### Deliberations on proposal to amend the Alcohol Control Bylaw

### Te take mo te purongo Purpose of the report

 To assist Bylaw Panel deliberations on public feedback to a proposal to amend Te Kaunihera o Tāmaki Makaurau Te Ture ā-Rohe Whakararata Waipiro / the Auckland Council Alcohol Control Bylaw 2014.

## Whakarāpopototanga matua Executive summary

- 2. To assist Bylaw Panel deliberations on public feedback to the proposal, staff have summarised the feedback and provided a structure for the deliberations (Attachment A).
- 3. Council received responses from 883 people and organisations at the close of feedback on 13 November 2020 (including late feedback from the Eden Park Trust). All feedback is summarised into topics under the following categories:
  - new temporary alcohol ban for:
    - o all major events at Pukekawa / Auckland Domain (excluding 'Christmas in the Park')
    - o 'Christmas in the Park' at Pukekawa / Auckland Domain
    - o all major events at Eden Park
    - o all major events at Rarotonga / Mount Smart Stadium
    - o all major events at Waiōrea / Western Springs Stadium
  - replace unnecessary clauses with a 'related information' note
  - clarify exceptions to alcohol bans, council's ability to make temporary alcohol bans, and the Bylaw wording
  - other bylaw-related matters and additional matters.
- 4. Staff recommend that the Panel accept the late feedback received from The Eden Park Trust, consider all feedback received on the proposal and make the necessary recommendations to the Governing Body.
- 5. This approach will help complete the statutory process the council must follow. This includes considering the views of people interested in the proposal with an open mind before making a final decision.
- 6. There is a reputational risk that some people or organisations who provided feedback may not feel that their views are addressed. This risk can be mitigated by the Panel considering all public feedback contained in this report and in its decision report to the Governing Body.
- 7. The final step in the statutory process is for the Governing Body to approve the Bylaw Panel recommendations. If approved, staff will publicly notify the decision and publish changes to the Bylaw.

### Ngā tūtohunga Recommendation/s

That the Bylaw Panel:

- a) thank those persons and organisations who gave public feedback on the proposal to amend Te Kaunihera o Tāmaki Makaurau Te Ture ā-Rohe Whakararata Waipiro / the Auckland Council Alcohol Control Bylaw 2014
- b) accept and consider the late feedback from The Eden Park Trust alongside all other public feedback received
- c) request that staff as delegated by the Chief Executive prepare a decision report to the Governing Body for approval of the Panel.

### Horopaki Context

### Proposed Bylaw amendments better reduce alcohol-related crime and disorder

- 8. On 24 September 2020 the Governing Body adopted a <u>proposal</u> (Attachment B) to improve the Bylaw for public consultation (Item 15, GB/2020/109).
- 9. The proposal arose from a statutory review of the Bylaw (see figure below).
- 10. The proposal seeks to better reduce alcohol-related crime and disorder by making:
  - new temporary alcohol bans for major events at four regional venues (Rarotonga / Mount Smart Stadium, Waiōrea / Western Springs Stadium, Eden Park and Pukekawa / Auckland Domain)
  - the Bylaw easier to read and understand.



### Bylaw Panel appointed to deliberate on public feedback to the proposal

- 11. On 1 September 2020 the Regulatory Committee appointed the Bylaw Panel to attend public consultation events, deliberate and make recommendations to the Governing Body on public feedback to the proposal (REG/2020/52).
- 12. When deliberating, the Panel:1
  - must receive public feedback with an open mind and give it due consideration
  - must provide the decisions and reasons to people who gave feedback
  - must ensure all meetings are open to the public
  - may consider or request comment or advice from staff or any other person to assist their decision-making.

### Feedback on the proposal was received from 883 people and organisations

13. The proposal was publicly notified for feedback from 10 October to 13 November 2020. Council received <u>feedback</u> from 882 people and organisations from across Auckland during that period, and late feedback from The Eden Park Trust (see table below).

### Summary of public notification and feedback

#### Public consultation initiatives

- public notice in all local suburban papers in October 2020
- article on 'Our Auckland' website in October 2020

Sections 82(1)(e), 82(1)(f), 83(3) of the Local Government Act 2002 and sections 46 and 47 of the Local Government Official Information and Meetings Act 1987.

- email notification to all local board members, advisors, senior advisors and local area managers, Auckland Domain Committee staff, and the Chair of the Independent Māori Statutory Board
- email or postal notification to stakeholders, mana whenua and mataawaka.

### Public feedback opportunities

- in writing online, by email or by post
- verbally by phone or at an online 'Question and Answer' event in October or November 2020
- in person at a 'Have Your Say' event<sup>2</sup> at the Central City Library on 20 October 2020, or one-on-one session for mana whenua and mataawaka or key stakeholder feedback event in October or November 2020.

### Consultation reach (number of responses)

- feedback received from 883 people and organisations as follows:
  - online and written feedback provided by 879 people and organisations, including the Tūpuna Maunga o Tāmaki Makaurau Authority and The Eden Park Trust. This included four via email, nine via the online 'Have Your Say' feedback form and 866 via an online feedback form by a People's Panel sample (Attachments C and D).
  - o attendee feedback at 'Have Your Say' events by four people (Attachment E).
- no person or group opted to attend the online 'Question and Answer' events, mana whenua or mataawaka one-on-one sessions, or stakeholder feedback event.
- 14. Attachments A to F in this report contain a deliberations table, proposal, summary and full copy of public feedback, summary of 'Have Your Say' event feedback, and operational and non-bylaw-related feedback.
- 15. All local boards and the Auckland Domain Committee had an opportunity to provide views on the public feedback by resolution and present those views in person to the Bylaw Panel prior to deliberations. Twenty local boards and the Auckland Domain Committee resolved formal views (Attachment G). The views of the remaining local board will be tabled at the Panel's meeting.

