






Amount Requested and Allocated 2021/2022

Exclusions – any changes

The Hibiscus and Bays Local Board will not consider grants for financial assistance for:

- Applicants who have had one successful grant application within the current financial year from the Hibiscus and Bays Local Board unless there is mitigating circumstances (which need to be explained in the application)
- Administrative costs that are ongoing, such as salaries, debt servicing, legal expenses, medical expenses, or a commitment to ongoing funding or financial support
- Churches and Educational Institutions, except where these groups can demonstrate the wider community benefit
- Activities whose purpose serves to promote religious, political or contentious messages
- Activities that do not relate to one or more of the local board plan initiatives
- Activities or projects where the funding responsibility lies with another organisation or central government
- Prizes for sports and other events (except trophies)
- Commercial business enterprises and educational institutions in accordance with the Council's Community Grants Policy (Scope and Eligibility, Page 20)
- Applications to fund projects, programmes or facilities run by Auckland Council or its employees

Exclusions – any changes

The Hibiscus and Bays Local Board will not consider grants for financial assistance for:

- Auckland Council CCO's or organisations who receive funding from the Auckland Regional Amenities Fund
- Applications for activities, events or projects outside of the local board area*
- Applications to subsidise rentals, reduce debt, or payment of rates unless it is a transitional Rate grant
- Applications for the purchase or subsidy of alcohol or costs associated with staging after-match functions
- Grants for the sole purpose of an individual
- Family reunions
- Recommendation
 - applicants are ineligible to apply for the Hibiscus and Bays Local Board contestable grants if they have had one/two successful grant application within the current financial year



Decline Reasons

- **Does not align with local board priorities:** There is a low alignment with the local board's priorities and/or community outcome(s)
- Grant round oversubscribed: Limited funding
- Central government funding role/ Other funding sources available
- Application insufficiently developed: The project not fully defined or developed, applicant may be invited to submit an application to a future grant round
- *Limited community benefit(s): Insufficient evidence of specific benefits to the community*
- **Project outside of local board area:** Project not benefiting Local Board area
- Not eligible: Applicant or project not eligible under the terms of the Community Grants Policy 2014 or the local board grants programme



Facilities Grant – any changes?

The Facilities Grant provides funding to assist with the costs of planning or developing a facility with the Hibiscus and Bays Local Board area. This can include:

- needs assessments
- feasibility studies
- investigation and design
- small building works or minor capital work

Contestable Rates Grants



Transitional Rates budget was allocated to local boards from Legacy Rates grants and have been continuing since amalgamation. A transition mechanism was put in place as part of LTP 2018-28 for three years.



From 1 July 2021, this budget falls under the complete discretion of the local board.



The Hibiscus and Bays Local Board decided to use this budget for an additional one year of support.

Purpose

- 1. To provide an update on the narrative and interpretive text for Whenua-roa / D'Oyly Reserve.
- 2. To discuss the gazettal of names and receive direction on the existing English names.
- 3. To inform of corrections to addresses in the adoption report in May last year.
- 4. To discuss selection of sites for tranche two.

Summary

- 5. Twenty-one parks were selected for Māori naming as tranche one, with the names adopted in May 2022 (HB/2022/61)
- 6. Bilingual signage has been installed in Whenua-roa / D'Oyly Reserve but the narrative for the interpretive sign has not yet been received.
- 7. A small community event (whakarewatanga) may still be held upon receipt of the narrative and installation of the interpretive panel for Whenua-roa. Iwi has advised that they expect to provide this soon.
- 8. Gazettal is a formal process that occurs once Māori names are adopted. The local board may wish to consider the existing English names as some are merely street addresses. Direction is sought on the local board's preference for adoption of these existing names.
- 9. Some street numbering used for park addresses in the adoption report in May last year were incorrect. These have been corrected in Te Kete Rukuruku's data base. This has no impact on decisions made or any project implementation following the adoption, so no further action is required.
- 10. The local board should start considering sites for naming in tranche two. Suggestions have been provided for this purpose.
- 11. There is adequate budget for completion of tranche two but it will be unable to be delivered this financial year. If budget is unable to be carried forward it is recommended that a small budget of \$3000 be considered for the work programme in FY 2024.

Context

- 12. Te Kete Rukuruku (TKR) is a partnership between mana whenua and Te Kaunihera o Tāmaki Makaurau (council) that seeks to collect and share stories unique to mana whenua in Tāmaki Makaurau.
- 13. Twenty-one sites were selected for tranche one and these names were adopted in May 2022 resolution HB/2022/61

- 14. In tranche one the board was offered the opportunity to select one park where all signage will be upgraded to be fully bilingual. This signage is funded from Long-term Plan regional funding for Māori outcomes. The site selected was Whenua-roa / D'Oyly Reserve.
- 15. The new signage includes:
 - dual language entrance signage, stating the te reo Māori and English names.
 - bilingual wayfinding, information and bylaw signage
 - a proposed bilingual interpretative sign to tell the story behind the te reo Māori name.

