When increasing the canopy cover it must also be taken into account where these trees are planted in relation to dwellings in order to mitigate the possibility of trees falling onto dwellings, neighbouring properties being inundated with falling leaf litter and trees growing over resident's fences and becoming a menace costing resident's by having to trim them and pay for disposal of the trimmings.

Improve water quality by the removal of noxious weeds such as oxygen weed in order to allow natural flows to be maintained (Whangapouri Stream). The proliferation of weed affects natural creek levels, fresh water crayfish and eel habitats. Clearing of portions of this weed from creeks also assists the prevention of flooding as it prevents it from breaking free and blocking culverts, etc causing damming. Regular removal of rubbish from creeks will also improve water quality and flows again allowing for the proliferation of eels and fresh water crayfish.

I know you are required by legislation to specifically prioritise Maori, and you have clearly set out to do so, so you can tick that box. Unless something is wrong with my search engine on my computer, the word 'Maori' appears 83 times in your plan, 'iwi' 19 appears times and 'multicultural', 'Asian', 'Chinese', and 'Indian' appear never.

You make the case (page 10) that 15% of the population in Franklin is Maori. That means that 85% is not. That same 2018 census said 22.5% of Franklin residents were not born in NZ. There are a wide range of other ethnicities on whose behalf you are also governing, and some (in particular in the horticulture sector – third or fourth generation European, Chinese

and Indian) play key roles in the local economy. I think your plan – which in general is addressing sensible issues - should be rewritten to reflect the multicultural nature of your Local Board population.

I support the proposal for a Franklin-focussed Climate plan on pages 14, 25 and 27, but I will be amazed if you are allowed to do it by Council/Council staff. 'Yes, Minister' will strike, and when the next plan is under development we will find that nothing has happened. And in respect of future-focused planning, please do better than the Southwest Manukau Adaptation Plan, which, despite any encouragement you claim (page 13) you gave, did not significantly engage the interests of locals in Clarks Beach as far as I could tell, perhaps because they have become accustomed to Auckland Council simply doing what it (or its staff) wants and ignoring local knowledge/hopes. (I thought that your FLB response to the (in my view imperfect) Adaptation Plan when you considered it at your own meeting, as reported by the minutes, was good; then we see the report to the Council Planning, Environment and Parks Committee where the staff told the committee to ignore you; the minutes of that are not available at the time of writing but the fact that the staff paper could even have been allowed to go forward in the format it did yet again demonstrated in another instance that Franklin has lost the 'local' from local government.)

I think the Southwest Manukau Plan missed opportunities to look at what the Council might need to do in provision of more facilities in future, and in terms of actions to assist flora, fauna, and user amenity, both on land and in the harbour, and simply focused on the fate of the status quo infrastructure. (That's exactly the problem set out in the penultimate paragraph of Ms Fulljames' introduction (page 3 of the draft Plan).) It might take all of the three years of the Plan to get this new Climate Plan thoroughly consulted and in place - not the few months of consultation given for the Adaptation Plan. But if you don't engage people and get ground-up input and support, you will be wasting ratepayers' money, and risking the plan being resented/ignored by residents.

Given that Franklin is the Local Board with the longest coastline on the Manukau, I was surprised that more attention was not paid to ensuring the Manukau Harbour Forum (a term never used in the plan?) operates effectively and enhances the harbour's environment and amenity. I think reference to this needs specific inclusion.

You heard at the Clarks Beach meeting on August 2 the residents' concerns about erosion, and erosion control. You also heard about local initiatives to create infrastructure for ferries/tourism on the Manukau. The Local Board was very helpful in trying to expedite the resource consent for the wharf – which still took far too long to be granted, yet another instance where the 'local' bit of local government is sadly lacking - but one has to read between the lines of your draft plan to find any suggestion of encouragement for such activities. If these commuting/tourism ventures are successful, they will need parking adjacent to them (because there is no public transport) but the Adaptation Plan turned its back on such issues - the silos strike again! If Franklin Local Board are to claim to be leaders of the community, I suggest they adopt a fact-based approach to their work.

I want to record my extreme disappointment at the legitimisation that Franklin Local Board gives on page 22 of the draft plan to the "No Maoris Allowed" book and, especially, the television programme. The latter was remarkably poor journalism based on anecdote and was presented from a slanted viewpoint (a view I have heard expressed in separate conversations by two former TVNZ news/documentary staff). The TV programme made serious allegations in respect of the now-deceased proprietor of the Beehive store in Pukekohe, Mr Derecourt, which were outright lies; I understand the producer has now acknowledged this. There was no obvious leadership from Franklin Local Board to address/redress these inaccurate slurs on Pukekohe; now this plan looks to have accepted the material presented as absolute truth, and that is very disappointing and I believe needs correction.

There is no doubt that there was some racial discrimination in Pukekohe in the 20th century, and that it is a role of the Local Board to ensure this does not recur. But while the book by Bartholomew (an American by birth) documents a view of events in Pukekohe in the mid 20th century, so do the MA thesis by Clive Sage ('A Study in Community') and the book "People of the Four Winds" by B Kernot, both held in the Pukekohe Library. Both these latter two authors had the advantage that they spent time living and working in the community they were writing about, and though both point to issues we would prefer did not happen in the 2020s neither seem quite as scathing as Bartholomew. I suggest that before simply accepting any one anecdotal comment, the Local Board digs a little deeper to find where the truth lies. Points which Bartholomew glossed over or ignored include:

- the first reference Kernot found to a call for a separate Maori School in Pukekohe was in 1941, from a Maori group who saw it as part of a wider facility. A meeting to advance this is reported in Franklin Times, 19 September 1941, page 5. Inter alia: 'Present at the meeting convened by the Mayor [Max Grierson at that time] were Princess Te Puea Herangi, Mr J. N. Massey. M.P. for Franklin, Mr Alan P. Day (county clerk, Franklin County Council). Rev. L Motu Kapa (Anglican Missioner. Tuakau). Rev. Tuhimata (Methodist Missioner. Tuakau). Messrs R. Piripi and Barrett (of Pukekohe) and W R Cheeseman (town clerk)'. That is a pretty starry cast! Bartholomew in private correspondence has acknowledged that this happened, and that it did not progress because of Government decisions in Wellington, not local decisions in Franklin.
- The local Maori community came together to raise funds for facilities at the school that was eventually created in the early 1950s. Kernot who taught at the school for a period appears to argue that the creation of the school and its associated hall were regarded by Maori who were coming to Pukekohe from disparate iwi as a very useful community focal point, which is quite contrary to the Bartholomew viewpoint.
- The Rotary Club (predominantly Pukekohe Pakeha businessmen?) seem to have had no difficulty in engaging with the Maori community to enhance the facilities planned for the school.

I welcome the proposed commitment to redressing the treatment of unmarked graves on page 24 of the plan, but expect to see the full range of ethnicities acknowledged in this project – an opportunity for you to put in 'multicultural' into your plan. To put it succinctly, there are other ethnicities besides Maori in unmarked graves. I expect all to be treated equivalently, and I think that should be written into the plan. By 2016, Franklin Genealogical Society had compiled a list of 190+ names of unmarked graves in Pukekohe Cemetery, and drawn them to Local Board member/Auckland Council staff member attention. It did not need a second-rate television documentary to suddenly uncover their existence. See also attached file

#### 1. Response rates

If this is not crocodile tears – "the less engagement, the more we can do what we want" - I suggest that the answers to this lie considerably in your own hands. At the meeting at Clarks Beach on August 2 there were questions deflected by "that's a matter for the Council, not us as a Local Board", and "we are not responsible for the methodology of the Southwest Manukau Adaptation Plan". As far as citizens are concerned, YOU are the local government in this area and, whether you like it or not, whatever <a href="maintended">any Auckland Council staff member does reflects on you as a Local Board.">a Local Board.</a> Council activities are already beset by silos; I would rather see you taking a 'whole of services' approach, and if you express inability to take responsibility for Council actions (as you did that night), then you are clearly not worth talking to in some people's eyes. Only when people believe they are talking to the decision makers will there be any real engagement.

It's time for you to adopt the principle "There is no wrong door", absorb the commentary, and pass it on to someone else to do something about it if you can't do it yourselves.

And my guess is that the display boards used at Clarks Beach brought you very little sensible information in terms of the feedback. The content on those boards is like "motherhood and apple pie" – its hard to argue against any of it – and in my opinion they do not list out adequately the detailed actions that are in the full draft Plan. I and I know others did not comment on those boards that night. I suggest that in future you provide more detail on your key plans on those boards, if you truly are after feedback.

Finally, I commented at some length on the Auckland Council budget for 2023-24. When I looked at my submission as recorded in Franklin feedback volume 2, (#20310) I was extremely disappointed that the material had been extensively curtailed. I drew this to the attention of the Chair and Deputy Chair of the Local Board. I do not know if they rectified the issue. I subsequently found that a submission I made on behalf of Franklin Historical Society had alsoapparently been truncated. But if this is what the Councillors and Local Board members were given as the basis for their decisions, they were short-changed by the process. That is a criticism of the staff, not of the Councillors or the Local Board members who can only know what they have been told. I do not understand why this censorship by staff should have happened, and it certainly casts doubt on whether putting effort into exercises such as this brings any benefit to me or the community.

We have significant volumes of traffic for a small village and are a gateway in/out of the Auckland Region and extremely popular with trailer boaters using both KKBay facilities and headed further to the Kaiaua Coast. The traffic poses a huge risk to walkers. There is also a high risk of users of the local playground as the road takes a sharp bend and there are no barriers to protect the playground from poor drivers. There has already been one near miss.

- -We need to ensure there is regular maintenance and flushing of town centre waterways to look after eco-systems and for public safety. We have received feedback from the community about concerns for the water quality in Lions lake and the creek through River Lane.
- -Need signage to advise the public of any safety measures, recommendations and maintenance carried out to keep the waterways healthy. This will educate the public on good practices and what Council are doing to look after it.
- -We would like to see an improvement in response time for tree maintenance in the town centre, as this takes too long for completion. There are trees which still need pruning for safety and visibility for businesses and services on Tamakae Reserve, requested prior to the Jan/Feb 2023 weather events.

'We would like to see improvements in infrastructure and public places in Waiuku.

-We need shelters at all the bus stops in Waiuku and a safer location for bus stop 2921 on Kitchener Rd if possible (also mentioned in our feedback on Regional Public Transport Plan) -Road maintenance is an ongoing issue in several locations in Waiuku and we receive regular complaints. King St; the section between Meachen Terrace and Constable Rd consistently sinks and potholes appear. This is currently on the AT service schedule, but still not resolved after road closure and large detour for works 5/6 Aug 2023, causing significant inconvenience to the community. We have submitted feedback to AT about the terrible state of Racecourse Rd and parts of Kitchener Rd which are very bumpy and corrugated making it very rough travelling. With Kitchener Rd being the main access in an d out of the town, this maintenance should be a priority, particularly for emergency services using it.

-We need a round-a-bout built at both the King St/ Kitchener Rd/ View Rd and the Racecourse Rd/ Kitchener Rd intersections, as both experience periods of heavy traffic congestion during the day, not only at peak traffic periods. It is too dangerous to use the flush median when turning right from Racecourse Rd onto Kitchener Rd to go to the town

centre. We are happy with the outcome of the rubber roundabout which was used at the Victoria Ave/Queen St intersection.

- -The River Lane public space is in need of work to return it to a good standard. We have received complaints from members of the community on it's declined state. The pontoon structures, totem poles, metal structures and timber sleepers in parking spaces are all in need of repairs or replacement. This area is used by many for walking and relaxing, and is also part of the town heritage trail for visitors, so we feel it is important to have it looking it's best.
- -The town centre stage structure requires maintenance and the canopy needs cleaning. Repairs were requested several months ago, for safety reasons and aesthetics. This area is the main focus of the town centre and needs to be well presented, so regular checks and maintenance should be a priority. We would like to see the phone booth better maintained and beautified, perhaps with some artwork, in conjunction with Spark, as it is regularly vandalised and looks unattractive in the town centre.
- -We and many others in our community are concerned about an unsafe building in the town centre which is a safety risk to the public. Akl Council Compliance team are now assessing this, however the time delay has been unacceptable. We would like to see these types of critical issues addressed promptly.

'We support these objectives. In relation to the local economic development objective; -We need Waiuku town centre to be welcoming and attractive to encourage visitors and shoppers into town. The appearance of many buildings does not support this objective at all. The business association has offered subsidies to assist landlords with façade beautification and under veranda lighting, within our available budget, with very low takeup. The beautiful old facades in the main street and many buildings in the town centre area look untidy and need to be cleaned and re-painted. We appreciate that the maintenance of buildings is the responsibility of the owners, however we would very much appreciate some support from Akl Council, if possible, to help us work towards a level of consistency. This would benefit the owners, businesses, employees and the whole community, and avoid the visible decline of our town centre, with derelict buildings, the town being perceived as and becoming less safe, causing people to go to Pukekohe for services and shopping. -The loss of major retail bank branches in Waiuku is a huge disadvantage for the local economy which will cause many residents to travel to Pukekohe for these services and further isolate elderly residents. This has a negative impact on local business by reducing foot traffic in the town centre. We have asked local banks about having a shared banking hub rather than losing services altogether, by incorporating all banks in one place with

reduced staff and costs for each. We are aware that this model is being trialled elsewhere

and we feel Waiuku would be a great place to do the same. We appreciate this is a commercial decision made by the banks, however if there is any way that Local board could support or advocate for this to happen for the Waiuku community, we believe it would be of great benefit to all.

### **Overview**

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the draft Franklin Local Board Plan.

Aktive's vision is Auckland – the world's most active city: Tāmaki Makaurau – te tāone ngangahau rawa o te ao.

We provide leadership to the Auckland region that encourages, enables and inspires Aucklanders to lead more active lives through play, sport and active recreation. As both Sport NZ's and Auckland Council's strategic partner in Auckland, this means investing in organisations and projects that will get more people active, with focuses on tamariki, rangatahi, and identified communities.

We work closely without our System Build Partners, including CLM Community Sport, to connect, support and collaborate with organised sport bodies, clubs, schools and community groups in the strategic direction, planning and delivery of programmes and facilities.

Aktive recognises the key role that Local Boards play in the delivery of play, recreation and sport across Tāmaki Makaurau. Local Boards are essential in creating communities where people want to live, work and play and they have a significant impact on the health and wellbeing of Aucklanders through governance and decision making on parks and open spaces, community facilities, grants and support, community leases and many other aspects.

### **Key Feedback**

- 1. The draft Plan clearly identifies the importance of community facilities and open spaces in health and wellbeing outcomes for our communities and the need to think creatively in maintaining and delivering these facilities.
- We fully support investigation into different approaches to funding such as a local targeted rate to fund and improve community facilities, with a focus on built facilities.
- 3. We note the absence of any reference to the Franklin Sport and Active Recreation Facilities Plan and would welcome an update which sees this acknowledged in the Franklin Local Board Plan and used to inform allocation decisions for sport and recreation facilities.
- 4. We ask the Franklin Local Board to be cautious about the initiative to remove assets as this can lead to negative consequences if the requisite planning is not done.
- We recommend the Franklin Local Board does not increase the costs of leases to community organisations and instead looks at community leases as an investment to deliver positive community outcomes.
- 6. We fully support the support of youth to have a voice in the community but urge the Franklin Local Board to have stronger emphasis on play and a clear direction to provide opportunities for tamariki and rangatahi not just at playgrounds, but through all community spaces.
- 7. We request the Franklin Local Board add advocacy items to:
  - Advocate to the Governing Body for more investment into the Sport and Recreation Facility Investment Fund
  - Advocate to the Governing Body for more investment into the Regional Sport and Recreation Facilities Operating Grant.

Aktive commends the vision shown in the Franklin Local Board Plan and the clear priority that has been placed on ensuring that our communities have opportunities to access community facilities and open spaces to empower them to live healthy, active lives.

### Does the Local Board Plan reflect what you want for this community over the next three years?

The Franklin Local Board Plan does a great job at identifying the importance of our community facilities and open spaces and looking at new ways to support the maintenance, renewal and development of facilities.

We acknowledge that the role of the Local Board is particularly challenging in that Local Boards need to deliver a wide range of facilities and services without the necessary budget to support their visions. We ask the Devonport-Takapuna Local Board be very direct in your prioritisation of what is important to the community so that you can make a difference in a number of spaces as opposed to spreading your support too widely.

#### **Sport and Recreation Facilities and Open Spaces**

We acknowledge the challenges that come with catering for a diversified and dispersed community and agree that Council may not always the best option for owning/managing community facilities.

We fully support the objectives of:

- Local public places are future-proofed, fit for purpose and financially sustainable.
- Develop community facilities where there is a community service deficit.
- Enable community groups across Franklin to lead delivery of community initiatives.
- Provide improved access to council services across the Franklin Local Board area, including in areas that
  experience deprivation through isolation.
- Local communities are provided options for retaining services they enjoy as the board plans for sustainable and equitable service delivery.

And key initiatives to:

- Fund a capability and capacity building programme to help community groups to organise themselves, plan their priorities and attract non-council funding for local activities.
- Fund community partnerships that align with our plan over the next three years.

We fully support the introduction of a targeted rate to support the maintenance, renewal and development of both council and non-council owned facilities. We know that participation in sport brings 74.3 million¹ hours of meaningful, positive social interaction each year and there is evidence emerging that underspending on facilities leads directly to lower participation levels. To ensure that the community is catered for, the Franklin Sport and Active Recreation Plan should be used as the key planning document to identify where there are gaps in provision in the network and where this targeted investment should go.

To implement what has been identified in the Sport and Active Recreation Plan we agree with the approach the Franklin Local Board has taken of funding community partnerships as well as capability and capacity building for community organisations.

We do caution the Franklin Local Board around looking at opportunities to sell underused land and facilities and when looking at recovering fees to cover costs, particularly in association to community leases.

We understand the intention is to use existing facilities to maximum capacity and as we have said above, to make a difference without being spread too thin, but this type of initiative is often used as an easy way to remove buildings and assets without doing the requisite thinking around how they can be used more effectively. We urge you to follow your Sport and Active Recreation Facilities Plan in making any decisions about reducing footprints or disposing of assets.

We also understand the need to recover costs for certain services. If this is considered, we strongly recommend that there is no increase to the cost of leases to community organisations. The majority of sport and recreation organisations with Council leases are already running at extremely low margins to deliver high quality community outcomes and any further costs could have a detrimental impact on this delivery. Leases should be seen as an investment to achieving these outcomes as opposed to a cost neutral activity.

#### Play

We acknowledge the extensive planning done to ensure community facilities and open spaces are fit for purpose to cater for everyone and that the Franklin Local Board Plan identifies youth as having a key voice in the area, however we do request that the Franklin Local Board Plan looks to include more direct references to catering for tamariki and rangatani through the inclusion of play through the community, local spaces and open places. We know that young people often are overlooked when it comes to provision of services and facilities and that simply building a playground or a skatepark is seen as catering for their needs.

Franklin has on average a slightly higher proportion (21.1% to 20%) of its population under the age of 15 than the rest of Tāmaki, and we want to ensure that these groups who often do not have a voice in the community are prioritised in all aspects of planning because these will be the future users of these facilities and leaders in the community.

We emphasise play because it has a significant impact on a number of aspects of young people's lives, according to Sport New Zealand research<sup>2</sup>, its benefits include:

- being physically active in a fun way that develops fundamental movement skills
- encouraging self-directed creativity and innovation
- improving social and emotional connections
- improving a young person's understanding of their relationship with the physical environment
- improving resilience, independence and leadership by determining their own outcomes
- aiding better decision-making based around elements of challenge and risk.

#### **Advocacy**

We strongly support the advocacy items to:

- Improved recreation service provision for south-east Auckland based at Beachlands-Maraetai.
- Planning for Auckland's strategic cycle network (Future Connect) incorporate Franklin communities.

We ask the Franklin Local Board to consider advocacy items such as:

- Advocate to the Governing Body for more investment into the Sport and Recreation Facility Investment Fund.
  This is a key regional fund that will enable facilities to be developed that aren't owned by Council and that
  have a significant impact on physical activity and health for our communities.
- Advocate to the Governing Body for more investment into the Regional Sport and Recreation Facilities
  Operating Grant to enable communities to operate facilities and lessen the burden on Council.

### Conclusion

Aktive supports the work of the Franklin Local Board in creating opportunities for communities to lead active, healthy lifestyles, and we thank you for your commitment to play, recreation and sport as an integral part of life in your community. We also support a continuing and close connection between the Franklin Local Board and CLM Community Sport in meeting the needs of our communities.

As noted earlier in this submission, Aktive and CLM Community Sport would greatly appreciate you referencing the critical nature of the Sport and Recreation Facilities Investment Fund and the Regional Sport and Recreation Facilities Operating Grant within the Franklin Local Board Plan. Aktive is working with Councillors to ascertain options for increasing the Sport and Recreation Facilities Investment Fund because simply retaining the existing fund level will not be enough to accommodate the demand that exists today, let alone into the future.

#### Introduction

Forest & Bird is New Zealand's largest and longest-serving independent conservation organisation, with over 100,000 members and supporters. Its mission is to be a voice for nature, on land, in fresh water, and at sea, on behalf of its members and supporters. Volunteers in 50 branches throughout New Zealand carry out community conservation projects and advocate for nature. Forest & Bird has nine branches and three major projects in the Auckland region alone.

In support of the society's objectives, it has been involved in resource management processes at the national, regional, and district level. It routinely submits on regional and district plan provisions, some resource consents and advocates in the Environment Court in relation to biodiversity, landscape and natural character. It is particularly committed to ensuring that the environmental bottom lines established in national policy statements in order to give substance to the "protective" element of Part 2 of the RMA are given effect to in regional and district plans and achieved through decisions on resource consents.

The South Auckland branch carries out a range of activities, including but not limited to weed control, pest control, restorative planting, education events, content creation and environmental advocacy. The South Auckland branch covers the area from the Waikato Region boarder, west to Karioitahi, east to the Firth of Thames and north to Mount Wellington, including many significant areas such as the Hunua Ranges. Everyone involved in the branches are volunteers, including the committee, trappers, and supporters.

In addition, Forest & Bird has one of its National Conservation Projects located in the area, South-East Wildlink. The project covers 10188 ha in the South-Eastern semi-rural part of Auckland. The Wildlink creates a corridor of native bush between the two Forest & Bird reserves, Totara Park, Auckland Botanic Gardens, and Clevedon Scenic Reserve, providing a safe habitat for native animals and invertebrates to feed, roost and breed. It aims to protect native birds, lizards, insects, and critically endangered long-tailed bats, which have been spotted in the Wildlink area, from introduced predators. Eventually, Forest & Bird hopes the South-East Wildlink will connect with Hunua and Waitakere regional parks and pest-free islands in the Hauraki Gulf. Forest & Bird volunteers have been carrying out pest control for years in its two reserves: the 20-acre Olive Davis Reserve and the 37-acre Ngaheretuku Reserve, plus 120 acres of adjoining bush and Totara Park area. This landscape scale, community-based project demonstrates how to control pest animals in a way that engages residents and brings a range of benefits for people and nature.

