## Council Long Term Plan Submission Dr Naomi Pocock & Associates Alight Ltd

Tēnā koutou. I'm here to advocate for Doughnut Economics<sup>i</sup> as a decision-making tool for councils to use in their LT planning, which enables us to stay within the Earth's ecological boundaries, while giving all citizens access to fundamental services. It uses regenerative and distributive 21<sup>st</sup> century economic thinking to restore and repair our environments and communities and give future generations a chance of thriving on a liveable planet.

As the World Economic Forum argues, every decision is now inherently a climate decision, whether we recognise it or not.

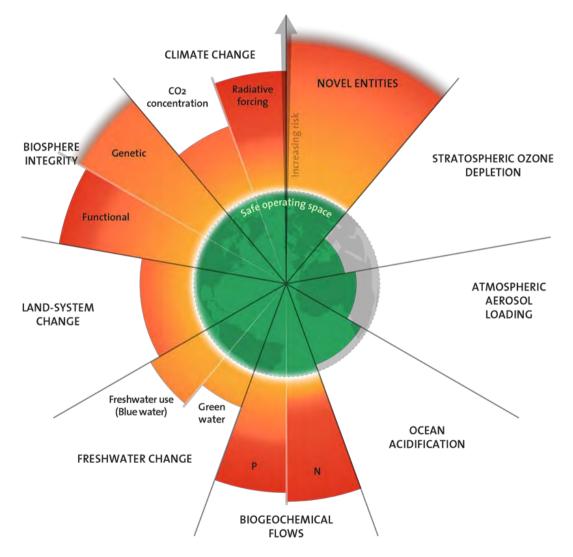


Figure 1 2023 Planetary Boundary Overshoot. Azote for Stockholm Resilience Centre, based on analysis in Richardson et al 2023

In terms of the background to Doughnut Economics, scientists have discovered that we are overshooting 6 of the 9 boundaries that represent the safe space for humanity to continue to develop and thrive for generations to come on Earth (see Figure 1).

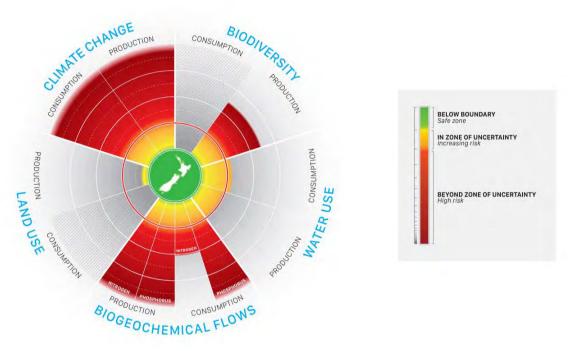


Figure 2 NZ's Assessment of 5 Planetary Boundaries. Ministry for Environment 2020

In 2020 the Ministry for Environment commissioned research to translate the planetary boundaries framework to New Zealand (see Figure 2). Like all developed nations New Zealand exceeds its fair share of the safe operating space. Long term planning should be thinking of how any activities planned for will fit within, contribute to, or be aligned with operating in this safe operating space.

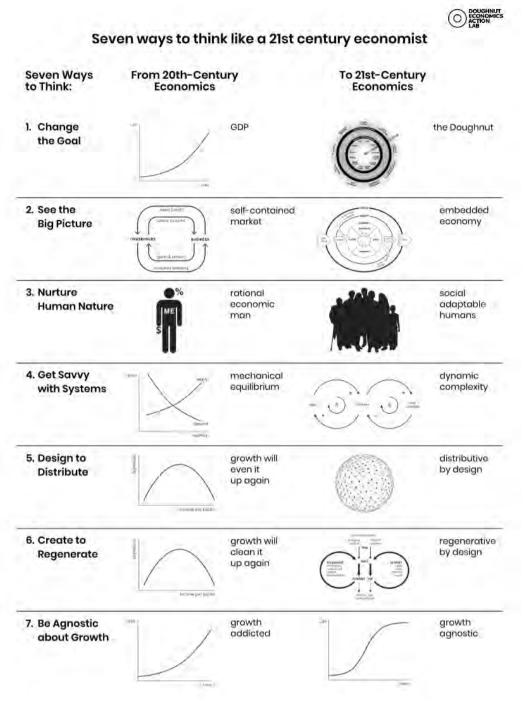


Figure 3 7 ways to think like a 21st Century Economist

However, the report noted we can build a regenerative, circular economy that enhances New Zealand's resilience and reduces the transgression of planetary boundaries. The Doughnut Economics model we're presenting today enables this. It also incorporates the Sustainable Development Goals and aligns with NZ's Living Standards Framework. At its core, it suggests all activities should be developed and considered using the 'Seven ways to think like a 21<sup>st</sup> Century Economist' (see Figure 3).

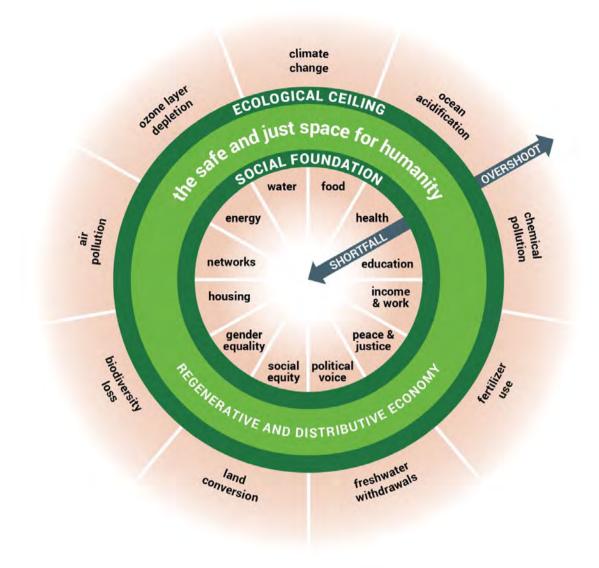
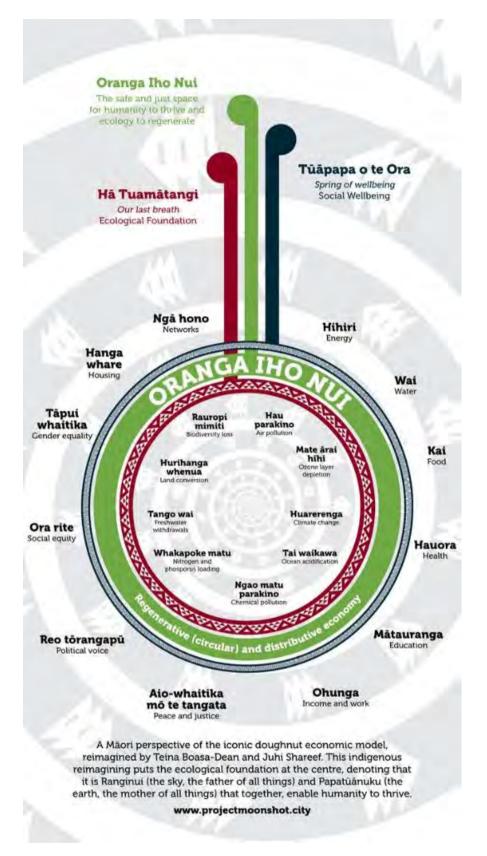


Figure 4 A compass for human prosperity

Doughnut Economics provides a compass and map towards a safe and just space for humanity to thrive (see Figure 4). Outside the circle is the overshoot of planetary boundaries, inside the circle represents the shortfall of human deprivation. The model has been reimagined by Tuuhoe, who says the environment is the foundation and the social elements belong in the outer ring (see Figure 5). While these two doughnuts are slightly different interpretations of the same thing, what they have in common is that they recognise human activity must operate in balance with nature.

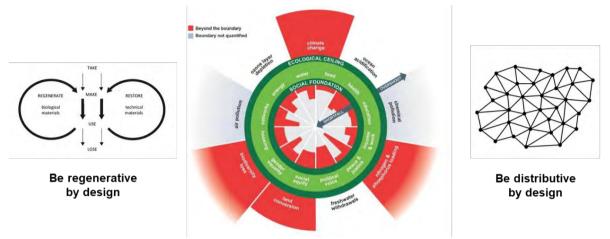


Figure 6 How can we get humanity into the doughnut?

We know the world is dangerously out of balance environmentally and socially. Our subconscious default is to grow the economy and our measure for this is GDP. However, the physical constraints of a finite planet mean that GDP cannot grow forever. GDP also does

not allow for fair distribution of wealth. It certainly does not consider environmental impacts. An oil spill is good for GDP, for example, because of the extra work (or use of goods and services) it creates. Instead, Doughnut Economics proposes that we be distributive and regenerative by design (Figure 6).

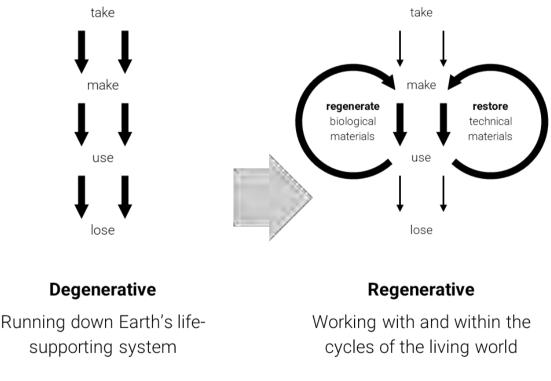
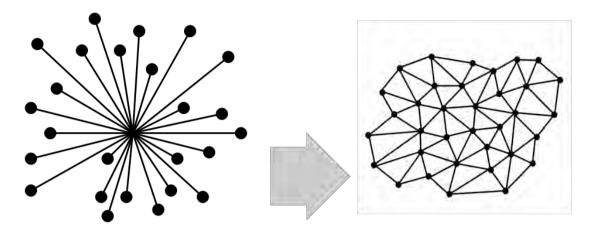


Figure 7 Change from degenerative to regenerative design

Instead of degenerating earth's life supporting systems with our take, make, use and waste model, we need to regenerate and restore our living world (Figure 7). Examples include landscape restoration, the circular economy (such as the right to repair and repair cafes), nature-centred cities and nature-rich buildings.

In addition, instead of dividing value and opportunity into the hands of a few, we need to share value with the people who cocreated it (see Figure 8). Examples include affordable social housing, public transport, community micro-grids and purpose-led business.

The city of Amsterdam has used Doughnut Economics as a tool to guide their social and economic recovery from the covid pandemic. Since then, over 80 local and regional governments worldwide have started exploring the concepts and what would it mean for their place to put them into practice. Locally, Regen Melbourne and Regen Sydney are each a collective of around 180 organisations using the doughnut as a concept to gather around to design their ambitions for a thriving future.

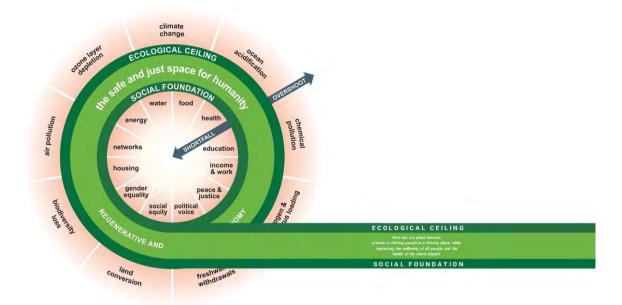


Figure 9 Unrolling the doughnut

So how do we implement the Doughnut Economics model in councils (Figure 9)? I'm going to give you a very high-level overview, but of course we'd need much longer than 5 minutes to delve into the detail. Luckily, all of this information is available open-source via the Doughnut Economics Action Lab.

First, councils need to understand and explore the possible futures they want through four lenses of local, global, ecological and social, by asking questions that consider both local aspirations for people and planet, and also global responsibilities (see Figure 10).

They might look at these four lenses in a variety of ways, such as through holistically inquiry, by identifying interconnections or by exploring possibilities (see Figures 11-13).

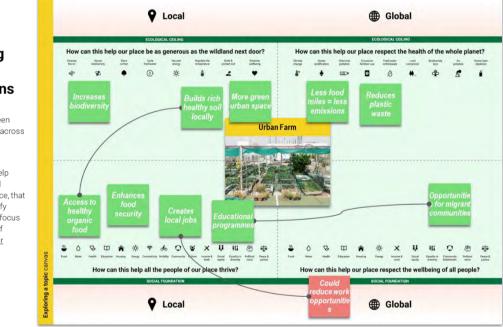


Figure 12 Using the Doughnut to identify interconnections - example Urban Farming

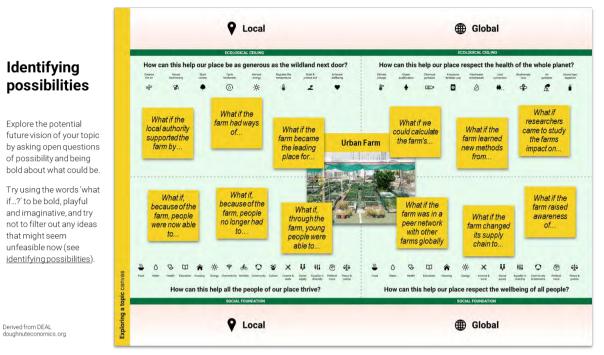


Figure 13 Using the Doughnut to explore possibilities - example Urban Farming

So depending on where you are at on your sustainability journey, my ask today is that you engage Doughnut Economics as part of your Long Term Planning process:

- 1. Firstly, I ask you to understand the four lenses of local, global, ecological and social, and focus on these as a long-term target, rather than economic growth.
- 2. Next, you may need to collect data to create a portrait of place.
- 3. Then, you would engage with the doughnut across multiple dimensions of your organisation, to ensure your local targets and decisions sit within the planetary boundaries and investments align with social foundations.
- 4. Finally, you would create communities around those dimensions to help shift thinking towards 21<sup>st</sup> century economics that enables a thriving humanity on a liveable planet.

Representing the majority of the 24 transitional housing providers across Tāmaki Makaurau, ATHPN plays a crucial role in supporting individuals in need of housing. With Auckland hosting 44.2 percent (2,765) of the 6,246 transitional houses across Aotearoa New Zealand, our network offers a diverse array of services aimed at helping people succeed, sustain their own futures, and plan for long-term housing stability.

Transitional Housing is more than just housing. We provide a diverse range of support services and tailored responses across the Auckland region to support and empower Aucklanders to succeed and sustain their own futures and plan for long term housing.

Transitional housing providers play a crucial role in the comprehensive Auckland-wide effort to combat homelessness. Every day, we diligently strive to diminish health disparities, crime rates, instances of family violence, and antisocial behaviour. Additionally, we actively promote positive lifestyle choices, education, independent living, and various other initiatives as integral components of a nationwide endeavour to eradicate homelessness.

## **Overall feedback:**

- We commend Auckland Council for the funding currently invested into homelessness initiatives and encourage Auckland Council to increase their investment in this area.
- We endorse the "Pay More, Get More" option, as it would significantly boost investment and expedite efforts to support housing growth and align infrastructure.
- We suggest that Auckland Council continues to explore Inclusionary Housing as a strategy to enhance affordability throughout the Auckland region.
- We urge Auckland Council to collaborate with and involve Auckland community housing providers to better understand local housing needs, thereby informing future housing growth and infrastructure planning.
- We commend Mayor Brown for the commitments made at the Te Ohu Whakawhanaunga Mayoral Forum 2022.
- We intend to deliver an oral submission concerning Auckland Council's Long-Term Plan.
- We endorse Community Housing Aotearoa's submission to Auckland Council's Long-Term Plan.













