WHAT HAPPENS AT A HEARING

At the start of the hearing, the Chairperson will introduce the commissioners and council staff and will briefly outline the procedure. The Chairperson may then call upon the parties present to introduce themselves to the panel. The Chairperson is addressed as Mr Chairman or Madam Chair.

Any party intending to give written or spoken evidence in Māori or speak in sign language should advise the hearings advisor at least five working days before the hearing so that a qualified interpreter can be provided.

Catering is not provided at the hearing. Please note that the hearing may be audio recorded.

Scheduling submitters to be heard

A timetable will be prepared approximately one week before the hearing for all submitters who have returned their hearing attendance form. Please note that during the course of the hearing changing circumstances may mean the proposed timetable is delayed or brought forward. Submitters wishing to be heard are requested to ensure they are available to attend the hearing and present their evidence when required. The hearings advisor will advise submitters of any changes to the timetable at the earliest possible opportunity.

The Hearing Procedure

The usual hearing procedure is:

- The applicant will be called upon to present his/her case. The applicant may be represented by legal counsel or consultants and may call witnesses in support of the application. After the applicant has presented his/her case, members of the hearing panel may ask questions to clarify the information presented.
- The relevant local board may wish to present comments. These comments do not constitute a
 submission however the Local Government Act allows the local board to make the interests and
 preferences of the people in its area known to the hearing panel. If present, the local board will
 speak between the applicant and any submitters.
- Submitters (for and against the application) are then called upon to speak. Submitters may also be
 represented by legal counsel or consultants and may call witnesses on their behalf. The hearing
 panel may then question each speaker. The council officer's report will identify any submissions
 received outside of the submission period. At the hearing, late submitters may be asked to address
 the panel on why their submission should be accepted. Late submitters can speak only if the
 hearing panel accepts the late submission.
- Should you wish to present written information (evidence) in support of your application or your submission please ensure you provide the number of copies indicated in the notification letter.
- Only members of the hearing panel can ask questions about submissions or evidence. Attendees
 may suggest questions for the panel to ask but it does not have to ask them. No cross-examination
 either by the applicant or by those who have lodged submissions is permitted at the hearing.
- After the applicant and submitters have presented their cases, the chairperson may call upon council officers to comment on any matters of fact or clarification.
- When those who have lodged submissions and wish to be heard have completed their
 presentations, the applicant or his/her representative has the right to summarise the application
 and reply to matters raised by submitters. Hearing panel members may further question the
 applicant at this stage.
- The chairperson then generally closes the hearing and the applicant, submitters and their representatives leave the room. The hearing panel will then deliberate "in committee" and make its decision.
- Decisions are usually available within 15 working days of the hearing.

I oppose much of this application however I think the environmental impact is the most devasting for this area. It surprises me that this is even being considered given the amount ofwork that has been done to save the Kauri in the area due to Kauri dieback, Yet critically endangered natives including Kauri are set to be bulldozed which both would destroy at risk plants and ecosystms and could potentially spread Kauri dieback further. This area is the gateway to the Waitakere ranges and the disruption to the area for many years will have significant impact on visitors to the area due to congestion and it's not a good look to tourists seeing us removing trees at a time it is critical to keep them. NZ is seen a clean green. Local visitors will also be down. Therefore several business's around the Titiirangi village could be affected which in turn will be damaging to the local economy. The roads are not wide enough to cope with the trucks and the every day traffic possibly not strong enough to cope with the volume and the weight. It is frightening to think what will be enountered on those winding roads with tight corners with such volume. Not only will this quiet neighbourhood have to deal with a huge volume of heavy trucks (with dirty fumes affecting the environment albeit) the noise will be will not be pleaseant for both the immeadiate residents but also for the local schools and kindys porentially disrupting learning. Also this raises concerns around the safety of our children(and adults for that matter around the large trucks) particulary at peak times. With the traffic in mind this too is going to cause huge commutor delays as it is pretty much one road in and one road out. This will not just be one month of disruption but YEARS of it. Whilst I am not in the immediate area of construction I worry about those that are and how that is going to affect their property values. Would you want to live in a house with such close proximity to a water plant?

Whilst I do not live in the immediate area I do live in Titirangi which has a strong community of individuals that care for the environment. I cannot sit back and not have a say in the matter that potentially will have a devasting effect on local community but wider Auckland too, It's the gateway to avery significant part of Auckland and NZ. I for one am not going to be impacted as far my commute to work goes but it is likely that I will be less inclined to go to the beaches out that way of perhaps not go to the village for a coffee due to the congestion. Imagine how many people will be thinking the same and how much impact that will have.

I would like the council to challange Watercare to look at options that are going to be less invasive and less disruptive on the environment and a community. Consider other areas or look at their existing site (can that be upgraded for instance??)

My concern relates to the significant volume of excavation (87,000m3) and specifically the proposal for most of this (at least 52,000m3) to be disposed off site. In the interests of responsible and sustainable soil management, minimising carbon emissions and minimising traffic congestion, I consider that the proposal warrants a thorough analysis of opportunities to retain soil on site, and a clear commitment to utilising any appropriate disposal facilities that are in proximity to the development. I note that the proposal has alluded to a possible alternative landfill site at Parau which could accommodate 66,000 to 100,000 m3 of material (ie potentially all of it) and acknowledge that further details are to be confirmed in the CTMP. However, given that the impacts of disposing of soil off-site are not insignificant, I would consider that a detailed analysis of options and effects is warranted.

I love the bush, and was deeply saddened when the Council and iwi closed the Waitakere Ranges due to Kauri dieback, but continue to stay away from restricted areas as losing these beautiful trees would be catastrophic. How can the council pretend to care about Kauri, native bush and trees in general, and then consent the removal of significant bushland? The movement of earth from the proposed site would not only endanger more native forest through the transfer of contaminated soil, but also be an excessive burden on the Titirangi, Laingholm, and Woodlands Park communities. The proposed road -Scenic Drive - for removing the soil is inappropriate on many levels. The road is too narrow and windy for the number and size of vehicles proposed. I have had many close calls on that road with trucks and buses crossing the centre line. I find it hard to believe that two large trucks moving in opposite directions could negotiate that space - and consistently over an extended period of time. As a runner and walker, Scenic Drive is a key pathway leading from the Village to Exhibition Drive. Trucks tend to flick debris up from their wheels - I have been hit by flying stones and dirt a number of times over the years. This project would make this piece of footpath unpassable. Further, living in Woodlands Park, AT do not provide a bus service on a Sunday, leaving biking the only means for our teenagers to meet with friends. Woodlands Park Road and Scenic Drive are the only safe roads to do this on. Scenic Drive itself has dropped significantly twice over the 5 or so years, and in the last instance took more than a year to remedy. I oppose this application in its entirety, for the reasons outlined below.

1. Proposed site

1.1 Attempts to preserve local ecology have been limited

The Waima site was chosen following assessment of a long list of sites – as outlined by a Tomkin & Taylor report provided on WaterCare's website (was available at https://www.watercare.co.nz/SiteCollectionDocuments/AllPDFs/FINAL_Longlist_report_24_06_16_v3.pdf, but has been removed) and I have significant concerns that this site, compared with the alternatives, is not a future proof option, nor in line with the Auckland Unitary Plan.

The Tomkin and Taylor report states the site is confined, and there is little room to expand without moving into significant ecological areas and/or areas that are steep and difficult to build upon and there is little flexibility in avoiding such areas. By my interpretation of the documents provided by WaterCare, this does not make this site the clear future proof option that is required as a solution for greater Auckland.

From a practical standpoint as a water treatment solution, the site appears to be fairly average (Tonkin and Taylor report). Several of the long listed sites scored almost the same as this one. Given there were several long listed sites that would not have removed this extent of valuable vegetation, proposals of smaller split sites, and space on the current site for improvements, it is clear that there are alternatives that do not have such an impact on the environment. Watercare's decision to use this site states "There are currently no plans with regards to the future use of the existing site if it is not the preferred option. The retention of the site would allow Watercare the opportunity to utilise the site for water treatment purposes in the future" (Site Selection for Replacement of Huia Water Treatment Plant, Capex C-12205, 30 May 2019, section 7) If this is the case why can more of the current site not be used now, to truly avoid the ecological damage proposed in this application?

Watercare has made one concession to the environment, the movement of one reservoir from an endangered wetland. However, there is still significant destruction of the environment at the remaining reservoir site. To our community the environment includes all the trees, not just the large ones. There are also significant areas of the old water treatment plant that will be disused. There are historically listed buildings on this site, which there are no provisions for maintaining (note that the historically listed Nihotupu Filter station also owned by Watercare is in a state of disrepair, and there has been no sign of commitment to maintaining listed in the area buildings by Watercare). If a significant effort had been made to protect the environment of the site, a meaningful use of these historic buildings would be to include administrative offices, and features such as the proposed visitor centre could and should be incorporated into the existing site, potentially reducing the footprint in ecologically sensitive areas.

The choice of the Manuka Road site was justified largely on the basis that the ecology of the land was low value. This has been shown by the ecological reports since conducted not to be the case – "As a whole, indigenous vegetation within the Project Site meets Auckland Unitary Plan SEA criteria of representativeness, rarity, diversity, buffering and connective linkages. According to the Ecological Institute of Australia

and New Zealand (EIANZ) method for assessment of ecological value, the Project Site rates "High" for three out of four assessment matters (rarity/ distinctiveness, diversity/pattern, ecological context), and achieves an overall ecological valueranking of "Very High". (Boffa Miskell Ltd, Huia Water Treatment Plant Replacement, Assessment of Ecological Effects, 26 July 2019, p99". Little to no alterations to the planned footprint of the plant have been made following the clear findings of the ecological reports that the plant is deserving of its status as an significant ecological area (SEA).

1.2 Impacts on the character of the community

The community of Waima is a small bush community. Until recently, on the council GIS viewer, the proposed site was listed as a significant ecological area (SEA) (and indeed it holds this status, and the ecological reports confirm this status). In several council maps it was shown as regional park. The designation 'for water treatment purposes' that this site carries is also across a wide area of the local Waitakere ranges, and so it was a surprise to many that an industrial building of this scale could be built under this designation.

This site is at the entry to the Waitakere ranges and is the primary route taken by tourists to the West Coast beaches. If a prolonged building impacted this route, it would impact the Arotaki Visitor Centre, the impression of New Zealand given to tourists, and even beyond the building of this site the attraction of the area to tourists (including the tourist trade in Titirangi Village itself). The road called 'Scenic Drive', starts at Titirangi roundabout and passes right through the Waitakere ranges, an industrial plant of this scale in Waima would warrant a name change for the road.

Waima has very few amenities, and is not just another suburb of Auckland. Many streets have no pavements, and the properties in the area are clearly bush living, with large trees that are of a similar age to those of the proposed treatment plant site (Figure 1). We have significant areas of native bush on our properties and take pride in this. Work on individual properties and removal of trees is restricted as almost all of the area is within a significant ecological area (SEA). Almost all the bush in the Waitakere ranges is regenerating, as is the proposed site. If the intention had been to build a water treatment plant here, Watercare had the opportunity to maintain the land, and to oppose the SEA status. As the owner of land in this SEA, whose own property is and should be protected by the SEA Figure 1: Waima Crescent, 500m from proposed site. despite having been developed in the last



100 years, my belief is that Watercare has an obligation to maintain the forest to match the nature of the community that has evolved.

The current site is an eyesore, which will remain due to the historic building status attached to it. There is a further eyesore at the top of the hill (the Nihotupu Filter Site, which is disgracefully poorly maintained by Watercare as a historic site). The issue for most local residents is not that there will be one treatment plant on the street, but there will be three, with two of them rotting away uncared for. All for a small increase in 'water supply', which is reliant on water actually being available in the local dams, which has been the an issue over last several vears (https://www.stuff.co.nz/environment/115144382/auckland-water-shortage-storagedams-remain-lower-than-last-year).

1.3 Future proofing?

The site is very confined. Auckland is growing at an incredible rate and the time for construction is eight years. There is no scope for expansion beyond destroying more and more of the local significant ecological area. Almost every other long-listed site was able to expand, this site seems to be a short-sighted choice. Indeed the site design includes "No vacant areas for future upgrades in capacity." (BUN60339272-CSiteLayout.pdf, GHD | Report for Watercare Services Limited - Huia Replacement Water Treatment Plant , 51/33575/05, p10), so 3.5 Ha of significant ecological value are to be destroyed for short-term gain.

1.4 Stability assessments

It is clear from the documents outlining stability assessments, including response to council requests for further information, that complete stability assessments have not been conducted. It is also clear to residents in the area that the area around the site including Scenic Drive and Exhibition Drive are prone to slips, with at least 2-3 slips happening on steep ground per year in the area. It seems to be a major risk to defer appropriate stability assessments until vegetation has been removed.

The vegetation of the land appears to be used as an excuse for incomplete stability assessments, and traffic impact assessments. Given these have major potential impacts proper assessments of these risks should be conducted.

2. Traffic and suitability of local roads

"Existing traffic volumes for roads surrounding the site have been surveyed. The Average Daily Traffic (ADT) volume on Woodlands Park Road is 5,135 vehicles, with 3% heavy vehicles, which is around 154 heavy vehicles per day. The existing daily traffic volume on Scenic Drive (just south of the Titirangi Roundabout) is 7,325 vehicles, 4% of which is heavy vehicles, which is 293 heavy vehicles per day. Heavy vehicles include buses, rigid trucks and articulated trucks (including truck and trailers), as well as any occasional over-dimensional vehicles." (BUN60339273-M1TrafficTransport.pdf, CH2M Beca, 10 July 2019, 6513515,NZ1-16108720-17 2.0, page 1)

Traffic flow appears to be modelled at Titirangi roundabout, at AM peak, inter Peak and PM peak. The data used for this modelling is same data acquired in Feb 2017 described in Appendix A. Appendix A suggests this is Tube count data — not data acquired from human counts (this make sense given the 24 hour collection of data). No info on actual methodologies is given, however, this can be found in documentation for tube counts (http://www.gw.govt.nz/assets/Transport/2013-transport-model-update/TN1-Data-Collection-v2.pdf). Heavy vehicles are determined by axle configuration. It should be noted that in most tube counts, heavy vehicles include

'medium vehicles' (i.e. vans, utes, Camper Vans). This seems like an important distinction, as heavy vehicles like trucks are rarely seen on Scenic Drive or Woodlands Park Road. It also seems unusual that the traffic flow data would be acquired at the same time as a scheduled 'Scenic Drive Remediation Project'.

In the seven years I have been living in the area I have rarely seen any 'heavy vehicles' other than buses, and vans (i.e. vehicles operated by small companies and tradesmen). The report estimates that currently on Woodlands Park Road that there are 154 heavy vehicle movements per day. Spreading that 'load' evenly over 24 hours, that is more than six 'heavy vehicle' movements per hour, or one every ten minutes. If that were the case almost every time I leave the house and run/walk to Titirangi Village (2km) I would see a number of heavy vehicles. This is simply not the case. This is even more unlikely if you factor in the fact that traffic counts show almost zero traffic movements overnight. Using the same methods to calculate heavy vehicles on scenic drive, there are 293 movements per day, an astounding heavy vehicle per 5 minutes. If there is a case for justifying over a hundred truck-and-trailer movements per day during construction on the basis that there are already many heavy vehicle movements, then apples need to be compared to apples and a count of truck and trailer movements needs to be conducted.

On Tuesday 13 August 2019 I ran along Woodlands Park Road/Scenic Drive once, and walked the route twice. In the 12 minutes it to me to run this route at 9am I saw no heavy vehicles (no buses, trucks, or semi-trailers), in the 25 minutes it took me to walk it commencing at 2:39pm I saw one heavy vehicle (a bus), in the 23 minute return journey commencing at 3:36pm I saw 4 heavy vehicles (all buses). This is consistent with bus timetables showing 25 public buses and 8 school buses on weekdays (which Scenic Woodlands along Drive and Park Road, https://at.govt.nz/media/1980457/wn03 new-lynn feb-2019-web.pdf, https://at.govt.nz/bus-train-ferry/timetables/school-timetables/glen-edenintermediate/. https://at.govt.nz/bus-train-ferry/timetables/school-timetables/greenbay-high/). Watercare themselves state there are 1-2 heavy vehicle movements per day associated with the current plant (BUN60339273-M1TrafficTransport.pdf, CH2M Beca, 10 July 2019, 6513515,NZ1-16108720-17 2.0, page 19). Together these account for 34 true heavy vehicle movements per day. Given the lack of industry in the area, and my experience on local roads, it is difficult to believe there could be more than a handful of additional heavy vehicle movements that are comparable to those that will occur due to the construction (these are truly heavy truck and trailer movements). Very little attention is given in the resource consent application to the movement of large trucks on scenic drive, but it is clear from the photographs provided in the application that it is very difficult for these very large vehicles to move on this windy road without crossing the centreline. If there were to be 100 truck movements a day on these roads (which there certainly are not now), then how will these vehicles be able to pass one another when they come in opposite directions (13 to 17 per hour as stated in the application is one movement every 2-3 minutes along a very narrow, windy road, which includes double apex bends and has barely been mentioned in assessments of the route, Scenic Drive)? The proposed solution to loop truck movements will only partially address this problem as trucks meeting scheduled buses will likely become an issue.

Table 4.3 in the Traffic Management report is misleading, it equates a semi-trailer to a small rigid truck that might be used by a tradesperson. This is not a fair representation of the heavy vehicles observed by locals in the area (BUN60339273-M1TrafficTransport.pdf, CH2M Beca, 10 July 2019, 6513515,NZ1-16108720-17 2.0, page 47). All figures showing only a small increase in 'heavy vehicle' traffic along the entire proposed route are similarly misleading.

Tables 4.1-4.4 seem to miss the fact that although the roads in the area have capacity to carry extra traffic (i.e. extra cars), this is not the same as the capacity, or the structural integrity to carry such a large number of trucks.

Schools and School Bus Services (BUN60339273-M1TrafficTransport.pdf, CH2M Beca, 10 July 2019, 6513515,NZ1-16108720-17 2.0, page 19)

It seems like the applicants have considered only the impact of schools on increased traffic in the area, not the impact of heavy vehicle movements/construction on people picking and dropping their children off at school. There are multiple schools beyond the proposed site (Woodlands Park Primary, Laingholm School) where parents need to be able to 1) get their kids to school and commute to the City, and 2) pick their children up in a timely manner. There are also 4 school buses in the AM/PM that currently use Woodlands Park Road at a later time of day than the short period allowed by the applicants to avoid disruption. These schools need to be factored in to assessments of the appropriateness of traffic management plans.


"Woodlands Park Road has a single footpath located adjacent to the proposed WTP site with a narrow unpaved shoulder not suitable for on-road cycling on the eastbound traffic lane...These recreational users are generally observed to be using Woodlands Park Road to access the Exhibition Drive track located at the corner of Scenic Drive and Woodlands Park Road, but some will potentially be walking to/from Titirangi along Scenic Drive, including some school children"_(BUN60339273-M1TrafficTransport.pdf, CH2M Beca, 10 July 2019, 6513515,NZ1-16108720-17 2.0, page 23,24)

The section of the application describing cyclist use of the roads near the propose site provides no meaningful analysis on the impact of construction on cyclists (BUN60339273-M1TrafficTransport.pdf). There are clearly cyclists who commute along the truck routes (see traffic report), and I have regularly commuted to the City on a bicycle along this route. Nobody should, or would be cycling on the unpaved shoulder (which I would describe as a culvert), all cyclists use the road. This is currently reliant on a mutual respect between drivers and cyclists which would clearly be impacted by the proposed significant increase in heavy vehicles.

The regular use of Scenic Drive to access the Waitakere Ranges by 'serious cyclists' (evidenced by the large number of people in lycra in Titirangi Village on weekend and summer mornings) also needs to be addressed and is completely lacking in this report. Many occupants of Titirangi also access Exhibition Drive to run and/or Cycle along Scenic Drive from Titirangi Roundabout. By searching Strava for segments in the area, I can see several cycling segments, including one covering this portion of Scenic Drive

('The Scenic Drive Gauntlet'), which has 758 individuals who have recorded *at least* one time this year (Figure 1).

These activities will be severely impacted in terms of safety for the duration of construction. The weekend activities proposed in the Traffic Management Report need to factor in the use of this road by pack cyclists (BUN60339273-M1TrafficTransport.pdf, CH2M Beca, 10 July 2019, 6513515,NZ1-16108720-17 2.0, page 47).



"For the Titirangi Road routes, this includes limiting heavy trucks in the following periods, where practicable, to address the potential adverse effects in Titirangi Village: During the weekday peak hours (07:30 to 08:30 and 17:00 to 18:00), excluding public holidays"

This neglects traffic to Titirangi School, the travel of students from Waima, Woodlands Park, Huia, Cornwallis and Laingholm to secondary schools (Green Bay High, plus several buses of children to schools thoughout Auckland). The route from Woodlands Park Road via Scenic Drive and Titirangi Road toward New Lynn is busy from 7am to 9am weekdays (at least two hours), and traffic from the City to these suburbs occurs at high volumes between 17:00-19:00 (workers finishing at 17:00 are rarely at Titirangi Village before 18:00). Finally, there is significant traffic out from Titirangi village along scenic drive from 15:00-16:00 and a number of school buses run along that route between those hours. That the peaks in traffic on Scenic Drive (and other affected roads) last longer than one hour is confirmed by traffic data reports.

Heavy Vehicle Demonstration Summary Appendix E, A16055C BML S92 response The heavy vehicle demonstration summary does includes pictures of truck movements on Scenic Drive, but no discussion of the difficulty of using this road in large trucks. This road is the most dangerous, windiest, and least wide road of all on the route. A demonstration of trucks passing on this route, where they are regularly observed crossing the middle line is glaringly missing.

Potential Mitigation Options, Parking, Appendix E, A16055C BML S92 response,pg 8

On Titirangi Road approaching Titirangi Village Watercare propose to:

"Restrict parking on those sections that are most affected by the northbound heavy vehicle or bus movements (mainly where the road is not straight) or where there is lower parking demand to reduce the potential and extent of the potential areas of conflict. Noting that: a. The zonal occupancy shows not all the zones are well-used, so by restricting some parking potentially in Zones A, B and C, vehicles can make use of the under-utilised parking in Zone D (which is generally on a straighter section)."

The graphs on the final page of this document show that Zones A-C (close to Titirangi Village) are over half full all day on weekdays. The proposition to remove these parking spaces and to ensure that the spaces in Zone D are used instead misses the reason why people use the spaces in zones A-C. They are parking here and catching the bus from Titirangi village, often to New Lynn or the City. Allowing use of only the carparks far from the village will discourage this and increase congestion.

Huia Road

Huia Road is suggested as an extra route for truck movements, it will also need to accommodate significantly increased traffic for the entire duration of construction. However, the applicant's do not provide any serious evaluation of these effects in their reports. Huia Road, for the ~2km from Titirangi Roundabout is very steep, very windy, and likely inappropriate for large trucks, certainly when coming up the hill. According to the traffic reports at Titirangi Roundabout (BUN60339273-M2TrafficTransport.pdf), Huia Road has the highest traffic load at AM Peak, the longest gueues/gueue times (up to 87m of queue). It could be expected that the majority of the Scenic Drive traffic that exists currently could feasibly have to be rerouted via Huia Road over portions of the construction. This was the case in 2017 when 1) Scenic Drive was closed due to a slip, and 2) there were periodic closures of Scenic Drive in one or both directions due to remedial work. This would add 10-15 minutes to our journey to Titirangi Village, even on a quiet weekend morning. It is likely that any construction would need to increased traffic on this route, and longer wait times at Titirangi roundabout, but Huia road and its condition is not mentioned. I note that in my experience at this intersection, if the queue is ~80 m long the amount of time I am queuing at the roundabout is far more than 20-30 seconds, this is more like what you would wait if you were at the front of the queue.

Road Stability

The section of Scenic Drive between Titirangi Roundabout and Woodlands Park Road is not surrounded by stable ground. There are regular slips of earth onto the road. Indeed a major slip closed this part of scenic drive and/or resulted in the road being August traffic on one side from December (https://www.stuff.co.nz/auckland/local-news/western-leader/97458895/new-slip-onscenic-drive-closes-the-west-auckland-road, https://www.stuff.co.nz/auckland/localnews/western-leader/96310628/slip-in-west-aucklands-titirangi-disrupts-traffic). Also in 2017 remediation works were carried out on this portion of Scenic Drive, and these works took significantly longer than advertised. A major issue during this period was the traffic on Huia Road, which is also unsuitable for heavy traffic movements. Prior to this remediation, the road surface was incredibly uneven, and many of the streetlights on this section of the road were 'on a lean'. I cannot see a good reason why the significant increase in heavy traffic movements would not degrade this section of road back to this state.

Night time truck movements

"It is therefore recommended that over-dimensional vehicles and other wide (or over size) loads are transported to and from the Project site between the hours of 10pm and 6am, whenever practicable, if they require more than the available lane width on the recommended heavy vehicle route/s. The movement of over-dimensional vehicles and other wide (or over size) loads being undertaken in accordance with the relevant standards and procedures" (BUN60339273-M1TrafficTransport.pdf, CH2M Beca, 10 July 2019, 6513515,NZ1-16108720-17 2.0, page 36)

Waima is a quiet community, where there is very little night time traffic. Note, that the Suburb receives no city noise. Large truck movements in this area are loud, and can be clearly heard. In fact, noise travels very ready through the bush, and the topology of the local land. Regular truck movements at night would be unacceptable to people living in the area. This noise has not been considered appropriately in the report, in fact the word 'noise' does not appear in the traffic management report.

Use of Parau landfill site

The proposed use of the Parau landfill site to take most of the landfill from the site, again appears to neglect the roads between Woodlands park and the landfill site, which are steep and windy. It is certainly not clear they could accommodate the number of heavy truck movements per day that are estimated. Again, the assessment of suitability of roads seems to be in terms of number of vehicles using the roads with the windiest and steepest nature of roads in this area being almost completely ignored.

<u>Construction Staff Parking</u> (BUN60339273-M1TrafficTransport.pdf, CH2M Beca, 10 July 2019, 6513515,NZ1-16108720-17 2.0, page 62)

Detail of construction staff parking is deferred until a contractor is appointed. It is critical that this does not include further destruction of high value significant ecological area, and this has not been addressed by the applicants.

Entrance to site

"The width of the access does not comply with the Unitary Plan Table E27.6.4.3.2 but has been designed according to operational requirements. Due to the operational requirements of the site, large heavy vehicles are needed to be able to pass one another at the access point. The vehicle tracking is shown in Appendix D and has demonstrated that two vehicles are able to pass at access point as required."

If there are only 1-2 heavy vehicle movements per day, and not every day (BUN60339273-M1TrafficTransport.pdf, CH2M Beca, 10 July 2019, 6513515,NZ1-16108720-17 2.0, page 19), there is no clear reason why access to the site would need to pass one another at the access point, and so why the width of the access should not comply with the Unitary Plan.

Noise caused by heavy vehicles

The estimates of noise caused by heavy vehicles due to construction is clouded by dubious estimates of the current number of heavy vehicles on Woodlands Park Road. We live 50-60 m from Woodlands Park Road, and we hear every truck that passes the intersection nearest to our house clearly. These traffic movements are currently rare, the additional traffic noise caused by large trucks is not adequately assessed.