#### **Approach**

We are structuring our submission to include Objectives, Key Initiatives, and Advocacy items; just as they may appear in a Local Board Plan; along with commentary on some items and localised specifics.

#### **Advocacy**

#### Selective Commentary

#### Our environment: Nature thrives across our entire rohe.

Connecting highly valued ecological habitats is an important part of enhancing the biodiversity within them. Most native and indigenous biodiversity is not adapted to crossing sparse urban areas; with many forest birds only willing to fly a couple of hundred metres between forest fragments. As the city continues to intensify, with a corresponding loss of private open space, council needs to invest in developing and maintaining ecological corridors to connect biodiversity hotspots. This involves both the development of existing reserves to host biodiversity (daylighting streams, planting, etc) and acquiring new protected ecological spaces through acquisition and vesting of reserves and planning rules. Maintaining these biodiversity hotspots and ecological corridors requires a landscape approach to council controlled ecological maintenance and community collaborations. This means prioritising investment in ecological and park maintenance to manage pest plant and animal populations in specific areas rather than regional elimination of selective pests.

Often there is a correlation between ecological corridors and urban waterways. As such, investment in terrestrial ecology along streams and wetlands has a positive impact on managing stormwater while enhancing freshwater ecology and the health of receiving waterbodies such as the Manukau Harbour. Blue-Green Spatial network plans are an important planning tool for identifying where

open space needs to be retained or reclaimed from development to manage stormwater, to minimise sediment and pollution entering the harbour and to mitigate the risk of flooding. Within currently urbanised areas opportunities to reclaim open space in flood prone areas should be a priority, alongside reducing the impact of stormwater surge by supporting the use of water retention devices and planting in new development and retrofitting older developments.

Highly valued ecological habitats are not the only places where biodiversity is valued. Tree cover across the entire urbanised area provides benefits for people and for native fauna; regardless of whether it is native or not.

Our Communities and Places: Our communities live well alongside nature as climate changes Within many Local Board Plans, goals for sustainable lifestyles and climate change adaptation are included within the environment outcome. We believe that these objectives are better placed across outcomes where they will be acted on more directly. This is of particular importance when considering that the end users of Local Board Plans are Council Departments and CCOs. We do not want climate change and sustainability to just be an issue considered by those parts of the council concerned with environment and infrastructure. Within this outcome we want it to be at the forefront of mind for those parts of council concerned with community development and resilience, and the provision of sports and recreation facilities. While these actions can have a positive impact on nature and areas of biodiversity, their primary benefit will be in the lives of people and communities.

# *Our Places and Our Economy*: Our economy meets the needs of our communities with minimal impact on nature.

Our communities spend more time involved in economic activity than any other single activity. Economics is not simply the domain of business owners and managers; it is also the interest of workers, customers, and nature. Nature cannot be seen as a limitless resource of materials for economic systems and the mythical "away" to which we throw the waste of economic activity. The resources that fuel our economic activity are scarce and if we waste them for short term profits then we will continue to destroy our natural heritage and rob future generations of economic opportunity.

Adopting a circular economy; where the waste of one economic activity is recovered to fuel another economic activity, is the most responsible form of economic development. Investing in waste recovery, through incentives like community recycling centres, creates employment and new sources of raw materials for local businesses. Community initiatives like repair cafes improve the wellbeing of residents by extending the useful lifespan of the goods they already own.

Transport is another economic activity that requires reform to become more efficient. Not only can Auckland not financially afford to continue to address congestion by investing more in roads for private vehicles; but doing so deprives the city of many other benefits from public and active transport. Public and active transport are both more efficient uses of scarce resources, reducing economic impact on nature. They are also more social means of travel that can build community and make places safer by putting more active eyes onto the streets. Local Boards play a key role in the development of active transport through street to park connections in Greenways plans, Local Board transport capital funds and advocacy to Auckland Transport. Delivering an effective active transport network should not just be about paths though, street trees and facilities play an important part in making these spaces attractive options to meet transport needs.

Empowering community groups to do this is huge. We are invested and motivated. Ownership/Kaitiakitanga and great community ongoing relationships outlive the building of the trials. They are fun to build, so we can deliver low cost low impact high km paths easily but only with Council and Local Board removing the existing road blocks and blockers to us getting this going.

- 1. Resource Consenting and Landowner Approvals. 2years and 10's thounds of dollars council must drive this with the community and make the way. No volunteer is going to do this, so to enable communities FIX THIS ASAP. Use the "permission slip" model and trust communities to build paths with landowners, stakeholders, successfully, safely and quickly. Its in our interest!
- 2. Paths cross multiple entities, DoC, AC, AT, Watercare, Private Land, Unformed legal roads, reserves all of which we can navigate but ENABLE groups to get outcomes by fixing this boondoggle. Appoint a Franklin High Mobility commissioner to quickly Map the paths and Open the paths to the community for building low cost high km low impact trails.

Public transport advocacy is required to ensure the portions of our community that rely on public transport can be mobilized and can travel around the region. Improved access to public transport in our rural areas is necessary.

Places like Port Waikato are isolated regions, with most inhabitants commuting via private vehicle to work. This area needs an increase in the times and days that bus operates in this area (currently only operating a limited amount on Thursday each week). Current bus irregularity is a barrier to regular employment and access to important health services for this area. Due to the limited offering of facilities and services in the area, this population requires transportation methods to places like Tuakau and Pukekohe to access necessary services and employment opportunities. Increasing the public transportation capabilities will empower these residents and provide a larger pool of employees for Franklin businesses suffering from staff shortages and support the local economy.

The timeline for the implementation of public transport and on-demand ride shares also threatens residents' ability to travel to work, family/community, and other services. The train from Pukekohe will not reopen until 2026 at the earliest, which is currently lengthening commuting times and challenging the mobility of Franklin families. Furthermore, the ondemand AT Local service, scheduled to replace most buses in Pukekohe in 2025, while bringing a lot of benefits to most of the community, risks isolating certain community members. Those with limited access or ability in technologies, Wifi/Data, cell phones, etc will not be able to utilize this service as well as other residents, thus having a negative impact on some of our community members from lower socio-economic backgrounds as well as the large aging population that Franklin has. Many people in our area have never or barely utilised similar apps like Uber as we do not have them in this area. Unlike the test area that AT Local is currently operating from, many more of our residents will need assistance with

utilising this mode of transportation. I believe advocacy for these people is required, and that one of the most utilised bus routes should remain so that people can still travel in this way if they cannot access the rideshare app.

We must ensure when investigating facilities to sell or cut, that we continue to provide opportunities for arts and culture to flourish in our community. These places are integral to providing the community with not only entertainment but an opportunity to participate in community and artistic activities.

We need a partnership between the council and the community to drive the urban and rural stream rehabilitation of Whanagpouri Creek. Can we re-instate the water quality monitoring and facilitate/fund a community group in partnership with mana whenua that looks after the creek? Just in the small part of the creek running near my property in Kennelly Park, we can see severe pollution that doesn't get cleared away (pictured in supporting document). The state of this is dismal and we need this to be monitored and cleaned up to ensure healthy waters. The erosion of this channel could also be prevented by replanting the banks with natives that strengthen the integrity of the bank. If the council helped to facilitate a community group (such as the ones in other areas e.g. Friends of Oakley Creek) and provided the opportunity and support for clean-ups, reporting, and removal of major pollutants, replanting banks, and educating/empowering community members with the knowledge and skillset to look after the creek and the opportunity to be advised by mana whenua on the protection of this waterway. # Big Street Bikers feedback on the draft Franklin Local Board plan 2023

Thank you for the opportunity to give feedback on the draft Franklin Local Board Plan 2023.

### Introduction

Big Street Bikers (BSB) is an Auckland-based company with social enterprise accreditation from the Ākina Foundation. BSB is working to increase the access to and use of e-bikes in Aotearoa. We provide secure parking, wayfinding, and charging facilities called Locky Docks that are a free public amenity delivered at no cost to ratepayers.

We work in partnership with mana whenua, community groups, businesses, councils, local boards and government agencies to offer people more transport choices and to promote active and public transport modes. Locky Docks promote the uptake of people riding by removing the security concerns associated with parking bikes at transport hubs, town centres, community facilities and key destinations. There has been a noticeable increase in bike thefts acting as a deterrent to using a bike for short trips.

Big Street Bikers is rolling out a network of Locky Dock stations across Tāmaki Makarau as part of a country-wide programme. The capital expenditure and recurring operational expenditure associated with the delivery and operation of the Locky Dock network is funded by Big Street Bikers through partnerships with Waka Kotahi, Mercury and the sale of third-party advertising content.

Infrastructure investment that gives locals the opportunity to switch short expensive car trips to an easy bike ride is one of the most effective ways of reducing household transport costs for residents. Everyone benefits from a transport system that supports a lifestyle where short trips by bike, micro-mobility or on foot are the norm.

### Feedback on the Local Board Plan

Big Street Bikers commends the Local Board for its commitment to accelerating modal shift in Town Centres and villages and work to expand local pathways for active transport.

We would like to suggest that the Local Board include as an initiative in the final local board plan delivery of **secure bike parking**, **bike charging and wayfinding stations at transport hubs**, **town centres**, **community facilities and key destinations** as an initiative to be delivered within the next three years.





A local network supports the Local Board's climate action goals and advocacy for investment from Auckland Transport and central government in local initiatives that encourage and incentivise modal shift. The network will help promote and encourage the uptake of active transport in Franklin.

With the funding Big Street Bikers currently has available, it will be possible for the local board to achieve a local network of secure bike parking over the next couple of years. It's not just Pukekohe that has new residents needing support. The Hingaia Peninsula area, and Clarks Beach specifically, is growing exponentially, yet we're very underserved with playgounds and facilities foour young people, and also have been advocating for some years to get footpaths to the school. Community members would gladly volunteer to create a footpath and cycle trail, but currently council regulations prevent us from any volunteer action.

• Port of Onehunga - Accessing future transport hubs. Currently this is a major block to progress, due to Panuku constraints.

Direction to Council Organisations to enable communities to re-establish wharves either via local fundraising or with Transport Emission Reduction Program funding, and climate action funding.

Justifications

- Reduction in VKT from Awhitu residents to CBD
- Growing population
- Demand for non-congested transport from Franklin
- Low cost to establish
- Servicing underserved communities.
- Provision of PT to wider community
- Reduction in single occupant vehicle travel

Multimodal corridor transport corridor linking Karaka, Waiuku, Pukekohe, Bombay to provide safe transport connection linkages. It would accommodate pedestrian, cycleways, and public transport vehicles including light rail, trucks, cars, buses and services such as power, water, communication, gas and sewage.

If it is treated as a green field project (avoiding existing infrastructure) it would result in significant cost savings and reduced construction times .

When properties along the designated route are placed on the market they should be purchased by council and the land not required for the multimodal corridor is returned to the open market and sold off. Transpower used this process to erect a transmission line between Whakamaru and Pakuranga which resulted in a significant land profit to Transpower during the build process.

Erosion. We believe there are cost-effective ways to help control this, instead of adopting a passive position. Each year thousands of tons of cliff faces (soft sandstone) in the areas of Waiuku, Awhitu Peninsula, Glenbrook, up the Taihiki River and Clarks Beach fall into the Manukau Harbour. This results in thick mud that compromises local beaches and channels, including the Waiuku Wharf area and negatively impacts shellfish and all marine life. A lot of these collapsing cliff faces are part of Council's Esplanade Reserves.

An effective engineering solution to reduce this material collapsing into the harbour isreusing the soft sandstone sediment to stabilise the toe of these soft sandstone cliff faces. This method has been used in other places. For instance, there have been a number of artificial reefs built on Tamaki Drive and on the shore line of the Tamaki River and a carpark at Westhaven all using Mudcrete, a mixture of marine sediment and Portland cement processed through a pug mill. Dredgings from the Port of Onehunga were trucked to the Port of Auckland's Container terminal at Mechanics Bay and processed into Mudcrete and this has successfully been used as a structural component for the container terminal development process.

A similar process could be used to stabilise the cliff faces in our area using the dredgings from the Waiuku Wharf area to make it a much more useable harbour port and improve the current negative environmental and visual aspect.

The consenting process to address coastal erosion and placing new wharfs around the harbour needs to be simplified.

### Health:

Undertake research ito determine why people are suffering from eye infections, diarrhoea and vomiting after swimming and wakeboarding in the Manukau Harbour, especially the Taihiki River Glenbrook Beach and Clarks Beach.

Regular water quality testing undertaken using various methods including testing for e.coli to determine sources of the contamination and finding solutions to these issues.

No further discharges of treated waste water and or contaminated water into the Manukau Harbour such as what we have witnessed at Watercare's discharge point at Puketutu Island over the last 60 years.

Watercare are currently being subject to a party seeking to have their existing right to locate sewer pipes under private property challenged. The community including the local

board need to support Watercare where they continue to be allowed to install sewer pipes under private property (at a reasonable depth) that avoids digging up public roads that will result in an significant increase in the carbon foot prints during construction of new pipelines.

27. There should be a simple planning template developed by Auckland Council that sets out the process to address the erosion and wharf development around the harbour that ensure projects are delivered in a timely and cost effective manner.

The massive majority of Waiuku community wants the Mudlarks to next take out mangrove retention areas at head of Rangiwhea and golf course inlets.

9. Do you have any other feedback on our draft Franklin Local Board Plan for 2023-2025?

As per attached

I'm Tony Ogilvie, secretary for The Mudlarks. We are supplying labour for executing the 2015 Consent for mangrove removal, over 50,000 hours so far.

We appreciate money being allocated for ongoing running expenses of the mangrove clearing project.

We are acutely aware of Council's need to restrict spending wherever sensibly possible.

We think that this means that any spending must be done efficiently, to get best value for money.

We are convinced that we get better return for our efforts, and Council spending, if we clear an inlet completely, rather than leaving a retention area of mature mangroves to keep seeding it.

Mudlarks are grateful to FLB for their efforts to assist in procuring a simple change, and we hope that FLB reps and Council decision-makers get together to consider a swap, whereby retained areas of mangroves in Rangiwhea and Golf course inlets are cleared, in return for converting other area(s) designated for cutting to retention. This could be an unequal swap, with a net reduction to the 75 ha total consented, and more mangroves retained.

Areas for converting would best be those distant from Waiuku, close to needles and Steel Mill, as seeding from there up into our current cleared inlets would likely be minimal.

#### Result would mean:

- -More value for Council money, past and future, as far more sustainable.
- -Waiuku residents have their open areas restored. (Overwhelming majority of locals in favour)
- -Inlets way more easily maintained as upstream seed supply disappears.
- -Better longevity of Waiuku local waterways for leisure, tourism, bird and fish life.
- -If unequal swap, then an increase in Franklin's canopy cover (P14 of Draft)

Banded Rail not affected: We've discovered these endangered species living in nearby rushbeds where mangroves have been absent for years, so clearing should not be a problem for them.

I think Waiuku waterways are part of the 'diverse natural environment that offers spectacular experiences sought after by regional, domestic, and international visitors and film producers.' (P 36 of draft).

Thank you for the opportunity to present The Tree Council's submission on the proposed **Franklin Local Board Plan 2023**.

This submission is made by The Tree Council, an independent, voluntary organisation, a non-profit incorporated charitable society which has been serving the Auckland community since 1986 in the protection of trees and as advocates for the significant benefits and services that our trees and green spaces provide.

#### Climate Action

The Tree Council comment:

- We are delighted to see recognition of the low level of canopy cover and green space in your area and your aim to support mana whenua and community groups working to enhance biodiversity and undertake tree planting
- We support and applaud these objectives and initiatives regarding enhancing tree cover within the local board area.
- If you haven't already developed an Urban Ngāhere Strategy Action Plan for your local board area to enable opportunities to enhance tree cover to be identified and activated we urge you to do so.

#### **Our Environment**

The Tree Council comment:

- We support these objectives and initiatives regarding enhancing tree cover within the local board area.
- We urge you to oppose all consents proposing to remove trees in Significant Ecological Areas and Scheduled Notable Trees on both private and public land as these are so important to retain for future generations.

• If you have kauri in any of your local reserves you should consider getting them urgently tested for kauri dieback and if found to be positive then you should consider getting them treated to keep them alive. Kauri dieback has an almost 100% mortality rate so all infected trees will die without treatment. We recommend you work with the Kauri Rescue Trust for the best way to approach this problem. There is an urgency as trees in which the disease has progressed too far will not survive even after treatment, so the earlier this happens the better. Kauri are carbon sinks, we need to keep these trees alive as long as possible.

In addition we would like to see specific support, including financial support, for the following initiatives to protect and enhance existing tree cover:

- Practical support and (for eg legal) advice for private landowners wishing to provide permanent protection for their trees eg via covenants &/or scheduling to enable protection of existing tree cover on private land to be optimised as most of the mature trees in Auckland are on private land with no legal protection.
- Grants for private landowners to maintain Scheduled Notable Trees on their property.
- Provide permanent and visible physical labels for all Scheduled Notable Trees in the local board area to enable the public to see that this tree is legally protected and tell the stories of our natural heritage.
- Look for opportunities to schedule additional mature trees and encourage Council to undertake Plan Changes to the Unitary Plan to regularly add new trees to Schedule 10 (Notable Trees).
- Look for opportunities to raise awareness of the value of Scheduled Notable Trees by organising events to celebrate them such as guided walks, community picnics, heritage talks.
- We would like to see specific support, including financial support, for mana whenua, local communities and groups undertaking the following types of initiatives within the local board area:
  - water quality testing
  - monitoring of beaches
  - o treatment of diseased kauri trees on local parks and private land
  - o monitoring for myrtle rust
  - weed control
  - pest control
  - o protection of rare birds eg dotterel
  - o restoration planting
- Public education on issues affecting biodiversity such as:
  - o kauri dieback, myrtle rust
  - weeds
  - o animal and insect pests
  - o other biosecurity threats
  - control of dogs in sensitive areas
  - o conflicting uses eg vehicles on beaches

Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback on the draft Franklin Local Board Plan. We have chosen to focus our submission on the key initiatives under Tō Tātou Taiao (Our Environment). Our comments are set out below.

#### Who We Are: Āwhitu Peninsula Landcare

Āwhitu Peninsula Landcare is a community-led organisation situated on the Āwhitu Peninsula, the ancestral home of Ngaati Te Ata Waiohua. Our organisation was established in 1994 and our work covers the entire 22,000-hectare peninsula.

Our vision is for a rejuvenated Āwhitu where native wildlife flourishes in healthy ecosystems, cherished and supported by the people. To achieve this vision, we: undertake pest animal and pest plant control work, and support the community to do the same; contribute to the restoration of native ecosystems by propagating eco-sourced native plants (as part of Te Korowai o Papatūānuku, alongside our partners Auckland Council, Ngaati te Ata and the Ministry for Primary Industries); and contribute to research and action to prevent local extinctions caused by myrtle rust.

We are a not-for-profit organisation and receive funding from Auckland Council, the Ministry for Primary Industries, Foundation North, the Department of Conservation, the Franklin Local Board and others.

Key initiative: Provide funding for Te Korowai o Papatūānuku project and continue partnership with Ngāti Te Ata to restore sites of cultural significance.

We acknowledge the support that the Franklin Local Board have provided to Te Korowai o Papatūānuku in the past, and appreciate the inclusion of Te Korowai in the draft plan. We support the initiative to restore sites of cultural significance as identified by Ngaati Te Ata.

Key initiative: Support Ngāi Tai ki Tamaki as kaitiaki to lead restoration of the environment at Nikau Pa (Clevedon Scenic Reserve). Key initiative: Establish a sub-committee to enable co-governance over Waiomaru reserves and to inform the delivery of the Waiomaru Reserve Management Plan.

We support the initiatives to empower mana whenua to be effective kaitiaki within their rohe, and believe this to be consistent with Te Tiriti o Waitangi. Our work under Te Korowai has benefited greatly from our partnership with Ngaati Te Ata, with the expertise of both organisations (as well as Auckland Council) leading to better outcomes for the environment and for our organisation. We submit that the Franklin Local Board support a co-leadership approach to conservation throughout Franklin to the extent that mana whenua would like to be involved.

Key initiative: Require all public space projects in urban/future urban areas to actively contribute to increases in tree canopy cover and more green infrastructure.

We agree with a focus on increased canopy cover in urban areas, and acknowledge the many benefits this would have. We submit that this increased cover be comprised of eco-sourced, native plants where practicable; and to establish corridors and stepping stones between areas of existing native habitat.

Compared to other countries, Aotearoa has a disproportionately high rate of exotic plants and birds in our urban areas; and we have among the greatest loss in urban species density compared to non-urban areas. The dominance of introduced species represents a 'significant reduction in biodiversity, natural character and ecological integrity'. 2

The Franklin Local Board have an opportunity to restore the region's native biodiversity. Urban areas can establish corridors and stepping stones between larger areas of native habitat, providing connectivity that is crucial to sustain our native biodiversity<sup>2</sup>. Planting areas as small as 100m<sup>2</sup> with native trees can create important 'feeding stations' for our native birds; while border habitats like hedgerows, road verges and riparian zones can become important corridors<sup>2</sup>.

Increasing canopy cover without having a focus on native vegetation is a missed opportunity. Our native plants perform the same ecosystem services as introduced species (like absorption of rainfall and sequestering of carbon), but with the added benefit of restoring more native biodiversity.

We note that the Local Board are interested in establishing a sustainable visitor economy, leveraging the presence of charismatic species like kōkako. Maximising opportunities to restore and connect native habitat will further those aims. The restoration of native riparian zones will also contribute to the objective in the Plan to improve water quality and waterway function.

Recommended change to key initiative: Require all public space projects in urban/future urban areas to actively contribute to increases in <u>eco-sourced native</u> tree canopy cover and more green infrastructure.

We also note that protection of existing biodiversity is extremely important, and is not currently covered in the draft plan. We submit that an additional key initiative be added to reflect this.

Recommended key initiative: Protect and enhance threatened species and a representative range of indigenous ecosystems.

Key initiative: Advocate for a change of policy and process so that new developments deliver 'urban lungs' i.e. areas to be planted with semi-mature trees to improve air quality, to lower surface temperatures and to absorb and filter rainwater.

Āwhitu Landcare has two concerns with the suggested requirement that developments utilise semi-mature trees. The first is that developers will have fewer options for plant species, which may discourage the planting of native trees. The second concern is for the survival of those trees on some sites, as in our experience taller plants are more subject to the damaging effects of wind. We also submit that trees may not be suitable for all developments, and the planting of smaller species like shrubs and grasses will yield many of the same benefits.