#### Our submission

The Long-Term Plan presents a more defined trajectory and a streamlined role for Auckland Council, emphasizing key priorities such as enhancing efficiency, expediency, and cost-effectiveness. It also outlines policy improvements aimed at fostering a beautiful, thriving, and safe environment for all Aucklanders. We particularly endorse the emphasis on infrastructure investment for housing growth, including stormwater, transportation, and community investment, as outlined in the Auckland Housing Programme Areas specified in the Auckland Future Development Strategy.

Our submission is guided by the vision of ensuring adequate housing for all New Zealanders. Given Auckland Council's proposal to significantly increase infrastructure investment for housing, we strongly urge them to explore additional measures to ensure that housing growth remains affordable and accessible to all Aucklanders across the entire housing continuum.

#### Inclusionary Housing for Tāmaki Makaurau

The ATHPN backs the promotion of Inclusionary Housing as a potent means to address diverse housing needs within communities across Aotearoa New Zealand. Considerable research supports the adoption of Inclusionary Housing, urging the central government to empower and formalize local authorities' capacity to implement it through forthcoming legislation replacing the Resource Management Act—an initiative endorsed by ATHPN.

Inclusionary Housing yields enduring community benefits and is widely employed abroad to ensure affordability for local residents. It entails a policy framework where a designated percentage of social and affordable housing is incentivized in new developments, broadening opportunities for individuals to thrive in secure, healthy homes.

A 2018 report from Auckland Council's Community and Social Policy department on Affordable Housing in Auckland underscores housing needs and relevant initiatives to augment low-cost housing, assisted rent, and assisted homeownership. The report identifies Inclusionary Housing as a strategic tool for enhancing affordability. Additionally, Auckland Council's Submission on the Resource Management (Enabling Housing Supply and Other Matters Amendment) Bill asserts that enabling Inclusionary Housing would have a "meaningful difference" in fostering affordable housing in Auckland. This acknowledgment is significant, given the previous implementation of a flawed Inclusionary Housing policy in Auckland's Special Housing Areas, which yielded limited effectiveness.

Auckland Council has actively advocated at the national level for Inclusionary Housing, recognizing its potential to deliver affordable homes within a comprehensive national framework. However, there appears to be no progress in investigating Inclusionary Housing as a policy framework/planning tool for Auckland Council.













### Partnering with the Auckland Housing Sector

The ATHPN endorses the Long-Term Plan's strategy to collaborate closely with Kāinga Ora and the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development. Furthermore, we urge Auckland Council and Eke Panuku to forge partnerships and actively involve Auckland housing providers, with a particular emphasis on delivering much-needed affordable housing throughout Auckland. Auckland's housing providers possess extensive knowledge, experience, and insights into local housing needs, which can significantly contribute to informed long-term planning for housing growth and infrastructure.

#### Auckland Mayoral Forum asks on Housing

The ATHPN's peak body, Community Housing Aotearoa – Ngā Wharerau o Aotearoa (CHA), is a member of a comprehensive community coalition known as Te Ohu Whakawhanaunga (Te Ohu). Prior to the last local election in Auckland, Te Ohu presented several housing requests to the Mayoral candidates, receiving a commitment from Wayne Brown regarding these requests should he become Mayor:

1. Auckland Council adopting the right to a decent home

2. Establishing a coordination group made up of council and representatives if Te Ohu Whakawhanaunga with a council designated resource to:

a. Explore and support mechanisms implementing the right to a decent home

b. Receive progress reports on actions taken by Auckland Council or by Eke Panuku towards this outcome

3. Directing Auckland Council to investigate and report on councils ability to:

a. Provide and facilitate the provision of affordable, health, accessible, secure, and culturally adequate rental accommodation retained on council land;

- b. Support Māori housing initiatives.
- c. Support a range of affordable housing initiatives in partnership with CHP's Kāinga Ora, and private developers.
- 4. Directing Auckland Council to investigate inclusionary zoning options for Auckland.

## 1. Overview

For Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland to prosper, its people require good health, productive lives and to feel included in society. Good health is contingent upon various societal factors, including strong communities, access to socioeconomic resources, quality education, and a health-promoting physical environment. The enjoyment of the highest attainable standard of health is a fundamental human right.<sup>1</sup> Providing the social, economic, cultural, and environmental conditions that promote wellbeing within present and future communities is one of the main purposes of local government.<sup>2</sup>

The National Public Health Service (NPHS) is a directorate within Health New Zealand – Te Whatu Ora (Health NZ). This submission has been written by NPHS – Northern Region, a regional arm of the directorate covering Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland and Te Tai Tokerau/Northland. NPHS cares about promoting and protecting the health and wellbeing of our communities and achieving equity within the population. Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland faces a number of challenges such as rising inequity, increasing numbers of residents, an ageing population, climate change, a rising prevalence of long-term health conditions, and the impacts associated with harmful commodities, including tobacco and alcohol. The Long-Term Plan 2024 – 2034 (LTP) should confront the reality of growing demand for quality infrastructure and services as a result of these challenges, prioritising actions that advance equity or reduce inequity. Addressing these issues is essential to improving population health and the prosperity of Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland.

NPHS acknowledges the complexities confronted by Auckland Council (Council) in addressing major financial challenges in a region facing significant social, economic, and environmental pressures. Consequentially, the LTP lends a pivotal opportunity for Council to be leaders and innovators in shaping an equitable and prosperous Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland through ambitious transformational change.

This submission details some overarching concerns and recommendations with regard to the LTP consultation, before providing more specific commentary on the proposal, namely:

- 1) the overall direction, and;
- 2) funding across council service areas.

NPHS' principal concern that underpins the enclosed response is the ability of the LTP to achieve equitable outcomes within Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland. Based on this priority and the surrounding evidence, NPHS favours the overall balance of rates and expenditure contained within the 'Pay More, Get More' proposal, as that is more likely to enhance the wellbeing of underserved

communities. However, it is imperative to note that this alignment hinges on the understanding that Council bears accountability for advancing equitable outcomes through the implementation of the LTP. This entails ensuring that Council spending generates health gains for Māori, Pacific peoples, and other underserved communities, whilst also mitigating adverse impacts of rate rises on lower income households and residential tenants. By achieving this balance, Council can demonstrate its commitment to honoring Te Tiriti o Waitangi (in particular, Article 3 – Ōritetanga) and to achieving the goals of the Auckland Plan 2050, which recognises growing inequity as one of the three biggest challenges for Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland.

## 2. Response to the consultation

## **Overarching comments**

This section identifies opportunities for Council to improve the overall approach to the LTP consultation and provides overarching recommendations for LTP decision-making.

## Te Tiriti o Waitangi

NPHS recommends greater reference to Te Tiriti o Waitangi in the LTP documents, such that acknowledgement of the articles of Te Tiriti is an integral component of the proposal. Implementing Te Tiriti o Waitangi throughout the proposal, rather than irregularly and in distinct sections, would endorse the Council's commitment to partnering with the community. Te Tiriti o Waitangi — in particular, Article 3 (Ōritetanga) — guides NPHS' approach to public health in Aotearoa/New Zealand. NPHS' role as a Crown agent is to uphold Te Tiriti o Waitangi to ensure equitable physical, mental and social wellbeing and health outcomes, for all in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland.

Similarly, the meaningful application of the articles of Te Tiriti o Waitangi by local government is essential to achieve optimal health and wellbeing in our communities. NPHS encourages Council to strongly consider how it can honour Te Tiriti in the adoption of the LTP and ensure that this is central to the development of future plans and policies.

## **Engagement and consultation**

NPHS would like to see evidence of a greater commitment to engagement with diverse communities in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland. Council has a responsibility to ensure that the voices of Māori, Pacific peoples, disabled people, rangatahi/youth, refugees, new migrants, the LGBTQIA+ community, and other diverse communities are represented and reflected in its decision-making.

## Language and tone

In addition to proactive outreach to engage more diversely with the community, accessibility of the consultation would be enhanced by a more inclusive framing and tone within the LTP documents. In particular, the documents would be improved by using language that is mana-enhancing and reflects the values of the communities that Council serves. Specific examples include:

- The terminology used to label the main proposals as 'Pay Less, Get Less', 'Central', and 'Pay More, Get More' may not be inviting for many in the community and could lead to misinterpretations. Firstly, the framing may inadvertently convey the assumption that all individuals have equal access to resources. It is important to acknowledge the role of structural drivers in shaping varying socioeconomic contexts within the population which affect people's access to the choices offered by Council. The current framing could be perceived as blame-oriented and consistent with a discourse of individual responsibility. In addition, the title of the 'Pay Less, Get Less' proposal could be misinterpreted as a reduction in rates, rather proposing a smaller increase in rates relative to the other proposals. To foster a more inclusive and accessible reading experience, NPHS recommends that future proposals employ language that is more transparent and sensitive to the broader community.
- NPHS recommends that the language used around the proposed change to the local board funding formula is amended using the term 'equitable' instead of 'fair' would more accurately reflect Council's aim to rectify disparities (Refer to submission section 'Parks and Community', page 9).
- A greater emphasis on the foundational values guiding the proposed LTP, that extend beyond the confines of fiscal discourse, would help the community to understand Council's visions for a thriving and prosperous Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland.
- It is crucial that language used by Council in all documents reflects Māori as a partner under Te Tiriti o Waitangi, rather than a high needs population. Language that portrays Council's understanding of its role within this partnership could be significantly strengthened within the current LTP proposal.

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## Translating strategic priorities into meaningful action

NPHS supports the Council's prioritisation of wellbeing in the Auckland Plan 2050, particularly as it details the importance of supporting Māori identity and wellbeing and equitable outcomes. NPHS also supports the LTP's performance measurement framework that prioritises Māori outcomes across all investment areas. However, for Council to give effect to its strategic priorities, NPHS recommends that the LTP places greater emphasis on activities that will have a meaningful impact for Māori and groups experiencing disparities. For example:

- NPHS supports the inclusion of the 'Papakāinga and Māori Housing' outcomes within Kia Ora Tāmaki Makaurau. Access to affordable, quality, safe housing is essential to wellbeing, and inequitable access is a significant driver of systemic health inequities in Aotearoa/New Zealand. The impacts of colonisation and breaches of Te Tiriti o Waitangi have led to an underrepresentation of Māori in home ownership in Aotearoa/New Zealand. Whilst it is encouraging to see Council's commitment to providing expert advice and investment in Māori housing, papakāinga and marae infrastructure, NPHS would like to see greater commitment to addressing the economic and structural barriers to home ownership. Such activities can also generate gains in safe housing access, and hence health outcomes, for Pacific peoples, tāngata whaikaha, and lower-income earners. The importance of Council activities in this area is detailed in this submission under 'City and local development', page 12.
- If Council are to reduce expenditure in certain areas, NPHS urges Council to prioritise the retention of initiatives that enhance Māori wellbeing and reduce inequities. The benefits of this approach are reiterated throughout our comments on funding across Council services. This includes retaining concentrated spending on:
  - 1) infrastructure and services in areas of higher socioeconomic deprivation;
  - activities that address major sources of health inequities in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland, including access to quality affordable housing and healthpromoting transport options, and protection against harmful commodities; and
  - 3) initiatives designed and delivered in partnership with mana whenua.

## Overall direction: Achieving an equitable balance of expenditure

## and rates

NPHS' foremost priority is that the LTP achieves equitable outcomes for communities in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland. Based on this priority and surrounding evidence, NPHS favours the overall balance of rates and expenditure detailed under the 'Pay More, Get More' proposal, as that most likely to enhance the wellbeing of underserved communities. However, it is imperative to note that this alignment hinges on the understanding that Council bears accountability for advancing equitable outcomes through the implementation of the LTP. To achieve this balance, NPHS recommends that Council factor the following in its decision-making:

- Increasing Council funding and service provision in parallel with raising residential rates has the potential to reduce inequity due to; 1) the inequitable distribution of homeownership in Aotearoa/New Zealand, and; 2) the opportunity for additional Council spending to achieve health gains for underserved communities. A recent report released by Health NZ found that 21% of Pacific people and 31% of Māori own their own home, as compared to 58% of European/Other people.<sup>3</sup> In the Northern Region (Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland and Te Tai Tokerau/Northland), non-Māori / non-Pacific live on average 8 years longer than Māori and 7 years longer than Pacific people.<sup>3</sup> These inequities are avoidable and unjust and are a result of systemic social and economic drivers. Home ownership is one of the key platforms for wealth, particularly in Aotearoa/New Zealand. Investing rating income in a range of services available to both those who own property and those who do not is a mechanism for enabling all to benefit from our public resources.
- The Local Government Act 2002 states that the purpose of local government is to "promote the social, economic, environmental, and cultural well-being of communities in the present and for the future". Consequently, it is incumbent upon Council to balance financial levers in a way that addresses current inequities in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland whilst also safeguarding the interests of future generations.
- Whilst a parallel increase in both Council activities and residential rates presents opportunities for Council to reduce current inequities and promote intergenerational equity, it is crucial to consider the potential impacts of rate rises on lower income households, as well as residential tenants (via rent increases). NPHS urges Council to factor these impacts into decisions around

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the level of rate increases, and to take steps to mitigate any impacts, such as by increasing rate remissions for low-income homeowners. NPHS also encourages Council to consider the accessibility of the rate remission scheme and minimise the complexity of the application process to the most practicable extent.

• To ensure an equitable approach, it is vital that any increases in Council investment or operational spending, address disparities in opportunities across groups in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland. To monitor this, NPHS encourages Council to develop a consistent equity monitoring framework across Council group activities that sits alongside the measurement frameworks for '*Climate mitigation and adaptation*' and '*Māori outcomes*'. NPHS notes the inclusion of '*Communities of greatest need*' in the performance measurement framework diagram provided on page 7 of the Supporting Information document. However, the detail provided on the performance measurement framework on page 651 (*Section 8.2*) of the Supporting Information document and page 30 of the Consultation document do not identify an equity measure. In addition, the performance measures listed under each Council service area do not appear to monitor the extent to which activities will address disparities. If an equity monitoring framework already exists, it would be encouraging to see these details clearly reflected in the LTP documents.

## **Funding across Council service areas**

This section provides specific commentary on the proposed activities and initiatives across the service areas identified in the LTP.

#### Transport

• NPHS encourages Council to progress with planned active transport projects and is concerned about the impacts of reductions to expected cycleway extensions under the 'Pay Less, Get Less' proposal. A connected and safe cycling network is one of the biggest drivers of increased active transport use. Active transport has considerable positive effects on physical and mental health of individuals, improving heart health, reducing risks of some cancers and improving sleep quality and stress. Furthermore, the provision of safe active transport infrastructure is vital for protecting Aucklanders from the health impacts of air pollution and for reducing carbon emissions. Council has recognised the importance of promoting safe and equitable access to active transport in the Climate Action Plan and the Auckland Plan 2050 (*Outcome: Transport and Access*). Giving effect to these goals within the current LTP can demonstrate Council's commitment to supporting an equitable, healthy, thriving, sustainable Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland.