### Tātaritanga me ngā tohutohu Analysis and advice

- 16. To assist the Bylaw Panel in its deliberations, staff have summarised bylaw-related public feedback into categories in Attachment A. This enables the Panel to deliberate and record its recommendations on each topic to meet statutory requirements. The public feedback categories are:
  - new temporary alcohol ban for:
    - o all major events at Pukekawa / Auckland Domain (excluding 'Christmas in the Park')
    - o 'Christmas in the Park' at Pukekawa / Auckland Domain
    - o all major events at Eden Park
    - o all major events at Rarotonga / Mount Smart Stadium
    - o all major events at Waiōrea / Western Springs Stadium
  - replace unnecessary clauses with a 'related information' note
  - clarify exceptions to alcohol bans, council's ability to make temporary alcohol bans, and the Bylaw wording
  - other bylaw-related matters and additional matters.
- 17. The majority of public feedback and views supported all proposals. Key matters for deliberations include:
  - whether to apply Proposal 1E (temporary alcohol ban for major events at Waiōrea / Western Springs Stadium) to major events at the Western Springs Outer Fields
  - whether to extend the area of the alcohol ban in Proposal 1E to future fan trails.
- 18. Staff have forwarded feedback on operational and non-bylaw matters (summarised in Attachment F) to relevant council units.

The 'Have Your Say' event was a drop-in opportunity for the public to learn more about the proposal, ask questions and provide feedback to council officers and panel members.

### Tauākī whakaaweawe āhuarangi Climate impact statement

19. There are no implications for climate change arising from this decision.

## Ngā whakaaweawe me ngā tirohanga a te rōpū Kaunihera Council group impacts and views

- 20. The proposal impacts the operation of units across the council group involved in events, processing alcohol ban requests and alcohol ban signage. Those units are aware of the impacts of the proposal and their implementation role.
- 21. Auckland Unlimited advise that Proposal 1E (major events at Waiōrea / Western Springs Stadium) should also be applied to major events held on the Outer Fields.
- 22. Community Action on Youth and Drugs (CAYAD) Tāmaki Makaurau, and the Safety Collective Tāmaki Makaurau provided advice about event implementation that has been circulated to other relevant council units.

## Ngā whakaaweawe ā-rohe me ngā tirohanga a te poari ā-rohe Local impacts and local board views

- 23. The proposal impacts the Auckland region.
- 24. In February and March 2021, all local boards and the Auckland Domain Committee had an opportunity to input into the decision-making process by providing views by resolution on the public feedback to the proposal. In addition, they could also choose to present those views in person to the Bylaw Panel on 19 March 2021.
- 25. Twenty local boards and the Auckland Domain Committee provided views by resolution (Attachment G). Three of those local boards and the committee chose to also provide those views in person to the Bylaw Panel. Formal views of the Ōrākei Local Board will be tabled at the Panel meeting as the board chose to resolve views in March 2021 (OR/2021/5).
- 26. Most views supported all proposals with the following exceptions or additions:
  - Kaipātiki Local Board does not support Proposal 1B about 'Christmas in the Park' at Pukekawa / Auckland Domain
  - the Auckland Domain Committee endorses case-by-case decision-making for major events at Pukekawa / Auckland Domain (Proposals 1A and 1B)
  - Waitematā Local Board:
    - does not support Auckland Unlimited advice for Proposal 1E<sup>3</sup> to also apply to major events at the Outer Fields and recommends case-by-case decision-making
    - o recommends inclusion of any future associated fan trails in Proposal 1E
    - recommends the Fan Trail over Ponsonby Road in Proposal 1C also include the side streets to that road.

### Tauākī whakaaweawe Māori

### Māori impact statement

- 27. The Bylaw has significance for Māori as users and kaitiaki / guardians of public space. Māori are also over-represented in alcohol-related hospital visits, the criminal justice system and as victims of crime.
- 28. Māori health advocacy organisations, Te Puni Kōkiri and the Tūpuna Maunga Authority support the use of alcohol bans as a tool to reduce alcohol-related harm.
- 29. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority provided general feedback on the proposal noting that Tūpuna Maunga are subject to alcohol and smoke-free policy that supports the spiritual, cultural and community significance of the maunga.

30. Mana whenua and mataawaka were provided opportunities to give feedback on the proposal in writing, online and in person. The majority of people identifying as Māori who provided feedback support the proposal. This is consistent with the overall percentage of feedback in support.

### Ngā ritenga ā-pūtea

### **Financial implications**

31. The cost of the Bylaw Panel recommendations will be met within existing budgets.

## Ngā raru tūpono me ngā whakamaurutanga Risks and mitigations

32. There is a reputational risk that some people or organisations who provided feedback may not feel that their views are addressed. This risk can be mitigated by the Panel considering all public feedback contained in this report and in its decision report to the Governing Body.

### Ngā koringa ā-muri Next steps

- 33. Staff will prepare a report from the Bylaw Panel to the Governing Body to implement the Panel directions on public feedback from its deliberations meeting. The report will be circulated to the Panel for approval and if necessary, the Panel can reconvene.
- 34. The final step in the statutory process is for the Governing Body to approve the Panel recommendations. If approved, council staff will publicly notify the decision and publish changes to the Bylaw.

## Have your say

### Helping to protect the public

Aucklanders drink alcohol in public places every day, for example at a family picnic, licensed venue or concert. Most people drink responsibly and without having any negative impact on others.

Sometimes drinking in public places can cause or worsen crime or disorder there. For example, drinkers may make too much noise, leave litter or graffiti, urinate in public, commit vandalism or theft, intimidate or assault others, trespass, or use vehicles recklessly. This can negatively affect nearby residents' sleep, reduce the recreational or visual amenity of the place, make people feel unsafe, and place drinkers or those around them in danger of physical harm.

### **How Auckland Council keeps you safe**

We use a bylaw to enable us to make alcohol bans that prohibit alcohol in certain public places (for example a park or town centre).

The current ability to make alcohol bans is included in Te Kaunihera o Tāmaki Makaurau Te Ture ā-Rohe Whakararata Waipiro 2014 / <u>Auckland Council Alcohol Control Bylaw 2014</u>.