Recommended change to key initiative: Advocate for a change of policy and process so that new developments deliver 'urban lungs' i.e. areas to be planted with <u>eco-sourced native plants</u> to improve air quality, to lower surface temperatures, to absorb and filter rainwater <u>and to improve native biodiversity</u>.

Key initiative: Invest in community-led plant and animal pest management education, and support community action initiatives.

We support the initiative. The benefits of revegetation and connectivity of habitat on our native wildlife will not be realised without corresponding pest control<sup>2</sup>. We acknowledge the incredible work already happening in the community to reduce the impact of possums, rats, mustelids, weeds and other pests.

We submit that the Franklin Local Board also promote responsible pet ownership, and support efforts to reduce the number of stray and feral cats in the region. Cats are the only known definitive host for *Toxoplasma gondii*<sup>3</sup>, meaning that the parasite can only reproduce in cats. Toxoplasmosis is known to affect many of the native species found in the Franklin region, including kākā and Māui dolphin. Earlier this year, it was confirmed that a Māui dolphin found on the Āwhitu Peninsula had died due to toxoplasmosis<sup>4</sup>. Māui dolphin has a conservation status of nationally critical, with an estimated 54 adults remaining. We must address the feral cat population to protect these taonga species and to reduce the overall predation of our native wildlife. The Franklin Local Board can support this crucial work through education and control programmes, and through advocacy for responsible pet ownership.

Key initiative: Partner with community groups, developers, and landowners to protect waterways leading to the Manukau Harbour and Hauraki Gulf.

We see a role for public education (particularly around some simple solutions using plants) as well as requirements for developers to be undertaking these practices.

Key initiative: Develop a community-led Climate Plan that: considers local challenges and opportunities; supports the local board to invest in community-led action; is a platform for community participation in climate action; is a platform for attracting regional, government and other third-party investment.

We support the initiative and look forward to contributing to the Climate Plan.

Dear Sir, Franklin Local Board Members,

As suggested I have prepared a list of issues that I believe should be part the Franklin Board Plan 2023.

- Design and designate a multimodal transport corridor linking Karaka Waiuku Pukekohe Bombay to provide safe transport connection linkages to these area as development continues.
- 2. The multimodal corridor is to accommodate pedestrians cycleway public transport vehicles including light rail trucks cars buses and power water communication gas sewage services.
- The multimodal corridor is to be generally linear in design and is treated as a green field project (avoiding existing infrastructure) which results in significant cost savings and reduced construction times.
- 4. Develop a long term purchasing plan of the land on and bordering or part of the designated multimodal route.

5.	A willing buyer seller process to be used which is similar to the French infrastructure land purchasing system that encourages sensible land purchases in a timely cost effective manner.
6.	When properties along the designated route are placed on the market they should be purchased by council and the land not required for the multimodal corridor is returned to the open market and sold off.
7.	Transpower used this process to erect a transmission line between Whakamaru and Pakuranga which resulted in a significant land profit to Transpower during the build process.
8.	Each year thousands of tons of cliff faces (soft sandstone) in the area Waiuki Awhitu Peninsula Glenbrook Clarks Beach area fall into the Manukau Harbou that result in thick mud that compromises local beaches channels including the Waiuku Wharf area.
9.	A lot of these collapsing cliff faces are part of Council's Esplanade Reserves that are not maintained by council and should be.
10	Consideration needs to be given on determining an engineering solution to reduce these cliff faces collapsing into the harbour and reusing the soft sandstone sediment to stabilise the toe of these soft sandstone cliff faces.
11	. There have been a number of artificial reefs built on Tamaki Drive and on the shore line of the Tamaki River and a carpark at Westhaven all using Mudcrete a mixture of marine sediment and Portland cement processed through a pug mill.

12. Dredgings from the Port of Onehunga were trucked to the Port of Auckland's Container terminal at Mechanics Bay and processed into Mudcrete and this has successfully been used as a structural component for the container terminal development process.
13. A similar process could be used to stabilise the cliff faces in the area using the dredgings from the Waiuku Wharf area to make it a much more useable harbour port and improve the current negative visual aspect.
14.I continue to receive enquiries for a series of public wharfs to be established around the Manukau Harbour in order to service a public transport network on the Manukau Harbour.
15. The locations for public all tide 24/7 wharfs would be at such locations as Onehunga, Waiuku, Clarks Beach, Te Toro, Waiau Pa, Glenbrook Beach, Matakawau, Grahams Beach, Orua Bay, Huia, Cornwallis, French Bay, Blockhouse Bay.
16. Updated and regularly maintained navigation charts of the Manukau Harbour including the upper reaches of the Waiuku River to the NZ Steel Mill and Waiuku.
17. Installation of updated navigation markers (buoys and lights) on the main channels servicing Orua Bay Te Toro and Waiuku and Grahams Beach to Onehunga.
18. All new public boat ramps to be useable 24/7 with an adjoining floating dock and trailer parking and the facility is suitably protected from wave action ensuring safe launching and retrieval of trailer vessels.

19. The Port of Onehunga is available for mooring purposes for larger and non-trailer-able vessels.
20. The Port of Onehunga is made available for regular ferry services on the harbour.
21. Research is undertaken to determine why people are suffering from eye infections diarrhoea and vomiting after swimming and wakeboarding in the Manukau Harbour especially the Taihiki River Glenbrook Beach and Clarks Beach.
22. Regular water quality testing is undertaken using various methods including testing for e.coli to determine sources of the contamination and finding solutions to these issues.
23. There should be no further discharges of treated waste water and or contaminated water into the Manukau Harbour due to what we have witnessed at the discharge point of Watercare's discharge point at Puketutu Island over the last 60 years.
24. Watercare are currently being subject to a party seeking to have their existing right to locate sewer pipes under private property challenged.
25. The community including the local board need to support Watercare where they continue to be allowed to install sewer pipes under private property (at a reasonable depth) that avoids digging up public roads that will result in an significant increase in there carbon foot prints during construction of new pipelines.

- 26. The consenting process to address coastal erosion and placing new wharfs around the harbour needs to be simplified.
- 27. There should be a simple planning template developed by Auckland Council that sets out the process to address the erosion and wharf development around the harbour that ensure projects are delivered in a timely and cost effective manner.

On behalf of the Te Puru Charitable Trust, an Auckland Council Controlled Organisation (CCO), we are submitting on the Draft Franklin Local Board Plan 2023. This is a late submission but nevertheless we respectfully request that the Local Board consider our submission.

We are writing to request that Franklin Local Board maintain the current funding levels for Te Puru Sports Facility.

# Who is Te Puru Charitable Trust?

The Trust runs the Te Puru Community Centre, which is arguably in one of the most beautiful locations for this type of facility in New Zealand:

# https://www.tepuru.co.nz/about-us/the-trust/

Acknowledging Te Puru's mana whenua values, before it was a sports facility, Te Puru was for centuries a traditional burial ground (urupa) of Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki. Ngāi Tai still regard Te Puru as sacred and significant in their ancestral history and the Trust continues to work with Ngāi Tai in maintaining and raising awareness of this cultural taonga.

The centre was originally built as the result of a large community mobilisation, strongly supported by members of the then Franklin Local Board. Many members of the community came together to raise funds from sponsorship, contributions and grants and then actually helped with the physical construction of the facility. As a result, the centre has a special place in the hearts of many members of the Beachlands Maraetai area, and wider southeast Auckland.

The Te Puru Community Charitable Trust itself was then formed in 2002 to run the completed Te Puru Community Centre. The Trust was formed as a CCO by the Manukau City Council and became an Auckland Council CCO, following the 'super city' merger in 2010.

Te Puru Charitable Trust is made up of volunteers, each bringing specific skills and backgrounds that enable community-led decision-making at the Centre. The Te Puru Trust currently employs two FTE staff to run and operate the Centre.

# Te Puru Sports Centre at the Heart of our Community

The Te Puru Centre is at the heart of the Wairoa community and is unique in the area. There are no other large sport and recreation facilities within thirty kilometers that include a full-sized indoor multi sports hall, gymnasium, conference facilities, bar, commercial kitchen, boardroom and various other event spaces.

As Te Puru sits adjacent to the council sports fields, it has formal affiliations with the local football, rugby, touch, netball and athletics clubs. These clubs are all major organisations in the local community and make significant use of the facility.

Te Puru accommodates an extremely diverse range of users, from a variety of age groups and ethnicities. The Trust is actively working with its user groups to increase the number of women and girls in sporting activities.

In addition to sports clubs, the Centre runs or hosts community clubs, programmes and activities including school holidays, gymnastics, Māori language lessons, Mahjong, quiz nights, annual awards ceremonies, weddings and so on.

An average month sees nearly 4000 people from the local community, east Auckland and beyond using Te Puru's facilities.

# Partnership with Franklin Local Board & Auckland Council

The Franklin Local Board and Auckland Council achieve an excellent return on the current level of investment in Te Puru and, under our current funding agreement, the Trust reports every six months on the KPIs agreed with Council. The Trust works actively to achieve and exceed the Auckland Plan requirements and Council-identified KPIs, including:

- · Improving affordability and accessibility to sports and recreational activities
- · Improving participation of Māori and targeted populations
- · Increasing diversity of activities offered
- Active user group and community engagement
- Strong governance
- · Effective and efficient operations
- Providing a well-maintained, attractive facility
- · High satisfaction levels of users

# Māori Involvement in Te Puru

Since 2017, we have been engaging with local iwi Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki and creating opportunities for increased Māori involvement in governance and operations.

Māori comprise 8.6% (2018 census data) of the local community. The Trust is proud to have 20% Māori staff.

Since 2017, we have conducted annual customer surveys and continue to collect data on the gender and ethnic diversity of our users. Through this feedback, the Facility Manager has a good understanding of the local programmes and initiatives Māori participate in, and we aim to increase Māori participation by providing services that match user demands.

There is strong Māori representation within our user groups for netball, rugby and touch rugby. Rugby / touch rugby's affiliations with Counties Manukau means that many visitor/tournament games at Te Puru Park involve teams with high Māori representation.

We have multiple strategies for increasing the provision of and growing participation in culturally appropriate activities for Māori. These have been developed taking account of the feedback and data received over three years of customer satisfaction surveys and ethnicity data.

In 2018/19 the Trust collected participation data on children and young people that identify as Māori. From 1st July 2018, the Trust reported participation by Māori children for the activities it facilitates which are the school holiday programme and the gymnastics club programme. The participation rate aligns with the proportion of local Māori population.

Our approach also includes:

- School holiday programmes can offer Māori games/Māori language activities.
- Supporting the local community to learn Te Reo. The Trust, in response to a request for Te Reo classes, offered Te Reo through Te Wānanga o Aotearoa classes in 2017/ 2018 and in 2019 (x2 classes per week for 36 weeks), catering for approx. 50 local community members).
- Delivering KiwiSport programmes to the local primary schools (Orere, Brookby, Maraetai, Clevedon, Beachlands) increases opportunities for participation in sport.

# Removing financial barriers for participation in sports

The Trust operates numerous strategies and programs aimed at reducing financial barriers to participation in sport and recreation.

These include:

- Subsidised classes for senior citizens and group exercise classes
- Free play 10 hours allocated per week
- Subsidised community / affiliated rates for local clubs
- 'Bring a friend' weeks

- Provision of direct financial assistance or waive fees for in need local families. We are currently looking at formalising this process.
- School Holiday Programme: We are the most affordable programme in the local area, and less expensive than other similar Auckland suburbs.
- Gymnastics: less costly other similar gymnastics clubs
- Facility hire in line with other Auckland-based providers
- Free activities badminton (youth and adults), table tennis (youth and adults), adult open fitness/gymnastics, senior social, pickle ball, Rummikub

To enable the Trust to continue to provide this wide range of sports and recreational activities to the local Beachlands / Maraetai community and wider East Auckland and maintain our KPI performance levels, we urge the Local Board and Auckland Council to maintain our current funding levels through the Local Board grants and Council Funding Agreement and Facility Operating Grant processes.

# Funding Agreement with Auckland Council

The Trust notes that this budget review is for the Council's FY 2023/2024 - Te Puru's current funding agreement with Auckland Council is to the end of FY 2024 and will expire on 30 June 2024.

We request that this approved funding agreement remain unchanged.

# Challenges Facing Te Puru Community Centre

Te Puru currently faces two significant challenges.

Firstly, the facility itself is over twenty years old and in this harsh marine environment needs increasing maintenance and upgrades. Current planned repairs to roofing, doors, windows and decking are estimated to cost many hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Secondly, the Centre's funding from Auckland Council has recently been slashed. This has left the facility in a potentially unsustainable financial position.

Te Puru Trust is actively exploring new funding opportunities but will still require considerable financial support from the Franklin Local Board and Auckland Council, as our CCO status constrains our ability to obtain commercial sponsorship and other types of funding sources that would typically be available to private charitable organisations.

# Local Board Plan 2023: Request from Te Puru Charitable Trust:

1) An Appropriate Financial Contribution be made to Upgrade and Future Proof the Facility to Cater for Significantly Increased Use

The Te Puru Charitable Trust will remain supportive of the Proposed Plan Change if an amendment is made to allow for an appropriate development contribution for repairs, additions and alterations to the Te Puru Community Building. Development contributions

are fees payable on developments and subdivisions and they provide for, amongst other things, upgraded infrastructure for Council and CCO facilities.

At Te Puru, the significant increase in user numbers from the proposed plan change will have the following key impacts:

- Storage. The Centre is already up against the limit of its storage capacity, with shipping containers outside the building being used for extra capacity. A plan to construct an extra storage facility has already been produced. This facility is estimated to cost several hundred thousand dollars.
- Repairs and Maintenance. It would be expected that the cost of annual repairs and maintenance would increase. This would come at a cost of tens of thousands of dollars per year.
- Bar, Clubrooms and Kitchen. These key facilities are constrained. To allow for successfully accommodating bigger numbers of customers they would need to be reconfigured. Plans exist for this but have not yet been actioned. Again, this reconfiguration will cost several hundred thousand dollars.
- Stadium Floor. The stadium floor is budgeted for replacement in 2028. Increased use of the facility will bring forward this cost of several hundred thousand dollars.
- IT and AV. The information technology and audio-visual facilities at Te Puru are barely adequate. An increase in numbers and activities would necessitate an upgrade costing tens of thousands of dollars.
- Inclusion in discussions with the Local Board Council and the applicant regarding recreational facilities for the Beachlands South plan change area

The Trust also requests that it be included in discussions regarding the provision of recreational and sporting facilities in the Beachlands South plan change area, with a view to providing feed back into the final Local Board plan.

This is to ensure the Council's decision makers have up-to-date information regarding the nature and scale of recreational facilities likely to be needed, and can take a comprehensive and coordinated approach in providing for these facilities within the Beachlands South and wider east Auckland area via the Local Board Plan process.



### **DEFINITIONS AND INTERPRETATION**

- 1.1 Unless the context otherwise requires, capitalised words have the meanings given to them in this Agreement and as follows:
  - "Business Day" means a weekday (Monday to Friday) excluding any New Zealand public holidays and Auckland Anniversary Day;
  - "Contact Address" means, in relation to a party, the physical and postal addresses, facsimile number, and email address (as the case may be) for purposes of communications under this Agreement notified by that party to the other party from time to time:
  - "Funding" means the total financial funding set out in the Specific Terms.
  - "Funding Period" means the period to which the Funding relates and will be applied for the Purpose, as set out in the Specific Terms
  - "GST" means goods and services tax as provided in the Goods and Services Tax Act 1985;
  - "Insolvency Event" means anything that reasonably indicates that there is a significant risk that Recipient is insolvent or is or will become unable to pay its debts as they fall due including:
  - (a) any step being taken to make the person bankrupt, wind up the person's business or to have a receiver, receiver and manager, administrator, liquidator or statutory manager appointed to or in respect of the person or any of its assets;
  - (b) any statutory demand being served on the person, or any proceedings being brought or threatened against the person for recovery of a liquidated or undisputed debt:
  - (c) the person ceasing to carry on its business; or
  - (d) a meeting of the person's creditors being called or held or the person entering into any type of arrangement with, or assignment for the benefit of all or any of its creditors:
  - "Objectives and Measures" means those outcomes, objectives, measures, key performance indicators (KPIs), goals and targets set out in the Specific Terms;
  - "Party Representative" means the Funder Representative and Recipient Representative (as the case may be) set out in the Specific Terms, or anyone else who is appointed by a party (and duly notified to the other party) to discharge those roles from time to time;
  - "Probity Event" has the meaning given in clause 9.4; and
  - "Purpose" means the purpose for which the Funding is to be used as set out in the Specific Terms.
  - "Vulnerable Children Act and Regulations" means the Vulnerable Children Act 2014 and associated subordinate legislation.

- 1.2 References and interpretation: Except where the context otherwise requires, this Agreement shall, be interpreted and applied in accordance with the following principles:
  - Agreement: references to this "Agreement" include the Signing Page, Specific Terms, General Terms and Schedules;
  - Clauses and schedules: references to clauses and schedules are to clauses in the General Terms and the schedules to this Agreement (unless stated otherwise);
  - GST: all monetary amounts are stated exclusive of GST and in New Zealand dollars unless provided otherwise;
  - Including: "including" and similar words do not imply any limitation:
  - all references to legislation include all subordinate legislation, any re-enactment of or amendment to that legislation and all legislation passed in substitution for that legislation;
  - Material Breach: references to "material breach" include any series of breaches of a similar or recurring nature which taken together are material;
  - Negative obligations: an obligation on the Recipient not to do something includes a reference to the Recipient ensuring that its staff, subcontractors and anyone else it is responsible for do not do that thing;
  - Party: references to any "party" mean a party to this Agreement and include their respective successors and permitted assigns (as the case may be);
  - Persons: references to a "person" include a natural person, firm, corporation, association or other entity, whether incorporated or not and whether or not having a separate legal personality;
  - Singular and plural: where the context permits, the singular includes the plural and vice versa.
- 1.3 **Terms:** The Specific Terms prevail over these General Terms to the extent of any inconsistency. The General Terms do not limit additional rights or obligations in the Specific Terms or in any schedules.

### 2 **FUNDING AND PAYMENT**

- Subject to Recipient complying with this Funding: Agreement, Funder will provide the Funding to Recipient for the Purpose as set out in the Specific Terms.
- 2.2 Payments: The Funding will be paid in accordance with Funder's grant payment process. Payment of the Funding is not subject to GST.
- 2.3 Conditions: The Funding (and any instalments thereof) will be paid to Recipient subject to the following conditions:
  - (a) Funder is satisfied Recipient has complied with all material obligations under this Agreement (including the reporting requirements) and is not in default of any obligations;

- (b) Funder continues to have confidence in the Recipient's structure, governance, management, operational practices, and financial stability/solvency; and
- (c) Funder is satisfied that Recipient intends to only use the Funding for the Purpose during the Funding Period.
- 2.4 Non-exclusive funding: For avoidance of doubt, this Agreement does not limit Funder's freedom to fund any other organisation with the same or similar objectives to Recipient.
- **2.5 Recognition:** Recipient will give fair and reasonable acknowledgement of Funder's funding contributions, including as set out in the Specific Terms.

### 3 RECIPIENT'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- **3.1** Use of Funding: Recipient will use the Funding during the Funding Period solely for the Purpose and in a manner that is diligent and prudent.
- 3.2 Legal compliance: Recipient shall:
  - (a) obtain all necessary licences, authorisations, permits and registrations to enable it to achieve the Purpose;
  - (b) comply with all applicable laws, regulations, bylaws, industry codes of practice, ethical and professional standards, and licensing and consent requirements.

### 3.3 Vulnerable Children:

- (a) Where the Recipient is a specified organisation under the Vulnerable Children Act and Regulations, the Recipient will ensure that it complies with all applicable requirements including, as required, ensuring that the Recipient undertakes safety checks for new and existing children's workers employed or engaged by the Recipient (both in relation to any activities funded and generally). The Recipient will, upon request, at all times, immediately provide the Funder with information about any matters relating to the Vulnerable Children Act and Regulations.
- (b) The Funder (or its representatives) may carry out audits of the Recipient to ensure compliance with all obligations set out under clause 3.3(a). The Recipient must:
  - (i) actively cooperate and participate in any audits carried out by the Funder;
  - (ii) provide all necessary access and information required by the Funder in relation to an audit; and
  - (iii) take all reasonable steps to immediately rectify any issues raised by the Funder.
- **3.4 Health and Safety:** Without limiting any additional obligations set out in the Specific Terms, the Recipient must
  - (a) at all times comply with all health and safety legislation, regulations, applicable codes of practice and standards;
  - (b) ensure that it takes all practicable steps to ensure the health and safety of all personnel of the Recipient and any other parties associated with the use of the Funding Services, including the public, and visitors to any area under the control of the Recipient;
  - (c) will have and keep current, all relevant Health and Safety qualifications required to perform its obligations in respect of the use of the Funding; and
  - (d) allow the Funder (or its representatives) to audit its Health and Safety compliance at any time and provide the Funder

- with any information as the Funder requires in relation to those matters.
- **3.5 Objectives and Measures:** Recipient will use its best endeavours to try to achieve the Objectives and Measures during the Funding Period.

### 3.6 No additional funding:

- (a) Recipient is responsible for organising all additional funding over and above the Funding which may be required for the Purpose or other activities and operations of the Recipient.
- (b) If required by the Funder, Recipient will actively seek funding contr butions during the Period to assist it with the costs associated with the Purpose from other sources, i.e. sponsorship, donations, grants and through other fund raising initiatives.
- (c) The Funding is only for the Period and Purpose and Funder is under no obligation to provide any funding to Recipient other than the Funding. Any decision about providing further funding to Recipient will be at Funder's sole discretion and subject to a separate funding agreement.

### 4 PARTIES' RELATIONSHIP

- **4.1** Representatives: The Party Representatives are the first and primary contact persons in relation to this Agreement, except to the extent otherwise provided in this Agreement or agreed by the parties.
- **4.2 No surprises:** Recipient shall communicate regularly with Funder about its use of the Funding, including promptly raising and escalating any issues (including media issues) likely to be of concern to Funder.
- **4.3 Publicity and reputation:** Recipient acknowledges that its activities may affect Funder's reputation, and accordingly:
  - (a) <u>Disrepute</u>: Recipient must not do anything which brings, or would be I kely to bring, Funder or any of its Funder-controlled organisations, into disrepute; and
  - (b) <u>Public communication</u>: Recipient must not make any inaccurate or misleading representations or public statements relating to or impacting upon its relationship with the Funder or this Agreement.
- **4.4 Funder publicity:** Funder may at its discretion promote in any media its support of Recipient and the Purpose.