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- NPHS encourages Council to retain the planned funding for transport safety projects and continue to take meaningful steps towards reducing deaths and serious injuries on the roads in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland. The implementation of safe speeds, raised pedestrian crossings, red light cameras, and other traffic calming measures are cost–effective methods to reduce road deaths and serious injuries.<sup>4,5</sup> Implementation of the current Katoa, Ka Ora proposal is expected to reduce Death and Serious Injuries (DSI) by approximately 184 over the next 10 years.<sup>5</sup> In addition, the perception of safety is one of the main barriers preventing Aucklanders from walking and cycling. Research in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland found that parents and children would be more likely to walk and cycle if there were more road safety features.<sup>6</sup> Ensuring that transport safety projects are adequately funded is crucial for Council to meet both its goals under the Auckland Plan 2050 (*Outcome: Transport and Access, Area 6*) and its obligations under the Local Government (Auckland Council) Act 2009, which requires Auckland Transport to contribute to a safe transport system.
- NPHS supports the introduction of time of use charging within Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland, if implemented in an equitable manner and in tandem with improving access to other transport options. If done well, a time of use charging scheme can present multiple co-benefits, including reduced carbon emissions, improved air quality, and additional Council revenue that can be allocated to other health-promoting initiatives.

The London congestion charging scheme was found to reduce harmful emissions (particulate matter and nitrogen dioxide) from vehicles and contributed (alongside other air quality interventions) to better air quality.<sup>7</sup> In 2016, over half of all Aucklanders (59.4%) were exposed to levels of nitrogen dioxide (NO2) higher than the current World Health Organization's Air Quality Guidelines, with higher rates for Pacific Peoples (74.5%).<sup>8</sup> These exposure levels were overwhelmingly from vehicle emissions. This is estimated to have caused 685 premature deaths and 3504 respiratory and cardiovascular hospitalisations in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland,

alongside 6144 new cases of asthma among children. The annual social costs are estimated to be \$3.2 billion from both direct hospital costs and restricted activity days where people could not work.

To avoid any unintended consequences for the wellbeing of Aucklanders, it is important that the introduction of time of use charging in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland parallels the provision of accessible and safe public and active transport infrastructure. Furthermore, these charges should be implemented according to international experiences of minimising negative impacts on those experiencing higher levels of socioeconomic disadvantage, including by omitting routes that are pivotal to the connection of higher deprivation areas.

#### Water

 NPHS supports investment in infrastructure that will both mitigate the public health risks associated with future wastewater overflows into the harbours and protect Aucklanders from the impacts of future flood events. Importantly, the rollout of these infrastructure upgrades should be focused in areas of higher socioeconomic deprivation.

## Parks and Community

- NPHS supports Council's proposed change to the local board funding formula that gives a
  greater weighting to deprivation in the distribution of funds. However, the use of the term
  'equitable' rather than 'fair' within the LTP documents would more accurately reflect Council's
  intentions. 'Fair' is subjective and can lead to misunderstandings. Conversely, 'equitable'
  explicitly conveys the idea of addressing inequity or imbalance in resource distribution. It shifts
  the focus from an ambiguous notion of fairness to a deliberate effort to ensure communities
  have access to the resources they need to thrive.
- NPHS supports the continuation of \$700 million of operational funding to transition from a traditional asset-based delivery model supporting direct service provision, to a model focused on integrated services, partnerships, and digital services. A shift towards working in a more flexible, modern environment will be important for delivering on recognised gaps in service provision and providing greater benefits to communities.
- NPHS supports the retention of grant funding for play activations and is concerned about the impacts of a potential reduction in funding under the 'Pay Less, Get Less' proposal. Amid the challenges of urban redevelopment, the vital role of play activations in fostering children's creative and physical development becomes increasingly pronounced. Play is not merely a

pastime; it's a foundational element in children's holistic development, offering a myriad of benefits across cognitive, physical, social, and emotional domains. Play evolves from simple exploratory actions in infants to structured, complex activities in older children, significantly impacting their social, physical, and cognitive skills. Integrating play activations within urban environments is not just an investment in children's immediate enjoyment but a strategic move towards nurturing the next generation's well-being and development.<sup>9,10</sup> By continuing to fund play activations, Council can demonstrate its commitment to honouring Te Tiriti o Waitangi by promoting equitable access to health and wellbeing for all children, particularly benefiting Māori, Pacific peoples and underserved communities. These have the potential to reduce long-term healthcare costs through fostering early physical and mental health. Additionally, supporting play activations adheres to the mandates of the Local Government Act 2002 for Councils to enhance community wellbeing.

- NPHS supports the proposed funding of \$35 million toward indoor sports facilities. By increasing access to such facilities, especially in areas experiencing higher levels of socioeconomic deprivation, Council can promote physical activity and social cohesion. These facilities will be especially crucial for promoting the health and wellbeing of tamariki/rangatahi in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland.
- NPHS supports the retention of current opening hours of community facilities and is concerned about the impacts of a potential reduction under the 'Pay Less, Get Less' proposal. Reducing the operating hours for sports and recreation centres will affect opportunities for physical activity and, consequently, community wellbeing and social cohesion. Recreational facilities play a critical role in enhancing community wellbeing by serving as essential spaces for physical activity, mental relief, and social interaction. They act as communal grounds that encourage healthier lifestyles, aiding in the reduction of diseases associated with sedentary living. Socially, these facilities foster a sense of community, building social networks and support systems crucial for emotional wellbeing. Protecting the accessibility and operational readiness of these centres is not only about facilitating leisure or physical activities; it's about securing a foundation for a healthier, more cohesive, and inclusive Auckland.<sup>11</sup> By protecting the opening hours of these facilities, Council can demonstrate its commitment to Te Tiriti o Waitangi to ensure equitable health opportunities for all demographics, including Māori, Pacific peoples, tāngata whaikaha, and other underserved groups.

- NPHS recommends ensuring that access to safe, clean drinking water (and related infrastructure) is prioritised through any decisions on asset disposal or service reduction. This includes the provision of drinking fountains and refill stations, especially in spaces used frequently by children such as parks and playgrounds. Equitably ensuring that all communities have access to clean drinking water in public spaces promotes water drinking, protects teeth and reduces potential for plastic single use bottles. This aligns strategically with Auckland Plan 2050 (*Outcome: Belonging and Participation*) and Auckland's Climate Plan.
- Council plays a pivotal role in shaping local food environments. To meet its legislative obligations to promote community wellbeing under the Local Government Act 2002, councils need to take all practicable steps to ensure that these environments promote healthy food choices. NPHS recommends Council incorporates the following actions into its planning:
  - a) Commit to healthy environments within Council itself as well as within community facilities (for example through embedding the Healthy Environment Approach) to support healthy options as the first and easiest choice.<sup>12</sup>
  - b) Prioritise policies that promote health-oriented marketing environments within Councilcontrolled Organisations (CCOs) to promote healthy lifestyle choices. An existing example is Auckland Transport's policy on marketing that does not permit the promotion of alcohol, gambling, tobacco or vaping.<sup>13</sup> Policies such as this could be strengthened by emphasising the importance of preventing marketing to children for ultra-processed food and drinks.
- NPHS encourages Council to ensure the funding of community gardens is protected under the current LTP. Community gardens generate a range of health benefits via improvements to social, economic, and cultural wellbeing. They are a practical setting that offer opportunities to practice and revitalise traditional Māori kai practices.<sup>14</sup> In addition, community gardens play a vital role in supporting local food security, as identified in Te Tāruke-ā-Tāwhiri: Auckland's Climate Plan (Action Area 4). Their role as a climate adaptation tool further extends to their

ability to provide buffering effects against climate change as an urban green space.<sup>15</sup> Funding of these important community assets not only provides the required physical resources, but also supports paid staff who hold expertise and skills that enable the gardens to function. The retention of this funding is strategically aligned with the Auckland Plan 2050 (*Outcomes: Homes and Places; Māori Outcomes and Wellbeing*), the Auckland Climate Action Plan, and enables Council to meet its obligations under Te Tiriti o Waitangi and the Local Government Act 2002.

### City and local development

 NPHS supports Council investment in the urban regeneration programme and are concerned about the impacts of potential reductions in projects that contribute to improving quality compact form and equitable housing access in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland.

Access to affordable quality housing is a fundamental human right and a key social determinant of health. A study analysing data from 2010-2017 estimated that illnesses attributable to unsafe and substandard housing in Aotearoa/New Zealand resulted in \$141 million of direct costs to the public sector annually. Furthermore, the study estimated 229 deaths attributable to these conditions annually, resulting in a cost to society of \$1 billion.<sup>16</sup> Access to optimal housing conditions is inequitably distributed within society, and a direct contributor to health inequities.<sup>17</sup> The provision of affordable, safe, quality housing is essential for achieving health gains for Māori, Pacific peoples, tāngata whaikaha, and low-income earners. By continuing to invest in activities that will catalyse the development of affordable quality housing, Auckland Council can continue to take meaningful steps towards achieving the goals of the Auckland Plan 2050 (*Outcomes: 'Belonging and Participation'*, *'Māori identity and Wellbeing'*, and '*Homes and Places'*), and demonstrate its commitment to supporting Māori outcomes and meeting its obligations under Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

In addition to improving access to affordable quality housing, the urban regeneration programme is important for fostering the physical conditions required for thriving communities, including by improving access to key amenities, such as public and active transport, supermarkets, green spaces, and community facilities. Improving the overall

quality of new and existing neighbourhoods has multiple co-benefits, including reducing carbon emissions, improving air quality, increasing community resilience, and promoting economic, social, and physical wellbeing.<sup>17</sup>

If urban regeneration activities do need to be reduced, NPHS urges Council to do so equitably and in a way that will continue to protect public health in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland. This can be achieved by retaining projects that will have the greatest benefit for Māori and Pacific peoples, are focused in areas of higher socioeconomic deprivation, and are dedicated to enabling the delivery of affordable quality housing and accessible health-promoting transport infrastructure.

### **Environment and regulation**

 NPHS supports ongoing investment in community-led environmental initiatives. NPHS is concerned about a proposed reduction in support for these initiatives, particularly with regard to decreased support for mana whenua to exercise kaitiakitanga. Continuing these activities contributes to thriving communities, increases social cohesion, and supports cultural wellbeing. Ongoing investment will demonstrate Council's commitment to supporting Māori outcomes, honouring Te Tiriti o Waitangi, and promoting thriving, resilient communities.

### **Council support**

- NPHS supports an increase in Kia Ora Tāmaki Makaurau funding within the central proposal as a key avenue through which Council can support Māori outcomes and deliver on its Te Tiriti o Waitangi obligations.
- NPHS would like to see a reassurance within the LTP that funding for the remaining Counciloperated childcare centres in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland will be maintained.

The provision of these services is strategically aligned with The Auckland Plan 2050, which acknowledges that children have a right to an education and that there is consistent evidence linking good quality education, especially childhood education, with improved skills development and lifelong learning. In addition, Council's Child and Youth Strategic Action Plan (I Am Auckland) prioritises children and young people supported at all levels of education, from early childhood education.

Importantly, Kauri Kids services increase equitable access to high-quality education from a young age by providing a low-cost and highly flexible option as compared to for-profit private

providers. Aotearoa/New Zealand has some of the highest childcare costs in the Western world. According to the latest OECD data from 2018, a typical couple who both earn the average wage and have two kids spends 28% of their income on childcare.<sup>18</sup> Furthermore, Kauri Kids centres are sites of best-practice community initiatives that promote the health and wellbeing of tamariki and whānau. All services are located within or next to existing Council facilities (community houses, pool or leisure centres) that promote supportive environments for whānau to participate in community initiatives.<sup>19,20</sup> In addition, Kauri Kids centres are also case studies on healthy kai and wai through initiatives such as the Healthy Environment Approach.<sup>21</sup>

It is important that Council's current resource allocation for alcohol licensing services is maintained at or above its current levels to ensure whānau and communities in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland are safe from alcohol-related harm. Alcohol causes substantial harm to individuals and communities, with some communities, including Māori, experiencing higher levels of harm than others from the wide availability of alcohol.<sup>22,23</sup> Continuing to provide adequate resource to Council's regulatory role within alcohol licensing is key to controlling the availability of alcohol, ensuring that Council meets its goals under the Alcohol Harm Minimisation Strategy (2022) and its commitment to equitable health outcomes for Māori under Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

## North Harbour Stadium

NPHS does not take a position on the Council's approach to managing the future of the North Harbour Stadium precinct. However, NPHS wishes to raise the potential public health risks associated with a move to a private sponsorship model, which may allow access for harmful commodity industries such as alcohol and ultra-processed food companies.

Keeping North Harbour Stadium free from alcohol marketing is vital for Auckland Council to meet its commitment to minimise alcohol-related harm in Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland.<sup>24</sup> There is a causal

relationship between youth exposure to alcohol marketing and earlier uptake of drinking.<sup>25</sup> Māori and Pacific childrens' exposure to alcohol marketing is five and three times that of Pākehā children, respectively.<sup>26</sup>

In addition to concerns around alcohol marketing, a shift to a private sponsorship model may result in an influx of advertising, sponsorship and/or promotion of ultra-processed food brands. Adopting a Healthy Environment Approach would minimise unintended negative consequences for children's exposure to harmful food and drink marketing in this setting and align with the Council's role under the Local Government Act 2002 to promote the overall well-being of the community.<sup>12</sup>

If the North Harbour Stadium does move to a private sponsorship model, NPHS urges Council to ensure that this does not result in any marketing of alcohol, ultra-processed food brands, tobacco and vaping, or gambling to the community.

# Conclusion

Thank you for the opportunity to submit on Auckland Council's Long-Term Plan 2024–2034. NPHS and Council share a commitment to reduce inequities and achieve wellbeing for all within Tāmaki Makaurau/Auckland under Te Tiriti o Waitangi. This submission highlights opportunities for Council to meet this commitment under the current LTP, namely through the equitable provision of affordable quality housing, accessible healthy transport options, early childhood education, healthy kai, drinking water, and community facilities; investment in community-led initiatives; and activities to mitigate the inequitable impacts of extreme weather events and harmful commodities. NPHS welcomes the opportunity to discuss any of the points raised in this submission.

The needs of all users of public buildings and spaces must be taken into account in developing infrastructure in Auckland.

For many blind people, the built environment acts as a barrier to their participation in the community. The inability to fully access the facilities that everyone else in the





community takes for granted – footpaths, cafes, public buildings, swimming pools, libraries, sporting facilities and movie theatres – limits independence and impacts on quality of life. Most often access to the built environment is thought of only in terms of wheelchair access within buildings and carparks. Blind, deafblind or low vision users are often not considered.

Blind, deafblind and those with low vision must be able to use footpaths safely and effectively. When cyclists and pedestrians share pathways, there is an increased potential for pedestrians to be injured. Cyclists move more quickly than pedestrians move and blind, deafblind and those with low vision often cannot hear them. There are existing standards that apply to the built environment, such as the New Zealand Standard 4121:2001 Design for access and mobility: Building and associated facilities.

Blind Low Vision NZ recommends that:

• Access audits to be included in the design process and to be reviewed (as are fire safety standards) and adhered to.

