Our annual repairs and maintenance costs for the year ended 30 November 2023 were \$337,372.00. This does not include any asset maintenance which was a further \$75,000. For the year ending 2024 we are forecasting asset maintenance costs excluding Repairs and Maintenance to be \$781,357 (this includes a LED lighting upgrade of \$570,000).

Auckland Netball has an ongoing asset maintenance plan for the next 4 years and has identified the following:
