







# Summary of feedback on the draft Henderson-Massey Local Board Plan 2023

## **Purpose**

This report summarises feedback received during the public consultation in July/August to inform the development of the Henderson-Massey Local Board Plan. This summary aims to capture themes rather than detail every point of feedback received.

#### **Executive Summary**

Local board plans are strategic three-year plans developed in consultation with the community. They set out the direction for the local area reflecting community aspirations and priorities, and guide:

- decisions on local activities, projects, and facilities
- local board input into the council's regional strategies and plans, including the Auckland Plan
- how local boards will work with other agencies, including community groups, central government agencies and council-controlled organisations that play key roles in the area
- funding and investment decisions.

Local board plans focus on the key areas local boards are responsible for and include objectives and some of the key initiatives that will be carried out to achieve them.

### **Engagement Approach**

The draft Henderson-Massey Local Board Plan 2023 was developed using feedback received from public engagement carried out between November 2022 and April 2023. Feedback previously heard from the community on a wide range of topics, particularly during the 2023 Annual Budget consultation period, was also considered.

Between 13 July and 14 August 2023, the local board consulted on the draft plan to hear the community's thoughts. Feedback was received through Have Your Say events, written submissions including online and hard copy forms, emails and letters.

This report summarises the key activities that took place and the feedback that was heard during both the early engagement and the consultation period.

## Mana whenua & Mataawaka engagement

A co-ordinated approach was taken by local boards so that mana whenua were invited to engage with relevant local boards in one hui rather than receiving separate invitations from each local board.

For the Henderson-Massey Local Board, two online information sessions were held to inform mana whenua across Tāmaki Makaurau about the purpose of local board plans, how their perspectives could be incorporated into the plans, as well as the feedback process and timelines.

In Hikurangi/West Auckland, mana whenua and mataawaka expressed a preference to provide feedback through hui.

The three west local boards, Henderson-Massey, Waitākere Ranges and Whau, together with ward councillors, met with mana whenua Te Kawerau ā Maki collectively and discussed local board plans during a Rangatira ki te Rangatira/governance hui at Te Ipu Kura a Maki (Henderson Civic) on 18 August 2023.

In terms of formal submissions, 14 were received from those respondents who indicated they whakapapa Māori. This comprised 11% of the overall submissions for Henderson-Massey.

#### Stakeholder and community engagement

Drop-in sessions and Have Your Say Events were held through-out the Henderson-Massey Local Board area between 15 July and 9 August 2023.

- 630 members of the Henderson-Massey community participated
- Feedback was received verbally, via email or by completing the on-line feedback form
- Feedback relating to specific consultation questions were included as 'feedback received'

#### Feedback received

- 126 pieces of feedback were received from individuals
- 21 organisations provided feedback and/or submissions
- 45 pieces of feedback were received from Drop-in sessions and Have your say events

## **Summary of feedback**

#### **Māori Outcomes**

Delivering outcomes for Māori is an important feature of the Henderson-Massey Local Board Plan.

Māori outcomes respond to Council's legislative obligations and to extensive engagement with Auckland's Māori communities.

The draft plan proposed the following initiatives to support Māori outcomes in our area:

- Opportunities to work more closely with Te Pai Hikuroa and the Māori Thought Leadership Collective
- A desire for a united west voice so that local board boundaries do not affect delivery on the aspirations of the Māori community in the west
- Continue to work alongside Te Kawerau ā Maki to take care of the land and waters for future generations

Key themes from the feedback included:

#### Climate action

Local Boards also have an important role to play in leading and supporting Auckland's response to the climate emergency, including supporting regional climate plan initiatives, integrating climate awareness into all decisions, including community investment.

The draft plan proposed to meet the challenge of taking climate action in the following ways:

- Focus on investing in increasing tree canopy cover, reducing emissions, advocating for sustainable development to help with flooding
- Opportunities to improve and maintain streams and infrastructure
- Contributing to community-led resilience, response, and recovery so the Henderson-Massey community is better prepared for future events.

Key themes from the feedback included:


## **Our People**

Key features of the draft Henderson-Massey Local Board Plan 2023:

Focus on ensuring Māori culture and identity thrives and a commitment to recognising and providing for Te Tiriti o Waitangi outcomes. Ensuring diverse communities influence what happens in their neighbourhoods and people's resilience and connection to their community is strengthened by building on the west's legacy of practical, creative and supportive communities.

Key themes from the feedback included:

Focus on climate-change mitigation and sustainable living. Ensuring te wai is healthy and thriving, the urban ngahere grows larger and matauranga Māori is central in environmental restoration.

Ensuring well-planned growth prepares for the needs of a growing community and includes a range of transport options.