• Ensure RTS 14 and NZS 4121:2001 are followed in the design, construction, and maintenance of the built environment.

- The removal of shared use paths until minimum safety standards are met.
- No coloured footpath and roadway art is used in the Continuous Accessible Path of Travel. The minimum Continuous Accessible Path of Travel width must be 1.8m.

• No coloured footpath and roadway art is used near pedestrian crossings or intersections.

• No reflective paint is used in coloured footpath and roadway art.

• Collaborate with Blind Low Vision NZ to consult people with vision loss at the design stage of coloured footpath and roadway art projects.

Without safe, accessible public transport, individuals who are blind, deafblind or have low vision have reduced independence, higher rates of unemployment, limited recreational opportunities, and increased social isolation.

There are many facets to public transport, and each may present accessibility barriers. People with vision loss are disproportionately more reliant on public transport than other New Zealanders. It is essential that they are able to plan journeys, access timetables, locate boarding positions, identify destinations and travel to and from these locations safely and independently.

People who are blind, deafblind or who have low vision use taxis more than their sighted peers do in order to travel independently. Taxi systems and passenger information are designed for sighted people. This places blind, deafblind and low vision people at a significant disadvantage in being able to direct the driver, monitor their journey or make complaints. The New Zealand Transport Agency had directed that all taxis must display the name of the company, a number for passengers to call to make complaints and the cab number in braille and large print on the front left-hand passenger door. However, this requirement was rescinded when taxi regulations changed.

Another example and a frequent problem experienced by guide dog handlers is the lack of awareness among taxi operators and drivers of their obligation to carry guide dogs. Some taxi drivers still refuse to take a blind passenger with a guide dog. This is now illegal but is not being monitored by the authorities. In other cases, audible stopping and destination signals and other passenger information systems are either not installed or not consistently used on buses, trains and at stations when they should be.

Blind Low Vision NZ recommends that Auckland Council spend more on:

• Appropriate disability awareness and mandatory training for public transport operators.





• Improve complaints handling processes so that issues people who are blind, deafblind or have low vision might have may be resolved.

• Ensure that all websites and digital applications providing public transport information are accessible. Ensuring ICT associated with user experience is fully accessible meeting international best practice standards such as the latest version of WCAG.

• Require the taxi industry to install meters that have audio output and accessible fare payment information and options.

• Ensure each bus or train stop is announced in a way that is clearly audible throughout the vehicle and on the platform.

• Ensure the fare card system is accessible for commuters who are blind, deafblind or have low vision and that they are able to independently load, use and monitor the validity of their smart fare card.

• To investigate the feasibility of a nationally integrated fare card system for public transport.

- All new foot paths and cycle ways to be physically separated.
- All new bus and train stations to have audio announcements.
- All new transport infrastructure complies with RTS 14 and NZS 2121:2001.

• All new electric ferries and buses need to be accessible for those who are blind, deafblind, or low vision.

### On Electric Buses

The low level of noise of new quiet vehicles presents a significant safety problem for people who are blind, deafblind or who have low vision.

The RNZFB Board believes that:

All people have the right to cross roads at pedestrian crossings and negotiate carparks and other shared spaces without the hazards presented by quiet vehicles.

Hybrid and electric vehicles – referred to as "quiet vehicles" – offer numerous economic, environmental and social benefits. The low level of noise is beneficial from an environmental and social perspective, but presents a significant safety problem for people who are blind, deafblind or who have low vision.





People who are blind, deafblind or have low vision rely on environmental sound as an essential aid to independent mobility and safety when crossing roads and negotiating traffic.

Quiet vehicles will make this much more difficult, and in some cases, impossible. It is worth noting that the widespread introduction of quiet vehicles will have implications for the safety of everyone in the community.

The use of appropriate noise-making devices in quiet vehicles. The Blind Low Vision NZ preference is for the alert sound to mimic the noise of a motor vehicle, as it needs to be distinguished from other less threatening sources.

Hi, I'm a long term caravanner living in Bucklands Beach, my van is certified self contained and it is with some frustration that on returning from a trip away I discovered the dump station at Halfmoon Bay marina is closed, and on investigating I was unable to find a facility anywhere in the East Auckland area.
	I understand why the Marina has closed this facility but am concerned that with the number of trailer boats in the area and there being no facility to empty waste tanks boaties may be tempted to discharge their waste at sea.
	There is a large number of motorhomes and caravans also stored in the Marina park and in the East Auckland area and having no dump station in the region makes it





difficult to empty our tanks in the correct manner.

As a member of the Motor Caravan Association it is my understanding that our organisation has offered to assist in the costs of setting up a facility in East Auckland so I would encourage you to take up this offer. By putting this facility in the Halfmoon Bay marina this would also allow boaties somewhere to empty their tanks as well.

Over the summer months there has been a number of motorhomes overnighting at Bucklands and Eastern beaches and I suspect at other beaches and parks in our area and not having a dump station in the region leaves these people with no alternative other than to dump their waste incorrectly.

We are aware of the PDS at Maraetai Beach but consider no-one in their right mind would use this service unless travelling up from Kaiaua via Kawakawa and Clevedon.
	Dump Stations need to be located in an easily accessible location. They should not be a destination as is the case with the now closed unit at Half Moon Bay. Dump stations should be located in an 'enroute' location which for the East means East Tamaki, Ti Rakau, Ti Irrirangi, even Ormiston.
	There are a significant number of motorhomes and caravans in the East and the closest units are at Drury (accessible to





only a few), Walters Road, and Maraetai. Coming from the North, a stop at Albany (a significant detour) is the best option.

Example #1 WATER : Definitely fast track the Water infrastructure services as a top priority. The 1st ESSENTIAL service is Safe healthy water for drinking in Auckland City (and AotearoaNZ). Thus, fixing all the pipes NOW and maintaining the optimum water quality should ALWAYS be Council Priority. WATER is ESSENTIAL for Health and Sanitation. Water is a Human Right for Life [280 litres per person per day]





The 2nd ESSENTIAL service is processing Waste Water so that NO polluted water goes into our streams and harbours. Council MUST have the highest water standards and regulations and employ inspectors to monitor and prosecutors who enforce hefty penalties on Polluters as the effective deterrant.

The 3rd ESSENTIAL service priority is preventing Stormwater overflows, pollution and flooding.

\*These 3 Water Services should be at minimal cost to ratepayers. Aucklanders already pay high separate water rates- for every person to have a minimum allocation of water. However water for other purposes should be 'user pays'. Every household property owner must be allocated a certain amount of 'free' or minimal cost water, according to the number of people who live at that address. However, increased USE of Water by individuals, households or business will incur extra costs.

Thus, those who use more-pay more. PLEASE identify BIG Water Users and Wastersto Pay for it.

The cost of building new water services and extending pipes for all the new housing developments should not be paid for by longtime ratepayers but by those who benefit from the new housing developments for approximately 120,000 migrants per year. This should also be funded by central government from our taxes (which we already pay). Providing Healthy Water services for citizens should Not be dependent on borrowing and debt, nor privatization by multinational corporates.

If the current Auckland Water rates revenue is deemed to be insufficient for the Essential upgrade of Water Services, then funds can be drawn from our general property rates paid to Auckland City Council and from central government taxes. This should not require an increase in general rates on modest family homes valued at under \$1.3 million. People with multiple properties and luxury homes could pay more if they profit from ownership and council needs to raise rates.

The 4th Essential: Protect Auckland's Urban Forest of Mature Trees. Cease massacre of healthy trees. Destroying trees is contrary to Council principles and NZ national government commitment to lower CO2 emissions and counter the Climate Crisis.

Reduce Costs, Rates and Environmental Harm: Another contradiction of Council objectives to protect the environment and climate, is twisted by Tupuna Maunga Authority. 2A] The TMA is spending ratepayer dollars for cutting down hundreds of mature trees on the volcanic hills, against the will of local communities. The TMA now has control over millions of dollars, much used for chainsaw and helicopter crews. This is where Council could cut the funding. The whole 'development' of these Maunga is a 'nice to have' or non-essential expenditure, but also an unacceptable use of ratepayers money.





However, if TMA gets the money anyway, then they must be accountable to community values. Maunga need protection from vandals and rubbish. They need a budget for care like other Auckland Parks. \*Plant trees, but \*save rate money by reducing grass mowers \*to reduce fossil fuels and CO2 emissions. TMA should be treated like other Community Groups, that apply for annual funding to do environmental restoration planting programmes, not massive tree cutting.

\*It is reasonable to fund TMA if they give evidence that their Maunga planting and CARE programmes, involves employing 'at risk' youth to learn skills to restore the environment, grow food and develop the ethos of responsible citizenship. That would be a true Maori kaupapa.

\*In addition, they could create mountain biking tracks for young boys in parks and maunga -so kids don't have to drive out to Woodhill or Manurewa for this activity that appeals to them.

2B] Council should 'Save Money' by not buying more land for Parks (now) –but just earmark prime parkland for Future Investment - when we have paid for ESSENTIALS. Thus, we would not spend rates on new parkland until we have repaired the pipes, guaranteed safe healthy water for citizens and provided the water infrastructure for increased population housing. However, the new Housing areas should be consented on the basis of the developer paying for a local parkland. Land for Parks or land with high quality agricultural soils for growing food MUST BE PROTECTED from Building developments. Council must have power to refuse consent to build on these areas.

The 6th Essential: dramatically reduce Youth Crime in our communities- Central government, Youth and Family, Social Welfare, Mental Health, Police and Justice systems (paid by our taxes) are supposed to do this work. However, Auckland Council surely has power with Local Boards to be effective in providing Community Wardens and Counselling services that reaches out to all 'at RISK Families'. This involves funding voluntary community groups to do a lot of this work.

The 7th Essential: STOP Wasting Auckland's Waste- The Environment section of the Plan commits to 'good waste management' monitoring and clean-up of landfills. However, there is lack of commitment or method for reducing commercial waste, building and demolition sites waste, production of plastics or products that are not recyclable. The Council still puts responsibility on consumers, expecting them to 'buy the right thing' and sort out waste materials, even tho' most plastics are NOT recycleable and go to landfill! The council should demand that producers change what or how they produce and package products. Auckland Council must issue an ultimatum of restrictions on imports of unrecycleable materials that end up in toxic rubbish dumps.

Auckland Council Must prioritise clean-up of all toxic rubbish dumps and use the MOST environmentally healthy ways of re-using, repurposing, recycling all waste and





ensuring it does not go to landfill. Kate Raworth's Circular Economy ('Donut economics') provides essential guidelines for how to do this.

Parks, Community and Environment: These Council Management areas cross-over but all fail to provide Urban Tree Protection in Housing Developments which also undermines Climate Protection. WHY? There is ample public input over the last 10 years showing the majority of citizens and ratepayers want to Protect the TREES and do not believe in the erroneous choice between 'housing and trees'. It is a travesty that our city wealth of mature trees is being destroyed. It is hypocrisy and pretense of democracy that LBs and Council cannot act on the Community majority asking for Tree Protection.

# 1d. Is there anything else you would like Auckland Council to do less of so that you could pay less?

The 5th Essential: Auckland Council must reduce use of toxic chemicals especially Glyphosate of Monsanto 'Ready-Round-Up' sprayed in parks, berms and public places which children frequent. Surely Council realizes that too much toxic herbicides and pesticides are used and must be stopped in order to protect Health of People and environment, as well reduce huge costs and rates. YES Pay Less to Use Less chemicals!

Council should cut costs on high tech spending AND reduce Marketing, PR and Promotion using ratepayers money for non-essential services. This includes costly extraneous Maorisation of every place name and agency, online and on signage outside buildings. (eg. Glen Eden Library which already has huge lettering on the building, now has another new sign outside in Maori)

Culture & Economy: Auckland Council should not spend so much ratepayers money on so many BIG Commercial Celebrity Star shows, nor build new BIG Stadiums for these BIG events. Auckland Council and Ratepayers should prioritise support for local cultural events, artists and performers on a smaller scale. This would mean Huge SAVINGs for Council.

Commercial multinational corporates pay for the BIG promotion and BIG stage shows not Auckland ratepayers. The public can watch BIGTIME superstars or sporting events on their personal digital devices (for free) or on a BIG Screen being livestreamed from the US or where-ever. If 'the public' demand BIG LIVE shows to come to Auckland, then 'they' pay the price as individuals-not make all ratepayers pay for non-essential commercial entertainment.

It is misleading to try to justify raising ratepayers funds for BIG commercial Pop Culture promotion to bring people to Auckland or as a drawcard for tourists to come to NZ. We





have many other attractions to offer and our economy should not be about importing overseas Acts. However, tourists can pay more for accommodation and visits to our cultural heritage institutions, experiences, Museum, Zoo, etc. (funded by ratepayers). Tourist fees will provide Council with funds it needs to promote the City to attract more visitors. Thus, Council should focus on funding community groups and produce quality cultural events for Auckland citizens eg. Maori, Pacifica and Multicultural Festivals, etc (already paid for by rates that do not need to be raised). This attracts more visitors and raises Council revenue. Prioritise Essential Services.

Council Services: One must question the digitalization of everything in our lives and council spending so much on this technologisation inside and outside every building. It is ridiculous to pay more for high tech than on paying real people. It is disturbing to replace Human Beings and jobs- with machines, especially in public face to face services like libraries. It is wasteful of council ratepayer funds to install screens everywhere, for entertainment, 'notifications' or surveillance

Transport: The double decker monster buses are ugly and wasteful of fuel, usually empty of people, block vision of pedestrians and increase carbon emissions. The major way for Auckland Council to reduce CO2 emissions is to electrify existing public transport, buses, trains, and ferries. Do not expand fossil fuelled public transport. Cease purchase of FOSSIL Fuel vehicles.

It is highly questionable to spend ratepayers and Council's frugal funds on building new, costly massive Public transport systems, because it is unlikely the public will stop using private cars. However, it makes sense to Improve public bus routes for more mini-bus services.

The 7th Essential: Use our rates to fix the potholes and repair roads damaged by floods etc. and make more footpaths as the priority not cycleways.

The 8th Essential: Reduce road deaths, injuries and accidents by Reducing Speeds limits, especially around schools (20-40km) and villages. We should not need more flashing lights, costly high tech cameras and smart devices to 'slow down'. Instead,





people need NEW ROAD RULES that make it clear that we cannot speed around EVERYWHERE in Auckland (only on motorways). Auckland Council should take the initiative to champion 'Safer City Streets' with Auckland Transport. Council should ban 'Boom Box' Cars and motorbikers racing around our streets and parklands. Comment: Some new roads could be built for slower driving, like around Motueka where many good roads are not tarsealed-thus everyone drives more slowly (naturally). Also, there are more cyclists and walkers because there are less vehicles and roads are safer. (South Titirangi Rd and Atkinson Rd are good local examples of tarsealed slow roads, with footpaths.)

People who have BIG modern cars hardly register the feeling of speed (like in airplanes) so do not 'slow down' naturally. Thus, the raised red cross-walks seem the only way to subdue the speedsters. The traffic calming, raised crosswalks are helpful in many places, but too many are in the wrong place. Instead – lower the speeds in pedestrian areas as most cost effective for AT.