### 4.5 Conflicts of interest:

- (a) Recipient undertakes that it has disclosed, and that it will disclose, to Funder in writing any actual, potential or perceived conflict with the interests of Funder under this Agreement or in any other material way.
- (b) Recipient shall manage any conflicts in consultation with Funder. If Funder considers that a conflict is not being, or cannot be, appropriately managed by Recipient then Funder may immediately terminate this Agreement by written notice to Recipient.

# 4.6 Recipient's responsibility:

(a) Recipient is not (by virtue of this Agreement and the Funding) an employee, contractor, partner, joint venturer, or subsidiary of Funder and Recipient is not entitled to

- pledge the credit of Funder nor act as its agent, except as expressly authorised by this Agreement.
- (b) Recipient will be solely liable for all debts, losses, expenses and taxation on Recipient's income.

### 5 REPORTING AND PERFORMANCE

### 5.1 Reporting:

- (a) Recipient shall provide regular reports on its use of the Funding and other obligations under this Agreement in accordance with the Specific Terms or as otherwise as reasonably required by Funder from time to time.
- (b) If Funder is dissatisfied with any report provided by Recipient, Funder may, in its sole discretion, require more frequent/detailed reporting and/or refuse to make any further payments to Recipient.
- **5.2 Notification of breaches:** Recipient will immediately notify Funder if an event occurs which does or may:
  - (a) constitute a material breach of any term of this Agreement or render any warranty contained in this Agreement incorrect or untrue in any respect; or
  - (b) adversely impact in any way on the performance of Recipient's obligations under this Agreement.
- 5.3 Records and information requests: Recipient must keep full records and documentation in relation to the Funding and this Agreement ("Records") and provide copies of Records to Funder on reasonable request, and immediately notify Funder of any disclosure requests Recipient receives (including under the Local Government Official Information and Meetings Act 1987).
- **5.4** Performance review: Funder may monitor and review the performance and compliance of the Recipient under this Agreement, and Recipient agrees to co-operate with Funder as may be reasonably requested including by:
  - (a) providing all information that is requested by Funder;
  - (b) attending such meetings that are reasonably requested by Funder to discuss and review any aspects of this Agreement; and
  - (c) allowing Funder reasonable access to any sites under the control of Recipient.

The foregoing shall also apply where Funder has a reasonable concern about Recipient's financial viability or ability to continue to operate.

### 6 CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION AND IP

- **6.1 Confidentiality:** The parties acknowledge that some information provided by them in connection with this Agreement may be commercially sensitive or not for general publication. Where so, the party providing the information should specify which information they provide is confidential, and the party receiving the information agrees not to disclose it without the prior consent of the other party, except as required by law or where the information is already publicly available (other than through a breach of this Agreement).
- **6.2** Intellectual property: Recipient acknowledges that the Funder owns all intellectual property in respect of the Funder name and logo ("Funder trade marks"). All use of the Funder

trade marks (if permitted by this Agreement) shall comply with Funder's logo and brand guidelines or otherwise as reasonably required by Funder from time to time in writing. All goodwill associated with Funder trade marks shall inure exclusively to the benefit of Funder.

- Publishing of information: Auckland Council regularly publishes information on its procurement activities, spending and contracting as part of its public information programme ("the Programme"). Notwithstanding anything else in this Agreement/ Contract, the Recipient consents to Auckland Council disclosing information about this Agreement/ Contract in its Programme publicly, including, but not limited to
  - (a) a description of the Funding being supplied;
  - (b) the name of the Recipient;
  - (c) the Term of the Agreement;
  - (d) the value of the Agreement;
  - (e) the total funding received by the recipient regarding all agreements or contracts with Auckland Council.

### 7 WARRANTIES

- **7.1 General warranties:** Recipient represents and warrants and undertakes on a continuing basis that:
  - (a) Entity status: Recipient is:
    - a. a duly constituted corporation, society or trust under the laws of New Zealand; and
    - b. registered with the Charities Commission if its activities are charitable or not-for-profit,

and that status and registration will be maintained during the Funding Period.

- (b) Enforceable: this Agreement is valid, binding and enforceable and it has taken all necessary action to authorise the execution and performance of this Agreement, and entry into this Agreement will not cause Recipient to be in breach of any other agreement or obligation;
- (c) <u>No impediment</u>: except as disclosed by Recipient to Funder in writing, Recipient is not aware of any matter or event which does or may materially and adversely affect the ability of Recipient to perform its obligations under this Agreement;
- (d) <u>Solvency</u>: no Insolvency Event has occurred in respect of it;
- (e) No inducements: no form of inducement or reward has been or will be directly or indirectly provided or offered by Recipient to any of Funder's employees, agents, officers or representatives in connection with this Agreement;
- (f) Tax resident: Unless notified otherwise to Funder prior to the date of this Agreement, Recipient is a New Zealand tax resident;
- (g) <u>Correct information</u>: all information and representations made by Recipient (prior to or after the date of this Agreement, including in any contestable funding application process leading to this Agreement)

- are true, complete and correct and not misleading through non-disclosure; and
- (h) No double funding: Recipient has not sought or received any funding from any other person that "doubles up" on the Funding in excess of Recipient's actual requirements for the funded activities in question.
- **7.2 Reliance:** Recipient acknowledges that Funder has, in entering into this Agreement, relied on Recipient's representations in clause 7.1.

### 8 REFUND OF FUNDING

### **8.1** If the:

- (a) Funding (or any part of it) is not used for the Purpose;or
- (b) Funder terminates this Agreement pursuant to clause 9.1,

then Funder may refuse to make any further payments to Recipient and Recipient will refund (in the time and manner requested by Funder) up to 100% of that portion of the Funding already paid to Recipient as determined by Funder. Funding that has been legitimately spent for the Purpose will not be required to be refunded.

### 9 TERMINATION

- **9.1 Termination:** Funder may immediately terminate this Agreement by written notice to Recipient if:
  - (a) Recipient commits a material breach of this Agreement that is not, in the reasonable opinion of Funder, able to be remedied:
  - (b) Recipient commits a material breach of this Agreement, and, where such breach is capable of remedy, Recipient fails to remedy such breach within ten (10) Business Days following receipt of written notice from Funder specifying the breach and requiring it to be remedied;
  - (c) Recipient suffers an Insolvency Event or a Probity Event occurs; or breaches any of its obligations under clause 3.4.
  - (d) any warranty contained in this Agreement is untrue in any material respect; or
  - (e) Recipient breaches clause 12.2 (no assignment or legal changes without consent).

If provided in the Specific Terms, the Funder may also terminate this Agreement without cause (in the Funder's sole discretion) on given the period of written notice provided in the Specific Terms.

- **9.2** Consequences of termination: On termination or expiry of this Agreement:
  - (a) Recipient must return to Funder any property, including Funder's Intellectual Property, in Recipient's possession or control; and
  - (b) Recipient will refund any portion of the Funding, as required in accordance with clause 8;

- **9.3** Accrued rights: Termination or expiry of this Agreement is without prejudice to the accrued rights of the parties, and any express rights under this Agreement are additional to any other right or remedy a party may have.
- **9.4 Probity events:** For purposes of clause 9.1(c), "Probity Event" means:
  - (a) Inducement: where any improper inducement, reward or benefit has been provided on behalf of Recipient to any of Funder's staff or other persons to influence their actions in relation to Recipient or this Agreement; or
  - (b) Offence or breach: where Recipient commits any offence relating to fraud or dishonest acts, or breaches the Commerce Act 1986 in relation to this Agreement, or Recipient defrauds, or attempts or conspires to defraud, Funder;
  - (c) <u>Ethical wrongdoing</u>: where Recipient engages in governance, ethical or business practices which are fundamentally incompatible with Funder's values or the local government accountability and legislative framework; or
  - (d) Related party transactions: where Recipient enters into or performs any financial transaction (including payments, koha or gifts) with related parties (such as trustees, staff or other associated persons), irrespective of whether the transaction is demonstrably at under-value, except for the following permitted transactions:
    - koha or gifts that comply with policies and financial limits expressly disclosed to Funder prior to entering into this Agreement;
    - b. arms-length services payments or remuneration; or
    - distributions that fall directly within Recipient's charitable purposes or objects in its constituting documents,

and includes any of these things done for or on behalf of Recipient or anyone it is responsible for.

**9.5** Survival: Any provisions intended to survive expiry or termination of this Agreement (including clauses 5.3, 5.4, 6, 8, 9.2, 9.3 and 11.1 to 11.3, and any provisions incidental to or required in order to give effect to any surviving clauses) will remain in full force and effect.

### 10 DISPUTE RESOLUTION

- 10.1 Disputes: The parties will engage in good faith negotiations as soon as reasonably practicable to resolve any dispute or difference (a "Dispute") that arises under this Agreement. Recipient must still comply with its obligations under this Agreement during any Dispute.
- 10.2 Proceedings: Neither party may commence any court proceedings related to the Dispute unless it has first complied with this clause 10. However, nothing in this clause 10 restricts or limits the right of either party to obtain urgent injunctive relief or to exercise any right under this Agreement (for example, to terminate).

### 11 INDEMNITY, LIABILITY AND INSURANCE

**11.1 Indemnity:** Recipient indemnifies Funder, its employees, agents and officers against all claims, demands, actions,

proceedings, costs (including solicitor and own client costs), losses, expenses and damages which are made or brought against any of the above-mentioned indemnified parties or incurred or suffered by those parties in connection with Recipient's breach of this Agreement, negligent act or omission of Recipient or anyone it is responsible for, or any claim made by a third party in relation to Recipient's activities.

- 11.2 Recipient's responsibility: Under no circumstances shall Funder, or its employees or consultants or agents, be liable in contract, tort or otherwise to compensate Recipient or any third party for any loss, injury or damage, direct or indirect, including, loss of profit or business or for any direct or indirect or consequential loss whatsoever arising from any act, permission, error, default or delay in respect of the performance or non-performance by Funder (or in the case of a third party claim, Recipient) of its obligations under this Agreement.
- 11.3 Trustee limitation: Despite anything stated or implied in this Agreement, if Recipient is a trust, Funder agrees that the trustees of Recipient enter into this Agreement as trustees for Recipient and not in any personal capacity. The liability of each of the trustees of Recipient under this Agreement (except in matters of fraud, criminal act, or wilful wrongdoing by that trustee) is limited to the assets for the time being of Recipient.
- **11.4 Insurance:** Where appropriate or required by Funder, Recipient will hold and maintain such insurance cover as may be reasonable to insure against any material risks in relation to Recipient's activities (including in the Purpose).

### 12 GENERAL

- **12.1 Notices:** Notices under this Agreement must be delivered in writing to the relevant party at its Contact Address (by facsimile, post or courier delivery), marked for the attention of the Party Representative, and also copied by email to the Party Representative. Notices are deemed delivered:
  - (a) In the case of facsimile, as soon as the sender receives from the sender's facsimile machine a report of an error free transmission to the correct facsimile number; and
  - (b) In the case of post or courier delivery, when the notice is delivered to the correct Contact Address.

Express acknowledgement by the relevant Party Representative that is has received an email copy of the notice constitutes delivery. Notices delivered after 5pm on a Business Day, or on a non-Business Day, will be deemed received on the next Business Day.

- 12.2 Assignments and transfers: Recipient must not assign or transfer any of its rights or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of Funder. Any change in effective control or beneficial ownership of Recipient shall be deemed an assignment for purposes of this clause 12.2. If Funder consents, Recipient will pay Funder's reasonable legal and other costs relating to consent and assignment.
- 12.3 Further acts: Each party must sign all documents and do all things reasonably requested by the other party necessary or convenient to give effect to this Agreement according to its true intent and spirit.

### 12.4 Rights, benefits and obligations:

(a) <u>Benefits</u>: Except as expressly provided, this Agreement is not intended to confer benefits or enforceable rights on subcontractors or any persons other than the parties.

- (b) <u>Joint liability</u>: If Recipient is more than one person or entity (whether or not trustees) then this Agreement binds them jointly and severally.
- (c) <u>Cumulative rights</u>: Provisions in this Agreement for the benefit of Funder are cumulative.
- 12.5 Regulatory capacity: Nothing in this Agreement affects or fetters any regulatory power of Auckland Council or any of its council-controlled organisations. Recipient has no recourse under this Agreement with respect to the exercise (or not) of such powers, including on licensing or consenting matters.
- **12.6** Severability: If any provision of this Agreement is or becomes unlawful or unenforceable it shall be treated as severable from the other provisions of this Agreement which shall remain in full force and effect.
- 12.7 Variation and waiver: The provisions of this Agreement may only be varied or waived by written agreement signed by the parties. Any delay or failure to exercise any remedy is not a waiver.
- 12.8 Entire agreement: This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties in relation to its subject-matter, and supersedes all prior oral and written representations, understandings, arrangement and agreements except to the extent expressly retained under the terms of this Agreement.
- **12.9** Governing law and jurisdiction: This Agreement is governed by the law of New Zealand. The parties submit to the non-exclusive jurisdiction of the New Zealand courts, and shall not object to the exercise of jurisdiction by those courts.
- 12.10 Counterparts: This Agreement may be executed by facsimile or scan, and in any number of counterparts all of which will be deemed an original and together be taken as a single instrument.




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

## Solar farm proposal offers renewable energy for Clevedon and Ardmore



The farmland surrounding historic St James Church in Ardmore is the site of a proposed solar farm which could so power to Clevedon and Ardmore.

An application has been made to Auckland Councily build a solar farm in Ardmore which would provide power to the surrounding communities.

Kenny Ardmore Limited has applied for resource consent to construct and operate a solar farm at 600 Papakura-Clevedon Road, Ardmore, adjacent the historic St James Church and opposite Ardmore School. If council grants resource consent, the enterprise will see about 18,000 solar panels installed on approximately 13ha of the 16.9ha site, along with ancillary electrical transformer and substation equipment.

The solar farm's resource consent application says it will generate approximately 17,488 MWh, enough to meet the domestic power demand of about 2,400 houses in the surrounding local communities of Ardmore and Clevedon.

The site could be connected to two local substations via the Vector lines network, which will then transmit electricity to Ardmore and Clevedon. Limited surplus would be fed back to the national grid.

On site, the solar panels will be fixed in place, and will not rotate or swivel. The panels will run in rows, tilted at a fixed angle to face north. Each solar panel will measure 2.4m long x 1.3m wide x 0.4m deep, and ill be a mounting frame on piles that are drive into the fence posts. Once mounted, each panel will to 3m in height. The photovoltaic panels have a lifespan of 30 years.

Because the solar panels are an impervious resource consent is required for the diversion and of stormwater onto land from the panels. Resour is also required as the solar panels and ancillar exceed the maximum permitted building area restriction for the area.

The application says that planting will be undertoothe site to act as a visual buffer between the resolar farm.

The application goes on to say: "Overall, an initia moderate adverse effect on the rural character amenity of the site is expected due to the intra solar panel structures and associated infrastruct proposed mitigation planting establishes (over



The Pukekohe Business Improvement District is run by the Pukekohe Business Association which represents over 700 businesses in the Pukekohe district. We promote, support and advocate on behalf of local businesses to help create a prosperous economic environment for them to operate in. Our role in the Auckland economy is to improve the business environment of our areas, promote innovation, prosperity and employment as well as attract new businesses, customers and visitors.

The Franklin Local Board Plan outlines a comprehensive vision for our community's future, encompassing a range of strategies and initiatives aimed at enhancing the overall quality of life in Pukekohe. Undoubtedly, this plan holds several potential benefits for our business community.

Many aspects of the plan would provide many benefits to the business community. The plan's emphasis to facilitate opportunities for local Māori enterprise and entrepreneurship is well supported by the PBA. We would like to work collaboratively in this area to support the identification, growth, and opportunities for Māori business owners. We also support the continuation of the local Economic Development Broker to enhance local connections and provide opportunities for business development.

Please see the below points we would like to see included in this plan:

- Enhancing Pukekohe's Path network:
  - o We support the local targeted rate to fund the coordination and co-delivery of a Franklin Paths network. However, we would like to see this extended to include the replacement of or upgrade to the highly unsafe and slippery pavers that line our central business district. The safety risk this poses to our community, in particular, our elderly community members need to be addressed. Surveys we completed give a surprising insight into how many of our community members will avoid the town during the wet months for fear of slipping over. This needs to be addressed at an Auckland Council level, however, FLB support and advocacy is required. (Survey Attached)
- On-demand ride share
  - o We see that this service is coming and would like to see this happen sooner rather than later. This service can benefit not only the Pukekohe community but also the businesses as it provides flexible transport. This was raised in our PBA Strategic planning sessions by multiple attendees. This must be implemented before AT proceeds with its proposed changes to the bus service, as the limitations in current public transport options impacts both locals and visitors' mobility around Pukekohe
- The enhancement of Pukekohe's civic, arts and culture precinct
  - o The Pukekohe Business Association heavily supports the Unlock Pukekohe area plan.
- Transportation

- A review of the outer ring road needs to be carefully considered as the current plan does not allow for a safe passageway for pedestrians. The current plan also cuts through residential properties and is not future-proof to accommodate for the expansion of these residential areas. Taking freight transport out of the CBD accommodates residential growth between Pukekohe & Bombay and Pukekohe & Drury.
- o Park and Ride- We see the value in pursuing the opportunity to have a Park and Ride space in Pukekohe. This could utilise some of the A&P Showgrounds land or the old ITM site.
- We support a reduction in the speed limit within the Ring Road to create a safer pedestrian environment.

#### Beautification

o We would like to see the inclusion of more beautification and placemaking initiatives in this plan. The Pukekohe Business Association has been advocating for Flag Tracks for many years and now requires the support of the Franklin Local Board. The installation of flag tracks will be an asset for Pukekohe as this will beautify spaces and accommodate seasonal festivities.

#### Parking

- o As identified in our Strategic planning workshops, there is a strong need to further support additional parking opportunities in Pukekohe. This includes a multistorey car parking space in Devon Lane/ Massey Ave. As the development of this site has been put on hold by Eke Panuku. We see this as an opportunity to explore further options to future-proof parking opportunities that support our town's projected growth.
- o Investment in way findings and electronic parking indicators should be included.

#### Commercial response to Climate Change

o We welcome infrastructure that empowers businesses to develop a circular economy and reduce waste in Pukekohe's commercial district. This should include a recycled cardboard station.

#### • Response to the Dury Development

o A Pukekohe Branding Project, in partnership with the Franklin Local Board, will assist in cultivating a distinct local identity that attracts visitors and investors, fostering economic growth and community pride. We see this as a priority for Pukekohe and would welcome support similar to that of the Clevedon branding project.

In conclusion, the Franklin Local Board Plan 2023 holds promising benefits for Pukekohe businesses, but it also presents challenges that require careful consideration and collaboration between local authorities and the business community.

I am confident that with thoughtful planning and a collaborative approach, Pukekohe's businesses can thrive in the evolving landscape outlined by the Franklin Local Board Plan 2023. We are grateful to have such a strong and well-represented Local Board and we look forward to working closely on projects that deliver outcomes suitable for both our Businesses and the wider community.



Have you or someone you know slipped or fallen on wet pavers in Pukekohe's CBD?



Did the slip or fall result in an injury?







## **Introducing Disabled Persons Assembly NZ**

### We work on systemic change for the equity of disabled people

Disabled Persons Assembly NZ (DPA) is a not-for-profit pan-impairment Disabled People's Organisation run by and for disabled people.

## We recognise:

- Māori as Tangata Whenua and <u>Te Tiriti o Waitangi</u> as the founding document of Aotearoa New Zealand;
- disabled people as experts on their own lives;
- the <u>Social Model of Disability</u> as the guiding principle for interpreting disability and impairment;
- the <u>United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities</u> as the basis for disabled people's relationship with the State;
- the <u>New Zealand Disability Strategy</u> as Government agencies' guide on disability issues; and
- the <u>Enabling Good Lives Principles</u>, <u>Whāia Te Ao Mārama: Māori Disability</u>
   Action Plan, and <u>Faiva Ora: National Pasifika Disability Disability Plan</u> as avenues to disabled people gaining greater choice and control over their lives and supports.

#### We drive systemic change through:

- Leadership: reflecting the collective voice of disabled people, locally, nationally and internationally.
- **Information and advice:** informing and advising on policies impacting on the lives of disabled people.
- Advocacy: supporting disabled people to have a voice, including a collective voice, in society.
- Monitoring: monitoring and giving feedback on existing laws, policies and practices about and relevant to disabled people.

## **UN** Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities

DPA was influential in creating the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD),<sup>1</sup> a foundational document for disabled people which New Zealand has signed and ratified, confirming that disabled people must have the same human rights as everyone else. All state bodies in New Zealand, including local and regional government, have a responsibility to uphold the principles and articles of this convention. There are a number of UNCRPD articles particularly relevant to this submission, including:

- Article 3 General principles
- Article 9 Accessibility
- Article 19 Living independently and being included in the community
- Article 27 Work and employment
- Article 28 Adequate standard of living and social protection
- Article 29 Participation in political and public life
- Article 30 Participation in cultural life, recreation, leisure and sport

## **New Zealand Disability Strategy 2016-2026**

Since ratifying the UNCRPD, the New Zealand Government has established a Disability Strategy<sup>2</sup> to guide the work of government agencies on disability issues. The vision is that New Zealand be a non-disabling society, where disabled people have equal opportunity to achieve their goals and aspirations, and that all of New Zealand works together to make this happen. It identifies eight outcome areas contributing to achieving this vision. There are a number of Strategy outcomes particularly relevant to this submission, including:

Outcome 5 – Accessibility

## The Submission

1.) Introduction and Guiding Principles

DPA welcomes this opportunity to make a generic submission covering all local board areas to raise general principles/themes that every Auckland Council board should take into consideration when considering their local plans from a disability perspective.

This includes that there should be specific references to the needs, issues and aspirations of disabled people in each local area within all plans. The disabled communities of Auckland need to be more visible in these plans as there are few references to disabled people's concerns and issues within many of them.

DPA believes that this points out the need for more consultation specifically targeted to the disabled communities in each board area.

Ultimately, this means that disabled people should be recognised as a specific stakeholder group who should be actively consulted with and have our needs fully referenced within all plans.

**Recommendation 1:** that all local boards are required to specifically consult with disabled people as a distinct stakeholder group as part of all local board plan consultation processes.

**Recommendation 2:** that all local boards specifically reference the needs, views and priorities of disabled people (alongside those of other communities) within all local board plan documents.

Significantly, there appears to be either minimal or no data on the number of disabled people in each board area. While DPA notes that the last full Statistics New Zealand Disability Survey figures date from 2013 and that a new survey is about to be undertaken, Auckland Council should collaborate with Statistics New Zealand and other official data stakeholders to estimate the number of disabled people in the region for planning purposes.