Discussion

Signage and whakarewatanga

- 16. In the park chosen to receive new bilingual signage, iwi are offered the opportunity to provide additional narrative. This allows for an interpretive text to be installed in the park telling the story of the name and the area. At the time of writing this memo a full narrative has not yet been received from Ngāti Manuhiri Settlement Trust for Whenua-roa.
- 17. Draft visuals were provided to the local board in September 2022 for all other bilingual signage for Whenua-roa / D'Oyly Reserve. This signage was installed in October. The interpretive panel will follow once the narrative is received.
- 18. The last update received from iwi was that the narrative has been written and is awaiting kaumātua approval.
- 19. The local board have previously indicated they would like to hold a whakarewatanga in Whenua-roa / D'Oyly Reserve once the interpretive text is installed. This is a small event involving key community groups and park stakeholders to celebrate the adoption of the first tranche of names and unveil the story of Whenua-roa. It is a wonderful opportunity for key members of the community to hear from iwi and have a better understanding of the meaning and significance of what is being achieved through the adoption of these names.
- 20. We are still hoping this may be possible before June 30 but it is contingent on receiving the narrative from Ngāti Manuhiri Settlement Trust.


Gazettal

- 21. The council as landowner can name parks and places by resolution through the exercise of its power of general competence under section 12 of the Local Government Act 2002. Local boards are the allocated decision-makers for the naming of local parks as resolved by the Governing Body 28 June 2018 resolution GB/2018/106.
- 22. Where the land is vested in council and held as reserve under the Reserves Act, the council may name or change the name of a reserve by notice in the Gazette (s16(10) Reserves Act).
- 23. The local board authorised the gazettal of park names adopted at their business meeting in May 2022 resolution HB/2022/61. The names were adopted as dual names and so are planned for gazetted as dual names.
- 24. In some cases the existing English names recorded in council's asset data base appear to have little value and many of the existing names in tranche one are just addresses or road names.
- 25. The sites identified for discussion are listed in the table below.

- 26. The local board could decide to remove the existing names and retain the Māori name as a sole name. Alternatively small amendments could be made to the old names if a dual name is preferred.
- 27. Our recommendation, if there is no signage on site and no community connection to the existing English name, is that the local board consider removal of the English name and gazette a sole Māori name. This could be confirmed on a case by case basis and a report would follow for a formal decision.
- 28. If there is a known connection with the current name then we would recommend gazetting the name as outlined in the table above.
- 29. Pārekareka has had one Māori name adopted as it is one contiguous site. See photo below. It does however have two English names. We recommend one name for the entire site.



30. TKR would like to discuss these English names with the local board and seek direction on the local board's preference for gazettal of the names.

Incorrect addresses

- 31. In order to reference and locate parks receiving Māori names, park addresses were included in the adoption report. Councils Geomaps database has been used to source these addresses. Discrepancies between differing layers within the Geomaps system have been identified. Consequently, some of the addresses used in the adoption report have the incorrect street number.
- 32. Corrections have been made in the TKR data base and any future correspondence or information around the name adoption will have the corrected addresses.
- 33. This does not affect gazettal as legal descriptions are used for that purpose.
- 34. There is no risk of confusion or of signage being installed in the incorrect park or location as the park and road names were all correct along with the SAP identification numbers.
- 35. Legal advice received suggests that aerial maps may be used in future for identification purposes rather than addresses to avoid future issues of this nature.

Tranche two site selection

- 36. Although not confirmed we expect there to be three iwi who will have an interest in naming tranche two.
- 37. If we allow for 5 sites per iwi this would make a total of approximately 15 sites to go forward for naming.
- 38. A list of parks with temporary names has been supplied by Parks and Community Facilities and these could be considered for the next tranche. See Attachment A.
- 39. Iwi have also been asked for any sites they would like considered and Ngāti Manuhiri has suggested Centennial Park in Campbells Bay.
- 40. Sites considered but not included in tranche one that were supported by iwi previously were
 - 21 Landmark Terrace- no signage accessway only
 - Hatfields Beach Reserve
 - Stillwater Reserve
 - Strand Reserve Waiwera
- 41. If Strand Reserve is considered then it may also be worth considering adjacent reserves of Waiwera Place Reserve and Waiwera Hill Scenic Reserve as they are all next to each other and it would seem sensible to consider naming at the same time.
- 42. There are three libraries in the Hibiscus and Bays Local Board area and it is recommended these go forward for naming in tranche two.
 - East Coast Bays Library
 - Orewa Library
 - Whangaparāoa Library
- 43. It is recommended the local board consider these recommendation and prioritise approximately 15 sites for naming in tranche two.

Financial considerations

- 44. The local board allocated \$21,000 in FY2022 that was carried forward for delivery of tranche two this year. Sharepoint line item 694.
- 45. Given the time frames required by iwi for naming in tranche one it is not expected to deliver tranche two names this financial year.
- 46. If the local board wish to continue with naming in FY 2024 and the funding is unable to carried forward then TKR suggest a small project budget of \$3000 be allocated next financial year to allow shared interests to take place and naming research to commence. This would be with the expectation that names would not be received until late 2024.

- 47. Following shared interests, the next milestone payment is required when names are received, we would plan for this to occur in FY 2025. This would require an additional \$9500 to complete the tranche in FY2025. This spreads the budget over two years, provides more time for iwi and will assist with any cost savings that may be required from the local board in FY 2024.
- 48. These calculations do not allow for any whakarewatanga.

Next Steps

- 49. The local board should advise their preference for gazettal of tranche one names and TKR will follow up accordingly.
- 50. The local board should consider the suggestions for tranche two sites with a view to making a decision by May if possible.
- 51. If the local board wish to progress with TKR next financial year a work programme line of \$3000 should be considered subject to this year's funding being unable to be carried forward.