Cycleways are 'non-essential' and will not reduce car traffic. Council should save on this 'nice to have' for future times when other Essentials are paid for first. However, the priority cycleways need to be built away from fast roads not alongside them. Then they are an attractive option for recreational use by families or 'keep fit' people. It also daunting to contemplate the boxed 'Consultation Feedback Form' and would need months of study and research to make informed choices. However, I hope my form of submission will still be valuable in terms of Community and Environmental VALUES and PRINCIPLES with policy Examples and specification of Essential Services.

I agree that Council could do less and cut costs on some items listed within each category option. Also within each of the 3 options there are essential services where Council should do more. Unfortunately, 'essential and non-essential' services are lumped together (within each category 'Less, Same, More') so it is difficult to separate and stipulate which to cut and which to keep.

I am in agreement with the Plan's statement of 'Spending more where it is needed most'\* and that 'We should make do with what we have'. However, the problem is that we are Paying More for the same or less services which is 'supposedly' justified as 'inflation'. The logic is that if we accept the rising costs of everything, then Council must demand dramatic rate increases. Thus, we are led to believe TANOO (There Are No Other Options) and the three specified Categories make it easier for people. The Bigger question is: 'How could Auckland Council (and Aotearoa) change the economic ideology and financial system that traps us in debt and is presented as a fait accompli? Does the Council ever question this system?

We understand the reasons for its closure by the marina company but feel it's an important community asset that should be maintained for public use in the area for the following reasons:
	- The closest dump stations to our home in Howick are now Wiri or Maraitai which is a considerable distance and depending on traffic can take an hour or more in travel time
	- People travelling in motorhomes and campers rely on dump stations. Having access to a dump station is an important consideration when planning where to stay, which flows on to benefits for local





businesses such as restaurants, shops, and attractions. Having a local dump station will encourage visitors to stay longer.

other areas where savings could be made which are not interdependent. The 'overall direction' oversimplifies very complex decisions.

We must prioritise looking after our people and planet by investing in the things that provide us with life's essentials, such as fresh air, clean drinking water, hazard resilient landscapes and basic needs, like accessible transport and a sustainable waste network.

Where I'd like Auckland Council to do/spend more

• Public Transport - Ensure public transport is affordable, accessible, and reliable, prioritising investment in public transport infrastructure over road spending.

• Active Transport - Urgently transition towards low emissions communities by prioritising and increasing, not reducing, investment in walking and cycling infrastructure.

• Water Quality - Re-establish the full funding of the Water Quality Targeted Rate (WQTR) to pre-2023/2024 budget levels to ensure delivery and growth of related work programmes.

• Environment and Regulation - Ensure appropriate funding is allocated to increase monitoring activity of current/active and future resource consents to enable better environmental outcomes.

As well as the options provided in the structured consultation, I would also like the Council to do more of the following:

• Protecting and working with communities by continuing to prioritise the funding and delivery of Making Space for Water in partnership with Central Government.

• Ensuring adequate support for community and social services, including contestable grants (such as the Climate Action Grant), the Live Lightly programme, the Communities in Need programme, and supporting work on Council land and marae. This can be achieved by re-establishing pre-2023/2024 budget funding for these areas.

• Supporting frontline, volunteer powered communities by ensuring local boards are adequately funded and grants are available. Grants and investment into community-led services provide great value to Aucklanders. For every dollar that Council invests we get back many more volunteer hours.

• Supporting moves to a circular economy and zero waste, ensuring waste materials are seen as resources to be reused, repaired, repurposed and recycled, and are diverted from landfill.





• Lowering emissions by becoming a leader in localised renewable energy generation by enabling local integrated energy solutions to support community owned energy groups

I want Auckland Council to spend less on new roading projects that prioritise private vehicles as the primary transport mode.

Auckland Council's Transport Emissions Reduction Pathway sets out actions required to reduce the region's transport emissions by 64% by the year 2030. Transport is the biggest emitter contributing to over 40% of the region's total emissions. Within the transport emissions, 86% come from road transport. This sets a clear directive. We need to get people out of private cars, into buses, trains and ferries and onto cycleways. Failing to understand and action this will result in a continuation of over investment in roading projects and underinvestment in the public and active transport networks. The evidence is there and the evidence is clear.

Regarding the Mayoral proposal, I am encouraged to see initiatives to make public transport more accessible, such as the \$50 weekly cap and introduction of diverse payment options. Another positive is the work programmes which look to improve public transport services, such as network optimisation, expansion of the electric train fleet and completion of the City Rail Link. Unfortunately, alongside these positives, there are some concerns. A couple of examples are; the removal of 'low performing' bus services, and the several references to roading focused projects.

As well as continuing to invest and improve our public transport network, it is essential that the Council urgently supports the transition towards low emissions communities by prioritising and increasing, not reducing, investment in walking and cycling infrastructure.

Cutting "low-value initiatives, including raised pedestrian crossings and expensive gold-plated cycleways" is an ideological move that fails to align with the Council's own Transport Emissions Reduction Pathway. In monetary terms, this means cutting





funding for cycleways by \$141.5 million. This makes no sense as we know increasing funding for active transport infrastructure is a smart investment that can benefit the economy, the environment, and public health. Cycling is a low-cost, low-carbon and low-impact mode of transport that can reduce congestion, pollution, and greenhouse gas emissions. Cycling also promotes daily, incidental physical activity, mental wellbeing and social inclusion. By improving the safety, accessibility and attractiveness of walking and cycling, more people will be encouraged to choose it as a regular means of travel, creating a virtuous cycle of benefits. This approach also creates better use of existing roading assets by making space for those who cannot choose cycling, walking or public transport.

This can be achieved by re-establishing pre-2023/2024 budget funding for these areas.

Supporting frontline, volunteer powered communities by ensuring local boards are adequately funded and grants are available. Grants and investment into communityled services provide great value to Aucklanders. For every dollar that Council invests we get back many more volunteer hours.

#### Tell us why:

Auckland Council's Transport Emissions Reduction Pathway sets out actions required to reduce the region's transport emissions by 64% by the year 2030. Transport is the biggest emitter contributing to over 40% of the region's total emissions. Within the transport emissions, 86% come from road transport. This sets a clear directive. We need to get people out of private cars, into buses, trains and ferries and onto cycleways. I personally feel this is such a great idea. Failing to understand and action this will result in a continuation of over investment in roading projects and underinvestment in the public and active transport networks. The evidence is there and the evidence is clear.

Regarding the Mayoral proposal, I am encouraged to see initiatives to make public transport more accessible, such as the \$50 weekly cap and introduction of diverse payment options. Another positive is the work programmes which look to improve public transport services, such as network optimisation, expansion of the electric train fleet and completion of the City Rail Link. Unfortunately, alongside these positives, there are some concerns. A couple of examples are; the removal of 'low performing' bus services, and the several references to roading focused projects.

As well as continuing to invest and improve our public transport network, it is essential that the Council urgently supports the transition towards low emissions communities by prioritising and increasing, not reducing, investment in walking and cycling infrastructure.

Cutting "low-value initiatives, including raised pedestrian crossings and expensive gold-plated cycleways" is an ideological move that fails to align with the Council's own Transport Emissions Reduction Pathway. In monetary terms, this means cutting funding for cycleways by \$141.5 million. This makes no sense as we know increasing funding for active transport infrastructure is a smart investment that can benefit the economy, the environment, and public health. Cycling is a low-cost, low-carbon and low-impact mode of transport that can reduce congestion, pollution, and greenhouse gas emissions. Cycling also promotes daily, incidental physical activity, mental wellbeing and social inclusion. By improving the safety, accessibility and attractiveness of walking and cycling, more people will be encouraged to choose it as a regular means of travel, creating a virtuous cycle of benefits. This approach also creates better use of existing roading assets by making space for those who cannot choose cycling, walking or public transport.

Revenue gained from NETR affects the delivery of essential projects to protect our biodiversity and taonga species. For example, the rate funds kauri dieback track upgrades, treatment support for landowners with kauri dieback, monitoring of the health of our forests and education for visitors to prevent further spread of the disease and predator control on our islands and the mainland. This work supports the health of our environment, which we need to be healthy to keep humans healthy, by filtering our water, catching and intercepting rainfall, holding our soils and slopes together and cleaning our air. Having spent years with large parts of the track network closed to protect kauri it is important to ensure this work continues as planned to enable safe access to our wild places, which are so important for our mental and physical health, and the health of our forests.

Most local authorities, during their assessments under Part 7 of the Local Government Act, determine the need to provide public toilets, which serve / benefit residents and visitors alike. Local Government New Zealand's guidance on assessing sanitary services notes:

For some territorial authorities, the need for and supply of effluent disposal facilities (i.e., facilities for the disposal of wastewater and sewage from trucks and campervans etc.) may be relevant in the assessment of public toilets (Ref: Local Government New Zealand (2000). The knowhow guide to assessing water and sanitary services under the Local Government Act 2002, p. 29.)

A well-functioning public dump station will:

• Provide a safe and convenient facility for local ratepayers to use when they return home from their motorhome and caravan holidays.

• Support the local visitor industry which benefits financially from domestic and international motorhome tourism.

• Protect communities and the environment by providing facilities that encourage visitors and ratepayers to safely dispose of their wastewater.

One of last years priorities for the Howick local board was the environment. Dump stations are designed to protect the environment from indiscriminate waste disposal. Many of the smaller cities and towns around New Zealand understand this





and provide clean water and dumping facilities for many people, yet they are often 100 times smaller in population and geographical area than Auckland is. It seems inconceivable that East Auckland can't provide a dump station for its local residents, New Zealand and international tourists.
The cost of a basic dump station is around \$80,000, as we have been told by NZMCA. This is a long-term investment, and NZMCA have said they will contribute up to 30% of this cost, so as members of NZMCA, and as local rate payers I would expect a responsible council to ensure simple facilities such as these be a priority investment in the 2024 – 25 budget, ensuring that the council are therefore complying with the above mentioned Local Government Act 2002, and section 23 of the health Act 1956.

Whangarei District Council is a member of The Working Party on GMO Risk Evaluation and Management Options. Auckland Council is also a member, and the two Councils share the same concerns. What affects Auckland concerning GMOs and GE, directly affects North Auckland , and indeed , all of New Zealand. The issue cannot be isolated, as it concerns ecology and the environment.





Submission on GE and GMOs.

Explanation of terms used.

HSNO ... Harmful Substances and New Organisms Act

EPA ......Environmental Protection Authority.

G.E..... Genetic Engineering

GMO...Genetically Modified Organism (created by GE.)

CRISPR...Gene editing.

CRISPR allows the genome to be cut at precise locations, allowing for its accurate and targetted renewal or replacement.

It can result in unwanted and potentially pathogenic consequences.

In spite of claims by the scientists in this field, they CANNOT predict the final genetic makeup of any organism they create.

There is a very real need for the Auckland Council to retain and strengthen the precautionary regulations already in the existing plans . There is strong lobbying to have these precautions removed and the present government wishes to allow in the field experiments.

Over the past ten years Northland / Tai Tokerau , the Whangarei District Council , Local lwi, Land and Soil , Organic Farmers have fought and won two court cases to retain the right to have precautionary regulations on GE and GMOs. The first was in the Environment Court and the second in the HIgh Court. An attempt to take it to the Court of Appeal was prevented by the Judiciary.

The right fought for, was the right to make precautionary regulations. In both cases the ability of HSNO and the EPA to understand local conditions and make the needed decisions was found to be inadequate and the Local Government was given that right. We wish to retain that right and hope Auckland will join us in ensuring the two councils retain that right.

There will be costs involved in maintaining this right . The Auckland Council will have to estimate and allocate the necessary funds in its budget. It will be supported by all the GE Free and other organisations associated with it.

I have asserted the need for precautionary regulations .

Two reasons are mentioned above. The government has sided with the CRISPR scientists and their wish for outside trials . We know that the organisms so created cannot be guaranteed to be what the scientists want. That is a problem . If the GMO





turns out to be a danger to the environment and ecology, and it escapes into the environment the costs of control could be immeasurable and never ending. The past record of outside GMO testing has not been good: failure to clean up thoroughly ( animal bodies not buried at the required depth ), an escaped GMO brassica - brassicas are one of our main vegetable species ( cabbage , cauliflower, broccoli, Brussels sprouts to name some...) Luckily the escape was found by an ordinary member of the public and the danger averted. Another error of judgement was inside a laboratory. The scientist in charge of some GMO grass plants went off without notice and it was just lucky another found the plant as it began to form seed.

The record of closed laboratory experiments world-wide is not good. Google the topic to check.

The risks of an escaped GMO cannot be overstated. It could ruin the trade and economy of NZ. And it is the GE FREE label that sells so much of New Zealand's agricultural products.

It is not only in the management of GMOs that the science has been lax. It does not test new GMOs widely and thoroughly enough.

To take the example of a GMO grass bred to minimise the production of methane by dairy cows, these are just some of the tests that would have to be carried out.

Dairy cows are kept for their milk . The cow's milk has products from any food it ingests. Feed them turnips and you taste them in the milk. Just as a human mother has to monitor her diet to prevent her milk affecting her child"s digestion , so must the cow's milk be tested and monitored for its effects on those who consume the milk and its products. Then , other lifeforms will eat that grass , goats , sheep, horses , birds , insects , snails , worms , and micro-organisms. Finally it will affect the soil in which it grows and into which it decomposes . We cannot under-estimate the microscopic life forms . They are powerful influences in nature.

Cows need a mixed diet for their own health and the health of their products. ONE grass type would not be a well balanced diet.

Another check to give pause, is that one type of GE corn was okay for animals to eat, but it poisoned humans. GMO cotton plants were good at killing the boll weevil ...and also any stock animals that ate them. The Indian farmers were ruined. Not enough testing was done.

The Number of tests needed does not stop there. All the other life forms connected to the original batch need to be checked. Ecology is all about interconnectedness.

GMOs are not a quick fix if they are to be used safely.





Another aspect of GMOs is that they need to be protected from other plants if they are to grow well. It was for this, Glyphosate / Roundup was found to be a good control . The International Court of The Hague has found that glyphosate causes cancer, and Monsanto/ Bayer is being sued by many farmers who have developed cancer from using glyphosate . Glyphosate is being banned in many countries. Glyphosate is absorbed by humans from plants that have been sprayed with it . Glyphosate has been found in the umbilical cords of unborn children.

These are the main reasons we need to have precautionary regulations for GE and GMOs. They are not yet safe enough to risk the environmental welfare of the country , its trade, its economy, and the health of its people.

These points apply to Auckland as much as to North Auckland... and the rest of New Zealand.

The three options (central, more, & less) proposed in the consultation are not the only options, the same goes for the corresponding rates rises. For example, we could get much-needed investment in transport services and climate resilience, as stated under the 'pay more get more' option, with a rate rise of less than 14% in year one. There are





other areas where savings could be made which are not interdependent. The 'overall direction' oversimplifies very complex decisions.

We must prioritise looking after our people and planet by investing in the things that provide us with life's essentials, such as fresh air, clean drinking water, hazard resilient landscapes and basic needs, like accessible transport and a sustainable waste network.

Where I'd like Auckland Council to do/spend more

• Public Transport - Ensure public transport is affordable, accessible, and reliable, prioritising investment in public transport infrastructure over road spending.