### Improving how we make alcohol bans

We recently checked how the rules are working and identified improvements.

We propose changes to the Bylaw that would:

- make new temporary alcohol bans for all major events at and around Rarotonga / Mount Smart Stadium, Waiorea / Western Springs Stadium, Eden Park and Pukekawa / Auckland Domain in the Bylaw. These would replace any existing temporary event alcohol bans at these locations
- replace rules covered by existing legislation or council policies about making an alcohol ban and alcohol ban signage. These would instead be included only as 'related information'
- clarify exceptions to alcohol bans for licensed premises and the transport of alcohol, and clarify how council can make temporary alcohol bans
- make the Bylaw wording easier to read and understand.

No feedback is being sought on other aspects of the Bylaw as they will remain **unchanged**, for example:

- existing permanent alcohol bans, except for the temporary alcohol bans proposed to be replaced
- exceptions to alcohol bans for buying and drinking alcohol at licensed premises in an alcohol ban area (including at an event) and the transport of alcohol in an unopened container
- the authority to make alcohol bans by resolution of local boards, the Auckland Domain Committee and the Regulatory Committee
- the existing process to make an alcohol ban.



# 2 What is the Bylaw

The Te Kaunihera o Tāmaki Makaurau Te Ture ā-Rohe Whakararata Waipiro 2014 / <u>Auckland Council</u> Alcohol Control Bylaw 2014 was made on 30 October 2014.

The purpose of the Bylaw is to reduce crime or disorder in certain public places that is caused or made worse by alcohol consumed there. The Bylaw seeks to achieve this by enabling council to make alcohol bans that prohibit alcohol in those public places (including in a vehicle).

# 3 What council proposes to change

### Improving how we make alcohol bans

We recently checked how the rules are working and identified improvements.

Council is proposing to better reduce alcohol-related crime and disorder in public places by making amendments to the Alcohol Control Bylaw 2014. The proposed amendments are listed below.

### Proposed changes

### • Make new event-based temporary alcohol bans for all major events at Mount Smart Stadium, Western Springs Stadium, Eden Park and Auckland Domain in the Bylaw. The new event-based temporary alcohol bans will replace existing event-based temporary alcohol bans made by resolution¹ for Mount Smart Stadium, Eden Park and Auckland Domain for 'Christmas in the Park' and the Lantern Festival. Changes to these existing resolutions would:

- for Mount Smart Stadium extend the ban to apply to all major events, not only concerts
- for Eden Park extend the ban to include Eden Park stadium, and two fan trails if they are activated as part of the event<sup>2</sup>
- for Auckland Domain extend the ban to all major events (not only the Lantern Festival) and change the ban time to start and finish one hour earlier (between 6am and 6am instead of 7am and 7am).

The ban for the Auckland Domain 'Christmas in the Park' event would remain unchanged.

- Use a related information note to replace rules about making an alcohol ban and alcohol ban signage that are covered by existing legislation or council policies.
- Clarify exceptions to alcohol bans for licensed premises and the transport of alcohol, and clarify how council can make temporary alcohol bans and the Bylaw wording.

### Reasons for proposed changes

### New event-based temporary alcohol bans made in the Bylaw:

- more easily enable a preventative approach to alcohol-related crime or disorder at or near event venues used for major events
- remove time and cost to process individual requests for event-based temporary alcohol bans where:
  - the event venue has been and will continue to be used for major events
  - a ban has been used in the past for major events at the event venue and Police and event organisers indicate a ban is needed in the future.
- create more consistent event-based temporary alcohol ban times and application.

Replacing some clauses with related information notes and providing clarifications:

- replaces rules that duplicate existing legislation or council policies but keeps content as extra information
- provides rules that are easier to read and understand.

If you want to know more, **Appendix A** shows what the proposed amended Alcohol Control Bylaw would look like. **Appendix B** provides a copy of the existing Alcohol Control Bylaw 2014. **Appendix C** provides a summary of the differences between the existing and amended bylaw.

## 4 How we implement the Bylaw

### Making decisions using evidence

Council uses evidence to decide whether to make, amend or replace an alcohol ban by resolution.

Before making an alcohol ban by resolution, the <u>Local Government Act 2002</u> requires council to be satisfied that there is evidence of a high level of crime or disorder in the area which has been caused by or made worse by alcohol consumption in that same area.

Evidence can include witness accounts of crime or disorder, photos of litter or damage, and callouts to council noise control and the Police. The <u>Local Government Act 2002</u> also requires any alcohol ban to be appropriate and proportionate in terms of the nature and scale of the crime or disorder and justifiable as a reasonable limitation on people's rights and freedoms.

### **Erecting and maintaining signage**

Council erects and maintains alcohol ban signage. Signage informs people of the alcohol ban area and hours. An internal policy guides the form and placement of alcohol ban signage.

#### Police enforcement of alcohol bans

The New Zealand Police are responsible for enforcing alcohol bans made under the Bylaw.

Anyone can report a breach of an alcohol ban to the Police. Police respond to reports of alcohol ban breaches as soon as possible depending on the nature of the issues and other priorities.

Police may use powers of search, seizure and arrest under the <u>Local Government Act 2002</u> to enforce alcohol bans. For breaches of alcohol bans, the Police may issue an infringement fee of \$250.

# 5 How we got here


### **Decisions leading to the proposed changes**

The <u>Local Government Act 2002</u> requires the council to review its bylaws periodically to determine whether they are effective, efficient and still necessary to address the problem. We also check that the Bylaw is not inconsistent with the New Zealand Bill of Rights Act 1990.

Auckland Council reviewed the existing Bylaw by engaging with stakeholders<sup>3</sup> and undertaking research. Council reported its findings and considered options in response to the findings at meetings in April and May 2019.

This statement of proposal was approved for public consultation by the Governing Body in September 2020. This begins the formal process to make amendments to the Alcohol Control Bylaw 2014.

