.g. the Hauraki Gulf and its beaches. Access is becoming increasingly difficult with parking at a premium and the issues caused by (e.g.) the invasive exotic seaweed *Caulerpa*, as mentioned in the mayor’s introduction, having put significant areas of the Hauraki gulf out of bounds over the last summer.

The management of our marine environment being a priority as presently it is managed by too many separate organisations often with conflicting strategies. E.g. the Fisheries Act resource utilisation objectives which reportedly are directly in conflict with the objectives of the Hauraki Marine Park Act.

Without a comprehensive Marine Strategy, future generations of marine users will not have the same opportunity to access the marine environment that past generations have had, unless they are affluent. This includes beach goers, wind surfers, boat owners, fishermen, etc.

The proposal needs to be more driven by the outcomes Aucklanders seek rather than the “internal” performance measures suggested on P 33 which are important for management but meaningless to customers.

Completing projects is process based thinking. Completing projects and having (e.g.) improved efficiency or safety outcomes with performance measures to demonstrate the achievement of the intended project benefits, is outcome-based thinking.

Basically, travellers want an efficient journey, a safe journey and an enjoyable journey by PT, car, etc. The current issue for many is that journey times are too long, often unreliable and journey times increasing.

E.g. I regularly travel by PT and private car and what is important as an outcome is the reliability of my regular journey times from Whangaparaoa Road to Queen Street. BACKLOG HORIZONTAL INFRASTRUCTURE WORK SHOULD BE PAID FOR BY RATES NOT LOANS

THERE IS NO EFFECTIVE LINKAGE TO THE AUCKLAND PLAN 2050

The consultation document should be, but is not, driven by the Auckland Plan 2050 and on delivering its 6 Outcomes, 20 Strategic directions and 37 Focus areas. The significant major issues identified in council's "2023 Update of the Auckland Plan 2050" should be linked to, and a key driver of the consultation document as they require additional effort and resources/money to be directed to those identified areas.

E.G. The first statement/purpose of the Council's 2022/23 annual report talks about "how we contributed to the Auckland Plan outcomes". This LTP consultation document decision making process should adopt a similar approach noting the serious issues of the 2023 Auckland Plan update.

Specifically, the document should address the key issue facing Auckland as on page 20 of the Auckland Plan 2050 – "Two Speed Auckland" as amplified in the 2023 review of performance. Specifically, this includes reducing what the Auckland Plan describes as "the divide between the rich and the poor". This will presumably require money to address.

All Council decisions should be aligned with, and linked to, the Auckland Plan 2050. Failure to link expenditure to the Outcomes covered in the Plan and its three-year review, make the Auckland Plan a pointless document.

Drowning rates in NZ are the worst in the world, and it is clear that Surf lifesaving clubs play a vital role in our community, providing essential services to keep our beaches safe. However, many of these facilities are reaching end-of-life and are in need of replacement. Without adequate funding, our

SMS clubs will struggle to continue their lifesaving work effectively - this is the situation right now with Mairangi Bay - a massive provider of Surf Life savers to the AUckland region.

- Without fit-for-purpose facilities that people enjoy visiting, the Auckland region risks losing the volunteers who provide the service, spelling the end of more than a hundred years of vigilance on our beaches.
- We therefore request that Auckland Council allocates \$8.02 million in funding within the Long Term Plan specifically earmarked for the rebuilds and ongoing maintenance of surf lifesaving club facilities, as per Surf Lifesaving Northern Region's Surf 10:20 Capital Development proposal.
- Mairangi Bay Surf Lifesaving Club has existed in its current location for 70 years. The current membership comprises ~150 active lifeguards, over 500 Junior Surf children aged 6-14yrs and a further ~600 associate members. The building is well past its useful life and can no longer adequately cater for its membership and activities. A new building is therefore imperative to continue being able to serve the membership and community.

· Without fit-for-purpose facilities that people enjoy visiting, the Auckland region risks losing the volunteers who provide the service, spelling the end of more than a hundred years of vigilance on our beaches.

· We therefore request that Auckland Council allocates \$8.02 million in funding within the Long Term Plan specifically earmarked for the rebuilds and ongoing maintenance of surf lifesaving club facilities, as per Surf Lifesaving Northern Region's Surf 10:20 Capital Development proposal.