• Active Transport - Urgently transition towards low emissions communities by prioritising and increasing, not reducing, investment in walking and cycling infrastructure.

• Water Quality - Re-establish the full funding of the Water Quality Targeted Rate (WQTR) to pre-2023/2024 budget levels to ensure delivery and growth of related work programmes.

• Environment and Regulation - Ensure appropriate funding is allocated to increase monitoring activity of current/active and future resource consents to enable better environmental outcomes.

As well as the options provided in the structured consultation, I would also like the Council to do more of the following:

• Protecting and working with communities by continuing to prioritise the funding and delivery of Making Space for Water in partnership with Central Government.

• Ensuring adequate support for community and social services, including contestable grants (such as the Climate Action Grant), the Live Lightly programme, the Communities in Need programme, and supporting work on Council land and marae. This can be achieved by re-establishing pre-2023/2024 budget funding for these areas.

• Supporting frontline, volunteer powered communities by ensuring local boards are adequately funded and grants are available. Grants and investment into community-led services provide great value to Aucklanders. For every dollar that Council invests we get back many more volunteer hours.

• Supporting moves to a circular economy and zero waste, ensuring waste materials are seen as resources to be reused, repaired, repurposed and recycled, and are diverted from landfill.





• Lowering emissions by becoming a leader in localised renewable energy generation by enabling local integrated energy solutions to support community owned energy groups.

#### Tell us why:

Auckland Council's Transport Emissions Reduction Pathway sets out actions required to reduce the region's transport emissions by 64% by the year 2030. Transport is the biggest emitter contributing to over 40% of the region's total emissions. Within the transport emissions, 86% come from road transport. This sets a clear directive. We need to get people out of private cars, into buses, trains and ferries and onto cycleways. Failing to understand and action this will result in a continuation of over investment in roading projects and underinvestment in the public and active transport networks. The evidence is there and the evidence is clear.

Regarding the Mayoral proposal, I am encouraged to see initiatives to make public transport more accessible, such as the \$50 weekly cap and introduction of diverse payment options. Another positive is the work programmes which look to improve public transport services, such as network optimisation, expansion of the electric train fleet and completion of the City Rail Link. Unfortunately, alongside these positives, there are some concerns. A couple of examples are; the removal of 'low performing' bus services, and the several references to roading focused projects.

As well as continuing to invest and improve our public transport network, it is essential that the Council urgently supports the transition towards low emissions communities by prioritising and increasing, not reducing, investment in walking and cycling infrastructure.

Cutting "low-value initiatives, including raised pedestrian crossings and expensive gold-plated cycleways" is an ideological move that fails to align with the Council's own Transport Emissions Reduction Pathway. In monetary terms, this means cutting funding for cycleways by \$141.5 million. This makes no sense as we know increasing funding for active transport infrastructure is a smart investment that can benefit the





economy, the environment, and public health. Cycling is a low-cost, low-carbon and low-impact mode of transport that can reduce congestion, pollution, and greenhouse gas emissions. Cycling also promotes daily, incidental physical activity, mental wellbeing and social inclusion. By improving the safety, accessibility and attractiveness of walking and cycling, more people will be encouraged to choose it as a regular means of travel, creating a virtuous cycle of benefits. This approach also creates better use of existing roading assets by making space for those who cannot choose cycling, walking or public transport.

Motorhome tourism relies on the availability of public dump stations as not all campgrounds have dump stations, and in any case, it is pointless permitting free responsible camping without making suitable waste disposal facilities available. Currently, there are only 17 (per the NZMCA maps) in the greater Auckland
	Council area, which is a very small number for such a large area, whereas even small towns throughout the rest of New Zealand have a PDS. The NZMCA travel guide shows 251 throughout the rest of New Zealand.





There is no grey water disposal facility on Great Barrier Island, and no grey or black water disposal facility on Waiheke Island. Towns such as Winton, Havelock, Westport, Hokitika, Taupo, Tūrangi, Picton, Kaikoura etc etc all have them. I believe the NZMCA has offered financial and design assistance to Auckland Council to construct a facility to replace the defunct Half Moon Bay facility which was the only one in the whole of suburban East Auckland. Failure to make these facilities available will result in tourists emptying toilet cassettes into public toilets, and grey water tanks into stormwater drains - practises banned in most other local body areas.

As an owner of a motor home I would like to appeal to Auckland Council to find a solution so that those who have need to empty their black water in the Eastern zone can do so in an easily accessible place. Previously we have enjoyed the privilege of 'dumping' at Half Moon Bay but recently learned that that dump at Half Moon Bay is no longer available. For many people, both motorhomes, caravaners, tradies and boats this is considered an essential service. We need somewhere at the end of a trip (or a days work) to be able to dump. With this closure we are faced with alternatives that are not say easily accessed and it can be very inconvenient having to find an alternative as you return home. Please consider ways to overcome this service at a local level.





On another note completely - as a grandparent I pick up grandchildren from Cockle Bay Primary School in Sandspit Road Cockle Bay frequently. Parking in that area is absolutely challenging at the best of times as the area is in close to proximity to Howick College, Somerville Intermediate, Shelley Park school. This means that before and after school it is very difficult to get a park. Many parks are of course occupied by teachers and staff at the schools and students at the college which compounds the problem. My request is as follows: I have become aware that the old bus stop in front of the Cemetery is in fact no longer a scheduled bus stop. It has only recently been repainted as a no park zone as if it is still needed for the buses, which it is not. It would be a simple and very inexpensive job

still needed for the buses, which it is not. It would be a simple and very inexpensive job to repaint that zone with approximately 6 carparks - that is another 6 families who will not face the daily stress of finding a park whilst picking up especially the younger 5 and 6 yr olds who need to collected from the classroom and walked safely to the car. #### Submission on the proposed 2024-2034 Long Term Plan

#### Tēna koutou,

Tū Mai Taonga is a once-in-a generation opportunity for mana whenua to lead conservation at scale on Aotea by removing the last two predators species over the next ten to twelve years.

In the proposed Long Term Plan, Mayor Brown asks "What is the problem we are trying to fix?"

Tū Mai Taonga is fixing:

- Environmental breakdown on Aotea by removing feral cats and rats.
- Cultural identity and wellbeing breakdown by reindigenising the way we work, to help our workers develop a sense of pride, place and purpose.
- A lack of meaningful participation in important matters in our rohe that has gone on for too long, by leading conservation at scale in our way.
- Relationship difficulties between iwi and Council by facilitating meaningful engagement to pursue and achieve mutually beneficial outcomes.

# Re: AUCKLAND COUNCIL LONG TERM PLAN 10-YEAR BUDGET 2024-2034 FEEDBACK – Ngāti Tamaterā Treaty Settlement Trust

Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback on Auckland Council's 10-year Budget LTP2024 – 2034. We are providing this submission on behalf of Ngāti Tamaterā Treaty Settlement Trust (**Ngāti Tamaterā**). We can confirm that we have authority to submit on our organisation's behalf.

#### About Us

#### Whakapapa

Tamaterā was the second son of the eponymous ancestor Marutūahu, and his descendants formed the tribe known as Ngāti Tamaterā.

The Iwi of Ngāti Tamaterā is composed of approximately 3189 members (2018 census). Ngāti Tamaterā is one of the Iwi of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau the "Tāmaki Collective" and is also a member of the Pare Hauraki and Marutūahu collectives. Ngāti Tamaterā belong to three marae: Taharua, Te Paea o Hauraki and Te Pai o Hauraki. Ngāti Tamaterā is the mandated authority "Post Settlement Governance Entity" for its Iwi – Settlement eminent.



#### Rohe

The area of interest of Ngāti Tamaterā extends from Mahurangi in the north to Ngā Kurī a Whārei in the south: encompassing the islands and shores of Tīkapa Moana / Hauraki Gulf from Auckland to the Coromandel Peninsula, to the islands and shores of Tīkapa Moana including Hauraki's eastern seaboard, reaching southwards to Katikati and Te Puna (the region between southern Hauraki and the western Bay of Plenty). This is expressed by Ngāti Tamaterā as "mai Matakana ki Matakana."

The Ngāti Tamaterā rohe spans the following Local Boards: Albert-Eden; Aotea/Great Barrier; Devonport-Takapuna; Franklin; Henderson-Massey; Hibiscus and Bays; Howick; Kaipātiki; Mangere-Ōtāhuhu; Manurewa; Maungakiekie-Tāmaki; Ōrākei; Ōtara-Papatoetoe; Papakura; Puketāpapa; Rodney; Upper Harbour; Waiheke; and Waitematā; Local Board(s).

#### Ngāti Tamaterā Treaty Settlement Trust

In June 2011, the Crown recognised the mandate of the Ngāti Tamaterā negotiators to negotiate a comprehensive settlement of the historical Tiriti o Waitangi / Treaty of Waitangi claims of Ngāti Tamaterā with the Crown. The mandated negotiators and the Crown entered into an agreement in principle equivalent on 22 July 2011. Ngāti Tamaterā's Post Settlement Governance Entity (PSGE), the Ngāti Tamaterā Treaty Settlement Trust, was ratified between June and August of 2012. In September 2017, Ngāti Tamaterā and the Crown initialled a Deed of Settlement (the Deed). The Deed is subject to ratification by the members of Ngāti Tamaterā and conditional on the enactment of the settlement legislation. The Office of Treaty Settlements (OTS), with the support of the Department of Conservation (DOC), Land Information New Zealand (LINZ), and other government agencies, represented the Crown in day-to-day negotiations. The Minister for Treaty of Waitangi Negotiations, the Hon. Christopher Finlayson, represented the Crown in high-level negotiations with Ngāti Tamaterā.

#### Strategic Direction

Ngāti Tamaterā aspires to be a vibrant, empowered, and prosperous tangata whenua community of mana in the Tāmaki and Hauraki regions – and particularly in those locations and places of historic concern to Ngāti Tamaterā. The refreshed Ngāti Tamaterā Iwi Strategy (April 2022) set the vision for where Ngāti Tamaterā want to be in 50 years, namely, to create a thriving Hauraki Nation and "To enhance the mana and wellbeing of Ngāti Tamaterā". Ngāti Tamaterā will continue to grow the unique tangible and intangible culture of Ngāti Tamaterā. This is framed in the strategy by key values that define who Ngāti Tamaterā are and what comprises their Tamaterātanga:

- 1. Wairuatanga holistic wellbeing including tapu and noa.
- 2. Whanaungatanga our connection and whakapapa.
- 3. Whakakitenga for our unique Tamaterātanga to be embraced.
- 4. Auahatanga seen for our creativity and innovation. For Ngāti Tamaterā to be known as for its digital expertise and innovation across all sectors.



- 5. Hūmārie moving with humility.
- 6. Tika & Pono what is right and true. Being what is right and true in our actions.

This Tamaterātanga includes, among other things, language and cultural revitalisation leading to a new cultural creativity and the ability to interact with places of significance to Ngāti Tamaterā history and identity.

The Strategic Objectives to help achieve Ngāti Tamaterā's vision are:

- 1. Whanaungatanga Building strategic and critical partnerships and to ensure a collective approach to Tamaterātanga.
- 2. Tikanga Standing proud in our Tamaterātanga and ensuring our actions are right and true (tika and pono)
- 3. Mātauranga Setting the foundation for Tamaterātanga achieving excellence in education and knowledge.
- 4. Developing initiatives designed to foster the identity, unity, and cohesion of Ngāti Tamaterā and its various sections enables the 'reweaving' of Ngāti Tamaterā back together again after generations of disconnection and alienation.

#### Working with Auckland Council

Ngāti Tamaterā has been working with Auckland Council at both a governance and operational level for several years. Recent governance level involvement has included inputs on the Auckland Plan 2050; Long-Term Plan 2018 – 2028; 2021 – 2031; 2022-2032; 2023 – 2033, and respective 10 year budgets, Long-Term Māori Outcome Priorities; Auckland Council Annual Budget (several); and a multitude of strategic policy documents and policies.

Operational level involvement has included inputting on: Thriving Communities; Review of Council-Controlled Organisations (CCOs) and Engagement with Iwi Māori; Freshwater Management Policy; National Policy Statement – Freshwater Management, Tūpuna Maunga Operational Plan; Climate Change; Auckland Council's Water Strategy, and the Three Waters now Local Waters Done Well kaupapa to name a few.

We understand that the Auckland Council is currently developing the 10-year Budget 2024-2034 and Long-Term Plan. The Budget sets out the assets and services that will be provided over the next 10-years and how they will be paid for. Since 2010, Auckland has grown by 227,600 people and it is projected that the Auckland population will grow by another 658,500 people by 2051. Growth and development will potentially adversely affect transport and traffic, housing, the environment, and quality of life. Managing the impacts of this growth requires fiscal prudency, planning and long-term thinking. It also requires clear priorities and investment that will help drive Auckland towards its vision of a beautiful, thriving, and safe place to live.



The LTP takes a long-term view and outlines what the council does, why, how activities fit together and what it costs over the plan's 10-year period. It is the basis for accountability to the community.

We do understand that the context of the 2024-34 LTP is challenging as the council so rightly notes "Simply put, the council cannot afford the same suite of activities and services without changing its financial settings or vice versa. We recognise that Auckland Council faces enormous challenges. The council faces rising investment demand due to rapid growth, changing community needs and expectations, ageing assets, a need to support recovery from recent storm events and mitigate and adapt to climate change. Simultaneously the council operates in an environment of reduced investment capacity due to reduced revenue, existing commitments to spend, increased interest rates and supply chain costs. We also understand that Central Government is also changing councils operating environment, centralising regulatory settings, and removing some functions from Local Government.

The LTP also helps define the relationship between the council, Aucklanders, central government, iwi and partners. It should be clear about what the council does and doesn't do and how it makes decisions about the allocation of scarce resources.

Council's existing strategies and policies provide long-term direction to its activities and the outcomes it wants to achieve for Auckland. However, as we are aware many are not being implemented or monitored. We have read the document communicating the strategic priorities for the LTP agreed by the councillors and the mayor and also the Mayor's proposal.

We note that 10 Year Budget proposes three priority big idea areas that underpins the thought process of council's role in this LTP and include.

**One:** Getting back to basics

**Two:** A fundamentally different relationship with central government **Three:** Simplified governance that empowers local decision-making

#### Priorities

The council needs to deliver its services and infrastructure better, faster, and cheaper. The LTP will therefore need to constitute a plan to make progress on a wide range of priorities, including further progress on the mayor's core campaign promises which Aucklanders will expect the mayor to act on. These are:

- 1. Stop wasting money
- 2. Getting Auckland moving
- 3. Fix Auckland's Infrastructure and build a resilient Auckland
- 4. Take back control of Council organisations and Auckland's future
- 5. Making the most of our harbours and environment

Where applicable to our organisation, we have provided general feedback to Auckland Council on Key Feedback Topics & Local Board Strategic Initiatives and Proposals, the Representation Review and Local Board Reorganisation plan (separate submissions).



We have also outlined our communities' strategic objectives and priorities to identify areas where we would like to work in partnership with Auckland Council to develop proactive and enduring solutions.

It is our intent that our feedback continues to enable a more collaborative partnership with Auckland Council for the benefit of the people and the environment.