3. 'Mitigation'

Auckland is currently talking about a "wholesale slaughter" of trees (https://www.nzherald.co.nz/nz/news/article.cfm?c_id=1&objectid=11932829).

Waitamata Local Board have published a report on the significant decline in trees in the Auckland Region between 2006 and 2016 and reported a 61.23Ha decline in tree coverage. A key finding was that this decline the combined impact of many thousands of individual clearance events, all of which were individually less than 0.01ha (100m²) in size (http://www.knowledgeauckland.org.nz/assets/publications/TR2018-021-Tree-loss-Waitemata-Local-Board-2006-2016.pdf). The applicants use information on the percentage of the total SEA in the area to be cleared of trees as justification for a small impact. The fact is that this is not just another small loss of trees. This is 3.5Ha of high value ecology. A a signatory to Claxon (http://claxon.nz/signatories/) I recognise, like many of the Country's leading Scientists that we are currently in a climate emergency (https://www.stuff.co.nz/environment/climate-news/113946213/more-than-50-of-new-zealands-top-scientists-call-on-government-to-declare-climate-emergency). This climate emergency cannot be ignored when making infrastructure decisions, and deforestation is completely inappropriate given what we currently know about its impact on the climate, on the survival of species, and on the health of our cities.

"The Project Site rates High for three out of four assessment matters (rarity/ distinctiveness, diversity/pattern, ecological context). Therefore, the Project Site achieves an overall ecological value ranking of VERY HIGH." (Boffa Miskell Ltd, Huia Water Treatment Plant Replacement, Assessment of Ecological Effects, p61)

I believe that the environmental effects of the approval of this application are so significant that the consent should not be granted. Loss of any forest habitat is unacceptable at a time when Aotearoa New Zealand recognises that the fragmentation of terrestrial habitats for human land puts major pressures on biodiversity (https://www.mfe.govt.nz/publications/environmental-reporting/environment-aotearoa-2015-biodiversity/impacts-biodiversity,

https://www.es.govt.nz/Document%20Library/Other%20resources/Biosecurity%20resources/Addressing%20New%20Zealand%27s%20biodiversity%20Challenge.PDF).

The critically endangered flora and fauna outlined in ecological reports, and consistent with the SEA overlay are covered under:

- The Auckland Unitary Plan SEA, Environmental protection, Mana Whenua,
- The Waitakere Ranges Heritage Area Act 2008
- The Little Muddy Creeks Plan 2014
- Auckland Council 2050 Pest Free Plan.
- Auckland Councils list of protect trees.
- Native Plants Protection Act 1934
- Wildlife Act 1953
- The Conservation Act 1987
- DoC National Biodiversity Strategy 2019

perpetuity funding. It is therefore inadequate.

The applicants propose primarily pest control to compensate for the loss of biodiversity and deforestation in their proposal. There is already an active and effective local community group ("Waima to Laingholm Pest Free", http://w2l.nz) whose activities cover an area including both the existing and proposed water treatment plant, as well as much of the land in the 'mitigation proposal'. Mitigation should not include already ongoing activities.

Recommendations regarding biodiversity offsetting by funding of invasive species control suggest that the control must meet seven conditions:

"...be technically possible to reduce invasive species to levels that enhance native biodiversity; be affordable; be sufficiently large to compensate for the impact; be adaptable to accommodate new strategic and tactical developments while not compromising biodiversity outcomes; acknowledge uncertainties associated with managing pests; be based on an explicit risk assessment that identifies the cost of not achieving target outcomes; and include financial mechanisms to provide for inperpetuity funding." (Norton, D. A. and B. Warburton (2015). Conservation Biology 29(1): 5-11)

This proposed mitigation does not provide convincing evidence of being large enough to compensate for impact, does not acknowledge uncertainties, does not include an explicit risk assessment and does not include any mechanism for in-




Figure 1. Illustrative models of cumulative population increase.

Appendix C, A16055C BML S92 response, p9, Figure 1 and text. In response to:

"The loss of 3.5 ha of native forest and shrubland within the project development area is assumed to be permanent, or for at least as long as the design life of the infrastructure proposed. Please explain whether and how the proposed compensation programme as administered by the Trust Deed will

provide for enhancements to biodiversity that last at least as long as the residual impacts of the development."

Watercare state:

"Figure 1 illustrates simple cumulative growth models for a given species over 10 years assuming a) a 20% annual population increase, and b) 50% annual population increase. In either scenario, the population increase exceeds 1000% after 10 years. Even at an increase of 10% per annum, the population would double after approximately 7 years."

The data and text surrounding this figure are grossly misleading and do not reflect a reasonable estimate for the potential benefits of a pest control program over 720 Ha in the Waima Catchment. Note first, that the growth rates cited from the references provided on page 10 are 'best case' scenarios in several cases (for example, the Mohua growth rate in O'Donnell et al. NZ Journal of Ecology 2012, 36(2):131 is the highest by far of 13 species, 2 showed no change and 4 decreased in population after pest control). The data cited on page 10 show population increases over ten years of 24-fold, 6-fold, over 7 years of 4-5 fold, and there is no study showing anything near the 1000 fold claimed here. I cannot see anywhere in the cited references an indication of a 50% annual growth rate, or even a 25% annual growth rate, 10% or at a push 17% seems more reasonable, but more likely less than that on average. I have a PhD in Applied Mathematics, focusing on Mathematical Biology and while I do not research population dynamics, this is the kind of thing that is studied as an undergraduate. One of the first things you learn in these undergraduate courses is that uncontrolled population growth like these curves show only happens in unrealistic scenarios (infinite food sources, space to spread out, no competition for space or food) and the 1000-fold projected increases are clearly unrealistic, and I would say unheard of in the literature on population grown after an intervention. This can be seen by considering an example:

Thinking about the 720 Ha that Watercare propose to do pest control in, let's say that there are 100 Tuis living there right now. With their projected population increases, 10 years after construction of the treatment plant there will be 100,000 Tuis living there. This is great because that means we have 100,000 Tuis /720 Ha = 139 Tuis per hectare. Thinking about this in terms of property sizes we can understand, let's think about how many Tuis will be in a classic Kiwi quarter acre section (0.1Ha) – around 14! Even if there were only 10 Tui originally in the area, we'd have 1-2 per quarter acre of land in the area, and when you add in all the other species that will be saved, the land will be packed with native species. While it sounds awesome that the pest control programme will be so successful it is clear that this is a mis-representation of the data.

From my interpretation of the data presented by Watercare, it seems more likely that the worst-case scenario presented in the response document is actually closer to a best-case scenario than any other numbers touted, and the graphs presented are a severe mis-representation of the data available.

Appendix C, A16055C BML S92 response, p10

'We emphasise that our compensation framework trades time for area, so that the flora and fauna populations and 'safe sites' lost from the site would be replaced at a rate of one or more orders of magnitude across the catchment, where vulnerable populations are likely to be suppressed to low numbers, and/ or in decline. We consider that the outcome envisaged is a net ecological benefit."

There is no evidence presented that the area is large enough to compensate for loss, and that the replacement of flora and fauna will reach the levels stated.

Kauri Dieback

As stated in the Council's response to this application (BUN60339273, Response to Section 92 Request for Further Information) the Kauri Dieback management plan is does not contain sufficient detail. At a time when there is a Rāhui in place that covers the Waitakere Ranges, including the proposed site, because of the threat of Kauri Dieback on a vulnerable population of native trees, the consent should not be approved without a Kauri Dieback management plan in place. Watercare were not forthcoming in detailing this plan in their response. The walking track (Clark's Bush Track) which this development will encroach upon is currently closed due to the threat of Kauri Dieback, and this highlights the need to seriously consider Kauri Dieback. This should include a complete management plan prior to any consents.

"No specific response to management of potentially P. agathicida – contaminated sediment over and above standard Best Practice controls is proposed. No mature kauri trees are present within the construction footprint, so in our assessment there is minimal likelihood that sediment generated onsite would contain a high pathogen load." (BUN60339273, Response to Section 92 Request for Further Information, Appendix C, page 4). The lack of 'mature' Kauri, however, smaller Kauri are present across the site (Boffa Miskell Ltd, Huia Water Treatment Plant Replacement, Assessment of Ecological Effects, p58). There is also a Kauri on site with likely symptoms of Kauri Dieback (Boffa Miskell Ltd, Huia Water Treatment Plant Replacement, Assessment of Ecological Effects, p28). A proper management plan needs to be place with all eventualities accounted for, rather than discounting the risk.

"Within the local context, the site is connected to and forms a linkage with regional parkland to the south (which contains two of the oldest kauri trees in the Auckland region5) and west, and to a network of forest patches in the Titirangi-Waima area. Forest is fragmented by roads and urban settlement, but forest canopy cover is dense and characterised by stands of regenerating kauri. The site therefore has an important connecting function within the local context and is part of a wider area of adjoining kauri forest and regional parkland. (Boffa Miskell Ltd, Huia Water Treatment Plant Replacement, Assessment of Ecological Effects).

The fragmentation of ecosystems has a major impact on biodiversity, and the Clark's bush track was (prior to its closure to prevent kauri dieback) a popular bush walk. We regularly took international visitors along this track to see the large Kauri, and any risk

to these Kauri is unacceptable, as is the destruction of the first segment of this public footpath.

Hello Independent Commissioners,

I'm writing to oppose the Huia Water Treatment Plant. I'm a 3rd generation Titirangi resident (my 3 school aged children I'm raising are 4th generation).

We all understand the need for clean water, but the site chosen goes against all national, regional and community environmental values and why people choose to live in Titirangi.

People struggle to grasp the size of the project from the numbers on a page. But what Watercare plan would be the biggest ecological destruction of the Waitakere Ranges in a lifetime. The '6pm news' images of chainsaws, bulldozers and trucks deforesting 3.5ha of native plants and trees is something you'd expect to see in the Amazon, not The Waitakere Ranges.

We now live in an age where a supermarket gets fined 100k for giving out a single use plastic bag, yet Watercare plan to destroy critically endangered native forest. At a time Auckland Council have declared a climate emergency, the Waitakere Ranges are closed by Auckland Council and under Rahui by Te Kawerau a Maki. Clarks Bush Track, an Auckland Council walking track on the site of the proposed WTP is fenced off and closed for Kauri Die Back protection.

I understand there will be pressures to grant consent for this project. But Watercare have proceeded against legal advice that consenting of the proposed site it at the extreme end of the risk scale. And although Watercare may claim designation for this site (services yes, an industrial plant debatable), it doesn't ever give them the legal right to remove protected vegetation and destroy waterways.

As independent commissioners I expect you to reject 'acceptance' that this site is a 'done deal' and judge the resource consent on the unsuitability of an industrial plant on this site - in the middle of the The Waitakeres. Watercare simply need to choose a more suitable site.

The following facts are extracted directly from the Watercare consent documents, Auckland Council data and documents, and my own local knowledge including multiple site visits.

I **oppose** the WTP with the following concerns under the following resource consent requirements:

Vegetation removal in a SEA Overlay. E26.3.3.1 (A77)

The Auckland Unitary Plan.
Threatened native ecosystem types.
Protected native species.
Pest free corridors.
A new species discovery.
Kauri as a threatened species.
Mitigation.

Earthworks in a SEA Overlay E26.6.3.1 (A118) E30.4.1 (A7)

Kauri Die Back spread via surface overflow. Impacts to wetlands and flooding risk. Heavy Vehicle movements.

Diversion of rivers and streams. E3.4.1 E7.4.1

Diversion of streams
Diversion of Groundwater
Dewatering of Groundwater
Wetlands – not ephemeral.

E26.3.3.1 (A77) Removal of vegetation in a protected S.E.A. overlay.

"The site is part of the large Significant Ecological Area (SEA) of the Waitakere Ranges and meets all of the five criteria (representativeness; threat status and rarity; diversity; stepping stones, migration pathways and buffers; uniqueness or distinctiveness) for assessing ecological significance in Schedule 3 of the Auckland Unitary Plan."

"The site itself is representative of regenerating forest types including kauri, present in this part of the foothills. It contains threatened ecosystem types (regenerating kauri forest, broadleaved forest and kahikatea-swamp maire forest) and nationally and regionally threatened species. It contains a diversity of forest types including threatened ecosystem types. The site forms linkages and corridors for wildlife with adjoining regional parkland forest."

Watercare reports have repeatedly claimed that the forest on site is regenerated, scrubland. However it's plain as fact that large tracts of forest on the site avoided the de-forestation of the past and hold mature kahikatea, rimu, pururi and kauri up to 200 years old. Only 100m from the site stands Clarks Kauri – the oldest kauri in Auckland at over 1000 years old.

The Unitary Plan

Adhering to **D9.3 Auckland Unitary Plan** states XXX. Although Watercare claim to have minimized their footprint, Watercare haven't tried to avoid destroying SEA at all. From the long list of sites, the site in question was the only one where it was impossible to avoid the SEA. In choosing a site that is nearly 100% SEA, they in turn cannot claim to have avoided SEA at all.

Endangered ecosystem types and protected native species.

"A total of 84 native plant species were recorded during the vegetation transect and plot survey (Appendix 3). This includes 7 gymnosperm tree species, 19 fern species, 36 tree and shrub species, and 8 climber and epiphyte species."

Beca Ecological Report.

"The revised threat status of kauri and Myrtaceae species (swamp maire, kanuka, manuka, rata) elevate the importance and significance of the forest on the site."

The site features large tracks of swamp maire and kahikatea wetlands. Only 2% of Kahikatea swamp forest remain in New Zealand and is considered critically endangered.





4 Threatened native ecosystem types present at the site.

- kauri forest (WF10) (regional IUCN threat status endangered)
- kauri podocarp forest (WF11) (endangered)
- mixed regenerating broadleaved forest (WF7.2) (critically endangered)
- swamp maire kahikatea pukatea forest (WF8) (critically endangered).

7 Critical, nationally threatened and at-risk native plant species present at the site.

- Agathis australis (Kauri) Threatened Nationally Vulnerable
- Syzgium maire (Swamp Maire) Threatened Nationally Critical
- Leptospermum scoparium (Manuka) At Risk Declining
- Kunzea robusta (Kanuka) Threatened Nationally Vulnerable
- Metrosideros excelsa (Pohutukawa) Threatened Nationally Vulnerable
- Metrosideros carminea (Carmine Rata) Threatened Nationally Vulnerable
- Metrosideros diffusa (White Rata) Threatened Nationally Vulnerable

Also present on site (see below photo) is the presence of Pterostylis agathicola, a rare native Kauri Greenhood Orchid, which grows only in Kauri forests in the shade of large Kauri trees.





The critically endangered flora and fauna is not just protected by the Unitary Plan with its SEA overlay, but should also be covered under the following laws, acts and plans:

- The Auckland Unitary Plan SEA, Environmental protection, Mana Whenua,
- The Waitakere Ranges Heritage Area Act 2008
- The Little Muddy Creeks Plan 2014
- Auckland Councils 2050 Pest Free Plan.
- Auckland Councils list of protect trees.
- Native Plants Protection Act 1934
- Wildlife Act 1953
- The Conservation Act 1987
- DoC National Biodiversity Strategy 2019

Consenting this vegetation removal would contradict all of these legal measures put in place to avoid further ecological destruction of Auckland and New Zealand.

A new species discovered.

A species of parasitic wasp, NEW to New Zealand science was recently discovered on site. The Pteromalidae wasp is SIGNIFICANT, five examples of the flightless female were found at Clark's Bush by respected entomologist Dr Peter Maddison and is yet to be named by the Curator of Entomology, Auckland Museum. The Pteromalidae are a very large family of mostly parasitic wasp and many are important as biological control agents where they lay larvae that feed of its host (a pest) before eventually killing it.

Also found and identified in Clark Bush is the very rare slave ant Strumigenys xenos. The first and ONLY other confirmed record of the S. xenos in NZ comprises a single dealate.

These are both not classified as pests by Landcare Research, who use insects such as these as biocontrols, a method of controlling pests such as wasps, mites, weeds and plant diseases. Ask yourself what this new species of parasitic wasp could possibly help control? If the SEA protected forest ecosystem it lives in gets bulldozed, we will never know.

Pest free corridors.

The Waitakere Ranges are part of the Northwest Wildlink 4, a corridor of interlinking habitat between the Ranges and the Hauraki Gulf Islands. Native birds fly only a maximum 90m at a time and fragmenting this natural corridor of 3.5ha of native forest contradicts the Auckland Council 2050 Pest Free Plan.

The proposed site adjoins and links with Waitakere Regional Parkland to the south. These connections should be described and recognised (still no mention in Watercare reports). The vegetation types on site are all part of a continuum. It is a single piece of forest, with mosaic of successional stages and canopy patterns that are connected and forms an important connection for wildlife in this network. Forest in the foothills of the ranges provides the ecological connections, linkages and stepping stones for wildlife from the ranges to the Manukau Harbour and across the Auckland isthmus to the Hauraki Gulf.

Native bird species recorded are tui, kereru, grey warbler, kingfisher, fantail, shining cuckoo, morepork, silvereye, spur winged plover, harrier. Resident populations have been observed. North Island kaka are likely to visit the site. Forest gecko have been recorded previously at the site, and green gecko are likely to be present.

The **Nationally Critical native long-tailed bats** have been recorded on site. "DOC acoustic recorder placed along Woodlands Park Rd just South of the intersection with Waima Crescent, Huia 15 Location. "Bat Pass" recorded at 10.43pm Jan 10th 2018."

Photo below showing the boundry of the site and neighboring Waitakere Regional Parkland. It's the same bush.



Kauri Die Back

The Waitakere Ranges Regional Park (WRRP) now represents the most heavily kauri dieback infected area currently recorded in New Zealand (Hill et al. 2017). Of the distinct areas of kauri forest within the WRRP which are above 5ha in size, 58.3% are exhibiting symptoms of kauri dieback infection to some degree.

The importance of kauri forest on the site, and the threat of the spread of kauri dieback disease within the local area are important factors to consider with the protection of the site.

The fact they refuse to do a tree count for Kauri below is disingenuous and made to give the impression they've avoided Kauri. As it stands untold saplings and rickers 20cm (age of Kauri rickers under this size are approx 80-120 years) will be destroyed in the middle of this crisis. This contradicts all efforts to save the species, which includes a full closure of the Waitakere Ranges where kauri are present.



Photo below shows kauri rickers on site under the 20cm threshold to be counted.

Mitigation

The "enhancements" Watercare propose as mitigation don't come close to the destruction that will result. The loss of 4 endangered ecosystems can't be measured, or matched - and the loss is too great to mitigate.

As such mitigation should not be considered a viable alternative to the destruction of SEA protected forest and stream reclamation in Titirangi.

The idea that mitigation money would be spend on an already budgeted pest program, upkeep and weeding of their own properties (should be a given), stewardship of kauri (while cutting them down), control of Argentinian Ants (which are not present on site – Dr Peter Maddison)

and the clause that mitigation money can be spent outside the catchment area is almost laughable if it wasn't so serious.

Auckland Council has a guardian role to protect this forest, it should not use rate-payer money to fund its destruction, and then pay out for its mitigation.

Earthworks


E26.5.3.1 (A118) Earthworks in a SEA overlay exceeds more than 2500m2 E26.5.3.2 (A107) Earthworks within 50m of a watercourse.

Earthworks and Kauri Dieback.

To put the problem into context. Auckland Council closed the WHOLE of the Waitakere Ranges, including Clarks Bush Track that runs through the site in the effort to contain Kauri Die Back.

Although Watercare claim to have avoided stands of mature Kauri, the WTP is jammed in so tight they have no option to create a buffer zone. As such earthworks are so close to mature kauri, some within 4-5m of the actual trunk, that the root systems of these endangered species will be ripped to shreds by the bulldozers. In turn killing the tree they say they've avoided.

Illustration below from an Auckland Council produced Keep Kauri Standing info booklet shows the root structure extending 3 x past the drip line.



The presence of Kauri Die Back onsite means that contaminated soil will be spread across the site and down in the Yorke Gully stream. I don't for one second believe the biosecurity protocols will be strict enough to stop the spread of an invisible spore, keep thousands of workers sticking to the rules.

I also don't believe surface water diversions will stop the annual 2000mm of rain and resulting overland flow from spreading KDB contaminated sediment down the valley **into the adjoining Waitakere Regional Parkland** onto stands of endangered kauri.

Soil contaminated with Kauri Die Back will also have to be carted 70km plus to a tip site that accepts contaminated soil. Further adding to its potential spread.

Photo show Clarks Kauri. Only 100m (downhill) from the site stands **Aucklands oldest kauri**. This registered tree is estimated to be 1000+ years old.



The below map is from Auckland Council Geo Maps site. It shows all overland flow from the proposed WTP will follow the contours and run down into in the Yorke and Armstrong Gullies.

E26.5.3.1 (A118) Earthworks in a SEA overlay exceeds more than 2500m2

Roading suitability and heavy vehicle trucks due to earthworks above 2500m3

The removal of 100,000m3 of cut soil will be a major strain on the community and its roading. 82,000 thousand 'truck and trailer' heavy vehicle movements have been modelled for our roads and the reports are inadequate.

Watercare have failed to produce a report on whether Scenic Drive is structurally sound and wide enough to handle 82,000+ truck movements. Scenic Drive is structurally fragile. Over recent years multiple land slips on both inside and outside banks have come onto the road recently reducing it to one lane. Recent resurfacing has addressed pothole, fixing a slip and drainage only, but did not include any widening or structural strengthening. Footpaths are crumbling and slipping down the outside banks.

Scenic Drive is very thin along multiple sections and the carriageway can't physically handle two heavy vehicles passing side by side 'at the same time'. There are times where trucks will be using Scenic Drive every 3.5 minutes*, there are bound to be moments where two trucks pass each other. There have been moments in the past where trucks and buses have had to come to a complete stop on Scenic Drive so they can pass each other. This is not safe, nor acceptable. Recent photos produced by Watercare showing trucks do more to prove my point, than prove it's safe

The resulting effects of these 82,000+ heavy vehicle movements will leave the community with third world roading and end up costing Auckland Transport many millions to fix. A report on its soundness must be produced now as part of the consent for removal of 2500m3, not as part of the OPW.

Huia Replacement WTP Transport Assessment- Beca

Photos below show a Watercare heavy vehicle on Scenic Drive 2018. You can see it doesn't physically fit in its lane pushing the car out onto the outside kurb. Two trucks at the same time would not be possible. Wide load issues will also arise. Photo 2 shows a Watercare chemical truck in early 2019 somehow broken down at the Woodlands Park/Scenic Drive intersection, on the wrong side of the road, on a blind corner.





It is also a major failing that the report does not include Huia Road in its Traffic Data (2.6.1) and Residual Road Capacity (2.6.2).

Huia Road is the ONLY alternative route to avoid the WTP works in the event of heavy trucks, works and road closures on Woodlands Park Road. It will become the ONLY route into the city for the 10,000+ residents of Titirangi, Laingholm, Huia, Parau and Whatipu. This road is already gridlocked, with commuters cueing for hundreds of metres to clear the roundabout already. Double the traffic and it will start to effect people daily lives with a reduction in productivity effecting the local economy. Traffic reports for Huia Rd must be produced.

We've also come across another anomaly in the reports. Watercare currently state that there are 350 heavy vehicles (including buses) going down Titirangi Road from the village every day (Northbound). During business hours, that's one every 2 minutes which is clearly incorrect. After comparing Auckland Transport data online, it looks like they have (intentionally or not) combined small vans, trucks, UTEs, Camper Vans, etc with 'heavy vehicles' and added the scores together. This deception makes it seem that the traffic they are adding to the Titirangi Road, through the village will be less of an addition than it actually is.

Heavy Vehicle movements around schools due to earthworks above 2500m3

The 82,000+ trucks will pass local schools and early childhood centres on the way to the WTP site. These are woefully mentioned in the reports and locals can count up to 11+ primary, intermediate school and early childhood centres.

On map **2.8 Schools near potential heavy vehicle routes** the map finishes at the WTP and doesn't extend further south east to show Woodlands Park Primary School and kindergarten which is the proposed route to the Parau dump site.

Watercare are seriously downplaying the proposed route from the WTP site to Parau dump site to transport 100,000m3 of cut soil. Watercare state the route past Woodlands Park Primary School is only suitable for rigid trucks eg. no trailer = lower haulage. Watercare don't actually provide rigid truck numbers for this route.

Based on the equation supplied in the consent, I calculated that 90 'truck and trailer' movements daily used in their predictions will be multiplied x 2.5 to equal 225 heavy vehicle truck movements travelling past school daily - vibrating and shaking school surroundings as it passes over the pedestrian crossing and judder bar.

Another way to look at it, a rigid truck takes up to 10m3 of soil. Shifting 100,000m3 of cut (not expanded) soil would take 11,000 truck movements past Woodlands Park Primary School!!!

Considering the huge amount of heavy vehicle traffic passing the school, the resourse consent inadequately calculates the increased demand of the WTP to Parau section of road which no only includes the school, but bus stops, parks, narrow carriageways and blind corners.

Watercare's claim that there will be no adverse effects of this Parau dumpsite of are is grossly misleading.

Below photos shows cnr Woodland Park Road and Boylan Ave is a very tight inside corner with a unprotected footpath. On two blind corners, it's already a dangerous, yet vital crossing point across to both the park and westbound bus stop.

It also shows Woodlands Park Road at after school pickup. Cars reverse out onto the road into upcoming traffic coming around another blind corner. The pedestrian crossing is an intense judder bar that will shake the 11,000 trucks and reverberate it through the school.





Watercare have also proposed non-operational trucks times, but strangly finshes at 3pm, falling well short of the time needed for school pickup and the hundreds, if not thousands of school children and parents walking and biking to and from home to school.

It's dangerous. It's a tragedy waiting to happen and I fear for my children.

Earthworks and local Archaeology

There is missing context of the archaeological history of the site.

Watercare mention the only archaeological considerations that need to be addressed are from its Heritage listed buildings.

However, there are **multiple Auckland Council documents** namely a report commissioned in 1978 by J.T Diamond, and the more recent Local Board Little Muddy Creek Plan about a watershed battle on site.

The Battle of Parau in 1750 was a battle between Kiwi Tamaki of Waiohua and Te Whaakiaka of Ngati Whatua that handed kaitiaki (guardianship) to the now gaurdians, Ngati Whatua. The documents describe how Kiwi Tamaki chased Ngati Whatua up the ridge from Parau, before being ambushed and killed by hand combat on site. Multiple documents place the area as

Waima Rd (now Woodland Park Rd), Smyths Saddle (area around the Woodlands Park Rd and Scenic Dr saddle).

70 years of minimal human activity and forest growth passed before early settlers arrived in the 1820s. They describe finding skeletal remains, including baskets of bones in the forks of trees. A burial cave tucked into the rocks under Exhibition Drive not 100m from the site was said to once hold the remains of Kiwi Tamaki. The burial cave is a registered pre-historic archaeological site as noted in the J.T Diamond report.

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There are two records of burials from the Waima Road area and these are quite likely the result of the large battle fought here around 1750, in which Kiwi's forces were slaughtered.

inlet being a rich sea food gathering spot. Evidence for the the food resources and occupation of the Nihotupu valley is in several midden sites on the dam's ridges, kumara pits are still to be seen on the eastern ridge. In the 1760s a major battle between the Waiohua and Ngati Whatua took place where the dam is today. The Waiohua continued their resistence on the eastern ridges, finally succumbing amid great casualties at Paturoa (Titirangi Baech)

Many falling during the long running battle near the site of todays Titirangi Filter station.