Council engaged with a range of stakeholders including the Tūpuna Maunga Authority, the New Zealand Police, Alcohol Harm Watch, Health Promotion Agency, Auckland Regional Public Health Service, Te Puni Kōkiri and Māori public health advocates.

Bylaw made under sections 145 and 147 of the Local Government Act 2002.

### **Summary**

This summary is not part of the Bylaw but explains the general effects.

Sometimes drinking in public places can cause or worsen crime or disorder there. For example, drinkers may make too much noise, leave litter or graffiti, urinate in public, commit vandalism or theft, intimidate or assault others, trespass, or use vehicles recklessly.

This can negatively affect nearby residents' sleep, reduce the recreational or visual amenity of the place, make people feel unsafe, and place drinkers or those around them in danger of physical harm. The purpose of this Bylaw is to reduce crime or disorder in certain public places that is caused or made worse by alcohol consumed there, by –

- using alcohol bans to prohibit people from consuming, bringing or possessing alcohol in certain public places at certain times (clause 6)
- setting out how council may make a new alcohol ban by resolution (clauses 7 and 8)
- specifying event-based temporary alcohol bans (Schedule 1)
- referencing the full list of alcohol bans and maps (viewable on council's website).

Other parts of this Bylaw assist with its administration by –

- stating its name, when it comes into force and where it applies (clauses 1, 2 and 3)
- stating the purpose of this Bylaw and defining key terms (clauses 4 and 5)
- referencing the powers of the New Zealand Police to enforce this Bylaw, including the issue of \$250 infringement fines (Part 4)
- ensuring existing resolutions continue to apply and incomplete enforcement action can continue where relevant (Part 5).

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### 1 Title

(1) This Bylaw is the Te Ture ā-Rohe Whakararata Waipiro 2014 / Alcohol Control Bylaw 2014.

Clause 1 amended in accordance with Clause 2(2).

### 2 Commencement

- (1) This Bylaw comes into force on 18 December 2014.
- (2) Amendments to this Bylaw by resolution GB/####/## come into force on 01 June 2021.

### Related information about amendments

Council decided on dd month year to make various amendments to the Bylaw. The majority of the amendments were to make the Bylaw easier to read and understand. Key changes included:

- making new event-based temporary alcohol bans in Schedule 1
- using related information notes to replace clauses about alcohol ban signage and to replace clauses that duplicate legislative decision-making criteria
- clarifying exceptions to alcohol bans for licensed premises and the transport of alcohol, and clarifying council's ability to make temporary alcohol bans.

A comparison of the Bylaw before and after the amendments were made can be viewed in Item # of the Auckland Council Governing Body meeting agenda dated dd month year.

Clause 2 amended in accordance with Clause 2(2).

### 3 Application

(1) This Bylaw applies to Auckland.

### Part 1

### **Preliminary provisions**

### 4 Purpose

(1) The purpose of this Bylaw is to reduce crime or disorder in certain public places that is caused or made worse by alcohol consumed there.

Clause 4 amended in accordance with Clause 2(2).

### 5 Interpretation

(1) In this Bylaw, unless the context otherwise requires, –

**Alcohol** has the meaning given by <u>section 5(1)</u> of the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012.

**Auckland** has the meaning given by <u>section 4(1)</u> of the Local Government (Auckland Council) Act 2009.

### Related information

The Local Government (Auckland Council) Act 2009 enabled the Local Government Commission to determine Auckland's boundaries in a map titled <u>LGC-Ak-R1</u>. The boundaries were formally adopted by <u>Order in Council</u> on 15 March 2010, and came into effect on 1 November 2010.



**Christmas / New Year holiday period** means Christmas Eve (the day before Christmas Day) to the day after New Year's Day as determined by the <u>Holidays</u> Act 2003.

**Council** means the Governing Body of the Auckland Council or any person delegated or authorised to act on its behalf.

### Related information about who can make an alcohol ban

Council has delegated the making of alcohol bans by resolution under clause 7 to -

- local boards for local parks, streets and carparks as at 30 October 2014 (GB/2014/121)
- the Regulatory Committee for areas of regional significance as at 30 October 2014 (GB2/2014/121)
- the Auckland Domain Committee for the Auckland Domain as at 1 November 2016 (GB/2016/237).

The Governing Body of Auckland Council is responsible for making alcohol bans in all other public places, and for any alcohol bans in Schedule 1.

**Public holiday** has the same meaning given in the Holidays Act 2003.

**Public place** has the meaning given by <u>section 147</u> of the Local Government Act 2002.

### **Related information**

The Local Government Act 2002 (as reprinted on 1 July 2018) states a public place –

- (a) means a place that is open to or is being used by the public, whether free or on payment of a charge, and whether any owner or occupier of the place is lawfully entitled to exclude or eject any person from it; but
- (b) does not include licensed premises.

Vehicle has the meaning given by section 2(1) of the Land Transport Act 1998.

- (2) Related information and links do not form part of this Bylaw and may be inserted, changed or removed without any formality.
- (3) The Interpretation Act 1999 applies to this Bylaw.

Clause 5 amended in accordance with Clause 2(2).

### Part 2

### Alcohol consumption and possession in public places

- 6 Alcohol prohibited in public places where an alcohol ban applies
- (1) A person must not consume, bring or possess alcohol in any public place or in any vehicle in any public place where
  - (a) an alcohol ban made by council in accordance with clause 7 of this Bylaw applies; or
  - (b) an alcohol ban in a Schedule of this Bylaw applies.
- (2) However, subclause (1) does not apply in those circumstances described in section <u>147(4)</u> or section <u>147(1)(b)</u> of the Local Government Act 2002.

### Related information about alcohol bans

A list of all alcohol bans made using clause 7 and related maps is attached at the end of this Bylaw for information only, and can be viewed on council's <u>website</u>.