Importantly, (as highlighted in the back pages of this submission), we feel that Auckland Council needs to employ new and innovative approaches when delivering services. Mana Whenua need to be central to designing and implementing this framework.

## 10-YEAR BUDGET 2024 – 2034 and Long-Term Plan SUBMISSION – Ngāti Tamaterā Treaty Settlement Trust

We agree and support the view that Auckland Tāmaki Makaurau is a beautiful, thriving, and safe place to live with its stunning natural environment, however there is lot to be done to ensure Auckland is a liveable city where its transport and housing needs are met along with the ever-increasing cost of living for our most vulnerable population.

We are acutely aware of the financial strains and burdens the last 3-4 years has been for local and central government and do agree that council needs to be able to affordably deliver the basic infrastructure needs and services expected by Aucklanders and iwi.

We fully understand that a getting back to basics approach is required to ensure sustainable and resilient communities while facing these huge challenges.

However, we want to make it clear that we expect Te Tiriti obligations are being met and that budget and cost cuttings do not affect our critical partnerships and enduring relationships.

We support the stance of the Māori Outcomes increase in budget over the next 10-year period however do not feel that is enough increase in funding and would like to see further meaningful Iwi relationships and budget allocations across council directorates. The Māori Outcomes budget should not be a contestable fund for directorates to access. This fund should be directly attributed to Iwi to help support, implement, and realise shared aspirations and outcomes.

Another focus area that we are keen to see develop is having access to Subject Matter Experts on a secondment basis to support the capability building of iwi moving forward and support the Māori Outcomes team to have a Māori/Iwi lead position across the directorates.

We also agree with the 5-point themes including.

- 1. Fixing Auckland's Infrastructure
- 2. Stop wasting money.
- 3. Getting Auckland moving
- 4. Make the most of our harbours and environment.
- 5. Take back control of Council organisations and Auckland's future.

Strengthening councils' resilience physically and fiscally over the next three years is paramount and we are supportive of this.

- In addition to the identified challenges and objectives, it is important to consider how transport initiatives can support cultural preservation, enhance connections to marae and cultural sites, and address historical inequities in transport accessibility for Mana Whenua Iwi Māori. Prioritizing cultural connections, community well-being, and meaningful engagement with indigenous communities can further enrich the outcomes of the transport plan.
- 3. Priority Transport Projects for Mana Whenua Iwi Māori:
- Priority projects for Mana Whenua Iwi Māori may include initiatives that improve access to cultural sites, enhance connections between communities, provide safe and sustainable transport options, and support traditional modes of travel. Transportation projects that promote cultural vibrancy, environmental stewardship, and community well-being can contribute positively to Mana Whenua and the wider indigenous community.
- 4. Engaging Māori throughout Program Development:
- To ensure meaningful engagement with Mana Whenua Iwi Māori, it is essential for council and government agencies to adopt a collaborative and participatory approach. This includes involving indigenous representatives in decision-making processes, seeking input on project design and implementation, respecting cultural protocols, and fostering long-term relationships based on trust and mutual respect.

NTTST engaged in a lengthy lwi Māori representation process 2022 with Ngā Mātārae who contracted a report Beyond Obligation Independent Review of Auckland Council's Engagement with Māori Judy Campbell — September 2022. We also underwent a submission process that Te Ara Kōtui

# Specifically:

Iwi should have direct access to the Māori Outcomes fund to help support and realise our shared outcomes and aspirations. We support the Māori Outcomes Political Working Group however would encourage iwi representation on that group one from each quadrant. We would like to see a suite of supports for Māori and this is part of that suite. We do not agree that directorates utilise this fund to realise their own Māori outcomes programme of mahi, however, should budget in their own Māori outcomes budget with their own annual budget accordingly. We feel that more innovative thinking should be addressed here. Secondments are key for us to help build our capacity and capability. There are many iwi that are not yet settled and these supports would be more meaningful. Having targeted rates for our marae is another way to support Māori especially as marae have been supporting our wider community over time through natural disasters and the latest global pandemic.

Increased supports to our Iwi Capacity Contracts and underlying Relationship Agreements are key to enduring relationships. We are keen to further increase our capacity and work more closely with council to realise better outcomes for Māori/Iwi.

We are keen to further develop delivering better outcomes for Māori and want to scope what this may look like moving forward with not only Ngā Mātārae but ALL directorates across the council family.

I am detailing that Māori Outcomes increase and other innovative ways the council can support<br/>Māori than just budgetary resources - e.g.; Potential FTEs across the directorates, secondments of<br/>SMEs to Iwi, budget line items for Māori Outcomes across the 10 directorates including the Māori<br/>Outcomes fund set aside over 10 years as that ringfenced fund shouldn't be a contestable fund to<br/>directorates to take care of their respective Māori Outcomes responsibilities and accountabilities.WatercareWe see Watercare as a critical partner for Iwi across all storm water, drinking water and wastewater<br/>programmes. The new coalition government is yet to roll out its Local Water Done Well Policy of<br/>which we are all yet to respond, engage and participate in. As council well knows with the previous



government, we had formed Te Hiku water services roopu including Tāmaki Makaurau and Te TaiTokerau and Waipuna aa rangi Iwi RRG of which we are currently determining next steps. Balance sheet separation is key here to determine how might we work together as Te Tiriti partner across Te Oranga o Te Taiao, and Te Mana me te Mauri o te wai.

We understand the need to increase water services costs, however there should also be a subsidy to those Kainga Ora, marae and papakāinga properties where our most vulnerable live. Cost of living is horrendous, and children are missing out on fundamental needs and requirements.

The Local Waters Done Well Policy, formerly known as the Three Waters Policy, has significant implications for iwi Māori, marae, and mana whenua across the motu. This policy shift acknowledges the importance of engaging and working collaboratively with iwi Māori, marae, and mana whenua in the management and governance of local water resources.

For iwi Māori, marae, and mana whenua, the Local Waters Done Well Policy provides increased opportunities for engagement and participation in decision-making processes related to water management.   - Sustainable Funding: Aligning business rates with the general rate in environmental-focused programs demonstrates commitment to sustainable initiatives, supporting Māori communities, marae, and whanau through environmental protection efforts backed by equitable financial contributions.
- Community Considerations:
  - Equitable Commitment: Equalizing rate shares promotes shared responsibility in environmental and transport initiatives, benefiting the broader community, including mana whenua, iwi, Māori communities, marae, and whanau through collective investment in sustainable development programs.
  - Financial Sustainability: Ensuring equitable business rates in environmental programs can enhance long-term funding sustainability, fostering strong financial support for initiatives that align with Māori values of environmental stewardship and community well-being.

#### Conclusion:

Balancing rates between sectors and aligning business contributions in environmental programs can promote fair financial practices, sustainable development, and community resilience, positively impacting mana whenua, iwi, Māori communities, marae, and whanau by fostering equitable funding mechanisms and supporting collective efforts towards environmental preservation and community well-being.

#### Reintroduction of Recycling Charges for Schools:

- Impacts:
  - Financial Burden: Reintroducing recycling charges for schools may impose additional financial strain on educational institutions, potentially affecting funding allocation for other essential programs and services that benefit Māori students and communities.



 Environmental Education: However, this initiative can foster environmental awareness and sustainability among students, aligning with Māori values of kaitiakitanga and promoting eco-conscious practices in schools and communities.

#### Planned Rollout of Rates-Funded Refuse Collection:

- Impacts:
  - Service Accessibility: Continuing the rollout of rates-funded refuse collection enhances waste management services accessibility for North Shore, Waitakere, Papakura, Franklin, and Rodney districts, benefiting Māori communities with more efficient and consistent refuse collection services.
  - Equitable Service Delivery: Transitioning from the pay-as-you-throw model to rates-funded collection can ensure fairness in waste management service provision, promoting equal access to essential services for all residents, including mana whenua, iwi, marae, and whānau.

#### Changes in Rodney Drainage Districts and Waitakere Rural Sewerage Targeted Rates:

- Impacts:
  - **Property Benefits:** Adjusting targeted rates to reflect public feedback and property benefits in Rodney Drainage Districts can lead to more transparent and equitable cost distribution, potentially ensuring that properties receive fair value for targeted services.
  - Cost Recovery: Increasing the Waitakere Rural Sewerage targeted rate aims to maintain cost recovery and financial sustainability, which can positively impact Māori communities and rural areas by ensuring quality sewer services and avoiding general rate subsidies.

#### **Recommendations:**

#### **General Feedback:**

- We advocate for transparent and inclusive communication channels to engage iwi, Māori communities, marae, and whanau in decision-making processes, ensuring that proposed changes align with community needs, cultural values, and environmental priorities.
- Encourage ongoing dialogue and collaboration between Auckland Council and affected stakeholders to address concerns, promote understanding, and tailor initiatives to best serve the interests and well-being of local Māori communities.

#### **Environmental and Social Considerations:**



- Support sustainable waste management practices, environmental education, and equitable service delivery to ensure that policy changes align with Māori values of environmental stewardship, community well-being, and cultural preservation.
- Emphasize the importance of fostering partnerships with mana whenua, iwi, Marae, and Whanau to ensure that proposed changes promote sustainable development, resource efficiency, and community resilience across Auckland regions.

#### Local Boards and what they are proposing over the next FY.

1. How well do you feel the current model meets the needs of Māori communities?

The current model of governance within Auckland Council, particularly the decision not to establish Māori seats on the Governing Body, does not adequately meet the needs of Māori communities. While efforts are being made to enhance Māori participation through other means, the lack of direct representation for Māori voices poses a significant barrier to ensuring their perspectives, values, and interests are effectively considered in decision-making processes. It is crucial to establish mechanisms that genuinely reflect and prioritize the needs of Māori communities.

2. Are there any structural changes that might make it easier for you to engage with Auckland Council?

Structural changes that may improve engagement with Auckland Council could include the establishment of dedicated Māori seats on the Governing Body or local boards. These seats would provide a formal platform for Māori communities to have direct input into council decision-making processes. Additionally, increasing the resources allocated to support Māori engagement, such as community outreach programs, cultural competency training for staff, and the creation of Māori advisory groups, could also enhance the ease of engagement with Auckland Council.

3. Are there any changes that might improve effective representation of communities of interest?

Effective representation of communities of interest, including Māori communities, can be improved by ensuring diverse voices are included in decision-making processes. This can be achieved through mechanisms such as proportional representation, co-governance arrangements, and meaningful consultation with affected communities. Additionally, enhancing transparency, accessibility, and inclusivity in the decision-making process can help ensure that the needs and perspectives of all communities are accurately represented.

4. Do you have any other concerns or feedback?



It is essential for Auckland Council to prioritise meaningful engagement with Māori communities and other diverse stakeholders in the decision-making process. Transparency, accountability, and inclusivity are key elements that should underpin any structural changes to ensure effective representation and decision-making. It is crucial that the Council takes proactive steps to address historical inequities, build trust with communities, and create a governance framework that reflects the diverse perspectives and values of all Aucklanders.

In considering the number of councillors and how they are elected, the following feedback is provided:

- Number of Councillors: It is crucial to ensure that the number of councillors on the Governing Body is sufficient to effectively represent the diverse communities and interests within Auckland. The proposal to have roughly equal size wards with a +/-10% rule is a step in the right direction to promote fair and balanced representation. However, it is essential to ensure that the number of councillors is adequate to address the needs and concerns of the population they serve. The alignment of ward boundaries with local board boundaries and mesh block boundaries can contribute to more effective representation by enhancing the connection between councillors and the communities they represent.
- 2. How Councillors are Elected: The process of electing councillors should prioritise the principles of democracy and fairness. It is important that the election system allows for all voices to be heard and for diverse perspectives to be represented in the decision-making process. Ensuring that the method of election is transparent, accessible, and inclusive will help promote trust in the democratic process and ensure that councillors are accountable to the communities they serve. Additionally, consideration should be given to mechanisms that encourage diversity and inclusivity among elected representatives, reflecting the varied demographics and interests of Auckland's population.

Overall, the number of councillors and the election process play a critical role in shaping the effectiveness of governance and representation in Auckland. It is important that these aspects are carefully considered to ensure that the voices of all communities are heard, and that decisions made by councillors reflect the needs and aspirations of the diverse population they represent.

To better serve the Māori community of interest in Auckland, the process of determining the number of councillors and how they are elected should consider the following:

# 1. Māori Representation:

• Ensure that the governance structure includes mechanisms for meaningful Māori representation, such as the establishment of Māori wards or seats on the Governing Body. This would provide a platform for Māori voices to be directly included in decision-making processes, reflecting the unique perspectives and interests of the Māori community.



- Explore co-governance models that allow for partnership and collaboration between Māori representatives and the wider council, fostering a relationship based on mutual respect and recognition of Treaty obligations.
- Enhance consultation and engagement with Māori communities throughout the decision-making process, respecting cultural protocols and ensuring that Māori perspectives are integrated into governance plans.

## 2. Community of Interest Considerations:

- Recognise the unique interests and aspirations of the Māori community, including cultural, social, economic, and environmental factors. Ensure that boundaries for wards and subdivisions consider the community of interest definitions, including the political, functional, and perceptual dimensions outlined by the Local Government Commission.
- Align ward boundaries with areas of significant Māori population or cultural importance to ensure that Māori communities are adequately represented and have a say in matters that affect them directly.
- Encourage diverse representation within council through mechanisms that support the election of Māori candidates and promote the inclusion of Māori perspectives in decision-making processes.

By incorporating these considerations into the process of determining the number of councillors and how they are elected, Auckland Council can better serve the Māori community of interest by fostering a governance structure that is inclusive, representative, and responsive to the unique needs and values of the Māori population.

#### Context

Aside from the key issues covered above, some of the other key proposed priorities for this 10-year budget are:

#### Māori outcomes

Council is committed to Treaty-based partnerships with Māori. Then council enables the delivery against 10 Māori Outcomes strategic priorities through our Māori Outcomes portfolio. The portfolio includes day-to-day activities, supplemented by the targeted use of the Māori Outcomes fund (\$170 million investment over the next 10 years).

The proposed funding will support Māori-led initiatives that are aligned to Kia Ora Tamaki Makaurau (the council's Māori Outcomes performance measurement framework). Examples include the Marae Infrastructure Programme, which helps marae to be healthy and sustainable cultural hubs.

The range of activities supported by the Māori Outcomes fund is varied. It enables incubation of initiatives, which over time transition into business-as-usual activities - such as Ngā Kete Akoranga, and the cultural capability programme. Te Kete Rukuruku is returning names to parks and places in Tāmaki Makaurau and helps to ensure the Māori language is seen, heard, spoken, and learnt in everyday life. The fund supports papakāinga and marae development with feasibility and concept design, financial planning, governance, and asset management.

## Specific feedback

- In principle the Kia Ora Tamaki Makaurau (Māori Outcomes) is a good initiative
- In reality, this funding is difficult to access and difficult to evaluate and track success.
- Procurement systems and processes need to be considerably more user friendly.
- This initiative needs to have tangible (and transparent) benefits for Māori communities.
- It was designed without input from Mana Whenua or Mataawaka
- The accompanying Māori Responsiveness Plans were prepared by Officers with no input from Mana Whenua or Mataawaka
- Many Auckland Council staff still have a poor understanding of who we are, what we need, and the nature of our organisation.