I have informed Watercare of these facts. And I believe as part of the removal of earthworks, some 10m deep in parts, a proper archaeological study including these facts need to be commissioned. By law under the Historic Places Act it's illegal to dig without first consulting the Historic Places Trust on this matter.

For such a detailed documented history that directly pinpoints the site, it's astonishing that the preliminary short-list archaeological score was given a 4 out of 5, with 5 being of no-concern. Who made this assessment and why? I personally asked Te Karerau a Maki and it wasn't them.

Below shows the short list scoring. Note a score of 4/5 (5 being least impacts). Also note the Manuka Road Site doesn't add up properly.

Streams

E3.4.1 (A49) (A19) (A34) Diversion of streams, reclamation and stream erosion protection. E7.4.1 (A20) Dewatering and groundwater level control.

The diversion and reclamation of streams is a **non-complying activity.**

The WTP site will destroy the headwaters of Yorke Gully, an area free of external modifications or stormwater eg. 100% pure. Described as a flood plain and intermittent stream (.5-1m) with high biochemical functionality, it feeds directly into the substantial and excellent quality stream below in Waitakere Regional Parkland before exiting into Little Muddy Creek, a vital connection between fresh and sea water.

An 50m area of the stream in the immediate receiving environment recorded three species of native fresh water fish – koura (native crayfish), Longfin Eel and Inanga, the latter two classified as At Risk – Declining and protected under the Conservation Act.

Vegetation removal will result in an increased sediment flow into this stream. Add to this stormwater and foreign objects diverted into the stream system from an industrial building site. Add to this chemical spraying and sediment run-off from bio security truck cleaning stations. Add to this 'mild pollution' as recorded exiting the current WTP into the Armstrong stream. All putting the environmental status of the excellent quality river at severe risk of collapse.

Watercare will 'kill' this stream if an industrial plant claims the floodplain and headwaters above it.

The letter below from Eugine Sage states that while she appreciates the need for infrastructure in a growing city, she is "not comfortable that this is at the expense of natural values". She particularly expresses concerns over the works in waterways.

Dear Mr Courtney

Thank you for your email of 18 April in which you brought to my attention your concerns about the potential destruction of native forest near Titirangi, Auckland. I note your description of the values that may be at risk in an area that is zoned a Significant Ecological Area in the Auckland Unitary Plan.

The Department of Conservation has advised me that the land is owned by the Auckland Council organisation Watercare and is the site of the Huia Water Treatment Plant. The existing plant is old, and Watercare is planning to build a new larger plant within the property, adjacent to the existing buildings. I am also advised that the property has been designated for water-supply works for many years and that its existing designation was one of the factors that led Watercare to settle on redeveloping this site after a comprehensive review of a number of alternative sites in west Auckland.

While I appreciate that a growing city like Auckland needs to upgrade and replace important infrastructure from time to time, I am not comfortable if that is at the expense of significant natural values. The department has advised me that parts of the Watercare property contain mature forest and that a diverse range of fauna and flora has been identified on the property

I understand that shortly Watercare intends to lodge applications for resource consents required for activities that are necessary to build the new plant but that will not otherwise be permitted under the designation, such as works in waterways. I have asked the department to review those applications if they are publicly notified.

I have also copied our correspondence to the Mayor of Auckland, Phil Goff, to inform him of my concerns and requesting his views on how the significant natural values on this property will be protected. Thank you again for bringing this matter to my attention.

Wetlands, not ephemeral

However Watercare want to describe the status of the reservoir site – permanent stream, ephemeral, intermittent, surface water, at risk of flooding, pools of water - the whole area is a **wetland.** The definition of a wetland being "freshwater as the primary factor for controlling the environment" is correct in this instance. Helped by Titirangi's sub-stropical weather and 2000m of annual rainfall - this area is never dry.

Critically endangered swamp maire and kahikatea wetlands are identified throughout the site. The kidneys of the land, they reduce the risk of flooding. DoC describes wetlands as some of the world's most productive environments. Only 2% of our Kahikatea wetland areas now remain in NZ.

The whole area is a wet area and dewatering the table and reclaiming and culverting a 50m reach of permanent stream will have a negative effect on the surrounding wetland areas not included in Watercare's report.

DOC list human activity as the biggest threat to wetlands:

- drainage for urban or rural development.
- loss of vegetation allow excess sediment to run directly into wetlands and streams
- pollution by excess run-off of sediment and nutrients

Photo below shows ephemeral kahikatea wetlands and swamp maire on site in the middle of summer. Hardly ephemeral.



Further arguments.

From experience everything Watercare says should be treated with caution.

I have found Watercare to be lacking credibility - numerous mis-leading statements, withholding of information to the public and inaccuracies have crept into the reports.

For most things there is a factual counter argument to challenge their statements.

Those are the ones I have picked up, what others are there?

So, I also **oppose** the WTP with the following OPW concerns of the report produced, it's misleading statements, lack of key data and reports.

Community and traffic impacts.

See above comments in under earthworks consent requirement.

2.6.1 and 2.6.2 No Huia Road Traffic Data and Residual Road Capacity data.

2.7 No mention of Woodlands Park Primary School and the 11,000 trucks that will pass it.

Community, political engagement, court case.

Watercare fail to mention the intense political debate surrounding the project. When Oratia was announced as the preferred site, Councilors Cooper and Hulse, even Minister Paula Bennet who lived on the road, strongly advocated for the site, in turn subjecting Waima to the fate it now faces. Unfortunately, Waima has not received the same advocacy from any political figures, with Councilors Cooper and Hulse rejecting all local calls for help and conversation.

Local Waitakere Board politicians Presland and Turner have advocated on our behalf to the best of their power, even officially recommending to Watercare the alternative site of the Parau landfill as an ideal site for the WTP. They received no response.

Community engagement has been a farce and Watercare have shown little respect for the community it wants to destroy. The youtube video that surfaced after initial drop in sessions didn't show the heated debate that ensued, instead it showed it's own contractors posing as members of the public in a typical Watercare spin campaign.

When you read the resource consent words it reads like the Titirangi Protection Group gladly helped mitigate ecological effects, the reality is they have vehemently opposed the proposal, and put up red flags on multiple issues that Watercare should have forseen themselves.

5.3-5.5 Long and short list of sites.

Of the long and short list sites investigated, only Waima had a significant SEA protection over it (95% coverage). On that basis why it was not stricken off the list shows that Watercare have done nothing to avoid ecological destruction on a SEA protected overlay.

Any avoidance and redesign of the reservoirs does not make up for the fact the entire WTP will still destroy 3.5ha of high value ecological bush protected by SEA overlay.

I also don't believe Watercare considered ALL the alternatives in the long-list stage. The Parau landfill as shown below is 100% owned by Watercare and would only need a small amount of vegetation removal to fit the WTP. Traffic effects would be localized to just Huia Road, not via Scenic and past Woodlands Park School. It's perfect. Why no cleared grassland or property by the dams where discharge could be directed down the spillways was not also considered I'm not sure.



I'mno expert, but initial site scoring should also come into question. From what we now know about the ecological effects by recent reports the scores would look different to what is shown. Ecology with multiple endangered and critically endangered species, should have been awarded a 1/10. Archaeology with a documented history of a major battle on site should have been awarded a 2/5. Noise effects with vegetation clearance from chainsaws reaching borderline hazardous levels should have awarded a 5/10.

87,000 trucks going through a road that doesn't even fit the trucks and 11,000 of those passing Woodlands Park school with its associated noise and vibration effects should have awarded a 10/20. And social effects with the danger of the public on small roads with multiple blind corners should have been awarded a 7/15. The adjusted score would have suggested the unsuitability of the site. I challenge you to challenge Watercare to revisit site selection. We know Auckland needs water, they just chose the worst place for it.

(Also to note that the numbers of the Manuka Road site don't even add up properly. Again bringing into question their credibility in such a process.)

7.1.2 Existing environment

There are somewhat misleading claims made here. The high court challenge was made by The Titirangi Protection Group on behalf of the community. For the community it read clear that the land was designated for water purposes, BUT only in regards to piping, not a massive industrial complex only 4m from residential properties. Residential LIMS of neighboring properties when purchased in the mid 2000s showed no mention of such a designation. And unbeknown to residents with was changed without proper notification to them.

Someone searching Auckland Council maps show the area 'green' and 'as one' with adjoining Waitakere Regional Parkland, with a public walking track on it. So no it's not clear at all there is correct designation on this land.

Regardless of any designation Watercare claim to have on the property, it still gives them no right, hence the resource consents they need, to destroy native bush.

8.8.2 The Auckland Plan

There is no mention whatsoever in the resource consent of the inconsistencies this ecological disaster has on the environmental inititives of the Auckland plan.

The site itself leaves for zero room for expansion, in doing so not future proofing this vital infrastructure.

In short, I call on you to say NO to consenting this project in its entirety. Watercare just need to find somewhere else.

The Auckland Conservation Board submits its concern that the significant earthworks associated with the WTP poses a risk of spreading Kauri dieback. The ecological impact of Kauri dieback in the Auckland region is a major biosecurity threat.

What are the reasons for your submission?

The Tamaki Makaurau – Auckland Conservation Board is an independent statutory body appointed by the Minister for Conservation. It was established by section 6L of the Conservation Act 1987. The Board has the responsibility for overseeing the development and implementation of the conservation management strategy and conservation management plans for its region. As well as providing for interaction between the public and the Department of Conservation at the regional level, the Board also acts as an advocate for the protection of conservation values. Its prime role is to advise the Department, and the New Zealand Conservation Authority (NZCA). The functions of the Board are set out in Sections 6M of the Conservation Act 1987. Under Section 6N of the Act. the Board is conferred the right to appear before courts and tribunals in New Zealand and be heard on matters affecting or relating to the Board's functions. The number of trucks and heavy equipment in the area over an extended period of time; passing dozens of schools/early childhood centres on roads not designed to take these heavy vehicles. It's a real safety concern, as well as a noise concern for local residents. Given the delicate nature of the roading in the area (i.e recent slips on Scenic Drive), heavy machinery in this area seems impractical and dangerous. The removal of such a VAST area of vegetation is a huge concern, especially in the light of the kauri dieback epidemic. We could lose 80+ native species on the 3.5ha site with 11 of those endangered, or critically endangered. 3 very rare or new species of organisms discovered that could help control unwanted pests or disease. 2000mm a year of Titirangi rain that could flush 87,000m3 of sediment down onto the neighbouring kauri forest, including one of the oldest in Auckland only 100m away. 3 streams redirected, altering the natural flow in a wetland area. An increased risk of flood to the residences below the plant area, when trees are removed. Given the climate emergency declared by the Council, it seems foolish to remove the trees/vegetation we desperately need to help keep our planet habitable. The mitigation measures being suggested don't begin to make up for the destruction of a protected ecological area, and the long-term disruption to the local community.

We will be forced to move from our family home and our community and the caos this will cause is far too much for anyone to be expected to bare for a minute let alone 8 years plus. All our hopes and dreams are being destroyed. The wellbeing of our community is at stake. We have one road in and out that services Waima and one other road Huia Road that services Huia to Titirangi. Thats 10,000 people who use these two roads. If Woodlands Park Road becomes mostly unusable which it will, we will have 10,000 people using ONE road. How will emergency services get in and out? Last year Scenic Drive was closed for months, we could not use it. Then one night there was a large accident on Huia Road and it was also closed for the Fire Engine and Ambulances for a few hours. The condenses reason is as follows: The Waituna Group (WAG) is a community-based society incorporated in 2003 which is dedicated to the restoration and preservation of the Waitakere Ranges, and the Southern region around the Waituna catchment in particular. The evidence suggests that the granting of consent for the Huia Replacement Water Treatment Plant (WTP) would be in direct contradiction to this aim, and furthermore would undermine the activities and progress which WAG has made over the last 16 years, leading to a significant loss of vital ecological corridors, and the degradation of the local ecology and environment in a Significant Ecological Area (SEA). An SEA is "an area of significant indigenous vegetation and/or significant habitat of indigenous fauna" (Sawyer and Forbes, 2013), the loss of which cannot be mitigated against. The SEA is recognized in the Auckland Council Unitary Plan and by the provisions of the Waitakere Ranges Heritage Act (2008). The core objective of WAG is to prevent the fragmentation of the catchment bush environment, establish ecological corridors, protect fragile riparian environments, flora and fauna in the Waituna catchment area. WAG opposed the development of the 16ha lot 51 Rimutaka Place in the Environment Court in 2004 (for example as parties to RMA 869/98; RMA 2066/98), much of which has now been vested as a public reserve, Waituna Park, established in 2009 (Western Leader, 2009), following our involvement in the subsequent mediated settlement. The key importance of the 51 Rimutaka site was that it was central to connectively from Exhibition Drive through the current Replacement WTP site and Clarke's Bush, down the riparian margins and through to Little Muddy Creek, as well as representing a significant ecological site in itself. The group has a long track record of working with local people including both private landowners and councils (Waitakere City Council, the Auckland Regional Council, and now the Auckland Council and the Waitakere Ranges Local Board, WRLB) and other local groups such as the Minihaha group, to preserve and restore the local bush environment. WAG has long been recognised as a partner in the restoration of the area, and from 2009 was a Sustainable Neighbourhoods and Green Networks Partner and is the recognised Community ecological group in Waima in the Local Area Plan (WRLB, 2014), but has failed to be acknowledged by the reports conducted by Boffa, or invited to consultation. The 2014 Local Area Plan under the area of 'Kaitiakitanga and the exercise of stewardship' notes that: "Active community groups are contributing to protecting and enhancing the character and amenity of these areas, the wellbeing of their community, and biodiversity outcomes. Some, such as the Sustainable Neighbourhood groups or Waituna Action group, undertake ecological restoration work on private land, road frontages and reserves." (WRLB, 2014:8.) As far back as 2003 the activities of the group have been reported in the press, for example in an article entitled "Fighting for Waima's Future," (Rani, Western Leader, 2003.) To this end the group has secured funding from the Department of Conservation, The Charitable Trusts, EcoMatters, Sargood, Sustainable Neighbourhoods and many others.) The establishment of Waituna Park and the long-term series of projects designed to progress this agenda, and led to the group proposing to the WRLB in 2013 the project now completed as the "Little Muddy Creek walkway." WAG worked with council and local stakeholders throughout this project, and organised many rounds of weed removal, pest control, and planted the area with appropriate native plants to enhance the connectivity of site through to Waituna Park over a number of years, working with members and local volunteers on both public and private adjacent land. WAG has funded and coordinated similar projects on the margins of Waituna Park, the York Rd Reserve, Tangiwhai Reserve, and around Woodland Park School to give some examples (see attached WAG Newsletter, Winter 2011 for example.) The utility of this was recognised in the "State of the Waitakere Ranges Heritage Area 2018" report acknowledging "the Little Muddy Creek walkway linking Tangiwai Reserve and Grendon Road, and the walkway between Rimutaka Place and Huia Road" as significant connected areas where local community groups have been active in restoration (WRLB, 2018. WAG noted in appendices for this area.) The catchment streams have significant importance, which we have been working to enhance resulting in high-quality habitats. They provide a significant habitat for endangered species classified by DOC as "at risk" and "declining," such as the Hochstetter's frog (Leiopelma hochstetteri), Redfin bully (Gobiomorphus huttoni), Longfin eel (Anguilla dieffenbachia), and a spawning ground for inanga (Galaxias maculatus.) These species are sensitive to damage or change to riparian disruption to streams, banks and margins, sedimentation, and run-off which this proposal will produce. These species have been verified by experts as being present in the catchment. In order to preserve these threatened species the New Zealand Forest Owners Association (NZFOA) and the New Zealand Farm Forestry Association (NZFFA) recommend to maintain corridors of riparian vegetation along banks, and that corridors should be as extensive as possible (Buxton 1991; Jowett et al, 1999). Furthermore they recommend the permanent protection of known Hochstetter's frog habitats. We have consulted our qualified ecological experts and the advice is the damage to the catchment would be irreparable. Culverting, a significant feature of the Replacement WTP plan, is highlighted as highly likely to impact negatively on the catchment

and the sensitive species dependent on it. The work WAG and other local groups and the community have done with their funders over the last 16 years in restoring the local streams and ensuring the return of long-finned eels and inanga downstream from the WTP will be destroyed. In addition recently new species have been discovered in the catchment, including a potentially unique native wingless Pteromalid wasp (verified by the Curator of Entomology, Auckland Museum), which requires urgent investigation. A number of extremely rare invertebrate species have recently been discovered on the proposed site and proximate lots. We consider the "Boffa" Ecological Reports and site evaluations to have been rudimentary and inconclusive. For example the bird count was totally inadequate to provide an evaluation of the site in both temporal scope and scale. WAG rejects any proposed mitigation as being totally incompatible with its aims to protect and restore the fragile local environment, which will not address the importance of this gateway region or the important ecological assets within it. Whilst the proposed site is in the foothill borders of the Waitakere Ranges, it has long been understood that to "fragment the vegetation cover in the forest fringes ... undermining the ecological qualities of these areas" (ARC, 1993) has long-term damage on the viability of the Ranges as a whole. In Watercare's own assessment the proposal will damage a large Significant Ecological Area (SEA) and alter the existing water catchment. The Waitakere Ranges Heritage Act (2008) emphasises the important role that the Eastern foothills play as a buffer to the transition from metropolitan Auckland (2008:4; 7(h:i)). Further to this the loss of endangerment of local Kauri and significant trees (directly and indirectly), the harm posed to important local waterways, the material changes to the foothill area are reasons why the consent should be rejected. In addition it is clear that Watercare is proposing a site which failed to meet its initial criteria and has not made a diligent effort to consider alternatives sites.

1. Introduction

The evidence suggests that the granting of consent for the Huia Replacement Water Treatment Plant (WTP) would be in direct contradiction to this aim, and furthermore would undermine the activities and progress which WAG has made over the last 16 years, leading to a significant loss of vital ecological corridors, and the degradation of the local ecology and environment in a Significant Ecological Area (SEA). An SEA is

"an area of significant indigenous vegetation and/or significant habitat of indigenous fauna" (Sawyer and Forbes, 2013), the loss of which cannot be mitigated against. The SEA is recognized in the Auckland Council Unitary Plan and by the provisions of the Waitakere Ranges Heritage Act (2008).

The core objective of WAG is to prevent the fragmentation of the catchment bush environment, establish ecological corridors, protect fragile riparian environments, flora and fauna in the Waituna catchment area. The following sections details the above concerns and provide additional support.

2. Rejection of mitigation

Mitigation will have not redress the extensive degradation of the Waituna catchment ecosystem, which is significant and vulnerable or prevent the fragmentation which the Parliamentary Commissioner for the Environment described as "death by a thousand cuts." (Parliamentary Commissioner for the Environment, 2001.) Development of the proposed site will have a significant impact on the ecological and wildlife values of the site, and crucially the value this area has in terms of its ecological linkages and connections with other areas of forest within the Waituna Catchment and wider Southern Waitakere Ranges. Auckland Council notes that "decline has occurred through the loss and fragmentation of native ecosystems" in the SEAs in the Waitakeres (Sawyer and Forbes, 2013) and the site and environment are part of a large SEA. Damage to the streams through changes to natural courses, run-off and sediments during the build could have devastating impact on the viability of the catchment, including for examples the ability support Hochstetter's frogs (which were found in the Waituna stream and appear to be in decline and fragile) and inanga spawning grounds near Landing Rd. Part of the rationale for the establishment of Waituna Park was to prevent the loss of ecological connectivity in the Waituna catchment, which we consider vital. As such we cannot accept the current site proposal for the proposed Watercare development, and have resolutions at our AGMs not to accept mitigation as offering acceptable outcomes has been sanctioned by our membership. The direct damage to the catchment and wider environs cannot be mitigated against in the loss of connectively and the fragmentation of the area.

We do not feel that ecological groups such as WAG which have been present within the Waituna catchment have been represented or consulted with adequately. We feel that WRPS, Forest and Bird, the Titirangi Residents and Ratepayers Association, and some other groups invited to consultation as representing the catchment and which could benefit from mitigation funding do not wholly represent the interests of Waima and the Waituna catchment as described in this submission in regard to mitigation.

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3. Ecological Connectivity

The Replacement WTP site in its immediate surroundings bounds the forest which forms part of the link between exhibition drive to the north, the forest of Titirangi to the east, and the rest of the Waitakere Ranges to the west, and South through to Waituna Park and Tangiwhai Reserve. The site is a vital part off the Little Muddy Creek riparian corridors, which includes the Waituna Stream. It is one of several blocks of indigenous vegetation which form an important link between the Waitakere Ranges and the coastal ecosystems of the Little Muddy Creek area and the overall area forms an important part of the Waitakere Ranges.

The 2014 Local Area Plan described the area:

"quality streams and healthy and diverse vegetative communities extend throughout Laingholm, up to Woodlands Park and Waima areas. Adjoining housing development in these areas, the surrounding bush is of good density and composition, and provides an almost uninterrupted corridor of vegetation, allowing the facilitation of wildlife movement and the linkage of geographic areas. This vegetation includes kauri, kowhai, kohekohe, puriri and kahikatea amongst others ... the area contains various avian species, and is likely to contain various reptile species such as the forest gecko, the Kauri Snail, and possibly the Hochstetters frog. The area boasts some of the highest sightings of kereru (wood pigeon) in the region in recent community-based counts." (WRLB 2014:8)

Figure 1 shows that the proposal disrupts the integrity of the catchment and its ecological corridors, as identified in the Local Area Plan. The plan highlights "the importance of connected ecosystems that follow natural features within the catchment, particularly natural waterways.," (p.13.) The damage to a major part of the integrity of this area would be devastating. Corridors are crucial in allowing sustainable populations, and are especially important to maintain the integrity of waterways. Protection of the integrity and extensive nature of the forested Ranges is, therefore, important for maintaining biological diversity at a regional and national scale.

The 1999 Auckland Regional Policy Statement (ARPS) Policy 6.4.7.1 (v) explained the importance of this as "the relationship a natural feature has with its surrounding landscape, including its role as an ecological corridor or riparian margin, and the extent of buffering or protection from external adverse effects". The ecological context of an ecosystem or habitat, and the connections and interactions it forms in the surrounding landscape, is suggested to be a significant criterion for assessing significance in the context of Section 6 (c) of the Resource Management Act. Therefore the subject site forms an important part of the Waitakere Ranges and the forest in the Titirangi area. It forms part of a corridor of vegetation along Waituna Stream, which drains into Little Muddy Creek

and the Manukau Harbour. The site forms an important "stepping stone" and connection for native flora and fauna with other areas of forest in the surrounding gullies and hillslopes in the Titirangi area. In particular the site and local corridors provide riparian protection to the Waituna Stream.

ARPS policy 6.4.7.2 also set out a number of criteria for assessing the significance of natural heritage resources in terms of their contribution to the viability of the Region's ecosystems and their role in "maintaining the health and long term survival of ecosystems and their constituent parts in the Region" (ARPS 6.4.9). Criteria which are relevant to the subject site include the following:

- the area contributes to the ecological viability of surrounding areas and biological communities; or
- the area is a component of, adjoins or provides a buffer to, a significant natural resource, or watercourse or coastal margin; or
- the area has habitat values, or provides or contributes to a habitat corridor or connection facilitating the movement of fish or wildlife species in the local area; or
- the protection of the area adds significantly to the spatial characteristics of the protected area network (e.g., by improving connectivity or reducing the distance to the next protected area)."
- Reduces the fragmentation of significant connections of indigenous vegetation between significant ecosystems;

We believe these tests are still relevant and important in assessing the impact of the proposal on the local catchment, and that the replacement WTP fails all of these criteria. In assessing the importance of the area in the context as being a vital local corridor we draw on evidence given by Shona Myers, Senior Ecologist at Wildlands Consultants (with former positions as the Natural Heritage Scientist with the Auckland Regional Council, for the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research and Department of Conservation) as part of RMA2066/98. This evidence followed detailed research of the ecology of the catchment. In relation to the loss or severing of connections between habitats and areas of indigenous vegetation the evidence given presented that "Maintaining the continuous and intact nature of the indigenous vegetation at the subject site [51 Rimutaka Place],

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and the linkages which the vegetation forms with the Waituna Stream and other parts of the Waitakere Ranges is important for ensuring the long term viability and biological diversity of the site, and of the Ranges as a whole. Fragmenting these linkages through vegetation clearance would lead to loss of habitats for indigenous flora and fauna and impact on the long-term viability of the forest ecosystem." (Appeal RMA 2066/98, Statement Of Evidence By Shona Claire Myers.) In addition it is self-evident that the stream systems are not deductible and form continuous ecological corridors and affected by changes upstream as proposed by the Replacement WTP.

Further to this the Council must reject this application in total contradiction to the "keep Kauri standing" policy. Kauri onsite, including rickers falling under the size limit recognised by Watercare in their assessments, will obviously be destroyed, but the mature Kauri proximate to the site will also be adversely affected. We believe that there are likely to be submissions which are focused on Kauri and will not focus on this important issue within this submission, but it cannot be overemphasised that Kauri are under extreme threat and the Replacement TPG proposal is incompatible with aim to protect them.

4. Lack of adequate process

We do not feel that Watercare has sought to evaluate alternative sites to the proposed site with any rigour, and that this consent application should be rejected. In their initial scoping Watercare had identified a large number of other site options, including Parker Rd, Oratia, as well as other contingencies such as bringing forward their Waikato river new plant and upgrading the existing facility. We understand that the WRLB proposed a new site, which in the assessment of our Ecological advisers offered low environmental impact, known as the "sludge site," (Pipeline and Huia Rd), which had the backing of local people and the Waima Residents and Ratepayers Association. We submit that Replacement WTP proposal contravenes the first principle of the RMA to avoid irreversible adverse environmental effects and is inconsistent with Auckland Unitary Plan and the intent of the Heritage Act to "avoid reductions in the extent, range and quality of native ecosystems" and development that "reduces the overall dominance of natural and rural features."

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The Replacement WTP is contrary to the aim of the Heritage Act to "manage aquatic and terrestrial ecosystems in the area and to protect and enhance the indigenous habitat values, landscape values and amenity values," and to "recognise that people live in the area in distinct communities (ie. Waima), and to enable those people to provide for their social, economic, environmental and cultural wellbeing" (section 8 subsection (g)(i and iii); and (i)). The character of the area described in the Heritage Act as "a rare and accessible instance of nature and history in close proximity to a metropolitan city" and the amenity of the local community will be severely compromised by the large-scale industrial project which is no longer appropriate to the nature of the area. Since the 1930s when Watercare applied for the zoning of the site the character and context of the area has changed; the Parliamentary Commissioner for the Environment gave emphasis that "the way in which the pattern of development is being allowed to happen in these (Waitakere peri-urban) environments" need to be carefully reviewed in a holistic manner to preserve the character of areas (2001.)

The Local Area Plan for Waima promised that:

"the delicate balance between houses and vegetation along the slopes will be maintained ... Ecological corridors within the area will provide safe, healthy and connected ecosystems and terrestrial habitats. Restored riparian margins will assist aquatic ecosystems to flourish from the Manukau Harbour to the upper tributaries" (WRLB, 2014: 11.)

Every statement in the above policy would be undermined and undone by the granting of the Replacement TPG consent. WAG does not accept that Watercare cannot fulfil its duty to provision for Auckland's water supply without finding an area which would not violate an important SEA, the provisions and spirit of the Heritage Act and Unity Plan and the wishes of the local community. WAG does not accept that this proposal represents the best or adequate technical decision to maintain the supply of water for the region, or that there has been a credible process to ensure for this outcome.