**Recommendation 3:** that Auckland Council collaborate with Statistics New Zealand and other official data stakeholders to estimate the number of disabled people in each board area and across the region for planning purposes.

The fact that disabled people are not specifically targeted or fully included in all board plans has led to the absence of each local plan not being available in accessible formats including New Zealand Sign Language, Braille, Easy Read, Large Print and audio on the Council's website.

**Recommendation 4:** that Auckland Council ensures all local plans are published and available in accessible formats including New Zealand Sign Language, Braille, Easy Read, Large Print and audio.

Noting all the above factors, this submission focuses on key areas of concern for the disabled community that have been touched upon in our past submissions to the Auckland Council.

Our submission will focus on the need for local boards to plan and/or champion the following principles from a disability perspective. These include the need for:

- Accessible and inclusive communities
- Environmentally and climatically sustainable communities
- Communities that provide economic and social opportunities

# 2.) Brief background – important disability statistics

One in four New Zealanders have a disability or long-term health condition. Māori and Pacific peoples have an even higher-than-average rate of disability. There were approximately 271,000 disabled people residing in Auckland in 2013<sup>1</sup> (the latest data available), a number which rises to over 300,000 when accounting for current population increases.

Disabled people in Auckland face an increased risk of living in poverty largely due to lower incomes and extra resource requirements compared to non-disabled people.<sup>2</sup> Statistics also show that disabled New Zealanders are grossly overrepresented in unemployment rates; two-thirds of disabled people earn less than \$30,000 per annum, increasing the likelihood of poor socio-economic outcomes.<sup>3</sup>

One of the top issues for disabled people across Tāmaki Makaurau is that of housing.

Disabled people as a group are disproportionately impacted by homelessness. This is due to disabled people being overrepresented amongst low-income earners while also facing higher living costs due to disability. For this reason, disabled people are more likely to be renters; 2018 data from Statistics New Zealand shows that 47% of disabled people rent compared to 35% of non-disabled people.<sup>4</sup>

Disabled people are also at greater risk of homelessness due to the lack of security around ongoing tenancy and this is exacerbated by the low number of accessible houses not only in Auckland but throughout the country.

Another area of ongoing concern for disabled people is access to transport.

Earlier this year we submitted on the Auckland Council's Future Transport Projects plan. In that submission, we outlined how disabled people are highly reliant on public transport given the significant proportion of disabled people who don't drive.

Nevertheless, provision needs to be made to accommodate the transport needs of all disabled people and this includes for those who transport themselves via different modes including driving, bussing, walking, cycling, using taxis, ferries and trains.

In 2022, Waka Kotahi published independently commissioned research (in which DPA collaborated) entitled *Transport experiences of disabled people in Aotearoa New Zealand*. <sup>5</sup>

This research illustrated the ongoing accessibility challenges faced by disabled people when using public transport. Disabled people's main challenges included, for example, issues around using Total Mobility (TM), the inaccessibility of bus services, lack of footpaths and safe crossing points, and feeling excluded from the planning of sustainable city centres, as well as the disablist attitudes of some transport planners.

Disabled people also have ongoing issues with accessing train and ferry services in Auckland and the need for improved transport accessibility and affordability.

# 3.) Accessible and inclusive communities

Disabled people want to live in fully accessible communities which are inclusive of everyone.

DPA believes that disabled people have the right to access all facets of the communities they live in including public buildings, transport networks, schools, housing, playgrounds, parks, community facilities/amenities, and footpaths on an equitable basis with non-disabled people.

This means that disabled people should have the right to go everywhere and anywhere within the local communities in which they live without barriers being placed in the way of their full participation.

That is why DPA stresses the need for Auckland local boards to both champion and build community facilities and infrastructure (or those over which boards have direct responsibility for) to Universal Design Standards (to at least level 5). We also made

this call in our recent submission to Auckland Council's Future Development Strategy.

**Recommendation 5:** that all local boards fully champion and build community facilities and infrastructure (which they have direct control over) to Universal Design Standards (at least to level 5) to ensure accessibility.

All communities in Auckland should be fully accessible for every disabled person to live in too, and this includes people with mobility impairments, blind and low vision people, neurodiverse people (i.e., Autistic people), people with psychosocial disabilities/mental distress and Deaf/deaf communities.

This can be achieved, for example, through having accessible wayfinding signage in public spaces/places, quiet spaces where people can retreat to in busy areas (which are suitable for neurodiverse people and people experiencing mental distress), accessible bus stops, mobility parking and vehicle drop off areas, appropriate seating where people can sit and rest as well as good lighting and security features.

Building infrastructure to UD standards – including, most importantly, housing - should support the building of accessible, inclusive communities.

On housing, local boards should act as an advocate and champion to both central and local government - as well as to private and non-government sector stakeholders - for more accessible housing, especially that built to UD standards which can accommodate the needs of all people who may live in any dwelling across its lifetime, including disabled people.

Accessible housing should be available in all board areas within Auckland and at affordable prices for both rentals and buying.

**Recommendation 6:** that all local boards champion and advocate for the building of more accessible Universal Design housing in their areas.

Associated with the need for more accessible housing and community infrastructure is the requirement for fully accessible and affordable public transport connections in all areas.

All of Auckland Council's local boards can act as advocates, champions and partners with disabled people in both calling for and working together with Auckland Council and Auckland Transport on transport solutions that will give greater accessibility and choice to disabled Aucklanders.

These solutions include support for the development of Mass Rapid Transit (MRT) systems which are supported by networks of accessible bus, ferry and rail routes which are, in turn, serviced by fully accessible trains, buses and ferries. They should centre around the availability of accessible supporting infrastructure in the form of bus interchanges and stops, ferry terminals and railway stations.

**Recommendation 7:** that all local boards advocate and champion the extension of accessible transport networks for all Aucklanders, including disabled people.

Local boards should also support calls to make public transport more affordable, including for disabled people, by ensuring that the Total Mobility (TM) Scheme (that provides a 75 percent discount on all taxi and mobility service transport fares for those eligible) remains a key component of the transport system as it gives disabled people the opportunity to fully participate in their communities.

DPA recommends that local boards should advocate to Auckland Council and Auckland Transport to annually adjust the maximum fare cap to keep pace with inflation, so that disabled people can continue accessing journeys throughout the Auckland region.

**Recommendation 8:** that all local boards advocate for the extension of affordable public transport to all Aucklanders, especially to transport disadvantaged communities which include disabled people.

All local boards should be mindful that the need for fully accessible, inclusive communities must be underpinned by the undertaking of extensive barrier free

accessibility audits in areas where infrastructural improvements are being mooted as part of any local board plans.

**Recommendation 9:** that local boards either undertake or support the undertaking of barrier free audits in areas where infrastructure improvements are planned.

# 4.) Environmentally and climatically sustainable communities

The disabled community are already being severely hit by the impacts of climate change and are expected to be one of the hardest hit population groups going forward, locally, nationally and internationally.<sup>6</sup>

DPA found that after reaching out to our members in Auckland following the recent weather events that while many disabled people were resilient and had withstood the floods well, others had not as we heard stories about the impact that weather-enforced homelessness had on disabled people, especially given the lack of accessible housing.

DPA calls upon local boards to ensure that disabled people in every ward area can have their voices heard on all matters pertaining to planning for climate change, especially when developing mitigation strategies.

When it comes to planning climate change mitigation strategies, including the need to develop more 20-minute communities and managed retreat plans, disabled people need to be heard as, for example, planning for the potential red zoning of certain areas from being built on will have considerable ramifications for disabled people going forward including the need to potentially re-locate to less flood prone areas.

Nevertheless, DPA supports the need for red-zoning and building bans in areas where flooding, inundation and sea level rise risks will make it impossible to live in an increasingly warmer world.

All area board plans should specifically note the implications of climate change on marginalised communities, and this includes disabled people and that the voices of everyone, including Māori, Pasifika, disabled people, older people and others need to be clearly elevated and heard when it comes to climate change and environmental sustainability projects.

**Recommendation 10:** that local boards include disabled people as a key stakeholder group in planning for climate change mitigation and environmental management projects in their areas.

DPA believes that everyone, including disabled people, should have the right to access the increasing number of green spaces which are being proposed all over the city, including within many local board areas.

It is important that the voices of the disabled community are heard when planning these projects as it can make all the difference for walkways, trails and other green spaces to be fully accessible and inclusive, including for disabled people.

DPA asks that all local boards be required to involve disabled people and disability organisations in planning for any new green spaces within local board areas.

**Recommendation 11:** that local boards be required to involve disabled people and disability organisations in the planning of new green spaces in their board areas.

# 5.) Communities that provide economic and social opportunities

All local boards should champion, support and facilitate economic and social opportunities for all communities, including disabled people.

Earlier in the submission we pointed out the lower socioeconomic status of most of the disabled community. While disabled people live in all areas of Auckland and in all communities across the socioeconomic spectrum, there is a higher proportion of disabled people living in lower socioeconomic areas compared to higher socioeconomic areas.

Nevertheless, all local boards in the dispensing of community grants should prioritise the needs of disabled people and community flax roots disability organisations. We would like to see local boards fund more community organisations and initiatives which are run both by and for disabled people on a self-determining basis.

**Recommendation 12:** that all local boards prioritise criteria for community grants to include funding the needs of disabled people and disability organisations, including those organisations and initiatives run by and for disabled people.

We would also like to see ongoing support given by local boards to initiatives which create employment and training opportunities, especially in the lowest income board areas, and that support be given to programmes and initiatives which are aimed at economically marginalised communities including disabled people, Māori, Pasifika, ethnic communities and rangatahi/youth, amongst others.

**Recommendation 13:** that local boards, especially in the lowest income wards, support employment and training opportunities aimed at economically marginalised communities, including disabled people.

Lastly, we ask that all local boards play a role in monitoring the impacts of the recent budget cuts imposed by Auckland Council.

We made an extensive submission to Auckland Council on their budget proposals earlier this year and we opposed all cuts to council services and activities. Our submission noted the impact of proposals like cuts to library services and community funding on the ability of disabled people to fully participate in the community.

DPA acknowledges that Council took some of the proposed cuts off the table, but others remain and are currently being implemented.

For this reason, DPA asks that local boards not only monitor the impacts of cuts on residents but also acts to collectively speak out about any impacts on communities.

**Recommendation 14:** that local boards continue to monitor the impact of cuts decided upon by Auckland Council and speak out on their impacts to communities to Council.



# FLB Submission - Background -

The Local Board Plan is most encouraging and especially with acknowledging the importance in addressing Climate Change, Environment, Iwi and the importance of Active Transport.

It is good that the Plan identifies where FLB has a role in advocacy only and with funding. We have included suggestions on how the Plan could be further enhanced against some of the following background.

From our hands on experience with enhancing biodiversity and building trails we make the following background comments.

Council own or control large areas of legal public access corridors that total for instance over 520km west of the Motorway in Franklin through to Waiuku. Over half of these corridors in rural areas are not open for public access, are weedy and pesty with little maintenance. This is contradictory to AC and FLB plans.

Getting approval and an approved plan for low cost, low impact, community trail builds is a very difficult process. There are high costs, unintended barriers and an unwillingness for the community to sponsor. However, when these hurdles are overcome at the Trail build stage much can be achieved provided there are not extremely expensive Resource Management plan approvals required. For instance we and Waiuku Trails have shown that Trail builds with a smooth rolling surface can be achieved at a cost to AC of \$20 - \$200/m. As against the average AT trail build cost of \$8,000/m. Christchurch \$3,000/m and Wellington \$1500/m. In our experience funds for the trail build can welcome significant community and other Government agency contributions. For instance with our \$10,000 Green Trails build funding from AC we ended up with over \$55,000 of 'other' committed funding. Franklin is a wealthy area. Another example is that in Wellington Rod Drury and his family via a Trust have provided \$1,000,000 to enhance existing Trails.

Franklin, despite have 23% of Auckland's area and low population density, underperforms for being active and is well below the AC Sport and Rec key performance indicators.

Until now planning and providing for Active Transport in Franklin has been largely dysfunctional with AT and AC not working together to plan Active Transport and to unlock the potential of the large areas of legal public access corridors. AT have a singular focus on commuting and this ends up being largely focused on high density urban areas with priority setting.

Technology for Active Transport has changed dramatically and continues to do so. Electric Bikes for instance have considerably raised Active journey distance potential. 30% of Aucklanders own a bike. 50% can ride a bike. Almost all can walk and almost all can ride a mobility scooter. Active Transport has by far the least carbon footprint of all transport options. In 2021 according to NZCT statistics, 27% of all adults in NZ over the age of 18 participated in at least one of the Great Rides of NZ. Great rides brought in over \$1Billion of revenue to local communities. Great rides have annually over 1 million participants almost all of whom were Kiwis. The Great Walks of NZ have an annual participation of 100,000 of

which approximately half are overseas tourists. Interestingly around half of the people using Great Ride Trails are walkers/trampers. The longer rides create a framework from which shorter circuits closer to communities can be integrated into.

Active Transport for commuting, especially by bike, requires in the first instance people to be able to recreate, have fun and develop skills in a safe environment close to their home. It makes sense to create these circuits in all or most parks where people can access easily from their own home. At the same time plant trees to minimise Trail maintenance, provide carbon storage, enhance biodiversity, provide community well being etc.

Across urban Auckland it is proven time and time again that retrospective planning and delivery is very expensive. As exampled by AT cycleway cost of \$8,000/m. It makes sense to have a Trails plan in place across all of Franklin connecting all communities etc. This is primarily using existing legal access options. It can provide a starting point for community and Iwi engagement as is being used by Waikato District Council with their intramaps Trails plan. It is low cost. It can help guide development rather than piecemeal unconnected developments dictating Trail routes. In our experience if it had not been for our lucky intervention 3 trail opportunities would have already been lost with various developments.

In Franklin with the growing population all roads are getting busier. People are feeling less safe using Active Transport even when on quieter roads. Car users are increasingly looking for lower traffic back routes off very busy main routes. The differing speed restrictions should be used in more roads to try and keep cars and trucks on main roads in our opinion.

Pg 6 Carrying out our plan point 2 – Add .... 'And legal access public corridors'

Pg 11 Bottom of page add draft FLB initiative of 'Advocate and support Iwi for low impact Trail access onto existing legal public access corridors that are currently blocked from public access'. (purpose – environmental restoration, access to historic sites, opportunity to bring to life history, kaitiakitanga,, access to historic Pa sites, midens, rua etc.

Pg 14 3<sup>rd</sup> para after 2<sup>nd</sup> sentence add. Technology is rapidly expanding the range of micromobility transport options and the distance that can comfortably be travelled by these modes such as E bikes E scooters and E mobility scooters

Pg 14 4<sup>th</sup> para after 2<sup>nd</sup> sentence add. Traditionally we have prioritised planning and build investment in roads for cars and trucks. There has been little Regional planning for Active Transport links between communities.

Pg 14 bottom add 5<sup>th</sup> point: Includes mapping a Trails plan to connect all communities in Franklin and to connect south to the Waikato using primarily existing legal public access options. (This will provide 'safer' existing Active Transport options and increase engagement with community and lwi. It will help guide development so that Developments can add value and not shut down potential options).

Pg 15 under initiatives end of 2<sup>nd</sup> line /Trails. The use of the word Path denotes concrete and urban rather than also incorporating rural links. In the first table include a 4<sup>th</sup> point that develops low impact, low cost circuit trails in most parks and reserves so people can safely have fun and develop skills needed for participation in Active commuting.

Pg 15 in the first table add a new initiative section. Advocate and support mapping and signing of 'safer' trails and paths both in urban and rural areas. (Build on the success of the likes of the initiation of the Pukekohe 5 Summits Trail. It has been a community engager and has acted as a seed for further initiatives.

Pg 15 last initiative – just add and ground cover species in existing public spaces. (currently across Auckland 70% of all public park and reserve space is mown. There is increasing pressure for trees on private land with urban intensification. Public spaces need to lift their game.

# Pg 22 Our Draft Plan

Objective Support the young and unborn future generations

**Key Initiative** Trial advertising a volunteer position on the Franklin Local Board who just has the purpose of representing the young and unborn children of our future. This approach is gaining traction overseas around Climate Change where current decision making have impacts well beyond the 3 year election cycle.

#### Pg 23 Advocacy Add 2 more points:

- Support Schools being involved in 'doing' low impact climate change mitigation projects such as trail building, tree planting, weed and pest control and cultural story telling
- Support youth being more active via micromobility. Currently people in Franklin underperforming according to AC Sport & Rec with being one of the least active areas despite access to a lot of open spaces and much lower population pressures.

Pg 24 Para 4 strat of 3<sup>rd</sup> sentence, Replace Most with Some. Most people in Franklin live in urban areas. Should also add to all the negative barriers the fact that Technology is developing rapidly to provide an increasing number of solutions for participation in carbon friendly Active Transport and micromobility.

Pg 25 bottom of first paragraph end of 2<sup>nd</sup> to last sentence. Delete 'partnership from Auckland Transport' and replace with investment and participation from Regional and National funding agencies, community and Iwi. Franklin is one of the more wealthy Regions of NZ. In our experience the community is very willing to invest in Trail build. In Wellington the Drury family donated \$1M to enhance existing trails. There are large National funds available but to be ahead of the competition it would need a very committed and proactive Local Board.

Pg 25 para 3, before last sentence. First we will have a Frankin wide Green Trails plan connecting all communities primarily using existing legal public access corridors. (It is crazy to rely on random developments to deliver cohesive Active Transport routes across Franklin. It is crazy to not consider how to maximise the opportunity with existing Council controlled corridor spaces).

## Pg 25 add point 6

High Resource consent costs whether a proposed trail development is low impact
with almost all win / win or high impact with significant compromises. The initial
consent process acts as a very real barrier to Community engagement for low impact
Sage 1 type developments.

### Pg 25 Opportunities – add:

- Many existing underutilised legal public access corridors not delivering optimal outcomes. No alignment with AC and AT Long Term Plans
- Use a low impact, low cost approach with minimal land disturbance in line with lwi and Climate Change ideal outcomes
- Advocate and support adoption of land from private landowners for enduring access
  Walking Access Easements with AC as the Controlling Authority. (This allows more
  solutions for low impact trails and avoiding RMA pinch points where we already have
  success examples such as Belmot Rise and Taihiki Estuary).

We have much to offer with stunning scenery with estuaries, coastline, native bush and volcanos. Combined with space and a varied food supply hub for Auckland. Outdoor recreation is a growing business and local tourism is a climate change friendly business model.

#### Pg 36 Challenges - add

• No plans for recreational trails that connect with public transport hubs, connect with the rest of Auckland and connect with the Waikato – apart from Hunua Traverse.

#### Pg 36 Opportunities - add

• Local climate change friendly, recreational tourism given our proximity to Auckland and a gateway to exploring the rest of New Zealand. Includes active and water based transport

Pg 37 Table 1, first key initiative section add: Support Maori with adding story telling opportunities to help celebrate and embrace our rich cultural history.

Pg 39 At another objective and key initiative. This is to include something that links with the targeted rate for Trails.

#### **Submission of Civic Trust Auckland**

#### **Draft Local Board Plans - all**

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#### Introduction

Civic Trust Auckland (CTA) is a non-profit public interest group, incorporated in 1968, with activities and interests throughout the greater Auckland region

The aims of the Trust include:

- · Protection of natural landforms
- Preservation of heritage, in all its aspects
- Encouragement of good planning, for the city and region.

We are on Council's list of regional stakeholders and we have previously provided submissions on Local Board plans, as well as on many other Auckland Council plans. Some matters that we have advocated for are now in place, such as smoke-free parks and public open spaces, more resource recovery centres and public education about waste reduction, especially as regards plastic bag use, and Local Boards holding their monthly meetings at varying times.

Other matters are partly in place but we feel the need to submit on them again, including improved public transport: bus, rail and ferry services, better provision for walking and cycling, involving the community more in decision making as well as supporting them as volunteers and improved Local Board engagement with the community, perhaps through a regular clinic at varying times of the day.

CTA has a particular focus on the Environment and Climate Action parts of the Local Board plans.

CTA greatly appreciates the work of Local Boards, and recognises that they know their local communities and are focused on the needs of those particular communities, as well as responding to Auckland Council plans. We are aware of the reduced amount of funding Local Boards have been allocated. We support in general the initiatives in the draft plans. We have highlighted some areas of particular support and particular concern, first making some general points about all Local Board plans as well as particular points for a number of Local Boards, in alphabetical order according to the names of those Local Boards. When quoting from Local Board plans, we use *italics*.

#### **All Local Boards**

#### **Climate Action**

All the plans address climate action and emissions reduction. We support all Local Boards in the importance they have placed on climate action and commend those that have their own Climate Action Plan, especially those that put them in place even before Auckland Council formulated its Climate Action Plan, such as Puketāpapa. As stated in the Upper Harbour Draft Local Board Plan: "We recognize that climate change is a complex issue that will require collaborative effort from all of us" (page 10). The Kaipātiki Local Board articulates that "Climate impact is a key consideration for all decisions made."

The plans address similar concerns:

- lack of knowledge about how to live low carbon lives
- community preparedness for impacts of climate change
- additional barriers for migrant and ethnic communities
- lack of access to reliable public transport
- road safety concerns, particularly in rural areas
- coastline erosion, sea level rise and flooding
- low tree canopy cover and lack of greenspace to match the rate of urban development and intensification vegetation, soil and biodiversity loss (urban development, transport, pollution)

We support climate actions across the Local Boards such as

- establishing / supporting EcoNeighbourhoods
- implementing local Urban Ngahere (Forest) Action Plans
- implementing Shoreline Adaptation Plans, especially in collaboration with a neighbouring Local Board
- local waste minimisation, resource recovery initiatives and public education about waste reduction.
- the planting of more trees by Local Boards and support for the community to plant trees
- ensuring Local Board assets will be resilient to the impacts of climate change or severe weather, and reinstating any assets lost or damaged as a result of storm events
- implementing low carbon practices when upgrading or developing Local Board assets
- developing community-led emergency preparedness plans and
- working alongside the community in response to flood events

Furthermore, we support those Local Boards such as Aotea-Great-Barrier that have their own local Emergency Response Team to lead emergency preparedness, response and recovery, and those advocating, as the Devonport-Takapuna Local Board articulates: "Advocate to and work with Auckland Emergency Management and wider council departments to support community networks and connections that help people to fare better and respond to emergencies and the impacts of climate change" (page 16).

We are hopeful that communities know about their local Climate Action Plan or are able to find it online or elsewhere.

#### Māori Outcomes

As stated in all the Local Board plans, "Māori identity and culture are Auckland's unique point of difference in the world." CTA endorses all the plans listing strong Māori initiatives that build whānau wellbeing and strengthen resilience, such as practicing te ao Māori guardianship (kaitiakitanga) principles led by mana whenua and incorporating mana whenua identity and culture into the design of developments. We support dual naming of parks and other sites to reflect Māori heritage.