#### Recommendations

- Enable Māori Communities the ability to critique the Kia Ora Tamaki Makaurau framework.
- Ensure decision-making is guided by fundamental operating principles such as: efficiency, effectiveness; transparency; value-adds (amongst others)
- Provide us with exact figures of the spend to date.
- Make provision for performance measures.
- Make provision for feedback mechanisms.
- Please allocate resources into ensuring everyone (ideally all Aucklanders) know who we are, what we need, and what we do.
- Please ensure staff recognise that we are interfacing with multiple agencies (central government, local government, Crown Agencies, Research Institutes, the private sector; education providers, property developers; the religious sector, environmental groups, community groups, and private residences) We often lack the time and resource to be involved in every Auckland Council project, initiative, and programme.
- Auckland Council need to make it easy for us to be involved.
- Auckland Council could significantly help us by providing forward work programmes right across Auckland Council (including the CCOs) so we can decide as to what initiatives are strategically aligned with our organisations and dedicate staff accordingly.



- Recognise that our organisations often have a commercial and resource management arm. Our roles and responsibilities include (amongst others): planning and policy development; consenting; compliance; ecological restoration and management; supporting processes and procedures; and furthering our own strategic initiatives internally (including business development
- We want to ensure that existing agreements, partnerships, and MOUs aren't impacted, and that the existing relationships are enduring with the potential amalgamation of some local boards across Tāmaki

I had the opportunity to sit and listen to the korero that was shared yesterday at Hoani Waititi marae – and would like to give you all my own whakaaro.

My first thoughts as I walked into Hoani Waititi were "Wow, this is a beautiful marae, how blessed Te Whanau o Waipareira Trust and Hoani Waititi Marae Trust are to have this to welcome people and manaaki their guests" – and there was a sting, a pain in





my chest as I thought about the fact that we, as mana whenua could not even host something like this because we have NO WHERE. No marae, no whare, nothing.

I sat in this beautiful marae, looking at the carvings and the tuktuku panels and admired them... trying to imagine if we will ever have this, if my tamariki will ever have this. You see, our last papa kainga was taken 130 year years ago – and we have not had a marae since. Our whanau as a result, have been displaced and scattered – our tupuna's bones, spread throughout the country at various urupa and cemeteries – because we have nowhere for them to go. That is a sad reality for us, as mana whenua – and it needs to change. I cannot describe the pain you feel as mana whenua, when you hear of others in your area getting funding and support to refurbish or extend their marae – when you and generations above you are yearning for a marae.

I sat yesterday and heard lots of korero, whanau getting up and sharing their pepeha and explaining how important pepeha are for Māori – yet mine sits unfinished... I can mihi to my maunga Puketotara, to the awa Waiti me Waitakere, to Tainui my waka – but I have no marae. I have no turangawaewae to stand upon. My heart sank when others talked about being "under the totem pole" as Māori, and ae – that is true, even more so for mana whenua who sit there unable to even host guests like this, in our own rohe.

This email is not to whakaiti (trample) on the mana of those who spoke yesterday – it is to share my whakaaro, my own thoughts and reflections. Te Kawerau ā Maki have waited 130 years... 130 YEARS for a marae. Generations. I live in fear that another generation, my mother's generation will pass with still no marae, and nowhere to be buried. That is a scary thought, a heart-breaking thought.

Auckland Council, Councillors, Local Boards and Ngā Mātarae need to understand the significance of a relationship with mana whenua. It is not the same as relationship with Māori groups or with Māori trusts and organisations – who undoubtedly do great mahi for the community – but are not mana whenua. West Auckland is our whenua, it is TE KAWERAU Ā MAKI whenua, so – when manuhiri (guests) come into our rohe, or come to gather here they should be hosted and welcomed by mana whenua; when there are discussions about the environment, about things happening within this rohe, those are with mana whenua. There is a difference – and Council could make a difference by further recognising this significance, by SHOWING US CONNECTION and supporting us to build our marae within the LTP.

A mana whenua marae should be at the top of the priority list when it comes to Māori Outcomes – there is no greater example of true connection or relationship. Or will Council and the LTP fall victim to the "squeaky wheel gets the oil" and overlook Te Kawerau ā Maki for another 130 years?

# SUBMISSION FROM THE AA ON AUCKLAND'S LONG TERM PLAN 2024-2034 CONSULTATION DOCUMENT

- 1. The NZ Automobile Association (AA) appreciates the opportunity to comment on Auckland's Long Term Plan 2024-2034 Consultation Document (the Consultation Document).
- 2. The AA currently has over 345,000 Auckland Members and throughout our 120-year history has advocated for the transport interests of our Membership.

### Summary

- 3. The AA supports the overall direction for transport investment signalled in the Consultation Document because it indicates a strong focus on getting the basics right and helping people to move around the region. It makes clear that the purpose of the Council's transport investment is to help alleviate congestion, improve public transport and other modes, address safety issues and provide improved resilience to natural events. It identifies that a key priority is to make the most of existing assets and planned spend, and that there will be a particular focus on renewals and maintenance to ensure assets are kept in good order. We support this direction.
- 4. The AA is unable to express a view on which of the transport investment options (the central proposal, the pay less/get less option, or the pay more/get more option) is preferable. This is because there is no description of the outcomes that can be expected under the different options, nor is it clear why the specific projects within each option have been selected. Aucklanders should have been provided with this information.
- 5. We consider that the performance measures identified in the Consultation Document should be expanded to include the transport issues that matter most to Aucklanders, such as congestion and travel times. Tracking such metrics would also help the Council to determine whether transport investment is delivering on its priorities.
- 6. Lastly, we are concerned that the Consultation Document suggests the Council intends to increase a number of fees and charges solely to raise revenue. These fees and charges are not taxes; they exist to ensure the transport system functions effectively and efficiently in particular, to help people to move around.
- 7. Whenever a new fee or charge is proposed, we expect the Council to be open and honest with Aucklanders about why it is being proposed and why the price is appropriate, so that Aucklanders can form a view as to whether they agree. We would also like to see the Council be transparent and proactive in making information available on the amount and location of revenue raised from the likes of bus and transit lane infringements much like the Police do with driver offence data, such as speed offences. This would enable the public to form views on whether enforcement is fair, appropriate and aimed at making the transport system operate effectively and efficiently, or if the Council should be doing more in certain locations to boost compliance.



### **Overall direction for transport**

- 8. The AA supports the overall direction for transport investment signalled in the Consultation Document, because it indicates a strong focus on getting the basics right and helping people to move around the region.
- 9. The Consultation Document makes clear that the purpose of the Council's transport investment is to help alleviate congestion, improve public transport and other modes, address safety issues and provide improved resilience to natural events. It also states that making the most of existing assets and planned spend is a key priority. Our view is that these goals will find favour amongst Aucklanders, with AA Member feedback consistently indicating a desire for more to be done to enable them to move around easily, safely, affordably, and in a reliable and timely manner.
- 10. Ensuring the road network is well maintained and fit for purpose is central to the successful operation of Auckland's transport system. The network shoulders the vast majority of trips taken in Auckland, be they in private vehicles, on buses, on foot or by bike, so making sure it is in good working order must be the first call on transport investment. We therefore strongly support the Consultation Document's signal that there will be a strong focus on renewals and maintenance.
- 11. However, we are concerned that the Consultation Document indicates that repairs needed following the storm events of early 2023 will in part be funded by a reprioritisation of renewals expenditure. While we completely support repairs needed as a result of storm damage, we do not believe it should come from renewals funding, particularly given road re-surfacing has not in recent years been keeping pace with what is needed.
- 12. We also consider that there is insufficient emphasis on responding to and providing for Auckland's growth. The Consultation Document indicates that, under the central option, 'limited' work supporting investment in priority housing areas will be undertaken. We feel this is inadequate, given the significant access, congestion and safety challenges in our rapidly growing outer urban areas.
- 13. It's clear that the Council's vision and priorities for transport have a strong public transport focus. We very much support the development of the public transport network, as doing so will increasingly give more Aucklanders realistic alternatives to moving around the region.
- 14. That said, it must remain front of mind that for the foreseeable future, private vehicles are going to remain the dominant mode of travel, and congestion will continue to play a huge role in inhibiting Aucklanders' ability to move around easily, even with ongoing substantial investment in the public transport system. We are therefore very pleased to see the Consultation Document indicating up front that alleviating congestion is one of the key purposes of the Council's investment in Auckland's transport system. We will be watching closely to see how this flows through into investment decisions that meaningfully alleviate congestion on the network.
- 15. We agree with the need to reduce environmental harm from the transport sector, but believe this must be done in a way that continues to enable people to meet their access needs.
- 16. Lastly, we endorse the Council's signal it will take steps to reduce the cost and inconvenience of temporary traffic management. We note that this is a bugbear of many Aucklanders.

### **Options for investment in transport**

17. The Consultation Document outlines three options for 10-year investment in Auckland's transport system: a central proposal, a pay more/get more option, and a pay less/get less option.

### Proposed funding

18. When compared with the Long Term Plan (LTP) 2021, the central proposal outlines an additional \$2.1 billion in capital funding (a 17% increase) and an additional \$9.4 billion in operational funding (a 45% increase). While additional transport investment is needed and welcomed, there has been significant inflation in recent years, particularly in the transport sector. As such, it is not clear to us how much more will be delivered in practice, when compared to that signalled in LTP 2021.

### Investment options

- 19. There is insufficient information available in the Consultation Document to determine which option (the central proposal, pay less/get less, or pay more/get more) is preferable.
- 20. While each of the options includes a headline figure for capital expenditure, and a list of some of the projects and initiatives intended to be delivered, no information is included to explain why specific projects are being included (or in the pay less/get less option, why they've been removed or dialled back). Nor is there any information about the specific outcomes the projects or combination of projects will deliver in terms of the things that matter most to people, such as congestion, travel times, ease of access, safety and emissions reduction. It is therefore not possible to determine:
  - whether the projects identified in the central proposal are the best use of investment
  - whether the benefits from the additional projects identified in the pay more/get more proposal justify the additional investment
  - what the forgone benefits of delivering the pay less/get less option would be when compared to the central option, relative to the reduced spend.
- 21. The Consultation Document also indicates that the lists of projects identified under the different options do not take into account that less funding will be available following the cancellation of the Regional Fuel Tax, and points out that details of the transport programme will be determined by Auckland Transport.
- 22. For the above reasons, we are unable to form a view on which investment option is preferable, nor can we comment specifically on individual projects.

### **Measuring performance**

- 23. The four proposed transport performance measures included in the Consultation Document do not provide a comprehensive picture of whether the LTP investment is helping to deliver on the Council's vision for the transport system.
- 24. The proposed measures will give some insight into the operation and use of the public transport system, use of cycle lanes/ways, and work undertaken to reseal local roads, but won't provide any insight into the travel experience of AT's largest customer group motorists, nor will they give any indication on key metrics such as:

- whether the focus on renewals is addressing the backlog in renewals works
- changes in Aucklanders' levels of access (e.g. to employment, education or key services)
- insight into whether initiatives to get more out of the existing network such as the installation of transit and bus lanes are improving the total number of people moving along key routes
- whether deaths and serious injuries on the roads are coming down
- whether environmental harm attributable to the transport system is being reduced.
- 25. Our view is that the measures identified in the Consultation Document should be revisited, and at a minimum, measures pertaining to the above points should be included.

#### **Transport fees and charges**

- 26. The Consultation Document outlines a range of initiatives that the Council intends to progress in order "to meet cost challenges/support the delivery of proposed initiatives". Our overarching concern is that the Council appears to be focused entirely on the revenue potential of a number of existing transport charges and fees, potentially at the expense of their actual purpose which is for the most part about getting the transport system to operate optimally.
- 27. Whenever a new fee or charge is proposed, we expect the Council to be open and honest with Aucklanders about why it is being proposed and why the price is appropriate, so that Aucklanders can form a view as to whether they agree.

### Increasing paid parking areas

- 28. We are concerned that Consultation Document indicates that more paid parking areas will be introduced simply to raise revenue.
- 29. There is a case for charging for parking in locations and at times where there is high demand for parking and feasible alternative travel options available to people. Outside of this, charging for parking risks simply making it more expensive or difficult for Aucklanders to meet their travel needs.

### Charging for some Park and Ride spaces

- 30. AT's parking strategy indicates that the purpose of Park and Ride is to improve access to public transport and make a meaningful contribution to congestion reduction. Any decision to charge for Park and Ride needs to be informed by clear evidence that charging will help to achieve this purpose, rather than being used simply as a tool to raise revenue.
- 31. The Consultation Document indicates that the focus would be on Park and Ride sites that are generally full and are well-served by connecting bus services. Any consideration of charging at park and rides needs to go beyond this, looking specifically at whether those using the Park and Ride could realistically switch to public transport to reach the station without unrealistic or punitive travel times, and whether charges would create a barrier to using the service.
- 32. Ultimately, any decision to charge for Park and Ride could not be considered successful unless it:

- resulted in more people using the rapid transit network, as opposed to merely displacing someone who isn't willing (or able) to pay with someone who is; and
- didn't lead to spill over where people opt to park in free parking nearby, on-street, rather than using the Park and Ride facilities.

Plans to expand enforcement activities, including the types of infringements for vehicles that incorrectly use bus and transit lanes:

- 33. Compliance with bus/transit lanes is an important element in the overall efficient operation of the transport system. However, we are concerned by the ongoing number of instances we're hearing of people making genuine mistakes, as opposed to deliberate infringements, such as a result of not noticing signage, not being clear on when a lane is in operation, or not being aware of when they can enter the lane to make a left turn. This is particularly the case in the most congested and developed parts of the city where drivers are, by necessity, focused on the traffic around them and can therefore easily miss what can be relative small roadside signs, or where bumper-to-bumper traffic obscures road markings.
- 34. While we appreciate markings and signage may be legally compliant, there are locations where the number of people getting tickets makes it very clear that the markings and signage are insufficient for many people to be aware of the rules.
- 35. We are strongly of the view that issuing bus/transit lane infringements should not be viewed as a way to generate revenue, and greater focus should be instead placed on helping motorists to do the right thing. In particular, where a lot of tickets are being issued in a single location, we would like to see AT do more to understand why this is the case and what steps could be taken to improve compliance.
- 36. We would also like to see the Council be transparent and proactive in making information available on the amount and location of revenue raised from the likes of bus and transit lane infringements – much like the Police do with driver offence data, such as speed offences. This would enable the public to form views on whether enforcement is fair, appropriate and aimed at making the transport system operate effectively, or if the Council should be doing more in certain locations to boost compliance.

#### Time of use charging

- 37. While we can certainly see the potential for congestion charging (or 'time of use' charging) to relieve congestion on Auckland's roads, we are yet to be convinced it is the right approach for Auckland given the lack of realistic alternatives available beyond most peak period journeys to and from the city centre.
- 38. That aside, if time of use charging were to be implemented in Auckland, it would need to be done so for the purpose of relieving congestion, not raising revenue. If the Council intends to use any congestion or time of use charge to raise revenue, then there are very real risks that efforts to use the charge to alleviate congestion will be compromised and that public trust will be undermined.