Some kauri dieback has been found but currently aears to be contained. The influx of construction worker will act to assure that the location becomes fully infected. It will not be possible to contain soil movement here during earthworks. The construction creates undue risk for the death of giant kauri, endangered species and other native treasures. There are noble trees located down stream and within effected areas, long tail bats seen using the area. Risking these things when we do have other viable alternatives seems to be counter to many of our other objectives where the nation spends lots of money and effort over years. I strongly oppose this project because of its harmful effects on local ecological system, local residents, children and school, and international green image of New Zealand.

Harmful Ecological Effects of the Project

This project threatens the ecosystem of the Waitakere Ranges which has national significance. The removal of 3.5 ha of the protected native forest which is classed as Significant Ecological Area (SEA), contains species which are considered endangered or critically endangered and forms a part of largely intact forested corridor providing food, shelter and breeding grounds for native species is going to have disasterous effects on the area. According to the assessment provided by Boffa and Miskell in their Ecological Report dated on 21 May 2019 the site has very high ecological values and overall effect of the proposed development is High.

This project goes against everything I as a resident of this area highly value and hold dear - conservation of native flora and fauna, image of "green and clean New Zealand" and our efforts to save kauri forests for the future generations. Currently, our beloved icon tree is threatened with extinction due to dieback disease and most of the tracks in the Waitakere Ranges are closed for visitors (including the Clark's bush track crossing the area of proposed water treatment plan) to save these unique and precious trees. The fact that kauri are endangered is widely recognised by Maori community that initiated the rahui, which is supported by the Auckland City Council. This Project proposes to cut down healthy kauri trees, move large amounts of potentially contaminated soil, threatening genetically diverse kauri forest located below the site containing historically significant kauri trees. 2000mm a year of rainfall will flush sediment, along with potential kauri dieback spores down into kauri stands throughout the valley. Only 100 metres from the site stands Clarks kauri, 36 m high and one of the oldest kauri in Auckland. Watercare cannot guarantee that kauri and other protected trees located close to the site or down in the valley won't be affected as current control protocols were not developed for the projects of this size. Our house is located very close to the prospective site and we have 16 mature kauri trees on our grounds – they are part of the same grove Watercare is planning to fragment - and we want them to remain healthy and standing!

Mitigation package proposed by Watercare is negligable to offset the negative effects on local ecology. Weed and pest control are already part of the Council plan for the area and won't make up for the loss of protected bush and species relying on it.

Harmful Effects of the Project on Local Residents and Community

The project will significantly alter the character of the community, which attracted our family when we made our decision to move here. When we purchased the house, the paperwork showed that the area adjacent to our house is part of a National Park with Clarks Bush Track running through it.

Harmful effects of the project on local residents include but not limited to: terrestrial effects; ground instability effects; impact of earthworks on water quality and soil conservation; increased discharges to air; contaminated soil disturbance effects, groundwater and settlement effects, storm water diversion and discharge effects; transport effects associated with vegetation removal and bulk earthworks, noise and vibration effects associated with vegetation removal and earthworks, and effects of stream diversion and reclamation.

In fact, Watercare proposed to give us, residents, only 10 metre buffer zone from the boundary! Just to give an indication – when Watercare proposed the same project in Oratia they gave the residents 32 metres of buffer zone, which suggests discrimination based on community membership in favour of Oratia residents and violation of equality principle governing New Zealand society. Practically, that means that our life will be unbearable or even in danger if the consents to carry out proposed earthworks and remove vegetation were granted. This project, if approved, is a threat to our psychological and physical health, well-being and functionality because during the construction period we will not only be witnessing the destruction of the forest we love, we will also be suffering of the very loud noise on a daily basis (higher than allowed limits), and associated traffic created by heavy trucks.

There is a huge concern about the amount of heavy traffic during the construction period. The roads are narrow and windy and there are schools and learning centres on proposed routes. Traffic is already an issue in our area at peak times as the alternative routes are either very limited or non-existent. 80+ heavy trucks added to it will make it a real nightmare for people living in the area.

According to construction plans the site which already sits above our houses will be further elevated (at least 1.5-2 m more) and we have great concers about ground stabillity. If all the trees which hold ground together are removed there is a great potential for landslips and flooding and in this case all the houses situated below will be affected. Also, constant vibration associated with work and movement of heavy machinery may further affect stability of the area and have detrimental effect on our houses and we won't be able to receive any compensation through insurance claims. Despite all that no mitigation or compensation was proposed to the residents of neighbouring properties.

There is no buffer zone proposed for high density vegetation located on the border of the site which means that the number of trees affected will be greater than Watercare shows in their documentation.

Harmful Effects of the Project on Children and School

Children from Woodlands Park School and other Enviro schools were educated about the importance of fresh water ecology and took active part in planting. Culverting will severely compromise all this work and set restoration efforts back many years. Increased discharge of stormwater and groundwater would flush more sediment into streams and eventually into the Little Muddy Creek and Manukau Harbour There have been many years of community initiatives to restore the streams with reparian planting, pest and weed control.

If the Resource Consents sought by Watercare were given to this project, it would send a wrong message to our children who are already confused by what is happening in our area – Rahui and lots of words in support of kauri and native ecology from the Council on one side and the proposed destruction of the thriving native ecosystem containing kauri and other endangered native species by the Council Controlled Organisation on the other side.

Harmful Effects of the Project on the International Green Image of New Zealand

Despite the Rahui the natural character of the area attracts a lot of international tourists every year. The prospective vegetation removal, earthworks and associated activities, movement of heavy traffic on our narrow and windy roads will have very negative effect on tourism in the area and also further descredit the "clean and green image" of New Zealand.

Not only trees are under attack. The vegetation on the Project site forms part of the ecological corridor connecting forest in the Lower Nihotupu Reservoir and Little Muddy Creek catchment. If it is removed, native birds, insects and invertebrates inhabiting the area are going to be affected. There will be a gap in the largely intact ecological corridor which means further decrease in biodiversity. The area is not well-studied and may contain rare species. As an example, a new species of Pteromalid wasp was found on site and a very rare "slave ant". This information is not in the ecological reports yet. All these species will have no chance of survival if vegetation on site is removed

Watercare asks for consent to culvert and redirect the streams and also to discharge stromwater and ground water. The streams have moderate to high water quality and are home to native species. What will happen to them? According to Ecological Assessment Report prepared for Watercare by Boffa and Miskell dated 21 May 2019 two of the fish species observed were labeled as At Risk/ Declining, and there was at least one species of invertebrates which is "increasingly rare".

Just to give an indication – when Watercare proposed the same project in Oratia they gave the residents 32 metres of buffer zone, which suggests discrimination based on community membership in favour of Oratia residents and violation of equality principle governing_New Zealand society. Furthermore, propsals to create 2m working zone within this buffer will reduce it to 8 metres making its ability to mitigate the negative effects even lower. Practically, that means that our life will be unbearable or even in danger if the consents to carry out proposed earthworks and remove vegetation were granted. This project, if approved, is a threat to our psychological and physical health, well-being and functionality because during the construction period we will not only be witnessing the destruction of the forest we love, we will also be suffering of the very loud noise on a daily basis (higher than allowed limits), and associated traffic created by heavy trucks. Neither the potential risks for neighbouring properties nor mitigation of those are addressed by AEE.

There is a huge concern about the amount of heavy traffic during the construction period. The roads are narrow and windy and there are schools and learning centres on proposed routes. Traffic is already an issue in our area at peak times as the alternative routes are either very limited or non-existent. 80+ heavy trucks added to it will make it a real nightmare for people living in the area.

According to construction plans the site which already sits above our houses will be further elevated (at least 1.5-2 m more) and we have great concers about ground stabillity. If all the trees which hold ground together are removed there is a great potential for landslips and flooding and in this case all the houses situated below will be affected. Also, constant vibration associated with work and movement of heavy machinery may further affect stability of the area and have detrimental effect on our houses and we won't be able to receive any compensation through insurance claims. WSL has conducted a number of meetings with direct neighbours informing us about the project development and its technical aspects. However, no concrete mitigation or compensation measures were proposed by WSL to the residents of neighbouring properties at any stage.

There is no buffer zone proposed for high density vegetation located on the border of the site which means that the number of trees affected will be greater than Watercare shows in their documentation.

Mitigation package proposed by Watercare_for the area is negligable to offset the negative effects on local ecology. Weed and pest control are already part of Auckland_Council plan for the area and won't make up for the loss of protected bush and species relying on it.

Despite the Rahui the natural character of the area attracts a lot of international tourists every year. The prospective vegetation removal, earthworks and associated activities, movement of heavy traffic on our narrow and windy roads will have very negative effect on tourism in the area and also further descredit the "clean and green image" of New Zealand.

The project will alter the character of the community which attracted us when we made our decision to move here. When we purchased the house the paperwork showed that the area adjacent to our house is part of a National Park with Clarks Bush Track running through it.

Not only trees are under attack. The vegetation on the Project site forms part of the ecological corridor connecting forest in the Lower Nihotupu Reservoir and Little Muddy Creek catchment. If it is removed, native birds, insects and invertebrates inhabiting the area are going to be affected. There will be a gap in the largely intact ecological corridor which means further decrease in biodiversity. The area is not well-studied and may contain rare species. As an example, a new species of Pteromalid wasp was found on site and a very rare "slave ant". This information is not in the ecological reports yet. All these species will have no chance of survival if vegetation on site is removed.

Watercare asks for consent to culvert and redirect the streams and also to increase discharge of stromwater and ground water into the Yorke gully. Both redirection and diversion are non-comlying activities in an SEA. The streams in question, form the headwaters of the permanent Yorke gully, described as an excellent quality stream with an SEV of 0.845 and habitat of Longfin Eel and Inanga, both listed as At Risk-

Declining_and at least one species of Invertebrates which is "Increasingly Rare" (Eclogical Assessment Report by Boffa and Miskell). What will happen to them? The AEE does not provide the answer to this question as neither the effects of the intermittent stream reclamation nor those of the increased stormwater discharge on York gully ecology are sufficiently addressed.

Increased discharge of stormwater and groundwater would flush more sediment into streams and eventually into the Little Muddy Creek and Manukau Harbour There have been many years of community initiatives to restore the streams with reparian planting, pest and weed control. Children from Woodlands Park School and other Enviro schools were educated about the importance of fresh water ecology and took active part in planting. Proposed activities will severely compromise all this work and set restoration efforts back many years.

If the Resource Consents sought by Watercare were given to this project, it would send a wrong message to our children who are already confused by what is happening in our area – Rahui and lots of words in support of kauri and native ecology from the Council on one side and the proposed destruction of the thriving native ecosystem containing kauri and other endangered native species by the Council Controlled Organisation on the other side.

Decision sought

The submitter seeks that the Application be declined in its entirety.

Alternatively, if the Application is granted the submitter seeks conditions that mitigate the adverse effects on Manuka Road residents.

1) Section 8.3 Waitakere Ranges Heritage Area Act 2008. The Resource consent application refers to section 13 of the act in relation to "protect, restore, and enhance the area and its heritage features etc." This applies to all of the land regardless of whether it is privately or publicly owned. To ignore this by using the rationale that it is ok to clear the project site because the area has been cleared in the past is setting a dangerous precedent that puts the ecology of the entire ranges at at risk, as much of it has been cleared in the past "for the national good" to provide timber to build Auckland and to create farm land. It is clear when comparing the photographs of the site from 1940 and 1959 (ref. Boffa Miskell Ltd Assessment of Ecological Effects Figures 1 and 2) with current Google Earth photographs that over the last almost 80 years the forest canopy for the whole area has recovered remarkably. The majority of the land in the photos is privately owned, much of it now residential. The fact that the native forest is so visibly regenerating in a residential area is in itself an indicator of how important it is to the residents of this area. Over time the surrounding land use has changed and the importance of protecting the remnants of our ngahere are now well recognised. No one is arguing that the existing water treatment plant should be removed – it was here before the surrounding land was rezoned, allowing a residential subdivision to be built and before the WRHHA and Auckland Unitary Plan came into being. It was here before Phil Goff planted the millionth tree on 14th June 2019 and before Jacinda Ardern and Shane Jones pledged to plant 1 billion trees over 10 years. Taking these changes into account, the building of a new industrial plant in the middle of a residential suburb and a recovering ecosystem is unthinkable. 2) Section 3.7.3 Reptiles and amphibians. The Application for Resource Consent notes that no geckos were found during the site survey. I have attached a photo of a Forest Gecko that was on the wall by my front door at 7 Waima Crescent (adjacent to the reservoir site) in February 2019. These geckos are often seen in and around the forest and are likely to be present in the project sites.

What are the reasons for your submission?

On top of the destruction of the ecosystem, which will extend beyond the project sites into the greater area, the lives of the residents of the area will be significantly impacted for years by noise and traffic over roads that are suitable to carry large trucks. On a deeper level, we live here because we love the forest. Seeing and hearing it be destroyed after so much nurturing and protection, on top of the noise and inconvenience is adding a large amount of emotional insult to injury for the families who live in here.

What decisions and amendments would you like the council to make?

My suggestion is to pipe the water out of the ranges from the original Huia Rd site (as is already planned) to a treatment plant that is in a designated industrial zone that will not cause the anticipated environmental damage expected at the Waima site.

This submission is in support of one aspect of the mitigation proposed by Watercare in 4.10.10 **Broader mitigation initiatives: Repurposing of the Nihotupu Filter Station**

Water care proposes to restore the Nihotupu Filter Station and repurpose the structure. Watercare is "committed to undertaking the required remedial and strengthening work to enable the building to be repurposed, potentially as office space (including a potential site office during the construction period) or as a water supply heritage facility as advocated by members of the Engineering Heritage

New Zealand and local heritage groups." (page 51) The cost of this is estimated by Watercare to be \$3.8 million.

The Nihotupu Filter Station is included in the Auckland Unitary Plan Schedule of Significant Historic Heritage Places (Item 86) in Category B. The interior is excluded. The extent of place extends to the Woodlands Park Road and Scenic Drive boundaries in the south and east and to the neighbouring property in the north.

The heritage values were deemed to be:

A Historical

- Part of a group of places associated with the construction of the Waitakere Ranges water supply system
- Represents Auckland City Council efforts to address water shortages and contamination problems with the city water supply in 1920s
- Association with W E Bush, Auckland City Engineer

B Social

- Important reminder of past way of life and development of infrastructure
- Recognised by IPENZ

F Physical Attributes

- Good example of specialized building type early 20th century water purification system
- Representative example of work of Candy Filter Company of London (filtration specialists who designed scheme around the world)

G Aesthetic

Formal architectural appearance in Stripped Classical style.

Before inclusion in the Unitary Plan the building was scheduled in the Auckland District Plan – Waitakere Section Category 2 for exterior and Category 3 for specific internal elements.

The Watercare designation 9324 specifically states that "Works shall not adversely affect those elements of the Huia Filter Station (WSL4), the Nihotupu Filter Station (WSL4) or the Waitakere Filter Station (WSL3) which are identified in the Heritage Appendix of this Plan..."

A heritage assessment was carried out for Watercare Services Ltd by Matthews & Matthews Architects Ltd and published in September 2015.

The Nihotupu and Waitakere Filter Stations were built in 1927 to the same design. The Nihotupu Filter Station was built to coincide with the completion of the Upper Huia Dam (Engineering Heritage New Zealand, Supporting Information, page 1). The Huia Filter Station was built in 1928 in Woodlands Park Road but to a different design and is proposed to continue in use with the new treatment plant. The layout and plans for the Nihotupu Filter Station were prepared by the London-based Candy Filter Company. While the Waitakere and Huia Filter Stations are still in use, and thus have undergone modification, the Nihotupu Filter Station was closed in the early 1990s. Consequently, much of this station "retains original plant and equipment from when it was originally constructed. It has survived as the building was decommissioned" (Matthews & Matthews, page 2).

The building was constructed of reinforced concrete in the Stripped Classical style. It still has its original steel windows though these have been boarded over. The heritage assessment by Matthews and Matthews has given an A Exceptional Significance rating to the exterior, the steel windows and adjoining garage and a B Considerable Significance to many of the elements of the interior.

"The Nihotupu Filter Station retains a variety of early painted steel motors, steel gantries, chains, hooks and painted steep rails as well as a range of early tanks and tank platforms. These surviving early features are identified as significant.

The building also retains much of its early plan layout and architectural detail including plastered reinforced concrete structure, steel framed windows and t&g timber doors. The main elevation facing the street, although boarded up is generally intact and is assessed as significant. The rear and west elevations are not readily visible. A small garage dating from 1927 is also assessed as significant" (Matthews & Matthews, page 73).

The 1960s chemical stores and 1980s addition to the building are not assessed as having significance.

A seismic and structural condition assessment of the building concluded that the building is in relatively good condition and can be improved and strengthened to reach acceptable standards (Opus International Consultants Ltd, 2010).

Engineering Heritage New Zealand has assessed that Waitakere Ranges water supply system of dams and other infrastructure and determined that this should be included in the IPENZ Engineering Heritage Register. Members of Engineering Heritage New Zealand attended a meeting of the Community Liaison Group during 2018 and spoke strongly in favour of retaining and repurposing the building.

Watercare's proposal is to restore the building, use it as offices during construction of the treatment plant, and thereafter repurpose it. It suggests its future use may be as offices or "a water supply heritage facility as advocated by members of the Engineering Heritage New Zealand and local heritage groups."

This approach is supported and there could be additional uses linked to the recreational use of Exhibition Drive. The filter station stands at the entrance to the Drive which is now a well-used recreational walkway for walkers, runners and cyclists, especially for family cycling. It is a safe, all-weather route that links through the Beveridge Track to Arataki Visitor Centre. It is readily accessible by people living in the Woodlands Park and Waima areas and is well-used for recreation.

It is the only place that cycling is allowed in the Waitakere Ranges Regional Park and is one of the few routes by which people with limited mobility can experience the Waitakere Ranges, as it is flat with a tar-sealed surface.

Consequently there is scope for businesses that support the Drive to be located in the building, such as bike hire or café. There are outstanding views to be had from the roof of the building.

There is also potential for interpretation of the water supply system to be installed in the building in the form of a museum or exhibition space. The Waitakere Ranges has the distinction of being a continuously operated water supply area for around 130 years. Infrastructure such as dams, tramways and filter stations that were installed in the 19th and early 20th still exist and are mostly still in use. This provides a unique opportunity to interpret aspects of water supply such as catchments, water quality, management of the asset and the workforce. The history of the Waitakeres water

supply system and the people involved have been well documented, with a rich photographic archive and documentation in Auckland Council archives. A history of the water supply was written for Watercare by historian Graeme Murdoch some years ago, so there is great potential to build on this prior work with displays and also to provide interactive education about water for young people and visitors.

Therefore it is our submission that restoration and repurposing of the Nihotupu Filter Station as proposed by Watercare is supported and is included in the Mitigation package for the Huia Replacement Water Treatment Plant (WTP) Project.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This Heritage Assessment has been prepared by Matthews and Matthews Architects Ltd. on behalf of Watercare Services Ltd. The assessment refers to the Nihotupu Filter Station.

The Nihotupu Water Filter Station, at the corner of Woodlands Park Rd and Scenic Drive, Titirangi, was constructed in 1927 following a series of water shortages, and water testing by the Health Department demonstrating sub-standard water quality. Water from the Nihotupu dam was not contaminated with bacteriological matter but in heavy rains was often silty and discoloured from suspended particulate and organic matter. The Nihotupu station was one of three filter stations designed around the same time, with the Nihotupu and Waitakere Stations constructed to the same design in 1927, followed by the Huia Filter Station constructed in 1929.

Concept plans were prepared in England. The London-based Candy Filtration Company, which had been awarded the contract for the Waitakere and Nihotupu Filter Stations, prepared layout and plant plans. The initial architectural plans were also prepared in England, by Structural Engineers L.G. Mouchel & Partners using the patented Hennebique Ferro-concrete System, an early form of steel reinforced cast in-situ concrete. The initial design was revised and the building was constructed to detailed plans prepared by the Candy Filtration Company, with an amended floor plan and facades. It is not clear whether the firm of L.G.Mouchel & Partners was involved in the revised plan.

The building was designed in a Stripped Classical style, often used in the 1920s and 1930s for public and commercial buildings. It is a simplified variation of a Classical style utilising forms, motifs and elements associated with Classical architecture but in a stylised and simplified form. The overall effect is sleek and simple, yet maintaining the grandeur of the classical style.

The original building survives in close to its original form and layout, but has been added to, with the addition of a front porch and upper level lunchroom possibly in the 1960s, and a larger three-level addition with a glazed curtain wall to the front elevation in 1980.

The building is no longer in use, and remains boarded up. Options for its future are under consideration. Currently Watercare proposes the building's demolition.

The report format includes a history of the building within the context of Waitakere and the water supply of Metropolitan Auckland. This is followed by an assessment of significance of building elements and spaces within. A summary of significance assessed against heritage criteria follows.

INTRODUCTION

Commission

This Heritage Assessment has been prepared by Matthews & Matthews Architects Ltd on behalf of Watercare Services Ltd. It is intended to provide a preliminary analysis and identification of those elements that contribute to the overall cultural heritage significance of the Nihotupu Filter Station situated at the corner of Woodlands Park Rd and Scenic Drive, Titirangi. The Heritage Assessment will assist in the development of appropriate proposals for the future of the building.

Research has been carried in as much detail as possible within the available time with the objective of trying to establish an overview of the significance of the place, some idea of the original form of the building and changes that have occurred.

The format follows in outline the approach used for the preparation of conservation plans.

Status

The Nihotupu Filter Plant is situated at the corner of Woodlands Park Rd and Scenic Drive, Titirangi, on Lot 2, DP 156565.

(i) Designation

The Old Nihotupu Filter Station is located within the Watercare designation (reference WSL4), as shown on the Human Environment Map G8 and H8 of the Operative Waitakere District Plan 2002 (District Plan). The designated purpose of the site is "Watercare Services Limited: Water supply purposes — Huia and Nihotupu Filter Station."

The designation is subject to conditions, of which Condition 3(a) is particularly relevant to this proposal: "Works shall not adversely affect those elements of the Huia Filter Station (WSL4), the Nihotupu Filter Station (WSL4) or the Waitakere Filter Station (WSL3) which are identified in the Heritage Appendix of this Plan, CHI numbers 1257, 1283, and 1289 respectively, under the columns headed "Description" and "Interiors."

(ii) Heritage Scheduled Item

The building is scheduled in the Heritage Appendix of the Waitakere District Plan, CHI 1283. The listing is for External – II (specific elements) and Internal – III (specific elements).

The listing reads as follows:

- The form and scale of the 1927 Nihotupu Filter Station building, including decorative façade elements, and excluding later additions
- Original (1928-1947) windows and doors
- The basic form of the 1927 filter tanks (but not surfaces, which may be subject to maintenance work and repair from time to time)
- Significance attributed to historical, architectural and landmark values.
- (iii) The building is not registered by the New Zealand Historic Places Trust.

Methodology

This heritage assessment provides an evaluation of the significance of the building, and an assessment of the contribution that individual spaces and elements make relative to the place as a whole. Readily available historical data on the place was investigated, and an inspection of the building made. Based on an analysis of this documentary and physical evidence the assessment has been prepared using relative criteria from Waitakere City District Plan.

NIHOTUPU FILTER STATION - BRIEF HISTORY

Maori History of the Waitakere Rangesi

Human occupation in the Waitakere Ranges has a long history of over 1000 years. Both Te Kawerau a Maki and Ngati Whatua claim mana whenua status in the Waitakere Ranges. There are a number of known middens, waahi tapu sites and pa sites in the area relating to Maori Occupation.

The Waitakere mountains bear the name, "Nga Rou Pou a Maki", the numerous posts belonging to Maki. Maki was the famous ancestor of Te Kawerau a Maki, who regard themselves as the tangata Whenua of the region. Te Kawerau a Maki people have been a distinct tribal entity since the early 1600s, when their ancestor Maki and his people conquered and settled the district.

Ngati Whatua claim that occupation, kinship and significant events bond Ngati Whatua to the Waitakere district and Te Kawerau a Maki. The waterways of the region were significant providers of food for the tribe, as well as transport routes for their waka. Travel enabled communications between hapu, tribes, and trade routes that developed between kin groups then later with European and American whalers, sealers and merchants. The main portages between Manukau and Waitematā were at Otahuhu and Te Whau (Blockhouse Bay). Ngati Whatua based in Tamaki (Auckland) accessed the Waitakere Ranges for provisions and trade, or for safe cover for during attack.

The abundant food supply of fish, forest birds and berries, and fertile kumara growing areas ensured that competition was strong for the resources and the land, and warfare between the two tribes was ongoing. Settlements at Te Henga and Karekare developed with an intermingling of the tribes. Contact with early Europeans introduced the pig and potato as new food sources.

In 1825 an attack from Ngapuhi from the North decimated the Kawerau, with several hundred left dead at Karekare and younger women and children taken captive. The few who escaped moved south and lived in exile for ten yearsⁱⁱ.

In modern times both Te Kawerau a Maki and Ngati Whatua have concerns over the sustainable management of the area and its resources, including the water and flora and fauna. Te Kawerau a Maki sum up their concerns regarding water as follows:

The mauri (life-force) of all natural waters should be protected, and the food producing capacity and life supporting capacity of natural waterways should be protected and enhanced. The iwi wants waterways to be managed to a level that ensures their use as a food source and supports active restoration programmes, including stream edge planting. Above all, the iwi requires that the spiritual and cultural concepts should be recognised as key issues in water managementⁱⁱ.

Early European Settlement

European settlement began in the 1830s, with timber milling, kauri gum digging and flax milling as the earliest industries. In the 1840s timber merchants began milling in the Waitakere Ranges and the Crown purchased most of the Waitakere Ranges. With the construction of the railway and more ready access to the area, more land was sold and increased forestry led to the destruction of the Kauri forest. Today Te Kawerau a Maki hold title to just four hectares of land.

Brickworks and pottery industries developed with a tannery and New Lynn and later the Mephan-Ferguson Steel Pipe Works. Suburban development followed later, and more recently as the population has grown, manufacturing and service industries have been established in Waitakere City.

Development of the Gravitational Headworks in the Waitakere Ranges 1907-1929^{iv}

The population of Auckland trebled between 1901 and 1930, from 38,000 in 1900-1901 to 105,600 in 1929-30. Auckland was now New Zealand's largest city, largest port, and leading centre of manufacturing. Amalgamation between ten suburban local bodies and Auckland City took place between 1913 and 1928. Once a local body amalgamated, access was provided to Auckland City's cheap and reliable water supply, which further boosted suburban growth and industrial development.

Industry was concentrated around the central port of Auckland, the Onehunga area, and New Lynn. New Lynn boasted a large tannery and brick works, both major water users, as well as the Mephan-Ferguson Steel Pipe Works which had been established to provide mains for the Waitakere Gravitational supply, as well as city pipework. As both industry and suburban development occurred, increasing pressure was put on the water supply of the city.

From 1875 the city's water was supplied solely by the Western Springs Waterworks, but by 1900 the water quality had declined and the quantity was not sufficient for the city's needs. A proposal was put forward by H.M Wilson and J. Carlaw to progressively develop gravitational headworks in the Waitakere ranges, developing from a temporary dam at Nihotupu which had been constructed in 1902. In 1904 the ACC accepted the proposal and finance was made available. Wilson, a New Zealand trained consulting engineer, was put in charge of the development, working with Carlaw, the waterworks engineer.