### Related information about exceptions – Transport of alcohol

In <u>section 147(4)</u> of the Local Government Act 2002 (as reprinted on 26 March 2020), an alcohol ban does not apply in the case of alcohol in an unopened container to,—

- "(a) the transport of the alcohol from licensed premises next to a public place, if—
  - (i) it was lawfully bought on those premises for consumption off those premises; and
  - (ii) it is promptly removed from the public place; or
- (b) the transport of the alcohol from outside a public place for delivery to licensed premises next to the public place; or
- (c) the transport of the alcohol from outside a public place to premises next to a public place by, or for delivery to, a resident of the premises or his or her bona fide visitors; or
- (d) the transport of the alcohol from premises next to a public place to a place outside the public place if—
  - (i) the transport is undertaken by a resident of those premises; and
  - (ii) the alcohol is promptly removed from the public place."

This may include for example, transporting alcohol from a supermarket to your home, from your home to a BYO restaurant or from your home to a friend's house.

### Related information about exceptions – Licensed premises

In section 147(1)(b) of the Local Government Act 2002 (as reprinted on 26 March 2020), exceptions apply to an alcohol ban where a licence is held under the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012 (Subpart 1 of Part 2). This may include for example, buying alcohol at an event at a park that holds a special licence or dining on the footpath at a restaurant that holds an onlicence providing for BYO alcohol.

Clause 6 amended in accordance with Clause 2(2).

### Part 3

### **Controls**

### 7 Council may make an alcohol ban

- (1) Council may make an alcohol ban for the purpose of prohibiting or otherwise regulating or controlling, either generally or for one or more specified periods, any or all of the following:
  - (a) the consumption, bringing or possession of alcohol in public places; and
  - (b) in conjunction with (a), the presence or consumption of alcohol in vehicles, or vehicles of stated kinds or descriptions, in public places.
- (2) Council may amend, replace or revoke an alcohol ban in accordance with clause 8 with all necessary modifications.

Clause 7 amended in accordance with Clause 2(2).

### 8 Procedure for making an alcohol ban

- (1) Council must, before making an alcohol ban in clause 7
  - (a) comply with decision-making requirements under the Local Government Act 2002; and
  - (b) consider using one of the following standard times where appropriate in relation to the requirements in subclause 2(a)
    - (i) 24 hours, 7 days a week (at all times alcohol ban);
    - (ii) 7pm to 7am daily (evening alcohol ban);
    - (iii) 10pm to 7am daylight saving and 7pm to 7am outside daylight saving (night-time alcohol ban);
    - (iv) 7pm on the day before to 7am on the day after any weekend, public holiday or Christmas / New Year holiday period (weekend and holiday alcohol ban).

### Related information about making an alcohol ban

- An alcohol ban may be permanent or temporary:
  - a permanent alcohol ban applies to a place for long periods (for example a town centre or park 24 hours 7 days a week or 7pm to 7am daily)
  - a temporary alcohol ban applies to large scale events (for example a major concert, festival or sporting event).
- Council may make a permanent or temporary alcohol ban under clause 7 at a meeting of a local board, the Auckland Domain Committee or the Regulatory Committee or directly in a bylaw. The process to amend, replace or revoke an alcohol ban is similar to the process that made the ban. The Local Government Act 2002 (as reprinted on 26 March 2020) prescribes the criteria to make an alcohol ban in sections 147B (for resolutions) and 147A (for bylaws). The criteria cannot be changed by council.
- For alcohol bans made by resolution or in a bylaw, the statutory criteria requires:

- evidence of a high level of crime or disorder in the area caused by or made worse by alcohol consumption in that same area
- o the ban to be appropriate and proportionate in light of the crime or disorder
- o the ban to be justified as a reasonable limitation on people's rights and freedoms.
- For temporary alcohol bans in Schedule 1, the statutory criteria requires the alcohol ban to be justified as a reasonable limitation on people's rights and freedoms.
- Before making a decision, council must also comply with the general decision-making requirements under <u>Subpart 1 of Part 6</u> of the Local Government Act 2002 (as reprinted on 26 March 2020). This could include considering –
  - complementary or alternative solutions to an alcohol ban, for example locking gates, public bins, lighting, CCTV and Māori or Pacific Wardens
  - views of people likely to be affected by or interested in the alcohol ban, for example nearby residents or businesses, community groups, and the New Zealand Police
  - o the nature, severity and frequency of alcohol-related crime or disorder
  - o whether the crime or disorder is a result of displacement from an existing alcohol ban
  - o whether an alcohol ban would result in displacement of the crime or disorder
  - o whether a Crime Prevention through Environmental Design assessment is needed.
- Council must under clause 8 consider standard times to improve consistency in Auckland, however it may also consider other times more appropriate and proportionate in light of evidence.

### Related information about making an alcohol ban - making a request

 Members of the public (for example community groups, businesses and the New Zealand Police) may request council to make an alcohol ban at any time, with supporting evidence.

### Related information about alcohol ban signage

- Council uses alcohol ban signage to inform, educate and assist with enforcement.
- The Governor General may use <u>section 147C</u> of the Local Government Act 2002 (as reprinted on 26 March 2020) to make rules about alcohol ban signage. No rules have been made to date.

Clause 8 replaced in accordance with Clause 2(2).

### Part 4

### Enforcement powers, offences and penalties

- 9 Police can use statutory powers and other methods to enforce this Bylaw
- (1) A Police constable may use their powers under the <u>Local Government Act 2002</u> to enforce this Bylaw.

### Related information about enforcement

The New Zealand Police are responsible for enforcing alcohol bans and have powers relating to search, seizure and arrest under sections  $\underline{169}$  and  $\underline{170}$  of the Local Government Act 2002 (as reprinted on 26 March 2020).

Clause 9 amended in accordance with Clause 2(2).

### 10 A person can be penalised for not complying with this Bylaw

(1) A person who fails to comply with Part 2 of this Bylaw commits an offence and is liable to a penalty under the <u>Local Government Act 2002</u>.

### Related information about penalties

A person who breaches an alcohol ban commits an offence and is liable to an infringement fee of \$250 under section 4 of the Local Government (Alcohol Ban Breaches) Regulations 2013 (as printed on 18 December 2013).

Clause 10 amended in accordance with Clause 2(2).

### Part 5

### Savings and transitional provisions

### 11 Existing resolutions continue to apply

- (1) This clause applies to all resolutions made under this Bylaw prior to amendments in clause 2(2) coming into force.
- (2) Every resolution made continues to apply as if made after the amendments to this Bylaw until the expiration date specified in the resolution or until amended, replaced or revoked by council, whichever comes first.

Clause 11 inserted in accordance with Clause 2(2).

### 12 Existing inquiries to be completed under this Bylaw

(1) Any compliance or enforcement action by council under this Bylaw that was not completed prior to amendments in clause 2(2) coming into force will continue to be actioned under this Bylaw as if the amendments had not been made.

Clause 12 inserted in accordance with Clause 2(2).



### In this Schedule:

- "Major events" has the same meaning as "large scale events" in section <u>147A</u> of the Local Government Act 2002.
- The alcohol bans in the table above apply if a major event is held on all or part of a venue stated.

### Related information about event-based (temporary) alcohol bans

- More information on major events can be found in council's <u>Events Policy</u>. The policy describes
  major events as events that have a regional, national and international profile. Examples of major
  events where a temporary alcohol ban could apply include concerts (Six60 at Western Springs),
  festivals (Lantern Festival at Auckland Domain), and sporting events (Warriors at Mount Smart).
- There are two Eden Park Fan Trails. One is a 2.3 kilometre walking route to Eden Park activated on 'match days', starting at Western Park on Ponsonby Road. The second was activated last during the 2011 Rugby World Cup and is a 4 kilometre walking route to Eden Park from Queen Street.









(as at 30 October 2014)

Made by Governing Body of Auckland Council

**Resolution in Council** 

30 October 2014

Pursuant to section 145 and 147 of the Local Government Act 2002, the Governing Body of Auckland Council makes the following bylaw about alcohol control matters.

### Part 1 Preliminary provisions

### 1 Title

(1) This bylaw is the Alcohol Control Bylaw 2014.

### 2 Commencement

(1) This bylaw comes into force on 18 December 2014.

### 3 Application

(1) This bylaw applies to Auckland.

### 4 Purpose

(1) The purpose of this bylaw is to control the consumption or possession of alcohol in public places to reduce alcohol related harm.

### 5 Interpretation

(1) In this bylaw, unless the context otherwise requires, -

**Auckland** has the meaning given by the Local Government (Auckland Council) Act 2010.

Explanatory Note: As at 20 September 2011, the definition in section 4 of the Local Government (Auckland Council) Act 2009 "...means the area within the boundaries determined by the Local Government Commission under section 33(1) (as that determination is given effect to by Order in Council under section 35(1))".

**Alcohol** has the meaning given by section 5(1) of the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012.

Explanatory Note: As at 01 April 2014, the definition in section 5(1) of the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012 "... means a substance—

- (a) that
  - is or contains a fermented, distilled, or spirituous liquor; and
  - (ii) at 20°C is found on analysis to contain 1.15% or more ethanol by volume; or
- (b) that—
  - (i) is a frozen liquid, or a mixture of a frozen liquid and another substance or substances; and
  - (ii) is alcohol (within the meaning of paragraph (a)) when completely thawed to 20°C; or
- (c) that, whatever its form, is found on analysis to contain 1.15% or more ethanol by weight in a form that can be assimilated by people."

**Christmas / New Year holiday period** means Christmas Eve (the day before Christmas Day) to the day after New Year's Day as determined by the Holidays Act 2003.

Explanatory Note: As at 01 April 2014, section 45 of the Holidays Act 2003 specifies that where the public holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday, the

public holiday must be treated as falling on the following Monday or Tuesday respectively.

**Community-focused solutions** mean alternative or complementary measures to an alcohol ban to reduce alcohol related harm. Examples include crime prevention through environmental design, local community initiatives, discussions with nearby licensees, youth and leadership development programmes, and partnering with Police, Ministry of Justice, sports clubs and town centre / business associations.

**Council** means the Governing Body of the Auckland Council or any person delegated to act on its behalf.

Explanatory Note: A list of delegations may be attached to this bylaw for information only purposes.

**Licensed premises** has the meaning given by section 5(1) of the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012.

Explanatory Note: As at 01 April 2014, the definition in section 5(1) of the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012 "... means any premises for which a licence [under the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012] is held."

**Public holiday** has the same meaning given in the Holidays Act 2003.

Explanatory Note: As at 01 January 2014, the definition of public holiday in section 44 of the Holidays Act 2014 means "...

- (a) Christmas Day:
- (b) Boxing Day:
- (c) New Year's Day:
- (d) 2 January:
- (e) Waitangi Day:
- (f) Good Friday:
- (g) Easter Monday:
- (h) ANZAC Day:
- (i) the birthday of the reigning Sovereign (observed on the first Monday in June):
- (j) Labour Day (being the fourth Monday in October):
- (k) the day of the anniversary of a province or the day locally observed as that day."

**Public place** has the meaning given by section 147 of the Local Government Act 2002.

Explanatory Note: As at 01 April 2014, the definition in section 147 of the Local Government Act 2002 "...

- (a) means a place that is open to or is being used by the public, whether free or on payment of a charge, and whether any owner or occupier of the place is lawfully entitled to exclude or eject any person from it; but
- (b) does not include licensed premises."

- (2) The Interpretation Act 1999 applies to this bylaw.
- (3) Explanatory notes and additional information attached at the end of this bylaw are for information purposes only, do not form part of this bylaw, and may be made, amended, revoked or replaced by the council at any time without a formal process.

### Part 2 Control of alcohol

### 6 Alcohol bans

(1) Every person is prohibited from consuming, bringing into, or possessing alcohol in any public place (including in a vehicle) in contravention of an alcohol ban made by the council in accordance with clause 7(1).

Explanatory note: As at 01 April 2014 under section 147(4) of the Local Government Act 2002, the prohibition in clause 6(1) does not apply to alcohol in an unopened container in the following circumstances "...

- (a) the transport of the alcohol from licensed premises next to a public place, if—
  - (i) it was lawfully bought on those premises for consumption off those premises; and
  - (ii) it is promptly removed from the public place; or
- (b) the transport of the alcohol from outside a public place for delivery to licensed premises next to the public place; or
- (c) the transport of the alcohol from outside a public place to premises next to a public place by, or for delivery to, a resident of the premises or his or her bona fide visitors; or
- (d) the transport of the alcohol from premises next to a public place to a place outside the public place if—
  - (i) the transport is undertaken by a resident of those premises: and
  - (ii) the alcohol is promptly removed from the public place."

### 7 Making alcohol bans

- (1) The council may make an alcohol ban for the purpose of prohibiting or otherwise regulating or controlling, either generally or for one or more specified periods, any or all of the following:
  - (a) the consumption, bringing into or possession of alcohol in public places; and
  - (b) in conjunction with (a), the presence or consumption of alcohol in vehicles, or vehicles of stated kinds or descriptions, in public places.
- (2) The council must, before making an alcohol ban in clause 7(1)
  - (a) be satisfied that the alcohol ban gives effect to the purpose of the bylaw; and
  - (b) comply with the decision-making requirements under Subpart 1 of Part 6 of the Local Government Act 2002; and

- (c) comply with the criteria under section 147B of the Local Government Act 2002 as follows
  - (i) be satisfied that there is documented evidence that the area to which the alcohol ban will apply has experienced a high level of crime or disorder that can be shown to have been caused or made worse by alcohol consumption in the area; and
  - (ii) be satisfied that the alcohol ban is appropriate and proportionate in light of the evidence and can be justified as a reasonable limitation on people's rights and freedoms; and
- (e) investigate and where appropriate, implement community-focused solutions as an alternative to or to complement an alcohol ban; and
- (f) consider the views of the New Zealand Police; and
- (g) consider the views of Maori; and
- (h) consider the views of owners, occupiers, or persons that council has reason to believe are representative of the interests of owners or occupiers, of premises within the area to which the alcohol ban will apply; and
- (i) consider the following times, where appropriate and not contrary to the requirements in subclause (2)(c)
  - (i) 24 hours, 7 days a week (at all times alcohol ban);
  - (ii) 7pm to 7am daily (evening alcohol ban);
  - (iii) 10pm to 7am daylight saving and 7pm to 7am outside daylight saving (night time alcohol ban);
  - (iv) 7pm on the day before to 7am on the day after any weekend, public holiday or Christmas / New Year holiday period (weekend and holiday alcohol ban).

Explanatory note: The times in clause 7(2)(f) are a guide to improve consistency in times across Auckland, but recognises that in some instances use of the times specified may be clearly disproportionate to the evidence of the problem and therefore contrary to the statutory requirements in clause 7(2)(c) that requires alcohol bans be proportionate in light of the evidence.

(3) The council may, at any time, amend or revoke an alcohol ban in accordance with clause 7(1) and 7(2) with the necessary modifications.

### 8 Signage

- (1) The council may make controls on any or all of the following in relation to signage for alcohol ban areas subject to compliance with any regulations under section 147C of the Local Government Act 2002:
  - (a) require the council to erect and maintain signs indicating the existence or boundaries of an alcohol ban;
  - (b) describe the placement of the signs
  - (c) prescribe kinds of signs required to be erected and maintained (including, without limitation, content, images, maps, size, lettering, symbols, and colouring).

### Part 3 Enforcement, offences, penalties

### 9 Enforcement

- (1) A constable may use their powers under the Local Government Act 2002 to enforce this bylaw.
- (2) In addition to their general powers under sections 169 and 170 of the Local Government Act 2002, the Police may exercise the power under section 170(2) of that Act (to search a container or vehicle immediately and without further notice) on specified dates or in relation to specified events notified in accordance with section 170(3) of that Act.

Explanatory note: As at 01 April 2014 under section 169 and 170 of the Local Government Act 2002, a constable has powers of arrest, search and seizure in relation to alcohol bans.

### 10 Offences and penalties

- (1) Every person who breaches this bylaw commits an offence.
- (2) Every person who commits an offence under this bylaw is liable to a penalty under the Local Government Act 2002.

Explanatory note: As at 29 October 2013 the penalty for breaching an alcohol ban is an infringement fee of \$250 under the Local Government (Alcohol Ban Breaches) Regulations 2013.

# Purpose of the report

The information in this report summarises feedback received through an online feedback form on proposed changes to the Alcohol Control Bylaw 2014 during the public consultation period from 10 October to 13 November 2020. This includes feedback from a People's Panel survey open from 29 October until 4 November 2020.

Proposed changes would make new temporary alcohol bans for all major events at Pukekawa / Auckland Domain, Eden Park, Rarotonga / Mount Smart Stadium, and Waiōrea / Western Springs Stadium in the Bylaw; replace rules already covered by existing legislation or policy with a 'related information' note; clarify exceptions to alcohol bans and council's ability to make alcohol bans; and make the Bylaw wording easier to understand.

All feedback and local board and Auckland Domain Committee views will be considered by a Bylaw Panel at a public meeting scheduled for March 2021. The Bylaw Panel will use the feedback to make recommendations on the proposal to the Governing Body at a public meeting scheduled for April 2021.



- 70 per cent or more of submitters on each of Proposals 1A E agreed with new temporary alcohol bans for major events at four regional event venues in Auckland.
- 70 per cent of submitters agreed with Proposal 2 about replacing clauses covered by existing legislation or policy with a 'related information' note, to remove duplication.
- 87 per cent of submitters agreed with Proposal 3 about clarifying the Bylaw wording, exceptions to alcohol bans and council's ability to make temporary alcohol bans.
- The main theme to come out of the other feedback collected was that alcohol bans are useful, important and improve outcomes.
- The feedback was generally positive towards temporary alcohol bans across event venues in Auckland, for the main reason that they would reduce alcohol-related crime and disorder and improve public safety.





















#### Māori feedback

Of the 157 responses to this question, 17 of the submitters identified as Māori. Of these, 65 per cent supported the proposal.

Māori views differed to the rest of the submitters, with the main theme that it creates clearer, more efficient and enforceable rules.

#### Attachment E - 'Have Your Say' event feedback

An in-person 'Have Your Say' event<sup>1</sup> was held on 20 October 2020

A stall at the Central City Library enabled members of the public to have their say The stall included a table, chairs, council flag and posters of the proposals on signage boards (including maps of proposed new temporary alcohol ban areas). It provided:

- post-it notes, dot stickers, and pens to record feedback on proposal posters
- hard copies of the feedback form
- flyers about the proposal
- hard copies of the Statement of Proposal and proposed new bylaw.

#### Members of the public engaged with staff and the Bylaw Panel about the proposals<sup>2</sup>

- 19 members of the public spoke to council representatives about the proposals, of which:
  - 15 took a flyer outlining the proposals and ways to have their say
  - four posted dot stickers and post-it notes in agree and disagree columns on the proposal posters:
    - Three people agreed and one person disagreed with Proposals 1A E about proposed new temporary alcohol bans.
    - No one engaged with Proposals 2 and 3 about making the Bylaw easier to understand.

#### Comments included that:

- the member of the public does not like alcohol and supports anything restricting it
- if people must buy alcohol at the venue rather than bring their own, venues could offer lower-alcohol drinks or cheaper alcohol.
- the proposed temporary alcohol bans could disproportionately affect vulnerable communities or young people more likely to interact with the Police and drink outside venues.

#### Attachment F: Operational and non-Bylaw-related feedback

Feedback was received on operational and non-bylaw-related matters (summarised below) alongside feedback on the proposal. These matters will be shared with relevant council staff to consider as operational matters.



#### Alcohol ban signage

Comments included recommendations to:

- include Alcohol Drug Helpline information on some or all alcohol ban signage
- use simpler, larger, more uniform signage to reduce costs and improve understanding
- include on signage common languages, image representations, and information about exceptions to alcohol bans
- place signage on main roads, event venue entrances, around eateries and bottle stores
- reduce the use of signage due to visual amenity concerns
- increase the use of signage for enforceability
- improve and update existing signage (for example, outdated Manukau City Council signage).

There were also other comments about:

- the importance of clear, prominent signage for awareness and enforcement
- concern about a reduction in signage or extra, costly signage
- no need for signage if alcohol is banned.



#### **Enforcement**

Comments included recommendations to:

- provide consistent and greater enforcement for event bans and existing bans, for example at Mission Bay and in Manurewa
- pass any costs onto licenced premises
- introduce tougher penalties for breaching bans and for disorderly intoxicated people.

There were also other comments about:

- the importance of other alcohol harm reduction measures to address any displacement of harm to a different area
- the importance of alcohol ban enforcement (including for exceptions) and the need for more enforcement, especially on public transport
- the importance for bans and other bylaws to be easily understood and enforceable
- ensuring event organisers are responsible for following exception rules
- concern about enforcement costs and responsibility for enforcing BYO and licensed premises rules.



#### **Central government legislation**

Comments included recommendations to:

- provide stronger penalties for alcohol offences
- advocate for legislation change to enable council to add or remove alcohol ban exceptions
- revise the term 'alcohol ban' as it is not reflective of current bans and exceptions
- increase tax on alcohol

Another comment noted frustration with council's implementation role of central government legislation it cannot change.



#### **Education**

Comments included recommendations to reduce alcohol-related harm by:

- improving awareness of alcohol bans
- providing classes about safe drinking
- advertising against excessive drinking and public intoxication
- limiting advertising and alcohol sponsorship to address binge-drinking culture
- better using Provisional Local Alcohol Policy to send clearer message about acceptability of alcohol and its role in the community
- promoting healthy drinking instead of restricting alcohol access to licensed premises, which increases venue revenue.

There were also other comments about:

- the importance of public and event organiser awareness of bans
- methods for bans to be communicated consistently and efficiently including through signage, posters, advertising, and QR codes for event bans.



#### **Event implementation**

Comments included recommendations to:

- address rise in use of party pills and MDMA that could be further increased by an alcohol ban by introducing testing and support services such as <u>Know Your Stuff</u> and Red Frogs
- ensure events staff (including in hospitality, security, emergency services) are trained to identify and manage people who are intoxicated or under the influence
- ensure information is available to support people removed from the venue due to intoxication or possession of banned substances
- introduce regularly serviced toilet facilities on the Eden Park Fan Trails
- encourage non-alcoholic or healthy food alternatives/subsidise a soft drink bar
- · restrict alcohol to designated, well-distributed areas within the venue
- ban cannabis and other psychoactive substances, public urination, intoxicated people from attending events, smoking and vaping
- ensure litter clean-up post-event
- address issues that could cause drinking outside the venue, such as high prices, waiting times, restrictions on range availability or quantities
- contain all rules for alcohol and drug use at events in one location
- reconsider Coca-Cola sponsorship of 'Christmas in the Park' due to health and waste concerns about the company
- ensure strong communication of event alcohol bans for those not attending.



#### **Licensed premises**

- Comments included recommendations to:
  - o reduce the number of licensed premises
  - o prohibit or reduce new licences in lower-income areas
  - o ban drinking in public places aside from licensed premises.

#### Other comments included:

- to amend how licensed premises operate:
  - prohibit alcohol sale at concerts and to intoxicated people
  - control alcohol prices, total quantity allowed to be sold, and quantity sold per person from supermarkets
  - ban sale of alcohol in glass bottles
  - prohibit external bar areas and tables and chairs on footpaths
- licensed premises in an alcohol ban area reduces ban efficacy and sends a conflicting message to the public
- to amend BYO rules:
  - allow BYO of alcohol in opened container
  - ban intoxicated people from BYO
  - limit alcohol brought to BYO restaurants
  - allow BYO at all restaurants.