We note that the Manurewa Local Board has the highest proportion and highest number of Māori residents across all the Local Boards and that, appropriately, they include in their plan a particularly strong and high number of listed Māori outcomes, including for Māori youth.

#### **Places**

All Local Board Plans have included the following in their draft plans under Local Planning and Development:

"We support local town centres and communities to thrive by developing town centre plans and development, supporting Business Improvement Districts (BIDs), heritage plans and initiatives."

Local boards, sometimes with input from local heritage organisations, arguably have the best understanding of their local heritage and therefore have an important role in its identification, protection and enhancement. We strongly support local boards identifying and assessing the heritage items and places in their area, making use of local knowledge and skills to do so, and consulting with stakeholders in working to preserve and enhance their built and natural heritage.

We observe that the Waitematā Local Board lists particular heritage buildings in its draft plan, and it seems that only two other Local Board do so (Orakei Local Board – Remuera Library, Waitākere Ranges – Waikumete Cemetery, the rail station house and Playhouse Theatre). We know that communities value their heritage buildings and we know that many of them remain unidentified and unprotected, so we encourage Local Boards to include the identification, protection, enhancement and restoration of built heritage as key initiatives in their plans.

CTA supports local boards to advocate and provide for local board input for improved outcomes for heritage in Council planning documents for the region's collective heritage.

CTA supports the creation and maintaining of a regional cultural heritage database to provide information to landowners, resource consent applicants and other interest groups. We encourage Council and community groups sharing collective information for the purposes of heritage identification.

CTA encourages all Local Boards to investigate incentives for enhancing low quality designs and to encourage any design solutions that might assist in this. We support Local Boards advocating to the Governing Body for the creation of the position of City Architect.

We support Local Boards reviewing their community-leased buildings, approach and fees to make best strategic use of those spaces.

We support the intention of the Local Boards which are looking at partnership opportunities with local schools, churches, and other organisations to make their spaces available for community use and to ensure programmes and initiatives are coordinated to fill any gaps and to avoid duplication. Schools in particular are a valuable resource for all communities, both their facilities and their populations.

We support the Local Boards working with Kāinga Ora to help provide park and community facility assets, as well as integrate their housing developments with the character of the area, ensure that developments are well planned and that the transport and other infrastructure works well

#### **Environment**

Many of the Local Boards in their plans recognise and celebrate their environmental volunteers who have restored, protected and cleaned up areas over many years and continue to do so. This includes community-led pest control and biodiversity projects. The support of Local Boards for such work is important.

Also important are the actions of those community groups which work to identify and protect built heritage, which is recognised by the Ōrākei Local Board in its intention to work with the Remuera Heritage Society (amongst others) to preserve heritage character in the area (page 25).

Local Board support, including funding initiatives such as planting, pest control, stream and water quality enhancements, and waste minimisation projects is important for healthy ecosystems and sustainability.

Some Local Boards contain Special Ecological Areas within them and we support their work in this regard.

CTA supports the daylighting of streams to divert them from pipes back to the surface, as the Manurewa Local Board and others are planning to do, including Waitematā Local Board with the Waipapa Stream.

We support the use of electric vehicles and the installation of charging stations.

All Local Boards recognise the importance of parks and open spaces in their area and we support those that plan to acquire open space where possible, such as through large-scale developments, and to improve existing parks space through land exchanges, reconfiguration and improving linkages and connections.

We support management plan for local parks, reserves and other open spaces. However, care may need to be taken so that an omnibus management plan does not mean that unique aspects of certain spaces are not protected. Some spaces may need their own separate management plan.

We support more tree planting throughout the city, and, in general, oppose the removal of already planted trees. This includes the removal of exotic trees from the maunga that are demonstrably valued by the people of Auckland. We submit that trees already planted be allowed to live out their natural lives and that any succession planting, where appropriate, should focus on natives.

We suggest that small local projects involving the community, particularly new migrants and/or those for whom language is a barrier, could be to beautify/make use of small areas, including on land which is awaiting development, for planting or for art installations.

## **Transport**

As mentioned in the Devonport-Takapuna Draft Local Board Plan (page 25), "Local Boards have an advocacy role when it comes to many transport projects." All the plans address transport issues, particularly public transport, and they advocate for efficient, affordable and convenient public transport, which CTA has previously advocated for and supported.

CTA supports the Māngere-Ōtāhuhu and Otara-Papatoetoe Local Boards in advocating for free public transport. CTA has suggested in previous submissions that a trial of free transport be held. As pointed out by several Local Boards, transport in Auckland accounts for nearly half of the city's greenhouse gas emissions. Some Local Boards also mention car-dependency and congestion.

We also support safer speeds, especially around schools, traffic calming, road safety and pedestrian and cyclist priority, including cycleways and greenways to encourage healthy activity and less care use, as is advocated for by most, if not all, Local Boards. We caution that when considering implementation of the relevant infrastructure, including bicycle parking, there should be full consultation with affected people, primarily being the residents and/or businesses in the area under consideration. Streetscape character should not be compromised. We suggest that there is already sufficient infrastructure in place for bicycle parking, partly because some Local Board areas have already provided specific bicycle parking and partly because most cyclists like the ability to park very close to where they are going and are happy to use a pole, fence or tree to chain their bike to, and in our experience, this is workable for everyone (in contrast to e-scooter parking). We consider that the negative effect of placing any transport infrastructure in the public realm needs to be recognised and minimised.

CTA encourages Local Boards to support our advocacy to Auckland Council for a Public Transport champion. This could be a youth role and it could involve the telling of good stories about public transport. In our view, many more people would use public transport if they could see other people like themselves using it on a regular basis and get to know more about HOP cards (and the imminent introduction of the use of credit cards to pay for public transport), that public transport can accommodate the frail and disabled, and that there is, in fact, often a bus stop not too far from their house and/or place of work.

We support the Local Boards that are advocating for more bus shelters in their area. In our view, a shelter in addition to a seat at a bus stop is an essential part of the public transport infrastructure, for protection from both sun and rain. Future designs should consider the potential for the seat and the people waiting at the bus stop getting wet from driving rain, as is the case with some of the current shelters.

#### **Community Engagement with Local Boards**

The Devonport-Takapuna Draft Local Board Plan under "Challenges" states: "Low levels of participation and understanding of what local boards do, which weakens local democracy and decision making" (page 14) and also under "Challenges" the Franklin Local Board includes: "Limitations to understanding the board's role and mandate, and its influence in regional and national decision-making" (page 21). The Māngere-Ōtāhuhu Local Board will advocate for "Auckland Council to communicate in a way that is accessible to all our community leading to a better-informed community and improved engagement with the council" (page 15).

In our view, engagement with the community is an issue for all Local Boards, as well as the wider Council. We have observed that many members of the community still do not know much (if anything) about local boards, and a very small percentage of them actually engage with their local board. Furthermore, some people find it difficult, for various reasons, to approach their local board and/or to be listened to. We commend those Local Boards which have made their members available through regular open meetings to members of the public, especially those that are at varying times of the day to cater for the availability of different members of the community. We suggest that time could usefully be made available within Local Board workshops for members of the community dealing with certain issues to engage more thoroughly with board members and staff than is possible in public forum appearances at local board business meetings.

The Local Board plans outline what Local Boards do, who the members are and where they are based, so if people in their area read the plans, they would have a better awareness about Local Boards. If all libraries held copies of the relevant Local Board plans in their final version, this would assist in more people becoming more aware of Local Boards.

We suggest that Local Boards share with other Local Boards what has worked in terms of public engagement for them. An idea from a member of the Puketāpapa community is that Local Board members hold their clinics or engagement (where practical) "on the street," which could mean in a park or square which is used well by the public. We note that when Local Board candidates are campaigning for election, they tend to go to where the people are, and we suggest that this could be part of the answer, rather than expecting the people to come to where they are. We know that many people do not know where their Local Board office is. If practicable, Local Board members could now and again set up tables, chairs and coffee on the footpath outside their office.

We also note that a key initiative of the Devonport-Takapuna Local Board is: "Community conversations – enabling communities we hear from less to engage more comfortably and on their terms" (page 15), so perhaps their ideas could be shared with other Local Boards. We also see that this Local Board will "Advocate for accessible and easy to use engagement methods that suit our residents for both local and regional consultations" (page 16).

We encourage local board members (and future candidates) to retreat from political affiliations. In our experience, alignment with a political group creates an impediment to good governance and working effectively for the community. Community groups tend to be apolitical and their members tend to work well together. The political affiliations of Local Board members can act as a barrier to community engagement – as well as a barrier for members to engage with and cooperate with each other.

#### Albert-Eden

We support the Carrington residential development and the way it has developed, including working with the iwi involved, and we also support the bid by the Pt Chev Social Enterprise Trust for there to be a community wellbeing hub incorporated into Building One on this site. We are disappointed that one wing of this building is to be demolished, due to the roading design.

We strongly support the Local Board's key initiative to: "Provide feedback on resource consents and planning processes to ensure good design outcomes are achieved and significant views of the maunga (volcanic cones) are protected through the volcanic viewshafts and height sensitive areas in the Auckland Unitary Plan" (page 12).

CTA strongly supports the establishment of the Waiōrea Community Recycling Centre (opened on 11 August), which seems to be a shared facility between the Albert-Eden and Waitematā Local Board areas, and supports the promotion by these two Local Boards of the facility. We suggest that libraries in all Local Board areas could be a place for dropping off small items such as used batteries (battery collection being something that has taken place in Wellington libraries for some years).

CTA supports this Local Board including as one of the objectives of its plan: "The history, identity and character of our neighborhoods are celebrated" and that a key initiative is: "Protect and celebrate our historic heritage by being good stewards of the assets we own and supporting others to care for theirs" (page 29). Supporting others could be seen as both support for the people in their Local Board area as regards historic heritage that is privately owned, and supporting other Local Boards to care for historic heritage that are their assets, as well as other Local Boards supporting the protection of other historic heritage sites.

We support the Albert-Eden Local Board for the following (page 31):

"Renewal funding for seismic upgrades for heritage assets

- Support the Tūpuna Maunga Authority in their aspiration to have the maunga recognised as UNESCO World Heritage site
- The Auckland Unitary Plan reflects the importance of built and natural heritage and the contribution that heritage makes to the identity, history and story of Tāmaki Makaurau and its people".

We endorse this Local Board's plan to carry out an audit of the parks in their area to identify where they can get better use, to activate them more and to see if there is the right mix of uses for the future.

A photo of Rocket Park in Mount Albert is featured in the Albert-Eden Draft Local Board Plan. This park no longer functions as it was intended. It was originally a park where children with disabilities could use special equipment such as a Liberty Swing for wheelchairs. We understand that the swing is no longer there, and we submit that it be reinstated, along with the other original equipment for this special park.

We support the Local Board's intention to "Encourage green business practices and share information on existing resources such as Sustainable Business Network and Climate Connect Aotearoa" (page 35).

#### Aotea-Great-Barrier

This Local Board's plan states that "Our community is also incredibly conscious of remote living and the carbon impacts of freighting supplies to the island" (page 11). The island is very different from the mostly urban areas of Auckland and has some different issues to deal with, which perhaps the rest of the city does not recognise.

CTA supports this Local Board's intention to "advocate to the Governing Body for continued staff support to investigate a visitor levy to respond to the impacts of tourism" (page 14), like the levy that has been introduced to Rakiura / Stewart Island.

The Aotea-Great-Barrier Local Board has been progressing solar power upgrades of council and community buildings and electric chargers, as have several other Local Boards, and we encourage more area to do this, and for Local Boards to learn from each other in this regard.

Another aspect that perhaps other areas could learn from is the island's "bespoke approach to education through our Lifelong Learning Strategy, especially for our tamariki and rangatahi with a new early childhood education centre and established Aotea Learning Hub" (page 13).

We congratulate the island on being designated as an International Dark Sky Sanctuary.

An aspect of the island that needs recognition by Auckland Council is that "Climate change has led to warmer waters and the arrival of exotic marine pests such as Caulerpa, Asian Paddle Crab, Sea Squirt and Mediterranean Fan worm" (page 16). We support the Local Board's call for tighter protections for their coastal waters.

We congratulate this Local Board on its innovative low carbon initiatives, such as Anamata's Resource Recovery Centre and AoteaOra Trust's Off the Grid events (page 16) and agree that these should be showcased globally and there should be trials of new sustainable systems. The landfill on the island has closed, which presents a different situation than all other Auckland communities.

We support this Local Board in advocating to central government and the Governing Body to encourage manufacturers to commit to product sustainability (page 17) and encourage other Local Boards to do the same.

We also support this Local Board to:

- "Advocate to central government and the Governing Body to abolish bottom trawling and dredging in the Hauraki Gulf and to encourage sustainable fishing as directed through Sea Change - Tai Timu Tai Pari
- Advocate to central government and the Governing Body for the prohibition of marine dumping" (page 17).

Aotea-Great-Barrier does not have any public transport and we support the Local Board's key initiative to "Investigate a community-led public transport system" (page 19).

We also support them to advocate to technology providers for stronger connectivity options (page 20).

## **Devonport-Takapuna**

We support collaboration between Local Boards on many matters and so are pleased to see that this Local Board is collaborating with the Kaipātiki Local Board "on the reduction of litter, sediment, and industry pollutants to improve the water quality of streams and ponds in the catchment of the Wairau Estuary" (page 11).

This Local Board (and many others) is supportive of the work of environmental groups and environmental education. Amongst other environmental initiatives, we support their aim to "Prioritise funding and support zero waste initiatives that promote a circular economy" and the "focus on native and ecologically appropriate planting and the principle of having the right tree in the right place" (page 12). Regarding the trees, we would caution that the wrong tree in the wrong place (in any Local Board area) does not necessarily get removed but that it is allowed to live out its natural life, or there is consideration given to transplanting the tree. We understand that there is modern machinery that enables the transplanting of large trees. Perhaps Local Boards, including this one, could advocate to the Governing Body and/or central government for investment in one of these machines.

We see that this Local Board's intention of "Working with our neighbouring local boards on joint environmental initiatives to increase the impacts" (page 18) is something that all Local Boards could do – and we know that many of them are.

We are pleased to see amongst the objectives in this Local Board's draft plan: "Natural and built heritage are conserved and both colonial and Māori history and significant places are valued, promoted, and celebrated" (page 19).

We support this Local Board to "Advocate to the Governing Body for additional funding to renew our heritage asset portfolio and enable greater protection for our heritage assets" (page 20).

We also support this initiative (and other similar ones of other Local Boards): "Utilisation of regional funding to retrofit assets and upgrade them with solar energy saving measures" (page 22).

On page 25 it is stated that there is: "Limited capacity for bikes on ferries, zero capacity for bikes on buses, and the absence of infrastructure for active travel modes on the harbour bridge is a constraint on reductions to transport emissions." We note that there is not quite zero capacity for bikes on buses, as fold-up bikes can be taken on buses: "For safety of the passengers on board of buses only compact folding bikes and scooters are permitted on board, and must be folded down before boarding (at.govt.nz)."

We would encourage the Devonport-Takapuna Local Board to advocate for bike racks on buses that go across the Auckland Harbour Bridge.

#### Franklin

We support this Local Board's initiative to "Identify opportunities to reduce Franklin's mowing footprint by replacing lawn with trees" (page 15) and the other Local Boards that have this same initiative.

We support their advocacy for "Provision of fit for purpose public transport services that enable underserved communities to access Auckland's public and active transport networks and community service hubs, e.g. through 'AT Local' services or new bus routes" (page 19).

Franklin, being a rural community, includes in its draft plan, which does need to be recognised by other areas: "Auckland climate action is focussed on reducing carbon largely by reducing the use of private vehicles but does not constructively support rural residents and farmers in taking action, such as emission reduction" (page 25).

We support this key initiative: "Advocate for investment from Auckland Transport and central government in local initiatives that encourage and incentivise modal shift (from private vehicles to active or public transport) or shorten the commute for those reliant on private vehicles (by improving access to public transport)" (page 26).

We support the following (pages 26 & 33):

- "Require all public space projects in urban/future urban areas to actively contribute to increases in tree canopy cover and more green infrastructure."
- "Advocate for a change of policy and process so that new developments deliver 'urban lungs' i.e. areas to be planted with semimature trees to improve air quality, to lower surface temperatures and to absorb and filter rainfall."
- "Increased ferry capacity at Pine Harbour, Beachlands, to address local population growth, acknowledge east Auckland congestion issues and offer off-road commuter options."

#### Henderson-Massey

We support this Local Board in the following:

- "Working with Waitākere Ranges and Whau local boards to take a 'west Auckland' approach to strengthen our capacity" (page 14)
- "Continue to prioritise parks and play spaces that are inclusive, accessible to all, and support whānau-focused gatherings and activities" (page 20)
- "Progress opportunities for neighbourhood path connections, guided by the Connections Plan
- Prioritise transport projects that improve safety and health and contribute to climate action and social outcomes"
- Support initiatives that help remove barriers to cycling e.g. access to a safe affordable bike and learn to ride programmes" (page 22).

## **Hibiscus and Bays**

On page 12 of this Local Board's plan, their Climate Plan actions are well detailed.

CTA supports this key initiative: "Take a more proactive approach to ensuring that the different voices in our community are heard to inform our local board decision-making" (page 16).

We particularly like the way this Local Board has articulated its appreciation for local volunteers: "Our committed and skilled environmental groups we support have long established histories and have been award winners for their professionalism and work" (page 19).

This challenge is one that other Local Boards may also face: "There is increasing demand for council services to be available online, and 24/7 whilst recognising that at other times residents are more comfortable with a face-to-face service provision, all within budget constraints, which will require better integration of locally delivered services with regionally provided online services" (page 22.)

We are pleased to see this opportunity expressed: "The rapid increase in residents working from home reduces congestion and adds value to the local economy by keeping commuter spending local" (page 25).

CTA supports the following: "Advocate to Auckland Transport to better accommodate the integration of public transport vehicles, major bus stop and park and rides, with micro mobility and bicycles, to enable people to use these modes to connect with their public transport journey" (page 26).

We would encourage this Local Board to also advocate to Auckland Transport for bike racks on buses.

#### **Howick**

This Local Board has a strong focus on youth, as do many of the others.

We note the following key initiative: "Support the Tūpuna Maunga Authority to protect and enhance Ōhuiarangi / Pigeon Mountain" (page 20). We do support protecting the maunga but we do not support the removal of trees from any of the maunga in Auckland. It is our position that particular trees that are not wanted on the maunga should live out their natural lives and that replacement planting of other species can be planned for.

We support this Local Board in its intention to advocate to local schools to "make sustainability, environmental responsibility and waste management part of school values" (page 20). These values, across Auckland schools should, through school students, extend into the community and become embedded in future generations.

We support this key Initiative (which is shared by other Local Boards): "Promote healthy living and sustainable lifestyles by supporting community-led initiatives, such as vegetable gardens, and by encouraging and educating the wider community of the benefits of growing your own food" (page 22).

We support this special initiative and are of the view that it would have region-wide use: "Establish a sensory playspace that contains areas and equipment that provides stimulation of the senses for children with visual impairment or developmental disorder" (page 22).

CTA supports this advocacy to Auckland Transport, which could be replicated in other Local Board areas, where appropriate, for:

- "feeder bus services or other innovative on demand services that will enable the community to access the existing bus / ferry networks
- more bus services to serve all areas of the local board
- provision of more ferry and train services" (page 26).

The following is important for all Local Boards: "Advocate to the Governing Body to: ensure adequate infrastructure is in place before approving housing intensification" (page 26).

We support the following key initiative: "Continue to provide operational funding support for the Howick Historic Village" (page 28).

We support the protection of historic landscapes and in this regard, support efforts to protect in the Unitary Plan the views from Stockade Hill.

## Kaipātiki

As with other Local Boards, this one is looking at solar energy, and we support their particular initiatives to: "Investigate installing solar on facilities with significant solar potential, including: Birkenhead Pool and Leisure Centre, Kaipātiki Local Board Office, Glenfield Pool and Leisure Centre" (page 14).

We feel that the following key initiative could be adopted by all Local Boards: "Seek feedback from our student and children's panels to inform our decisions with a child-lens" (page 17).

CTA supports the Kaipātiki Local Board's advocacy to the Governing Body:

- "to protect and celebrate our built and cultural heritage" (page 18), and
- "for the ability for local boards to have direct decision-making authority to make temporary changes to dog access rules to mitigate environmental or social problems, and request the opportunity to be included in the next round of dog access revision hearings Governing Body" (page 23).

We also support this Local Board advocating to central government:

- "to reinstate legislation that provides general tree protection" (page 23), and
- "for urban planning legislation to adequately protect special ecological areas Central Government" (page 23).

We see that the challenge expressed by this Local Board that "An increased number of schools are restricting public access to their grounds outside of school hours which is impacting informal community recreation opportunities" (page 25) could provide the opportunity to talk to other Local Board about this problem and possible solutions.

We support the following key initiatives, which could be the same for all Local Boards:

- "Consider climate impact when developing places and spaces, to reduce or avoid emissions and adapt to climate change, including avoiding areas or activities that are vulnerable to climate risks such as drought, extreme rainfall, coastal flooding, and heat
- Prioritise investment in assets that are well positioned, multi-purpose, and with good transport links, to reduce its carbon footprint" (page 27).

We also consider that all Local Boards would similarly advocate for and support the following:

- "the development of a quality compact, urban form that supports low carbon, resilient development, while ensuring adequate infrastructure to support it
- the uptake of sustainable design and construction that will be resilient to the impacts of climate change, including council projects, and encourage residents and businesses to use eco-design and water sensitive design practices" (page 28).

We think that all Local Boards would want this for their area: "Advocate for increased resource for compliance enforcement teams so they can respond to all requests and complaints received in the Kaipātiki area" (page 28).

We support cheaper fares, more frequent ferries, and more buses going to more destinations, more directly (page 29). We view the harbour as an underutilised resource which does not need the sort of maintenance that roads and rail do. We also support electric buses and ferries for Kaipātiki (page 32).

This matter seems to need to become more widely known within Auckland Council: "Advocate for policy and funding changes to reduce the use of the 'chip seal' road resealing method on suburban roads" (page 32).

We find it useful to have this pointed out: "Increase in working from home means more of our people are based locally during working hours which can help ease congestions at peak times, enable access to skilled work without the need to travel as frequently, and help increase spending in our town centres" (page 35).

## Māngere-Ōtāhuhu

This Local Board sees as an opportunity, which we think other Local Boards could embrace as well: "Identify areas where community groups are better placed to deliver services and projects that are currently delivered by council" (page 14).