Land was acquired and cleared, and a tramway constructed to the site. The Nihotupu temporary dam was constructed of timber. A team of approximately 20 men living in makeshift huts nearby constructed the timber dam and tramway. A 16 mile long steel main line was laid from the Waitakere dam to the Ponsonby Reservoir. When this was complete the city had access to 3 million gallons of water per day.

In 1915 the contract was let for the main impounding dam, the Upper Nihotupu dam, designed by Wilson and to be constructed of mass concrete. Completion of the 530 million gallon impoundment was planned for 1920, but the project struck many difficulties including the accidental death of the main contractor, and shortage of labour and materials during and following World War I. Auckland City Council took over the project in 1921, finally completing it in 1923.

Meanwhile there had been a number of severe water shortages when the city was forced to use the poor quality Western Springs water – culminating in the severe 'Water Crisis' in the summer of 1919-20. Water from both Western Springs and Waitakere was sub-standard and Health Department testing demonstrated faecal contamination. The Western Springs supply was severely contaminated by Ground water seepage for Newton Gully, while the Nihotupu supply had been contaminated by run-off from workers' camps which were too closely situated to the dam. The government bacteriologist recommended the immediate installation of a "Candy de Chlor Filter" and notices were placed in newspapers advising the boiling of all drinking water. The catchment areas were now screened off from the public, the workers camp was moved and the catchment drained, chlorinated and scoured.

This scare led to the installation of temporary chlorination plants at the Nihotupu break pressure tank and at Western Springs. This dealt with the problems of contamination but not with the discoloration of water produced by fine silt particles and organic matter introduced by stormwater runoff in bad weather, and by activity upstream in the construction of new catchment areas. The contamination scare and public frustration over water quality were triggers that led to the construction of filtration plants at Waitakere (1927), Titirangi (Nihotupu supply 1927) and later at Huia (1929).


To anticipate future shortages the ACC quickly implemented the next phase in the Waitakere Headworks development programme, the Upper Huia Stream Valley gravitational headworks. This project included construction of a 7 mile aqueduct between the Upper Huia dam and the Filter Stations at Titirangi, was completed between 1924 and 1929. The Waitakere dam was also raised by 16 feet to double its storage capacity.

The construction of the concrete dams had been very damaging for the natural beauty of the Waitakere and Nihotupu Falls, which had previously been a source of great attraction for visitors to the area. However the Government vested the Nihotupu Domain of 4710 in the ACC as water catchment land, which was then supplemented by Council by the purchase of adjoining catchments. These areas have been allowed to regenerate into natural forest and scrub in the ownership of the ACC (now Auckland Council) and provide a valuable natural resource for the people of Auckland and its visitors.


With a ready source of cheap, high quality water available in Auckland, hygiene conditions improved rapidly, and soon every house had a WC and running water. John A. Lee, well-known left wing Auckland Politician, commented "Men have gone to the moon and marvelled, but no greater event occurred on the earth than the abundance of soap and the unheralded arrival of hot and cold water by the turning of a tap. It is a gift of my life time, as is the leisure to use it. A rocket to the moon put millions on to exploration potential; but hygiene – made possible by instant hot and cold water – probably doubled our lifespan*.

History of the Site

The Nihotupu Filter Station is situated at the corner of Woodlands Park Rd and Scenic Drive, Titirangi, on Lot 2, DP 156565.




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
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Land for the filter station and other water uses was purchased from a number of individual land-owners. It comprises land from four crown grants, Part of Allotments 17, 26, 27, and 30 Parish of Waikomiti.


Allotment 17 was granted to N Parkins in 1856 and sold to Richard Matthews in 1858. It rapidly changed hands several times, until purchased by J Stanton who owned it from 1865 until 1910. After several further owners it passed to N Morpeth who owned it until from 1912 until 1927, when it passed to M.J. Bird, then in 1929 to Auckland City Council.



Allotment 26 was granted to William Russell in 1856, who sold it in 1861 to Thomas Buddle, who owned it until 1865 when it passed to N.E. Bruce. The land was subdivided several times and passed through various ownership until sold by Bishop to the King in 1927, and passed to Auckland City Coursell from marrie week.



Allotment 27 was granted to Thomas Russell in 1854 and passed to William Russell in 1856. It passed through several owners and was subdivided multiple times before passing to the ownership of Auckland City Council In 1929.

Allotment 30 was granted to Mahon in 1855 and sold to a M. H. Willkins (?) in 1864 who owned it until 1878 when he sold it to Clive Smith. It passed through a number of hands until 1900 Mould sold part of the land to Auckland City Council, possibly for the road. In 1926, when the part of the land was brought under the Land Transfer Act and the road was laid through the allotment (now Scenic Drive). In 1946 the land was purchased by the 'Mayor, Councillors and Citizens of the City of Auckland'.


Nihotupu Filter Station

After the water crisis during the summer of 1920-21, when Health Department testing demonstrated both the Western Springs and Nihotupu water supplies to be unsanitary, the Auckland City Council (ACC) had installed temporary chlorination systems to both supplies. In 1924 the ACC adopted a policy of water filtration for all water supplied to the city.


Walter Bush, city engineer at the time, was called on to provide specifications for the filters and to invite tenders. Waitakere Ranges water was pure of chemicals and bacteria but required filtration because of discolouration by sediment and organic matter, particularly during periods of heavy rain. The sediment caused corrosion in the cast iron pipework, reducing flow and adding to the discolouration problem. Bush specified that the filter would have to be able to remove suspended matter, to provide safeguards against bacterial or other organic pollutants, and to correct the natural acidity of the water making it less corrosive to the pipework.

The successful tenderer was the Candy Filtration Co. of Westminster, England. All plans were drawn in England and equipment ordered by the Candy Filtration Company. However construction contracts were let out to several local firms, including Smith & Smith Ltd., who contracted to tile the filter station floors and to undertake all painting work on the stations.

Supervision of the works was undertaken by a company representative, Mr W. Dufuor, who travelled out from England. Clerk of Works role was shared by Mr C. Wakeman and Mr H. McCullogh.




Location of break-pressure Tank (Now Reservoir with Nihotupu Filter Station to Left)

The Nihotupu Filter Station was constructed beside the old break pressure tank at Smythe's Saddle, Titirangi (later removed and replaced by existing reservoir tank), concurrently with the Waitakere Filter Station. Like the Waitakere Station it comprised reinforced concrete tanks 35 feet by 12 feet, containing a depth of 3'6" of filtration material - a top layer of fine sand 2'6" in depth the three 4" layers of fine gravel and coarse gravel respectively. Each tank was capable of filtering one million gallons per day.


The filtration process involved the addition of aluminium sulphate as a coagulant, at a rate of 1 part per 70,000. The coagulant caused clumping of the particulate matter, so that it could be filtered out by sand. Slaked lime (calcium hydroxide) was added as a 'flocculant' to remove smaller particles. The Sulphate of Alumina used came from an English company and was unloaded on the Auckland Wharves in 50 lb ingots. In times of heavy rainfall Chlorine was added to the Nihotupu supply and the residue was removed by 'Dechlor beds'. Similar filtration beds are still existing at the Huia Plant nearby, as shown in the photograph below.

The filtration beds were cleaned daily by agitating the sand with compressed air, washing with filtered water and allowing it to drain. Disposal of sediment was an ongoing problem and contamination of water supplies downstream occurred with compensation being paid to affected parties. A settling tank was built at the Nihotupu filter, but this was not successful and eventually the wash waters were held in holding tanks and released into the estuary at ebb tide. This continued until the 1980s when a centrifuge wash system was adopted.

The Nihotupu filter station was to be positioned to the west of the existing break pressure tanks. The steep site was cleared and excavated and construction proceeded relatively smoothly. The photograph below demonstrates the steepness of the site and the difficult working conditions


Construction was complete and the station was opened and operational in July 1927. A cottage was erected for the filter station attendant, Mr J Massey. A three month trial period ensued before final payments were made, with adjustments to the lime plants and completion of the buildings. In April 1928 final payments were made.

The Waitakere Filter Station was designed and built to the same design as the Nihotupu Station, and opened simultaneously with the Nihotupu Station in July 1927. The filtration plants operated so successfully that a third one, the Huia Filter Station, was commissioned in 1928, with the contract again awarded to the Candy Filter Co.



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





The Nihotupu Filter Station was constructed to a specification prepared by City Engineer Walter Bush. The contract was awarded to the Candy Filtration Company, which had been selling and installing filtration equipment around the world since the 1870s. Plans for the filtration systems were prepared in England and the letting of the various contracts and observation of the works were carried out by a Candy Filtration Co. representative from England.

Initial plans for the building, using the Hennebique System of reinforced concrete construction under patent, were prepared in London, England by L.G. Mouchel & Partners Ltd, Civil Engineers. The use of reinforced concrete was relatively new, and the French engineer Francois Hennebique (1842-1921) was the first to use steel rather than iron as reinforcement. He also established optimum positioning for reinforcement within the concrete section. Hennebique's principles were patented in 1892 in France and Belgium and under strict conditions he allowed his patents to be used by several reputable contractors. In 1895 the engineer L.G. Mouchel travelled to England to undertake the contract for Weavers Granary and Flour Mill in Swansea using the Hennebique system under license. This was the first of 36,809 structures to be completed in England between 1897 and 1919 using Hennebique's patented systems. The structures included buildings, bridges, viaducts, maritime structures, reservoirs, water towers, and canal works^{vi}. Mouchel himself died in 1908, but before he died set up a partnership to maintain the firm and its patent.

The building was designed in a Stripped Classical style, often used in the 1920s and 1930s for public and commercial buildings. It is a simplified variation of a Classical style utilising forms, motifs and elements associated with Classical architecture but in a stylised and simplified form. The overall effect is sleek and simple, yet maintaining the grandeur of the classical style.

The ornamentation of the façade, even in its stripped classical form, refers back to the nineteenth century, in contrast to the modern principles of reinforced construction used. Some features evident in the original design by L.G. Mouchel & Partners were incorporated in the modified design, but the overall appearance and form departed significantly from the initial design.


In the final design the façade was set out symmetrically with two subtly projecting bays flanking a central and two double height end bays. A relatively heavy cornice line supported on modillions further emphasis the composition of the façade, capping only the two projecting bays and central section. The end bays are left as plain parapet walls. Vertically proportioned multi-paned windows are Georgian in style and consistent with the Classical design.

The building as constructed was modified from the revised plans. A single storey section was deleted, and the layout was reduced by one bay. These amended drawings were prepared directly by the Candy Filtration Company in 1926 and it is not clear if L.G. Mouchel & Partners were involved in the amended design. These drawings show the detailed design for building as it was built, including a revised plant layout and construction detail.

It is not clear who carried out the construction of the building and tanks, although it is known that local sub-contractors were employed for the sub-trades. It is likely that work was carried out by the staff of the ACC Engineering department, who had gained considerable experience in concrete construction, having recently designed and constructed the Upper Nihotupu dam, completed in 1921^{vii}, and also completed construction of Grafton Bridge, completed in 1910.

The original building as constructed, exclusive of filter beds, has a broadly rectangular footprint of approximately 260 square metres and total floor area of approximately 460 square metres. The typical stud height is approximately 4.5 metres. As discussed below the primary superstructure is constructed in the Hennebique Ferro-Concrete System, an early form of cast-in situ reinforced concrete. It comprises cast-in situ, reinforced concrete walls, columns, beams, floor slabs and flat roof. Structure and façade are integral, with plaster render applied to exterior concrete surfaces. Roof weathering is presumably provided by membrane over plaster screed to falls. The foundations are shown to be reinforced concrete pads, at each column location, with the probability that reinforced concrete foundation beams interconnect these, under all wall lines at least. Floor and roof slabs are shown variously as being approximately 100 to 125mm thick. Primary walls are typically 150mm thick and (deemed) secondary walls 100mm thick. Columns are typically approximately 300mm square, and main beams 600 x 300mm, spanning 4.2 metres (maximum) between columns or columns/walls^{viii}.


Plant Design - Candy Filtration Co. Ltd.

In the 1870s Frank Candy began supplying filtration equipment around the world. His *Rapid Sand Filtration Method*, which used sand as a filter with coagulants and flocculants added to the water, and used air pumps to clean the filters, was innovative and inexpensive. Although the company has been sold, the technology is still in use today in parts of the world.


Original plant layout drawings for the Nihotupu and Huia Filtration plants were prepared by the Candy Filtration Co in London, England. The drawings are still existing, albeit in poor condition, and apart from the changes in floor plan, the general layout appears similar to that built. Amended Architectural drawings for the Nihotupu and Waitakere Stations were prepared by the Candy Filter Co., London.

THE DEVELOPMENT OF REINFORCED CONCRETE CONSTRUCTION

The terms reinforced concrete, ferro-concrete, and concrete-steel armoured concrete were originally applied to systems where steel was inserted into concrete to improve its strength. Reinforced concrete became the term commonly used to define the use of mild steel bars, wire and stirrups encased in concrete, formed to make columns, beams floor and wall slabs. Prior to the introduction of patented reinforced concrete construction systems reinforcement used was generally wrought iron, which although resistant to corrosion, did not have the tensile strength of mild steel. Innovative engineers and designers at the time were keen to construct in concrete due to the perceived advantages including its resistance to fire and earthquake.

The earliest concrete used in New Zealand was made using natural cement or hydraulic lime. From around 1860 imported Portland cement began to replace lime before New Zealand cement became widely used in the late 1880s. By 1900, Portland cement was the preferred agent in the concrete mix.

In 1874 the first substantial monolithic concrete building in Auckland, the Congregationalist Church, now known as St James Presbyterian Church, was designed by architect Philip Herapath. Other concrete structures were constructed after this, but it was the 18m high water tank at the New Zealand Railways workshops in Addington, Christchurch, built in 1883, by the prisoners from Addington Prison, which was seen as the first real reinforced concrete construction.

By the late 19th century there were a number of patented systems of reinforced concrete being used. These took the names of their inventors and thus there was the Hennebique, Coignet, and Considere systems^{ix}.

These reinforced concrete construction systems were in their infancy in New Zealand and Auckland when the Yates warehouses were designed by TW May in 1910. The Hennebique System was said to have been the most widely used in the Britain in the early 1900s. *

Frenchman Francois Hennebique (26 April 1842 – 7 March 1921) was the first to use steel instead of iron for reinforcing and he is acknowledged as the great French pioneer of reinforced concrete, patenting the system in 1892. He worked to exacting standards and gathered around him skilled building contractors who were allowed to use his patents under strict conditions. One of these contractors was the engineer L.G. Mouchel who in 1895 was sent by Hennebique to erect a building for Weaver's Granary and Flour Mill in Swansea using the Hennebique system. This marked the beginning of a massive building boom utilising the Hennebique system. Between 1897 and 1919 nearly 37,000 buildings were erected in England using the system.

Soon the Hennebique system came to New Zealand via the company L.G Mouchel & Partners^{xi}, where it was utilised in the construction of Auckland's Kings and Queens wharves in 1908-9 and in the construction of bridges and other civil works. ^{xii}

Hennebique's and the other patented systems of concrete construction became widely used in New Zealand buildings. Although there was much discussion and debate, including opposition at the time from the Auckland Master Builders Association, architects and engineers enthusiastically embraced the new method of construction.


In 1909 the proprietary product 'Camerated Concrete' began to be advertised in New Zealand. Camerated concrete was a patented system of hollow wall construction devised by Henry A Goddard in Australia. It was patented in 1905 and marketed in New Zealand by Aucklander H. Leslie Friend. XIII Other patents were applied for, such as one by Robert de Montalk who applied for a patent in 1910 for concrete and ferro-construction. XIV


The benefits of using reinforced concrete included its strength, fire resistance, vermin resistance as well as claims that it was sound proof.** A number of patents for reinforced concrete systems were applied for and other concrete construction systems promoted around this time.

In Auckland the first known use of reinforced concrete was in the construction of the Auckland Harbour Board wharves beginning in 1903 with the extension of the Railway Wharf in ferro-concrete as an experiment. The structure evidently met with approval and all the new wharves planned as part of a comprehensive scheme for harbour improvements would be similarly constructed.**

Designs were prepared in 1904 and construction began around 1907.**

Built at a similar time, in 1907-1910, Grafton Bridge was at the forefront of construction technology at the time, having the world's largest single span of reinforced concrete. Construction was started by the Ferro-Concrete Company of Australasia, and completed by Council staff when the contractors went bankrupt. Viii Other works carried out by the same company around this time included foundations for the No.1 crane at Calliope dock and two five storey buildings, one a storage building for the Northern Roller Mill Company and another adjacent for Lichtenstein (since demolished). Xix








Figure 27: 1966-9 pticks abovelop workmen laying concrete anchors between steel reinforcing such as the Gration Bridge at the seaters and, during the construction of the ferro concrete bridge. Sir George Grey Special Collections, Auditors (December, 2-477):

Construction of what has been described as New Zealand's first skyscraper, the New Zealand Express Company Building in Christchurch occurred between 1906 and 1907. It was constructed with a reinforced concrete structure to the basement and lower two floors and steel frame above. Unfortunately this was damaged during the September 2011 Christchurch Earthquake and has been demolished.

Other early buildings constructed in Auckland include the Premier Building designed by Robert de Montalk and built in 1907, and the Brunswick Building built in 1914.** Reinforced concrete components were incorporated into the Clark Bros warehouse (now T&G Building) in Wellesley St West, constructed in 1910.**


The Tepid Baths built in 1913 included reinforced concrete foundations, pool tanks and frame to the walls with brick infill panels. xxii

In 1913 the views of architects and engineers on the use of concrete technology were reflected in a report contained in *Progress*. Government Architect, J T Campbell noted that 'concrete will surely displace brick in future in architectural works. Its drawback is the difficulty of using its great strength economically without violating public taste, which has been educated to demand aesthetic treatment and substantial appearance.'








Initial layout design for Filters and Plant by Candy Filtration Co.



First Floor Plan with Plant by Candy Filtration Co. Watercare Archive



SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANCE

Historic Summary

An assessment of the heritage values of the The Nihotupu Filter Station plant are summarised under the criteria listed below. It is a recognised heritage building, scheduled in the Heritage Appendix of the Waitakere District Plan, CHI 1283. This scheduling includes both the exterior and interior (External – II (specific elements) and Internal – III (specific elements)).

a) Associative Value: The Historic Place has a direct association with or relationship to, a person, group, institution, event or activity that is of historical significance to Waitakere, the Auckland or New Zealand.

The water filter plant was built by Auckland City Council as part of a comprehensive system of water catchment reticulation and supply developed in ten early part of the 20th century. for the businesses and people living in the Auckland Region. This was a significant step in the development of a healthy and clean large scale water supply undertaken by a local authority.

b) Historical pattern:

The Historic Place is associated with important patterns of local, regional or national history, including development and settlement patterns, early or important transportation routes, social or economic trends and activities.

The filter station was constructed at a time when the expanding population of the Auckland Region required a reliable, and healthy water system. Similar scaled developments were being undertaken in other metropolitan areas, including Wellington and Dunedin with the construction of dams and associated infrastructure to provide fresh clean water.

c) Aesthetic / Architectural Qualities:

The style of the Historic Place is representative of a significant development period in the city, region and or the nation;

The Historic Place has distinctive or special attributes of an aesthetic or functional nature which may include its design, form, scale, materials, style, ornamentation, period, craftsmanship, or other design element.

The main building was designed in a rather grand stripped classical style, lending a scale and prominence not always associated with buildings of such a utilitarian nature. It is evidence of the intention that the building be of distinct architectural value as well as serving a functional purpose.

The architect, designer, engineer or builder for the Historic Place was a notable practitioner or made a significant contribution to the city, region or nation, and the place enlarges understanding of their work.

The firm of L.G. Mouchel & Partners, who prepared the original design under patent to Hennebique, was responsible for designing a large number of concrete structures in Britain using this system. It is not clear if the firm prepared the revised design but the building was constructed using this patented system.

W.E. Bush was the City Engineer responsible for a significant number of construction projects for Auckland City Council. He had been involved in the design and construction of the large dams and water catchment system in the Waitakere Ranges, but was also involved with a range of other council initiated projects aimed at improving the facilities and infrastructure of a developing and expanding city.

Candy Filtration Company are a worldwide company involved in the development and construction of water treatment systems, not only for drinking water but also in association with swimming pools.

d) Integrity:

The Historic Place has integrity, retaining significant features from its time of construction, or later periods when important modifications or additions were carried out.

Although no longer in use the building retains the principal elements and some equipment incorporated in the original design. The filtration tanks remain at the rear of the main building, and there are a number of pieces of equipment, motors and pipework that were part of the original construction.

The upper floor of the building has been altered for use and laboratories and a significant addition has been made in the 1980s

e) Scientific Qualities:

The potential for the Historic Place to contribute information about an historic figure, event, phase or activity.

The building is associated with, and part of the development of clean and healthy water supply.

f) Technological Qualities:

The Historic Place is representative of innovative or important methods of construction, contains unusual construction materials, is an early example of the use of a particular construction technique or has potential to contribute information about technological or engineering history

The building has value in terms of its construction employing the Hennebique patented reinforced system of construction.

The plan and layout of the building along with remnant equipment demonstrates how water filtration was carried out as part of a large scale catchment and distribution system.

g) Rarity:

The Historic Place or elements of it are unique, uncommon or rare at a local, district or national level, or in relation to particular historic themes.

This was built as one of three filtration buildings as part of the Waitakere Ranges catchment system. The other two filtration buildings are similar in terms of engineering design, and in terms of architectural design it is very similar to the Waitakere filtration building, being constructed from the same plans.

h) Context or Group Values

The physical and visual character of the site or setting of the Historic Place is of importance to the value of the place;

The Historic Place is an important visual landmark or feature,

Due to its situation on a well-frequented road leading to Huia Beach, its elevated position, and the use by the public of the walking tracks in the neighbouring bush areas, the building is a well-known and obvious built feature of the area.

The Historic Place is part of a group or collection of places which together have a coherence because of such factors as history, age, appearance, style, scale, materials, proximity or use, landscape or setting which, when considered as a whole, amplify the heritage values of the place and group/landscape or extend its significance.

The building is one of three filter stations built at a similar time. Stylistically it is the same as the Waitakere building, (the Huia Building is neo-Georgian) and aesthetically forms one of a group of three well designed buildings constructed for a utilitarian function.

i) Cultural Qualities:

The Historic Place is important as a focus of cultural sentiment; the Historic Place significantly contributes to community identity or sense of place or provides evidence of cultural or historical continuity, the Historic Place has symbolic or commemorative significance to people who use or have used it, or to the descendants of such people. The interpretative capacity of the Historic Place can potentially increase understanding of past lifestyles or events.

The building is part of, and provides evidence of a much larger scheme undertaken at the time to provide a reliable and relatively cheap source of clean water to the citizens of Auckland City. Provision of water facilitated the development and expansion of the city in much the same way that efficient transport, power distribution and sewerage systems did.















Huia Filter Station Original Filter Beds in 1947. Photo Watercare Archives











Undated Floor Plan of Huia Filter Station by Auckland Regional Authority. Watercare Archives

This submission is in support of one aspect of the mitigation proposed by Watercare in 4.10.10 **Broader mitigation initiatives: Repurposing of the Nihotupu Filter Station**

Water care proposes to restore the Nihotupu Filter Station and repurpose the structure. Watercare is "committed to undertaking the required remedial and strengthening work to enable the building to be repurposed, potentially as office space (including a potential site office during the construction period) or as a water supply heritage facility as advocated by members of the Engineering Heritage

New Zealand and local heritage groups." (page 51) The cost of this is estimated by Watercare to be \$3.8 million.

The Nihotupu Filter Station is included in the Auckland Unitary Plan Schedule of Significant Historic Heritage Places (Item 86) in Category B. The interior is excluded. The extent of place extends to the Woodlands Park Road and Scenic Drive boundaries in the south and east and to the neighbouring property in the north.

The heritage values were deemed to be:

A Historical

- Part of a group of places associated with the construction of the Waitakere Ranges water supply system
- Represents Auckland City Council efforts to address water shortages and contamination problems with the city water supply in 1920s
- Association with W E Bush, Auckland City Engineer

B Social

- Important reminder of past way of life and development of infrastructure
- Recognised by IPENZ

F Physical Attributes

- Good example of specialized building type early 20th century water purification system
- Representative example of work of Candy Filter Company of London (filtration specialists who designed scheme around the world)

G Aesthetic

• Formal architectural appearance in Stripped Classical style.

Before inclusion in the Unitary Plan the building was scheduled in the Auckland District Plan – Waitakere Section Category 2 for exterior and Category 3 for specific internal elements.

The Watercare designation 9324 specifically states that "Works shall not adversely affect those elements of the Huia Filter Station (WSL4), the Nihotupu Filter Station (WSL4) or the Waitakere Filter Station (WSL3) which are identified in the Heritage Appendix of this Plan..."

A heritage assessment was carried out for Watercare Services Ltd by Matthews & Matthews Architects Ltd and published in September 2015.

The Nihotupu and Waitakere Filter Stations were built in 1927 to the same design. The Nihotupu Filter Station was built to coincide with the completion of the Upper Huia Dam (Engineering Heritage New Zealand, Supporting Information, page 1). The Huia Filter Station was built in 1928 in Woodlands Park Road but to a different design and is proposed to continue in use with the new treatment plant. The layout and plans for the Nihotupu Filter Station were prepared by the London-based Candy Filter Company. While the Waitakere and Huia Filter Stations are still in use, and thus have undergone modification, the Nihotupu Filter Station was closed in the early 1990s. Consequently, much of this station "retains original plant and equipment from when it was originally constructed. It has survived as the building was decommissioned" (Matthews & Matthews, page 2).

The building was constructed of reinforced concrete in the Stripped Classical style. It still has its original steel windows though these have been boarded over. The heritage assessment by Matthews and Matthews has given an A Exceptional Significance rating to the exterior, the steel windows and adjoining garage and a B Considerable Significance to many of the elements of the interior.

"The Nihotupu Filter Station retains a variety of early painted steel motors, steel gantries, chains, hooks and painted steep rails as well as a range of early tanks and tank platforms. These surviving early features are identified as significant.

The building also retains much of its early plan layout and architectural detail including plastered reinforced concrete structure, steel framed windows and t&g timber doors. The main elevation facing the street, although boarded up is generally intact and is assessed as significant. The rear and west elevations are not readily visible. A small garage dating from 1927 is also assessed as significant" (Matthews & Matthews, page 73).

The 1960s chemical stores and 1980s addition to the building are not assessed as having significance.

A seismic and structural condition assessment of the building concluded that the building is in relatively good condition and can be improved and strengthened to reach acceptable standards (Opus International Consultants Ltd, 2010).

Engineering Heritage New Zealand has assessed that Waitakere Ranges water supply system of dams and other infrastructure and determined that this should be included in the IPENZ Engineering Heritage Register. Members of Engineering Heritage New Zealand attended a meeting of the Community Liaison Group during 2018 and spoke strongly in favour of retaining and repurposing the building.

Watercare's proposal is to restore the building, use it as offices during construction of the treatment plant, and thereafter repurpose it. It suggests its future use may be as offices or "a water supply heritage facility as advocated by members of the Engineering Heritage New Zealand and local heritage groups."

This approach is supported and there could be additional uses linked to the recreational use of Exhibition Drive. The filter station stands at the entrance to the Drive which is now a well-used recreational walkway for walkers, runners and cyclists, especially for family cycling. It is a safe, all-weather route that links through the Beveridge Track to Arataki Visitor Centre. It is readily accessible by people living in the Woodlands Park and Waima areas and is well-used for recreation.

It is the only place that cycling is allowed in the Waitakere Ranges Regional Park and is one of the few routes by which people with limited mobility can experience the Waitakere Ranges, as it is flat with a tar-sealed surface.

Consequently there is scope for businesses that support the Drive to be located in the building, such as bike hire or café. There are outstanding views to be had from the roof of the building.

There is also potential for interpretation of the water supply system to be installed in the building in the form of a museum or exhibition space. The Waitakere Ranges has the distinction of being a continuously operated water supply area for around 130 years. Infrastructure such as dams, tramways and filter stations that were installed in the 19th and early 20th still exist and are mostly still in use. This provides a unique opportunity to interpret aspects of water supply such as catchments, water quality, management of the asset and the workforce. The history of the Waitakeres water

supply system and the people involved have been well documented, with a rich photographic archive and documentation in Auckland Council archives. A history of the water supply was written for Watercare by historian Graeme Murdoch some years ago, so there is great potential to build on this prior work with displays and also to provide interactive education about water for young people and visitors.

Therefore it is our submission that restoration and repurposing of the Nihotupu Filter Station as proposed by Watercare is supported and is included in the Mitigation package for the Huia Replacement Water Treatment Plant (WTP) Project.

Throughout the application there is clear indication of the major impact on the regenerating native New Zealand Kauri Forest as well as interference with natural waterways including the diversion and reclamation of intermittent streams.

The minimisation of the impact on the existing environment in this report is astounding.

The request in this Resource Consent for the diversion & discharge of groundwater & stormwater including the disturbance of potentially contaminated land is contrary to best practice especially in a defined Significant Ecological Area (SEA.)

The removal of unique native vegetation (Kauri, Rimu, Ponga etc) within 'an SEA to enable the construction and operation of infrastructure is a restricted discretionary activity under the Auckland Unitary Plan.'

The Auckland Unitary Plan is under significant review as changes from the old district plan are being challenged across Auckland.

The implications of extensive earth and construction work, in such a delicate ecosystem *can not* be minimised, ignored or diminished as the impact on the environment will be enormous!

The Unitary Plan and the Resource Management Act are supposed to protect and preserve our natural and built heritage.

It is not a document to be used to destroy irreplaceable, significant indigenous regenerating Native New Zealand forest or be used to destroy the delicate ecological habit of our indigenous species.

At the very start of this Executive Summary the consultants Tonkin & Taylor admit that the "**reclamation & diversion** of the stream is a **non-complying** activity and the entire application potentially falls for consideration overall as a **non-complying activity**"

This is a pivotal statement within this entire document by Tonkin & Taylor who are providing professionally advice to Watercare Ltd (a council controlled organisation.)

The admission that this part of the application does not cover traffic & noise effects which are outlined in a separate 'Outline Plan of Works' (OPW), minimises the impact on residents and ratepayers in the area who live, work and are effected by the heavy trucks operating on the already unstable road cut into the mountain leading from the upper filter station to Titirangi Township.

This totally different application creates yet another obstacle for the public to challenge this application.

The impact on the Titirangi Village will be physically, environmentally and financially significant. No cost benefit analyse is available on these issue or can be pre-determined.

No compensation packages have even proposed for those commercial businesses effected by the impact of heavy, noisy trucks transporiting huge volumes of soil out of the area.

It is totally misleading to claim that the development on this scale will provide significant social, cultural and economic benefits.

Especially, when the impact of construction of this scale on the pristine regenerating Kauri Forest within the (SEA) has not been evaluated by *impartial* expert native tree arborists, ecologists or environmentalist

In a time of Climate Change acknowledged by Auckland Council, Watercare Ltd, Auckland Transport as well as the New Zealand Government it is TOTALLY unacceptable for the Unitary Plan or RMA to be used to destroy existing indigenous ecosystems.

The objections by other ratepayer and resident groups to deny Watercare access to their areas such as in Swanson, should be a flag that alternative sites in light industrial areas such as New Lynn, Henderson and Avondale would be more appropriate for this critical infrastructure, allowing for expansion of our water treatment services in the future.

It is counter intuitive to destroy priceless, natural regenerating New Zealand Kauri forest, ruin waterways and cause long term environmental damage, when alternative sites for this light industrial process are available within a 15km line of sight in west Auckland.

It is clear that building within these already developed light industrial areas would be more cost effective, sustainable and achievable then building a plant of limited size in such a fragile location within the Woodlands Park Rd zone.

The admission that this application for Resource Consent for major construction gives rise to a "range of adverse environmental effects" including the removal of 3.5 hectares of native forest vegetation would effect indigenous species including Lizards, Huhu bugs, Weta, native Stick Insects, indigenious Snails, native NZ Moths and possibly even unique endangered Bats within in this SEA.

This is clearly outlined in the executive report where it is acknowledge there will be a high level of ecological impact.

Watercare's proposal to avoid, remedy mitigate and compensate is a ludicrous concept.

It is a globally proven fact that man cannot restore nature back to it's original state. Only by leaving nature over long periods of time can the impact of man be mitigated.

The retention of 11 hectares is not an argument for the destruction of 3.hectares within this SEA.

Comprehensive mitigation and compensation of up to \$5 Million dollars to local environmental groups is nothing but 'Hush Money.'

A form of blackmail & manipulation. This type of controlled compensation to hand picked groups is unacceptable.

This idea excludes the public at large, picks winners and loosers and seeks to horse trade one block of Native Forest for another.

Playing off one environmental group against another is total unacceptable and unethical.

Paying compensation for those who acquiest to the intentions of Watercare is blatant manipulation of our laws and will not stand up under public scrutiny within the Local Government Act 2002, the Public Records Act or the RMA.

The suggestion that a charitable trust be set up to administer this "Blood Money" is despicable and is clearly an open abuse of Power.

In the Executive Summary it states that the Waima Biodiversity Management Plan (WBMP) " has the objectives of coordinating and increasing conservation, effects within the WBMP ...repairing and strengthening connective linkages throughout the catchment...promoting natural forest regeneration, improving the health and resilience of the remnant Kauri forest is *hypocritical* and *patronising*.

The blatant destruction of existing habitat is unforgivable in a time of such global environmental deforestation.

The idea of increasing community-wide engagement in stewardship and sustainable environmental management is pure 'Council Speak & Spin' for a blatant attempt to manipulate the Resource Management Act to achieve an outcome that Watercare has already decided it wishes to achieve.

Any attempt to suggest that Watercare has engaged in genuine Public Consultation is revealed in this executive summary.

Tonkin & Taylor clearly show that they are expressing the wishes of their employer when they claim later in the summary "The positive benefits of the environment from proposed mitigation and compensation package are considered appropriate compensation for the LOSS of forest extent."

This subjective statement further proves that Watercare wanted and was provided with unsubstantiated support for their planned destruction with an SEA.

Further, the reclamation and diversion of a (moderate-low) value intermittent stream is absurd.

Intermittent streams are nature's overflow system to protect the environemnent. Tonkin and Taylor's opinion is just that. Paid opinion!

We have many examples over the last 100 years of draining swamps, filling in harbours and destroying intermittent streams to understand the significance of the devastation created by this sort of work.

There are any number of legal documents providing proof of the environmental damage done to our precious waterways to be call on as evidence.

Watercare can **not** just avoid, mitigate, remedy or compensate for the environmental damage they are proposing.

Our future water supply is critical as is the protection of the limited amount of natural environment still within our human care.

The rebuilding of the existing Water Treatment plant on Woodland Park Road is not acceptable, nor an appropriate use of this area.

There are many already developed alternatives locations where such enormous environmental devastation would not occur and where future expansion of our water treatment plant would be better and more economically situated.

As a longtime resident of Titirangi, intimately associated with this part of Waima, I strongly object to Watercare's Plan to rebuild a water treatment on this site now or anytime in the future.

Introduction

The Royal Forest and Bird Protection Society of New Zealand Incorporated (Forest & Bird) is New Zealand's largest independent nature conservation organisation, with many members and supporters. Our mission is to be a voice for nature on land, in fresh water and at sea.

We have 47 branches throughout the country, seven of which, including the Waitakere Branch, are in the Auckland region and involved in a wide range of conservation and advocacy activities.

Forest & Bird has for many years had a strong interest and involvement in the greater Auckland area. These include instigating and implementing the Ark in the Park and Habitat Te Henga projects in the Waitakere Ranges and the North-West Wildlink, a wildlife linkage connecting the Hauraki Gulf Islands with the Waitakere Ranges. This has included advocating for greater protection of indigenous biodiversity on land, in freshwater and in the coastal environment, and in protecting and enhancing the healthy functioning and integrity of indigenous ecosystems across the region.

Forest & Bird could not gain an advantage in trade competition through this submission.

Forest & Bird wishes to be heard in support of this submission, and would consider presenting this submission jointly with others making a similar submission at a hearing.

Forest & Bird welcomes the opportunity to submit on the consent application.

1. Submission

- 1.1. Forest & Bird opposes the application for the following reasons:
 - (a) loss of significant indigenous vegetation and habitat
 - (b) adverse effects on the ecosystem of threatened kauri trees
 - (c) adverse effects on indigenous biodiversity, such as birds, reptiles and invertebrates
 - (d) the edge effects and cumulative effects of habitat loss and fragmentation
 - (e) adverse effects on a significant ecological connection to the Waitakere Ranges
 - (f) lack of justification for the size of the proposed footprint
 - (g) limited opportunity for on-site mitigation and remediation
 - (h) potential for sediment run-off via streams into Little Muddy Creek
 - (i) potential to spread kauri dieback disease and Argentine ants
 - (j) the site is covered by rāhui that has been placed on the Waitakere forest by Te Kawerau a Maki
 - (k) uncertainty and inadequacy of consent conditions including the biodiversity offset/compensation proposal
 - (I) deficiencies in the Draft Deed for the Trust proposed as part of the biodiversity offset/compensation proposal

2. Indigenous vegetation, habitat and biodiversity

- 2.1. The proposal is in a Significant Ecological Area (SEA), as identified in the Auckland Unitary Plan (AUP). The Regional Policy Statement provisions of the AUP provide for the protection of SEAs. It is our understanding that the proposal, if granted, will not protect this area of the SEA, and will result in adverse effects on the remaining SEA.
- 2.2. The site of the proposal is connected to and forms a linkage with regional parkland to the south and west and to a network of forest patches in the Titirangi-Waima area, most of which is SEA. These areas are largely dominated by the now threatened kauri and its associated ecosystem. Connectivity is an important aspect of ecosystem health and for the protection of significant habitats of indigenous species.
- 2.3. These areas connect with the rest of the Waitakere Ranges and via the North-West Wildlink to the Hauraki Gulf islands and beyond. Any loss and reduction in connectivity can have significant local effects and wider cumulative effects on significant vegetation and habitats and the ability to sustain indigenous biodiversity values in Auckland.
- 2.4. A number of rare and threatened fauna are likely to be present on or use the site, such as geckos and invertebrates, including a new species of flightless parasitic wasp (*Pseudoceraphron* n.sp.), a rare slave ant (*Strimigenys xenos*) and a species of peripatus (*Peripatoides* sp.) that have been found in the immediate area. Without a thorough ecological assessment the potential effects on this fauna cannot be determined.

- 2.5. The loss of up to 3.5 ha of indigenous vegetation within the proposal footprint areas (reservoir site and the treatment plant) will result in reduced connectivity with the rest of the Waitakere forest and will increase access to animal pests such as rats, stoats and possums, and enable pest plants to establish. While adequate mitigation could address some of these effects it will be difficult to avoid them entirely. Without an adequate assessment of these effects it will not be possible to provide an appropriate mitigation package or assess the remaining effects were the proposal to proceed.
- 2.6. The effects of this proposal must be considered in respect of cumulative adverse effects on the Waitakere forest, including ongoing pressure from urbanisation, on the habitat of significant indigenous fauna and fauna which is already under threat from habitat loss and fragmentation.

3. Freshwater streams including Little Muddy Creek

3.1. The proposal is likely to result in sediment runoff into adjacent streams and eventually to Little Muddy Creek. This risk is especially problematic during the rain events which can occur any time of the year and are most prevalent during spring and summer when construction is likely to occur. There are likely to be adverse effects of sediment on the habitat of catadromus fish including the threatened longfin eel and galaxiids such as banded kokopu.

4. Kauri dieback disease (PA)

- 4.1. Kauri is a keystone species upon which a number of other species depend for their existence. Kauri throughout the upper North Island is under threat from kauri dieback disease (known as PA). It is expected that the loss of kauri to PA will result in the collapse of the kauri ecosystem. Preventing the spread of the disease is critical to the survival of kauri and the ecosystems which they support.
- 4.2. The proposal has identified that there are kauri present within and adjacent to the proposal footprint. However the proposal only sets out to retain and protect kauri trees over 20cm diameter. Not only will this result in the loss of regenerating kauri within the footprint, it also increases potential for the spread of PA. PA can be present in young trees as well as within soil on the site. Moving these young trees and soil offsite poses a risk to spreading the disease.
- 4.3. Having been involved with the development of regional and national pest plans for kauri dieback, we understand that the presence of the PA can be very localised and hard to confirm. For example it may be present in a very small area of soil. This carries a risk that machinery, plant, vehicles and peoples' footwear and clothing could bring PA to the site. It could also be spread across the site and from the site.
- 4.4. The proposed area of native vegetation removal and substantial amount of earthworks and earth moving equipment not only risks the introduction (or spread) of PA it also exposes the neighbouring kauri areas (including the iconic Bishops Kauri Tree) to the potential environmental stress of edge effect, root damage and increased risk of exposure to PA.

- 4.5. PA primarily spreads through soil, and this can be carried by water. This means there is also a risk of spreading PA through sediment loss and via any sediment collection devices.
- 4.6. The application has not identified potential vectors, risks at the site, or measures to manage these risks. In our view the application is inadequate to provide any certainty for the prevention of PA spread.
- 4.7. A fit for purpose risk assessment and accompanying biosecurity plan (which includes audit and compliance measures) to manage all biosecurity issues, including PA, needs to be developed with an external/independent expert review.

5. Argentine ant

5.1. Argentine ants pose a threat to our indigenous biodiversity, particularly ground-living invertebrates. Argentine ants have been found nearby and are spreading. Vehicles, machinery, soil, plant material and supplies such as wood, provide common vectors for the spread of ants. The application fails to consider this risk or propose an adequate management plan.

6. Onsite mitigation and remediation

- 6.1. The extent of any onsite mitigation and remediation depends on the size of the footprint but there is insufficient justification for the footprint proposed.
- 6.2. Some on-site mitigation and remediation is proposed by the applicant, including the realignment of a stream. However, because the detailed design will not occur until after the granting of consent the extent of vegetation removal is uncertain. Potentially everything within the footprint of the proposed WTP could be removed. Even if the proposal does not require the whole footprint the opportunity to carry out on-site mitigation and remediation is limited by the scale of the activity if the proposal goes ahead.

7. Off-site offset and compensation package

- 7.1. The applicant compensation package is uncertain in terms of the requirements in the AUP.
- 7.2. The policies of D9 Significant Ecological Areas overlay in the AUP set out direction on the management of adverse effects and biodiversity values that are required to be avoided, remedied, mitigated or offset.
- 7.3. The applicant has not clearly identified the adverse effects which cannot be avoided, remedied or mitigated, to establish the residual adverse effects for which offsetting may be considered under the AUP. Understanding the extent and detail of any residual effects is important so that ecological advice can be provided:
 - (a) on the extent of adverse effects which cannot be avoided, remedied or mitigated on site
 - (b) on the opportunities for biodiversity offsetting on a like for like basis (as in NZ Best practice offsetting guidelines) and the extent of offset required to make up for onsite loss of biodiversity values. This includes identifying any values for which an offset cannot be achieved.

- (c) The extent to which any proposal by the applicant for biodiversity compensation under s104 is of an appropriate scale to compensate for the onsite loss of biodiversity values. (Recognising that D9 policies do not specifically consider compensation as an option for addressing adverse effects on SEAs).
- (d) Whether the potential loss of biodiversity values is such that an offset and/or compensation proposal is not appropriate.
- 7.4. In addition the proposed financial compensation is not consistent with the considerations under s104 of the RMA for offset and compensation. This section states that:
 - (ab) any measure proposed or agreed to by the applicant for the purpose of ensuring positive effects on the environment to offset or compensate for any adverse effects on the environment that will or may result from allowing the activity;
- 7.5. The applicant's financial offset/compensation is grossly inadequate and inappropriate. In our view any offset or compensation should be set out in terms of positive effects on the environment in the context of the adverse effects that will or may occur if the proposal goes ahead. Given the extent of ecological adverse effects we would expect that offset/compensating measures would be determined on an ecological basis, not a dollar amount.
- 7.6. In our view this requires the identification of specific locations and quantifiable environmental outcomes/benefits to be achieved.

8. Proposed conditions

8.1. Forest & Bird has a number of concerns with the consent conditions which have been proposed. These are set out in Attachment 1 to this submission.

9. Relief sought

- 9.1. Forest & Bird seeks that the application be declined.
- 9.2. However, should the Council decide to grant this consent, we seek that the conditions of consent are amended such that Forest & Bird's concerns are resolved.
- 9.3. Forest & Bird wishes to be notified for comment on the development of the updated optimised site layout report should the proposal progress that far.



These roads are already very congested during the early morning and late afternoons. And I have concerns over the further damage that would be done to Scenic Drive (in particular) by so many heavy truck movements over the lengthy construction period of the proposed new plant. Titirangi Village is a major gateway into the Waitakere Ranges and to South Titirangi and also the only access point to Langholm, Cornwallis, Huia, Kakamatua and Whatipu. The Village is the major hub for the local community, with historic Lopdell House and the newer Te Uru Art Gallery, restaurants, a superette, petrol station, shops and small commercial spaces. It is nevertheless a relatively small village. The road through the Village is narrow, and has had speed restriction mounds across the whole road in three places, for at least the last 10 years. This is busy village destination as well as being an access road as noted above. A larger number of racing cyclists also use Titirangi Village to access Scenic Drive for training purposes. At the end of the Village is the major Titirangi roundabout which has 5 roads for entry / exit. Four of these - Titirangi Road, Huia Road, Scenic Drive and Atkinson Road are busy roads. Adjacent to the Titirangi roundabout is Titirangi Primary School which has 473 pupils - therefore a major school. About 1.2km down Atkinson Road (from the roundabout) a second larger primary school (Woodlands Park – 725 pupils), and a little further down the same road is an access point to Glen Eden Intermediate. Naturally the local population has grown over the last 20 years, and so has the week day traffic congestion in the area during early morning (7am to 9am) and afternoon (4.30pm to 6.30pm) rush hours, plus school starting times (8am to 9.15am) and finishing times (2.45pm to 3.30pm). In the morning, there are lengthy traffic queues trying to access the roundabout (from Scenic Drive and from Huia Rd). In the later afternoon, there are lengthy queues of traffic up Titirangi Road from Godley Road (another major access route to Titirangi from the South East). Even though Watercare and its predecessor council owned entities have owned the Woodlands Park land (now proposed for the new plant) for a very long time, the same passage of time of about 80 years since the original works were built (when the area was farm land) means that the new plant would today be located in a built up area, with unique bush living. And road access through Titirangi to the site is very limited and completely unsuitable for a lengthy construction project of this nature. I believe that this was a concern of Watercare as well, and led them to buy some new land in Oratia 2-3 years ago, with the intention of putting the new plant there (even though they already owned the land in Woodlands Park). That Oratia proposal was shelved after their initial public consultation, when it received very strong public protest because it involved compulsory acquisition of more land in Oratia, which would have displaced a number of families. Scenic Drive, from Woodlands Park Road to the west, has been closed to heavy traffic for a number of years. As is often the case in roading through mountain range areas, there is a higher level of instability caused by heavy rain periods and the impact of traffic (I do not claim to be a roading engineer.) The section of Scenic Drive between the roundabout and Woodlands Park Road has been subject to slips over the last 20 plus years, with a particularly big slip in August 2017 (photos attached) which initially closed the road entirely for a number of days, and then left us with one lane access and traffic control lights for about 3 months. This route is quite narrow, and is the main route into Woodlands Park / Waimea, with alternative access through Huia Road being an additional 4km, on a very windy and hilly route. Auckland Transport completed a major upgrade to this whole section of Scenic Drive (from the roundabout to the top of Woodlands Park Road) in 2017/18, an action which they stated had nothing to do with the Watercare proposal. However, the Scenic Drive section is only part of the problem. There are only two possible access routes for heavy traffic to get to Titirangi roundabout / village (ie the entry point to Scenic Drive). One route - up Atkinson Ave (to the roundabout) - is steep, moderately windy, and narrow (particularly with school-related kerbside carparking) with speed bumps on the hill section road, and has the two major primary schools within 1.2 km. The other route is up the hill on Titirangi Road (rising to 150 metres above sea level), which is the main arterial route to Titirangi, South Titirangi, Langholm and Huia. This is also steep, two lane with windy sections (reflecting the lower Waitakere Ranges). Titirangi Road goes through the Village to the roundabout and therefore Titirangi Primary School. Both of these routes are totally unsuitable to multiple heavy traffic movements during a lengthy construction period, given firstly the safety risk to children and adults alike (particularly within 200 metres of the school), and due to the existing significant traffic volumes, in the weekday mornings until at least 9.15am and in the afternoons from 2.45pm. I appreciate the need for infrastructure building - renewal and new capacity - for a large and growing city. However in

spite of this being a great site for building a new water treatment plant 80 years ago, it is not now practical or suitable for building a replacement plant, given the passage of time which has turned former farm land outside the metropolitan area of Auckland, into a built up residential area (a unique one at that for Titirangi and surrounding suburbs). Watercare had the right idea (in principle) for their proposal for the Oratia area (or in the foothills of the Waitakere Ranges) – they once again should focus on developing the next water treatment plant on farm land outside the metropolitan area of Auckland.

I would like the Council to refuse the application in its entirety.

Reasons for my submission as set out in the document below in relation to significant impacts on our Waima Indigenous Fauna species

In regard to the resource consent for earthworks and vegetation removal, including a Significant Ecological Area (SEA) overlay – I am writing to voice my concerns on the significant impacts this will cause with the loss of our fauna, their habitats being destroyed, shelter, food sources being effected.

- Climate Change If deforestation continues and we see the beginning of global desertification, it will have resounding impacts on the global climate. Extreme weather events will increase: flooding, and drought will be common as there would be a lack of containment of rain water in trees or protection from continued rains.
- Cutting trees can result in the loss of habitat for animal species, which can harm ecosystems. According to National Geographic, "70 percent of Earth's land animals and plants live in forests, and many cannot survive the deforestation that destroys their homes."
- **Deforestation** can lead to a general degradation of their habitat. The removal of trees and other types of vegetation reduces available food, shelter, and breeding habitat. ... **Animals** may not be able to find adequate shelter, water, and food to survive within remaining habitat.
- RNZ "Government Seeks feedback on biodiversity strategy" Conservation Minister Eugenie Sage said New Zealand had 4000 native species that were threatened or at risk, and had already lost countless species to extinction including more than 50 kinds of native bird.

A National Policy Statement on indigenous biodiversity was also being created, she said.

Forest and Bird chief conservation adviser Kevin Hackwell said New Zealand's biodiversity was facing a crisis.

3.7.4 Bats - Page 28 (Refer T&T AEE July 2019)

I do not accept what has been said and also very disappointing what was in this report considering the latest NZ Classification of our Long-tailed Bats is "Nationally Critical"

- There were <u>29 so called "uncertain passes"</u> recorded on the ABM location Bat 15 which is right by existing WTP opposite Waima Crescent and adjacent to mature Kauri podocarp forest which they favour.
- On Boffa's Bat expert visual spectograms converted from audio, that sounds were produced by some passing cars at 40kHz range which is the same frequency as bats. They say "We" (NO mention of who had given 2nd opinion??) come to the conclusion that MOST of the "uncertain passes" were not bat passes, they did not say ALL.
- <u>Detection of 4 "uncertain passes"</u> on 2 x Bat locations on the impacted site Kaihikatea Wetlands where there are many potential mature roost trees there including Kauri and Kanuka, and streams which attract bats.
- <u>Detection of 1</u> on the forest edge of Woodlands Park Rd opposite Manuka Rd where the scrub is. Bats will often use forest roads or streams for feeding access, and here I would say their access into Clark Bush. Their home range is huge!!
- <u>It is disappointing</u> that the report does not confirm any bat passes If actual spectrograms of the "uncertain passes" had been included, then he may have been able to add his opinion on them. Usually, spurious background noises like traffic, rodents, birds etc. are fairly clear cut on spectrogram files and look quite different to bat passes.

- Judging by the map you supplied, it is very possible bats venture out from core areas of the Waitakere Ranges to the periphery urban
 areas while forgaging. As you (Tina) have indicated that there are mature trees nearby, it is possible that bats use these as roosts
 from time to time at least.
 - Email as pers. comm Bat Expert David Clark EcoQuest 18/6/19
- Bats move roosts on an almost a nightly basis, so just because you do one survey/s and don't find any, it does not necessarily mean
 that bats are not present in the area. You may just miss them with the timing of the survey/s.

2.3 Bats - Refer 2.3.1 Desktop Review - Page 13 (Appendix L - Ecological Assessment Boffa 21/5/19)

Was noted, further data was requested from the Auckland Council fauna database (B.Paris 2017, pers.comm, December 22).

- The information was not on this report showing the multiple bat surveys that had been undertaken in the vicinity of the site.
- Should have included as saying:- A sizeable resident population of long-tailed bats is present in the Nihotupu Reservoir catchment, well within flying distance of the Woodlands Park site. Forest margins, sheltered areas of tall forest intersected by roads (such as that present along Manuka and Woodlands Park Roads), and steep escarpments (such as the one above the proposed location for water reservoirs 1) are particularly favoured foraging habitats, while mature kauri and podocarps are likely to offer roosting habitat.

 Boffa Miskell HWTP Shortlist Options AEE Evaluation Report 8/5/17

Bats - Refer 2.3.2.1 Spatial Survey Design - Page 13 (Appendix L - Ecological Assessment Boffa 21/5/19)

- From paragraph 1 There was lack of information on the Spring 2018 bat surveys targeting large trees likely to be impacted as a result of the proposed works as what was said.
- Which trees? Species were not named, also no mention on visual monitoring observations on trees with cavities, loose or peeling bark, dead standing trees, large hollow stumps that bats would roost in.
- Also doing walking line transects with the handheld bat detectors, you can cover lots of ground in a night. Advised by David Clarke -Bat Expert 18/6/19

3.7.3 Reptiles and amphibians - Page 27 (Refer T&T AEE July 2019)

It mentions that detection rates and diversity of native lizards within the site were both very low, however the availability of suitable habitat on the site presents a reasonable likelihood that a range of species recorded in the surrounding area are present on site.

2.2 Herpetofauna - Refer 2.2.2 Survey Site Selection - Page 11 (Refer Appendix L - Ecological Assessment Boffa 21/5/19)

"Potential native frog habitats within the project area were assessed and found to be unsuitable because of sediment deposition or lack of refugia."

<u>I disagree:</u>- As noted in HWTP Shortlist Options Analysis: Ecological Effects Evaluation Report prepared for Watercare by Boffa Miskell as noted below:-

- Hochstetter's frogs (At Risk) have been recorded in the catchment surrounding the Nihotupu Reservoir and in forested headwater streams throughout the Waitakere foothills, and typically favour the margins of stony bottomed streams in native forest.
- Habitat within the headwaters of Armstrong Gully Stream is somewhat modified but could potentially support a Hochstetter's frog population - Boffa Miskell 8 May 2017
- Also, potential habitat was observed at the headwater's of Yorke Gully Receiving Stream in Clark Bush and confirmed by Auckland Botannical Society and Simon Grant - Environmental Ecologist for Waituna Action Group

2.2 Herpetofauna - Refer 2.23 Sampling Methods for Lizard survey (Refer Appendix L – Ecological Assessment

- Other survey methods such as tree warps could have been used to increase the chance of detecting gecko's. From not using tree warps where geckos are more likely to be rather than on the ground. Forest gecko (Nationally at risk) has been recorded previously at the site, and Green gecko (Nationally at risk) are likely to be present. Shona Myers review 2/7/18
- All native herpetofauna are protected under the Wildlife Act (1953)

<u>3.7.5 - Birds - Page 28 – (Refer T&T AEE July 2019)</u>

From this report, Fourteen bird species were detected within the

Project Site during the bird counts - seven native and seven exotic bird species. **This is incorrect,** as Shona Myers verified with me, **ten native** and seven exotic bird species (correct)

NZ Native Birds recorded:- Tui, Greywarbler, Kingfisher, Silvereye, Fantail, Shining Cuckoo, Kereru, Spur winged plover, Morepork and also included the Swamp Harrier (Kahu) from Bird Monitoring with Forest & Bird Waitakere and Locals on 6 May 2017 - Total of 17 bird species

- Bird counts however were done over a short time frame 3 days in total over 3 weeks. The timing of bird counts effects the results. As the counts were done during'summer' conditions there will be some seasonal effect (birds can be quieter at this time of the year).
- The graphs of bird counts are good, although hard to read. A table showing the mean no. of individuals per station at the site and compared to Auckland Council counts would be useful.
- An estimate of the total number of breeding pairs at the project site would be useful. This could be baed on work done on territory size for the more common native birds on he Auckland Region (or upper N Is). If the information is available.
- A comment on the ecosystem services provided by birds would be useful. Birds will be moving from adjoining bush areas, through the site utilising food sources and by doing this assisting with pollination and spread of seeds.

The above 4 bullet points was noted by Shona Myers 2/7/18

- There were no "Nest Survey's Conducted" -
- Mature trees offer high quality nesting habitat. HWTP Shortlist Options Boffa AEE 8/5/17
- It is surprising that only two count stations had records of Kereru. This is most likely due to their lack of conspicuous especially during December rather than few kereru being present. The results of the nationwide Kereru Count done in September 2017 could have been compared to what numbers were recorded in Waima/Titirangi area's. (Tina)

<u>Wingspan National Bird of Prey Centre - Rotorua</u> - Advised me to contact Doc. Told me in particular with our Ruru - NZ Native Owl is endemic to NZ and found nowhere else in the world is worthy of protection in the Waitakere Ranges. (They are resident in our Clark Bush - noted and recorded by Jacqui Geux from our Bat Walk - 13/6/17)

Birds - Refer 2.4.1 Desktop Review - Page 15 (Appendix L Ecological Assessment Boffa 21/5/19)

A second site just across the road on Woodlands Park Rd would be the location of the new above ground reservoir. This is on part of their 57 hectares of 'designated' land all within this vicinity.

- Stream Impacts and Effects on Armstrong Gully, Yorke Gully, tributaries, Waituna Stream down
 to Little Muddy Creek. Also the NH2 tunnel shaft excavation effects on Armstrong Gully and

Facts of Ecological Significance

- The sites are SEA (Significant Ecological Area) within the Waitakere Ranges Heritage Area protected by the Waitakere Ranges Heritage Area Act. Identified as being of Significant Ecological Value in the Auckland Council Unitary Plan.
- The land proposed for the water treatment plant, reservoirs and infrastructure is
 one of only 20 that meet all 5 criteria for a Significant Ecological Area out of 3226 sites listed in
 the AUP (SEA_T_5539)

Threatened ecosystem types – The majority of the sites contain threatened ecosystem types.

Kauri forest (WF10) (regional IUCN threat status – endangered)

Kauri podocarp forest (WF11) (endangered)

Mixed regenerating broadleaved forest (WF7.2) (critically endangered); and Kaihikatea swamp maire forest (WF8) (critically endangered)- present to the west of the proposed reservoir, grading into Kauri forest on the western property margin –(HWTP Shortlist options Boffa AEE 8/5/17)

Kaihikatea swamp and flood-plain forest (MF4) (Critically endangered) -

- Kahikatea pukatea forest (WF8) (critically endangered)
- The value of remaining regenerating kauri forest is heightened due to its threat Nationally and Globally. Kauri have been ranked as fourth on the list of conservation priorities on a Global scale (Forest et al. 2018)
- This will require the clearance and levelling of 4 plus hectares of land a total area that is larger than the size of Lynnmall, Auckland. The large scale of works involved would severely impact the natural landscape and freshwater ecology including aquatic animals.
- We have "At Risk" declining Inanga (Including Inanga spawning grounds further downstream from impacted sites) Long fin eels and redfin bullies
- The sites form linkages, corridors and habitats for wildlife adjoining regional parkland forest through the Waima area to the North and South and forms an important connection of wildlife in this network. The Yorke and Armstrong Gullies provide high quality freshwater habitat. Longfin eel and inanga (at risk declining) are present in the Yorke Gully catchment.


Major Concerns

- Pressure on the streams impacted, ephemeral gullies, wetlands. Expert Geological information from Riddolls Consultants Ltd – Dated 20/11/17 was received on slope stability, major inactive landslides, rockfall debris and still occurring. Also large scale land instability on Manuka Rd site where the proposed water treatment plant is to be built.
- Infiltration through the base of the dry pond/dam (In terms of increased risk relative to geotechnical stability)
- The selection criteria did not place enough importance on the environment.

- It is irreplaceable as an ecological corridor and not possible to mitigate the substantial threat this proposed water treatment plant will be to our endangered and critically endangered forest containing native freshwater fish species and high quality stream invertebrates, insects including rare species and a "NEW SPECIES" of Pteromalid wasp (family) Pseudoceraphron (genus) birds, lizards and other at risk fauna.
- The effects on our special Inanga spawing area and habitats.
- Effects on Freshwater Ecology (Referenced by Environmental Ecologists in the AEE 24 Aug 2018)
 The proposed footprint requires reclamation of a section of a headwater tributary of Yorke
 Stream, resulting in approx. 53m of intermittent stream loss and ephemeral stream loss
 (previous Boffa report was 38m ephemeral) The proposed stream diversion channel is at least
 70m in length. This satisfies the minimum requirement of a ratio 1:1 BUT DOES NOT satisfy the
 minimum area calculated with ECR (Ecological Compensation Ratio) There is a shortfall of 15m
 in length, or 7.5m2 of habitat?
- In addition to reclamation, earthworks and the associated discharge of sediment may adversely affect high quality freshwater habitats and associated aquatic organisms in the vicinity of the development.
- Hydrological changes associated with diversion of stormwater away from watercourses
- Sediment laden runoff due to increase soil exposure, runoff from impervious surfaces and vegetation removal will increase flood flows and could degrade freshwater systems downstream. This is a MAJOR issue causing erosion in-stream.
- Changes and modifications causing habitat loss
- Groundwater and Settlement effects
- Erosion and sediment effects and discharges
- Structures that can impede fish passages
- Chlorinated water discharged to streams.
- **Disturbance and edge effects** Risks associated with impacts of edge effect, works close to large old trees, changes to soil environment and our water bodies etc are more uncertain and will be difficult to manage.
- Piping streams underground /culverting and diversion/straightening including loss of stream length and the effects through discharge of contaminants to those through construction and ongoing discharge of stormwater.
- Also the SEV tool used (Stream Ecological Valuation) does not consider "special" characteristics of the fauna (such as threatened status) which hugely should contribute to these stream values.
- Any SEV assessments of intermittent streams should take place when flowing water is present in the stream, following a minimum of two months of winter flows and preferably between July and October to provide an ACCURATE assessment of biological values. Field survey's undertaken were only done on three days in Oct 2017 – NOT acceptable that a partial SEV was undertaken.

Kauri dieback

 Proposed site for the water treatment plant in Clark Bush Track is closed by Auckland Council for the protection of Kauri classified as "Endangered Ecosystem" yet Kauri now listed as a "threatened species" there will be the felling of healthy Kauri under 20cm – these include mature Rickers, saplings and seedlings (only mature trees were counted and GPS'd above 20cm in diameter)which include the sites where the reservoir 1 and 2 will be built - Kaihikatea Wetlands surrounded by Kanuka forest and Maire tawake, Kauri forest, Kaihikatea pukatea patch of forest (WF8) <u>Critically Endangered</u> surrounds the ephemeral stream headwaters — Manuka Rd — Yorke-impact-ephemeral-east within the WTP footprint will be destroyed. A microscopic water mould called **Phytophthora agathidicida** lives in the soil and has two forms. The soil form is in tough spores called oospores that can survive in dried soil on boots and equipment for up to 8 years (and counting). It also has a water borne spore with a tail that can swim called a zoospore, but can move through water film in the soil. The concern of Kauri dieback being spread through earthworks entering the streams and posing a huge threat to other Kauri and other unknown native trees that could be susceptible to the disease in the valley. For eg Tanekawa, Rewarewa.



Of Note – 76% of our known NZ native freshwater fish species are threatened with, or at risk of, extinction which include our taonga species:- Inanga, Longfin eel NZFFD (NZ freshwater Fish Database)

34 % of our macroinvertebrates are in decline in NZ.

What is measured

Stats NZ Tatauranga Aotearoa (18 April 2019)

The macroinvertebrate community index (MCI) is used as an indicator of water quality and overall stream health. It is one of five indicators that provide an overview of New Zealand's river water quality

Why it is important

Benthic macroinvertebrates are small animals without backbones (eg insects and worms). They live on and under submerged logs, rocks, and aquatic plants on the beds of rivers and streams during some part of their life cycle. Macroinvertebrates play a central role in stream ecosystems by feeding on periphyton (algae), macrophytes (aquatic plants), dead leaves and wood, or on each other. In turn, they are an important food source for fish and birds. A high MCI indicates a high level of river health, with more-polluted rivers having low MCI scores.

Many of New Zealand's native freshwater fish and invertebrates are endemic – they are found nowhere else in the world. Some also have very localised distributions. These animals are important for freshwater ecosystem processes. Our freshwater animals and plants interact to create complex ecosystems, and a decline in one species can have large-scale ecosystem impacts.

Reasons for my submission as set out in the document below in relation to significant impacts on our Waima Indigenous Fauna species

- In regard to the resource consent for earthworks and vegetation removal, including a Significant Ecological Area (SEA) overlay –
- I am writing to voice my concerns on the significant impacts this will cause with the loss of our fauna, their habitats being destroyed, shelter, food sources being effected.
- Climate Change If deforestation continues and we see the beginning of global desertification, it will have resounding impacts on the global climate. Extreme weather events will increase: flooding, and drought will be common as there would be a lack of containment of rain water in trees or protection from continued rains.
- **Cutting trees** can result in the loss of habitat for **animal species**, which can harm ecosystems. According to National Geographic, "70 percent of Earth's land **animals** and plants live in forests, and many cannot survive the deforestation that destroys their homes."
- **Deforestation** can lead to a general degradation of their habitat. The removal of trees and other types of vegetation reduces available food, shelter, and breeding habitat. ... **Animals** may not be able to find adequate shelter, water, and food to survive within remaining habitat.
- RNZ "Government Seeks feedback on biodiversity strategy" -Conservation Minister Eugenie Sage said New Zealand had 4000 native species that were threatened or at risk, and had already lost countless species to extinction - including more than 50 kinds of native bird.

A National Policy Statement on indigenous biodiversity was also being created, she said.

Forest and Bird chief conservation adviser Kevin Hackwell said New Zealand's biodiversity was facing a crisis.

3.7.4 Bats - Page 28 (Refer T&T AEE July 2019)

I do not accept what has been said and also very disappointing what was in this report considering the latest NZ Classification of our Long-tailed Bats is "Nationally Critical"

- There were <u>29 so called "uncertain passes"</u> recorded on the ABM location Bat 15 which is right by existing WTP opposite Waima Crescent and adjacent to mature Kauri podocarp forest which they favour.
- On Boffa's Bat expert visual spectograms converted from audio, that sounds were produced by some passing cars at 40kHz range which is the same frequency as bats. They say "We" (NO mention of who had given 2nd opinion??) come to the conclusion that MOST of the "uncertain passes" were not bat passes, they did not say ALL.
- <u>Detection of 4 "uncertain passes"</u> on 2 x Bat locations on the impacted site Kaihikatea Wetlands where there are many potential mature roost trees there including Kauri and Kanuka, and streams which attract bats.
- <u>Detection of 1</u> on the forest edge of Woodlands Park Rd opposite Manuka Rd where the scrub is. Bats will often use forest roads or streams for feeding access, and here I would say their access into Clark Bush. Their home range is huge!!

<u>It is disappointing</u> that the report does not confirm any bat passes - If actual spectrograms of the "uncertain passes" had been included, then he may have been able to add his opinion on them. Usually, spurious background noises like traffic, rodents, birds etc. are fairly clear cut on spectrogram files and look quite different to bat passes.

• Judging by the map you supplied, it is very possible bats venture out from core areas of the Waitakere Ranges to the periphery urban areas while forgaging. As you (Tina) have indicated that there are mature trees nearby, it is possible that bats use these as roosts from time to time at least.

Email as pers. comm Bat Expert - David Clark - EcoQuest 18/6/19

Bats move roosts on an almost a nightly basis, so just because you do one survey/s and don't find any, it does not necessarily
mean that bats are not present in the area. You may just miss them with the timing of the survey/s.

2.3 Bats - Refer 2.3.1 Desktop Review - Page 13 (Appendix L – Ecological Asessment Boffa 21/5/19)

Was noted, further data was requested from the Auckland Council fauna database (B.Paris 2017, pers.comm, December 22).

- The information was not on this report showing the multiple bat surveys that had been undertaken in the vicinity of the site.
- Should have included as saying:- A sizeable resident population of long-tailed bats is present in the Nihotupu Reservoir
 catchment, well within flying distance of the Woodlands Park site. Forest margins, sheltered areas of tall forest intersected by

roads (such as that present along Manuka and Woodlands Park Roads), and steep escarpments (such as the one above the proposed location for water reservoirs 1) are particularly favoured foraging habitats, while mature kauri and podocarps are likely to offer roosting habitat. - Boffa Miskell HWTP Shortlist Options AEE Evaluation Report - 8/5/17

Bats - Refer 2.3.2.1 Spatial Survey Design - Page 13 (Appendix L - Ecological Assessment Boffa 21/5/19)

- From paragraph 1 There was lack of information on the Spring 2018 bat surveys targeting large trees likely to be impacted as a
 result of the proposed works as what was said.
- Which trees? Species were not named, also no mention on visual monitoring observations on trees with cavities, loose or peeling bark, dead standing trees, large hollow stumps that bats would roost in.
- Also doing walking line transects with the handheld bat detectors, you can cover lots of ground in a night. Advised by David Clarke - Bat Expert 18/6/19

3.7.3 Reptiles and amphibians - Page 27 (Refer T&T AEE July 2019)

It mentions that detection rates and diversity of native lizards within the site were both very low, however the availability of suitable habitat on the site presents a reasonable likelihood that a range of species recorded in the surrounding area are present on site.

2.2 Herpetofauna - Refer 2.2.2 Survey Site Selection - Page 11 (Refer Appendix L - Ecological Assessment Boffa 21/5/19)

"Potential native frog habitats within the project area were assessed and found to be unsuitable because of sediment deposition or lack of refugia."

<u>I disagree:</u>- As noted in HWTP Shortlist Options Analysis: Ecological Effects Evaluation Report prepared for Watercare by Boffa Miskell as noted below:-

- Hochstetter's frogs (At Risk) have been recorded in the catchment surrounding the Nihotupu Reservoir and in forested headwater streams throughout the Waitakere foothills, and typically favour the margins of stony bottomed streams in native forest.
- Habitat within the headwaters of Armstrong Gully Stream is somewhat modified but could potentially support a Hochstetter's froq population - Boffa Miskell 8 May 2017
- Also, potential habitat was observed at the headwater's of Yorke Gully Receiving Stream in Clark Bush and confirmed by Auckland Botannical Society and Simon Grant - Environmental Ecologist for Waituna Action Group

2.2 Herpetofauna - Refer 2.23 Sampling Methods for Lizard survey (Refer Appendix L – Ecological Assessment)

- Other survey methods such as tree warps could have been used to increase the chance of detecting gecko's. From not using tree
 warps where geckos are more likely to be rather than on the ground. Forest gecko (Nationally at risk) has been recorded
 previously at the site, and Green gecko (Nationally at risk) are likely to be present. Shona Myers review 2/7/18

3.7.5 - Birds - Page 28 - (Refer T&T AEE July 2019)

From this report, Fourteen bird species were detected within the

Project Site during the bird counts - seven native and seven exotic bird species. **This is incorrect,** as Shona Myers verified with me, **ten native** and seven exotic bird species (correct)

NZ Native Birds recorded:- Tui, Greywarbler, Kingfisher, Silvereye, Fantail, Shining Cuckoo, Kereru, Spur winged plover, Morepork and also included the Swamp Harrier (Kahu) from Bird Monitoring with Forest & Bird Waitakere and Locals on 6 May 2017 - Total of 17 bird species

- Bird counts however were done over a short time frame 3 days in total over 3 weeks. The timing of bird counts effects the
 results. As the counts were done during'summer' conditions there will be some seasonal effect (birds can be quieter at this time
 of the year).
- The graphs of bird counts are good, although hard to read. A table showing the mean no. of individuals per station at the site and compared to Auckland Council counts would be useful.
- An estimate of the total number of breeding pairs at the project site would be useful. This could be baed on work done on territory size for the more common native birds on he Auckland Region (or upper N Is). If the information is available.
- A comment on the ecosystem services provided by birds would be useful. Birds will be moving from adjoining bush areas, through the site utilising food sources and by doing this assisting with pollination and spread of seeds.

The above 4 bullet points was noted by Shona Myers 2/7/18

- There were no "Nest Survey's Conducted" -
- Mature trees offer high quality nesting habitat. HWTP Shortlist Options Boffa AEE 8/5/17
- It is surprising that only two count stations had records of Kereru. This is most likely due to their lack of conspicuous especially during December rather than few kereru being present. The results of the nationwide Kereru Count done in September 2017 could have been compared to what numbers were recorded in Waima/Titirangi area's. (Tina)

<u>Wingspan National Bird of Prey Centre - Rotorua</u> - Advised me to contact Doc. Told me in particular with our Ruru - NZ Native Owl is endemic to NZ and found nowhere else in the world is worthy of protection in the Waitakere Ranges. (They are resident in our Clark Bush - noted and recorded by Jacqui Geux from our Bat Walk - 13/6/17)

Birds - Refer 2.4.1 Desktop Review - Page 15 (Appendix L Ecological Assessment Boffa 21/5/19)

 <u>Winter/Spring or Summer/Autum</u> would have been the optimal time periods for capturing highs and lows baseline data for these sites. Surveys done Dec/Jan 2017/18

Only carried out on three separate days 07/12, 12/12, 21/12 - 2017

Refer 2.4.2 - Five-Minute Bird Counts and Incidental Observations - Page 16

• Paragraph 4 - With incidental observations recorded outside of the 5MBCs - What species were there ? - They did not declare.

Birds - Refer 2.4.3 - Acoustic Monitoring - Page 16

ARDs were programmed to record daily for 14 consecutive days - What additional species ? these were not named. Also Night time monitoring enabled nocturnal species to be identified. But there was no mention of the Morepork which are resident in Clark Bush sighted from "Bat Walk on 6 May 2017" with local community group.

Birds - Refer 2.4.4 - Data Analysis - Page 16

- <u>From the report,</u> "The average number of each species recorded across the entire site over the six count periods was compared with 5MBC data collected by Auckland Council from nine locations within the Waitakere Ranges" (Figure 7)
- (i) How did this influence these calculations? and what does it mean? (ii) What did they compare? THE INFORMATION IS
 INCOMPLETE.

Five minute bird count in conjunction with Garden Bird Survey was conducted on 30/6/18 at Tangiwai Reserve – Titirangi by Waituna Stream with Forest & Bird and the public

Bird Species recorded and seen – Native:- Pukeko, Spur-winged plover, Little Black shag (naturally uncommon), Tui, Grey Warbler

Non-Native:- Rosella, Duck (Mallard), Magpie, Goldfinch – Total 9 species

Extinction rates for birds in New Zealand are high - 34% of endemic land and freshwater birds and 5% of sea birds. Birds that had evolved to live on the ground had no defences against the ravages of predators, nor habitat loss. Even now, 37% of our bird species are considered threatened. 

Exhibition Drive is not suitable for the proposed level of Rigid truck movements. This section of Exhibition Drive is used for a number of activities: - Residential access to property. - Bus Stop (Stop ID: 5893) used for public and school services. - Public access to walking tracks. Exhibition drive provides access to some of the few track still open in the ranges. These tracks are also the most highly utilised. Allowing access via Exhibition Drive would create a pinch point between these activities. In addition the Transport assessment (Appendix M) acknowledges that this access point has limited site lines in both directions along Huia Road. There is extremely limited visibility of Exhibition Drive from Huia Road with only the immediate entrance visible. Large vehicles would need to come to a complete stop prior to turning in, a slow manoeuvre with a heavily laden vehicle. Because of this and the site lines, this access point would require a traffic management system. This in turn would impact on the free flow of traffic along Huia Road. There is an alternative access point to the Landfill site further along Huia Road towards Parau via the Pipeline Road. This access point has much better site lines in both directions, and the access point is also wider. Utilising this access point would provide a clear separation between construction activities by Watercare and the existing activities listed above. Vegetation removal

What are the reasons for your submission?

We oppose Watercare's application for resource consent for vegetation removal. Watercare propose to remove 3.5 hectares of native bush. Auckland Council have affirmed a commitment to combat climate change; to promote biodiversity; to fight kauri dieback. The proposed development would fell native forest, releasing sequestered carbon back into the atmosphere. Deforestation is a key contributor to climate change; Auckland Council declared a Climate Emergency on 11 June 2019. Watercare have a statutory obligation under clause 1.1.8 of the Auckland Council CCO Accountability Policy, requiring them to consider the climate impact of their strategies and plans; has this obligation really been adequately observed? The loss of the affected area would be a blow to biodiversity, given the 80+ native species residing within the site, including 11 on the endangered or critically-endangered lists. The area is well-known for its rich biodiversity in flora and fauna, including rare species of fern, epiphytes, butterflies, and snails. The site contains habitat for nationally-threatened plant species, and is also home to a range of native invertebrates that keep nutrients cycling and are our key pollinators. A satisfactory understanding of the wildlife habitat that will be destroyed and/or disturbed has not been established. In particular, further investigations are warranted to establish both the short and long term impact this project will have on native bats, native birds, insect species, and the inanga and longfin eel populations present in the catchment. The discovery of a new species of native Pteromalid wasp was also identified on the site. Five examples of the flightless female were found at Clark's Bush and are yet to be named by the Curator of Entomology at Auckland Museum. Also found in the Kahikatea wetland was Empicoris Serous Bergroth - a very rare specimen of thread bug, only the fourth ever recorded in NZ. In addition, a very rare slave ant has been found and identified in Clark Bush. These little known species need special consideration. As part of a complex ecosystem, we don't yet understand how the disruption of their habitat will affect not just them, but the wider ecosystem long term. The affected area is defined as a Significant Ecological Area in the Unitary Plan; the affected critically-endangered flora and fauna is also protected under: • The Auckland Unitary Plan - SEA, Environmental protection, Mana Whenua • The Waitakere Ranges Heritage Area Act 2008 • The Little Muddy Creeks Plan 2014 • Auckland Council 2050 Pest Free Plan • Auckland Council's list of protected trees • Native Plants Protection Act 1934 • Wildlife Act 1953 • The Conservation Act 1987 • DoC National Biodiversity Strategy 2019 D9.3 of the Auckland Unitary Plan requires those wishing to remove vegetation in a SEA to: • first try to avoid removal; • if this is not practicable, to remedy the removal; • failing that, to mitigate or offset the removal. The Waima site is the only site on Watercare's "long list" where it is impossible to avoid removing vegetation in a SEA. Would "first try to avoid removal" then not be simply satisfied by choosing any other site from the list? The proposed measures to mitigate the impact of vegetation removal - pest control, weed control - are already being undertaken by other groups in the area, and the benefits of Watercare's mitigation package are seriously underwhelming when compared to the damage they will be inflicting. The ecology reports confirm this site forms linkages and corridors for wildlife with adjoining regional parkland, including the Northwest Link. The planned deforestation will have far-reaching consequences upon the wider Waitakere Ranges. The clearance of vegetation within the footprint of the proposed development is also likely to result in the poor health or the ultimate death of adjacent trees due to exposure, root damage and altered drainage patterns. Forest clearance that exposes mature forest trees to an edge environment can undermine their health and stability. Of huge concern to us is the likely impact to the kauri-podocarp forest adjacent to the south-western corner of the proposed site which is also close to a group of large, old kauri. Kauri Dieback is a huge concern in the Waitakeres, and to Auckland Council. Residents have received letters from Council threatening \$20,000 fines for breaching closed tracks in Kauri Protection Zones, for fear that dirt transported on shoes could transmit the disease. Watercare are proposing to move 100,000 cubic metres of dirt in and around these zones. The loss of trees will result in erosion, and dirt being washed downhill towards the healthy and genetically-diverse Kauri forests below the development area... forests which include three of the oldest Kauri in the Auckland region. The oldest of those is less than a hundred metres downhill of the development site. Are there any measures which could be adequate to protect those trees from potentially-infected runoff and cross contamination from the earth movements? It is concerning to us that only those Kauri with a trunk diameter greater than 20cm were counted during site surveys, leaving smaller regenerating Kauri unaccounted for and arbitrarily deflating the reported numbers of potentially-affected trees as a result. Kauri trees under 20cm in diameter are by no means saplings. Dating estimates suggest that a tree with a 20cm diameter would be around 80-100 years old, thus representing the future of this species. On reservoir site 1, council have suggested that the groundwater draining during construction may cause the surviving Kauri to suffer from drought conditions which could stress the trees and make them more vulnerable to pathogens. Although Kauri are known to be resilient to drought, it is not scientifically known how long this resilience lasts. Through groundwater drainage, Watercare will be creating artificial drought conditions for 18+ months. There are no contingency plans for what to do if that drought is preceded or followed by any natural drought. Why would we risk these already vulnerable trees by enforcing a man-made drought? In addition to this, scientific research is currently suggesting that Kanuka trees may offer some protection from Kauri Dieback Disease. A large number of Kanuka would be felled as a result of this development. Our concern is that surviving kauri may be losing their much needed protection as a result of this project.