· Mairangi Bay Surf Lifesaving Club has existed in its current location for 70 years. The current membership comprises ~150 active lifeguards, over 500 Junior Surf children aged 6-14yrs and a further ~600 associate members. The building is well past its useful life and can no longer adequately cater for its membership and activities. A new building is therefore imperative to continue being able to serve the membership and community.

Mairangi Bay Surf Lifesaving Club volunteers rescued over 70 people in the Auckland Anniversary floods and did so operating out of storage shipping containers.

Firstly, an indoor stadium on the North Shore is desperately needed, like West Auckland (Trust Stadium) and South Auckland (Bruce Pullman). The North Shore population is growing massively, especially the younger generation, and facilities for indoor sports such as basketball and pickleball are desperately needed.

Secondly, the North Harbour Stadium site could be re-jigged to include covered outdoor courts for sports such as pickleball. Pickleball is a young sport in NZ but is the fastest growing sport in the world. It started here for the older age group but is now played by all age groups (eg the Australasia Pacific Pro League now has 2 NZ teams, and the Auckland event will be held at Albany Tennis Park in late March). Currently we use courts in Council/school/YMCA gymnasiums, and some outdoor courts on existing public tennis courts. In Auckland there is too much rain for uncovered outdoor courts to be a realistic option.

Pickleball has exhausted all the indoor facilities available. On the North Shore we have grown from 2 sessions per week to 7 at the Council's Browns Bay Leisure Centre, but are unable to get more time, particularly after work or on weekends, because of use by other activities. Our open sessions are getting up to 46 players (we have 4 courts) which is really frustrating as you only get 2-3 15 minute games during the whole session with a lot of waiting going on. Every new session we introduce, the number of players just goes mad. Currently we also aren't able to accommodate school aged players because we just can't get enough courts. Typically pickleball players each pay \$5 to \$10 to play at a 2-3 hour open session. Additionally, players can book private sessions.

The Albany Tennis Centre has time for pickleball sessions twice per week only. They also host pickleball tournaments twice per year (which have grown from an 8 court tournament to 23 courts this April). At Kumeu Racquets Club, pickleball is now the most popular sport and runs the most sessions.

The facilities at other towns around New Zealand are phenomenal- Mt Maunganui has a gymnasium with 16 pickleball courts; Wellington and South Auckland also have excellent facilities.

So, if you could build a minimum of 8, preferably 12-16, covered pickleball courts at North Harbour Stadium (they don't have to be indoor, just covered and with lighting, like the covered outdoor netball/tennis courts at Westlake Girls High, so we can play in all weather and at night) I know we would be able to run day/night/weekend sessions that would be extremely popular, and be able to include school aged players

- Without fit-for-purpose facilities that people enjoy visiting, the Auckland region risks losing the volunteers who provide the service, spelling the end of more than a hundred years of vigilance on our beaches.
- We therefore request that Auckland Council allocates \$8.02 million in funding within the Long Term Plan specifically earmarked for the rebuilds and ongoing maintenance of surf lifesaving club facilities, as per Surf Lifesaving Northern Region's Surf 10:20 Capital Development proposal.
- Mairangi Bay Surf Lifesaving Club has existed in its current location for 70 years. The current membership comprises ~150 active lifeguards, over 500 Junior Surf children aged 6-14yrs and a further ~600 associate members. The building is well past its useful life and can no longer adequately cater for its membership and activities. A new building is therefore imperative to continue being able to serve the membership and community.

With regard to Question 1c, Auckland Council has a central proposal that recommends spending more where it is needed most. Surf Life Saving facilities are a critical component of our community. They have served as temporary welfare and community centres, as well as civil defence centres during regional emergencies, including during the Auckland Anniversary flooding and Cyclone Gabrielle. Mairangi Bay Surf Lifesaving Club volunteers rescued over 70 people in the Auckland Anniversary floods and did so operating out of storage shipping containers.

Our facilities aren't a nice to have, they are the heart of our service. Allocated funding is essential to ensure the continued operation of our clubs and the safety of beachgoers. The amount requested is minimal when compared to the benefit it will have for the region.