CTA supports the **Mangere-Otahuhu** Local Board to:

- "Revive the Māngere Gateway Heritage plan to enhance Stonefields and promote and regain heritage values (page 17).
- Partner with mana whenua to protect significant historical sites and waterways that host an abundance of native plants and animals
- Work with Kāinga Ora to encourage tree planting in their housing developments" (page 18).

CTA supports the entire advocacy list of this Local Board, on page 18 of their draft plan, which focuses on protecting and enhancing their natural environment, including active management of high-value biodiversity features in their area, and achieving zero waste and zero dumping.

## Manurewa

The Manurewa Local Board highlights the lack of equitable funding for their area over the last 13 years, and we support them in their advocacy to the Governing Body to confirm its commitment to achieving funding equity for local boards, and to "Look at ways to achieve funding equity for the most underfunded boards in the shortest timeframe possible with a priority focus on Manurewa, then other southern local boards" (page 23).

As with some other Local Boards, the lack of decent public transport options is noted. We support their advocacy to increase the frequency, connectivity, and capacity of public transport

services in their area (page 15), and, as with all Local Boards, suggest that car pooling is another option that could be promoted and supported by them.

This Local Board (as with all others) intends to enhance the urban ngahere. They point out that "there is only so much that can be done on council-owned land." We support their call for legislative measures that "could include adding protection and enhancement of urban ngahere to environmental targets and making it easier for local authorities to protect trees on private land" (page 16).

We support this Local Board (and the others which have this initiative) in the installation of more solar panels across their community facilities in partnership with power companies. The Manurewa Local Board will encourage households to do this too (page 18), and other Local Boards could encourage the households in their areas to do likewise.

CTA supports this Local Board to "Advocate to Auckland Transport to increase the frequency and capacity of trains and buses to and from Manurewa and Clendon town centres, linking more of our communities to public transport hubs" (page 18).

We note the establishment of the Manurewa Community Recycling Centre at the Beautification Trust and their support of the pop-up Repair Cafes operating at the Trust and at Nathan Homestead. We support them to "continue to advocate for a southern resource recovery park as part of the Auckland Resource Recovery Network" (page 25).

We are pleased to note under Opportunities: "increase awareness of the notable tree schedule to protect more of our trees" and "using nature-based solutions for flood management" (page 26), and we support the key initiative to "Replace every tree removed from the streetscape due to damage, storms and accidents within one year" (page 27). This practical and clear action could be adopted by other Local Boards.

We also support the following: "Promote the integration of natural ecosystems into the existing built form, which may include the construction of raingardens, living roofs and swales, mass tree planting, remediation of existing or contaminated soils, rehabilitation of watercourses and wetlands, and opening up buried watercourses and restoring them to more natural conditions (stream daylighting)" (page 27).

## Maungakiekie-Tāmaki

We liked to see the use of different languages in this Local Board's draft plan in addition to English and te reo.

CTA supports the following advocacy to the Governing Body of the Maungakiekie-Tāmaki Local Board:

- "to ensure appropriate mechanisms are implemented to limit development where infrastructure cannot support increased pressure from planned growth" (page 21)
- "for appropriate staffing resources to enable quality advice for good decision-making, particularly planning, to utilise increased local board decision-making and ensure local services are cost effective and fit-for-purpose" (page 29)
- "to increase the regional demolition fund. To maximise the use of our open spaces and oversubscribed maintenance budgets, local boards can look to reduce underutilised and aged buildings on reserves. Regional support will help local boards to realise these strategic long-term opportunities" (page 29).

Regarding the last one, we caution that these buildings first need to be accessed, especially for heritage and community values.

#### Ōrākei

This Local Board's intention to use methods such as digital signage, e-newsletters and social media as a way to improve communication with the community could be considered by other Local Boards.

We support the idea to "Advocate to businesses and philanthropic organisations to seek funding partnerships for community services" (page 14), which perhaps other Local Boards could also adopt.

We are pleased to see the inclusion in the draft plan of "Delivering the Pourewa Valley Integrated Management Plan will support the restoration of this significant urban forest" (page 16).

We strongly support the following (the second of which is also advocated for by other Local Boards):

- "Continue funding for the Eastern Bays Songbird Project in their valuable work creating and maintaining a sanctuary for wildlife in the Eastern Bays area" (page 17)
- "Advocate for a sponge-city approach which promotes water-sensitive design and enables bluegreen networks to manage flooding" (page 18).

The Ōrākei Local Board states that "Seismic restoration of Remuera library is undertaken" (page 23) and we strongly support the restoration of what is not only a heritage building but a community asset.

The Ōrākei Local Board states in its draft plan that theirs is "an area rich in history. We can use our wonderful built heritage and local history to engender pride in our area and to help protect this valuable heritage" (page 25). We appreciate the Local Board's acknowledgement of their built heritage and also of the Remuera Heritage Society (page 25).

We support the Local Board advocating to the Tūpuna Maunga Authority to "protect the War Memorial Seat and daffodil commemorative garden, and for effective pest control on Ōhinerau / Mt Hobson" (page 27).

CTA also supports the Local Board advocating to the Governing Body, central government and developers "to ensure the unique character and heritage of our area is retained as development occurs" and we support the Local Board "monitoring and assessing proposed legislation that may increase intensification that may have an effect on our infrastructure and character" (page 27).

#### **Otara-Papatoetoe**

This Local Board articulates (as many other Local Boards do, and with which CTA agrees) that it should be the local people who decide what the priorities in their area are: "Your input on what we need to prioritise for the next three years will help us greatly with this challenge" (page 3).

Regarding the Local Boards intention to "Develop a multi-park management plan that manage the use, development and protection of all parks, reserves and open spaces in the area" (page 21) we would say that the different types and characters of parks need to be considered when developing such a plan or plans.

On page 3 it is stated that "Public transport hubs and facilities including Manukau Bus and Train Stations, Puhinui Station Interchange, and the Southern Line train provide opportunities for connectivity and public transport use for both residents and visitors" and the Puhinui Station to attract visitors to the area is a key initiative. As CTA detailed in our submission on <a href="Auckland Council's Future Development Strategy">Auckland Council's Future Development Strategy</a>:

"This station is an important part of the city's infrastructure. As Puhinui Station connects to the wider public transport network, you can travel to and from Auckland Airport from anywhere in the city. The bus operates every 10 minutes from 4.30am to 12.40am, 7 days a week and there is a train from Puhinui Station to Britomart every 15 minutes. However, this AirportLink service is not clearly signposted at the airport and we understand that it is used very little. The facility to use public transport without needing a HOP card, as planned within the next 12 months, should help in this regard, but the AirportLink service needs more publicity. For example, the staff at the airport who monitor cars that arrive at the domestic terminal to pick up incoming passengers could hand drivers brochures that describe this service, so people can use it next time."

We would encourage this Local Board to advocate to AT to publicise this important part of the public transport network.

#### **Papakura**

We support this Local Board to: "Continue work on a heritage trail featuring sites of significance in Māori and European local history, acknowledging Ngāti Tamaoho's cultural indicators along the southern path overlooking the Manukau Harbour" (page 8) and we support their aim to highlight and celebrate the area's history and heritage.

We are pleased that the Manurewa Community Recycling centre is in place and that the Papakura Local Board describes the circular economy that will *"reduce costs and reduce carbon footprint"* (page 11).

We support this Local Board's advocacy in the following areas of public transport (pages 29 & 30):

- "Developing AT Local (on demand shared public transport service) in parts of Papakura Local Board area to increase public transport use.
- Great South Road –moving the cycle lane to an off-road shared pathway and converting the existing cycle and parking lanes into a combined T2 bus lane.
- Increased operating hours of southern train and public transport connections to airport and other employment nodes.
- Extending public transport routes to Ardmore and Bruce Pulman Park."

We also support the advocacy for "an increase in the standard street width requirement in new developments" and "developers /body corporates to cover ongoing maintenance of green space and enhanced tree canopy in new developments" (page 30).

#### Puketāpapa

We congratulate the Puketāpapa Local Board for developing their 'Becoming a Low Carbon Community' Action Plan action prior to Te Tāruke-ā-Tāwhiri: Auckland Climate Plan. We would like to see the "local climate champions" mentioned in this plan become more visible and for other Local Boards to adopt this idea.

We support the Local Board's aim to "Use existing community hubs, such as the library, to increase community understanding of climate change and promote local climate action initiatives" (page 16). Schools and libraries are an excellent resource for educating the wider public on climate change.

## Rodney

This Local Board states that its residents "often feel marginalised from Auckland Central and generally do not feel heard by decision makers" (page 14). We are not sure how the Local Board will address this, but making other Local Boards aware of it should help.

CTA supports the following advocacy by this Local Board to the Governing Body:

- "for Kawau Island to become pest free, with the support of the community, iwi, the Department of Conservation and stakeholders" (page 20)
- "for more investment in regional parks in our local board area and resourcing for service provision, such as with service centres, to meet the pressures of population growth and tourism" (page 24).

The draft plan states that "Our large geographical area and low population makes providing public transport difficult" (page 30). We suggest that with the good community connections described in the draft plan, where "people look out for each other and feel supported" (page 3) that carpooling would be a good option that could be promoted and supported.

CTA supports the following advocacy to Auckland Transport:

- "for the use of the existing rail network to be used for commuter transport to service the North West."
- "for further improvements and the expansion of Rodney bus services particularly in new development areas including park-and-rides, dedicated bus ways, additional routes and stops, weekend services on busier routes, higher frequency on busy routes and greater safety for bus drivers" (page 31).

## **Upper Harbour**

We support the Upper Harbour Local Board to "Advocate for accessible, multi-lingual, and easy-to-use engagement methods that enable our diverse residents to participate in both local and regional consultations and engagement processes" (page 14).

We appreciate that this Local Board has articulated (under Challenges): "Cost implications of restoration and conservation of our natural environment balanced against the cost of doing nothing" (page 16) and the huge risks that climate change poses to the environment and people, also the negative impacts of intensification and population growth. In our recent submission on Auckland Council's Future Development Strategy, we cautioned against too much growth too fast, and that it is preferable to stage intensification, and certainly not to do so in areas that were exposed to potential hazards.

We agree that "Reducing carbon emissions as individuals can be difficult" and that "Communities need support and opportunities to make changes and live more sustainably" (page 16). We are of the view that Local Boards are making positive differences as regards education about climate change and they can learn from each other's problems and initiatives, and support each other.

#### Waiheke

Waiheke is an island sanctuary in the Gulf, as articulated in this Local Board's draft plan on pg 3.

We commend this Local Board for adopting "even bolder climate goals through its Waiheke Local Climate Action Plan which includes the aim of achieving a net positive carbon footprint by 2040" (page 11). This could be a model for other Local Boards.

We recognise this key initiative as important: "Complete a feasibility study into the equity of year-round access to adequate potable water supply for Waiheke Island residents" (page 13).

We support this opportunity: "Waiheke becoming a predator free island" (page 16) and see the importance of public messaging and the work of predator-free groups.

We support the creation of wildlife corridors (including new and restored wetlands), kauri sanctuaries and seabird and shorebird breeding colonies across the islands, as well as stream restoration projects and academic and citizen science programmes to help understand and support the health of the aquatic environment (pp 16 - 17).

CTA strongly supports advocacy for "an end to bottom contact fishing such as dredging, bottom trawling and Danish seining" (page 18).

We also support advocacy to Auckland Transport for a designated Harbourmaster on Waiheke to be sufficiently empowered to address the increasing numbers of abandoned or derelict boats degrading the island's marine environment.

CTA also supports this Local Board's key initiative to "Implement the Waiheke Be Accessible Plan as resources become available to ensure facilities are accessible to all" (page 21).

#### Waitākere Ranges

The people of this Local Board area (as with others in the outer areas) often travel long distances to access work and education opportunities. We see that park and ride is an important way of connecting to public transport services (page 12) and that there is anticipation of the benefits that the City Rail Link will bring, as it will mean a 30-minute trip to get into the city.

We support this Local Board's advocacy in "Trialling a rural bus service to give our residents and visitors access to public transport" (page 29).

We support the Local Board also advocating for improved access to broadband and mobile phone services (page 12).

The Waitākere Ranges Heritage Area is a place of national significance which is appreciated by many throughout Auckland, for whom it is a favourite place to visit. There are at least 27 volunteer environmental groups active in the area, recognised in the draft plan. We support the Waitākere Ranges Local Board in its focus on protecting, restoring and enhancing this special area, including making the area a dark sky viewing location (page 15).

CTA supports this key initiative and would like to see it adopted by other Local Boards: "Ensure universal design for accessibility is embedded into all park development projects to enable everyone to access their local parks" (page 25).

We also strongly support the following: "Provide input into council plans, policies and project design, as well as the resource consent decisions relating to heritage" (page 29).

#### Waitematā

We support the Waitematā Local Board to "Promote Waiōrea Community Recycling Centre, local waste minimisation and resource recovery initiatives" (page 14), and we encourage this Local Board to do this in collaboration with the Albert-Eden Local Board.

We support this key initiative "Local composting and community gardens network" (page 14) and would like this Local Board to revisit the application of OMG (Organic Market Garden) to establish a community garden in the Bowen Ave part of Albert Park which has not yet gone ahead, having not received the support it needed.

Under "Our People," the statement "We celebrate our diversity and heritage and encourage equitable access to social, economic, environmental and cultural opportunities" is inspiring (page 16).

We appreciate the following being articulated in the plan: "We recognise the importance of treasuring and protecting our green spaces, heritage parks and trees" (page 27).

Under Opportunities: "Greater value for money through a partnership model which could leverage funding from other sources outside of Auckland Council" (page 18) is something that other Local Boards could also consider.

We are pleased to see that the problem of air pollution and pollution from shipping is noted (page 21). Pollution as such is not articulated in other Local Board plans. We are also concerned at the proliferation of visual clutter, particularly in terms of lighting, signage and some unnecessary street furniture.

We support the following and consider that other Local Boards could adopt the same: "Encourage, exemplify and promote the installation of 'living' green walls, rooftops, and assets in public buildings and private developments such as the Central City Library living roof, to improve air quality, green space, and biodiversity outcomes in urban environments" (page 24).

We support the following, and again, encourage other Local Boards to do the same: "Continue to reduce the use of agrichemicals in our parks and open spaces and advocate for agrichemical spraying to be phased out regionally" (page 24).

We strongly support this advocacy: "Auckland Council to advocate for changes to legislation and regulations to enable councils to introduce planning controls on how urban trees are assessed and protected. Auckland Council to simplify and better resource processes for identifying and protecting mature trees" (page 25).

We encourage the Local Board to consider, when developing concept plans (e.g., Basque Park, Heard Park, 254 Ponsonby Road and Wynyard Point) (page 27) not only the views of the local community and others who will access these spaces but also whether any "revitalisation" works planned are necessary. CTA has previously submitted that Heard Park does not need a makeover, and that the money be better spent elsewhere. Indeed, a couple of paragraphs down (on page 27) in the draft plan it is stated, "The cost of maintaining our assets and facilities is no longer affordable."

CTA strongly supports the key initiative to: "Deliver seismic strengthening, restoration and modernisation of Leys Institute Library and Gymnasium to preserve as a heritage taonga for future generations" (page 28).

Regarding the development of a Local Parks Management Plan (page 28), we caution that not all local parks are the same, and their diversity and special circumstances should be catered for.

We support this key initiative: "Acknowledge the importance of Te Hā (pōhutukawa) and the whenua that sustains it and investigate opportunities to increase the status and protection of Dove Myer Robinson Park including the possible inclusion in the heritage schedules of the Auckland Unitary Plan" (page 29).

Under "Our Places," the Local Board states: "The government's proposed legislative changes in resource management and urban development enable more intensive development in the city centre and around our neighbourhoods. This creates a challenge to ensure our neighbourhood character and heritage is conserved within our urban landscapes. We will support quality design in new developments that embraces existing heritage to create the heritage of the future" (page 32). CTA strongly endorses this statement, and also the following one: "We want to increase understanding, protection and conservation of city centre heritage places, landscapes and

stories. Our city centre should actively recognise and celebrate Auckland's historic heritage as a driver of positive change and placemaking" (page 33) and "Valued elements of heritage and special character in the local board area should be recognised formally and informally to assist with its protection and incorporation in the development of our urban landscapes" (page 34).

We support the following key initiatives (page 36):

"Provide feedback on resource consents and planning processes to ensure heritage sites and Special Character Areas are protected

- Ensure our heritage assets are restored such as Ewelme Cottage and Symonds Street Cemetery monuments
- Seek opportunities to promote and celebrate heritage places in Waitematā including making digital content and place-based stories more accessible
- Reflect Māori heritage and whakapapa in our public spaces and facilities incorporating Māori design principles and artwork."

We also support this Local Board's advocacy to the Governing Body as follows (page 37):

- Advocate to the Governing Body to allocate adequate funds to restore and preserve its heritage buildings, including incorporating seismic strengthening where necessary, to ensure their ongoing usage.
- Advocate to the Governing Body to allocate adequate funds to continue identification and formal protection of heritage and character elements of the Waitematā environment.
- Advocate to the Governing Body to retain the council's Heritage Acquisition Fund to assist
  with the protection and adaptive re-use of significant heritage buildings in the local board
  area.

CTA strongly supports the following initiatives (page 44):

• Support the preservation of significant heritage buildings such as Carlile House, the former Fitzroy Hotel and St James Theatre.

We also strongly support advocacy to central government for incentives to encourage the retention of heritage and character elements of the built environment (page 44).

CTA submits that an important addition to the draft plan is the recognition that significant parts of the landscape need protecting, particularly the Waitematā Harbour and volcanic cones, and other heritage landscapes.

## Whau

CTA supports this Local Board advocating to central government for "Legislation to protect a greater number of significant trees" (page 23), which other Local Boards have also included in their draft plans.

We also support their concern for sustainable building initiatives and practices (page 23).

We strongly support the key initiative to: "Ensure events and services are developed with accessibility considerations to support participation from residents with either physical or intellectual disabilities" (page 25) and to "Continue to prioritise and implement actions identified in the previous term to improve accessibility within key parks in the Whau, and do accessibility audits within additional parks" (page 26).

We support the advocacy to "Progress on the development of the Avondale-Southdown rail line to support freight movement Kiwi Rail Feedback on relevant policies and plans Central government Auckland Light Rail Group" (page 31).

We strongly support the following initiative: "Infrastructure and development that meets future growth, incorporates sustainable urban design principles, and is resilient to climate change, e.g. waste reduction, installation of stormwater retention tanks and permeable surfaces in housing developments" (page 31).

## **Draft Local Board Plans 2023 Feedback**

#### Who is Bike Auckland?

Bike Auckland is a non-profit organisation advocating for safer streets on behalf of everyone who rides a bike in our region - and everyone who would love to give it a go. But more than that: we believe that more people on bikes makes for a better city. Call it a virtuous cycle. Cleaner air, streets with birdsong, neighbours who know each other, elderly people staying active and healthy, children playing on quiet roads. Resilient, eco-friendly multi-modal communities which have long term sustainability. We can create this liveable city by investing in walking, cycling, and public transport. Investing now will save us more money in the future and that's the future we want to live in.

Our audience and members live and work in every local board area, all across the Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland region. This feedback is on their behalf.

## Our feedback

We know our members would like to see the following in their local board plans:

- Public transport and active transport modes given priority
- Accessibility for all kinds of disabilities
- Safe streets for kids to walk and cycle to school
- Vibrant town centres with well-designed, people-oriented public spaces
- Low traffic neighbourhoods

**Note:** People, Environment, Economy, Place, Community are all interlinked focuses and all can be benefited through more transport choice; allowing them to choose to walk, cycle, other micromobility, or use public transport.

**People:** Diversity includes people who are disabled or who experience mobility difficulties. 28% of Aucklanders do not have a license, and many more do not (or cannot) drive due to illness (seizures, fatigue, anxiety), vision impairments, medication, ADD, or age. These people need the choice to safely walk, cycle and take public transport to get around. Some people find that cycling is easier, and less painful for them than walking (especially if it's an E-bike), and cycling is often recommended by physios as a way to rehabilitate after illness or injury. Providing safe ways to get around by bike creates greater accessibility for this significant portion of our population, and for everyone when they are temporarily injured and are recuperating.

**Environment:** Cars create run off into our waterways. Giving people the safe option to walk and cycle more will lead to healthier waterways.

**Community**: When people walk and cycle for their transport they make more eye contact, say hello more, and generally become more connected with their surroundings. This leads to more connected communities, greater community cohesion, greater trust in neighbours, and less loneliness and isolation. This connectedness becomes powerful during times of emergency and can make stronger communities that support each other more and have greater resilience to bounce back from disasters. Bikes can also play crucial role as resilient and versatile transport modes during disasters, especially as they are small, and do not form traffic jams the way that cars do. More on this here.

## **Key initiatives**

## Safe speeds

<u>Safe speeds</u> on residential streets, town centres, and <u>around schools</u>. Permanent speed reductions to 30km/hr not only provide amazing safety outcomes, they are also our fastest and cheapest way of making a safe network for cycling. If our residential areas, schools, and town centres are 30km / hr it feels (and is!) much safer to walk and ride a bike, and many more people will begin to use these transport modes for their everyday local trips.

## Modal filters

Another cheap and fast improvement is use of modal filters in residential streets (such as planter boxes or bollards). Modal filters stop cars from cutting through but allow people using bikes, wheelchairs, and pushchairs to get through. Particularly for streets with a large amount of people driving through as a short-cut (rat running) modal filters can help to make the street safer, and quieter, and can also encourage locals to use their bikes and feet for short local trips.

## Protected Cycleways on main arterials

Arterial roads usually have higher traffic volumes, higher speeds, and more trucks and buses. Altogether this makes a formidable environment for riding a bike! They are also usually the most direct route to a destination! To give people greater transport choice, there needs to be protected spaces along our main arterials for people to cycle in. This can be done cheap and fast through the use of road reallocation and "pop up" materials like concrete tim tams or tall rubber. We know our members would like to see a network of safer streets sooner, and this means investing in infrastructure which is cheap and fast to roll out.

## Greenways

Include safe cycleways through parks, green spaces, and "<u>blue-green networks</u>". These provide safe spaces for children and adults to learn to ride a bike and become more confident - they can also form amazing connections to schools, local shops, and public transport.

Safer speeds, modal filters, protected cycleways on arterials, and off road paths through parks all together will form an accessible, safe, efficient, and connected network safe places to ride a bike across our neighbourhoods. These would link people to schools, town centres, and public transport, making local trips by carbon friendly and active modes easier and more appealing.

We also want to see secure bike parking at train stations, transport hubs, town centres, and community facilities (eg. work with your local businesses to get a network of <a href="Lockydocks!">Lockydocks!</a>), wayfinding to help people find their way around the existing cycleways, and support for community bike hubs and community events which include cycles

We've listed some specific transport projects we know our local members would love to see their local boards support. You can find them below in the list of specific local board area ideas.