Earthworks

What are the reasons for your submission?

We oppose Watercare's application for resource consent for earthworks. Waima and Titirangi do not have a roading infrastructure conducive to the volume of heavy truck traffic that the project anticipates. A heavy truck cannot fit in a single lane along much of the proposed routes, rendering the roads unsafe for both traffic and pedestrians. Watercare were asked by Auckland Transport to perform tests to demonstrate how two trucks could safely travel the route in opposite directions; is there any evidence this was adequately demonstrated? In particular, would emergency services vehicles be able to pass a truck in either direction if required, given that a minute or two can mean the difference between life and death? Scenic Drive has already experienced numerous slips in the past – has research been undertaken as to the likely exacerbation of such events by constant heavy truck movements and vibration? Much of the proposed route has poor or non-existent footpaths, and is already potentially hazardous to cyclists, pedestrians, and children walking to or from school. Adding a constant flow of over-width vehicles into the mix will increase the danger to these groups. Can the risk to human life be expressed on a balance sheet? In order to reach the Parau landfill site, the trucks need to pass by Woodlands Park Primary School, where our daughter attends. At peak activity level, it is proposed that thirteen trucks will pass the school every hour - more than one every five minutes. While students try to work. For years. The route to reach Woodlands Park Road will take those trucks either through Titirangi Village or up Atkinson Road. Auckland Transport have warned Watercare about the impracticality of the Atkinson Road route, given that it would require the dozens of heavy trucks to pass eleven schools and Early Learning Centres. Watercare's consultant have suggested they might agree to avoid Atkinson Road 'where practicable' - a phrase which does not instil confidence, particularly when the difficulty of having two trucks pass in opposite directions might render it unavoidable to use Atkinson Road. Passing through the Village, on the other hand, will have a huge impact on local businesses and on traffic and travel times for locals - particularly if parking in the Village is compromised to cater for Watercare's logistical requirements. Watercare cite a statistic of 350 heavy vehicles a day currently heading down Titirangi Road from the Village, seeking to demonstrate that an additional 90 trucks a day is a proportionately small increase. An examination of the report used to generate that figure of 350, however, reveals that it required conflating small vans, utes, campers, and the like all under the umbrella of 'heavy vehicles' - the addition of 90 trucks a day would be a massive change to current traffic patterns. While Watercare propose to minimise their traffic during certain peak times 'where practicable' (that phrase again!), it is impossible that the effects of these routes would not change the nature of the local community. Additionally, residents have been apprised that their insurance would not cover property damage resulting from vibration from the trucks. Auckland Council would be liable, and should send a letter out to residents advising of said truck movements. They should also arrange inspections of properties so that claims for damages can be properly addressed. Watercare have been made aware of evidence of pre-European archaeological sites within the development area. According to the Historic Places Act 1993, this requires them to submit an application to the Historic Places Trust - do we know if Watercare have complied with this requirement? Years of construction and destruction, six days a week - the noise of chainsaws laying waste to our environment, of heavy trucks constantly rumbling past, of diggers and earthmovers – will take a psychological toll on the residents... not merely as a result of the physical noise, but also from the inescapable reminder it presents of what is happening to our community.

What decisions and amendments would you like the council to make?

Full assessment, consideration and 'true cost' established on the effects of the earthworks being undertaken for the duration of this project.

The Waima site is a poor choice for the development, based on Watercare's own site principles and selection criteria. According to their Site Principles report of December 2015, the Waima site failed the Site Principles test, and Watercare needed to relax their criteria in order to allow the site onto their long list. It is the only site on the long list that makes encroachment into a Significant Ecological Area unavoidable. It is very small for its intended purpose, with no room for future expansion should additional facilities be required. Building the plant at Waima requires linking to existing aging infrastructure, versus starting fresh at a new site. To select, from all the sites on the long list, the one that flies hardest in the face of Auckland Council's commitment to combatting climate change, fighting Kauri Dieback, and supporting biodiversity – while at the same time presenting significant logistical and infrastructure deficiencies – points to something gone seriously awry with Watercare's site selection process. We submit that the site was selected based on altered scores due almost entirely to inappropriate political pressure on the CCO as a result of sustained media coverage, preventing the most optimal site (Oratia) being selected. We further submit that the first principle of the RMA – to avoid irreversible adverse environmental effects – has not been satisfactorily achieved with the project being proposed in this location. It is also inconsistent with the relevant objectives and policies of the Auckland Unitary Plan.

Vegetation removal

What are the reasons for your submission?

We oppose Watercare's application for resource consent for vegetation removal. Watercare propose to remove 3.5 hectares of native bush. Auckland Council have affirmed a commitment to combat climate change; to promote biodiversity; to fight kauri dieback. The proposed development would fell native forest, releasing sequestered carbon back into the atmosphere. Deforestation is a key contributor to climate change; Auckland Council declared a Climate Emergency on 11 June 2019. Watercare have a statutory obligation under clause 1.1.8 of the Auckland Council CCO Accountability Policy, requiring them to consider the climate impact of their strategies and plans; has this obligation really been adequately observed? The loss of the affected area would be a blow to biodiversity, given the 80+ native species residing within the site, including 11 on the endangered or critically-endangered lists. The area is well-known for its rich biodiversity in flora and fauna, including rare species of fern, epiphytes, butterflies, and snails. The site contains habitat for nationally-threatened plant species, and is also home to a range of native invertebrates that keep nutrients cycling and are our key pollinators. A satisfactory understanding of the wildlife habitat that will be destroyed and/or disturbed has not been established. In particular, further investigations are warranted to establish both the short and long term impact this project will have on native bats, native birds, insect species, and the inanga and longfin eel populations present in the catchment. The discovery of a new species of native Pteromalid wasp was also identified on the site. Five examples of the flightless female were found at Clark's Bush and are yet to be named by the Curator of Entomology at Auckland Museum. Also found in the Kahikatea wetland was Empicoris Serous Bergroth - a very rare specimen of thread bug, only the fourth ever recorded in NZ. In addition, a very rare slave ant has been found and identified in Clark Bush. These little known species need special consideration. As part of a complex ecosystem, we don't yet understand how the disruption of their habitat will affect not just them, but the wider ecosystem long term. The affected area is defined as a Significant Ecological Area in the Unitary Plan; the affected critically-endangered flora and fauna is also protected under: • The Auckland Unitary Plan - SEA, Environmental protection, Mana Whenua • The Waitakere Ranges Heritage Area Act 2008 • The Little Muddy Creeks Plan 2014 • Auckland Council 2050 Pest Free Plan • Auckland Council's list of protected trees • Native Plants Protection Act 1934 • Wildlife Act 1953 • The Conservation Act 1987 • DoC National Biodiversity Strategy 2019 D9.3 of the Auckland Unitary Plan requires those wishing to remove vegetation in a SEA to: • first try to avoid removal; • if this is not practicable, to remedy the removal; • failing that, to mitigate or offset the removal. The Waima site is the only site on Watercare's "long list" where it is impossible to avoid removing vegetation in a SEA. Would "first try to avoid removal" then not be simply satisfied by choosing any other site from the list? The proposed measures to mitigate the impact of vegetation removal - pest control, weed control - are already being undertaken by other groups in the area, and the benefits of Watercare's mitigation package are seriously underwhelming when compared to the damage they will be inflicting. The ecology reports confirm this site forms linkages and corridors for wildlife with adjoining regional parkland, including the Northwest Link. The planned deforestation will have far-reaching consequences upon the wider Waitakere Ranges. The clearance of vegetation within the footprint of the proposed development is also likely to result in the poor health or the ultimate death of adjacent trees due to exposure, root damage and altered drainage patterns. Forest clearance that exposes mature forest trees to an edge environment can undermine their health and stability. Of huge concern to us is the likely impact to the kauri-podocarp forest adjacent to the south-western corner of the proposed site which is also close to a group of large, old kauri. Kauri Dieback is a huge concern in the Waitakeres, and to Auckland Council. Residents have received letters from Council threatening \$20,000 fines for breaching closed tracks in Kauri Protection Zones, for fear that dirt transported on shoes could transmit the disease. Watercare are proposing to move 100,000 cubic metres of dirt in and around these zones. The loss of trees will result in erosion, and dirt being washed downhill towards the healthy and genetically-diverse Kauri forests below the development area... forests which include three of the oldest Kauri in the Auckland region. The oldest of those is less than a hundred metres downhill of the development site. Are there any measures which could be adequate to protect those trees from potentially-infected runoff and cross contamination from the earth movements? It is concerning to us that only those Kauri with a trunk diameter greater than 20cm were counted during site surveys, leaving smaller regenerating Kauri unaccounted for and arbitrarily deflating the reported numbers of potentially-affected trees as a result. Kauri trees under 20cm in diameter are by no means saplings. Dating estimates suggest that a tree with a 20cm diameter would be around 80-100 years old, thus representing the future of this species. On reservoir site 1, council have suggested that the groundwater draining during construction may cause the surviving Kauri to suffer from drought conditions which could stress the trees and make them more vulnerable to pathogens. Although Kauri are known to be resilient to drought, it is not scientifically known how long this resilience lasts. Through groundwater drainage, Watercare will be creating artificial drought conditions for 18+ months. There are no contingency plans for what to do if that drought is preceded or followed by any natural drought. Why would we risk these already vulnerable trees by enforcing a man-made drought? In addition to this, scientific research is currently suggesting that Kanuka trees may offer some protection from Kauri Dieback Disease. A large number of Kanuka would be felled as a result of this development. Our concern is that surviving kauri may be losing their much needed protection as a result of this project.

What decisions and amendments would you like the council to make?

Go back to the drawing board - find a site which won't obliterate our native forest

Earthworks

What are the reasons for your submission?

We oppose Watercare's application for resource consent for earthworks. Waima and Titirangi do not have a roading infrastructure conducive to the volume of heavy truck traffic that the project anticipates. A heavy truck cannot fit in a single lane along much of the proposed routes, rendering the roads unsafe for both traffic and pedestrians. Watercare were asked by Auckland Transport to perform tests to demonstrate how two trucks could safely travel the route in opposite directions; is there any evidence this was adequately demonstrated? In particular, would emergency services vehicles be able to pass a truck in either direction if required, given that a minute or two can mean the difference between life and death? Scenic Drive has already experienced numerous slips in the past – has research been undertaken as to the likely exacerbation of such events by constant heavy truck movements and vibration? Much of the proposed route has poor or non-existent footpaths, and is already potentially hazardous to cyclists, pedestrians, and children walking to or from school. Adding a constant flow of over-width vehicles into the mix will increase the danger to these groups. Can the risk to human life be expressed on a balance sheet? In order to reach the Parau landfill site, the trucks need to pass by Woodlands Park Primary School, where our daughter attends. At peak activity level, it is proposed that thirteen trucks will pass the school every hour - more than one every five minutes. While students try to work. For years. The route to reach Woodlands Park Road will take those trucks either through Titirangi Village or up Atkinson Road. Auckland Transport have warned Watercare about the impracticality of the Atkinson Road route, given that it would require the dozens of heavy trucks to pass eleven schools and Early Learning Centres. Watercare's consultant have suggested they might agree to avoid Atkinson Road 'where practicable' - a phrase which does not instil confidence, particularly when the difficulty of having two trucks pass in opposite directions might render it unavoidable to use Atkinson Road. Passing through the Village, on the other hand, will have a huge impact on local businesses and on traffic and travel times for locals - particularly if parking in the Village is compromised to cater for Watercare's logistical requirements. Watercare cite a statistic of 350 heavy vehicles a day currently heading down Titirangi Road from the Village, seeking to demonstrate that an additional 90 trucks a day is a proportionately small increase. An examination of the report used to generate that figure of 350, however, reveals that it required conflating small vans, utes, campers, and the like all under the umbrella of 'heavy vehicles' - the addition of 90 trucks a day would be a massive change to current traffic patterns. While Watercare propose to minimise their traffic during certain peak times 'where practicable' (that phrase again!), it is impossible that the effects of these routes would not change the nature of the local community. Additionally, residents have been apprised that their insurance would not cover property damage resulting from vibration from the trucks. Auckland Council would be liable, and should send a letter out to residents advising of said truck movements. They should also arrange inspections of properties so that claims for damages can be properly addressed. Watercare have been made aware of evidence of pre-European archaeological sites within the development area. According to the Historic Places Act 1993, this requires them to submit an application to the Historic Places Trust - do we know if Watercare have complied with this requirement? Years of construction and destruction, six days a week - the noise of chainsaws laying waste to our environment, of heavy trucks constantly rumbling past, of diggers and earthmovers – will take a psychological toll on the residents... not merely as a result of the physical noise, but also from the inescapable reminder it presents of what is happening to our community.

What decisions and amendments would you like the council to make?

Full assessment, consideration and 'true cost' established on the effects of the earthworks being undertaken on the local community for the duration of this project.

The submission relates to the whole of the application. I oppose the application in its entirety.

What are the reasons for your submission?

I submit that the site was selected based on altered scores, due almost entirely to inappropriate political pressure on the CCO as a result of sustained media coverage, resulting in the most optimal site from being selected. There are already cleared sites available which, with the application of high tech engineering, would avoid the devastation on our natural environment. I submit that the first principle of the RMA to AVOID irreversible adverse environmental effects has not been satisfactorily achieved with the project being proposed in this location. It is also inconsistent with the relevant objectives and policies of the Auckland Unitary Plan. VEGETATION REMOVAL: Noting that Auckland Council declared a climate emergency on 11th June 2019 I submit the removal of thousands of trees is irresponsible and out of step with best practice. It is madness to destroy native bush permanently which will add to global deforestation and further global warming. The ecology reports confirm this site forms linkages and corridors for wildlife with adjoining regional parkland including the North-West Link, furthermore edge effects will compromise the trees that remain outside of the construction site. I submit that proposed buffer zones are totally inappropriate in size, additionally at the Reservoir 2 site all high integrity bush inside the "buffer zone" will be removed, and replaced by low value vegetation. Watercare already plan that new vegetation may need to be removed in the future for pipe maintenance. The shaft of the NH2 is inside the area of highest ecological value, and within riparian margins. This "creep" of add-ons is indicative of further encroachment over time. This is further demonstrated by the Watercare statement: "Revegetation of the decommissioned WTP site is not proposed, in order to preserve the long term resilience of the water supply system through allowing space for future refurbishment and/or expansion of the plant" EFFECTS ON BIODIVERSITY: We submit that due consideration has not been made to: The impact of noise on surrounding wildlife. Furthermore in my view a satisfactory understanding of the underlying wildlife habitat that will be disturbed has not been established. Eg, a single bird survey period of December-January is inadequate. The bat survey was also inconclusive and further investigations are warranted. After the applicant was notified on 10 June 2019 of the discovery of new insect species and the presence of other rare insect species, further investigations were warranted before the application was lodged. CULVERTING AND REDIRECTION OF STREAMS: This will destroy ecosystems and alter the natural flow in a wetland area. KAURI AND KAURI DIEBACK: Large parts of the Waitakere Ranges are closed to prevent the spread of kauri dieback yet 3.5ha of land are to be cleared within this protected area. I would like to point out that: Only those kauri with a trunk diameter >20cm have been counted during site surveys, leaving smaller regenerating kauri unaccounted for. No investigations specific to the proposed development have been undertaken and the Ecological Report does not address the sensitive root systems of kauri and the impact of stress on vulnerability to kauri dieback. The SOPs for kauri dieback were not designed for projects of this scale and all soil from the project site must be considered as contaminated for the purpose of the potential spread of kauri dieback disease to kauri beyond the project footprint treated in accordance with this assumption. IMPACTS DOWNSTREAM OF THE SITE I submit that sediment controls are inadequate and the risk of failure could be catastrophic. Titirangi-Laingholm Catchment Modelling, including flood profiling is still underway giving insufficient information regarding the risk. Failure Mode 1 does not adequately address the evacuation or warning systems with downstream residents or the school which tests water in Kopai Gully. Given all soil is assumed to be contaminated such an event would risk healthy and genetically diverse kauri downstream. It would also risk the population of inanga at Little Muddy Creek, TRAFFIC IMPACT: This proposal has an 8 year construction period. Consideration must be made of the impact not only for local traffic that use these roads every day, but for tourist traffic, school buses and cyclists. Pedestrian safety for school children and recreational and dog walkers will be compromised. Vibration damage of homes along the truck routes will be an additional cost to the project not budgeted for. TOURISM AMENITY IMPACTS: The proposed construction site is at the gateway to the Waitakere Ranges and would be a visual scar and tarnish our international image. THE PROPOSED TRUST: I oppose mitigation regarding it as a blunt archaic tool and out of step with progressive thinking to development in our city. I submit that this is only compensation (and should in no way be referred to as "mitigation") and is focused on Biosecurity not Biodiversity. Mitigation is over and above what is currently planned or supported. I note there are multiple groups in the proposed zone who have support to increase biodiversity in the area via Auckland Biodiversity expertise and Auckland Council Grants. The NETR has increased this support. Any Trust should be in existence for the whole operational life of the plant, not just the period whilst being built and commissioned. The expected high level of engagement in the catchment is based on the aspirations of the community in relation to the Muddy Creeks Local Area Plan, however this does not take into account the resistance of many in the catchment who oppose the project and want no part in perceived blood/hush money. WHY IS THIS IMPORTANT? The site is almost completely covered in native vegetation and has been identified as a Significant Ecological Area (SEA) in the AUP. The site is only one of a small number of SEAs in Auckland that meet all 5 of the conditions required to be a SEA. Studies show direct connections between spending time in a forest atmosphere and the lowering of the stress hormone cortisol. The loss of forest, together with the noise and disruption will be distressing for the community over a long period of time.

What decisions and amendments would you like the council to make?

The application to be declined in its entirety.

What are the reasons for your submission?

This is a valuable ecological corridor that cannot be replaced, plus it has several rare species. There are approximately 7 rare plant and insect species that are threatened in the area. In particular there is a very newly discovered species of endemic flightless wasp that has just been identified by the team of Dr Peter Maddison that is yet to be named and not found anywhere else - this species is likely to be wiped out with the development of this new treatment plant and tanks. The plan reduces kauri habitat when the species is now considered seriously at risk by NZ law. The plan is also against nearly all science on how to deal with climate change. It will take 100 years to replace the loss of carbon storage in this site (no amount of tree planting on the other side of Auckland will make up for this before 100 years time, which is a serious issue as well if we want to take climate change seriously and even the UN is recommending preserving forest habitats in order to deal with it.) In terms of water storage and processing, the recent near doubt conditions have for instance shown that we are already at our limits with what we can sustainably supply for water in this area of the Waitakere ranges - the local damns were extremely low. There is no pain in building such a big plant and these tanks considering this. It is also really unsustainable to attempt to spread this water to the northern parts of Auckland. There has been no genuine attempt by Watercare to engage with a social impact study and report in this - their preliminary one showed that locals by far (around 90%) live in this location because they love the forests and they also want to protect the forests. It is clear that this forest clearing would impact on a lot of local's well-being. The clearing of this forest will potentially impact on tourists, making the area app[ear more like an industrial zone than a forest we value - it might even put off tourists and taint the image of our municipal authorities. This plant is in contravention with Watercare's own criteria for how it selected this site. It seems more politically motivated than actually one that makes ecological, sustainable and social sense.

What decisions and amendments would you like the council to make?

For the current plant to be replaced like-for-like on the same site with the same footprint. It is more than possible for components and parts to be prefabricated off site and delivered in to speed up the process (just as they do in the Netherlands). While this replacement plant is being completed it is more than possible to pump Waikato water into our area as this water makes its way up through New Lynn already and just requires extra pumping. There needs to be a new water source in the north of Auckland, such as in Riverhead - according to several water engineers I have consulted with there are locations there that would work ideally for water sources. This would reduce the pressure on the local damns and other water sources in the city. There needs to be careful social impact research carried out. Due to the extra truck movement for a water pant being built, Watercare needs to fund a lot of environmental and ecological mitigation for the catchment area (in regenerating and protecting local forests from pests and weeds etc).

Huia Treatment Plant Submission

To whom it may concern

I am shocked and saddened that an application for major construction is being considered on a site designated a Significant Ecological Area. Of all the eight sites on Watercare's list this was the only one which involves extensive damage to an SEA. The construction will damage the ecology of this area in the following ways: removal of rare native trees (34 with diameters greater than 20cm and including 14 Kahikatea trees aged 80-120 years old; rerouting of three streams; spread of kauri dieback through removal of earth which is in the vicinity of kauri trees and therefore according to the protocols applying to the Waitakere ranges must be assumed to be contaminated with kauri dieback; destruction and disruption of the habitat for rare species including a newly discovered and as yet unnamed species of wasp, a very rare thread bug and a very rare slave ant (see the report by entomologist Peter Maddison). The site is part of a fragile ecological area rich in biodiversity. I am an educator with a doctorate in environmental education and I am horrified that such an important ecological site could be lost and that construction processes will cause further ecological damage to the surrounding local area. Independent ecologist Shona Myers has highlighted the area's high ecological value. Her report showed the area was home to regenerating kauri, broad-leaved forest, kahikatea-swamp maire forest, and that it forms wildlife corridors to adjoining forest (Myers, 2018).

Kauri dieback is spread by the activities of forestry contractors and the movement of trucks. It will be impossible to adequately ensure that trucks do not spread contaminated soil around the area of the site and Titirangi. Phytophthoras (the fungus responsible for dieback) are invading new areas where plants have no resistance to them, hitching a lift on new species of plants and on vehicles in particular (Hansen et al, 2000; Hansen, 2008; Scott & Williams, 2014). In the Watercare report this is compared to the protocols for building the Waterview motorway but the Waitakere ranges are different in being an area heavily infected with Kauri dieback (Hill et al 2017, Myers, 2018) and therefore posing risks that the motorway site did not.

In terms of scale, the Waitakere Ranges Regional Park (WRRP) represents the most heavily kauri dieback infected area currently recorded in New Zealand. This survey has reaffirmed that kauri dieback disease is a widespread biosecurity issue within the WRRP.

(Hill et al, 2017, p. 18)

The number of trucks and the need to move earth material make the recommended guidelines for vehicle hygeine hugely impractical and unlikely in an area where kauri dieback has already been identified and where tracks have been closed to prevent further spread (notably Clarks track which is part of the proposed Watercare site). If local people who love the bush and want to protect cannot be trusted to clean their boots to protect kauri but must be kept out how far can you trust contractors who are under time pressure to clean heavy machinery when moving in and out of different zones? As even one spore, that can live for years can infect a new area how can you guarantee that the disease will not be further spread by frequent truck movement in and out of a kauri forest and the deliberate removal and dumping of huge quantities of infected earth? The pathogen was identified in 4 out of 6 samples taken from trucks working in kauri dieback zones indicating the high level of risk (Ashcroft,

2017). This risk is intensified as it is planned to dump the earthworks on a site which is on top of a hill. It is well known that kauri dieback is spread by water run off. The pathogen can be carried down hill to infect kauri lower down. The removal of vegetation will cause Significant Damage to the Ecology of the area rather than honouring the status of a Significant Ecological Area.

I am also submitting on the impact of trucks during the enabling period of the earthworks although the heavy increase in truck movements over the entire eight year build are of grave concern. The impacts of congestion, dangerous truck movement and restricted access to areas of recreation will be felt not just in Waima and Titirangi but also in Laingholm, Huia and Parau and will be felt by visitors and tourists who wish to enjoy the unique beauty of this area. After all this is a historic site – the famed 'Gateway to the Waitakeres' with the iconic Titirangi hotel now lovingly restored to host an art gallery, theatre and restaurant. The character of Titirangi village is an important economic resource for tourism and for all Aucklanders. Watercare estimates this truck movement to be between 92 -118 per day. The road through the village is at all times busy and requires careful navigation to avoid people and children crossing, parked cars, chickens and stray dogs. Already Scenic drive is a dangerous road for walkers and cyclists with recent accidents. This truck movement will cause terrible congestion and make driving, cycling and walking even more dangerous. This is also an area prone to landslides (recent ones were in 2016, 2017 and 2018 on Scenic Drive completely shutting the road). Landslides will increase the disruption of the massive movement of trucks even further. Auckland Transport has raised questions about whether the width of the road is adequate. I have seen reports and images of large trucks which frequently cross the midway line because of the narrowness of the road and have personal experience of navigating this road on a daily basis. Nearby houses will be affected by the heavy movement of trucks and it is without doubt that the character of a small, pretty village 'the gateway to the Waitakeres' will simply become a thoroughfare for industrial scale construction. Local businesses will suffer as movement to and from the village including parking will be more difficult (it is already busy at all times of the day). Cafes with pavement seating will be less attractive as large trucks frequently roll past. This loved village and important tourist visitor site will be ruined.

As detailed in Watercare's submission, there is risk that important recreational walking tracks can be closed during the construction process including Exhibition Drive off Scenic Drive and the Pipeline track which is accessed via the road to the sludge site which will receive further traffic as excess waste earthworks are dumped there (see Watercare's submission). This is also a main access point for both the Beveridge track (the other is from the Arataki Centre) and the Slip Track. Council recently upgraded the Slip Track which forms a complete loop up to Arataki and back down via the Beveridge Track to the access point adjacent to the sludge dump at the start of the Pipeline Road. This walking loop popular with families, visitors, dog walkers and runners (the only loop now available in the area) will be closed during construction to allow for the heavy truck access to the sludge site. This is significant as these are paths that have been upgraded recently in light of Kauri dieback whereas restricted access to these precious and expensively redone paths would further limit recreational opportunities in the area. Note also that access to the Pipeline Road sludge dump is located sharply off Huia Road - a narrow and winding rural road which is already hazardous and the route for residents of Laingholm into the city (the one other route would present a significant detour of about 20 minutes for many residents on that side of Laingholm. In addition Clark's Track, a historic walk through beautiful native forest, will be lost forever, or, if rerouted will remain in name only becoming just another suburban pathway by an industrial site.

Local people have been hit very hard by the scale of the track closures in the Waitakeres. Their sense of health, happiness and overall sense of freedom and wellbeing has suffered. As a member of the Huia running group the feeling is one of being incrementally trapped. First the tracks close, then just as a few reopen, the only significant upgraded walking loop in the area comes under threat from this Watercare development. This massive Watercare construction project would be an intensification of the environmental distress that we are already suffering. This is the 'slow violence' of ecological harm as people experience displacement while yet remaining in the same place. If approved this Watercare development will further destroy kauri and native trees and further prevent access to the wild and beautiful bush that we value. There is no way to mitigate against this harm. Forests take time to establish as do valuable ecosystems, opening up the forest via clearing creates opportunities for pests and weeds to establish and for diseases such as kauri dieback to spread. The treatment plant will need to be extended in about ten years and this will cause further creeping violence to the forest and to biodiversity. The eathworks and later construction will cause intense pressure in trying to navigate a route to workplaces, shops and health centres. Living here will become intolerable for many as everything that made it special is gradually destroyed or closed off. The place itself will shift irrevocably, degrading an entire biotic community of people, animals, birds, insects, trees and plants.

Auckland councillors, this decision is on you in a time of climate emergency and intense anxiety about biodiversity loss. At what point will it seem important to stop cutting down forest - our main protection from rising carbon? Will you act to protect the environment of this designated ecological site and the culture and wellbeing of the wider local area? Do you want to see 'the gateway to the Waitakeres' become a throughfare for heavy construction trucks and machinery?