# We would like local boards to advocate for Auckland Transport to:

- Align all projects and renewals with the <u>Transport Emissions Reduction Pathway</u> (<u>TERP</u>) and emission reduction goals
- Support the campaign to <u>Liberate the Lane</u> on the Auckland Harbour Bridge for walking, cycling, and wheeling
- Advocate for an <u>E-bike subsidy</u> to help more people replace their car trips with bikes! E-bikes are more accessible for a wider range of people
- Invest more from the financial budget towards walking and cycling. Our emissions reduction and vision zero targets demand a larger monetary allocation towards these modes
- Make streets safer by <u>reducing speed limits</u> to 30km/h <u>around schools</u>, residential streets, and town centres
- Use modal filters to stop rat running and make residential streets safer and quieter
- Provide an accessible, safe, and efficient local network of pathways and cycleways throughout the region
- Advocate for a local version of Portland's Bike <u>Disaster Relief Trials</u> to prepare our communities and equip them to respond during emergencies
- Improve cycle and pathway safety, including lighting, physical traffic barriers, non-slip surfaces
- Improve the local public transport network and bus lane priority (bus lanes are often used by more confident cyclists)
- Support local initiatives to reduce emissions by encouraging more use of public transport (eg. secure bike parking at transport hubs, safe cycleways connecting to public transport hubs)

The focus of Community Groups Feeding the Homeless (CGFH), which has been in existence for 5 years, is on feeding homeless people and supporting them in other ways. We act as an umbrella group that supports a number of groups, including Sunday Blessings (Waitematā) and Waka of Caring (Manurewa).

Homelessness is an issue that affects all of Auckland. Homeless people are amongst the most vulnerable people in our communities. In our view, local boards could help with community initiatives that support homeless people, and we know that some of them do and we appreciate that. Community Groups Feeding the Homeless (CGFH) has received funding from two local boards to support groups that we provide admin and practical support to, for which we are very grateful. We also appreciate the Local Boards that mention homelessness and/or deprivation and inequity in their plans and those that have key initiatives or advocacy that address homelessness.

We would like to see local boards support members of the community wishing to set up Pātaka Kai (<a href="https://www.patakai.co.nz/">https://www.patakai.co.nz/</a>) and that local boards publicise, perhaps in their e-newsletters, the locations of these free community pantries in their area. These pantries have been set up around New Zealand and many of them are in Auckland, though there are none in the city centre or on Aotea-Great Barrier.

We are also aware that some local board areas have community fridges in them, and we would like to see local boards supporting the establishment of more of them.

CGFH supports the roll-out of food scraps bins, and once they are established and people know how to use them, we would like the community to be encouraged to place any edible food that they don't need in a Pātaka Kai or fridge rather than in their food scraps bin.

We would also like to inform Local Board that one of the groups we are associated with, Guru Nanak Free Kitchen, has informed us that all the Sikh gurdwaras throughout Auckland are open 24/7 with food available for homeless people and others in need. In this time of cost of living difficulties and food insecurity, we feel it is important that the community know of such facilities and local boards are one way to inform the community.

We know that many of the libraries and community centres throughout Auckland welcome homeless people and some of them have programmes to support them and/or facilities such as showers that homeless people can use. We thank these places for their valuable support.

Working with Waiuku Clubs, Residents, Waiuku College Principals (Tom Vanderlaan/Stuart Kelly), Waiuku Local Board Councillors Sharlene Druyven (Town Manager), Matthew Murphy. 24 months ago, meetings were held between Rose Ward, Auckland Council Sports, Parks and Recreation, Jamie Archibald (CLM) that resulted in a "Pre-needs Assessment by Council". There were errors in this pre-needs assessment including:
- a) Council Statistician advisors were incorrect with population figures showing 7,400! (the exact number of the Electoral Vote only 30% voted, not including Waikato).
- b) The actual population figure being 24,000. This discrepancy between figures had been recognised by Rose Ward and had been discussed with Jamie Archibald of CLM, we are now on the cusp of 30,000 increasing 10% 15% P.A. Jamie.archibald@aktive.org.nz (excluding Waikato on our boarders)

- c) Population figures from Hugh Dickie, a well-respected Statistician collating together the number of 16,000 patients at Waiuku Medical Centre, visitors to the supermarket etc. over 2000 signatures were presented to council. d) In 2020 3000 homes were passed by Council with a further 700 approved in February 2022 resulting in an increase in population of approximately 15,000 people, excluding numerous one-off properties + 75 Lots on Cornwall Rd submitted Sept 2022.
- 9. Good Sporting Facilities and Community Spirit is very important:
- a) Council say Pools will be built with a population of 30,000.

Afternoon Franklin Local Board Members and members of the Manukau Harbour Forum, Recently I had the opportunity to catch up with the elected members of the Franklin Local Board regarding the Franklin Local Plan 2023 at the Clarks Beach Golf Club.

The elected members present at the golf club expressed concern that the local board was not receiving feedback from our community.

As a result I have spoken with a wide range of members in our community and the wider harbour community which has resulted in the list as developed below regarding a range of plan options of which some will be generational.

- 1. Design and designate a multimodal transport corridor linking Karaka Waiuku Pukekohe Bombay to provide safe transport connection linkages to these area as development continues.
- 2. The multimodal corridor is to accommodate pedestrians cycleway public transport vehicles including light rail trucks cars buses and power water communication gas sewage services .
- 3. The multimodal corridor is to be generally linear in design and is treated as a green field project (avoiding existing infrastructure) which results in significant cost savings and reduced construction times.
- 4. Develop a long term purchasing plan of the land on and bordering or part of the designated multimodal route.

- 5. A willing buyer seller process to be used which is similar to the French infrastructure land purchasing system that encourages sensible land purchases in a timely cost effective manner.
- 6. When properties along the designated route are placed on the market they should be purchased by council and the land not required for the multimodal corridor is returned to the open market and sold off.
- 7. Transpower used this process to erect a transmission line between Whakamaru and Pakuranga which resulted in a significant land profit to Transpower during the build process.
- 8. Each year thousands of tons of cliff faces (soft sandstone) in the area Waiuku Awhitu Peninsula Glenbrook Clarks Beach area fall into the Manukau Harbour that result in thick mud that compromises local beaches channels including the Waiuku Wharf area.
- 9. A lot of these collapsing cliff faces are part of Council's Esplanade Reserves that are not maintained by council and should be.
- 10. Consideration needs to be given on determining an engineering solution to reduce these cliff faces collapsing into the harbour and reusing the soft sandstone sediment to stabilise the toe of these soft sandstone cliff faces.
- 11. There have been a number of artificial reefs built on Tamaki Drive and on the shore line of the Tamaki River and a carpark at Westhaven all using Mudcrete a mixture of marine sediment and Portland cement processed through a pug mill.
- 12. Dredging's from the Port of Onehunga were trucked to the Port of Auckland's Container terminal at Mechanics Bay and processed into Mudcrete and this has successfully been used as a structural component for the container terminal development process.
- 13. A similar process could be used to stabilise the cliff faces in the area using the dredging's from the Waiuku Wharf area to make it a much more useable harbour port and improve the current negative visual aspect.
- 14. I continue to receive enquiries for a series of public wharfs to be established around the Manukau Harbour in order to service a public transport network on the Manukau Harbour.
- 15. The locations for public all tide 24/7 wharfs would be at such locations as Onehunga, Waiuku, Clarks Beach, Te Toro, Waiau Pa, Glenbrook Beach, Matakawau, Grahams Beach, Orua Bay, Huia, Cornwallis, French Bay, Blockhouse Bay.
- 16. Updated and regularly maintained navigation charts of the Manukau Harbour including the upper reaches of the Waiuku River to NZ Steel and Waiuku.
- 17. Installation of updated navigation markers (buoys and lights) on the main channels servicing Orua Bay Te Toro and Waiuku and Grahams Beach to Onehunga.
- 18. All new public boat ramps to be useable 24/7 with an adjoining floating dock and trailer parking and the facility is suitably protected from wave action ensuring safe launching and retrieval of trailer vessels.
- 19. The Port of Onehunga is available for mooring purposes for larger and non-trailer-able vessels.
- 20. The Port of Onehunga is made available for regular ferry services on the harbour.
- 21. Research is undertaken to determine why people are suffering from eye infections diarrhoea and vomiting after swimming and wakeboarding in the Manukau Harbour especially the Taihiki River Glenbrook Beach and Clarks Beach.
- 22. Regular water quality testing is undertaken using various methods including testing for e.coli to determine sources of the contamination and finding solutions to these issues.
- 23. There should be no further discharges of treated waste water and or contaminated water into the Manukau Harbour due to what we have witnessed at the discharge point of Watercare's outlet at Puketutu Island over the last 60 years.
- 24. Watercare are currently being subject to a party seeking to have their existing use right to locate sewer pipes under private property challenged by this party.
- 25. The community including the local board need to support Watercare ensuring continue to be permitted to install sewer pipes under private property (at a reasonable depth) that

avoids digging up public roads that will result in an significant increase in there carbon foot prints during construction of new pipelines.



Submission on the Local Board Plan 2023, the 2024-2031 Public Transport Plan, and General Feedback

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### Our Process:

On the request of the Local Board, and to discover what Franklin's rangatahi want from their local government, the Franklin Youth Advisory Board undertook a number of engagements at local libraries, gathering opinions and feedback through a variety of means, such as opinion forms, interactive brainstorming displays, and polling.

The following report summarises findings from:

- Face-to-face korero with our community; and,
- Formal submissions; and,
- Quantifiable data from specific questions and activities; and,
- FYAB Members' own experience and expertise.

### Formal Submission Questions:

#### Our Community - Objectives:

The people who filled out a formal submission indicated that they would like to prioritise more activities and facilities in rural and outer areas of Franklin (e.g., Beachlands/Maraetai, Clarks Beach, Manukau Heads, etc.)

People also noted they would like more resources to be put into youth-focused facilities and activities across the Local Board Area more broadly. We heard from people who wanted more resources to be dedicated to youth voice and engagement, as well as community-based groups more broadly.

One respondent made particular note of their concerns about safety in our communities. They remarked that they would like to see more initiatives focused on returning mana to our spaces and places and fostering a sense of pride and care for community assets.

#### Our People – Objectives:

People noted under this objective that more resources should be dedicated to creating trades education centres, apprenticeship opportunities, as well as tertiary academic centres where our young people can easily access it, here in our community.

People also generally noted that it is difficult for youth to access the facilities and services that already exist, and that more resources should be dedicated towards youth accessibility of public facilities and services.

### Our Environment – Objectives:

All respondents agreed that the Local Board is committed to climate action and that these steps are good. They did, however, make note that speed is of the essence in this, and that more resources should be dedicated to making all Local Board-affiliated facilities and modes of transport zero-carbon as soon as is practicable.

Most respondents also made note that green and wild spaces should be restored and created, and that wetlands especially should be preserved and expanded back to natural bounds where feasible, and not be allowed to be developed into inevitable sinking homes and infrastructure.

#### Our Places – Objectives:

Our respondents were largely of one that the Local Board does a good job of maintaining and developing the facilities it offers to the public. They did make note that more support should be allocated for community groups who work out of public facilities, but that local and community groups should also be empowered to make more and better use of public facilities.

Young people who responded also noted that they needed more places that were youth-focused in design and amenities. The Pukekohe Skate Park is an excellent example of what a well-designed youth facility can achieve, bringing kids off the street and into a safe and social environment that is busy all year round.

#### Our Economy – Objectives:

Our respondents largely made similar notes that more support is needed for locally grown businesses, and more support is needed for local sustainable agriculture, for which Franklin could become known.

People specifically noted they would like to see more green transport links, more green economy initiatives, more support for sustainable agribusiness, and more opportunities for farmers markets and other common open market spaces.

#### Franklin Paths Network:

Most respondents selected the following two of the three options:

- New paths that make it easier and safer to walk and cycle to public transport hubs.
- Delivering priority routes.

#### Other selected options include:

- Focused effort to improve the safety and accessibility of existing walking and cycling routes.
- New paths that make it easier to walk and cycle to school.
- New paths that connect residential areas with business areas making it safer and easier to commute to work.
- New paths in natural areas with a focus on recreations and connection with nature.

Some other suggested improvements included:

- Putting additional resources into maintaining existing paths infrastructure while expanding the network, to ensure that parts of the network do not deteriorate.
- Creating pathways along major rural routes for pedestrian, bicycle, and horse traffic to increase safety along high-speed rural roads.

#### Other Feedback:

Overwhelmingly, we heard that people want a lot more investment in playgrounds right across Franklin. They especially encourage creating this infrastructure around shops and cafes to increase local economic prosperity in the process.

One respondent made particular danger of coastal roads in East Franklin in dire need of repair, and also noted that this is true generally for rural roads in our area, which tend to be less than smooth and constantly in need of repair or resurfacing.

#### Generic Feedback:

#### **Interactive Brainstorm:**

We asked young people to help us brainstorm ideas for how the Local Board could more effectively use the facilities it currently has to help rangatahi/youth, as well as what facilities they wanted and needed in their communities.

Our two largest areas of feedback were in parks/playgrounds, and libraries. These two sets of facilities are central to the Local Boards connection with the local area, and some of the only tangible ways most people (especially young people) interact with local government at all.

In terms of libraries, young people are asking for lots of small improvements (e.g., a board/video games area, phone charging areas, more outdoor seating near the libraries, etc.), these small improvements are all generally about making the library an even better place to be than it is now. Drawing young people into libraries keeps them safe, off the streets after school, and in a place where they can learn and enjoy themselves in a social space.

The other, larger area of feedback was playgrounds. Young people want more, better, and bigger playgrounds all over the Franklin area. They want existing playgrounds to be upgraded with more and better play equipment, and they want more public bathroom facilities at all public parks, gardens, and playgrounds.

We also had feedback from people asking for more paths for cycling and walking, and upon being told about the Franklin Paths Network, they engaged positively and indicated they thought this was a good solution. One respondent did suggest closing parking spaces on certain streets to trial bike lanes in townships.

### Public Transport Plan 2024-2031:

### Methodology:

For this open, public poll, we asked people to take a red sticky dot, and place it on one of seven sticky notes with each of the seven upgrades proposed in the PTP, indicating the project they believed was the most important, or the one they thought should be prioritised.

#### **Results:**

#### Pukekohe:

The projects in Pukekohe with the most approval were the:

Trains every 7-8 minutes at peak times.

New bus loop connecting Paerata with new stations.

#### Waiuku:

The proposed upgrade to Bus Route 396 received positive feedback from three people

#### **Drury:**

The proposed project on Waihoehoe Road received positive feedback from three people

#### Clarks Beach:

The proposed new Bus Route 379 received positive feedback from two people.

#### **Conclusion:**

In summary, the young people of Franklin have shown us what matters to them, and what they think the Local Board could be doing more of. If there is one thing that the members of FYAB would like the Local Board Members to take away, it is that the young people of Franklin want more publicly-owned and operated spaces, places, and facilities available to them.

These facilities bridge an important gap between schooling, home, and extracurricular activities. When rangatahi have places to go that are youth-focused, they stay off the streets, they stay safe, and they stay with their peers. The facilities, despite the capital cost, provide an invaluable service to our communities, and foster a sense of local pride.

We work to connect, support and collaborate with organised sport bodies, clubs, schools and community groups in the strategic direction, planning and delivery of programmes and facilities.

CLM Community Sport recognises the key role that Local Boards play in the delivery of play, recreation and sport across Tāmaki Makaurau. Local Boards are essential in creating communities where people want to live, work and play and they have a significant impact on the health and wellbeing of Aucklanders through governance and decision making on parks and open spaces, community facilities, grants and support, community leases and many other aspects.

#### **Key Feedback**

- The draft Plan makes it clear that community spaces and places are vital for the health and well-being of our communities, and it suggests thinking creatively to keep and offer these places.
- We fully back exploring different ways to fund and improve community spots, like considering a special local fee for built facilities.
- We see that the Franklin Sport and Active Recreation Facilities Plan isn't mentioned, and we'd appreciate if it's included in the Franklin Local Board Plan to guide decisions about sport and recreation places.



- We ask the Franklin Local Board to be careful about removing assets without proper planning, as this could cause problems.
- We recommend the Franklin Local Board doesn't make leases more expensive for community groups. Instead, view community leases as an investment for positive community results.
- We completely support involving young people in the community, but we also want to stress focusing on play and making sure there are chances for kids and youth in all community areas, not just playgrounds.
- We want the Franklin Local Board to add these points to their list of things to support:
  - a. Ask the Governing Body for more money for the Sport and Recreation Facility Investment Fund.
  - b. Ask the Governing Body for more money for the Regional Sport and Recreation Facilities Operating Grant.

CLM Community Sport appreciates the vision presented in the Franklin Local Board Plan and the strong emphasis placed on making sure our communities can use community spaces and open areas to lead healthy, active lives.

## Does the Local Board Plan reflect what you want for this community over the next three years?

The Franklin Local Board Plan effectively recognizes the significance of our community places and open areas, while also exploring fresh approaches to sustain, improve, and build these facilities.

We understand that the Local Board's task is tough, as they have to provide various facilities and services with limited funds to match their goals. We request the Devonport-Takapuna Local Board to clearly prioritize what matters most to the community. This way, you can create a meaningful impact in specific areas instead of spreading resources thinly.

#### **Sport and Recreation Facilities and Open Spaces**

We recognize the difficulties in serving a diverse and spread-out community and agree that Council might not always be the best choice for owning and managing community facilities.

We fully support the objectives of:

- Local public places are future-proofed, fit for purpose and financially sustainable.
- Develop community facilities where there is a community service deficit.
  - Enable community groups across Franklin to lead delivery of community initiatives.



- Provide improved access to council services across the Franklin Local Board area, including in areas that experience deprivation through isolation.
- Local communities are provided options for retaining services they enjoy as the board plans for sustainable and equitable service delivery.

#### And key initiatives to:

- Fund a capability and capacity building programme to help community groups to organise themselves, plan their priorities and attract non-council funding for local activities.
- Fund community partnerships that align with our plan over the next three years.

We fully support the idea of introducing a targeted rate to help maintain, renew, and develop both Council and non-Council owned facilities. We're aware that engaging in sports leads to 74.3 million hours of positive social interaction each year. Moreover, there's evidence showing that not investing enough in facilities directly results in lower participation rates. To ensure the community's needs are met, it's crucial to use the Franklin Sport and Active Recreation Plan as the main guide for identifying gaps in the facility network and determining where this targeted funding should go.

To put the plans from the Sport and Active Recreation Plan into action, we agree with the approach taken by the Franklin Local Board in funding community partnerships and building the capacity of community organizations.

While we understand the intent to maximize the use of existing facilities and to make a meaningful impact without spreading resources thin, we want to be cautious about selling underused land and facilities. We also advise careful consideration when looking at recovering fees to cover costs, especially concerning community leases.

We know the aim is to use existing facilities to their fullest potential, but sometimes initiatives like selling assets can be a quick way to remove buildings without fully exploring how they could be better utilized. We urge the Franklin Local Board to stick to your Sport and Active Recreation Facilities Plan when making decisions about reducing facility sizes or getting rid of assets.

We also recognize the need to cover costs for certain services. If that's the case, we strongly recommend not increasing the cost of leases for community organizations. Most sport and recreation groups with Council leases already operate on very tight budgets to deliver quality community outcomes. Any additional costs could harm their ability to deliver. Leases should be seen as an investment in achieving these goals, rather than a purely cost-related activity.



We highlight play because it has a significant impact on a number of aspects of young people's lives, according to Sport New Zealand research<sup>1</sup>, its benefits include:

- being physically active in a fun way that develops fundamental movement skills
- encouraging self-directed creativity and innovation
- improving social and emotional connections
- improving a young person's understanding of their relationship with the physical environment
- improving resilience, independence and leadership by determining their own outcomes
- aiding better decision-making based around elements of challenge and risk.

#### Play

We appreciate the thoughtful planning that has gone into making sure our community spaces work well for everyone. While the Franklin Local Board Plan rightly emphasizes the importance of giving young people a say in the community, we kindly request that the plan also explicitly highlights the need to include activities for tamariki and rangatahi in local spaces. It's common for the needs of young people to be overlooked, and just having playgrounds or skateparks isn't enough to meet their needs fully.

In Franklin, there's a slightly higher proportion (21.1% compared to 20%) of people under 15 years old than in the rest of Tāmaki. We want to make sure that these young members of our community, who might not always have a strong voice, are kept in mind in all planning efforts. They are the ones who will grow up using these facilities and becoming the leaders of our community.

Play is an important aspect to acknowledge and plan for as, according to Sport New Zealand research<sup>2</sup>, its benefits include:

- being physically active in a fun way that develops fundamental movement skills
- encouraging self-directed creativity and innovation
- improving social and emotional connections
- improving a young person's understanding of their relationship with the physical environment
- improving resilience, independence and leadership by determining their own outcomes
- aiding better decision-making based around elements of challenge and risk.

#### **Advocacy**

We strongly support the advocacy items to:

- Improved recreation service provision for south-east Auckland based at Beachlands-Maraetai.
- Planning for Auckland's strategic cycle network (Future Connect) incorporate Franklin communities.

We'd like to ask the Papakura Local Board to consider advocating for the following:

- Ask the Governing Body for more money for the Sport and Recreation Facility
   Investment Fund. This fund helps build facilities that aren't owned by the Council but
   really help people be active and healthy.
- Ask the Governing Body for extra money for the Regional Sport and Recreation
   Operating Grant. This would help communities build facilities and make it easier on
   the council's budget.

#### **Conclusion**

CLM Community Sport stands by the efforts of the Franklin Local Board in creating opportunities for communities to embrace active and healthy lifestyles. We appreciate your dedication to play, recreation, and sports as vital elements of community life. We also support maintaining a close connection between the Franklin Local Board and CLM Community Sport to address community needs.

As mentioned earlier, CLM Community Sport and Aktive would greatly value it if you could highlight the essential role of the Sport and Recreation Facilities Investment Fund and the Regional Sport and Recreation Facilities Operating Grant in the Franklin Local Board Plan. We're currently collaborating with Councillors to explore ways to enhance the Sport and Recreation Facilities Investment Fund. Maintaining the current funding level won't be sufficient to meet the current demand, let alone future needs.

In the same discussions, we're advocating for the continuation of the Regional Sport and Recreation Facilities Operating Grant. This funding is crucial for numerous sport and recreation facility providers. Its absence could lead to higher costs for users or even the closure or significant reduction of facilities, impacting the level of service provided. We're more than willing to assist your Local Board support staff in providing additional details for your Plan, if you're open to the idea.
